The following Despatches, relating to operations in Northern and Southern Nigeria, have been received by the Secretary of State for the Colonies:—

Government House, Calabar,

7th July, 1904.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.

Sire,

I have the honour to submit the following report upon the Military operations which took place in this Protectorate between September,

1903, and May, 1904.2. During this period forces varying from 200 to 400 combatants had to be employed in nine

separate districts of the Protectorate.

3. Operation No. 1 was undertaken in September, 1903, its object being the capture of a pirate Chief, named Bibikala, who, from his stronghold on Wilberforce Island, on the Nun branch of the Niger, had for many years terrorized the surrounding districts.

A force (7 Officers, 6 British Non-Commissioned Officers, 326 rank and file, 6 Maxims, 1 2.95 gun, 1 Gardener gun, 9 marine Officers, 1 sternwheeler, 4 launches, 3 armoured canoes, 1 steel canoe, E. J. Kelleher, Medical Officer, A. A. Whitehouse, Political Officer, 85 crews of crafts) assembled at Akassa, under the command of Colonel A. F. Montanaro, Royal Artillery; garrisons were placed in the principal settlements on the creeks up the Nun River. These prevented several townships from assisting the enemy. Bibikala was hunted from creek to creek, and finally, on the night of the 1st of October, was captured by canoe-men under Lieutenant H. C. V. B. Cheetham, Royal Naval Reserve, of the Southern Nigeria Marine. He was afterwards tried, found guilty of murder, and hanged. The success of the operation was largely due to the co-operation of the Marine Department, under the management of Lieutenant H. A. Child, Royal Navy. Colonel Montanaro commends Lieutenant G. A. S. Williams, Royal Fusiliers, for his work as Intelligence Officer.

4. Operation No. 2 under the command of Major A. M. N. Mackenzie, Royal Artillery, saw undertaken with the object of inflicting punishment on several towns in the Eket District, implicated in an attempt to murder the Assistant District Commissioner, Mr. E. C. Crewe-Read.

District Commissioner, Mr. E. C. Crewe-Read.

A Force (5 Officers, 1 British Non-Commissioned Officer, 185 rank and file, Mr. Cruickshank, Transport Officer, 2 Maxims, C. Azzopardi, Medical Officer, A. C. Douglas, Political Officer, left Eket on the Kwa Ibo River on the 16th September. Resistance was first experienced near Efoi on the 20th and 21st September, and subsequently, whilst marching thence to Ikpa, pits were found dug in the bush. The latter place was held in some strength, and Captain E. L. Roddy, Cheshire Regiment, commanding the advance guard, was one of the first wounded during the attack upon the town, which consisted of scattered compounds with high fences and thick intervening bush. Fighting continued until the 25th of September, after which date organized opposition ceased.

5. Operation No. 3 was undertaken to enforce the fulfilment of promises made by the people of Mkpani, in the Obubra Hill District, on the left bank of the Cross River, not to close their roads to the surrounding tribes, and to give up cannibalism.

A Force (8 Officers, 5 British Non-Commissioned Officers, 288 rank and file, R. E. Little, Medical Officer, A. B. Harcourt, Political Officer), commanded by Major A. M. N. Mackenzie, Royal Artillery, concentrated at Ugep on the Calabar River on the 1st December, 1903. It was attacked immediately upon entering the Mkpani country. Trenches had been dug on each side of the paths as well as round the Mkpani town itself. The enemy finally submitted on the 5th of December; the force suffered 14 casualties, including Sergeant-Major A. E. Klee, Royal Artillery, severely wounded, and Colour-Sergeant H. Pritchard, 3rd Coldstream Guards. A quantity of live stock was seized. Major Mackenzie commends No. 638 Sergeant Ali Bakare, B Company, Southern Nigeria Regiment, who remained at his post in the firing line though seriously wounded in three places.

