PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and of the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the sixth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and forty-two and of the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter twenty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices situate within the metropolis and within the city of Westminster and the diocese of London namely: the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, and the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the firstly mentioned Act and were approved by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and were assented to by the patrons of the two benefices to be affected thereby, that is to say, by the Most Noble Herbrand Arthur, Duke of Bedford, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, who is the patron of the said benefice and rectory of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, and by the Reverend Leonard Edmund Shelford, Prebendary of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London, who as Vicar or Incumbent of the benefice of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields, in the said city of Westminster, is the patron of the said benefice and vicarage of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, and the same proposals were also assented to, subject to certain modifications, by the vestries of the parishes concerned, that is to say, by the vestry of the parish of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, and by the vestry of the parish of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street.

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter contained shall be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said benefice of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, is now full, the Reverend Edward Henry Mosse, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent thereof, and the said benefice of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, is vacant.

"And whereas the said Edward Henry Mosse has consented to become the first Incumbent of the united benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect.

"And whereas the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, as such Bishop

and the patrons of the said two benefices and the vestries of the said parishes respectively are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly but otherwise is based upon the said proposals.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Herbrand Arthur Duke of Bedford (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and seal) and with the consent of the said Leonard Edmund Shelford (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and seal) and with the consent of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, and of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street (in testimony of which consents this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent) we the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned, as follows:—

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and propose:—

"1. That the said benefice of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, and the said benefice of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, be united into one benefice under the style of 'The Benefice of Saint Paul, Covent Garden,' which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect, and the said Edward Henry Mosse, if he is then the Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, shall be the first Incumbent of the united benefice and it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said diocese of London to admit the said Edward Henry Mosse to the united benefice without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become the Incumbent of the united benefice.

"PART II.

"As to the Parish Church of the united benefice and the Church of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, and certain officers of the same and certain matters connected therewith we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect the Church of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church of the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the font, communion table, sacramental plate, bells and any suitable furniture and fittings of the church of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, shall be transferred to the church of the proposed new benefice hereinafter mentioned, or in the event of its being impossible for architectural reasons to use some of such furniture or fittings in the church of the proposed new benefice, then the furniture or fittings not so used may be transferred to such other church or chapel within the diocese of London as the Bishop may select.

"3. That upon the union taking effect if the tables of fees used in the two churches be alike in all particulars the table of fees used in the church which will become the church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parishes, but if such tables of fees be not alike in all particulars the same shall be of no authority and a new table of fees shall be made by the proper authority for the use of the united parishes as if the same were one parish.

"4. That in the event of the services of any of the church servants of the parish of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, who at present hold office being dispensed with by reason of the union taking effect, such servants shall, out of any moneys to be received by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the provisions of Part V of this scheme, receive such reasonable compensation as having regard to the length of his or her or their tenure of office and other circumstances of the case shall seem to us and to the Bishop of the said diocese of London equitable and proper. Provided always that it shall be lawful for us, if we shall see fit, in all or any of these cases to advance the compensation money or any part thereof out of the fund created by the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"5. That upon the final closing of the church of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, the register books of baptisms marriages and burials of the parish of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, shall be transferred to the church of the united benefice.

"PART III.

"As to the endowments of the united benefice we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties, revenues and income constituting the endowments (present and future) of the rectory of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, shall be transferred and annexed to the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the present parsonage house of the rectory of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, shall be the parsonage house of the united benefice, and the present parsonage house of the vicarage of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, shall form part of the endowments of the united benefice and shall be used as a house of residence for the assistant curate or curates of the united benefice.

"PART IV.

"Upon the subject of patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:—

"That the patronage of the said united benefice of Saint Paul, Covent Garden, shall be vested in the said Herbrand Arthur, Duke of Bedford, his heirs and assigns, and that the patronage of the new church and benefice which are referred to in Part VI of this scheme shall be vested as therein recommended and proposed.

"PART V.

"As to the church of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, and the site and appurtenances thereof and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials, site, furniture, or fittings of the same church we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:—

"1. That as soon as conveniently may be after the union has taken effect the church of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, be taken down.

"2. That subject to the provisions contained in Clause 2 of Part II of this scheme the furniture or fittings and the materials and site of the said church together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as aforesaid of the site and materials and furniture or fittings of the said church shall form one aggregate fund and shall be applied as follows and in the following order, that is to say:—

"(a) That we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England shall out of such moneys first make provision for the compensation or compensations mentioned in Part II Clause 4 of this scheme.

