The following Addresses were presented to The King, at Buckingham Palace, on Monday last:—

Address adopted by the Convocation of the Province of Canterbury, on the 21st February, 1906.

We, Your Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury in Convocation assembled, approach Your Majesty with the dutiful assurance of our devotion to Your Majesty's throne and person.

Our first desire is to express to Your Majesty and to our Gracious Queen Alexandra our true sympathy in the sorrow which has come on the Royal House by the death of the revered King of Denmark. Her Majesty has so entered into the troubles of all classes in this Realm that the hearts of all are touched with some share in the grief of Her bereavement.

In the forefront of the thoughts which rise in our minds as we look back over the five years which have gone by since we last addressed Your Majesty, is the unfading memory of the intense anxiety with which the people of these Islands and of the British Dominions beyond the seas waited and prayed during the time of that perilous illness which delayed the high and solemn ceremony of Your Majesty's Coronation. The thankfulness with which we hailed the blessing of Your Majesty's recovery is still fresh in our hearts, and we pray that Almighty God may guard the health which then He mercifully restored.

We have a further cause of thankfulness in the peace and concord which through the opening years of Your Majesty's reign have prevailed between this Empire and the Great Powers of Europe. And we rejoice to think that not Your subjects only, but also the thoughtful minds of

other nations recognize how largely this happiness is due to Your Majesty's constant zeal for peace, and to that personal influence which has drawn to Your Majesty the trust and admiration of all who watch the course of international relations.

It was granted to Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales to strengthen, by Their visit to the Colonies, and by Their happy response to the welcome which there greeted Them, the bonds of loyalty and affection which attached the Colonies to the Mother Country and to Your Majesty's Throne. We hope and believe that a like blessing will attend the visit which India is now greeting with characteristic splendour, and that the people of that vast land may steadily advance in all true welfare, in concord one with another, and in united loyalty to Your Majesty.

We rejoice to think that not in India alone, but throughout the world, the missions of the Church are labouring to carry far and wide the Faith of Christ which has ever proved itself the strongest force for raising and purifying human life, and the surest bond of peace and goodwill amongst mankind.

It is our especial privilege to address Your Majesty concerning the work of the National Church, and in this regard we desire first to speak of a body which, since Your Majesty's accession, has been gradually constituted, in pursuance of resolutions passed by both the Houses of Convocation and the Houses of Laymen in the two Provinces of Canterbury and York. This body, bearing the name of the Representative Church Council, consists of all the Houses which we have mentioned: and thus the Bishops, the Clergy, and the Laity of both Provinces are brought together for debate and counsel. We hope that thereby, through the grace and blessing of Almighty God, the manifold work to which the Church is called may be the more wisely and fruitfully maintained, and that the judgment of Churchmen concerning the affairs of the Church may be formed and uttered with such clearness

and confidence as to appeal to the mind and conscience of the nation. We believe that this our hope will be advanced if it should presently be found possible so to reform the constitution of the ancient Houses of Convocation as to make them more really representative of those on whose behalf they speak. The Lower Houses would thus sustain with increased efficiency the tasks which have been committed to them in the past, and enter freely and fully into the wideing work which lies before them in the future.

It is the mission and privilege of the Church to serve the poor; we thankfully trust that in many of the poorest parts of our great towns that mission and privilege are being exercised with faithfulness and devotion, and we believe that the deep trials which great poverty involves come home with especial force to those whose office brings them into direct relation to such work. With especial gratitude, therefore, we thank Your Majesty for the appointment of a Royal Commission to investigate thoroughly the urgent and difficult problem of the poverty which weighs heavily on multitudes of our fellow countrymen.

In many of our parishes the Clergy have long been burdened with anxiety by reason of the great reduction of their income through the depreciation of land, the low price of agricultural produce, and the consequent fall in the value of tithe. We can assure Your Majesty that there are many cases in which this anxiety brings real distress into our brethren's homes; and we are sure of Your Majesty's generous sympathy with our earnest desire that the burden may be lightened, and with any well-considered effort which may be made to lighten it.

In Your Majesty's gracious speech at the opening of Parliament it was announced to us that a Bill will be laid before the Houses of Parliament for amending the existing law with regard to education in England and Wales. The tradition of the Church, and the labours of those who have gone before us, bind us to a constant care for the great work of education, and we wish to assure Your Majesty that we are heartily willing to do the best we can so to advance and improve the education of all classes that all may bear their part usefully, faithfully, and religiously for the welfare of the realm. We trust that we shall be found ready to labour to the utmost in that effort for the amendment of national education to which Your Majesty's words have bidden us; always guarding steadfastly those principles which we believe to be essential to the right training of the children of a Christian country.

We pray that the Blessing of Almighty God may for Christ's sake be ever with Your Majesty.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

"I receive with much gratification your loyal and dutiful Address, and I thank you heartily for your renewed assurance of devotion and attachment to My Throne and Person as well as for your condolence and sympathy in the great sorrow which has befallen The Queen and Myself and My Family through the lamented death of My beloved Father-in-Law the King of Denmark.

"I recall with deep thankfulness to Almighty God My merciful restoration to health from the illness which delayed My Coronation. The anxiety of all classes of My Subjects for My recovery, and their touching tributes of affection

deeply moved Me and will remain an undying memory and a ceaseless source of gratification to Me.

