A PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD, R. & I.

Whereas Our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday, the seventeenth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and five; We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Tuesday, the fourteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and five; and We do hereby further, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and pleasure that the said Parliament shall, on the said Tuesday, the fourteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and five, assemble and be holden for the despatch of divers urgent and important affairs; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs, of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Tuesday, the fourteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and five.

PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS in pursuance of the Bishoprics Act, 1878, and the Bishoprics of Southwark and Birmingham Act, 1904, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England on the fifteenth day of December one thousand nine hundred and four certified to His Majesty under their common seal, that the annual value of the Birmingham Bishopric Endowment Fund, together with the annual sum which will ultimately be derived in pursuance of the last abovementioned Act from the contributory Bishopric of Worcester was not less than three thousand pounds. And that they the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners were satisfied that from the date of the foundation of the said Bishopric there would become and be payable to them under the provisions of the will of the late Reverend Canon Thomas Henry Freer an annual sum to be used as additional income for the said Birmingham Bishopric Endowment Fund which would be sufficient forthwith to raise the annual value of the said Birmingham Bishopric Endowment Fund to a sum of three thousand five hundred

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the abovementioned Acts His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, to order and declare as follows:—

(1.) The Bishopric of Birmingham is hereby founded.

(2.) The diocese of the said Bishopric shall consist of the Archdeaconry of Birmingham and the Rural Deanery of Handsworth and of such other parishes as shall be transferred to the diocese in pursuance of the Bishoprics of Southwark and Birmingham Act, 1904.

(3.) The Parish Church of Saint Philip at Birmingham in the county of Warwick subject to the rights of the patron and incumbent of such

church, shall be the Cathedral Church of the said I the enactment aforesaid, made a representation

Bishopric.

(4.) The Bishop of Birmingham is constituted a body corporate and is hereby invested with all such rights, privileges, and jurisdictions as are possessed by any other Bishop in England, and is subjected to the metropolitan jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

(5.) This Order shall come into operation on the publication of the same in the London Gazette.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, " chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches " to which they belong, with great advantage, and "places altogether extra-parochial may in some " instances with advantage be annexed to parishes " or districts to which they are contiguous, or be "constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it "shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, "or when the Bishop of any diocese shall re-"present to the said Archbishop that any such "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the "diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, "may be advantageously separated from any "parish or mother church, and either be con-"stituted a separate benefice by itself, or be "united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial, or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be " annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, "or be constituted a separate parish for eccle-" siastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing "(the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) "describing the mode in which it appears to him "that the alteration may best be effected, and "how the changes consequent on such alteration "in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe "lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesias-"tical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect "to patronage and rights to pews, may be made "with justice to all parties interested; and if "the patron or patrons of the benefice or bene-"fices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to "such scheme, or to such modification thereof "as the said Archbishop may approve, and the "said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or " modification thereof, and shall certify the same "and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to "His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for "His Majesty in Council to make an Order for "carrying such scheme, or modification thereof,

"as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Lord Bishop of London hath, pursuant to I

in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—
"I Arthur Foley Bishop of London beg leave

to represent to your Grace as follows:

"1. There is in the county and diocese of London the benefice or vicarage of Saint Paul, Wilton-place the parish whereof contained a population of seven thousand one hundred and twenty-nine at the last census. The net annual value of the benefice is one thousand two hundred pounds or thereabouts.

"2. There is also in the same county and diocese the benefice or vicarage of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington the parish whereof contains a population of nineteen thousand three hundred. The net annual value of the benefice is one thousand three hundred pounds or thereabouts.

"3. There is also in the same county and diocese the benefice or vicarage of All Saints Knightsbridge the parish whereof now includes by virtue of an Order in Council of twenty-ninth January one thousand nine hundred and four hereafter recited the area which under or by virtue of an Order in Council of third February thousand eight hundred and sixty-six gazetted on the sixth day of February thousand eight hundred and sixty-six was created a new parish of Holy Trinity Knightsbridge and formed out of certain parts of the then parishes Wilton-place and All Saiuts Saint Paul Knightsbridge.

"4. A new church has been erected under the provisions of a scheme made under the Union of Benefices Act, 1860, duly sanctioned by an Order in Council of twenty-ninth January one thousand nine hundred and four gazetted on the second day of February one thousand nine hundred and four such church taking the place of the original church of the said district of Holy Trinity and a new district has by an Order in Council been

assigned to such new church.

