The following Despatches have been received by the Secretary of State for the Colonies:

From the High Commissioner, Southern Nigeria, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

22nd July, 1905.

Despatch relating to Field Operations, October 1904 to June 1905.

I have the honour to report on the pacification and settlement work carried out during the dry season 1904-5.

2. Eight distinct operations were under-

taken:

(I.) On the west of the Niger, the Irrua patrol under the command of Captain Ian G. Hogg, D.S.O., 4th Hussars, between the 3rd of October and 1st of Novemb-r.

(II.) The Onitsha Hinterland Expedition, between 17th of November and 22nd of March, under the command of Brevet Major H. C. Moorhouse, R.A.

(III.) A column under Brevet Major H. M. Trenchard, Royal Scots Fusiliers, patrolled through the unsettled portion of the Ibibio and Kwa country, between the 15th of November and 27th of February.

(IV.) A column under Lieutenant (local Captain) C. E. W. Carleton, West India Regiment, traversed the hitherto unexplored portion of the Ekpaffia country, punished certain towns therein for the murders of native traders, and subsequently went through the Etchie country to the east. The command of this force was taken over by Captain W. J. S. Hosley, Lancashire Fusiliers, just before the Ogoni country, between Bonny and Opobo, was visited. The operations of this column extended from the 27th of October to 20th of March.

(V.) A column under Captain E. C. Margesson, South Wales Borderers, marched from the Enyong Creek, via Asaga and Afikpo, through

the Ezza, Onitsha, and Acharra countries to Oheki on the Cross River opposite Obubra Hill. Its operations took place between the 11th of March and the 2nd of June.

(VI.) A small punitive force visited the town of Ikoto-Okotobo in the Eket country.

(VII.) Subsequent to operation No. 4 a small patrol in the Ekpaffia country, between the 3rd and 7th of April, effected the arrest of a chief named Wohpara, and his followers, who had attacked a friendly chief and killed his son.

(VIII.) A small force, from the Owerri garrison, under Lieutenant J. Halfpenny, Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, visited certain Noria towns situated near the Owerri-Aba road between the 21st of

April and 5th of May.

3. The patrol through the Irrua country was ordered on account of murders, robberies and other acts of violence on passing traders, and to subdue a rising against the paramount Chief of Agbede.
The force under Captain I. G. Hogg, D.S.O., 4th

Hussars, was composed of :-

4 European Officers,

1 Medical Officer, 1 Political Officer,

139 Rank and file, with 2 guns,

and traversed a large area of country in the Benin and Ifon districts, but at only one place, Akindu, was active opposition experienced. Here a detachment under Lieutenant P. S. Vassall, Gloucestershire Regiment, was hotly opposed, two native soldiers being killed and six wounded.

Numerous towns were visited, and, where

necessary, fined.

Sergeant-Major A. E. Klee, R.A., is specially mentioned for gallantry and energy at the attack

The Cotton Association had since opened an estate in the Uromi country in the midst of the district traversed by the patrol, and Political Officers are now stationed at Agbede and at Agbor.

4. The most important work done was that

effected by the column under Brevet Major H. C. Moorhouse, R.A., in the Onitsha hinterland, where a stretch of country from 20 to 30 miles wide, extending from the Anambra Creek to Oguta, was visited. A great portion of this country was absolutely unknown, the inhabitants refusing to permit either Europeans or native traders to enter it.

The column consisted of:—

7 European Officers,

3 European Non-commissioned Officers; and

267 Rank and file.

This force started from Ogrugru, on the Anambra Creek, on November the 18th. The whole of the country visited is thickly populated; large towns with from five to ten thousand inhabitants occurring every few miles. The force frequently operated in detached columns, visiting, as far as possible, every town and explaining the Government requirements. Major Moorhouse reports that serious armed opposition was only met with at Obukpa on December 1st, at Enugu on January 8th, and at Umoogi on January 21st. At Obukpa a night march of eight miles and a feiut attack on a prepared position, which was a strong one, enabled him to engage the enemy in the open and inflict considerable loss on them.

At Enugu and Umoogi the fighting was from house to house. In the Owerri District, though shots were exchanged almost every day, there was nothing calling for special comment. During the expedition Major Moorhouse collected 1,092 rifles and 9,170 cap guns in the Onitsha Hinter-A new station has been established at Throughout the Oka, 25 miles east of Onitsha. whole territory the native chiefs have promised to abandon cannibalism, slave dealing, and human sacrifice, and have agreed to the establishment of native courts for the trial of all offences.

Oka is interesting as the headquarters of a very large community of blacksmiths and copper smiths, and men from this place are found in the most distant parts of the Protectorate. They execute wonderfully good work with the most primitive apparatus. I traversed the whole of this district myself a month after the patrol completed its work, and, though it was deemed advisable that I should be accompanied by a considerable escort, never met with any opposi-Though I frequently bicycled far ahead along the native paths I saw no signs of hostility, though the unusual sight of my machine caused great consternation to most of the people we met.

