

4. The provisions of this section shall apply only in the case of those foreign states with respect to which His Majesty shall from time to time by Order in Council declare them to be applicable, and so long only in the case of each state as the Order in Council shall continue in force with respect to that state.

And whereas by section one hundred and four of the said first-mentioned Act it is enacted as follows:—

(1) Where it is made to appear to His Majesty that the legislature of any British possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for His Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to apply the provisions of the last preceding section, with such variations or additions, if any, as to His Majesty in Council may seem fit, to such British possession.

(2) An Order in Council under this Act shall, from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in the Order, take effect as if its provisions had been contained in this Act; but it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to revoke any Order in Council made under this Act.

And whereas by section one of the Patents Act, 1901, it is enacted as follows:—

1.—(1) In the first proviso to sub-section one of section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883 (which section relates to the time for making applications for protection under international arrangements), the words "twelve months" shall be substituted for the words "seven months."

(2) An application under that section shall be accompanied by a complete specification which, if it be not accepted within the period of twelve months, shall, with the drawings (if any), be open to public inspection at the expiration of that period.

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, that the Legislature of the British Possession of the Colony of Ceylon has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks patented or registered in this country.

Now therefore His Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Him by the above enactments, doth declare, and it is hereby declared as follows:—

1. The provisions of section one hundred and three of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by section six of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act, 1885, and by section one of the Patents Act, 1901, shall apply to the Colony of Ceylon.

2. This Order in Council shall take effect from the tenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and five.

WHEREAS by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, section thirty as amended by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1893, it is provided (inter alia) that if the Council of a

borough agree to petition and the Council thereupon petition the King for the division of the borough into wards it shall be lawful for His Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to fix the number of wards into which the borough shall be divided; and the borough shall be divided into that number of wards and that where an Order in Council has been so made the Secretary of State shall appoint a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of the wards and apportioning the Councillors among them.

And whereas the Right Honourable Aretas Ake's-Douglas one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State did by warrant under his hand and seal at Whitehall on the thirty-first day of May one thousand nine hundred and five in pursuance of the said thirtieth section of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, appoint William Ellis Hume-Williams, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, one of His Majesty's Counsel to be a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of and for apportioning the Councillors among the wards of the Borough of Maidenhead the number of such wards having been fixed by the Order of His Majesty in Council dated the tenth day of May one thousand nine hundred and five.

Now therefore I the said William Ellis Hume-Williams being such Commissioner as aforesaid and in pursuance of the said warrant and appointment hereby declare this to be my scheme for determining the boundaries of the wards of the said borough of Maidenhead and for apportioning the Councillors among the wards so determined. And I hereby fix and determine that the boundaries of the wards of the said borough of Maidenhead shall be as follows namely:—

Saint Mary's Ward.

The Saint Mary's Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line drawn from a point on the borough boundary at the eastern end of Maidenhead Bridge along the centre of the said bridge in a westerly direction and continuing thence in the same direction along the centre of Bridge-road, Bridge-street, and High-street to its intersection with Market-street, turning in a northerly direction along the centre of the aforesaid Market-street and Cookham-road to its intersection with Norfolk-road along the centre of Norfolk-road to its junction with the Marlow-road and thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of the said Marlow-road to the point at which it is intersected by the borough boundary at Harrow-lane and following the said borough boundary in an easterly direction from thence to the point at Maidenhead Bridge from which the line commenced.

Boyn Hill Ward.

The Boyn Hill Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line drawn from a point in the centre of High-street at its junction with King-street in a westerly direction along the centre of Castle-hill and the Bath-road to a point at which the latter road is intersected by the borough boundary and following the said borough boundary in a southerly direction to the point at which it crosses the centre of the Braywick-road and from thence along the centre of the said Braywick-road and King-street to the point in the centre of the High-street from which the line commenced.

Oldfield Ward.

The Oldfield Ward shall comprise so much of the borough as is contained within a line drawn