6. Operation No. 4.— A force (15 Officers,

6. Operation No. 4.—A force (15 Officers, 5 British Non-Commissioned Officers, 2 2.95 guns, 428 rank and file, R. E. Little, Medical Officer, M. E. O'Dea, Medical Officer, A. L. Phillips, Transport Officer, R. Morrisey, Political Officer), under the command of Colonel A. F. Montanaro, concentrated on the 12th January at Mbiakpan, on the right bank of the Cross River, its

object being to bring under control the hostile Northern Ibibio district. The force was split up into columns which patrolled the country during a period extending from the 16th of January to the 4th of February. Considerable opposition was encountered, more especially by the columns under the command of Captain H. C. Macdonald, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, Lieutenant C. V. Fox, Scots Guards, and Captain W. J. S. Hosley, Lancashire Fusiliers.

On March 6th, Captain Macdonald was left in command of a force in order to complete thoroughly the disarmament of the towns in the district. By the end of the month this was reported to have been successfully accomplished, but not without determined opposition on the part of the enemy. Captain Macdonald reported that a search for a missing private ended in the discovery of the body cooked and half eaten in a village market place.

Colonel Montanaro brings to notice No. 2197 Private Ojo Otan, who in the action of the 16th January, at Mbiabon, though wounded in the face and knocked over, pursued his assailants, killing one out of three and bringing in Private Mandu Ibadan, who had suffered injury. Lieutenant G. A. S. Williams, Royal Fusiliers, Lieutenant H. A. Kirkby, Lancashire Fusiliers, and Captain Hosley are also specially mentioned in the Commanding Officer's report.

7. Operation No. 5 was conducted under the command of Captain I. G. Hogg, 4th Hussars, with the object of punishing the towns of Osea, Oriri, and Ndoto for attacking the District Commissioner, Mr. R. D. N. Raikes, during the previous month, when visiting the Ishan country, on which occasion 32 of the party with Mr. Raikes were wounded.

The force (7 Officers, 1 British Non-Commissioned Officer, E. J. Moore, Medical Officer, Major Winn Sampson, R. D. N. Raikes, E. F. Pryce (Political Officers), 241 rank and file, 1 7-pr. gun, 2 Maxims) left Asaba on the 24th December, and at Osea encountered stubborn opposition, which was overcome by the 15th January.

8. Operation No. 6 was undertaken with a view to suppressing a rising among the natives of the Asaba Hinterland. Under pressure of a secret society known as the "Ekumeku" or "Silent Ones," several mission stations had been destroyed and numerous friendly natives murdered.

A force (6 Officers, 4 British Non-Commissioned Officers, 215 rank and file, 1 7-pr. gun, 2 Maxims, W. E. B. Copland Crawford, Political Officer, assisted by J. Davidson and W. S. Boyle) left Asaba on the 17th January, commanded by Captain I. G. Hogg, 4th Hussars. Severe fighting took place, Colour-Sergeant W. Mendham being killed in an attack on the town of Ukunzu on the 28th January. On the 11th February Captain Hogg's command was reinforced by 1 Officer, 2 British Non-Commissioned Officers, 90 rank rank and file, 1 2.95 gun, under Local Captain H. P. Gordon, 4th Battalion Connaught Rangers.

On the 14th and 15th of February a final stand was made by the hostile natives in the town of Okuruku; stubborn resistance was met with, and the enemy was not completely routed until the King's compound, about a mile distant from the town, had been destroyed. This was effected after some 3 hours' fighting. By the 25th of April over 300 of the "Ekumeku" Society had been captured, and have since been tried by the Courts.

9. Operation No. 7.—On the 21st March, 1904, Captain I. G. Hogg assumed the command of a force of 9 Officers, 2 British Non-Commissioned

Officers, 288 rank and file, 1 mm. gun, 2 Maxims, E. J. Moore, Medical Officer, J. Davidson, Political Officer, with instructions to march through the Kwale country, whose inhabitants for the past 5 years had carried on incessant warfare with their neighbours to the detriment of native trading.

In July, 1903, the people of a town called Amebu had waylaid, murdered, and mutilated 2 women on their way to Obiaraku. Certain of the chiefs had further been reported to have offered human sacrifices.

Fighting took place at Atua, but by the 26th March active opposition had been crushed. The 6 chiefs mainly responsible for the human sacrificing were surrendered. It was subsequently discovered that the sacrifices had been offered to put an end to inter-tribal warfare. The method of sacrifice was peculiarly cruel and brutal. The victims were buried up to their necks in the market places, guns were buried with them, and their spirits directed to shoot anyone recommencing the war; pots were then placed over their heads, and they were left to perish.