"5. It is therefore desirable that the part of the said original Holy Trinity district which was separated from Saint Paul Wilton-place should be now again annexed to the said parish of Saint Paul Wilton-place. It is also desirable that a certain district (shown on the plan hereto annexed and coloured pink) of the said parish of All Saints Knightsbridge which contains a population of about two hundred and fifty and lying contiguous to the said parish of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington should be separated from the said parish of All Saints Knightsbridge and annexed to the said parish of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington.

"6. It appears to us the said Bishop of London and we do hereby represent to your Grace that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, the districts hereinbefore referred to may be advantageously separated from the said parish of All Saints Knightsbridge to which the same now belongs and be respectively annexed to the said parishes of Saint Paul Wilton-place and

Saint Mary Abbot Kensington.

"7. The Bishop of London is the patron of Saint Paul Wilton-place and of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington and the rector of Saint Margaret Westminster is the patron of All Saints Knights-

bridge.
"8. The Reverend Montagu Villiers is the Poul Wilton-place, the Wilton-place, the Reverend Somerset Edward Pennefather is the Incumbent of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington and the Reverend Ravenscroft Stewart is the Incumbent of All Saints Knightsbridge.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, we the said Bishop of London have drawn up

the scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the districts so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said parish of Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington respectively and the mode in which it appears to us that the alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the necessary consents in pursuance of the Pluralities Act, 1838, of the patrons of the several benefices affected and in case you shall upon full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith we request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents aforesaid by your report to His Majesty in

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents of the patrons and Incumbents of the said benefices respectively, are as follows:-

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to annex to the said parish of Saint Paul Wilton-place all that part of the said present parish of All Saints Knightsbridge which is coloured pink upon the plan hereto annexed and which lies contiguous to the former parish viz.:—All that portion of the parish of All Saints Knightsbridge which lies to the east of the middle of Albert Gate and also to the east of the middle of William-street.

"It is proposed to annex to the parish of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington all that part of the present parish of All Saints Knightsbridge which is coloured green upon the plan hereto annexed and which lies contiguous to the latter parish which lies to the west of the middle of the Broad Walk Kensington Gardens.

"The Incumbents of the said parish of Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington shall respectively have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said several hereinbefore described districts so proposed to be annexed to their said several parishes of Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Ken-

"All the fees from churchings marriages and burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized or performed at the church or otherwise in respect of the inhabitants of each of the districts so proposed to be annexed to the said parishes of Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington shall belong to the Incumbent of the parish to which the same is hereby proposed to

"The patronage of the several benefices will coutinue as heretofore and the parishioners in the districts severally to be annexed to Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington will become entitled to accommodation only in the church of the parish to which they are so annexed.

"CONSENTS OF PATRONS.

"We Arthur Foley Lord Bishop of London as patron of the vicarage or benefice of Saint Paul Wilton-place and also of the vicarage or benefice of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington and the Reverend Herbert Hensley Henson Canon of Westminster and Rector of Saint Margaret Westminster and as such rector, patron of the vicarage or benefice of All Saints Knightsbridge do hereby respectively signify our consent as such patrons to the foregoing scheme for separating parts of the said

parish of All Saints Knightsbridge and annexing the same to the parish of Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington respectively.

"CONSENTS OF INCUMBENTS.

"We the Reverend Montagu Villiers Vicar of Saint Paul Wilton-place the Reverend Ravenscroft Stewart Vicar of All Saints Knightsbridge and the Reverend Somerset Edward Pennefather Vicar of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington do hereby respectively consent to the foregoing representation and scheme of the Bishop of London for the alteration of the boundaries of our respective parishes.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration;

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his report dated the fourteenth day of November one thousand nine hundred and four, which said report is in the words and

figures following:—
"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby

report to Your Majesty in Council:

"That the Right Reverend Arthur Foley Bishop of London has represented unto us (amongst other things):

"That there is in the county and diocese of London the benefice or vicarage of Saint Paul Wilton-place the benefice or vicarage of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington and the benefice or vicarage of All Saints Knightsbridge.

"That a new church has been erected under the provisions of a scheme made under the Union of Benefices Act, 1860, by an Order in Council gazetted on the second of February last in place of the original church of Holy Trinity Knightsbridge and a new district has been assigned to it and the area which formed the original district of Holy Trinity Knightsbridge now forms part

of All Saints Knightsbridge.

