The following Despatches have been received by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs:

From the Earl of Cromer to the Marquess of Lansdowne.

August 27, 1905.

My Lord,

I have the honour to enclose a report which I have received from Sir Reginald Wingate on the recent operations in the Babr-el-Ghazal Province.

Although the actual fighting was not of an important character, the troops had to undergo considerable hardships by reason of the climate and of the nature of the country which had to be traversed. The conduct of the operations reflects credit on the officers and men concerned.

Your Lordship will observe that three more names are added to the somewhat long list of British officers who have lost their lives in this portion of the Soudan. Captain Armstrong was killed in 1903 by an elephant, and, more recently, Major Boulnois, Royal Artillery, and Lieutenant Fell, late Royal Navy—both officers of exceptional promise—died of disease.

My Lord,

I have the honour to forward my despatch on the result of the operations undertaken against the Nyam Nyam tribes in the early months of this year, with a request that after perusal you may be good enough to forward it with any remarks your Lordship may have to make through the Foreign Office, to the War Office.

Owing to the lamentable death of Major

Boulnois on the 29th May, the papers requisite to enable me to frame this despatch only reached me a few days ago.

Report on the Operations against the Nyam Nyam Tribes in the Southern Bahr-el-Ghazal, January, February, and March, 1905.

Events leading up to the Expedition.—The circumstances which led to the dispatch of an expeditionary force against the Nyam Nyam tribes (Azandé) were briefly as follows:—

In the autumn of 1903, a small escort conveying a number of presents for Sultan Yambio—the paramount Chief of the Nyam Nyam tribe—left Rumbek under the command of the late Captain Armstrong (Lancashire Fusiliers) for the purpose of entering into personal negotiations with that monarch and hoisting the British and Egyptian flags in this portion of the Anglo-Egyptian Soudan which hitherto had not been effectively reoccupied for administrative purposes by the Soudan Government. The confines of Yambio's territory are, roughly: on the north, the sixth parallel of latitude; on the south, the watershed between the Nile-Congo systems; on the west, the French Congo boundary; and on the east, the thirtieth parallel of longitude.

The correspondence which had previously taken place between Sultan Yambio and the Soudan Government had been of so friendly a nature that the party was organized more on the lines of an embassy than of a force to meet and overcome opposition.

Unfortunately, a few marches from Rumbek, Captain Armstrong was killed by an elephant, and the party had to proceed under the command of Colour-Sergeant Boardman (Liverpool Regiment). On entering Nyam Nyam territory the

attitude of the natives was noticed to be hostile, and as the party penetrated further its march was dogged by armed bands whose numbers daily increased, a general attack being only averted by the determined attitude of the little force. Seeing the futility of attempting to carry out his instructions in face of this ever-increasing opposition, Colour-Sergeant Boardman* skilfully withdrew his force by night and by covering 120 miles in four days managed to shake himself clear of the pursuing Nyam Nyams with but few casualties, except in transport animals and baggage, including the presents for Yambio.

In February, 1904, a patrol of 100 men and two guns under Captain Wood (Royal Irish Fusiliers) was sent to again attempt to open negotiations, but met with even less success, as it was ambushed and treacherously attacked by a party of Nyam Nyams under Rikhta, a son of Yambio, who had professed friendship to Government and volunteered to aid it with supplies and The losses on this occasion were transport. Captain Haymes (Royal Army Medical Corps), who died of his wounds, two men killed, and eight wounded. After the fight the patrol was unable to proceed further owing to no supplies or transport being available at Rikhta's—the natives in this district having all fled. The patrol retired slowly to Mvolo (latitude 6° 6', longitude 29° 58') in order to keep in touch with a Belgian scientific mission which, with a large armed escort, under Commandant Lemaire, had established itself there within Anglo-Egyptian territory. This force withdrew southwards, and as it was thought, evacuated Soudan territory.

It was evident after these two attempts, that peaceful negotiations were out of the question, so I obtained sanction for the dispatch of an expeditionary force of sufficient strength to overcome any opposition likely to be met with, and to permanently establish the authority of the Anglo-Soudan Government in this portion of the Bahr-e!-Ghazal.

Composition of Force and Plan of Operations.— The force, which was placed under the command of the late Major W. A. Boulnois (Royal Artillery), Commandant and Governor of the Bahr-el-Ghazal Province, was organized in two columns and composed as detailed in (A) and (A 1) attached.

The Eastern Column, under the command of Captain A. Sutherland (Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders), was ordered to advance from Rumbek via Mvolo into the eastern portion of the Nyam Nyam territory, engage the attention of Mangi, the most powerful son of Yambio, and. by enforcing his submission, prevent him coming to the assistance of his father; whilst the Western Column, under the immediate command of Major Boulnois, advanced via Tambura and N'Doruma directly against Yambio himself.

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Concentration.—The Eastern Column was concentrated at Mvolo by the 1st January, on which date it began its advance towards Mangi's. The Western Column completed its concentration at N'Doruma's, 255 miles south of Wau, in the third week in January, and began its advance to Yambio's on the 26th of that month.