Major Moorhouse brings to special notice the skill and gallantry of Captain J. Wayling, Canadian Militia, at Obukpa, and of Lieutenant C. V. Fox, Scots Guards, at Umoogi. Lieutenant Fox also proved a most efficient Staff Officer. Mr. Boyle, as Political Officer in the Onitsha Hinterland, and Mr. H. M. Douglas in the Owerri District rendered good service. Dr. Christian is reported as having been unremitting in his care

5. The Ibibio-Kwa patrol. The column commanded by Brevet Major H. M. Trenchard, Royal Scots Fusiliers. consisted of :-

7 European Officers:

Non-commissioned Officers;

1 Medical Officer:

Mr. Palmer as Political Officer; and

270 Rank and file and 1 gun.

It had instructions to establish law and order in the districts not dealt with in previous years, and to insist on the surrender of all war guns. Considerable opposition was met with-

(a) By a detachment under Captain E. de H. Smith, R.A., on 5th December, at Epenokum;

(b) By a small column, under Captain W. J. S. Hosley, at Ibirikpo, which was surrounded on all sides in dense bush, and fired on throughout the

day; and again

(c) On the 6th February while camping at Ndia Kata, Major Trenchard was attacked by three separate parties, and his force must have suffered heavy casualties but for the extraordinary bad shooting of the natives. With the exception of these three occasions only slight opposition was met with. 4,313 cap guns, including 250 sniders and a quantity of snider ammunition were surrendered and destroyed.

Major Trenchard brings to notice Captain Hosley as showing great activity on several occasions; Lieutenant E. A. Steel, R.A., as a hard working and capable Staff Officer; Lieutenant J. F. Mackay, V.C., King's Own Scottish Borderers, as showing great knowledge of bush fighting; Native Sergeant-Major Seberu Ilorin for gallant leading of his section; and says he is specially indebted to Mr. Palmer, as Chief Political Officer, for information obtained and for

capable transport work.

The force had 5 men killed and 21 wounded, and its work was much interfered with by an extraordinary outbreak of guinea worm which attacked most of the men who had taken part in an expedition in the Mkpani country, on the left bank of the Cross River, some nine months previously. This has been separately reported on, and was traced to the drinking of water in one village, and affords the clearest proof of the great length of time which elapses between infection and the appearance of the worm. Five of the Europeans who were in the former expedition suffered from guinea worm, as well as nearly 200 of the native troops and followers.

6. The Ekpaffia country had never been explored or brought under control. In April, 1904, the District Commissioner at Degama visited the southern portion of the country with a small police escort, and was successful in persuading the people to surrender their war guns, subject to the stipulation that disarmament should procred throughout the whole country. On again visiting the country, Mr. Syer found that a number of towns had combined together to oppose him, and just after his entering into the country an attack was made on some native traders at Ahoada, and a number of them killed and wounded and their goods looted. He was himself fired on from the banks of the river. The punitive column, under Lieutenant (Local Captain) C. E. W. Carleton, West India Regiment, started from Ahoada on the 27th of October, and consisted of :-

5 European Officers.

1 Non-commissioned Officer.

200 Rank and file.

1 2.95 gun and 2 Maxims.

The country is very flat, swampy, and thickly populated. The force at once met with severe and constant resistance, the chief fighting taking place at Orumineye, where Colour-Sergeant Scaulan was killed.

Captain Carleton reports that the whole town was "loopholed, enabling the enemy to pour heavy fire on our men." Many other towns were found strongly fortified. Ogbo was strongly defended "by lines of trenches encircling the town . . " "the walls cleverly loopholed, enfilading the streets, in which were many cleverly hidden staked pits." Resistance was not subdued until the 26th of December, when 4,010 guns had been surrendered, and a large fine paid by those towns which had seized property belonging to native traders. The column then proceeded to the Etchie country, lying to the east of Ekpaffia, with Mr. J. O'Connell as Political Officer, to disarm the

various towns, and to destroy the Ozozo Juju. Resistance was only encountered at Alako, where the column was attacked by considerable numbers of the natives, and 4 soldiers severely wounded. This phase of the operations lasted up to 2nd of February, when 1,100 guns had been surrendered.

Captain Carleton specially brings to notice the services of Lieutenant H. C. Fox, Royal Scots Fusiliers and of Native Sergeant - Major Abubakare (No. 990) who handled his men with great coolness when Colour - Sergeant Scanlan was killed. Captain Carleton handed over charge of the column to Captain Hosley on the 3rd of February. This officer met with no opposition in the remainder of the Etchie country-collected 268 more cap guns, and then moved, on the 16th of February, to the Ogoni country which, though lying close to the coast and between Bonny and Opobo, very old trading stations, had never been traversed by Europeans. The patrolling of this country was undertaken on account of attacks on boats passing between Bonny and Opobo, and of the prevalence of human sacrifice. The column was fired on at Soo, and again at Karie. The towns here had deep and wide ditches outside their gates, crossed by single log bridges, with stockades covering loopholed houses. further opposition was met with. 72 to 72 towns surrendered. All sacrificing Jujus were destroyed, and 2,303 cap guns and 126 sniders collected.
Lieutenant N. C. Duncan, Worcestershire Regi-

Lieutenant N. C. Duncan, Worcestershire Regiment, is specially mentioned for showing great zeal and ability as Staff Officer, and Native Sergeant-Major Abubakare Bazazagi (No. 990)

for excellent leadership of his men.

Mr. Cheke accompanied the column as Political Officer, and is reported to have done excellent work.

It is hoped that law and order have been established in the country. Native courts are being constituted therein.

7. The Ezza Patrol under Captain E. C. Margesson, South Wales Borderers, left the Enyong Creek near Itu, on the 12th of March. It consisted of:—

6 European Officers,

2 Non-commissioned Officers,

1 Medical Officer, 190 Rank and file, and

0 Kank and file, and 1 2·95 B.L. gun.

The first objective was to visit the town of Asaga, the inhabitants of which had rescued from the police and refused to surrender 8 men accused of being implicated in the murder of 4 Aros, who had been killed and eaten in January at that place. Only slight opposition was experienced, but it was not until the 20th of March that the principal chiefs surrendered.