"That it is desired that that part of the said original district of Holy Trinity which was separated from Saint Paul Wilton-place should be re-annexed to the said parish of Saint Paul Wiltonplace: also that a certain district of All Saints Knightsbridge lying contiguous to Saint Mary Abbot Kensington should be separated from the said parish of All Saints Knightsbridge and annexed to the said parish of Saint Mary Abbot Kensington and the said Bishop also reports that such districts may be advantageously separated from the said parish of All Saints Knightsbridge and be respectively annexed to the said parishes of Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the Pluralities Act, 1838, the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme, together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop as the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefices of Saint Paul Wilton-place and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington of the Reverend Herbert Hensley Henson Canon of Westminster as the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of All Saints Knightsbridge and of the Reverend Montagu Villiers the Reverend Ravenscroft Stewart and the Reverend Somerset Edward Pennefather as the Incumbents respectively of the said benefices of Saint Paul Wilton-place All Saints Knightsbridge and Saint Mary Abbot Kensington has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue au Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the first day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-

third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of All Saints, Hastings,

in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of

Chichester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of All Saints, Hastings, is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend George Alfred Foyster, of Guise House, Aspley Guise, in the county of Bedford, Clerk in Holy Orders.

"And whereas the said George Alfred Foyster is desirous that the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of All Saints, Hastings, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Chichester.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Ernest Roland, now Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of All Saints, Hastings, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of All Saints, Hastings.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said George Alfred Foyster (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of All Saints, Hastings, now vested in him, the said George Alfred Foyster as aforesaid, shall be transferred from him to the said Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, and his successors, Bishops of the same diocese, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, and by his successors, Bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is

pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chichester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four, in the

words and figures following, that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His late Majesty, King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Saviour, Saint Albans, situate in the parish of Sandridge, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Saviour, Saint Albans, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edgar, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Sandridge which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Saviour, Saint Albans, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Saint Albans.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edgar, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Saviour, Saint Albans, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Saint Albans, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Sandridge, in the county of Hertford and in the diocese of Saint Albans, which is bounded upon the south by the parish of Saint Peter, Saint Albans, upon the west partly by the new parish of Christ Church, Saint Albans, and partly by the parish of Saint Michael, Saint Albans, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Michael, Saint Albans, from the said parish of Sandridge diverges northward from Sandridgebury-lane, and extending theuce north-eastward to and along the middle of Sandridgebury-lane for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Soot House-lane, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Soot House-lane for a distance of fortyseven chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Saint Albans to Sandridge, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road (thereby crossing the main line of the Midland Railway by Dead Woman's Hill Bridge) for a distance of two chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the fence which divides the close numbered 1 upon the map or plan which is annexed to this scheme from the close numbered 3 upon the said map or plan and extending thence south-eastward to and along the fence dividing the said close numbered 1 and the close numbered 2 upon the said map or plan from the said close numbered 3 for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to the point where the said fence meets the fence which divides the said close numbered 3 from the close numbered 4 upon the said map or plan, and extending thence south-eastward and in a straight line across Marshalswick Park for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts to the point where the road leading from Beaumont's Farm and the cottages called Hallheath to Marshalswick Farm meets Old Green-lane, and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of Old Green-lane for a distance of seventy-one chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Sandridge to Hatfield, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the boundary which divides the said parish of Sandridge from the said parish of Saint Peter, Saint Albans."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

Rochester.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, the said district of Saint Catherine, Loughborough Park, shall be dissolved, and that as and from the same day the whole of the area of such district as the same was defined and set forth in the Order in Council and in the map or plan above mentioned and as the same area is set forth and delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall be added to the said new parish of Saint John, Angell Town, and shall become and be and form part of such new parish.

WHEREAS by an Order of His Majesty in Council bearing date the twentieth day of May one thousand nine hundred and three entitled "The Inter-Colonial Council South Africa Order in Council, 1903," provision was made for the establishment of an Inter-Colonial Council to advise the High Commissioner for South Africa and Governor of the Transvaal and of the Orange River Colony in the manner and concerning the matters in the said Order described and set forth:

And whereas by a further Order of His Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and four, entitled "The Inter-Colonial Council South Africa Order in Council, 1904," sections V and XIV of the said Order were amended and other provision was made as is therein set forth.