The Operations.—The eastern column marched southward along the Rhol River, mostly through uninhabited country, till the 30th January, when it came across a post of Congo Free State troops located at Iré (latitude 4° 55′, longitude 29° 43′), which Captain Sutherland ascertained were a portion of the "Lemaire mission," previously referred to, and which were supposed—

erroneously as it turns out—to have evacuated Soudan territory. Subsequently it transpired that Commandant Lemaire had established five posts in all in Soudan territory, the withdrawal of which is now forming the subject of negotiations between King Leopold and His Britannic Majesty's Government. On the 12th February the column crossed the Meridi River and proceeded westward to Mangi's village, where it effected a junction with the Western Column on the 25th. There was practically no serious opposition on the part of the Nyam Nyams to the advance of this column, which was attributable undoubtedly to the presence of the Congo Free State forces in their midst and to a heavy defeat which these forces had inflicted on them when attacking one of their posts a short time before.

The Western Column on the 30th January reached Zugumbia, where the sick, and most of the transport and baggage, were left under a guard, and advanced on the 2nd February with eight days' rations. On the 3rd February the mounted infantry scouts located an ambush of the enemy, who retired after a short skirmish. On the 6th February a large force of the Nyam Nyams was found massed to oppose the column, but retired on its determined advance on the 7th. Yambio's village was occupied, Yambio fleeing. into the bush. On the 8th a column under the late Lieutenant Fell (late R.N.) advanced, located Yambio himself, and dispersed his force again after a slight skirmish. That evening three columns went out to effect the capture of the Sultan, which was successfully accomplished by Major Carter's column, Yambio receiving a mortal wound in the skirmish, of which he died that night. By Yambio's death the country was relieved from a barbarous and cruel despotism which had pressed heavily on the people for many years. It was, therefore, hailed with satisfaction, as was evidenced by the numbers who, in a short time, came in gladly to Government, and further resistance ended. the 22nd February two companies under Captain Gordon (Leicester Regiment) were detached from the column to join hands with the Eastern Column, and one company under Major Carter (Lancashire Fusiliers) sent to locate the four other Congo Free State posts, reported to be established in Soudan territory.

Remarks and Recommendations.—The expeditionary force, although not exposed to any heavy fighting, underwent considerable hardships and arduous marching on short rations under difficult climatic and other conditions.

The presence of the tsetse fly in a large portion of the country traversed caused heavy mortality amongst the transport animals, and necessitated only the absolute necessaries of life being carried with the columns.

The bearing and behaviour of the troops were excellent, and the cheerful spirit with which the difficulties inseparable from an advance through dense bush were met and overcome, is deserving of the highest praise.

Resistance to the advance of the columns would undoubtedly have been more serious had not the Nyam Nyams—as I pointed out before—been so severely haudled by the Congo Free State forces just previously, which naturally made them loth to try conclusions with a relatively stronger force armed with modern weapons so soon again. But all this was not known till afterwards, and the force expected—and had to be prepared for—serious opposition from this powerful and warlike tribe.

The objects of the expedition, though gained with but little bloodshed, have been completely

realised. A very large extent of country has been effectively reoccupied by the Soudan Government in the name of Great Britain and Egypt, the paramount Chief and instigator of hostility to Government has been captured and is now dead, his sons and the various Chiefs of the sub-tribes have made their submission, permanent posts have been established, and a civilized administration initiated, the influences of which, it is hoped, will shortly be apparent in the increased prosperity and contentment of this large and important collection of Soudanese tribes.

In this connection I desire especially to bring to notice the very valuable services rendered by the late Major Boulnois, who was responsible for the organization and leading of the force, and to whom the success which has been attained was principally due. As a leader and administrator he showed himself to be possessed of very high qualities, and in his dealings with the Congo Free State officials, with whom he came in contact, he displayed much tact and discretion. It is with the deepest regret that I have to record the loss of this valuable officer, who died near Mvolo in May last from the effects of a severe attack of dysentery, whilst on his way back to Wau. I attribute his loss to a long period of service in the Bahr-el-Ghazal, culminating in the severe strain which was thrown upon him by the arduous nature of the recent operations.

I have also to record with deep regret the death of the Intelligence Officer of the Force, Lieutenant J. L. Fell (late Royal Navy), who succumbed at Tambura's from blackwater fever, due also to prolonged service in the Bahr-el-Ghazal, and to the fatigue and hardship of the late expedition. This officer was mainly responsible for cutting a navigable waterway through the great marches of the Jur River, he had much influence with the natives, by whom he was held in high esteem, and his loss is greatly to be deplored. Major Boulnois, who died before Lieutenaut Fell, expressed a wish on his deathbed that the very valuable services to the expedition of this officer should be brought to notice, and I most cordially endorse that recommendation.

Captain Sutherland, who commanded the Eastern Column, displayed much common sense and zeal in the execution of his duties.

Major Carter, commanding the 9th Soudanese Battalion, was successful in effecting the capture of Yambio.