The column marched from Asaga to Afikpo, and then through the unknown Ezza and Acharra country to Oheki. Opposition was met with at Idembi, Abbia, Opotokum, and Ndi-Agboro.

The patrol into the Ezza country was necessitated owing to an attack upon Major Cockburn by the people of Oheki, on his proceeding there with a small party in January to collect a fine levied on the inhabitants for looting trading canoes passing up the Cross River in the spring of 1904. The country was quite unknown and was found to be thickly populated. It is very fertile, and the position of large deposits of lead ore, which had previously been reported, was discovered. The column passed through large herds of cattle and flocks of sheep and goats, and throughout the country the towns were found to be clean and well kept, and there are many excellent paths about five feet wide with properly constructed side drains.

A Government station, at which a Political Officer will reside, has been established in the midst of the country near Ezzago. Native Courts will be constituted in the usual way.

Captain Margesson brings specially to notice the services of his Staff Officer, Lieutenaut C. E. Vickery, D.S.O., Royal Field Artillery; of Lieutenaut (Local Captain) H. A. Kirkby, Laucashire Fusiliers; and of Colour-Sergeant W. Pritchard, who was severely wounded at Opotokum on 9th April.

8. The town of Ikot-Okobo in the Eket country having given trouble by stopping the roads and assaulting the police and Government messengers, directions were given for this town to be visited

and disarmed.

A small force left Calabar on the 18th of February, under the command of Lieutenant Halfpenny, Inniskilling Fusiliers. It consisted of .—

2 European Officers.

1 European Non-commissioned Officer.

71 Rank and file.

The town was approached at night. Only very slight resistance was offered—one soldier only being wounded. Sixty-five cap guns were surrendered.

9. The Ekpaffia punitive patrol omitted to disarm one quarter of the town of Obelli. The chief of this quarter, named Wohpara, and his people resisted the orders of the friendly head chief of the town to assist in the cleaning of the roads in the locality and fired upon and killed Chief Akamaka, son of the head chief, and one of his boys. Lieutenant N. C. Duncan, Worcestershire Regiment, with one section of "D" Company, Southern Nigeria Regiment, was sent to effect the arrest of Wohpara and the disarmament of his followers. After four days' search Wohpara and his people were surrounded at night, and, after a severe struggle, captured and disarmed.

10. After the withdrawal of the Onitsha Hinterland patrol from the Owerri District, the inhabitants of a small district to the east of Owerri, which had not been visited, refused to allow passage along their roads, and fired on a military escort travelling over one of them. The District Commissioner, Mr. H. M. Douglas, and a small force under Lieutenant Halfpenny, with 86 rank and file, visited the country and met with constant resistance, four soldiers being killed and three wounded before this thickly-populated district submitted. Thirty-nine separate towns were dealt with in a space about eight miles square. The locality forms part of the Owerri District, and is just to the north of the main road to Aba.

11. This completes the list of the operations of the season 1904-5. A large additional area of the Protectorate has been brought under efficient control. In every case the Government requirements were carefully explained to the chicis and people by the Military Officer in command of the Force and by the Political Officer attached to the Expedition. The principal points being, as mentioned in previous reports, the stoppage of all intertribal fighting, the abolition of human sacrifice, twin murder, and of all trials by ordeal or punishment of their subjects by the chiefs. except after a public trial in the established Native Courts in the case of minor offences, and in the District Commissioner's Court or the Supreme Court in the case of serious crime, and the maintenance of the principal paths passing through the areas claimed by the various towns by their inhabitants.

12. Experience in the past has proved that, except where provision can be made for fairly frequent visits by a Political Officer, districts completely pacified gradually lapse into their

previous condition. In every case, therefore, operations in new country have, this year, been followed by the establishment of a Government station with a resident Political Officer, and it is hoped by this means that any recrudescence of unrest may be avoided. No less than seven new stations have been thus established.

13. In conclusion, I may say, that in every case, the Officer Commanding the Southern Nigeria Regiment, Colonel Montanaro, considers that the work was well carried out, and unnecessary fighting avoided, and I entirely concur in this opinion. It must have often been performed under very great difficulty. specially brings to notice the services rendered by Major Moorhouse, R.A., and in addition to the favourable mentions already made in this report, I recommend this officer for special consideration.

From the Governor and Commander-in-Chief, Sierra Leone, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

24th August, 1905.

Despatch relating to Field Operations.

For some years tribal warfare, instigated by a chief named Kafura, having prevailed in that portion of the Republic of Liberia adjacent to the boundary of the Sierra Leone Protectorate, and serious raids into the Protectorate having been made on several occasions, the President of the Republic, in March, 1905, assented to troops being sent from the Protectorate into the district mentioned for the purpose of enforcing order.

In accordance with this arrangement Captain (Local Major) C. E. Palmer, R.A., whose report is attached, on 25th March concentrated at Korumba, near the Liberian frontier, a force, details of which are stated in the margin.*

With this force operations were continued until June 28th, by which date all opposition was broken, Chief Kafura was a fugitive, and the people had selected as their rulers chiefs pledged

These successful results were obtained in an unexplored country, inhabited by a numerous well-armed enemy; local supplies were insufficient, heavy rain was constant in June, and only by great skill and tact could the natives be induced to assemble with a view to selecting new rulers.

Major Palmer has reported most favourably upon the zeal, efficiency, and contempt of hard-

ship shown by the Officers and men.

