And whereas it is expedient that there shall be a separate seal for the said Court of Appeal.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the "Eastern African Protectorates (Court of Appeal) Order in Council, 1906."
- 2. The Court of Appeal shall have a seal bearing the style of the Court, and a device approved by the Secretary of State; and until such a seal is provided the seal of His Britannic Majesty's Court for Zanzibar may continue to be used instead thereof.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Elgin, K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

HEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish of All Saints, Wainfleet, in the parts of Lindsey, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the civil parish of Wainfleet All Saints, without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:—

WAINFLEET ALL SAINTS.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of All Saints, Wainfleet, in the parts of Lindsey; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

- (a.) In the vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard and belonging or reputed to belong to the Barton family, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:
- (b.) In the said churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of February next:

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be

affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said twentieth day of February.