Owing to Major Boulnois' death I called on Major Carter and Captain Sutherland for the names of officers whom they consider he would have recommended, and amongst many others whom they have brought prominently to notice, I have selected the names of the following for special mention:

Major H. A. Bray (Royal Army Medical Corps), Principal Medical Officer of the Force. Captain H. Gordon (Leicester Regiment), com-

manding 10th Soudanese Battalion.

Captain A. J. B. Percival, D.S.O. (Northumberland Fusiliers), commanding Mounted Infantry who, in addition to his services in the expedition, marched with his company from El-Obeid to Tambura's, a distance of over 700 miles (without losing a man or animal) through almost unknown country, thus performing a very valuable reconnaissance which has contributed largely to the meagre information hitherto existing of the regions he traversed.

Captain A. B. Bethell (Royal Artillery). This officer, prior to the advance from Wau, proceeded

alone on a Mission to Tambura's, and in spite of the rumoured hostility of this and other Azandé chiefs, he succeeded in making arrangements with them which greatly facilitated the subsequent progress of the expedition.

Captain R. I. Rawson (Northumberland Fusiliers), acted as staff officer to the late Major Boulnois, and his valuable services have been

strongly brought to my notice.
Captain S. K. Flint (Royal Fusiliers) was in charge of the transport—a duty which involved very hard and continuous work; in spite of heavy losses in animals this officer succeeded in keeping the troops as well supplied as was possible under the circumstances.

Amongst the large number of Egyptian and Soudanese officers and non-commissioned officers who have been brought to notice, I have selected the following as specially deserving of mention:-

Bimbashi (Major) Almaz Effendi Mursi, 10th Soudanese Battalion; Sagh Kolaghasi (Adjutant-Major) Musa Effendi Fuad, who acted as staff officer to the Commander of the Eastern Column; Yusbashi (Captain) Ismail Effendi Mustafa, 9th Soudanese Battalion; Yusbashi (Captain) Atta Effendi El Sudani, 15th Soudanèse Battalion; Yusbashi Abdel Samit Effendi (Captain) Elgindi, Medical Corps; Yusbashi (Captain) Mohammed Effendi Safan, Transport.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, namely, the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three, duly pre-pared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eighth day of June, in the year one thousand niue hundred and five, in the words and figures following, that is to

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Benefices England, in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, namely, the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices within the Metropolis and within the City and Diocese of London, namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Michael, Cornhill, and the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Peter le Poor with the vicarage of Saint Benet Fink annexed and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Michael, Cornhill, is vested in the Master and Wardens and Brethren and Sisters of the Guild or Fraternity of the Blessed Mary the Virgin of the Mystery of Drapers of the said City of London.

"And whereas the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink is vested in the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said Diocese of London, has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us, which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the firstly hereinbefore-mentioned Act and were approved by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, and were assented to by the patrons of the said benefice of Saint Michael, Cornhill, and by the patrons of the said benefice of Saiut Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink, and the same proposals were also assented to by the vestry of the parish of Saint Michael, Cornhill, and by the united vestry of the parishes of Saint Peter le Poor and Saint Benet Fink.

"And whereas the said proposals comprised amongst other things the severance of a portion of the said parish of Saint Peter le Poor from the said benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink and its union with the contiguous benefice of All Hallows, London Wall, situate in the said City of London and in the said Diocese of London.

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter referred to should be made as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said benefice of Saint Michael, Cornhill, is now vacant, and each of the benefices of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink and of All Hallows, London Wall, is now full, the Reverend John Henry Coward, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent of the said benefice of St. Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink, and the Reverend Montague Fowler, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent of the said benefice of All Hallows, London Wall.

"And whereas the said Arthur Foley, now Bishop of London, as such Bishop, and the patrons of the said three benefices and the vestries of the said parishes respectively are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly but otherwise

is based upon the said proposals.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his Episcopal Seal), and with the consent of the said Master and Wardens and Brethren and Sisters of the Guild or Fraternity of the Blessed Mary the Virgin of the Mystery of Drapers of the City of London (in testimony whereof they have set their Common Seal to this scheme), and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London (in testimony whercof thay have to this scheme set their Common or Capitular Seal), and with the consent of the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley, Earl of Halsbury, now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of Your Majesty as the patron of the said benefice of All Hallows, London Wall (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consents of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Michael, Cornhill, of the united vestry of the said parishes of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink and of the vestry of the parish of All Hallows, London Wall (in testimony of which consent this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned as follows:—

" PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself and certain immediate incidents thereof we recommend and

propose:-

"1. That the said benefice of Saint Michael, Cornhill, and the said benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink be united into one benefice under the style of 'The United Benefice of Saint Michael Cornhill with Saint Peter le Poor and Saint Benet Fink' which said united benefice is hereinafter called the united benefice.