"It is ever, as you know, My earnest desire to do all in My power to contribute towards the maintenance of peace and tranquility throughout the world, and to foster that spirit of goodwill and charity which is characteristic of our holy religion. I share your thankfulness for the peace which has prevailed in Europe throughout My reign, and I rely upon the Christian sentiment of My people for supporting the pacific policy which has consistently guided My counsels. I trust that the visits of the Prince and Princess of Wales to the Colonies and to India will contribute to the maintenance of the concord that reigns throughout My Dominions and will, as you hope, strengthen the bonds of loyalty and affection which unite the people of My Empire.

"I learn with satisfaction of the measures of reform which have been introduced and are contemplated for extending the usefulness of the Church. You may be assured that it will ever be My wish to promote all measures which may tend to encourage the spread of religion and to render the Church an increasingly efficient instrument for promoting the spiritual welfare of My people. I hope that these objects may be furthered by the constitution of the new body to which you refer—the Representative Church Council—and by any proposals for the reform of the ancient Houses of Convocation which gain your approval, and that the blessing of Almighty God may rest upon your labours.

"I rejoice with you in observing the increasing zeal, faithfulness, and devotion manifested by the Clergy and the Laity in ministering to the needs of the poor, and I trust that the Commission which I have appointed to inquire into the problems of the relief of the poor and the distress arising from want of employment may be able to find some means of ameliorating the conditions resulting in the distress which weighs so heavily on many of My poorer subjects.

"I much regret that many of the Clergy are suffering from the effects of the agricultural depression which has been prevalent for so many years. On all matters that concern the welfare of the Church of England you may rest assured of My continued sympathy and interest.

"I am well aware of the great work which has been accomplished by the Church in the advancement and improvement of education, and I feel assured that your efforts for the continuance of this work, which have in the past borne such good fruit, will not be relaxed.

"I thank you for your prayers on My behalf, and I earnestly hope that by the Divine blessing prosperity may be abundantly bestowed on the Church of Christ and its labours, not only within this Kingdom but also in My Dominions beyond the seas, and that your zealous endeavours in the cause of true religion may tend to establish our national welfare on the surest foundations, and to promote the permanent happiness and highest interests of all classes of My people."

Address adopted by the Convocation of the Province of York, on the 22nd February, 1906

To The KING'S Most Excellent Majesty.
The Humble Address of the Convocation of the Province of York.

May it please Your Majesty.

We, Your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the Province of York in Convocation assembled, approach

Your Majesty with a humble assurance of our devotion to Your Majesty's Throne and Person.

We desire to express to Your Majesty and to our Gracious Queen our sincere sympathy in the bereavement which has fallen upon Your Royal House through the death of His Majesty the King of Denmark.

We thank God that Your Majesty's own health has been mercifully restored, since the grave illness which filled the Empire with such deep anxiety at the time of Your Majesty's Coronation. We earnestly pray that Your Majesty may be long spared to carry on those unceasing labours which are now so universally recognised throughout the world, for the welfare of all peoples in Your Majesty's Dominions and for the maintenance of International Peace.

It is our privilege to approach Your Majesty more especially on behalf of the National Church. We earnestly commend to Your Majesty's gracious care and favour the work of that Church in her efforts for the religious, moral and social elevation of the people, in her ministrations throughout the land to all sorts and conditions of men, in her furtherance of National Education, and in her Missionary labours, both in Your Majesty's Colonies and Dependencies, and in other far off lands.

And we earnestly trust that all measures which will enable the Church of England more effectively to discharge the sacred task entrusted to her—and herein especially the preservation of true Religion in our Schools, the Reform of the Church's Representative Bodies, and the lightening of some of the burdens now weighing heavily upon the reduced incomes of many of the benefited Clergy—may receive Your Majesty's most gracious consideration.

We humbly offer ourselves to Your Majesty for loyal co-operation in the furtherance of the highest interests of the people, which we know Your Majesty has so much at heart. And we devoutly pray that the blessing of Almighty God may ever abundantly rest upon Your Majesty's Throne and Realm.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

"I thank you very heartily for your loyal and dutiful Address, and for your sympathy in the bereavement which has fallen upon The Queen, Myself, and My Family, through the lamented death of My Father-in-law, the King of Denmark.

"I share your feeling of thankfulness to God for His mercy in restoring Me to health from the grave illness which delayed My Coronation, and I thank you for the kind expression of your affectionate interest in My welfare. My strength and My constant attention shall ever be devoted to the great causes of My subjects' well-being and of international peace.

"It is a source of the greatest happiness to Me to witness the efforts now being made by the Clergy, both at home and abroad, to further our holy religion and to spread the Church of Christ; and I feel assured that the Divine Blessing will rest on your earnest endeavours to minister to the necessitous, to reclaim and reform those who have fallen into vice, and to instruct the ignorant.

"In these efforts, as well as in the reforms which are being made and are in contemplation for the increased efficiency of the Church and its representative bodies, I feel sure that you will

be upheld and assisted by the co-operation and sympathy of a faithful laity.

"You may be well assured that in all that concerns the welfare of Our National Church, you will have My earnest sympathy and My constant prayers; and I trust that the burden caused by the present agricultural depression, which weighs so heavily upon many of the Clergy in My Kingdom, may be lightened.

"I thank you for your prayers on My behalf, and I trust that the Almighty will abundantly bless your continued efforts to promote true Christianity and morality."