"(b) That we shall out of such moneys next set apart a sum not exceeding eight thousand pounds for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a new church for (and within the limits of) the new district constituted or to be constituted as contemplated by Part VI of this scheme.

"(c) That we shall out of such moneys next set apart a sum of six thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence to be applied towards the augmentation of the income of the united benefice in order that the incumbent for the time being of the united benefice may make provision for the pastoral supervision of that part of his cure which constitutes the present parish of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, in such manner as the Bishop of the diocese for the time being shall require or approve.

"(d) That we shall out of such moneys next set apart a sum of five hundred pounds to be applied as a repair fund for the present parsonage house of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, so long as it shall be used as a house of residence for an assistant curate for the united benefice and also such further sum as may be necessary for the purpose of redeeming the land tax chargeable upon such house.

"(e) That we shall next appropriate out of the said proceeds a sum not exceeding one-fifteenth part thereof as part of the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"(f) That so much of the remainder of such net proceeds as may be required shall be appropriated by us if the funds will permit for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a parsonage house or the purchase (and, if required, enlargement or alteration) of any existing suitable house for a parsonage house for and within the limits of the said new district constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid.

"(g) That if after providing the said proposed parsonage house for such new district there be any balance of funds remaining unappropriated such balance shall be invested by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as an addition to the endowment of the same new district, and the interest or dividends accruing in respect of such investment shall be paid to the Incumbent for the time being of the new district.

" PART VI.

"As to a certain new district and benefice, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That an ecclesiastical district within the limits of the metropolis or its vicinity (such district then having been or then being about to be formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England authorizing the formation or constitution of such district) shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church and (if funds will permit) a parsonage house shall be provided out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"2. That the patronage of such new district and benefice shall be vested in the Vicar or Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields, in the city of Westminster.

"3. That when a church for such district has been built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinbefore recommended it shall be consecrated by the name and style of Saint Michael.

"4. That as from the date of the licence or institution of the first Minister or Incumbent of the said proposed district and new benefice, all the properties, revenues and income constituting the endowments (present or future) of the said vicarage of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, except the parsonage house of the said vicarage, shall be transferred and annexed to the said proposed district and benefice and any income which may accrue from such endowments between the date of the union taking effect and the date of the licence of the first Minister or Incumbent of the said proposed district or benefice shall become and form part of the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two.

"Provided always that this scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval which by the seventeenth section of the said Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site of any church shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the church of Saint Michael, Burleigh-street, and of the site thereof together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof; and provided also, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes partly out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Emmanuel, Streatham, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Southwark, and partly out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Alban, Streatham Park, in the said county of Surrey, and in the said diocese of Southwark.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said new parishes of Emmanuel, Streatham, and Saint Alban, Streatham Park, are new parishes wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parishes of Emmanuel, Streatham, and Saint Alban, Streatham Park, which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purpose of Divine worship.

"And whereas a sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England towards the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as such district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act then of the said new parish and towards the maintenance of the minister or Incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August, and the first day of November in each year to such minister or Incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the lastly-mentioned Act, the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said capital sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the

understanding and condition that we should grant out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore-mentioned Act a capital sum of seven hundred pounds sterling in respect of which there should be paid by us to the minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as before mentioned a yearly sum of twenty-one pounds and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said intended district and of the nomination of the Incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said grant of seven hundred pounds sterling will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas the contributors of part of the said sum of four thousand three hundred pounds have nominated the Very Reverend William Hagger Barlow, Doctor in Divinity, Dean of the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, Frank Sellwood, of Collumpton, in the county of Devon, Esquire, the Reverend Thomas Graham, Vicar of Saint Peter, Southborough, in the county of Kent, Francis Augustus Bevan, of number 54, Lombard-street, in the city of London, Banker, and John Francis William Deacon, of number 20, Birchington-lane, in the same city, Banker, as the persons to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and the nomination of the minister or Incumbent thereof shall be assigned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of Southwark (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parishes of Emmanuel, Streatham, and Saint Alban, Streatham Park, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint James, West Streatham.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish then of such new parish and of the nomination of an Incumbent thereto, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said William Hagger Barlow, Frank Sellwood, Thomas Graham, Francis Augustus Bevan, and John Francis William Deacon, their heirs and assigns, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them