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said present benefices shall be vacant, the union shall forthwith take effect and if the said benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink only shall then be vacant, the said union shall also forthwith take effect and the Incumbent of the other of the said present benefices shall become the first Incumbent of the united benefice, and if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said present benefices shall be full then the said union shall take effect on the next avoidance of the said benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink and the then Incumbent of the other of the said two benefices shall be the first Incumbent of the united benefice and in any case it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said diocese of London to admit to the united benefice such first Incumbent (if an Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Michael Cornhill) without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become the Incumbent of the united Until the time of the union taking benefice. effect the said two benefices shall remain separate and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof and of the Incumbents of each of them shall remain unaffected.

"3. That if after this Scheme shall have been ratified by an Order of Your Majesty in Council and before the said union shall have taken effect the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink shall with the consent of the Bishop of Loudon retire from his Incumbency in order that the said union may take immediate effect then the Incumbent so retiring from his Incumbency shall be entitled during the period hereinafter specified to receive out of the annual income of the united benefice and by way of compensation an annual sum of eight hundred pounds, which annual sum shall commence as from the day on which the said union shall take effect and shall be payable by equal half-yearly payments in every year, the first half-yearly payment thereof to become due at the end of six calendar months next after the day on which the said union shall take effect and the said annual sum shall be payable to the retiring Incumbent during the remainder of his life if he continue to be a member of the Church of England but not otherwise or until he shall

accept other Church preferment of a net annual value equal to or greater in amount than the said annual sum to be so made payable to such retiring Incumbent. And upon his accepting such preferment the said annual sum shall thenceforth absolutely cease to be payable, but if he shall accept other church preferment of a less net annual value (to be ascertained without reference to and exclusively of the house of residence, if any) than eight hundred pounds, then whilst he shall hold such other preferment the said annual sum of eight hundred pounds shall in each year be reduced by a sum equal in amount to the net annual sum (to be ascertained as aforesaid) payable to him for the said year in respect of such other preferment. always that if such retiring Incumbent shall hereafter be convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law the punishment for which would be deprivation or suspension his right to receive such annual sum payable by way of compensation as aforesaid shall cease or shall be suspended as from the date of such conviction. And provided also that if the same annual sum or any part thereof payable by way of com-pensation as aforesaid shall cease to be payable to such retiring Incumbent by his ceasing to be a member of the Church of England as aforesaid or by his being convicted of any offence against the Ecclesiastical Law as aforesaid or by his acceptance of such church preferment as aforesaid, or by his death (as the case may be) on any other than one of the half-yearly days of payment then he or his executors or administrators shall be entitled to a proportionate part of the said annual sum for the period which at the time of such cesser shall have elapsed of the current half-year which proportionate part shall be payable at the end of the current half-year.

"4. That the said annual sum shall be

charged upon the annual income of the united benefice and shall be payable out of the same by the Incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and as between the Incumbent for the time being of the united benefice and the retiring Incumbent and his assigns, the said annual sum shall be a first charge at law and in equity upon the income of the united benefice, the Incumbent of which united benefice shall be deemed to have accepted the same subject to a trust to pay to the said retiring Incumbent on his assigns the to the said retiring Incumbent or his assigns the said annual sum out of the income of the said united benefice and for that purpose to use all due diligence to receive and collect the income of the said united benefice, and that if such annual sum or any part thereof shall at any time be in arrear and unpaid for more than twenty-eight days after any of the said half-yearly days of payment and the fact of the same being so in arrear shall be verified by the declaration of the Incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns or in such other or further manner as shall be required by the Bishop of London it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to make an order upon the Incumbent for the time being of the united benefice requiring him to pay the amount in arrear within a time to be specified in such order, and if the same be not paid within such period then it shall be lawful for the said Bishop to sequester the profits of the said united benefice until all such arrears and the costs of the sequestration shall have been paid and satisfied but the power to be so conferred upon the said Bishop shall not in anywise abridge or interfere with the rights of the Incumbent who shall have so retired or his assigns to recover the said annual sum and all arrears thereof by proceedings at law or in equity, or with the

legal or equitable rights of the Incumbent for the time being of the united benefice to recover from the preceding Incumbent of the united benefice his executors or administrators any arrears of the said annual sum which ought to have been paid by such preceding Incumbent.

"PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice, the church of All Hallows, London Wall, and the church of Saint Peter le Poor and certain officers of the same and certain matters connected therewith, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect, the church of Saint Michael, Cornhill, shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish church

of the united benefice.