And whereas it is expedient that section XV of the said first recited Order should be revoked and other provisions substituted for the same as hereinafter provided:—

Now therefore His Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as "The Inter-Colonial Council South Africa Order in Council 1905," and shall be read and construed as one with "The Inter-Colonial Council South Africa Order in Council, 1903," and "The Inter-Colonial Council South Africa Order in Council, 1904."

II. Section XV of "The Inter-Colonial Council South Africa Order in Council, 1903," is, as from the commencement of this Order, hereby revoked, without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder and in place thereof the following provisions shall be substituted and take effect:—

"XV.—(1.) The Council shall have power to authorize the construction of any railway in the Transvaal or Orange River Colony either out of public funds lawfully available for such purpose, or by private enterprise, and to enter into an agreement or permit the entering into an agreement by any person previously authorized in that behalf by the Council for the construction or management of any railway so authorized with the Government of the Cape Colony, or Natal, or with any private individual, corporation, or company.

"(2.) Every such agreement shall reserve the

power to expropriate the railway.

"(3.) The Governments of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony shall respectively take all necessary steps by legislation or otherwise to carry out and give effect to any arrangements made by the Council in accordance with the provisions of this Order in Council, with regard to the construction, management, control or expropriation of any railways within the two Colonies.

"(4.) For the purposes of this section, construction of a railway by the Government of the Cape Colony or by the Government of Natal or by a corporation or company shall be deemed to be construction by private enterprise.

to be construction by private enterprise.

"Provided always that no such agreement made by or on behalf of the Council as in this section provided shall take effect until the same has been approved by a Secretary of State."

III. His Majesty may at any time alter, add to or amend the provisions this Order.

IV. This Order shall commence and come into operation on publication in the London Gazette and shall be published in the High Commissioner's Gazette and in the Official Gazettes of the Transvaal and the Orange River Colony.

V. Judicial notice shall be taken of this Order

and of the commencement thereof.

W HEREAS by section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by section six of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act, 1885, it is enacted as follows:—

1. If Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the government or governments of any foreign state or states for mutual protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in any such state, shall be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under this Act, in priority to other applicants; and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in such foreign state.

Provided that this application is made, in the case of a patent, within seven months, and, in the case of a design or trade mark, within four months, from his applying for protection in the foreign state with which the arrangement is in force.

Provided that nothing in this section contained shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the date of the actual acceptance of his complete specification or the actual registration of his design or trade mark in this country, as the case may be.

mark in this country, as the case may be.

2. The publication in the United Kingdom, or the Isle of Man, during the respective periods aforesaid, of any description of the invention, or the use therein during such periods of the invention, or the exhibition or use therein during such periods of the design, or the publication therein during such periods of a description or representation of the design, or the use therein during such periods of the trade mark, shall not invalidate the patent which may be granted for the invention, or the registration of the design or trade mark.

3. The application for the grant of a patent, or the registration of a design, or the registration of a trade mark under this section must be made in the same manner as an ordinary application under this Act, provided that, in the case of trade marks, any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under this Act.

4. The provisions of this section shall apply only in the case of those foreign states with respect to which Her Majesty shall from time to time by Order in Council declare them to be applicable, and so long only in the case of each state as the Order in Council shall continue in force with respect to that state.

And whereas it pleased Her late Majesty Queen Victoria to make an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said enactment, by and in virtue of a Declaration signed and sealed by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris on the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, duly conveying the accession of Great Britain and Ireland to the International Convention and Protocol for the Protection of Industrial Property, signed by representatives of certain Powers on the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, and duly ratified on the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, power being reserved to Her Majesty to accede thereafter to the provisions of the said Convention and Protocol on behalf of the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, and any of Her Majesty's Possessions, which Declaration of Accession was duly accepted by the French Government on behalf of the signatory Powers, by and in virtue of a Declaration dated the second day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

And whereas by various Orders in Council Her late Majesty Queen Victoria was pleased to declare that the hereinbefore recited provisions of the said Act should apply to the several foreign countries named in the said Orders parties to the said Convention and Protocol.

And whereas on the fourteenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred, an Additional Act was agreed upon between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the governments of the foreign countries parties thereto for the purpose of modifying certain of the provisions of the said International Convention and the Protocol annexed thereto, the ratifications of which Additional

Act were duly effected except as regards the Dominican Republic and Servia:

And whereas by section one of the Patents

Act, 1901, it is enacted as follows:-

1.—(1) In the first proviso to sub-section one of section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883 (which section relates to the time for making applications for protection under international arrangements) the words "twelve months" shall be substituted for the words "seven months."

