Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this twenty-third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and five, and in the fifth year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," as amended by "The Pluralities Act, 1850," it is, amongst other

things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear "to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect "to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be "represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more "benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual "sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, "being either in the same parish or contiguous to "each other, and of which the aggregate popula-"tion shall not exceed one thousand five hundred "persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the "said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on "such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or "patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory "or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, "is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry "and consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause with respect to his own diocese "a statement in writing of the facts, and in "other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid "representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such "benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with "notice to any person or persons interested, that "he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, "show cause in writing under his, her, or their "hand or hands to the said Archbishop, against "such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown "within such time, the said Archbishop shall "certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to "His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be the said and the said to "be lawful for Majesty in Council to make the said Archbishop shall are the said Archbishop shall be said and the said Archbishop shall be said and the said Archbishop shall be sa "and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such "benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan do hereby certify

to Your Majesty in Council:
"That the Right Reverend Charles late Lord Bishop of Worcester as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Oxhill and the rectory of Whatcote both in the county of Warwick having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed fifteen hundred persons may with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and is not of inconvenient extent and that Henry Oldham Soutter, of number 19, Onslow-gardens, South Kensington, London, Esquire, the patron or person entitled to present to both the benefices (being rectories) of Oxhill and Whatcote, con-

sents to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Charles late Lord Bishop of Worcester, our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the said patron and the copies of the representation and notices before mentioned are

hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the Right Reverend Herbert Edward Lord Bishop of Winchester, as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Hartley Mauditt and the perpetual curacy of West Worldham, both in the county of Hants, having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one hundred and forty-two persons may with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and is not of inconvenient extent, and that Emily Plummer, Widow, the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice (being a rectory) of Hartley Mauditt, and the Warden and Scholars Clerks of Saint Mary College, Winchester, being the patrons or persons entitled to present to the benefice (being a perpetual curacy) of West Worldham respectively consent to the proposed union

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Winchester, our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the said patrons and the copies of the representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice for cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes and for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall collate, present, or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say:—the first two turns in every three turns of presentation shall belong to, and be exercised by, the patron for the time being of the said rectory of Hartley Mauditt, and the third turn in every three turns shall belong to, and be exercised by, the patron for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of West Worldham.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall collate, present, or nominate to such united benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say:—the first two turns in every three turns of presentation shall belong to, and be exercised by, the patron for the time being of the said rectory of Hartley Mauditt, and the third turn in every three turns shall belong to, and be exercised by, the patron for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of West Worldham.

Bye-law so made shall not take effect until it is
submitted to His Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the Port Talbot Pilotage Board, being a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of the said Act, duly made certain Bye-laws which were submitted for the confirmation of Her late Majesty and were duly confirmed by Order in Council dated the third day of March, one thousand nine hundred:

And whereas the said Port Talbot Pilotage Board have made and submitted for the confirmation of His Majesty certain Bye-laws, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, in substitution for the said Bye-laws hitherto in force:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed new Bye-laws are proper and reasonable:

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1898, have been

complied with:

Now therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council is pleased to revoke the said Order in Council dated the third day of March, one thousand nine hundred, and is further pleased to approve of, and doth by this Order confirm, the said new Bye-laws, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE.

PORT TALBOT.—PILOTAGE RATES, BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