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board. (Altering General Accounts Order):
Appointment of Stocktaker :—

LEEDS UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Leeds Union ;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by a General Order of the Poor Law Board, dated the 9th day of September, 1869, and addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the Leeds Union (amongst others), and by an Order issued by Us, the Local Government Board, and dated the 20th day of January, 1879, and addressed to the said Guardians, it is required that in relation to the provisions, clothing, and other stores in the Workhouse and Infirmary, the Accounts when made up and balanced, shall be submitted to the Visiting Committee or to some Member thereof, who shall enter a memorandum at the foot of those Accounts, certifying to the same having been submitted, and to the correctness of the said Accounts as regards the stock remaining in store ;

And whereas it is expedient to empower the said Guardians to appoint a competent person or persons to examine the stores at the Workhouse, and at any House (whatever be its designation or description) which belongs to the Guardians, in which any poor person is lodged and maintained, and to which the Orders hereinbefore mentioned apply, and to perform the other duties hereinafter set forth :

Now therefore, in the exercise of Our powers in that behalf, We do hereby Order as follows :—

ARTICLE I.—The Guardians of the Poor of the Leeds Union, as and when they shall think fit to do so, may appoint a competent person or persons to perform the duties of a Stocktaker as hereinafter set forth, and may revoke that appointment. Any appointment of a Stocktaker by the Guardians shall be notified to Us forthwith.

ARTICLE II.—Every appointment of a Stocktaker shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Regulations in force for the time being as to the appointment of Officers by the said Guardians, and a person appointed to the office of Stocktaker shall receive such remuneration as may from time to time be assigned to him by the said Guardians.

ARTICLE III.—No person, except with Our consent, shall be appointed to the office of Stocktaker while holding any other office under the Guardians.

ARTICLE IV.—The Stocktaker shall, on the day next after the termination of each quarter, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stores at the Workhouse, and at any House such as is hereinbefore described, and compare the said stores with the quantities of stock remaining in store as shown by the entries in the proper columns in the Accounts termed respectively the "Quarterly Balance of the Provisions Account" and the "Quarterly Balance of the Necessaries and Miscellaneous Account," or in such additional Accounts as may be kept under the directions of the Guardians.

He shall also, on the day next after the termination of each half-year, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stock of clothing at the Workhouse, and at any House such as is hereinbefore described, and compare the same with the balance

appearing in the Accounts termed respectively the "Clothing Materials Receipt and Conversion Account" and the "Clothing Receipt and Expenditure Account," and shall compare the various articles enumerated in the Inventory Books of the before-mentioned establishments, and see that the said articles are distributed in accordance with the entries therein.

ARTICLE V.—After making the examination and comparison referred to in Article IV, the Stocktaker, if he find the stock to be correct, shall sign a certificate at the foot of each of the balanced Accounts in the following form :—

ARTICLE VII.—The Master of the Workhouse, and the Master, Steward, or Superintendent of any such House as aforesaid, shall lay each of the said Accounts before the Guardians at their next meeting after the date of the entry therein of any such certificate as aforesaid.

LEEDS (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1906.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

PART I.

MOVEMENT INTO CITY OF LEEDS.

Restriction on Movement into City of Leeds.

1.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved into the city of Leeds except in accordance with the provisions of this Order; Provided that this Article shall not apply to movement of swine from the administrative counties of the East and West Ridings of the county of York, or the county boroughs of Bradford, Halifax, Huddersfield, Kingston-upon-Hull, Rotherham, Sheffield, and York.

(2.) For the purposes of this Order the city of Leeds shall be deemed to include any detached portion of the administrative county of the West Riding of the county of York or of any county borough which is surrounded by the city.

Provision for Movement with Licence, and Subsequent Detention.

2.—(1.) Swine may be moved from premises outside the city of Leeds to premises in that city if accompanied by a licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of that city.

(2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article, the owner of the swine, or his agent, authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration, countersigned as hereinafter provided, to the effect:

- (i.) That he is the owner of [or the agent authorised in writing for this purpose by the owner of] the swine;
- (ii.) That the swine have been on the premises from which they are to be moved for a period of at least twenty-eight days immediately before the date of the declaration;
- (iii.) That to the best of his knowledge and belief the swine are not affected with swine-fever, and have not during the period of twenty-eight days as aforesaid been in any way exposed to the infection of swine-fever; and
- (iv.) That the swine are not in a Swine-Fever Infected Place, and that the movement of the swine is not prohibited by notice of an Inspector of a Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

(3.) The declaration as to swine to be moved shall not be effective until it is countersigned by a police officer of the district where the swine are, who, before countersigning the declaration, shall, so far as is practicable, satisfy himself as

to the correctness of the statements contained therein.

(4.) The declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting the licence thereon.

(5.) The licence shall be in force for five days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the licence is granted, the number of the swine to be moved, and the name or description of the place from which, and the place and premises to which, the swine are to be moved.

(6.) Swine moved with a licence under this Article shall not, for a period of twenty-eight days after arrival at the place of destination specified in the licence, be moved from such place of destination, except as hereinafter provided in the case of markets, fairs, sales, and exhibitions. The swine, while detained under this Article, shall be kept separate from all other swine. This provision does not restrict the removal of any carcase of a pig.

PART II.

MOVEMENT OUT OF CITY OF LEEDS.

Restriction on Movement out of City of Leeds.