(2) An application under that section shall be accompanied by a complete specification which, if it be not accepted within the period of twelve months shall, with the drawings (if any), be open to public inspection at the expiration of that

period.

And whereas on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and three, the German Empire duly acceded to the said International Convention, Protocol, and Additional Act:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the ninth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and three, His Majesty was pleased to declare that the provisions of section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by section six of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act (Amendment) Act, 1885, and by section one of the Patents Act, 1901, should apply to the German Empire:

And whereas on the twenty-second day of September, one thousand nine hundred and four, the Republic of Cuba duly acceded to the said International Convention, Protocol, and Additional

Act.

Now therefore His Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Him by the above enactments, doth declare, and it is hereby declared as follows:

1. The provisions of section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by section six of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act, 1885, and by section one of the Patents Act, 1901, shall apply to the Republic of Cuba.

2. This Order shall take effect from the seventeenth day of November, one thousand nine

hundred and four.

And whereas it is, in the judgment of His Majesty, expedient for the public safety that certain fireworks of a dangerous nature should be prohibited except under certain conditions:

And whereas the provisions of section one of

the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the abovementioned provisions of the Act, His Majesty is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council to order and prescribe,

No firework which contains an admixture of phosphorus (whether or not in the amorphous form) with Chlorate of Potassium or other Chlorate, shall be manufactured, imported, kept, conveyed or sold, unless such firework shall have been specially licensed by the Secretary of State for manufacture or importation, and unless it is named and defined in a list of Author-

ized Explosives signed by a Government Inspector and in force for the time being.

HEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it was enacted that, in case it appeared to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground should be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case might require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, should be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications men-tioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require; provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation was so considered; provided also that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the lncumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Saint Edmund, Emneth, in the county of Norfolk, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the civil parish of Emneth without the previous approval of the Local Government Board and that burials

should be discontinued in the said parish as hereinafter directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the fourteenth day of November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and four, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burialground shall be opened in the said civil parish without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued as follows, viz.:

EMNETH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Edmund, Emneth, in the county of Norfolk; and in the churchyard as it existed prior to the year one thousand nine hundred and four, except as

(a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In the said portion of the churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial-place, with the exclusive right of burial therein.

Ex parte the President and Fellows of Saint John's College in the University of Oxford.

STATUTE made to amend a Statute framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), in relation to Saint John's College, in the University of Oxford, duly passed at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose on the twentieth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and four, by the votes of the whole number of persons present and voting, and submitted to His Majesty the King in Council.

Whereas in Statute III, 12, of the Statutes of the said College it is enacted :- "Every Fellow elected to an Official Fellowship, not being then married, shall vacate his Fellowship by marriage, if such marriage shall take place within seven years from the day of his election. Every Official Fellow shall reside in rooms in the College during the usual College Terms, unless the President and Fellows at a Stated General Meeting shall have given him leave to reside elsewhere; and there shall always be at least four unmarried Official Fellows resident in rooms in the College during the usual College terms. So long as that number is complete, an Official Fellow vacating his Fellowship by marriage shall not be incapable of being elected to fill the vacancy so created, if the College should desire to retain his services as a Tutor, Lecturer, or Principal Bursar.

And whereas it appears to us, the President and Fellows of the said College, that it is desirable that the said Statute shall be altered and amended in manner hereinafter appearing.

Now we, the President and Fellows of the said College, in exercise of the powers vested in us under and by virtue of the 54th section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do, by this present instrument under our seal, alter and amend Statute III, 12, of the Statutes of the said College, as hereinbefore set out, in manner following, that is to say: -By omitting the whole of Clause 12 in Statute III, and by substituting for it the following clause:

12.—(a) Every Official Fellow shall reside in rooms in the College during the usual College Terms, unless the President and Fellows at a Stated General Meeting shall have given him leave to reside elsewhere; and there shall always be at least four unmarried Official Fellows resident in rooms in the College durin g the usual College Terms, of whom two at least

shall be Tutors of the College.

(b) Every Fellow elected to an Official Fellowship, not being then married, shall vacate both his office and his Fellowship by marriage, unless an application by him for leave to retain his Fellowship after marriage shall, previously to such marriage, have been granted by the President and Fellows at either a Stated General Meeting or a Meeting held in Full Term, of which at least thirty days' notice shall have been given. Provided always that no application for leave to retain his Fellowship after marriage shall be entertained by the President and Fellows unless the Fellow applying shall have served as an Officer of the College for at least seven years.