Much credit seems to me to be due to Major Palmer for having accurately organized a force adequate to the work, for the success of his operations, and for the skill by which the natives were induced by him to choose new chiefs. For these reasons I respectfully beg to arge that his name may be submitted for favourable consideration, and that the grant of the Africa General Service Medal to the Officers and men under his command may also be favourably considered.

Special Report on the operations of the Kissi Field Force, 1905.

1. The tract of country dealt with in this report lies near the central portion of the eastern boundary of the Sierra Leone Protectorate.

2. The expedition was rendered necessary by the aggressive behaviour of certain sections of of the Kissi tribes, principally at the instigation of Chief Kafura in the South, and Chief Fassalokkoh in the North.

These chiefs had for some time been encouraging their fighting men to raid into the British Protectorate, burn villages, plunder farms and carry off slaves. Those under Kafura had twice attacked the outpost at Korumba, held by a section of the West African Frontier Force soldiers, on the last occasion killing two of the

3. The consent of the Liberian Government having been obtained to the despatch of an expedition, I received orders on the 7th March, from His Excellency the Governor, to organise and command a force with which so to punish the aggressors as to prevent any recurrence of the raiding

4. The Korumba outpost, near the Liberian Border was decided on as a suitable place of concentration and also for the advanced base.

Here a force, strength and composition as per margin* was concentrated by the 25th March.

5. At 6 a.m. on 27th March I crossed the boundary into Liberia with a strength as under, having for my primary objective the town of Kenema (Chief Kafura's headquarters):—

13 Officers, West African Frontier Force.

1 Medical Officer.

1 Dispenser. 311 Rank and file.

312 Carriers.

11 Friendlies.

6. The route lay along a narrow path, much choked up with growth, running through dense bush country. All this had to be carefully scouted, as it was expected that in spite of all precautions the enemy would have had ample notice of our advance. The rate of marching was therefore very slow, not exceeding one and a half miles an hour on the average. For nine miles no sign of habitation or of the enemy was met with, this being the width of the belt of deserted land which now lies between the Protectorate and the Kissi country as a result of the constant feud between the peoples.

The sites where villages had formerly flourished were noticeable merely from the banana, orange,

and kola trees which remained.

After nine miles the first signs of cultivation were met with; a party of men working in the fields gave the alarm, signal guns were fired, and with a rush the two leading companies ran on to the stockaded camp of Boandu which was found to be held by some six to eight men with trade guns. These were soon cleared out, and with a loss of one man severely wounded the stockade was penetrated, and as it was now late arrangements for the night made.

The water supply was bad, the accommodation extremely cramped for the force, a few rough shelters failed to provide sufficient roof for the officers alone, and with the enemy constantly firing all round, now far, now close, an uneasy night was spent. The bulk of the men went without their rations for lack of water. carriers, though greatly alarmed at the constant

firing, behaved very well.
28th March.—Still following the road indicated by the guides as the most direct to Kenema, the force proceeded at 6.30 a.m. up a steep and thickly wooded hill, and following a ridge at the top reached, about 2 miles on, the town of Fankissi. Some guns were fired as the column drew

near to this town, and a few "chassepot" rifles | fired from the surrounding hills at ranges of 500 yards and upwards, dropped some bullets unpleasantly near the path. However, no damage was done, and the town of Fankissi, poorly stockaded and barely held at all, was rushed with no loss beyond one man slightly wounded. Thence the column proceeded viâ Buyeru (burnt), to the cross roads or Y of which the right branch led to Kenema and the left to Sufedu. Though strongly inclined to proceed at once to Kenema, which was no great distance off. I decided to take the left road as it was getting late in the afternoon, the water supply at Kenema was very uncertain, while that at Sufedu After the experience of the was very good. previous night I therefore went for the water, and this was very fortunate, for Sufedu proved to be a veritable granary stocked with rice, with ample accommodation and a splendid water The whole way there, a deafening discharge of trade guns was maintained, but owing to the excellent scouting of the men, which prevented the enemy creeping up to close quarters in the bush, no damage was done, and the town was taken and occupied without loss, and the force at last found itself in good quarters with unlimited supplies.

I decided to nold Sufedu as an advanced base, and operate from there with two companies, which, thus unhampered with the long line of carriers, would be in reality a stronger force than the 300 men with so much transport to

guard.

29th March.—Leaving two companies to guard camp, I marched on Kenema with the other two, via the same cross roads, and again a deafening fire greeted our advance. There could hardly have been less than 200 or 300 men firing in the bush, but hardly a man could be seen, though no doubt our occasional volleys at an unusually enterprising contingent of the enemy, must have accounted for a few of them. Kenema, which was only defended by a sort of stockaded gateway and held with no determination whatever, was rushed without difficulty. It proved to be a small town, beautifully clean, with a very superior type of native house, well built and carefully thatched. It contained little or no rice, and all property had been removed (as indeed proved always to be the case). It was burnt, and the column, proceeding to Farandala, destroyed that also, including the "barracks" in which Kafura housed his "warriors.

A few "chassepots" were heard this day, but the column returned to camp at Sufedu without

damage.

Leaving Sufedu on 3rd April, the force marched to Lengedu, and on the 4th reached Lokoma, which was found to have been recently burnt, by accident evidently, and only just in process of being rebuilt. The town lies close to the right bank of Moa River, on the left bank of which are friendly tribes, a mixture of Kissi and Luawa Mendi. I was therefore able to despatch mails from here, via friendly country, for the first time.

On the 31st March, and again on 3rd April, small deputations had come in under a white flag (which is a native custom here), on behalf of Chief Yigbo of Kuwundu, praying that the war might not be pushed into his country, which adjoins Kafura's on the north.