3.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved out of the city of Leeds except to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse and only if accompanied by a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of that city and on the following conditions (namely):

- (i.) The swine shall be marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine, thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.
- (ii.) The swine shall be moved, by railway so far as is practicable, to the bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the Licence, and during such movement shall not be permitted to come in contact with swine not marked under this Article.
- (iii.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than five days inclusive of the day of issue and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted and the name or description of the bacon factory or slaughterhouse to which the swine are to be moved.
- (iv.) The Local Authority of the city of Leeds shall cause a copy of the Licence to be sent forthwith to the Local Authority of the District into which the swine are to be moved.
- (v.) The swine shall after their arrival at the bacon factory or slaughterhouse be there detained until they are slaughtered.
- (vi.) The Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate shall take such steps as are necessary to insure that the swine are moved to the bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the Licence and are duly slaughtered there.

(2.) Swine while being moved under this Article shall not, unless otherwise hereafter expressly provided by Order of the Board, be subject to any restriction on movement of swine imposed by any other Order of the Board or by regulations made by the Local Authority of any District.

PART III.

REGULATION OF MARKETS, FAIRS, SALES AND EXHIBITIONS.

Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions of Swine.

4. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of swine, shall be held in the city of Leeds except as expressly authorised by this Order, or under the provisions of the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1904.

Exhibitions of Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

5.—(1.) An exhibition of swine may be held in the city of Leeds with a Licence of the Local Authority, on such conditions, if any, as they think expedient.

(2.) The Local Authority may, if they think fit, by such Licence authorise the sale at such exhibition of the swine exhibited thereat on such conditions, if any, as they think expedient.

(3.) The Local Authority shall not grant a Licence for an exhibition under this Article unless they are satisfied that the proposed exhibition is a bonâ fide agricultural show, and that the swine are to be exhibited thereat for competition.

(4.) Swine which have been moved into the city and been exhibited under this Article may be moved from the exhibition to any premises, whether within or outside the city, with a Licence of the Local Authority, on such conditions, if any, as are inserted in the Licence.

Sale of Swine with Licence of Local Authority in cases where the Swine have been on Premises for 28 days.

6.—(1.) A sale of swine may be held in the city of Leeds with a Licence of the Local Authority in any case where the sale is held in accordance with the following conditions (namely)—

(i.) that the sale is held on a farm or premises not in a Swine-Fever Infected Place; and
(ii.) that no pig on the said farm or premises is affected with swine-fever; and

(iii.) that for a period of twenty-eight days immediately before the day on which the sale is held no pig has been brought on to the said farm or premises, and that no pig on the said farm or premises has during that period in any way been exposed to the infection of swine-fever.

(2.) A Licence of the Local Authority for a sale under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall give notice of the conditions contained in this Article by specifying the same as conditions on which the Licence is granted, and may impose such further conditions, if any, as the Local Authority think expedient, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the sale, and shall also specify the farm or premises where and the date when the sale is to be held, and the Local Authority may at any time revoke any such Licence.

(3.) The Licence for a sale under this Article or a copy of such Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such sale by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the farm or premises where such sale is held.

Markets Fairs and Sales of Fat Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

7.—(1.) A market, fair, or sale of swine may be held in the city of Leeds with a Licence of the Local

Authority; Provided that the swine exposed at a market, fair, or sale authorised under this Article shall be moved from the market, fair, or sale only if accompanied by a Licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority authorising the movement and to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the licence, and subject to all the conditions of Article 2 of this Order as if the same were inserted in this Article.

(2.) A Licence of the Local Authority for a market, fair, or sale under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall give notice of the conditions contained in this Article by specifying the same as conditions on which the Licence is granted, and may impose such further conditions, if any, as the Local Authority think expedient, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the market, fair, or sale (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall also specify the place where the market, fair, or sale is to be held, and may authorise the holding of periodical markets, fairs, or sales on stated days for a time limited, not exceeding one month, but the Licence may be renewed from time to time, and shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to insure publicity for the same. The Local Authority may at any time revoke any such Licence.

(3.) The Licence for a market, fair, or sale under this Article or a copy of such Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such market, fair, or sale by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the market, fair-ground, or sale-yard where such market, fair, or sale is held.

(4.) The Local Authority shall grant a Licence for a market, fair, or sale under this Article only if they are satisfied that the market, fair, or sale is to be held in a market, fair-ground, or sale-yard which is capable of being thoroughly cleansed and disinfected.

Copies of Licences for Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions to be sent to Board.

8. The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every Licence granted by them for the holding of a market, fair, sale, or exhibition under this Order.

Revocation by Board of Licences.

9. If the Board are of opinion, with respect to any Licence of the Local Authority for a market, fair, sale, or exhibition under this Order, that the holding of such market, fair, sale, or exhibition thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the Licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Attendance at Markets Fairs and Sales.

10. A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend at every market or fair licensed under this Order and at every sale licensed under Article 7 of this Order, and a fit person or a sufficient number of fit persons shall be appointed by the Local Authority to attend at every market, fair, or sale so licensed, for the purpose of granting thereat on behalf of the Local Authority such Movement Licences as are required under this Order.

PART IV.

GENERAL.

Provision for Movement through City of Leeds.

11. For the purposes of this Order, swine shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of the city of Leeds in any case where they are moved through that city by railway from a place outside that city to another place outside that city without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked within that city.

Limitation on Granting of Movement Licences.