(c) An Official Fellow, who shall have vacated his office and Fellowship by marriage, may be re-appointed to his office in the College and receive one hundred pounds per annum out of the corporate revenues in lieu of his Fellowship; Provided always that his marriage shall not have reduced the number of unmarried Official Fellows below the number required by

this Statute.

(d) Nothing in this Statute shall be so construed as to prevent the College from electing a person who is already married to an Official Fellowship, if the College should think fit.

STATUTE made to amend certain Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria, chapter 48), in relation to Saint John's College in the University of Oxford, duly passed at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose on the twelfth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and four, by the votes of the whole number of persons present and voting and submitted to His Majesty the King in

Whereas in Statute III, 1, of the said Statutes it is enacted (inter alia):—"The number of Fellowships exclusive of Fellowships held ex officio by the Professors of Arabic and of Mechanics and Civil Engineering shall not be less than fourteen nor greater than eighteen." And in Statute III, 9, "Every Ordinary Fellow (not elected under Clause 13 of this Statute) who shall be instituted to an ecclesiastical benefice or shall become entitled either by descent or devolution, or by virtue of any testamentary or other gift or settlement to property, or to any government pension, or be admitted to any office tenable for life or during good behaviour (not being an academical office within the University of Oxford), or to any office in the Permanent i

Civil Service of the State, and who shall retain such benefice, property, pension, or office for twelve calendar mouths from the day of his institution, accession, or admission thereto, shall, if the net annual value of such ecclesiastical benefice clear of deductions (except for property or income tax) shall exceed five hundred pounds, or shall exceed three hundred pounds if the benefice be in the gift of the College, or if the net annual income derivable by him from such property, pension, or office, or from any two or more of the above-mentioned sources (including or not including an ecclesiastical benefice) clear of deductions except as aforesaid, shall exceed five hundred pounds, vacate his Fellowship at the expiration of such twelve calendar months, or in the case of a benefice in the gift of the College at the expiration of eighteen calendar months from the avoidance thereof; and for this purpose the income which the estimated value of any property would produce, if invested in three pounds per centum Consolidated Annuities at the price current at the time of the acquisition thereof, shall, in case of doubt, be considered to be the income derivable from such property. The word 'property' shall in this clause include any estate or interest in possession in any property real or personal. In any case in which the property or sources of income may have been acquired at several times, the latest time at which any part of such property or any of such sources of income shall have been acquired, shall, in construing this clause, be considered as the time of the acquisition of the whole thereof. Except as aforesaid no Fellow shall be disqualified for retaining his Fellowship by reason of his having become possessed of any property or income or been instituted to any benefice."

And whereas in Statute V, 9, it is enacted inter alia):—"The Merchant Taylors' Scholarships, when vacant shall be filled up at Merchant Taylors' School or at such other convenient place as the President of the College and the Master of the Company of Merchant Taylors shall appoint on the eleventh day of June in each year, or in case that day shall be Sunday, on the day following by the election of boys educated in the said School for the two years at least last preceding, who have not exceeded the age of nineteen years. The Electors shall be the Master Wardens and Assistants of the Worshipful Company of Merchant Taylors, the President or Vice-President of the College, and two Fellows of the College to be annually appointed by the President and Fellows for that

And whereas in Statute XV, 4, it is enacted:— "If and so long as any pensioner shall hold any office in this or any other College any Professorship or Public Readership, any office tenable for life or during good behaviour, any office in the Permanent Civil Service of the State, or any ecclesiastical benefice, his pension shall not exceed such amount as with the net income derivable from all those sources will make up the sum of one thousand pounds per annum, and that no pension shall be tenable with a benefice in the patronage of the College exceeding in value three hundred pounds per annum."

And whereas it appears to us, the President and Fellows of the said College, that it is desirable that the said Statutes shall be altered and amended in manner hereinafter appearing.

Now, we, the President and Fellows of the said College in exercise of the powers vested in us under and by virtue of the fifty-fourth section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do by this present instrument under our seal, alter and amend the Statutes of the said College as hereinbefore set out in manner | hundred and four, by the addition and alteration following, that is to say:-

In Statute III, 1, by inserting after the words "Civil Engineering," the words "or retained under the provisions of Statute XV, Clause 4.

In Statute III, 9, by adding at the end of the clause the words "This clause shall not apply to the holder of a Fellowship retained under the

provisions of Statute XV, Clause 4."