By the 24th April the chief towns had been visited, no further opposition being encountered, and trade was in full swing when the troops left the district.

10. Operation No. 8.—Captain and Brevet Major H. M. Trenchard, Royal Scots Fusiliers, assumed command of a force of 4 Officers, 2 British Non-Commissioned Officers, 211 rank and file, 2 Maxims; R. E. Little, Medical Officer; A. A. Whitehouse, Political Officer, assisted by H. M. Douglas, on the 6th March, 1904, its object being the pacification of a portion of the Owerri District on the right bank of the Imo River. Several engagements took place, in all of which the enemy were routed. Major Trenchard re-ports:—"I found night surprises in the bush were most successful, and had an excellent effect on the enemy. Also, I tried rushing the enemy directly they opened fire, with very good results.

11. Operation No. 9.—On the 10th February, 1904, the German station at Nsanakang, situated close to our frontier station at Obokum, was attacked, abandoned by the German traders, and looted by the natives. As soon as news of the rising was received, a small detachment under Lieutenant R. D. Whigham, Lancashire Fusiliers, was sent up to garrison Obokum, but unfortunately arrived too late to save the German As troops became available this garrison was gradually strengthened, and Captain H. H. Sproule, Indian Army, took command on the 9th of March, 1904. The insurgents having 9th of March, 1904. overflowed from German territory into the Protectorate, and having compelled the inhabitants of several towns in our territory to join them, attacked Obokum on the 10th and 11th, and again more vigorously on the 27th and 28th of March. Both attacks were successfully repulsed, but Captain Sproule was wounded in the first one. The force at Obokum suffered great hardship from unavoidable exposure to weather and frequent tornadoes. The Political Officer, Mr. Nicoll, a valuable Civil Servant, contracted blackwater fever, to which he succumbed on his way down to Calabar.

12. The unsettled condition of the country between the German boundary and Okuni during this time necessitated the patrolling of the district by a force of 6 Officers, E. Dayrell, Political Officer, D. A. Ashton, Medical Officer, W. P. Jones, Transport Officer, 1 7-pounder gun, 3 Maxims, 267 rank and file, 3 British Non-Commissioned Officers, under the command of Captain

and Brevet Major Trenchard. This force concentrated at Okuni on the 28th of April, 1904.

13. After consultation with Colonel Muller, commanding the German Cross River Expedition, the country was patrolled in a south-easterly direction from Aparabong to the boundary, the German force acting in similar manner on the other side of the line. No opposition was encountered. All towns implicated in the rising were visited and fined. I consider it greatly to the credit of Major Trenchard and the Political Officer, Mr. E. Dayrell, that all instructions were carried out successfully without the firing of a single shot.

14. This completed the operations for the season 1903-4. Most of the fighting took place in thick bush, where an invading force is at a great disadvantage. All travelling is difficult in this country, and often arduous. Europeans, in addition to the risks incidental to warfare, are liable to contract disease from exposure and over exertion in an enervating and unhealthy climate.

The beneficial effect of these expeditions is already making itself felt by a very marked increase in both the import and export trade. Districts which hitherto have been strictly closed to strangers are now regularly visited by native traders from the coast ports.

15. In addition to those already named, the

following Officers specially deserve mention:

Captain G. T. Mair, Royal Field Artillery,
Lieutenant W. V. Hume, South Lancashire Regiment, Lieutenant A. Moore, D.S.O., Royal Dublin Fusiliers, Lieutenant J. Halfpenny, Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers.

16. Colour-Sergeant D. O'Connell, Royal West Kent Regiment, Sergeant-Major A. E. Klee, Royal Artillery, and Colour-Sergeant H. Pritchard, 3rd Coldstream Guards, Christopher Jumbo, Interpreter, and Native Non-Commissioned Officers Battery Sergeant, Major Bell, No. 1961, Artillery, Southern Nigerian Regiment, Ilesho Ondo, No. 729, Company Sergeant-Major, "H" Company, Mamadu, No. 715, Sergeant "D' Company, and Olowi Giwa, Sergeant-Major, also deserve recognition.

