WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fifteenth day of February, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a new Archdeaconry within the diocese of Southwark, for endowing such new Archdeaconry and for altering the boundaries of the two Archdeaconries which already exist in the same diocese.

"Whereas the said diocese of Southwark has heretofore comprised two Archdeaconries and no more, namely, the Archdeaconry of Southwark and the Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of Southwark, has represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that a new Archdeaconry should be constituted within

the said diocese of Southwark and should comprise the rural deaneries of Greenwich, Lewisham, and Woolwich which are in the said diocese of Southwark but are not at present in any Archdeaconry and the rural deaneries of Camberwell and Dulwich which are at present within the said Archdeaconry of Southwark and within the said diocese of Southwark, that such new Archdeaconry should be endowed in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed, and that the rural deaneries of Streatham and Wandsworth which are at present in the said Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames and within the said diocese of Southwark should be trausferred to the said Archdeaconry of Southwark.

"And whereas it appears to us to be undesirable that procurations, synodals, visitation fees and induction fees should be received by the Archdeacon of the said proposed new Archdeaconry.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the discontinuance of the collection of the said fees there will be no annual income available for the said proposed Archdeaconry from fees, dues and emoluments, and that the grant hereinafter recommended and proposed will not be such as to raise the annual income of the said proposed Archdeaconry to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds.

"Now therefore we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of Southwark (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order one new Archdeaconry shall be created within the said diocese of

Southwark, that such Archdeaconry shall be named 'The Archdeaconry of Lewisham' and shall comprise and consist of the said rural deaneries of Greenwich, Lewisham, Woolwich, Camberwell and Dulwich and that the said rural deaneries of Streatham and Wandsworth shall be severed from the said Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames and shall be annexed to the said Archdeaconry of Southwark.

"And we further recommend and propose that the rural deans and other the clergy and the inhabitants generally of the said proposed Archdeaconry of Lewisham and the said Arch-deaconries of Southwark and Kingston-upon-Thames shall be under and subject to the archidaconal jurisdiction authority and control of the respective Archdeacons of such Archdeacenries for the time being and that such Archdeacens shall have and exercise all the rights powers and duties of an Archdeacon within

the limits of his Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that we be authorized to pay by half-yearly instal-ments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act to the Archdeacon of the said proposed Archdeaconry of Lewisham and to his successors in the same Archdeacoury the yearly sum of two hundred pounds, the instalment so first becoming due being an apportioned part only of the said sum of two hundred pounds in respect of the period between the date of the institution of the first Archdeacon of the said proposed Archdeaconry of Lewisham and the first half-yearly day of payment next ensuing: provided always that every payment in respect of the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the Archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that he has not collected procurations, synodals, visitation fees or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any Archdeacon who may be entitled to receive the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall resign or otherwise avoid his Archdeaconry such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such Archdeacon or his representatives (as the case may be) and the Archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the Archdeacons affected thereby and the said Archdeacons have signified their consent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, there-iore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Southwark.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parish of Tottenham, in the county of

Middlesex..

"Whereas under and by virtue of an indenture bearing date the thirteenth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and five, and made or expressed to be made between us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the one part and the County Council of the Administrative County of London of the other part, the hereditaments described in the schedule hereto annexed became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us in fee simple for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the hereditaments aforesaid are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are

governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manuer as shall

appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and em-powered by instrument or instruments, in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Acts all or any of the said hereditaments so vested in us as atoresaid, with their appurtenances and all our estate, right, title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns or other-wise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenemeuts or here-ditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"All that piece or parcel of land situate on the west side of Church lane, in the parish of Tottenham, in the county of Middlesex, containing one acre and thirty-two perches or thereabouts, together with the messuages and building thereon known as The Priory, and which said piece or parcel of land is with the abuttals more particularly delineated and coloured red on the plan A annexed to the deed, and all that other piece or parcel of land lying to the northward of the piece or parcel of land first described in the first witnessing part of the said deed and also coloured red on the said plan."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the Loudon Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the

Right Reverend Francis John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Macclesfield which is comprised within the townships of Macclesfield Forest and Wildboardlough, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church called Forest Chapel, situate at Macclesfield Forest as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Macclesfield Forest with Wildboardlough.