in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

All that portion of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint George, Newcastle-under-Lyme, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, which is bounded upon the east by the particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hartshill, upon the south-east partly by the last-mentioned cure and partly by the particular district of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Penkull, upon the west and upon part of the north by the parish of Newcastle-under-Lyme, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Newcastle-under-Lyme from the said new parish of Saint George, Newcastle-under-Lyme, at the junction of Hanover-street with Hassells-street, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Hassells-street for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with George-street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of George-street for a distance of ten chains and a half or thereabouts to a point near its junction with Shelton New-road and Stoke-road, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Newcastle-under-Lyme, from the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hartshill.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said particular district of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Penkull, which is bounded upon the north-east by the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hartshill, upon the north-west partly by the above described portion of the said new parish of Saint George, Newcastle-under-Lyme, and partly by the said parish of Newcastle-under-Lyme, upon the south-west by the parish of Hauford, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to

say, upon the south-east and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Hanford from the said particular district of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Penkhull, at the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from the Sewage Works of the Newcastle-under-Lyme Corporation into London-road across Lyme Brook, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said road leading from the said Sewage Works for a distance of six chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction with London-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of London-road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to the point opposite to the middle of the footpath leading from London-road to Victoria-road, and extending thence northward to and along the middle of such footpath for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to the point near the junction of Occupation-street with Victoria-road where the last-mentioned footpath meets the footpath which leads to Stoke-road and Hartshill, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Penkhull, from the said particular district of the Holy Trinity, Hartshill."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the thirteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen

Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes, to be taken partly out of the parish of South Stoneham and partly out of the new parish (sometime district) of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, both in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said parish of South Stoneham and the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, are cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of South Stoneham and of the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purpose of Divine worship.

"And whereas it is intended by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, so soon as the said proposed separate district shall be duly constituted, to submit to Your Majesty in Council a scheme for apportioning the revenues of the rectory of the parish of Saint Mary, Southampton, in the said county of Southampton, and in the said diocese of Winchester, in favour of the said proposed separate district so as to provide for the same an endowment of two hundred pounds per annum as from the date of the licence of a minister to serve such district in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, such endowment to be increased to three hundred pounds per annum so soon as a church or chapel shall have been built or acquired within such district and approved by us and consecrated in accordance with the provisions of the same Act.

"And whereas the Reverend William Durst, Honorary Canon of Winchester, and Rector or Incumbent of the said rectory of Saint Mary, Southampton, has nominated the Bishop of Winchester for the time being as the person in whom he desires that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district, and when such district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the said firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act then of the said new parish, shall be vested.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of South Stoneham and of the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of the Ascension, Bitterne Park.'

"And we further recommend and propose that without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of

Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district, and when the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or Incumbent thereto, shall be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester, and his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of the Ascension, Bitterne Park, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of South Stoneham, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, which is bounded upon the south and upon the south-east by the new parish (sometime district) of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-east, upon the north and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing at the junction of Middenbury-lane, Mousehole-lane, and Woodmill-lane, where the boundary of the county borough of Southampton diverges from the boundary of the parliamentary borough of Southampton and from the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, from the said parish of South Stoneham, and extending thence first northward, then generally north-westward, then westward, then south-eastward and then south-westward along the said county borough boundary (thereby following the middle of Woodmill-lane and the middle of the River Itchen) for a distance of one mile and thirteen chains or thereabouts to the point at the confluence of the stream which flows from Burgess-street along the north-eastern side of Bell's-row Copse with the River Itchen where the said county borough boundary diverges from the said river, and extending thence generally southward along the middle of the said river for a distance of sixty-three chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of South Stoneham from the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, which is bounded upon part of the east and upon the south by the parish of Saint Mary extra Southampton, upon the south-west by the new parish of Christ Church, Northam, both in the said county and diocese, upon the west, upon the north-west and upon the north by the said parish of South Stoneham and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point near the north-western entrance to the house and premises known as Beechwood where the boundary which divides the said parish of South Stoneham from the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, diverges from the middle of Middenbury-lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Middenbury-lane for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to a point due west of the north-western angle of the boundary of the said parish of Saint Mary extra Southampton, which angle is distant three feet to the east of the eastern side of the