12. A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the swine to be moved or by his agent, or by the owner or consignee or other person selling the swine, or exposing the swine for sale, or by the purchaser thereof or by his agent, or by the auctioneer or other person conducting or licensed to hold the market, fair, or sale at which the swine are exposed, or by the occupier of the premises from or to which the swine are to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Subcommittee of the Local Authority.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

13.—(1.) Every person in charge of a pig or thing being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

14.—(1.) If a market, fair, sale, or exhibition is held in contravention of this Order or of the conditions of a Licence thereunder, the person licensed to hold or holding the same, and the occupier of the place or farm or premises where the market, fair, sale, or exhibition is held, and the owner or consignee of each pig exposed or exhibited thereat, and the person exposing or exhibiting the same thereat, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale or exhibition, and the person, if any, taking entrance-money or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereof of any pig, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the market, fair, sale, or exhibition to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a pig is not marked as required by this Order, the owner, consignee, or other person exposing or exhibiting the same, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the purchaser thereof, and the person licensed to hold or holding the market, fair, sale, or exhibition, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale or exhibition, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any pig as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the

same to be done, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

15. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Bacon factory” means premises in which the business of a curer of bacon is carried on:

“Slaughterhouse” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered:

“Swine-Fever Infected Place” means a place for the time being declared to be infected with swine-fever under any Order of the Board:

“Farm” or “premises” includes two or more adjoining farms or premises in the same occupation:

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector:

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Provision as to Local Regulations.

16. The powers of the Local Authority of the city of Leeds to make regulations under the Swine-Fever Order of 1894, as to movement, exposure, or sale of swine, shall be suspended during the operation of this Order, and all such regulations in force at the commencement of this Order shall thereupon cease to operate.

Commencement.

17. This Order shall come into operation on the fifteenth day of March, nineteen hundred and six.

18. This Order may be cited as the LEEDS (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1906.

SHEFFIELD (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER
OF 1906.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

PART I.

MOVEMENT INTO CITY OF SHEFFIELD.

Restriction on Movement into City of Sheffield.

1.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved into the city of Sheffield except in accordance with the provisions of this Order ; Provided that this Article shall not apply to movement of swine from the administrative counties of the East and West Ridings of the county of York, or the county boroughs of Bradford, Halifax, Huddersfield, Kingston-upon-Hull, Rotherham, Leeds, and York.

(2.) For the purposes of this Order the city of Sheffield shall be deemed to include any detached portion of the administrative county of the West Riding of the county of York or of any county borough which is surrounded by the city.

Provision for Movement with Licence, and Subsequent Detention.

2.—(1.) Swine may be moved from premises outside the city of Sheffield to premises in that city if accompanied by a licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of that city.

(2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article, the owner of the swine, or his agent, authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration, countersigned as hereinafter provided, to the effect :

- (i.) That he is the owner of [or the agent authorised in writing for this purpose by the owner of] the swine ;
- (ii.) That the swine have been on the premises from which they are to be moved for a period of at least twenty-eight days immediately before the date of the declaration ;
- (iii.) That to the best of his knowledge and belief the swine are not affected with swine-fever, and have not during the period of twenty-eight days as aforesaid been in any way exposed to the infection of swine-fever ; and
- (iv.) That the swine are not in a Swine-Fever Infected Place, and that the movement of the swine is not prohibited by notice of an Inspector of a Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

(3.) The declaration as to swine to be moved shall not be effective until it is countersigned by a police officer of the district where the swine are, who, before countersigning the declaration, shall, so far as is practicable, satisfy himself as

to the correctness of the statements contained therein.

(4.) The declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting the licence thereon.

(5.) The licence shall be in force for five days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the licence is granted, the number of the swine to be moved, and the name or description of the place from which, and the place and premises to which, the swine are to be moved.

(6.) Swine moved with a licence under this Article shall not, for a period of twenty-eight days after arrival at the place of destination specified in the licence, be moved from such place of destination, except as hereinafter provided in the case of markets, fairs, sales, and exhibitions. The swine, while detained under this Article, shall be kept separate from all other swine. This provision does not restrict the removal of any carcase of a pig.

PART II.

MOVEMENT OUT OF CITY OF SHEFFIELD.

Restriction on Movement out of City of Sheffield.

3.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved out of the city of Sheffield except to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse, and only if accompanied by a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of that city and on the following conditions (namely) :

- (i.) The swine shall be marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine, thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.
- (ii.) The swine shall be moved, by railway so far as is practicable, to the bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the Licence, and during such movement shall not be permitted to come in contact with swine not marked under this Article.

(DATED 1ST MARCH 1906.)

ROTHERHAM (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER
OF 1906.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

PART I.

MOVEMENT INTO COUNTY BOROUGH OF
ROTHERHAM.

*Restriction on Movement into County Borough of
Rotherham.*

1.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved into the county borough of Rotherham except in accordance with the provisions of this Order; Provided that this Article shall not apply to movement of swine from the administrative counties of the East and West Ridings of the county of York, or the county boroughs of Bradford, Halifax, Huddersfield, Kingston-upon-Hull, Leeds, Sheffield, and York.

(2.) For the purposes of this Order the county borough of Rotherham shall be deemed to include any detached portion of the administrative county of the West Riding of the county of York or of any county borough which is surrounded by the county borough of Rotherham.

*Provision for Movement with Licence, and
Subsequent Detention.*

2.—(1.) Swine may be moved from premises outside the county borough of Rotherham to premises in that borough if accompanied by a licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of that borough.