- "2. That upon the union taking effect, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, shall out of the moneys received by us under the fourteenth section of the City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883, make a grant of fifty-six pounds per annum for the repair of the fabric of the parish church of the said united benefice such grant to be in addition to the sum of one hundred pounds per annum allotted for the repair of the fabric of the church of Saint Michael, Cornbill, under the Central Scheme of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales for the regulation of the City Church Fund created under the said City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883.
- "3. That upon the union taking effect any accumulations in respect of the annual sum of fifty-six pounds allotted for the repair of the fabric of the church of Saint Peter le Poor under the above mentioned Central Scheme shall become available for the repair of the fabric of the church of the united benefice.
- "4. That upon the union taking effect the rent receivable in respect of the portion of the churchyard of Saint Benet Fink which is leased to the City of London Electric Lighting Company Limited shall become available for the maintenance of Divine Service in the church of the united benefice.
- "5. That we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, shall out of the moneys received by us as aforesaid under the fourteenth section of the said City of London Parochial Charities Act, 1883, make a grant of one hundred and seventy-five pounds per annum for the maintenance of Divine Service in the Church of All Hallows, London Wall, and a grant of twenty pounds fifteen shillings per annum for the repair of the fabric of the church of All Hallows, London Wall.
- "6. That upon the union taking effect the font, Communion table, sacramental plate and other furniture used in the church of Saint Peter le Poor shall be appropriated by the Bishop of London for use in the churches of the new benefices hereinafter mentioned if such new benefices shall be within the Diocese of London and any articles which shall not be so appropriated may be transferred to any other church or chapel or churches or chapels within the diocese of London which the Bishop may select.
- "7. That upon the union taking effect if the tables of fees used in the churches of Saint Michael, Cornhill, and Saint Peter le Poor be alike in all particulars the table of fees used in the church which will become the parish church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parishes, but if such table of fees be not alike in all particulars the same shall be of no authority and a new table of fees shall be made

by the proper authority for the use of the united parishes as if the same were one parish.

"8. That upon the final closing of the church of Saint Peter le Poor the register books of baptisms, marriages and burials and the safe if necessary of the parishes of Saint Peter le Poor and Saint Benet Fink shall be transferred to the

parish church of the united benefice.

"9. That upon the union taking effect any one or more of the church servants of the church of Saint Michael, Cornhill, and of the church of Saint Peter le Poor whose services shall in consequence of the union be no longer required shall receive by way of compensation for the loss of his, her or their offices such gratuity or gratuities as the vestries who now vote their salaries annually shall with the consent of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners assign to them such gratuity or gratuities to be paid by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"PART III.

"As to the endowments and parsonage house of the united benefice we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties, revenues and income constituting the endowments of the benefice of Saint Michael, Cornhill, and of the benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink shall be transferred and annexed to the united benefice, the Incumbent of the united benefice shall be entitled to retain an annual sum of seven hundred and fifty pounds out of the endowments of the united benefice together with the rent of the house formerly used as the parsonage house of the benefice of Saint Michael, Cornhill, unless the Bishop and the patrons shall think fit to require him to go into residence there and the residue of the endowments of the united benefice, after the payment of the pension which is contemplated by Clause 3 of Part I of this scheme and subject to the various annual payments whether now subsisting or prospective with which the endowments of the said benefice of Saint Peter le Poor with Saint Benet Fink have been charged in favour of other benefices, shall be applied to the endowment of two or more of the new districts which are hereinafter proposed to be constituted or created in the following manner, that is to say, if two new churches and parsonage houses only are built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended and proposed then one half part of the said residue of the endowments of the united benefice shall be applied to the endowment of each of the two new districts which are hereinafter proposed to be constituted or created, but if three new churches are built out of the proceeds of the said sale or sales then one third part only of the said residue of the endowments of the united benefice shall be applied to the endowment of the said two new districts and the remaining third part of the said residue shall be applied to the endowment of the new district in which the third church to be built out of the proceeds of the said sale or sales shall be situate, provided always that any income arising in respect of the said residue of the endowments of the united benefice or in respect of any portion of such residue between the date when the union takes effect and the respective dates of the licence or institution of the first ministers or incumbents of the said proposed new districts shall be added to the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

"PART IV.

"Upon the subjects of patronage and of certain new districts we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and pro-

"1. That the patronage of the united benefice shall be vested in the Master and Wardens and Brethren and Sisters of the Guild or Fraternity of the Blessed Mary the Virgin of the Mystery of Drapers of the City of London

and their successors for ever.

- "2. That two or (as the case may be) three ecclesiastical districts within the limits of the metropolis or within the vicinity of the metropolis as defined by the said Union of Benefices Act, 1898 (such districts having then been or being then about to be formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and authorising the formation or constitution of such districts) shall be selected by the Bishop of London after consultation with the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London as the districts for which churches shall be built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinafter recommended.
- " 3. That the patronage of both of such new districts if there be not more than two of them or of two such new districts (if there be three of them) shall be vested in the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London and their successors for ever and that the patronage of the third new district (if such there be) shall be offered to the Master and Wardens and Brethren and Sisters of the Guild or Fraternity of the Blessed Mary the Virgin of the Mystery of Drapers of the City of London and if accepted by them shall be vested in them and their successors for ever, but if not accepted by them it shall be vested in the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London and their successors for ever.

"4. That one of the churches of the said new districts shall be consecrated by the name and style of Saint Peter le Poor and that another (or the other as the case may be) of the churches of the said new districts shall be consecrated by the name and style of Saint Benet Fink.