said lane and extending thence in a straight line due east for a distance of seven yards or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Saviour, Bitterne, from the said parish of Saint Mary extra Southampton."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS by Section 418 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, His Majesty is empowered from time to time on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade by Order in Council to make regulations for preventing collisions at sea:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act 1862, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, Her late Majesty was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the regulations contained in the schedule thereto (being regulations for preventing collisions at sea and as to signals of distress) should be substituted for the regulations contained in the

first schedule to an Order in Council made under the same Act and on such joint recommendation as aforesaid and dated the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Amendment Act, 1862, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, Her late Majesty was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the regulations contained in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the eleventh August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, should, as regards British fishing vessels and boats when in the sea off the coast of Europe lying north of Cape Finisterre, be modified and added to as in the said Order and schedule thereto were more particularly set forth:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, Her late Majesty was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, the regulations for preventing collisions at sea contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, except the Article numbered 10 in such regulations, should be annulled, and the regulations for preventing collisions at sea, contained in Schedule I thereto, should be substituted therefor (with the exception aforesaid) and come into operation as regards British ships and boats:

And whereas by Article 10 of the Regulations contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, it was provided, amongst other things, as follows:—

(g) In fog, mist, or falling snow, a drift-net vessel attached to her nets, and a vessel when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag-net, and a vessel employed in line fishing with her lines out, shall at intervals of not more than two minutes make a blast with her fog horn and ring her bell alternatively.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have in pursuance of the said recited Act jointly recommended to His Majesty that the above recited Article 10 should be amended in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas the operation of this Order is urgent:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the said Act and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that as from the date of this Order the following provision, that is to say:—

In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain storms, drift-net vessels attached to their nets, and vessels when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag-net, and vessels line fishing with their lines out, shall, if of twenty tons gross tonnage or upwards respectively, at intervals of not more than one minute make a blast; if steam-vessels, with the whistle or syren, and if sailing vessels with the fog-horn; each blast to be followed by ringing the bell. Fishing vessels and boats of less than twenty tons gross tonnage shall not

be obliged to give the above-mentioned signals; but if they do not, they shall make some other efficient sound signal at intervals of not more than one minute,

shall be substituted for paragraph (g) of Article 10 of the regulations scheduled to the said Order in Council, dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and that the said Article 10 shall be read and construed accordingly:

And His Majesty is also pleased to direct that this Order shall come into force from the date hereof, and shall be a *provisional* Rule within the meaning of The Rules Publication Act, 1893.

WHEREAS by section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by section six of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act, 1885, it is enacted as follows:—

1. If His Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the government or governments of any foreign state or states for mutual protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in any such state, shall be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under this Act, in priority to other applicants; and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in such foreign state.

Provided that his application is made, in the case of a patent, within seven months, and, in the case of a design or trade mark, within four months, from his applying for protection in the foreign state with which the arrangement is in force.

Provided that nothing in this section contained shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the date of the actual acceptance of his complete specification or the actual registration of his design or trade mark in this country, as the case may be.

2. The publication in the United Kingdom, or the Isle of Man, during the respective periods aforesaid, of any description of the invention, or the use therein during such periods of the invention, or the exhibition or use therein during such periods of the design, or the publication therein during such periods of a description or representation of the design, or the use therein during such periods of the trade mark, shall not invalidate the patent which may be granted for the invention, or the registration of the design or trade mark.

3. The application for the grant of a patent, or the registration of a design, or the registration of a trade mark under this section must be made in the same manner as an ordinary application under this Act, provided that, in the case of trade marks, any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under this Act,

4. The provisions of this section shall apply only in the case of those foreign states with respect to which His Majesty shall from time to time by Order in Council declare them to be applicable, and so long only in the case of each state as the Order in Council shall continue in force with respect to that state.

And whereas by section one hundred and four of the said first-mentioned Act it is enacted as follows:—

(1) Where it is made to appear to His Majesty that the legislature of any British possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for His Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to apply the provisions of the last preceding section, with such variations or additions, if any, as to His Majesty in Council may seem fit, to such British possession.

(2) An Order in Council under this Act shall, from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in the Order, take effect as if its provisions had been contained in this Act; but it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to revoke any Order in Council made under this Act.

And whereas by section one of the Patents Act, 1901, it is enacted as follows:—

1.—(1) In the first proviso to sub-section one of section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883 (which section relates to the time for making applications for protection under international arrangements), the words "twelve months" shall be substituted for the words "seven months."