In Statute V, 9, by omitting the words "or, in case that day shall be Sunday, on the day following," and by inserting after the words "who have not exceeded the age of nineteen years," the words "on the eleventh day of June in the current year." Provided always that whenever the eleventh day of June shall fall on Sunday, or on a day appointed to be observed as a Bank Holiday or public holiday, the election shall be held on such day in that year (not being earlier than the sixth day of June or later than the eighteenth day of June) as the said President and Master shall from time to time fix."

In Statute XV, by omitting the whole of Clause 4 and by substituting for it the following

clauses:

"4. Any Official Fellow who retires from service after having served the College for not less than twenty-five years may, at the discretion of the President and Fellows, to be exercised at any time after the expiration of such twenty-five years, and on one year's notice either receive the pension corresponding to his term of service, or be permitted to retain a Fellowship during his life with an additional stipend not exceeding one hundred pounds a year payable out of the Pension Fund.

"5. If and so long as any Pensioner or holder of a Fellowship retained under the preceding clause shall hold any office in this or any other College any Professorship or Public Readership, any office tenable for life or during good behaviour, any office in the Permanent Civil Service of the State, or any ecclesiastical benefice, his pension or the emolument of his Fellowship, as the case may be, shall not exceed such amount as with the net income derivable from all those sources will make up the sum of one thousand pounds per annum, and no pension or Fellowship so retained shall be tenable with a benefice in the patronage of the College exceeding in value three hundred pounds per aunum.

"In this clause the word 'emolument' shall include the additional stipend payable out of

the Pension Fund."

Provided that any Scholar who shall marry or be elected to a Studentship or to a place on the foundation of any other Collegiate Body within the University, or who shall without permission from the Governing Body previously accorded in writing cease to read for Honours, shall thereby vacate his Scholarship. Provided also, that nothing in this clause shall prevent the exercise at any time for sufficient cause of the power given by the Statutes of the House in force for the time being to the Governing Body of the House to deprive a Scholar of his Scholarship for any misconduct which in their judgment shall merit deprivation, subject to such appeal to the Visitor as is in the same Statutes provided, nor of that of inflicting any fines or penalties less than deprivation under any Bylaw of the House for the time being in force.

PRESTON CORPORATION TRAMWAYS.

BYE-LAWS.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Council of the Borough of Preston, being the Promoters of the Preston Corporation Tramways Undertaking, did on the 29th day of December, 1904, resolve that the following Bye-laws be made by them with respect to the said tramways under and in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Tramways Act, 1870:—

Interpretation.

1. Throughout these Bye-laws the word "Corporation" means the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Preston and such other Local Authority, Company, or person as may for the time being be authorized to use the tramways of the Corporation, and shall include any lessees or persons for the time being working the tramway system hereinafter referred to; the word "Tramways" means the tramway system for the time being worked by the Corporation, whether situate in the borough of Preston or the urban district of Fulwood; the word "Car" means any carriage or car run upon the tramways for the conveyance of passengers; the word "Conductor" means any officer or servant of the Corporation having the charge of or helping in the charge of a car; and the word "Driver" means any officer or servant of the Corporation driving or helping to drive a car.

Extent of Bye-laws.

2. The Bye-laws hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to every car using the tramways.

Entering or leaving Cars.

3. Every person shall enter or depart from a car by the step of the hindmost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise, unless so directed by the conductor.

No person shall enter or mount, or attempt to enter or mount any car arriving or standing at a terminus, stopping-place, or other place, until such passengers as may be upon the car and as desire to alight shall have alighted.

Entering or leaving Car in motion.

4, No person shall enter, board, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, board, mount, or leave any car whilst in motion.

Entering Full Cars.

5. When any car contains in the interior thereof the full number of passengers for which

seating accommodation, according to the notice thereof attached to the car, is provided in such interior, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount, or remain therein, except by the express permission of the conductor first obtained.

When any car contains on the outside thereof the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation, according to the notice thereof attached to the car, is provided on such outside, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount, or remain thereon.

Travelling on Steps, &c.

6. No person not being an officer or servant of the Corporation acting in the performance of his duty shall travel or ride on the steps, platforms, outside rails, buffers, or guards of any car, or shall stand, in any case, on the outside, or, except by the express permission of the conductor first obtained, in the interior of any car.

No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall board a car, and no person shall hold or hang on to any part of a car.