17. All the Commanding Officers did well and carried their work to a successful conclusion. Colonel Montanaro's great experience of bush fighting in this country greatly assisted him in the difficult work he had to perform in the expeditions where he was personally in command.

Captain Hogg commanded three different columns, and was continuously in the field for four months. On several occasions his force met with severe opposition. His reports are carefully compiled and full of useful information.

Major Mackenzie commanded two separate expeditions, meeting with considerable resistance in the Mkpani country. Major Trenchard carried out the two operations confided to him thoroughly and expeditiously.

The services of these officers deserve special consideration.

18. I have the honour to advise the grant of the African General Service Medal with clasp "Southern Nigeria, 1903-04" to the Officers, including Political and Medical Officers, and men of all ranks employed in the above operations.

19. The usual returns of ammunition expended and casualties are enclosed.

Sir,

have the honour to forward the report of the Acting Commandant on the operations in the Bassa Province consequent upon the annihilation of the party under Captain O'Riordan (Resident), and Mr. Amyatt-Burney, District Superintendent of Police, on the 16th and 17th December last.

2. The punitive force consisted of 262 rank and file, with 8 Officers and 3 British Non-Commissioned Officers, with 2 Maxims and 1 2.95 gun; the whole under command of Captain (local Major) | Fusiliers, 1st Northern Nigeria Regiment.

G. C. Merrick, Royal Artillery. The country is an extremely difficult one to operate in, since The there is much forest and dense cover. Okpotos are well armed, and have many Sniders and other arms of precision. Their custom is to lay ambushes, and to fire at the troops from the dense bush, seldom exposing themselves.

3. The remains of the deceased Officers, and a considerable quantity of their effects, including rifles belonging to their party, were recovered, and many of the survivors (who had been made slaves) were rescued. The portion of the country in which the fighting with Captain O'Riordan had taken place was traversed and re-traversed, and the hostile villages destroyed and fines inflicted, and many arms given in and destroyed. casualties amounted to 48 in all; only 5 soldiers having been killed, or having died of wounds. The operations lasted 3 months, and were carried out, in my opinion, with great ability.

4. Of the Officers whose names are mentioned by the Acting Commandant, I would especially

commend the following:

Major Merrick, Royal Artillery (in Command). Captain E. E. Williams, Northumberland Fusiliers, who has also done very excellent work on other occasions, and was strongly mentioned in the Kano Sokoto Campaign, but has never received any reward; he is an Officer especially deserving of recognition, since I have always heard that his Company was one of the smartest and best conducted in time of peace.

Lieutenant R. D. F. Oldman, Norfolk Regiment, is spoken of in terms of especially high praise by

Major Merrick.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.

Sir, have the honour to forward following

brief report on the Okpoto operations.

News was received at Lokoja on the 23rd December, 1903, that Captain O'Riordan, Resident of Bassa Province, who was on tour with a small escort of soldiers and police under Captain Burney, District Superintendent of Police, had been attacked in the neighbourhood of Agwatcha.
It was further stated that a force of Okpotos

was moving on Dekina.

A force which consisted of 262 native ranks, 34 enlisted carriers, 307 temporary carriers, and the following Officers, British Non-Commissioned Officers, andarmament was immediately mobilized:

Ammunition, Royal Artillery Reserve, nil, 9 common, 4 case, 48 shrapnel. Small arms, 300 rounds per carbine; Maxims, 6 belts each.

Of this force, 50 native rank and file under Lieutenant McLay and Colour-Sergeant Buey were forthwith ordered across the river via Mozum, and reached Dekina, some 18 miles distant from the river, the same night. following morning, 24th December, 1903, a further party of 54 native rank and file, and 1 2.95 quick-firing gun, crossed the river, reaching Dekina at 4 A.M. on the 25th December. News from survivors and native sources now left no room for doubt that both Europeans had been killed, and the remainder of the force crossed the river. The whole force massed at Oketti, 4 miles

east of Dekina, on January 2nd, 1904.
Agwatcha was reached on the 5th January, and here the first reliable information of the disaster was obtained. Major Merrick now organized a light column with European provisions for 7 days. This column consisted of the whole of his force, except 2 sections Infantry under a British Non-Commissioned Officer, who, with 200 carriers, were left at Agwatcha in charge of reserve ammunition,

stores, &c.