(2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article, the owner of the swine, or his agent, authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration, countersigned as hereinafter provided, to the effect :

- (i.) That he is the owner of [or the agent authorised in writing for this purpose by the owner of] the swine ;
- (ii.) That the swine have been on the premises from which they are to be moved for a period of at least twenty-eight days immediately before the date of the declaration ;
- iii.) That to the best of his knowledge and belief the swine are not affected with swine-fever, and have not during the period of twenty-eight days as aforesaid been in any way exposed to the infection or swine-fever; and
- (iv.) That the swine are not in a Swine-Fever Infected Place, and that the movement of the swine is not prohibited by notice of an Inspector of a Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board,

(3.) The declaration as to swine to be moved shall not be effective until it is countersigned by a police officer of the district where the swine are, who, before countersigning the declaration, shall, so far as is practicable, satisfy himself as to the correctness of the statements contained therein.

(4.) The declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting the licence thereon.

(5.) The licence shall be in force for five days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the licence is granted, the number of the swine to be moved, and the name or description of the place from which, and the place and premises to which, the swine are to be moved.

(6.) Swine moved with a licence under this Article shall not, for a period of twenty-eight days after arrival at the place of destination specified in the licence, be moved from such place of destination, except as hereinafter provided in the case of markets, fairs, sales, and exhibitions. The swine, while detained under this Article, shall be kept separate from all other swine. This provision does not restrict the removal of any carcase of a pig.

PART II.

MOVEMENT OUT OF COUNTY BOROUGH OF
ROTHERHAM.

*Restriction on Movement out of County Borough
of Rotherham.*

3.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved out of the county borough of Rotherham except to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse and only if accompanied by a Movement Licence of the Local Authority of that borough and on the following conditions (namely) :

- (i.) The swine shall be marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine, thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.
- (ii.) The swine shall be moved, by railway so far as is practicable, to the bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the Licence, and during such movement shall not be permitted to come in contact with swine not marked under this Article.
- (iii.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than five days inclusive of the day of issue and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted and the name or description of the bacon factory or slaughterhouse to which the swine are to be moved.
- (iv.) The Local Authority of the county borough of Rotherham shall cause a copy of the Licence to be sent forthwith to the Local Authority of the District into which the swine are to be moved.
- (v.) The swine shall after their arrival at the bacon factory or slaughterhouse be there detained until they are slaughtered.
- (vi.) The Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate shall take such steps as are necessary to insure that the swine are moved to the bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the Licence and are duly slaughtered there.

(2) Swine while being moved under this Article shall not, unless otherwise hereafter expressly provided by Order of the Board, be subject to any restriction on movement of swine imposed by any other Order of the Board or by regulations made by the Local Authority of any District.

PART III.

REGULATION OF MARKETS, FAIRS, SALES AND EXHIBITIONS.

Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions of Swine.

4. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of swine, shall be held in the county borough of Rotherham except as expressly authorised by this Order, or under the provisions of the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1904.

Exhibitions of Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

5.—(1.) An exhibition of swine may be held in the county borough of Rotherham with a Licence of the Local Authority, on such conditions, if any, as they think expedient.

(2.) The Local Authority may, if they think fit, by such Licence authorise the sale at such exhibition of the swine exhibited thereat on such conditions, if any, as they think expedient.

(3.) The Local Authority shall not grant a Licence for an exhibition under this Article unless they are satisfied that the proposed exhibition is a bona fide agricultural show, and that the swine are to be exhibited thereat for competition.

(4.) Swine which have been moved into the borough and been exhibited under this Article may be moved from the exhibition to any premises, whether within or outside the borough, with a Licence of the Local Authority, on such conditions, if any, as are inserted in the Licence.

Sale of Swine with Licence of Local Authority in cases where the Swine have been on Premises for 28 days.

6.—(1.) A sale of swine may be held in the county borough of Rotherham with a Licence of the Local Authority in any case where the sale is held in accordance with the following conditions (namely)—

- (i.) That the sale is held on a farm or premises not in a Swine-Fever Infected Place; and
- (ii.) that no pig on the said farm or premises is affected with swine-fever; and
- (iii.) that for a period of twenty-eight days immediately before the day on which the sale is held no pig has been brought on to the said farm or premises, and that no pig on the said farm or premises has during that period in any way been exposed to the infection of swine-fever.

(2.) A Licence of the Local Authority for a sale under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall give notice of the conditions contained in this Article by specifying the same as conditions on which the Licence is granted, and may impose such further conditions, if any, as the Local Authority think expedient, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the sale, and shall also specify the farm or premises where and the date when the sale is to be held, and the Local

Authority may at any time revoke any such Licence.

(3.) The Licence for a sale under this Article or a copy of such Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such sale by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the farm or premises where such sale is held.

Markets Fairs and Sales of Fat Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

7.—(1.) A market, fair, or sale of swine may be held in the county borough of Rotherham with a Licence of the Local Authority; Provided that the swine exposed at a market, fair, or sale authorised under this Article shall be moved from the market, fair, or sale only if accompanied by a Licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority authorising the movement and to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the licence, and subject to all the conditions of Article 2 of this Order as if the same were inserted in this Article.

(2.) A Licence of the Local Authority for a market, fair, or sale under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall give notice of the conditions contained in this Article by specifying the same as conditions on which the Licence is granted, and may impose such further conditions, if any, as the Local Authority think expedient, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the market, fair, or sale (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall also specify the place where the market, fair, or sale is to be held, and may authorise the holding of periodical markets, fairs, or sales on stated days for a time limited, not exceeding one month, but the Licence may be renewed from time to time, and shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to insure publicity for the same. The Local Authority may at any time revoke any such Licence.