"And with the like consent of the said Francis John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church called Forest Chapel, situate at Macclesfield Forest as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the per-formance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

And with the like consent of the said Edwyn, Bishop of the said diocese of Southwell, (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of All Saints, situate at Hucknallunder-Huthwaite as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always that so long as the Reverend Francis John Adams, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Sutton-in-Ashfield shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of All Saints, situate at Hucknallunder-Huthwaite as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Francis John Adams; and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be "separated from the parishes or mother churches "to which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may in "some instances with advantage be annexed to " parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop "of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, "or district within the diocese of such Arch-"bishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the "case may be, may be advantageously separated "from any parish or mother church, and either be "constituted a separate benefice by itself or be "united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be "annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, "or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesias-"tical purposes; and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to "the said Archbishop for his consideration) "describing the mode in which it appears to him "that the alteration may best be effected, and how "the changes consequent on such alteration in "respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe "lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesias-"tical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect "to patronage and rights to pews, may be made "with justice to all parties interested; and if the "patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices "to be affected by such alteration shall consent "in writing under his or their hands to such "scheme, or to such modification thereof as the "said Archbishop may approve, and the said "Archbishop shall, on full consideration and "inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or "modification thereof, and shall certify the same "and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to "His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for "His Majesty in Council to make an Order for "carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."
"And whereas the Right Reverend Charles,

"And whereas the Right Reverend Charles, Lord Bishop of Birmingham, hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented, in a writing dated the twenty-ninth November, one thousand nine hundred and five, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—
"I Charles, Bishop of Birmingham, beg leave to represent to your Grace that there are certain districts or portions of land belonging to the parish of Oldbury in the county of Worcester within my diocese which are detached from that parish and are wholly or partly surrounded by

the parish of The Quinton in the same county and diocese, that there are certain districts or portions of land belonging to the last mentioned parish which are detached therefrom and are wholly or partly surrounded by the said parish of Oldbury and that some similar portions adjoin the new parish of Laugley in the same county and diocese.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of "The Pluralities Acts" the said districts or portions of land referred to and now forming parts of the said parish of Oldbury and the said parish of The Quinton may be advantageously separated from the parishes to which they now respectively belong and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes only to the hereinbefore mentioned parishes to which they are

contiguous.

"That pursuant to the directions of the twenty-sixth section of the Act one and two Victoria chapter one hundred and six I have drawn up in writing a scheme appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect of the matters specified in the said twenty-sixth section may be made with justice to all parties interested and I submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Patrons and Incumbents of the benefices of the said parishes to the intent that your Grace may if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the

said representation are as follows:-

"SCHEME.

- "It is proposed to effect the separation of the several detached and other portions or districts of the parishes from the parishes to which they now belong and to annex them to the several parishes to which they are to be henceforth annexed and belong by altering the contiguous boundaries of the several parishes of Oldbury, Langley and The Quinton.
- "(1.) The boundary between the parish of Oldbury and the new parish of Langley shall be:—Starting from the junction of Joining's Bank and Moat-lane westward along Joining's Bank, then north along Thompson-road, then west along Station-street to the Birmingham Canal, then along the canal in a north-westerly direction to the Dingle Brook Course and the boundary of Tividale parish and the boundary of Rowley Regis parish.
- "(2.) The boundary between the parish of Oldbury and the parish of The Quinton shall be:—Starting from the junction of Joining's Bank and Moat-lane, proceed north-east along Moat-lane and Vicarage-road to its junction with Dog Kennel-lane, then along Dog Keunel-lane in an easterly and south-easterly direction to its junction with Londonderry-lane, then east along Londonderry-lane to the boundary of Holy Trinity parish, Smethwick.
- "(3.) The boundary between the parish of Langley and the parish of The Quinton shall be:—Starting from the junction of Joining's Bank and Moat-lane proceed south along Moat-lane to the stile on the right hand opposite the entrance to Knotsall Lodge, then over this stile along the field footpath in a westerly direction across two fields to the footpath which is a continuation of Farm-road, then along this footpath in a southerly direction to Pound-road to

and along the boundary of the new parish of St. Paul, Blackheath.

"(4.) All detached portions of either parish now existing shall hereafter belong to the parish within which they are situated—that is, each parish as defined by the above stated boundaries shall be self contained.

"That the Incumbents of the several parishes to which such districts or portions of land shall be annexed shall have exclusive cure of souls

within the limits of such districts.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said districts in the churches of the parishes to which they shall be annexed and that the fees for all such offices and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice as shall arise or become payable within or in respect of the said districts except the tithes, tithe rent charges, compositions in lieu of tithes, endowments and other annual payments shall belong to the Incumbents of the said parishes.

"That no change shall be made in regard to patronage, glebe lands, tithes, or tithe rent charges, compositions in lieu of tithes, endowments or other annual payments of or belonging to the benefices of the parishes herein referred to.