Opposition was first met with on the 6th January, when Major Merrick obtained information that an ambush had been prepared in a long stretch of bush about 2 hours distant from Agwatcha. This stretch was carefully scouted and after about 2 hours, fire was opened by the enemy. The force pushed on, driving the enemy through Kworobia, which place, though stock-aded, was not held. This place was occupied and about 2 hours after occupation the enemy commenced sniping from the bush. They were charged, however, and driven off. Our casualties

that day were 1 native killed and 1 wounded.
From the 7th to the 12th January, Major Merrick made a sweeping movement to the south, covering an area of some 20 miles by 15, and on the latter date returned to his advanced base at Agwatcha. The operations during this 7 days may best be described as a reconnaissance in force, as owing to the total absence of reliable intelligence and maps, Major Merrick had to glean what he could from native sources, and push his way bit by bit into the disaffected districts. In all 10 villages were rushed and destroyed, the enemy adopting the usual bush tactics, namely, trying to ambush the force, clearing out immediately they were discovered after opening fire, and returning at night to snipe the camp. Major Merrick's casualties so far were 11 killed and wounded. He was on more than one occasion able to inflict considerable punishment on the enemy. The nature of the country, thick jungle and forest, had seldom rendered it

Lieutenant H. F. Baillie, Seaforth Highlanders, | part been expended in snap shots at a single enemy or groups of half-a-dozen or so.

So far the expenditure of ammunition was 10 shell and 8,263 rounds 303 small arms, or 40 rounds per man, which in itself speaks well as to the control of fire. Large quantities of live stock and foodstuffs had been captured. Two men captured from Captain O'Riordan's escort had been rescued and several carbines recaptured.

The next five days no operations of consequence took place. Separate columns, under Captains Williams and Rose, D.S.O., visited the surrounding villages, but the enemy were not located in any force. The wounded were sent back to Lokoja. On the 18th January, Major Merrick moved the whole of his force to Giatu, on the south-east limit of the country visited, his intention being to work south-west and west, at the same time going over some of his old ground.

On the 19th, Major Merrick attacked the town of Agioma, which had previously been visited from a different side. Here he found the enemy who had evacuated the place on the 10th once more in position, but practically no stand was made. Another town was subsequently rushed and destroyed, and the force halted at Kushagi, which was friendly. Our casualties on the day were one man.

On the 20th and 21st other unfriendly towns were surprised and destroyed, and a considerable amount of ground, considering the thickness of the bush, was covered—i.e., some 34 miles. During these days fighting was only of a desultory sort, and one casualty only occurred. On the evening of the 21st camp was pitched at Biradu, which was the southern limit of the disaffected country. Here there is a colony of Hausas, Nupes, and other friendly tribes. It being unnecessary for the moment to go further south, Major Merrick now struck north-west towards Dekina, arriving at that place on the 23rd, having thoroughly reconnoitred the country some 30 miles on the way and destroyed Afojiji, a town which had fired on the late Captain O'Riordan's party. No opposition was met with, the only casualties being two followers who died of disease. From Dekina, Major Merrick moved south to the River Niger at Idah, arriving there on the 27th. Here he was re-inforced by an officer and 36 rank and file, and was able to send back to Lokoja his sick and wounded. On the 29th the force struck east by a direct road south of that taken viâ Dekina, and passing Biradu, entered the hostile zone again on the 2nd February, meeting with slight resistance. 3rd, five villages were rushed and destroyed, and some captures of cattle and supplies were made; the column moving north to Ankpa on the 4th.