This chief had not been free of the suspicion of implication in Kafura's agressive policy, though it was likely that he (although partially aware of the risk) had been forced by his more powerful neighbour to adopt a policy with which he did not agree. I had therefore replied to his depu-

tations that if he himself came in and would renounce all connection with Kafura and afford me active assistance in suppressing him and resettling the country, his previous implication in the hostile policy would be overlooked.

I was most anxious to secure the active cooperation of this chief, as he is a man of great influence in the country, one of the oldest chiefs, and a man of sense enough to grasp the advantages of being on our side, could I only get hold of him and put the matter personally to him.

On the 8th April, therefore, definite news of Kafura's whereabouts being lacking, and news having come in of warriors collecting in some strength in the towns of Mina, Beredu, and Komendi, which lay towards the north, I decided to move in that direction with the double object of defeating the enemy and bringing pressure to bear on Yigbo, who would see in our advance in his direction the fulfilment of my promise to treat him as an active enemy if he would not show himself my active friend.

On the 8th April, therefore, I took the road through the above mentioned towns, and having been greeted with the usual salvo of trade guns at the entry of each town, the column was at length attacked by the enemy in some force near

the town of Komendi.

The excellent discipline of the Frontier soldiers, however, combined with the absolute steadiness to which our long line of carriers had by this time been drilled, obviated the slightest inclination to panic on the part of the latter, and after almost continuous firing for over two hours the Kissis drew off having suffered considerable loss.

Much of the enemy's loss in this action was due to an ingenious ambush made by the rear guard under Captains F. N. Le Mesurier, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, and L. Murray, East Surrey

Regiment.

Komendi having been destroyed, I wheeled to the west, and skirting the south face of the Sandengongo Hills marched under spasmodic fire to Sangbaori, a large and prosperous town belonging to Chief Yigbo, and affording good accommodation. This town was not reached until 4 p.m., the column having left Lokoma at 6 a.m. the long march with almost continuous fighting along the road, all hands were glad of a good rest in roomy quarters, with excellent water.

The march of the 8th April finally broke the hting spirit of the Kissis. Subsequently to fighting spirit of the Kissis. that date hardly a shot was fired in lower Kissi country, and it was evident, as indeed has been since borne out by the statements of men who participated in that attack on the column, that a deep impression of our irresistibility had been

created.

The operations, 9th to 12th April, having been in my opinion sufficient to impress Chief Yigbo with the futility of his attitude, without completely terrorising and alienating the inhabitants and chiefs of his large tract of country, I decided to give time for these events to sink into his mind, and for him to recover from the temporary panic into which he had been thrown by them.

In the meanwhile there remained a considerable portion of Wunde (Kafura's) country still to be explored, and I decided to cover as much of that as possible, while gradually working my way back to Korumba in order to refit for the long march which lay before me in order to reach the the scene of the disturbances in northern Kissi country, in the neighbourhood of Kundewakoro.

I therefore marched to Masadu, passing north of the Sandengongo Hills and thence to Tomandu. No sign of the enemy remained, the country appeared wholly deserted.

Halting at Tomandu, I spent some time in endeavouring to tempt the chiefs lying east of the Mafessa River to come in, in order that I might explain to them the policy with regard to Kafura which they should pursue in order to secure the immunity of their country from the evils of war.

The negotiations were of a most delicate nature. The "war," as they called it, was evidently badly on their nerves, and a false step or an ambiguous expression in the mouth of a messenger sufficed to destroy the work of days devoted to gaining their confidence.

o On the 19th April, however, two chiefs were at last prevailed upon to come into my camp.

I learnt that Kaiura had passed through the country of one of them—Chief Mangara—and was then residing in the country of Chief Sapuyo, some twenty miles further east; that he had some following of "warriors" with him, and that he was being fed and housed by Sapuyo.

Several reasons decided me to leave him in

statu rather than pursue him further.

Leaving Tomandu on the 20th, I marched viâ Tungeru and Soardu to Korumba, where I arrived on 22nd. This ended the first phase of the operations.

On 23rd April a more than usually influential deputation arrived from Chief Yigbo, and definite arrangements were at length made for him to meet me at some town on my route to the north. This was satisfactory as showing the soundness of the policy adopted with regard to this chief.

The 23rd and 24th April having been devoted to refitting, arranging convoys, etc., the force again marched out on the 25th, and marching by Tagbefu, Sandea, and Soardu, all old sites, without houses, long since abandoned owing to the disturbed state of the country during the last four years, Kadu was reached on 27th, and the accommodation there proving sufficient for the force, I decided to await the arrival of Chief Yigbo and his sub-chiefs there. They arrived on the 30th, Yigbo, 11 sub-chiefs, and some 200 followers.

I at once held a "palaver" and put matters

very plainly to Yigbo.

On 1st May, leaving Kadu, I marched north by east and later north by west, in a wide bend necessitated by my desire to keep on the left bank of the River Meli, which here makes a bend to the east.

On 3rd May the column passed out of Chief Yigbo's country and entered that of the Lelis, a large tribe whose territory, by all accounts, stretches a considerable distance both to the east and north.

Leli country was left behind on the 5th as our course inclined more to the west, and the country of the northern Kissis was entered on the 6th, when a few shots outside the town of Bandadu proclaimed the fact that we were in hostile country again.

On the 7th Kundewakoro was reached and found deserted, as was Bandadu, though both towns are of great natural strength for defence.

Kundewakoro being a big town with excellent water close by, I decided to make it a base for the punitive operations against Chief Fassalokkoh. (Supra paragraph 2.)