"5. That the rules which are contained or referred to in the Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, dated the eighth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, confirming certain alterations in the statutes of the cathedral church of St. Paul in London and which relate to the presentation or nomination of Minor Canons to benefices in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church shall not apply to the patronage of the said new districts.

"PART V.

"As to the existing Church of Saint Peter le Poor and the site and appurtenances thereof and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials, site, furniture or fittings of the same church we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Peter le Poor be taken down.

"2. That subject to the provisions contained in Part II of this scheme the furniture or fittings (other than the font, communion table and sacramental plate) and the materials and site of the said church together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof shall be sold and disposed of by

us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient subject to the provisions of the seventeenth section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

"3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us as aforesaid shall form one aggregate fund and shall be

applied as follows, that is to say:--

"(1.) For the addition of a sum of five thousand pounds to the fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

"(2.) For the payment of the gratuity or gratuities which are contemplated by Clause 7 of

Part II of this scheme.

"(3.) For or towards the acquisition of suitable sites for and the erection of two new churches within the limits of two of the new districts constituted or to be constituted as aforesaid and to be erected as the churches of such new districts and for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a parsonage house (or the purchase enlargement or alteration of any existing house suitable with or without alteration for a parsonage house) situate within the limits of each of the said two new districts.

"The remainder (if any) of the said proceeds to be added to the said fund created under the twenty-second section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, unless in the opinion of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and of the Bishop of London it should seem expedient that the same or any part thereof should be applied for or towards the provision of a church or a church and parsonage house for a third new district in which case such third new district shall be formed or legally constituted in the manner contemplated by Clause 2 of Part IV of this scheme and shall be endowed as provided by Clause 1 of Part III of this scheme and its patronage shall be vested as provided by Clause 2 of Part IV of this scheme.

"PART VI.

"As to a portion of the parish of Saint Peter le Poor and as to the benefice of All Hallows, London Wall we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect a portion of the said parish of Saint Peter le Poor shall be severed from the united benefice and shall be united to the contiguous benefice of All Hallows, London Wall, the patronage whereof is vested in Your Majesty Your Heirs and Successors and is exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being.

"That the said portion of the parish of Saint Peter le Poor to be united to the benefice of All Hallows, London Wall, shall comprise:—

"All that portion of the said parish of Saint Peter le Poor which is bounded upon the southeast partly by the parish of Saint Helen and partly by the parish of Saint Ethelburga both in the said City of London upon the north by the said parish of All Hallows, London Wall, upon the west partly by the parish of Saint Stephen, Coleman-street, and partly by the parish of Saint Bartholomew by the Exchange both in the said City of London and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Throgmorton-street where the boundaries of the said parish of Saint Bartholomew by the Exchange the said parish of Saint Benet Fink and the said parish of Saint Peter le Poor all meet and extending thence eastward along the middle

of Throgmorton-street (thereby following the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Benet Fink from the said parish of Saint Peter le Poor) for a distance of ten yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern end of the western side of the gateway which leads under the house called Number 28 Throgmortonstreet and connects Throgmorton-street with Throgmorton - avenue and extending thence northward to and along the western side of the said gateway for a distance of twenty yards or thereabouts to its northern end where it joins Throgmorton-avenue and extending thence northeastward and in a direct line (thereby crossing Throgmorton-avenue diagonally) for a distance of forty-six yards or thereabouts to the western end of the wall forming the northern boundary of the premises attached to the Drapers' Hall and extending thence first eastward then southward then westward then southward then eastward then southward and then eastward along the walls forming the northern and north-eastern boundaries of the premises attached to the Drapers' Hall for a distance of seventy yards or thereabouts to the eastern end upon the western side of the street called Austin Friars and extending thence eastward and in a direct line for a distance of four yards or thereabouts to the middle of the last named street and extending thence first southward then south-eastward and then southward along the middle of the said street called Austin Friars for a distance of forty-three yards or thereabouts to the middle of the northern end of the gateway which leads under the house called Number 70 Old Broad-street and connects the said street called Austin Friars with Old Broadstreet and extending thence eastward along the said northern end of the said gateway for a distance of two yards or thereabouts to the eastern side of the said gateway and extending thence southward along the said eastern side of the said gateway for a distance of six yards or thereabouts to its southern end on the northern side of Old Broad-street and extending thence southward and in a direct line for a distance of nine yards or thereabouts to the middle of Old Broad-street and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Old Broad-street for a distance of eighty-one yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the north-western end of the wall forming the north-eastern boundary of the premises of the Marine Insurance Company Limited at Numbers 20 and 21 Old Broad-street and extending thence south-eastward to and along the last-mentioned wall for a distance of thirty-six yards or thereabouts to its southeastern end upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Peter le Poor from the said parish of Saint Helen.

"Provided always that this scheme shall not take effect until the consents and approval which by the seventeenth section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, are made requisite to the sale or letting or appropriation under the powers conferred by that Act of the site of any church shall be obtained to the sale and appropriation hereby proposed of the church of Saint Peter le Poor and of the site thereof together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use and enjoyment thereof and to the mode of dealing with such site which is hereby proposed.