From the 5th February to the 12th, the whole time was spent in the centre of the disaffected district, in endeavouring to locate Okpotos, who had now left their towns and were in hiding in the bush. Some captures of cattle were made, but it was seldom that the force was able to get in touch with the enemy. On the evening of the 12th, after successfully turning two ambushes, Kushagis friendly village was again occupied, and another of the captured policemen of Captain O'Riordan's party escaped and came in to camp; during the past seven days two other fugitives from the ill-fated patrol had also joined the column. On the 13th February, having gained useful information from the fugitive policemen, Major Merrick was able to locate the enemy and inflict punishment. His casualties were one man killed.

possible to make use of the 2.95 quick-firing On the 14th February the force conveying sick gun, and the small arms rounds had for the most and wounded moved north towards Amagide,

detaching parties to the west and south-west among the disaffected towns; some sharp fighting ensued, the enemy being driven back with loss, and some prisoners being taken. This action was of the usual bush fighting order, the expenditure 1,689 rounds or 5 per man, approximately being small, as were our casualties, which numbered 4. On the 15th Major Merrick continued a northerly route, visiting towns already destroyed. These had been re-occupied and the houses re-roofed. Some fighting took place, our casualties being three killed and wounded. the town of Olah, which refused to come out and talk, articles belonging to the late Captain Burney were found. The town was destroyed. An officer and two sections of infantry in charge of convoy proceeded thence to the River Benue at Amagedi en route for Lokoja. The remainder of the column moving once more west, reached Lafia on the 17th, having met only little opposition on the way and suffering only one casualty. On the 18th the stockaded town of Goddo was successfully carried, the 2.95 quick-firing gun doing good work, and 2 Companies Infantry under Captain Williams and Lieutenant Oldman being especially mentioned for their coolness and the able way in which they were handled. Our casualties were 7.

At 2 a.m. on the 19th the enemy made a night attack, wounding 4 men. The troops behaved well, and there was no confusion. Star shells were fired, and the bush round the camp swept with rifle fire. When day broke parties were sent out on both flanks, the main body moving to Kushagi. The enemy anticipating our movements, the main body was fired on from trenches 50 yards in length, constructed parallel to the road and some 15 yards from it. Although the fire was heavy and continuous, the Okpotos as usual retired at once when discovered.

The country being more open, Major Merrick on this occasion attempted to draw the enemy to attack, but only the bolder of their scouts came into the open. These met with a severe check. Our casualties were six. In the action Major Merrick particularly notes the coolness of Lieutenants Oldman and McLay. On the 21st the column marched to Agwatcha, having arranged to meet Lieutenant Baillie and returning convoy at that place on this date. The march, some 25 miles, was a long one when one considers the nature of the country. The narrowness of the nature of the country. paths, the dense bush, the necessity of careful scouting, and the scarcity of water rendered it necessary to move slowly, and the troops were on the march 11 hours. At Agwatcha the first real signs of surrender on the part of the Okpotos were noticed. Some carbines and Sniders taken from Captain O'Riordan's party being brought in, and three more of his followers, whilst the enemy handed over some of their own guns. From the 21st to the 28th no movements of importance took place. On the 28th the force again reached Kushagi's village, having met with no opposition; 29th, more Government carbines and sniders captured by the Okpotos from the late Resident, and many of their own guns were surrendered.

1st March, the scene of the night attack of the 19th was revisited and surrounding towns reconnoitred, one only was stockaded, and that but feebly held. On the 2nd and 3rd Major Merrick moved east through the disaffected districts to the confines of the Munchi country. These, although suspicious and nervous, were not hostile, and gave guides. The country here is noted as more open. On the 5th March, Major Merrick reached Obojibi, the extreme south-east boundary of the Okpoto country; the natives

are near akin to the Muntchis, and armed with poisoned arrows; the country is more open than Igara, and is better watered; the bush immediately along the streams is, however, very dense. From the 6th March to the 12th, Major Merrick once more went over most of the ground previously covered, but met with no further resistance. On the 12th March, he arrived at Iddah, en route for Lokoja, having left a strong garrison. The country formerly disaffected, but now under control.

I attach a list of casualties, 48 in all—these are on the whole not large; the operations lasted just three months. Major Merrick recommends the following Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers for special consideration, and I have much pleasure in submitting his list to your Excellency. Major Merrick is not fulsome in his praise of those under him, and his selections are, I know, brought forward after careful consideration.

As regards Major Merrick himself, I feel sure your Excellency will bring him to favourable notice. The operations were, as you have already stated in despatches to the Secretary of State and others, admirably carried out.