- 1. Pilots are licensed by the Port Talbot Pilotage Board, under sections twenty-five to thirty-five inclusive of the Port Talbot Railway and Docks Company's Act of 1899, to act as pilots within the waters of the Bristol Channel eastwards of Lundy Island, to vessels destined for and departing from the Harbour and Docks of Port Talbot.
- 2. No person shall be licensed to act as a pilot unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship for five years to a pilot in the waters of the district, and have afterwards served at sea at least twelve months in square rigged vessels in the over-sea trade and twelve months in steamers; and no person shall be deemed eligible if less than twenty-three years or more than forty-five years old, unless he be already licensed by some other Pilotage Authority having jurisdiction over the Bristol Channel as far as Lundy Island. In case the Board shall at any time be of opinion that an increased number of pilots is required in the said district, and there shall not be a sufficient number of duly qualified apprentices to supply the deficiency, the Board shall be at liberty to dispense with all or any part of the said apprenticeship or other requirements, and after examination to appoint any fit and proper person to act as a pilot without having served such term of apprenticeship or complied with such other requirements.
- 3. No person shall be licensed to act as a pilot unless, in addition to the requirements of Bye-law two, he produce (a) satisfactory testimonials as to his character, (b) a recent Board of Trade Certificate as to colour blindness, and shall have passed a creditable examination in the following subjects, viz.:—
 - 1. He must be able to give the course and distance between any two places within the limits of the channel.
 - 2. The rise, velocity and set of tides.
 - The depth and character of the soundings.
 The best anchorages, and where to stop for
 - a tide.
 5. The sandbanks, rocks, shoals, and other
 - dangers.The landmarks, buoys, lights—their different bearings and distance.
 - 7. The appearance of different headlands.
 - 8. The management of a vessel—to bring her to anchor—to keep her clear of her anchor in a tideway—to moor, unmoor, and get under weigh—and to handle a vessel under any circumstances.
 - Ne must also show a thorough acquaintance with the entrance channel to the harbour and docks of Port Talbot.
- 4. Subject to the provisions of the before mentioned Act, every licensed pilot who may be employed to pilot any ship or vessel within the limits of the harbour, shall be paid the following pilotage rates, according to the net registered tonnage of the vessel:—

Any Pilot who may be required to remain on board any ship or vessel for the convenience of the captain, master, owner, or agent shall be paid ten shillings per day or part of a day he may be retained on board while at anchor; and any pilot who may be required to move any ship or vessel from one dock or tidal harbour to another dock or tidal harbour, or employed to pilot any ship or vessel for adjusting compasses, or other purposes occupying one tide or part of a tide, shall be paid for every ship:—

- 7. If by stress of weather, accident, or Captain's desire, any ship or vessel outward bound be compelled to put back and return from the westward, the pilot in charge shall be paid the rate of pilotage for the distance he may have proceeded outward, and one third of the channel pilotage in addition on account of bringing such ship or vessel back again. If the vessel be brought into dock the pilot shall also be paid the full rate for port pilotage from limits of harbour to dock.
- 8. The following rules are for the regulation of disputes among the pilots themselves and shall not interfere with the obligation of any pilot to take charge of any ship upon being required to do so by the master, owner, agent, &c., thereof, under a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds as provided in sub-section "H" of section six hundred and six of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894:—
 - (a) The first pilot who arrives off Placknore Point in his cutter shall be deemed to be the first on turn for any vessel bound from Kingroad to Port Talbot, and having been

engaged, his cutter must follow him to Port Talbot.

(b) The first pilot who shall arrive in his cutter inside Newport River Bell Buoy, shall be deemed to be first on turn for any vessel bound to Port Talbot.

(c) The first pilot who shall arrive in his cutter inside a line from Cardiff Corporation Buoy to Penarth Pierhead shall be deemed to be first on turn for any vessel bound from Cardiff to Port Talbot.

(d) The first pilot who shall arrive in his cutter inside Neath Buoy shall be deemed to be first on turn for any vessel bound from Neath or Briton Ferry to Port Talbot.

(e) The first pilot who shall arrive in his cutter inside Swansea Buoy shall be deemed to be first on turn for any vessel bound from

Swansea to Port Talbot.

(f) The pilot who first speaks to a Port Talbot bound vessel to the westward of Fort Talbot and eastward of Lundy, shall be entitled to the prior right of piloting that vessel into port provided he gives his number to the vessel and follows her up and arrives alongside the vessel before the docking signal is up; or in the event of her receiving orders, or being able to dock early on tide, provided he arrives alongside in time.

(g) Should he speak to the vessel so far away that it will be impossible for him to be up in his cutter in time to dock, he shall be at liberty to follow up the vessel, provided he does so in the most expeditious way possible. Should he fail to arrive in time to take the vessel into dock, he shall still have the prior right to take the vessel out, provided that he gives due notice of his claim (with proof

to do so) to the clerk.

(h) When a pilot is following a vessel in accordance with the preceding rule, he shall not board any other vessel for the purpose of piloting her unless his services are demanded by signal within the limits of his licence, in which case he must give up the vessel of which he is in charge to the first pilot who may speak to him. The channel pilotage payable by such vessel to be proportionately divided between the two pilots proportionately to the distance piloted by each, the first pilot retaining his prior right to the outward pilotage of the vessel which he is following up.