"And provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been laid | Charterhouse.

before both Houses of Parliament for the space of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the second day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

words and figures following, that is to say:—
"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two and the Act of the sixtyfirst and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices situate within the metropolis, and within the diocese of London, namely: the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Mary. Charterhouse, and the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the firstly mentioned Act and were approved by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and were assented to by the patrons of the two benefices to be affected thereby, that is to say, by the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London, as the patrons of the said benefice and vicarage of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, and by the said Arthur Feley, Bishop of London, as the patron of the said benefice and vicarage of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, and the same proposals were also assented to, subject to certain modifications by the vestries of the parishes concerned, that is to say, by the vestry of the parish of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, and by the vestry of the parish of Saint Thomas,

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said two benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter contained should be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said benefice of Saint Mary, Charterhouse is now full, the Reverend Arthur Tildesley, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present Incumbent thereof, and the said benefice of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, is vacant.

"And whereas the said Arthur Tildesley has consented to become the first Incumbent of the united benefice, if and when the union which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take effect.

"And whereas the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, as such Bishop and as such patron and the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London, as the patrons of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, and the vestries of the said parishes respectively are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but other-

wise is based upon the said proposals.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London (in testimony whereof they have affixed their capitular seal to this scheme) and with the consent of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, and of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse (in testimony of which consents this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the chairman of a meeting of the said vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned, as follows:-

"PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself, and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and

propose:-

"1. That the said benefice of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, and the said benefice of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, be united into one benefice under the style of 'The Benefice of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, with Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, which said united benefice is

hereinafter called the united benefice.

"2. That upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect, and the said Arthur Tildesley, if he is then the Incombent of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, shall be the first Incumbent of the united benefice and it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said diocese of London to admit the said Arthur Tildesley to the united benefice without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become the Incumbent of the united benefice.

"PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice and the church of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, and certain officers of the same towards providing a parsonage house for the

and certain matters connected therewith we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:-

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, shall become and thereafter continue to be the parish

church of the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the font, communion table, sacramental plate, bells, and the glass ornaments, furniture and fittings of the church of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, or such of them as the vestry of the church of the united benefice shall select, shall be transferred to the church of the united benefice; but such of these articles as shall not be claimed by the said vestry for the church of the united benefice shall be transferred to the church of the proposed new benefice hereinafter mentioned, or to such other church or chapel within the diocese of London as the Bishop may select: Provided always that any articles that shall not be appropriated in any of the above ways, except the font, communion table and sacramental plate may be sold and the proceeds shall be added to the aggregate fund which is contemplated by Clause 3 of Part V of this scheme.
"3. That upon the union taking effect the

table of fees used in the church which will become the church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parishes.

"4. That upon the final closing of the church of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, the register books of baptisms marriages and burials of the parish of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, and any monuments in Saint Thomas's church which may not be claimed by those who, under the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860, have a right to claim them, shall be transferred to the church of the united benefice.

"PART III.

"As to the endowments of the united benefice we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further

recommend and propose:-

- "1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties, revenues and income constituting the endowments (present and future) of the vicarage of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, and of the vicarage of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, shall be transferred and annexed to the united benefice, and the Incumbent of the united benefice shall be entitled to retain a sum of six hundred pounds per annum out of such endowments, exclusive of the grant of one hundred and twenty pounds per annum now made by us towards the stipend of an assistant curate in the parish of St. Mary, Charterhouse, and the residue of such endowments shall be applied for or towards the endowment of the proposed new benefice hereinafter mentioned, provided always, that any surplus income accruing from such endowments between the date when the union shall take effect and the date of the licence or institution of the first minister or Incumbent of such new benefice shall be added to the fund created under the twentysecond section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.
- "2. That upon the union taking effect the present parsonage house of the vicarage of Saint Mary, Charterhouse, shall be the parsonage house of the united benefice, and the present parsonage house of the vicarage of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, shall be put into repair and purchased by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as a parsonage house for the benefice of Saint Paul, Clerkenwell, in the said diocese of London, out of the moneys held by us for or

said benefice of Saint Paul, Clerkenwell, and the consideration money paid for such purchase shall be added to the fund created by the twentysecond section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.

"PART IV.

"Upon the subject of patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend

"That the patronage of the united benefice shall be vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London and their successors for ever, and that the patronage of the new church and benefice, which are referred to in Part VI of this scheme, shall be vested in the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, and his successors for ever.

"PART V.

"As to the church of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, and the site and appurtenances thereof and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales of the materials, site, furniture or fittings of the same church, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:

"1. That as soon as conveniently may be after the union has taken effect the church of Saint Thomas, Charterhouse, be taken down.