One of two companies under Captain Le Mesurier operated from 10th to 14th. This party met with opposition of a feeble description.

From the 16th to 22nd I operated with two companies in the same direction but by different routes. On the 17th May I marched through Niadu to We through some particularly dense bush, and at the entrance to the latter town the enemy, concealed among rocks on the right of

the road and screened by dense bush growing in the crevices, got in some effective fire from the right front of the "point." Sergeant Kalfalla was killed on the spot, and Second Lieutenant R. H. Haseldine, South Lancashire Regiment, severely wounded. The town was rushed and the enemy driven out, and camp made for the The enemy, however, were not yet done Throughout the afternoon and after dark with. till about 8 p.m., they congregated in large numbers in the densely wooded hollows with which the town was surrounded, and parties creeping up as close as our clearing of the foreground would allow them to do unseen, fired into camp at intervals. Such tactics invariably drew a prompt volley from the men distributed along the crest of the hill, and finding that we were not to be surprised they abandoned the idea of rushing the camp, which had no doubt been brewing in their minds.

Meanwhile a party had been despatched to Kundewakoro to bring the Doctor, as it was thought Lieutenant Haseldine's wound was very serious, and both in order to avoid any chance of his being delayed en route as also to strengthen the party sufficiently to admit of energetic measures against this truculent section of Kissis, another company was detached from Kundewakoro as his escort. This party, with the Doctor, arrived at We, at 8.30 a.m., on the 18th, and this reinforcement, combined with the impression produced by a shot which killed one of the enemy's "spokesmen" on a hilltop at 750 yards range, proved too much for the boasted prowess of the "Real Kissis," as they proudly termed themselves, and they incontinently fled the country, not a man being left west of the Malu River. Most of them undoubtedly fled north into French territory, a few east by south across the Malu.

This ended the operations in Northern Kissi, and I returned to Kundewakoro on 22nd May. It was now time to revisit the Southern or Wunde country to examine into methods of repopulating the country, and to endeavour to establish a government antagonistic to Kafura.

government antagonistic to Kafura.

The force left Kundewakoro on 24th May, and passing southwards into British territory, reached Loma on 27th by a series of long marches.

After some delay, occasioned by the necessity for reorganizing the transport arrangements, rice supply, &c., and shifting the base from Korumba to Loma, the latter being more central and healthier in the rains, the force again moved out eastward on 7th June.

Short marches were made in order to study the condition of the country, progress of crops, and feeling among the commoner class of people.

It at once became evident that my promises to assist them in every way in establishing a peaceful form of government and my guarantee of immunity from further punishment, so long as they adopted peaceful ways, had been accepted in good faith, and where, on our first marching through this country the only folk to be seen were warriors with guns to contest our advance, now the pleasing spectacle was presented of busy crowds of men, women, and children working in the farms, many of whom of both sexes ran up to me smiling, and, through the interpreter, expressed their greetings and gratitude for the treatment they had received since their warriors had fled or laid down their arms.

The force reached Wulade on 10th June. This town is on the left bank of the Malessa River, which runs approximately north and south, flowing into the Moa River near Tomandu, and forms the eastern boundary of Wunde country.

By crossing this river and going to Sapuyo Kafura had consequently left his own country and I decided to utilize the stream as a barrier to prevent his returning in any strength to bring pressure on the now pacific inhabitants of Wunde

with a view to again raising them in his cause.

Meanwhile Chief Yigbo had joined the camp and been of the utmost assistance in enabling me to get touch with the principal men of the

country.

These minor chiefs, extremely nervous at first about putting themselves into my power by entering the camp, soon became reassured on seeing their friends and messengers well treated.

The great difficulty, however, was to get in those from the outlying parts of Wunde and Tungi, who had only seen us in war guise and could not be got to believe that I was prepared to let bygones be bygones, and only wished to show them how to settle the country for good.

Meanwhile, the town of Wulade was completely occupied by the force and taken over as a post. A strong stockade was built round and the place made impregnable to native methods

of warfare.

"Palavers" were held whenever a fresh batch of chiefs could be got together, the advantage of adopting a peaceful form of government pointed out, and the blackened waste of the Wunde towns held up as an object lesson.

The spirit of their replies and questions rapidly improved, and these meetings culminated on 5th July in a highly representative gathering, who, having by arrangement previously elected fresh chiefs among themselves, came to put forward their nominees for my sanction and formal election.

This ceremony was at once gone through, and the following chiefs were elected or confirmed in their chiefdoms respectively, viz.:-

- Chief Yigbo to Lingobengu (confirmed).
- 2. Chief Kimbo to Western Wunde (elected).
- 3. Chief Bawa to Eastern Wunde (elected).
- Chief Moniko to Tungi (elected).

These countries embrace the whole of the disturbed area except the Northern Kissi portion, especially 2, 3 and 4, which were formerly under Kafura's influence. All the sub-chiefs present, who amounted to a considerable majority of those concerned, were sworn to loyalty to their newly elected chiefs by the most binding oath known to them, and to this they willingly subjected themselves, and any collusion with Kafura was expressly denounced in the oath.

- 7. The Kissi Field Force, as such, ceased to exist on 28th June. From that date an outpost of two companies, in all some 200 strong, remained to hold Wulade in order to impress the people with the idea that we were ready to enforce, if necessary, the arrangements which they had sworn to undertake; and further, to afford to the newly elected chiefs the support of our presence in enforcing the allegiance of any still remaining reluctant to altogether abandon Kafura's cause.
- 8. I have purposely refrained in the above narrative from clouding the sequence of events by details of a personal nature.