(i) Should any vessel bound to Port Talbot and brought from the westward or followed up by a Port Talbot pilot receive orders to proceed to some other port and thence to Port Talbot, the pilot who brought her or followed her up shall be entitled to the prior right of piloting that vessel into Port Talbot, provided he notifies the clerk of his intention to do so, and his services are required.

9. No pilot shall be entitled to more than one inward bound vessel from the time he leaves the Port Talbot Pierhead until he rejoins his cutter within the limits of the Port Talbot Harbour (this provision shall not prevent any pilot taking charge of a ship with signals flying for a pilot), except under the following conditions:—

Should a pilot after boarding a vessel to the westward desire to send his cutter into any harbour situate within the Bristol Channel he shall not leave that harbour to go seeking for another vessel until such time shall have elapsed after his departure from Port Talbot and arrival on board his cutter as is hereinafter provided.

Any harbour lying between a line drawn from the Mumbles Head through the Scarweather Lightship to the Nash Lights, and a line drawn from Worms Head to Ilfracombe, twelve hours.

Any harbour situated between westward of a line drawn from Worms Head to Ilfracombe, and eastward of Lundy Island, eighteen hours.

No pilot shall join his cutter outside the limits of his licence for the purpose of seeking

employment.

10. No pilot shall tow his cutter with a vessel further than the distance for which he shall have been engaged to pilot such vessel, neither shall he join his cutter beyond the limits for which he is engaged, except under conditions laid down in Rule 9. Pilot cutters leaving Port Talbot to go seeking shall not under any circumstances be towed further than the Port Talbot Bell Buoy, and at the same time shall not be towed past another Port Talbot cutter, not in tow, going seeking. No pilot shall join his cutter in the open channel under any circumstances, unless on leaving a vessel of which he has been a bona fide pilot (this does not apply to a cutter within the Mumbles limit).

11. Any pilot missing his cutter when down channel may return to port by any means available, but he must not while so returning board any vessel for the purpose of piloting her, unless such vessel has the usual signal flying for a pilot

within pilotage waters.

12. Should a pilot desire to work in any cutter other than his own, written application to do so must be sent to the clerk, and the permission of the Board obtained, but the Board shall have full power to grant or withhold such permission.

13. Should any pilot be absent when a vessel for which he has been engaged is ready to come into dock the pilot who docks her will be entitled to the inward pilotage. Such pilot shall also be entitled to the prior right of piloting such vessel outwards.

14. Any pilot who in the opinion of the Board has wilfully forestalled another pilot of his turn or prior right as defined by the foregoing Rules, shall for the first offence be fived a sum not exceeding tive pounds, and for the second or subsequent offence, a sum not exceeding ten pounds, or be liable to suspension or to the loss of his licence at the discretion of the Board.

15. The pilots are permitted to collect their own pilotage rates, or they may be collected by a person who may be appointed for the purpose by the Board; and every pilot is required to make a monthly return to the Board of the pilotage earned by him, whether in piloting vessels to or from Port Talbot or elsewhere, the name and tounage of the vessels piloted, where belonging, where from, and where bound, the cargo and the distance piloted; paying over at the same time to the persons appointed by the Board to receive it, a poundage of one shilling in the pound, for the creation of a fund under sub-section eight of section five hundred and eighty-two of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or such other sum of not more than one shilling in the pound as shall from time to time be fixed by the Board, on the amount earned. The pilot shall also state in such return all cases where vessels bound to or from Port Talbot have been piloted over any and what portion of the district by a pilot not licensed by the Board. Any pilot failing to make a proper return, or making a false return shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding ten pounds and to the loss of his licence.

16. Any master or mate of a vessel who holds a certificate under the Board to enable him to pilot his vessel within any portion of the district under the jurisdiction of the Board, shall, for

every time he may navigate his vessel within the waters of the district over which he is licensed pay into the Port Talbot Pilotage Fund a sum not exceeding five per cent. of the amount of pilotage which the vessel of which he is in charge would have paid had the services of a licensed pilot been engaged; and every such master or mate shall, within a month of the thirtieth June and thirty-first December in each year, make a return to the Clerk of the Board of such services rendered by him during the previous six months (but such payment shall not entitle any such master or mate to participation in any of the benefits of the said Fund) under a penalty of not exceeding five pounds for every breach thereof.