- "2. That subject to the provisions contained in Clause 2 of Part II of this scheme the furniture or fittings, and the materials and site of the said church, together with any ground annexed thereto and necessary for the use or enjoyment thereof (including that portion of the original site for the said church which was appropriated for the purposes of the School Sites Acts by our predecessors, Her said late Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches, and which has now by virtue of the same Acts reverted to the same ownership as the remainder of the original site for the said church) shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, such sale or disposal being made in all respects subject to the provisions contained in the seventeenth section of the said Union of Benefices Act, 1860.
- "3. That the net proceeds to arise from the sale or sales to be made by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as aforesaid, of the site and materials and furniture or fittings of the said church, shall form one aggregate fund and shall be applied as follows, and in the following order, that is to say:
- "(a) That we shall first appropriate out of the said proceeds a sum not exceeding one hundred pounds towards defraying the cost of repairs to the fabric of the church of the united benefice.
- (b) That we shall, out of such moneys, next set apart such sum as shall appear to us and to the Bishop of London to be adequate for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a new church for (and within the limits of) the new district constituted or to be constituted as contemplated by Part VI of this scheme.
- "(c) That so much of the remainder of such net proceeds as may be required shall be appropriated by us, if the funds will permit, for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of a parsonage house or the purchase (and, if required, enlargement or alteration) of any existing house suitable for a parsonage house for and within the limits of the said new district constituted or to be constituted as afore-

"(d) That if after providing the said proposed parsonage house for such new district there be any balance of funds remaining unappropriated, such balance shall be invested by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as an addition to the endowment of the same new district, and the interest or dividends accruing in respect of such investment shall be paid to the Incumbent for the time being of the new district.

"PART VI.

"As to a certain new district and benefice, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further

recommend and propose:-

"1. That an ecclesiastical district within the limits of the metropolis or its vicinity (such district then having been or then being about to be formed or legally constituted under some or one of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England authorizing the formation or constitution of such district) shall be selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church and (if funds will permit) a parsonage house shall be provided out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"2. That when a church for such district has been built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales hereinbefore recommended, it shall be consecrated

by the name and style of Saint Thomas.

"Whereas the said episcopal house of residence was destroyed by fire on the twentyeighth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, and in respect of the loss or damage so incurred a sum of eight thousand nine hundred and thirty-three pounds and sixteen shillings has been paid to us under the insurance whereby the said episcopal house of residence had been insured against loss or damage

by fire.
"And whereas the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Saint David's, is rebuilding the said episcopal house of residence with certain sanitary and other improvements, and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed rebuilding and improvements, and we have approved the

"And whereas under the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and four and published in the London Gazette on the following day, the said Bishop has raised a sum of two thousand pounds towards the cost of effecting such rebuilding and improvement by borrowing such sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the said Bishoprick of Saint David's.

"And whereas the moneys which are available from the moneys paid to us under the said insurance and from the interest which has accrued in respect of such moneys together with the said sum of two thousand pounds borrowed as aforesaid will be insufficient for the purpose of defraying the cost of the said rebuilding and

improvements.

"And whereas the said Bishop is desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said rebuilding and improvements a further sum of one thousand pounds (being a sum which together with the said sum of two thousand pounds borrowed as aforesaid does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of such sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the said Bishoprick of Saint David's.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John, Bishop of Saint David's (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and verpose that the said Bishop be authorized to in case of loss or damage by fire to the same

borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any further sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of thirty-five years or until the said sum to be borrowed as aforesaid with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the following manner, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one thirtieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months computed as aforesaid pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said John, now Bishop of Saint David's, as every succeeding Bishop of Saint David's, until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound, or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed rebuilding of the episcopal house of residence aforesaid and the said sanitary and other improvements thereto.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop of Saint David's for the time being shall insure against loss or damage by fire and keep insured the said episcopal house of residence situate at Abergwili as aforesaid, the said insurance to be for a sum of not less than ten thousand pounds and to be effected in one or more of the public offices of insurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us, and that episcopal house of residence the moneys receivable in respect of the said insurance shall be paid over to us by the said Bishop and shall with any interest or accumulations thereon be applied by us in rebuilding or repairing the same episcopal house of residence with the concurrence of the said Bishop.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein-before named Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by his Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint David's.

Act, and which re-enacts similar provisions by
the said Act repealed of the Merchant Shipping

the General Lighthouse Authorities on account
of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and

the Board of Trade.

And whereas by section one of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898, it is (among other things) provided that references in Part XI of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, to the Mercantile Marine Fund shall be construed as references to the General Lighthouse Fund by the now reciting Act constituted.

And whereas His Majesty, by an Order in Council dated the twentieth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and three, was pleased to fix the engineering establishment which might be maintained by the Corporation of Trinity House, Deptford Strond, and the amount of the salaries to be paid to the officers of the said establishment out of the Mercantile Marine Fund.

And whereas it is expedient that the engineering establishment of the said Corporation should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing.

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Board of Trade have consented to such variation of the establishment.

2. The driver of a car, on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road so as not to leave sufficient space for the car to pass, shall sound his bell or gong as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall, with reasonable dispatch, cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the

car.

3. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramways, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

4. Every driver, conductor, or other person offending against any of these Bye-laws shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence.

5. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the

31st day of July, 1906.