Major Merrick showed not only skill as a leader, but also tact and discrimination in dealing with the people; where punishment was deserved it was thoroughly administered, and where leniency was advisable common sense and tact were used.

Captain Williams commanded his company with ability throughout the expedition. This Officer has seen much service in this country; is the beau ideal of a company commander, and a fine leader of coloured troops.

Lieutenant Oldman commanded his company with ability, and displayed initiative and enterprise; he rendered invaluable service; I specially commend him to your notice.

Lieutenant McLay has by his personal example frequently encouraged his men, and always led them with the greatest dash.

Lieutenant Spinks handled his gun well, whenever it was required, and was noticeable for the efficient way he placed his men in the bush and kept them on the alert.

Lieutenants Galloway, Royal Artillery, and Sewell, Royal Fusiliers, have also done good work.

Sergeant Buey has done good sound work throughout.

Of the native ranks, I note No. 89 Corporal Edee, Royal Artillery; No. 422 Yatto Yola, No. 1111 Daday, 1st Northern Nigeria Regiment; No. 1331 Lance-Corporal Baba Duchi, and No. 524 Private Lawani Kegi, 2nd Northern Nigeria Regiment, as deserving of special consideration.

In this connection I would also remind your Excellency of the good work done by Captain Byng-Hall, Suffolk Regiment, who succeeded Major Merrick in Bassa. This Officer carried on the work begun by Major Merrick, and in relation to the recovery of the remains of the two murdered Officers showed peculiar delicacy.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit a summary of Minor Field Operations conducted in the year 1904.

2. In February, in consequence of the lawless and defiant attitude of the Dakakeri tribe, lying on the direct route between Zungeru and Sokoto (via Kontagora), and various outrages on caravans committed by them, I authorized an expedition to subdue the tribe. It was under the command of Lieutenant (local Captain) Dyer, D.S.O., 2nd Life Guards, and accompanied by Major Sharpe, C.M.G., as Political Officer, and consisted of 1 British Non-Commissioned Officer, 88 rank and file, 1st Battalion, a Maxim, and a 7-pounder gun. The Commandant, Colonel Lowry Cole, reports as follows:—

"Captain Dyer left Kontagora on the 1st

March, 1904, accompanied by the Resident, Major Sharpe, as Political Officer. Ebo, in the Dakkakerri country, was reached on the 5th March, and, as the people refused to give up their weapons or pay a fine, Captain Dyer captured and destroyed the town, which is situated on very steep rocky hills. The inhabitants offered considerable resistance, and the nature of the ground which was full of caves and crevices favoured them. Our casualties were one private killed.

Colonel Cole submits Captain Dyer's name for honourable mention.

3. Gurkhawa, Yergum, and Montoil. These wild pagan tribes occupy the country north of Wase, on the high road from the Benue to Bauchi. They have constantly given trouble, and, after several murders of traders, they killed and ate the Government messenger* sent to warn them to desist. The expedition was under Lieutenant (local Captain) P. H. Short, Gloucestershire Regiment, and was accompanied by Mr. Vischer, as Political Officer, and consisted of 2 other Officers, 1 British Non-Commissioned Officer, 1 section No. 1 Battery, 99 rank and file 2nd Battalion, with a Maxim. The Commandant reports as follows:—

"The town of Yellua was reached on the 25th March, and on the same night march was made and an attack delivered on the group of villages at Gurkhawa, at dawn, on the 26th March, with complete success. There were no casualties on our side

our side.

"On the 31st March the Yergum territory was entered, and on the 2nd April Brott, their chief village, reached. Owing to the difficult and mountainous nature of the country the Officer commanding determined to stay there some days, and by harassing attacks and denying the only water in the vicinity to the inhabitants, to force their submission. There was some fighting on the 2nd and 3rd April. On the 4th an escort which had been detailed to accompany the Political Officer while surveying was heavily attacked. The enemy was driven off. Captain Short mentions specially the gallant conduct of Corporal Are Omoah, 2nd Northern Nigeria Regiment, who was temporarily in command of the escort, and though wounded in the head with a poisoned arrow, continued to handle his men with ability. Our casualties were 2 soldiers and 2 carriers wounded.