"That the inhabitants of the said districts shall be entitled to accommodation in the churches of the parishes to which they shall be respectively annexed and in common with the parishioners of those parishes and shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the churches of the parishes from which they shall have been separated except nevertheless any person or persons, if any, possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the last mentioned churches and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Right Honourable Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, First Lord of the Treasury and as such the patron in right of the Crown and of the said Lord Bishop as the patron entitled alternately to present to the said benefice of Langley when vacant and also the consent of the said Lord Bishop as the patron or person entitled to present to the aforesaid benefices of Oldbury and The Quinton and the consents of the Reverend Albert Pryor Roberts, Vicar of Oldbury aforesaid, the Reverend James Jones, Rector of The Quinton aforesaid and the Reverend Walter Wale, Vicar of Langley aforesaid has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to are

hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Southwell, our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the said patron and the copies of the representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

Any person who after the date of this Order, and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his re-

11. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the county of Lancaster, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Man-

It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such

last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recog-nizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 201. to enable him to desuch of his fray the travelling expenses of witnesses as may have been bound recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it was enacted that, in case it appeared to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground should be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case might require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, should be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications men-tioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require; provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation was so considered; provided also that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the church-wardens of the parish of All Saints, Wainfleet, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the civil parish of Wainfleet, All Saints, without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the eighth day of January last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twentieth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the said civil parish of Wainfleet, All Saints, without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued as follows, viz.:—

WAINFLEET ALL SAINTS.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of All Saints,

Wainfleet, in the parts of Lindsey; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In the vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard and belonging or reputed to belong to the Barton family burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) Any who may be engaged by the week and who may be required to attend for more than $7\frac{1}{2}$ hours on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday, or more than $4\frac{1}{2}$ hours on Saturday, will be paid at the hourly rate for such overtime attendance. But in no case must overtime attendance exceed 12 hours in any one week. They may also be paid by the piece at such rates as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury.

- 9. No service, however much it may happen to be prolonged, will confer any claim to superannuation or compensation allowance; and Boy Clerks will not be retained, as such, after they shall have reached the age of 20.
- 10. If a public holiday, on which the office is closed, fall within the period of a Boy Clerk's engagement, he may be paid in respect of it as for a working day. Boy Clerks may, with the consent of the Department in which they are serving, or if not at the time serving, with the consent of the Civil Service Commissioners, be allowed holidays, with pay at the rate for the official day in the proportion of one day for every 24 full days of actual and approved service previously rendered by them as Boy Clerks. But no Boy Clerk shall be allowed to take more than 12 days' leave under these conditions, between the 1st day of January and the 31st day of December, both days inclusive, in any one year, and in calculating the leave to be allowed in any given year, no service rendered before the 1st day of January of the preceding year shall be counted.

Holiday pay can only be allowed for holidays actually taken, not for days on which the Boy Clerk is drawing pay in respect of employment in any capacity in the Public Service.

11. Boy Clerks who may fall ill while serving in any Department, and whose illness may be attested by medical certificate to the

satisfaction of the authorities of such Department, may be allowed sick-leave, receiving three-fourths of the rate of pay for the official day; provided that no Boy Clerk shall be paid for holidays and sick-leave, taken together, for more than 28 days within any one year, exclusive of public holidays.

- 12. Except in conformity with Regulations 10, 11, 15, and 16, Boy Clerks will only receive pay for the hours, or parts of hours, during which they actually attend.
- 13. No person who has been trained, either wholly or partially, at the public expense, for the occupation of a teacher in schools in connection with the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, is eligible for employment as a Boy Clerk until the consent of those Departments, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.
- 14. Boy Clerks are not intended to travel during an engagement, nor will they, as a rule, be required to accept engagements at a distance from their residence; but any Boy Clerk who may be ordered to travel will be allowed such reasonable and customary expenses as the Lords of the Treasury may in each case approve.
- 15. If any case of infectious disease should occur in the house where a Boy Clerk is living, he must immediately report the fact to the Officer under whom he is employed, and must, if required, at once discontinue his attendance. In cases of such enforced absence from his employment, it is in the discretion of the Head of the Department in which he has been serving to allow the Boy Clerk full pay at the usual rate for the period for which it is medically certified that his attendance at the office would be likely to be dangerous to his colleagues.
- 16. In any year in which an open Competition for situations as Assistant Clerk (Abstractor Class) in the Civil Service or for Clerkships of the Second Division is held, a Boy Clerk who obtains from the Head of the Department in which he is serving leave of absence to attend such Examination may also, at the discretion of the Head of the Department, be allowed pay, at the usual rate, for the days during which he is attending the Examination.
- 17. Service Marks for each full period of three calendar months of actual approved service, subject to a maximum of twelve such periods, will be allowed to Candidates attending Examinations for the following situations, viz.:—

Clerkships in the Second Division of the Civil Service,

Second Class Clerkships (Lower Section) for Port Service in the Department of His Majesty's Customs,

Assistantships of Excise, Assistantships of Customs,

who are serving or have served as Boy Clerks; but the number of marks to be allowed for each period may be different at successive examinations.

18. In the promotions of permanent Civil Servants [Assistant Clerks (Abstractor Class) and others] under Clause 15 of the Order in Council of 29th November, 1898, not less than one and not more than two years' approved service as Boy Clerk or Boy Copyist may be allowed to reckon towards the six years' established service required by the said clause.