Disabled Cars.

7. If at any time a car becomes disabled or in any way injured, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall, upon the request of the conductor, leave the same, and, if such passengers have paid their fares, shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid. No person shall, except with the leave of the conductor, enter a disabled or injured car.

Smoking.

8. No person shall smoke or carry a lighted pipe, cigar, or cigarette inside any car, nor on the top of any car in front of the trolley standard.

Offensive Language or Conduct.

9. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language, or conduct himself offensively whilst in or upon any car, or spit or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any car or tramway station or premises used in connection with the tramway system, or in any way wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any car, play or perform upon any musical instrument, or distribute advertisements or tracts of any kind, or beg or collect money, alms, or subscriptions, or sell any article, or play any game, or gamble, or deposit remnants of food or fruit in or upon any car.

Intoxicated Persons and Persons suffering from Disease.

10. No person who is in a state of intoxication or affected with any dangerous, contagious, or infectious disorder shall enter or mount upon any car, and if any such person is found in or upon any car it shall be lawful for the conductor, or any other officer or servant of the Corporation to immediately remove such person from the car, and, if such person shall have paid his fare, he shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of his fare so paid.

Objectionable Persons.

11. No person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a car, soil or injure the seats, linings, or cushions of a car, or the dress or clothing of any passenger,

and no person who, in the opinion of the con-· ductor, might for any other reason be offensive to any passenger, shall be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any car, and may be prevented from entering any car, and shall not enter or mount any car after having been requested not to do so by the conductor; and if any such person be found in or upon any car, he shall, on request of the conductor, leave such car, upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

Damage to Cars.

12. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the seats, cushions, curtains, or linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or upon any car, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage any car. Any person acting in contravention of this Bye-law shall, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws, be liable for the amount of any damage so done.

Payment of Fares.

13. Each passenger shall, upon demand, or before leaving the car, pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the Corporation, the fare legally payable for the journey, and obtain a ticket therefor.

Any person leaving a car shall be deemed to have completed his journey.

No child under three years of age who is sitting on the lap of a passenger shall be liable to pay a fare.

Tickets.

14. Each passenger shall immediately, upon demand, show his ticket to the conductor or any duly authorized officer of the Corporation, and shall also, when required so to do by the conductor or any duly authorized officer of the Corporation, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

Tickets shall not be transferable, and shall only be available by the car on which they are issued.

Artisans.

15. No person not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the tramways, shall use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, or travel or attempt to travel on the tramways as an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer.

Luggage.

16. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not inside or on the roof of any car.

Dogs.

17. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in the interior of any car, nor, in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal is offensive or any annoyance to any passenger, shall the same be allowed on the outside of any

Firearms, &c.

18. No person shall enter, mount, or travel in or on any car with loaded firearms, or with any article, instrument, or implement which may, in the opinion of the conductor, be dangerous or offensive to any passenger.

Obstruction.

19. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any conductor, driver, or other officer or servant of the Corporation acting in the performance of his duty upon or in connection with any car or tramway.

Interference with the Duties of the Conductor or Driver.

20. No person other than the conductor or driver, or other servant of the Corporation acting in the performance of his duty, shall change or remove the route indicators or destination boards, or interfere with the controllers, brakes, lights, ventilators, trolley cord, or any part of the car or its equipment, or signal a car to start.

Power to remove Passengers committing Offences.

21. Any person who shall commit, whilst on any car, any legal offence or any breach of these Bye-laws shall, in addition to being liable to a penalty, be liable to be immediately removed from the car; and, if such person shall have paid his fare, shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of his fare so paid.

Conductors and Drivers to enforce Bye-laws.

22. Every conductor and driver shall, to the best of his ability, enforce these Bye-laws and Regulations, and prevent the breach thereof; and, if any such conductor or driver fails to enforce the same, as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach thereof.

Bye-laws to be placed in Cars.

23. There shall be placed, and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each car in use, a printed copy of the Bye-laws.

Penalty.

24. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and, in case of a continuing offence, to a penalty not exceeding ten shillings, in addition to the first mentioned penalty, for every day during which such offence continues.

Repeal of existing Bye-laws.

25. From and after the date of these Bye-laws coming into force, the Bye-laws and Regulations made by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses on the 28th February, 1895, and those made by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, and William Harding and Co. Limited, which came into force on the 1st of June, 1895, shall be repealed.

Date of coming into force.

26. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of April, 1905.