I should, however, be guilty of injustice to the Officers and men under my command did I fail to represent in the most emphatic manner the zeal, efficiency, good discipline and contempt of hardship with which they carried out these operations. To their zeal I am indebted for that enterprise and readiness to volunteer for arduous and dangerous service which was often of the utmost value. To their efficiency must be ascribed that amazingly small loss of life in the face of a numerous and well-armed enemy, fighting in a

country familiar to them, to the last inch, while to us it was unmapped and unknown. Nothing could have exceeded the excellence of the scouting work to which this immunity is due. The favourite tactics of the enemy, i.e., lying concealed close to the path and pouring in a deadly fire at close range on Officers or unarmed carriers, were entirely defeated by the incessant To their activity and vigilance of the scouts. good discipline is due that harmony and smooth working which characterised the operations from start to finish.

To their contempt for hardship I cannot pay too high a tribute. On a minimum of food, in wet weather, in rank bush and grass, more often than not was it their lot at the end of a long day's march to have to construct from such materials as the bush afforded the shelters which were to be their only protection against the almost nightly fury of the tornadoes.

It cannot be denied that Officers and men contributed to a record worthy to rank with the best traditions of the West African Frontier

Force.

That the physical difficulties to be contended with were no slight matter is well borne out by the fact that on 7th June, when entering upon the 3rd phase of the operations, of 13 officers who had originally been with the force at the commencement of operations only 4 remained actually fit for full duty, while of the remainder 6 had been invalided down country, while 3 were either too sick to march out or only fit for very light duty.

9. I have excluded from this report all details of either a political or highly technical nature, considering that such may well form the subject

of separate documents.

10. I append a sketch map showing the routes

followed by the Expedition.

A temporary casualty list and ammunition return are also attached pending the receipt of full details from Sierra Leone.

Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirtynine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eleventh day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thurteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Chillenden, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chillenden, is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in Jane Caroline Louisa Gurney, of Oakenrough, Haslemere, in the county of Surrey, Widow.

"And whereas the said Jane Caroline Louisa Gurney is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chillenden, now vested in her as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Archbishop of Canterbury

for the time being.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Chillenden, is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recom-mended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Chillenden.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Jane Caroline Louisa Gurney (in testimony whereof she has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal seal) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly

gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chillenden, now vested in her the said Jane Caroline Louisa Gurney as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, and his successors, in the same Archbishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, and by his successors in the same Archbishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of

any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighteenth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the parish of Bedlington partly out of the new parish (sometime district) of Cambois and partly out of the new parish (sometime district) of Choppington, all in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said parish of Bedlington the said new parish of Cambois and the said new parish of Choppington are cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for

public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Bedlington of the said new parish of Cambois and of the said new parish of Choppington which are hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the

purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Bedlington have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts or of some or one of them and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act a grant of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum to the minister of the said proposed separate district so soon as a minister shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act and to his successors.

"And whereas a piece of land situate within the said proposed separate district has been conveyed to us as the site for a permanent church for such district and such permanent church is now being erected upon the said piece of land in accordance with plans which have been approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners.

"And whereas the contributions towards the cost of providing the said proposed permanent church have been made upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the contributors towards the cost of providing the said proposed permanent church have nominated as the persons to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish should be assigned (firstly) the vicar for the time being of the said parish of Bedlington until the date of the foundation of a Dean and Chapter of Newcastle and (secondly) as from that date and for ever thereafter the Dean and Chapter of Newcastle and their successors.

"And whereas the said grant of the said yearly sum of one hundred and fifty pounds will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty

chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Arthur Thomas, Bishop of Newcastle (in testimony whereof is has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Bedlington, of the said new parish of Cambois and of the said new parish of Choppington which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from

the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Gouncil ratifying this scheme as aforesaid become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same be named The

District of Saint John, Sleekburn.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, and for the first twenty nominations which shall accrue before the foundation of a Dean and Chapter of Newcastle, if so many shall accrue, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Vicar or Incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Bedlington and that upon and after the expiration or other sooner determination of the assignment of such right of patronage as aforesaid the whole right or remaining right of such patronage or nomination shall without any other assurance in the law than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised by the Dean and Chapter of Newcastle and their successors for ever, if a Dean and Chapter of Newcastle shall have then been legally constituted with power to hold and exercise ecclesiastical patronage.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or any of them or any other Act of

Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint John, Sleekburn, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Bedlington, the new parish (sometime district) of Cambois and the new parish (sometime district) of Choppington, all in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint Mary, Blyth, in the said county and diocese, from the said new parish of Cambois at the point where the River Blyth is joined by the stream called Sleek Burn, and extending thence first generally north-westward and then south-westward along the middle of the said stream called Sleek Burn for a distance of three miles and a quarter or thereabouts (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Cambois from the said new parish of Choppington) to the point where the said stream called Sleek Burn is joined by the stream which flows between Sleekburn Cottage and Routledge's Buildings, and extending thence first south-eastward and then south-westward along the middle of such stream for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to the point where it is crossed by the middle of the Newcastle Backworth and Morpeth Branch Line of the North Eastern Railway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts

"Whereas the said ecclesiastical parishes of Saint George, Portsea, and Saint John, Portsea, are contiguous to the said ecclesiastical parish of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, and are situate in the

county borough of Portsmouth.