17. If a master of a ship navigating within the limits of the Port Talbot Pilotage Board, as defined by section thirty-one of the Port Talbot Railway and Docks Act, 1899, knowingly employs or continues to employ an unqualified pilot after a qualified pilot has offered to take charge of the ship, or has made a signal for that purpose, he shall, for each offence, be liable to a fine of double the amount of pilotage which could be demanded for the conduct of the ship.

18. The master of every ship carrying passengers between any place in the British Isles and any other place so situate, shall, while navigating within the limits of this district, employ a qualified pilot, unless he or the mate of his ship holds a certificate for this district, and if he fails to do so, shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, but pilotage shall not be compulsory in any other case.

19. Each pilot shall provide himself with a good and efficient cutter or pilot boat, which shall be approved and registered by the Board, he paying two shillings and sixpence for such register. And such cutter or boat shall be kept in good repair, and he subject to periodical examinations by the Board; and there shall be one indentured apprentice to each pilot, articled to serve his apprenticeship as a Port Talbot pilot. Two but not more than three pilots may, by permission of the Board, sail in the same boat and act in conjunction.

20. Every candidate for apprenticeship, before he can be considered eligible for the pilot service, shall produce satisfactory testimonials as to character, a surgeon's certificate that he is of sound health, and a Board of Trade certificate as to colour blindness; he shall prove to the satisfaction of the Board that he is not less than fourteen, nor more than eighteen years of age, and that he is able to read and write correctly, and that he has a competent knowledge of arithmetic. Having complied with these requirements, he may, after a month's probation, if approved by the Board, be apprenticed to a pilot for five years.

21. The indenture of apprenticeship, which shall be in a form approved by the Board, shall be signed by the pilot and the apprentice, and then be registered at the Pilotage Office.

The Board shall have full power to enquire into the conduct of the pilots towards their apprentices, and vice versa, and to investigate all complaints made by pilots against their apprentices and also by apprentices against pilots, whether they be masters to such apprentices or not, and into the general conduct of apprentices. And the Board shall have full power to make such orders or inflict fines in reference thereto and also to direct any Apprenticeship Indenture to be cancelled upon such terms and conditions as shall be determined,

22. The pilot to whom any apprentice is serving shall endorse on the back of every Indenture, a statement of time lost by the apprentice, and of pecuniary losses which have been incurred by the pilot, by reason of the negligence or want of attention of the apprentice, and such statement shall be initialled by the pilot and the apprentice on the respective dates when such losses shall be charged against the apprentice.

23. At the completion of the five years' apprenticeship the pilot shall appear before the Board with the apprentice and his indenture, and the Board shall thereupon decide as to the amount of time or money (if any) to be made good by the apprentice, before his indenture shall be surrendered to him, and such decision shall be finally binding on all parties. Whenever an apprentice shall for the first time appear before the Board or their Examining Committee for examination for a licence to act as pilot, his indenture of apprenticeship and all necessary papers required by these Bye-laws shall be submitted to the inspection of the Board.

24. A rota shall be prepared by the Clerk of the Board of the pilots and their cutters on turn for duty, so that there shall at all times, both day and night, be at least one cutter and its pilots under weigh and stationed within the port limits guarding the port. Any pilot who shall neglect to get and keep his cutter under weigh and on station duly guarding the port upon any day or night upon which it was his turn to keep guard, shall for the first offence pay a sum according to the judgment of the Board, not exceeding ten pounds; and for the second or subsequent offence pay the sum of ten pounds, or lose his licence. Provided always that any pilot may, with the consent of the Clerk, provide by arrangement some other duly licensed cutter

and pilot as a substitute.

25. Each pilot's cutter or boat shall have on her stern the name of her owner and the portto which she belongs, painted in white letters at least one inch broad and three inches long, and on each bow the number of her licence, and shall have the letters P.T. marked in black paint of not less than three feet six inches in length painted on her foresail or mainsail, and shall by day carry at her mast head a flag of not less than six feet by four feet in two colours—the upper horizontal half white and the lower part red; and at night each pilot's cutter or boat shall carry a white light only at the mast head and shall exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals which shall never exceed fifteen minutes. Every pilot shall immediately on boarding any vessel and taking charge thereof hoist a flag in some conspicuous place and keep the same flying during the time he so remains in charge; the flag to be the regular pilot flag, red and white with the colours horizontal. In case of default in any of the above requirements, the pilot to beliable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every breach thereof.