(3.) The Licence for a market, fair, or sale under this Article or a copy of such Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such market, fair, or sale by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the market, fair-ground, or sale-yard where such market, fair, or sale is held.

(4.) The Local Authority shall grant a Licence for a market, fair, or sale under this Article only if they are satisfied that the market, fair, or sale is to be held in a market, fair-ground, or sale-yard which is capable of being thoroughly cleansed and disinfected.

Copies of Licences for Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions to be sent to Board.

8. The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every Licence granted by them for the holding of a market, fair, sale, or exhibition under this Order.

Revocation by Board of Licences.

9. If the Board are of opinion, with respect to any Licence of the Local Authority for a market, fair, sale, or exhibition under this Order, that the holding of such market, fair, sale, or exhibition thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the Licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Attendance at Markets Fairs and Sales.

10. A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend at every market or fair licensed under this Order and at every sale licensed under Article 7 of this Order, and a fit person or a sufficient number of fit persons shall be appointed by the Local Authority to attend at every market, fair, or sale so licensed, for the purpose of granting thereat on behalf of the Local Authority such Movement Licences as are required under this Order.

PART IV.

GENERAL.

Provision for Movement through County Borough of Rotherham.

11. For the purposes of this Order, swine shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of the county borough of Rotherham in any case where they are moved through that borough by railway from a place outside that borough to another place outside that borough without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked within that borough.

Limitation on Granting of Movement Licences.

12. A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the swine to be moved or by his agent, or by the owner or consignee or other person selling the swine, or exposing the swine for sale, or by the purchaser thereof or by his agent, or by the auctioneer or other person conducting or licensed to hold the market, fair, or sale at which the swine are exposed, or by the occupier of the premises from or to which the swine are to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of the Local Authority.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

13.—(1.) Every person in charge of a pig or thing being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

14.—(1.) If a market, fair, sale, or exhibition is held in contravention of this Order or of the conditions of a Licence thereunder, the person licensed to hold or holding the same, and the occupier of the place or farm or premises where the market, fair, sale, or exhibition is held, and the owner or consignee of each pig exposed or exhibited thereat, and the person exposing or exhibiting the same thereat, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale or exhibition, and the person, if any, taking entrance-money or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereof of any pig, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the market, fair, sale, or exhibition to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own

acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a pig is not marked as required by this Order, the owner, consignee, or other person exposing or exhibiting the same, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the purchaser thereof, and the person licensed to hold or holding the market, fair, sale, or exhibition, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale or exhibition, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any pig as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

15. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Bacon factory” means premises in which the business of a curer of bacon is carried on :

“Slaughterhouse” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered :

“Swine-Fever Infected Place” means a place for the time being declared to be infected with swine-fever under any Order of the Board :

“Farm” or “premises” includes two or more adjoining farms or premises in the same occupation :

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector :

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries :

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Provision as to Local Regulations.

16. The powers of the Local Authority of the county borough of Rotherham to make regulations under the Swine-Fever Order of 1894, as to movement, exposure, or sale of swine, shall be suspended during the operation of this Order, and all such regulations in force at the commencement of this Order shall thereupon cease to operate.

Revocation.

17. The Order described in the Schedule hereto is hereby revoked as from the date of the commencement of this Order.

Commencement.

18. This Order shall come into operation on the fifteenth day of March, nineteen hundred and six.

Short Title.

19. This Order may be cited as the ROTHERHAM (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1906.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903.

1.—(1.) From and after the commencement of this Order the provisions of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903 shall apply to the Area described in the Schedule to this Order.

(2.) The borough of Barnsley, which is comprised in the said Area, shall cease to be a separate Scheduled Area for the purposes of the said Order.

(3.) The restrictions on movement imposed by this Order shall not apply to movement of swine into the said Area from the county boroughs of Leeds, Rotherham, and Sheffield.

(4.) For the purposes of this Order any detached part of an administrative county or county borough surrounded by another administrative county or county borough shall be deemed to be part of the county or borough which so surrounds it.

Provision as to Local Regulations.

2. The powers of the Local Authorities of any district comprised in the Area described in the Schedule hereto to make regulations under the Swine-Fever Order of 1894, as to movement, exposure, or sale of swine, shall be suspended during the operation of this Order, and all such regulations in force at the commencement of this Order shall thereupon cease to operate.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the fifteenth day of March, nineteen hundred and six.

No. 182.—CHINA, SHANTUNG—NORTH COAST.

Chifu Time Ball—Standard Time Adopted.

Information has been received from Captain E. F. B. Charlton, His Majesty's ship "Hecla," that, on 20th September, 1905, the time ball at Tower Hill, Chifu, was dropped at 0h. 0m. 0s. Standard Time of the 120th meridian of East longitude, or 0h. 5m. 34s. Local Mean Time, corresponding to 16h. 0m. 0s. Greenwich Mean Time.

It is assumed from the above that Standard Time has been adopted at Chifu.

Approximate position, lat. $37^{\circ} 32' 56''$ N., long. $121^{\circ} 23' 30''$ E.

No. 183.—FRANCE—NORTH COAST.

Le Havre, Newly Dredged Channel—Opening of, Alteration in Lighting and Buoyage.