"And whereas the endowments belonging to the benefice of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, other than the vicarage house or house of residence of the Incumbent of the said benefice, consist of an annual sum of two hundred and fifty-nine pounds thirteen shillings and four pence hitherto paid by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners to the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice and at the date upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall take effect there will be in the hands of the sequestrator of the said benefice a sum of money being the residue of the income of the said benefice received by him during the vacancy thereof after the discharge of all the liabilities incurred by him as such sequestrator.

"And whereas the county borough of Portsmouth includes amongst others the following ecclesiastical parishes, namely, Saint Thomas a Becket, Portsmouth; Saint Matthew, Southsea; Saint Mark, Portsea; Saint James, Milton; Saint Mary, Portsea; and also the consolidated

chapelry of Saint Stephen, Portsea.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester, is consenting to the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed and has signed and sealed this scheme in token of such his consent.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Herbert Edward Bishop of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and affixed his episcopal seal thereto) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, hereby recommend and propose that, first, all that portion of the said ecclesiastical parish of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, which lies to the north of the middle of Queen-street, Portsea, shall be annexed to and shall form part of the ecclesiastical parish of Saint John, Portsea, and that all that portion of the said ecclesiastical parish of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, which lies to the south of the middle of Queen-street, Portsea, shall be annexed to and shall form part of the ecclesiastical parish of Saint George, Portsea; secondly, after paying out of the purchase money to be received by us under the said Act any expenses incurred by us under such Act and any costs and expenses preliminary to and of and incidental to the preparing applying for obtaining and passing that Act incurred by the Bishop of Winchester, and after making such provision as to us may seem just for the compensation of any parish clerk or other parish officers affected by the same Act, we shall apply the balance of such purchase money and all sums which under the said Act and any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme may be received by us and be directed to be applied to any of the purposes to which the said purchase money is applicable as follows, that is to say, one thousand

pounds towards the cost of restoring the church of Saint Thomas à Becket at Portsmouth, six hundred pounds towards the cost of building the church of Saint Matthew, Southsea, and the residue of such balance of purchase money and of such other sums as aforesaid in equal shares towards the following four objects, namely (1) the purchase of a site and the erection of a parish hall for the new parish of Saint Mark, Portsea, (2) the erection of Saint Patrick's Mission Hall in the new parish of Saint James, Milton. (3) the erection of Saint Wilfrid's Mission Buildings in the parish of Saint Mary, Portsea, and (4) the erection of the Copnor Mission Hall in the consolidated chapelry of Saint Stephen, Portsea: Provided always, that if within five years from the date of this scheme no sufficient progress shall in the opinion of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners have been made with the aforesaid objects or any of them to make it desirable that the said sums of money or shares of the said residue or any part thereof shall be so applied as aforesaid then we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners shall be at liberty to apply the said sums or shares or any part thereof to such other purposes contemplated by section 2 (1) (B) of the said Act as we with the concurrence of the Bishop of Winchester may determine; thirdly, out of the said annual sum of two hundred and fifty-nine pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence hitherto paid by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners to the Incumbent of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, we shall pay an annual sum of one hundred and fifty-four pounds sixteen shillings and eight pence to the Incumbent for the time being of the benefice of Saiut George, Portsea, and an annual sum of one hundred and four pounds sixteen shillings and eight pence to the Incumbent for the time being of the benefice of Saint John, Portsea; fourthly, that the moneys which at the date upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall take effect shall be in the hands of the sequestrator of the said benefice of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, or shall subsequently be received by him in respect of the income of the said benefice shall be paid by him to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and together with any other moneys which may be received by us in respect of the income of the said benefice accrued since the last vacation thereof shall, subject to the discharge thereout of any liabilities properly payable out of such moneys, be applied by us in such manner as is hereinbefore recommended to purposes to which the purchase money hereinbefore mentioned is applicable; fifthly, that the register books of baptism, marriages and burials and any other deeds, muniments, records and documents belonging to the church of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, or the Incumbent thereof and now preserved in the chest belonging to the church and otherwise under the control of the Incumbent or officers of the church, with the exception of the title deeds of the White's Row Mission Hall shall be transferred to the custody of the Vicar or Incumbent of the parish of Portsea, and that the title deeds of the White's Row Mission Hall be transferred to the custody of the Incumbent for the time being of the benefice of Saint George, Portsea; and sixthly, the Bishop of Winchester shall (notwithstanding anything contained in the said Act and any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme) have power to make an Order under the thirty-fourth section of the Ecclesiastical Delapidations Act, 1871, stating the repairs and their cost for which the late Incumbent of the said benefice of Holy Trinity, Portsea, his executors or administrators, is or are liable and the sum so

stated as the cost of such repairs shall be a debt | due from the late Incumbent, his executors or administrators, to us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and we shall have the same rights and may take all such action as any new Incumbent of the benefice of the Holy Trinity, Portsea, but for the passing of the hereinbefore mentioned Act would have had or might have taken for recovering such debt and any sum so received by us in respect of such delapidations shall after payment thereout of any expense incurred by us in recovering the same be applied by us as is hereinbefore recommended to purposes to which the purchase money hereinbefore mentioned is applicable.'

HEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Saint Nicholas, Stenigot, in the parts of Lindsey, and of the parish of Saint Martin, North Nibley, in the county of Gloucester, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representations, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial grounds should be opened in the civil parishes of Stenigot and North Nibley without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:—

STENIGOT.—Forthwith and entirely in the old church of Saint Nicholas, Stenigot, in the parts of Lindsey, and in the churchyard

attached thereto.

NORTH NIBLEY.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Martin, North Nibley, in the county of Gloucester; and, after the thirtieth of June, one thousand nine hundred and six, in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or

brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave.