26. If any vessel whilst in charge of a pilot, does or receives damage, he shall immediately report such damage done or received to the Clerk of the Board on the form adopted by the Board under a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, and such report shall be read to the Board at their next meeting. The circumstances of the accident shall be investigated by the Board, if deemed necessary, and the Board may, if they see fit, require the licence of the pilot to be given up to the Board, until the case has been disposed of, and the pilot shall forfeit his prior right to the outward pilotage.

27. Any captain, master, or agent of any ship or vessel bound to sea, who may make application at the office of the Board for a pilot, shall give the ship's draught of water and registered tonnage with such other information as may be required; and upon payment of the pilotage fees shall have a pilot named and appointed to take charge of his ship or vessel, preference in all cases to be given to the pilot who piloted her inwards, such application to be made during office hours, and at least twelve hours before the pilot shall be wanted. Any pilot attending after being ordered, and the captain declining to go to sea (except the weather be such as to prevent his going) shall receive the sum of ten shillings for each attendance.

28. Any pilot who shall refuse or neglect to proceed to either of the pilot stations in the channel fixed by the Board when ordered to do so by the Clerk unless prevented by illness or the loss of his boat, or who shall be guilty of drunkenness or of insolent or abusive language, or unwarrantable conduct towards any member of the Board or the Clerk or other officers of the Board, or the captain, master, owner, or agent of any ship or vessel for which he may be engaged shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for the first offence, and for the second or any subsequent offence to the like penalty or the

loss of his licence.

29. Any pilot who may absent himself from duty, or go overland to take charge of any ship or vessel or seek employment otherwise than in his own boat, without the written consent of the Clerk shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding

ten pounds.

30. Should any owner or captain apply for a pilot to be sent for the purpose of bringing a vessel to Port Talbot, such application must be made to the Pilotage Office, and a pilot will be sent according to the rotation of the printed Should the pilot first on turn be pilotage list. absent, then the pilot next on turn shall be sent. The absent pilot to lose his turn.

31. Each pilot shall strictly conform to the directions of the harbour or dock master, touching the mooring or unmooring, placing or removing of any ship or vessel which such pilot may have under his charge, so long as such vessel shall be within the limits of the authority of any such

harbour or dock master.

32. For every original licence which shall be granted, there shall be paid to the Board the sum of twenty-one shillings, and for every renewal thereof, the sum of ten shillings and The licences of the pilots shall be sixpence. renewable annually at the Board's first meeting

in January.

33. Any pilot having charge of a vessel inward bound, shall not be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the dock or basin as directed by the dockmaster; but if in charge of a vessel bound to a port for which he is not licensed, he shall be released from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is anchored in the nearest roadstead to the port to which she is bound, and if outward bound to the distance or stage for which he has been engaged. Any pilot violating this rule shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds or the loss of his licence, or such other punishment as the Board may think necessary

34. Every pilot making any change in his residence shall forthwith, thereafter, give notice thereof, and of his new residence to the Clerk of the Board, under a penalty not exceeding twenty

shillings for each offence.

35. Every pilot shall strictly obey and observe all quarantine instructions and regulations; and all other regulations of a like nature, applicable either to the district or the port which may from time to time be issued by any competent authority, under a penalty of not exceeding ten

pounds for each offence.

36. Each pilot shall keep in his possession his licence together with a printed copy of the rates. bye-laws, and regulations, and shall produce the same to the captain, commander, owner, or agent of any ship or vessel when required so to do, under a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

37. All complaints of offences by pilots against the Acts of Parliament or the foregoing bye-laws shall be made in writing, signed by the party aggrieved, and delivered to the Clerk of the Board, or left at his office, as soon as practicable after the commission of the offence; and the Clerk shall procure the attendance of all such persons as the Board may desire to examine.