(2) An application under that section shall be accompanied by a complete specification which, if it be not accepted within the period of twelve months, shall, with the drawings (if any), be open to public inspection at the expiration of that period.

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, that the Legislature of the British Possession of the Colony of Ceylon has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks patented or registered in this country.

Now therefore His Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Him by the above enactments, doth declare, and it is hereby declared as follows:—

1. The provisions of section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by section six of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act, 1885, and by section one of the Patents Act, 1901, shall apply to the Colony of Ceylon.

2. This Order in Council shall take effect from the tenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and five.

And whereas the Right Honourable Aretas Ake's-Douglas one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State did by warrant under his hand and seal at Whitehall on the thirty-first day of May one thousand nine hundred and five in pursuance of the said thirtieth section of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, appoint William Ellis Hume-Williams, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, one of His Majesty's Counsel to be a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of and for apportioning the Councillors among the wards of the Borough of Maidenhead the number of such wards having been fixed by the Order of His Majesty in Council dated the tenth day of May one thousand nine hundred and five.

Now therefore I the said William Ellis Hume-Williams being such Commissioner as aforesaid and in pursuance of the said warrant and appointment hereby declare this to be my scheme for determining the boundaries of the wards of the said borough of Maidenhead and for apportioning the Councillors among the wards so determined. And I hereby fix and determine that the boundaries of the wards of the said borough of Maidenhead shall be as follows namely:—

Saint Mary's Ward.

The Saint Mary's Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line drawn from a point on the borough boundary at the eastern end of Maidenhead Bridge along the centre of the said bridge in a westerly direction and continuing thence in the same direction along the centre of Bridge-road, Bridge-street, and High-street to its intersection with Market-street, turning in a northerly direction along the centre of the aforesaid Market-street and Cookham-road to its intersection with Norfolk-road along the centre of Norfolk-road to its junction with the Marlow-road and thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of the said Marlow-road to the point at which it is intersected by the borough boundary at Harrow-lane and following the said borough boundary in an easterly direction from thence to the point at Maidenhead Bridge from which the line commenced.

Boyn Hill Ward.

The Boyn Hill Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line drawn from a point in the centre of High-street at its junction with King-street in a westerly direction along the centre of Castle-hill and the Bath-road to a point at which the latter road is intersected by the borough boundary and following the said borough boundary in a southerly direction to the point at which it crosses the centre of the Braywick-road and from thence along the centre of the said Braywick-road and King-street to the point in the centre of the High-street from which the line commenced.

Oldfield Ward.

The Oldfield Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line drawn

from a point on the borough boundary in the centre of the road at the eastern end of Maidenhead Bridge and proceeding thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Maidenhead Bridge, Bridge-road, Bridge-street and High-street to the junction of the latter street with King-street and proceeding from thence in a southerly direction along the centre of King-street and Braywick-road to a point at which the latter road is crossed by the borough boundary and following in an easterly direction the line of the said borough boundary to the point on the eastern side of Maidenhead Bridge from which the line commenced.

Belmont Ward.

The Belmont Ward shall comprise so much of the borough of Maidenhead as is contained within a line drawn from a point in the centre of High-street opposite the Town Hall in a line with the centre of Market-street and proceeding in a northerly direction along the centre of the said Market-street and Cookham-road to the junction of the latter road with Norfolk-road and turning in a westerly direction along the centre of Norfolk-road to its junction with Marlow-road and from thence following the centre of the said Marlow-road to a point at which the latter road is crossed by the borough boundary at Linden-avenue and from thence following in a westerly direction the line of the said borough boundary to a point at which it crosses the centre of the Bath-road and from thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the said Bath-road, Castle Hill and High-street to the point from which the line commenced. And I the said Commissioner in further pursuance of the terms of the said warrant and for the purposes aforesaid do hereby assign and apportion all the existing Councillors of the said borough of Maidenhead among the wards as hereinbefore determined of the said borough as follows namely:—

1. To Saint Mary's Ward three Councillors namely:—Sydney Reeve Langton, Charles Rockley, and William Fergusson Good.

2. To Boyn Hill Ward three Councillors namely:—David Wilton, Percy Matthew Lever and William Grierson.

3. To Oldfield Ward three Councillors namely:—Benjamin Hobbis, Edwin Hewitt and Arthur Upson.

4. To Belmont Ward three Councillors namely:—Andrew Millar Inglis, John Wesley Walker, and Philip Disney Thompson.