"Fighting continued on the 5th April, and on the following day another important village, Lantang, was visited, and more resistance met with.

"On the 7th and 8th the headmen of Yerghum came in and made submission.

"On the 11th April, the territory of the Montoil tribe was entered, and between that date and the 17th there was desultory fighting. On the 18th, the Montoil headmen came in and made submission.

"Captain Short, I think, deserves credit for his conduct of the operations. He mentions the good services of Dr. Ellis, West African Medical Staff, and also of Corporal Are Omoah; the latter I consider worthy of mention at least."

4. Lieutenant Browne, West African Frontier Force, had been sent, with a patrol along the southern frontier to prevent any smuggling of gin, arms, &c. On his way back, with 30 rank and file, he endeavoured to ascend Semolika (a precipitous hill, impassable for carriers or horses), being unaware that the people were hostile

^{*} It afterwards transpired that they had eaten the wrong man.

He was attacked and wounded, and 5 soldiers | and his servant were killed, 16 soldiers and 1 carrier wounded (3 soldiers and the carrier since dead), leaving 4 rifles and 3 boxes of ammunition in the hands of the enemy. The people who inhabit this hill are a band of robbers and murderers, who terrorised the country and who have long been a trouble to the Administration, and it was supposed that Lieutenant Browne was aware of their attitude. The expedition sent to make reprisals for this outrage was under the command of Major Merrick, Royal Artillery, and was accompanied by Captain Larymore, Royal Artillery, C.M.G., as Political Officer. It consisted of 5 Officers and Medical Officer, 4 British Non-Commissioned Officers. 2 95 guns, a Maxim, and 213 rank and file. The Commandant reports that "on 18th October, under cover of the fire of the gun, which was got into position on a hill opposite, a party under Lieutenant L. Galloway, Royal Artillery, assaulted the hill by the only apparently practicable path, another party being sent round to cut off the enemy's retreat.

"The enemy fought in a very determined way, and it was only after some hard fighting, during which Lieutenants Galloway and Burnett and 9 rank and file were wounded (Lieutenant Galloway twice), that the town was eventually carried.

"On the 21st, the headmen of Semolika made their submission. The restitution of the lost rifles and ammunition was demanded and they were called on to surrender 50 Dane guns in addition. The lost rifles and ammunition were restored on the 22nd; but as by the 23rd the Dane guns had not been brought in, Lieutenant Galloway and 70 men moved against a village called Ogpwe to which most of the Semolika people had retired. This had the desired effect, and without further fighting 24 guns were brought in and satisfactory arrangements made for the recovery of the fines imposed."

He adds, "I desire to bring to your notice for special mention, the name of Major Merrick for the capable way in which he carried out the operation. He mentions specially Lieutenant Galloway for good leading and gallantry, and also brings to notice the names of Lieutenant Burnett, Highland Light Infantry, 2nd Northern Nigeria Regiment, Sergeant Williams, 1st Artillery, Northern Nigeria Regiment, No. 2571, Private Jigallah, 2nd Northern Nigeria Regiment, No. 2327, Private Ibrahim Kano, 2nd Northern Nigeria Regiment, No. Royal Artillery 5, Gunner Isa 1st Artillery, Northern Nigeria Regiment.

These operations were particularly arduous the hill being some 1,700 feet high and most precipitous, and I concur with the Commandant in considering that they were carried out in an exceptionally capable way.

5. The Kilba Tribe close to the German border, North of Yola, had closed the main route by attacks on caravans, &c., and Lieutenant I. G. Sewell, Royal Fusiliers, was sent against them in July, with a total force of 2 Officers, 2 Non-Commissioned Officers, and 152 rank and file, and 2 Maxims. It was accompanied by Mr. Dupigny as Political Officer, and the Commandant reports that "there was a good deal of opposition, but no serious fighting." Our casualties were 2 carriers wounded.

"There was a great deal of hard marching and work generally, and Lieutenant Sewell deserves credit for the way in which he conducted the operations."

6. I concur in the recommendations made by the Commandant, and I have the greatest pleasure in recording my own appreciation of the

gallantry, skill, and humanity with which all these unavoidable expeditions were conducted.