38. Every pilot shall when required by the Clerk of the Board (by writing delivered or offered to such pilot or left a reasonable time at his registered place of residence) attend the Board or any of their Committees, or their Clerk, to answer any charge brought against him for any breach of these bye-laws, or in relation to any matter in connection with the Pilotage Service; and in default of such attendance every such pilot shall for the first offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings, and for the second and every subsequent offence not exceeding five pounds.

39. If any pilot shall be guilty of a breach of any of the aforegoing Bye-laws for which breach no pecuniary penalty is hereinbefore provided, or shall be guilty of any misconduct in any matter relating to the Pilotage Service, for which misconduct no punishment is hereinbefore provided, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds for every such offence.

40. All pecuniary penalties incurred by the breach of the aforegoing Bye-laws shall be

applied to the Superannuation Fund.

41. Throughout these Bye-laws the expression "the Board" shall mean the Pilotage Board of "the Board" shall mean the Pilotage Board of the Port of Port Talbot as appointed under section twenty-six of the Port Talbot Railway and Docks Act, 1899, the word "vessel" shall include any ship, boat, lighter and craft of every kind, and whether navigated by steam or other-

42. The preceding Bye-laws shall commence and take effect from the date of the Order in Council approving the same, on which day all Bye-laws previously made by the Port Talbot Pilotage Board for the government of pilots in the Port Talbot Pilotage District and approved by an Order in Council dated the third day of March, one thousand nine hundred, so far as the same or any of them are now in force shall be repealed.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight

hundred and eighty-four, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, Her late Majesty was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the regulations contained in the schedule thereto (being regulations for preventing collisions at sea and as to signals of distress) should be substituted for the regulations contained in the first schedule to an Order in Council made under the same Act and on such joint recommendation as aforesaid and dated the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventynine.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, Her late Majesty was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the regulations contained in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the eleventh August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, should, as regards British fishing vessels and boats when in the sea off the coast of Europe lying north of Cape Finisterre, be modified and added to as in the said Order and schedule thereto were more particularly set forth:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and expressed to be made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, Her late Majesty was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, the regulations for preventing collisions at sea contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eightyfour, except the Article numbered 10 in such regulations, should be annulled, and the regulations for preventing collisions at sea, contained in Schedule I thereto, should be substituted therefor (with the exception aforesaid) and come into operation as regards British ships and boats:

And whereas by Article 10 of the Regulations contained in the schedule to the said Order in Council dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, it was provided, amongst other things, as follows:—

(g) In fog, mist, or falling snow, a drift-net vessel attached to her nets, and a vessel when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag-net, and a vessel employed in line fishing with her lines out, shall at intervals of not more than two minutes make a blast with her fog horn and ring her bell alternately.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have in pursuance of the said recited Act jointly recommended to His Majesty that the above recited Article 10 should be amended in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, on the seventh day of August, one thousand nine hundred and five, to approve as a provisional Rule, within the meaning of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, the amendment of the said Article 10, as from the date of the said Order of the seventh day of August, one thousand nine hundred and five:

And whereas the provisions of Section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the said Act and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the following provision, that is to say:—

In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain storms, drift-net vessels attached to their nets, and vessels when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag-net, and vessels line fishing with their lines out, shall, if of twenty tons gross tonnage or upwards respectively, at intervals of not more than one minute make a blast; if steam-vessels, with the whistle or syren, and if sailing vessels with the fog horn; each blast to be followed by ringing the bell. Fishing vessels and boats of less than twenty tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to give the above-mentioned signals; but if they do not, they shall make some other efficient sound signal at intervals of not more than one minute,

shall be substituted for paragraph (g) of Article 10 of the regulations scheduled to the said Order in Council, dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and that the said Article 10 shall be read and construed accordingly.

And whereas the said regulations have been amended or varied by Orders in Council dated respectively the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and four, and eleventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred and five:

And whereas it is deemed expedient to revoke the said proviso set out in the above-ment oned paragraph 24 (2) of the Schedule to the said Order in Council of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and two, and to require all vessels to be registered, lettered, and numbered in accordance with the regulations scheduled to such last-mentioned Order in Council as amended by the Orders in Council dated respectively the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and four, and eleventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred and five:

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been

complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the said civil parishes without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued as follows, viz.:—

HAWKWELL.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary the Virgin, Hawkwell, in the county of Essex; and in that part of the churchyard which existed prior to the year one thousand nine hundred and two, except as follows:—

In any walled grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

BISHOP'S ITCHINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Michael, Bishop's Itchington, in the county of Warwick, and in the churchyard.

And whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the said Order so far as it affects the parish of

Long Clawson be varied:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that so much of the Order in Council, of the twelfth December, one thousand nine hundred and four, as relates to burials in the Parish Church of Saint Remigius, Long Clawson, in the county of Leicester, and in the churchyard, be varied by the addition thereto of the following excepting clause:—

Long Clawson.—(c) In the said churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein.

We, the Local Government Board, in the exercise of Our powers under the Act, do by this Our Order Sanction and Order as follows, that is

ART. I. We sanction the Schemes subject to the following conditions and modifications,

namely-

(1)—(a) The Schemes shall have effect subject to the insertion therein of the provisions of this Article for the dwelling accommodation of persons of the working class displaced by the Schemes.

(b) Suitable dwellings according to plans to be prepared by the local authority and agreed upon between them and the London County Council shall be erected on the Chapel Grove Area for the accommodation of four hundred persons of the working class, and on the Eastnor Place Area for the accommodation of one hundred persons of the working class:

Provided that in the event of a difference arising between the local authority and the London County Council with repect to the plans, the difference shall be referred to Us, and our decision thereon shall be final and

conclusive.

- (c) The dwellings to be provided in parsuance of the provisions of paragraph (b) hereof may, if the London County Council so require, be furnished in lieu of dust-shoots with such suitable ashpits within the meaning of section 141 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, as may be in accordance with the requirements of any Bye-laws made by the London County Council under the provisions of sub-section (1) of section 39 of that Act.
- (2)—(a) That part of the Chapel-grove area which comprises the premises numbered 26 to 86 and 89 to 91 on the plan marked "C.G.I. Revised Scheme, 1901," and so much of the premises numbered 87 on that plan as abuts upon the properties numbered 26 to 37 shall be cleared of buildings as soon as the local authority shall have acquired the same, but until such provision as is hereinbefore mentioned shall have been made on that part of the Chapel Grove Area for the accommodation of four hundred persons of the working class, no buildings occupied as dwelling-houses at the date of the Schemes in the remaining portion of the Chapel Grove Area or in the Eastnor Place Area shall be demolished.

(b) As soon as accommodation for four hundred persons of the working class shall have been provided on the part of the Chapel Grove Area to be cleared of buildings in pursuance of paragraph (a) the local authority may proceed to demolish the buildings situate in the whole of the Eastnor Place Area, but the remaining portion of the Chapel Grove Area shall not be cleared of buildings until provision shall have been made on the Eastnor Place Area for the accommodation of one hundred persons of

working class.

(3) If within one year from the time when the said part of the Chapel Grove Area or the Eastnor Place Area, as the case may be, shall have been cleared of buildings as aforesaid such dwellings as are hereinbefore required to be erected in the said areas for persons of the working class have not been erected, the local authority shall, unless We shall otherwise order, themselves erect the said dwellings, and subject to the provisions of this Order the local authority may borrow money for the purpose of defraying the cost of the erection of the dwellings.

(4) The local authority may for the purposes of defraying the expenses or any part of the expenses incurred or to be incurred by them of and incidental to the Schemes and of carrying into effect the Schemes, borrow such sum or sums of money as they

may from time to time require.

(5) Such of the lands in the areas comprised in the Schemes as shall not be required for the purpose of providing accommodation for persons of the working class as aforesaid shall be dedicated as a highway or open space unless we shall otherwise direct.

Art. II.—(1) The provisions of sections 183 to 191 of the Metropolis Management, Act, 1855, as applied by sub-section (2) of section 46 of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, shall apply and have effect so as to enable the local authority to borrow money for any purpose for which borrowing is authorized by this Order as if the said purpose were a purpose for which money may be borrowed under the said subsection.

(2) The London County Council may, for the purpose of paying or contributing any sum which

they may agree to pay or contribute, or which they may be ordered, pursuant to sub-section (7) of section 46 of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, to pay or contribute towards the expenses of carrying into effect the Schemes, borrow under and subject to the provisions of the Acts for the time being regulating the raising of money by the Council for capital purposes such sum or sums of money as they may from time to time require.
