COLD ASH INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

Temporary Certificate for Homes at Kettering and Moseley as branches of the Cold Ash School.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice, that he has granted a Certificate, under the provisions of the Industrial Schools Act, 1866 (29 and 30 Vic., cap. 118). to the premises known as "Roundhill Lodge," in the Broadway, Kettering, and to other premises known as "Sycamore," in Park-road, Moseley, near Birmingham, being new Homes recently started by the Waifs and Strays Society, with a view to the reception into the said Homes of Girls from the Cold Ash Industrial School while certain structural alterations are being carried out at the said School.

The Home at Kettering is certified for 25 Girls, and the Home at Moseley for 26 Girls. The Certificate, which dates from the 19th April, 1906, will continue in force until the end of the present year.