With reference to Notices to Mariners, Nos. 678, 817, and 1326 of 1905:—

The French Government has given further notice that, on 15th February, 1906, the newly-dredged channel into Havre would be opened, and the following alterations made in the lighting and buoyage in the entrance to that port:—

Lights established:—

1. A red flashing light every five seconds, thus:—flash, seven-tenths of a second; eclipse, four and three-tenths seconds, would be established in a white iron trellis-work turret, erected on the head of the new north breakwater; it is elevated 49 feet above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles, the light power being 6,000 candles. A fog horn, elevated 46 feet above high water and worked by compressed air, will give during thick or foggy weather one blast every thirty seconds, thus:—blast, three seconds; silent interval, twenty-seven seconds.

Approximate position, lat. $49^{\circ} 29\frac{1}{4}'$ N., long. $0^{\circ} 5\frac{1}{2}'$ E.

2. A white fixed light, elevated 49 feet above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 9 miles, would be established in a black iron trellis-work turret, erected on the head of the new south breakwater, the light power being provisionally 250 candles. During thick or foggy weather a bell, elevated 39 feet above high water, will be struck by machinery twelve times every minute.

3. The centre of the north-western entrance to the newly-dredged channel would be marked by three red fixed leading dioptric lights. The front light is elevated 39 feet above high water, visible from a distance of 11 miles, and shown

from a metal support, painted white, with a wooden topmark erected on the western part of the new northern breakwater about $3\frac{1}{2}$ cables from its head. The middle light is elevated about 72 feet above high water, visible from a distance of 14 miles, and shown from a similar support, erected at a distance of about $1\frac{3}{10}$ cables S. 75° E. from the front light, the light power of these two lights being 3,500 candles, and the illuminant incandescent gas.

The rear light (electric) is elevated 131 feet above high water, visible from a distance of 15 miles, and shown from the North Cupola of the Exchange, situated a distance of about $7\frac{1}{2}$ cables S. 75° E. from the front light, the light power being 5,000 candles.

These three lights in line lead through the centre of the newly-dredged channel to the Little Road.

4. The white fixed light formerly exhibited on the South Mole Head of the Avant Port would be replaced by a provisional green fixed light, elevated 27 feet above high water, and visible from a distance of 7 miles; this light in line S. 53° E. with the red flashing light on the new north breakwater head marks the northern edge of the second section of the newly-dredged channel, and in line with the fixed white light on the new south breakwater head, marks the southern edge of the same channel. Vessels should therefore turn into this channel when the green fixed light is midway between the lights on the heads of the new breakwater. The light power of this light over the channel is 130 candles.

Lights discontinued. The following lights would be discontinued:—The provisional red fixed light on Boulevard Maritime near St. Adresse, S. 34° E. 9 cables from La Héve South Light, the white fixed light on the head of the old north pier, now demolished, together with the provisional light showing a red sector over the works, the red flashing light on the old south pier, and the green fixed light situated between Basins du Roi and De la Barre in the Avant Port.

Buoys established:—5. The newly-dredged channel in the north-west passage would also be marked by five light-buoys moored about 30 yards from the limits, those on the northern side being painted black and marked A 1, A 3, A 5, each exhibiting a red fixed light, those on the southern side being first a buoy painted in black and white horizontal bands, marked A 2, and exhibiting a white occulting light every six seconds, thus: light, four seconds; eclipse, two seconds; and, secondly, a buoy painted red, marked A 4, exhibiting a white fixed light; they are in the following positions:—

a. A 1 buoy would be moored at a distance of $15\frac{1}{2}$ cables S. 62° W. from Cape de la Héve South Lighthouse.

b. A 3 buoy would be moored at a distance of 13 cables S. 50° W. from Cape de la Héve South Lighthouse.

c. A 5 buoy would be moored at a distance of $11\frac{2}{10}$ cables S. 28° W. from Cape de la Héve South Lighthouse.

d. A 2 buoy would be moored at a distance of 17 cables S. 57° W. from Cape de la Héve South Lighthouse.

e. A 4 buoy would be moored at a distance of $13\frac{2}{10}$ cables S. 27° W. from Cape de la Héve South Lighthouse.

Buoys withdrawn :—

The undermentioned buoys would be withdrawn :—

1. The light and bell-buoy No. 3, marking Éclat Bank, formerly situated at a distance of $1\frac{6}{10}$ miles S. 60° W. from Cape de la Héve South Light.

2. Light-buoy No. 5, formerly situated at a distance of $2\frac{7}{10}$ miles S. 35° W. from Cape de la Héve South Light.

3. Light-buoy No. 7, formerly situated at a distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. 3° W. from Cape de la Héve South Light.

4. Light-buoy No. 11, formerly situated at a distance of $1\frac{7}{10}$ miles S. 10° E. from Cape de la Héve South Light.

Approximate position, Cape de la Héve South Light, lat. $49^{\circ} 30\frac{1}{2}'$ N., long. $0^{\circ} 4'$ E.

NOTE.—Vessels entering or leaving the harbour are recommended not to pass the south breakwater within a distance of 80 yards, and not to steer northward of a line joining the head of the new north pier and the old north pier, the remains of which are marked by a red fixed light.

San Gabriel Island—Reef Northward of.

The German Government has given notice, dated 10th February, 1906, of the existence of a reef, with a depth of $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms over it, northward of San Gabriel Island, situated in a position from which the western extremity of that island bears S. 5° E., distant $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and the north-eastern point of the same island S. 63° E. This reef is connected with the island.
