On the occasion of Their Majesties' visit, on Wednesday, the 13th June, to the Sanatorium known as "King Edward VII. Sanatorium," which has been erected near Midhurst for the treatment of tuberculosis, the visit being undertaken with a view to the performance by His Majesty of the opening ceremony, the following Address was presented to His Majesty:—

May it please Your Majesty,

The advisory committee honoured by Your Majesty's command to supervise the construction of a sanatorium for the open-air treatment of early and curable cases of pulmonary consumption occurring in certain classes of the community, beg humbly to place before Your Majesty a brief report of their proceedings, which have resulted in the erection of the group of buildings to be opened by Your Majesty and the Queen to-day.

With a view of eliciting new ideas and encouraging originality of design, prizes of £500, £300, and £100 were, at the suggestion of Your Majesty, offered for essays on the subject, and, in order that advantage might be taken of all available experience in the structural arrangements of similar institutions, the architect appointed, Mr. H. Percy Adams, was directed to visit the newest and most important of the existing sanatoria. Members of the committee also visited the chief European institutions of the kind, and it is believed that all the improvements suggested by experience are embodied in the Sanatorium to be known by Your Majesty's name.

The class for which special provision is to be made includes those belonging to the various professions who may fall victims to phthisis and are unable to afford the expense incident to treatment in private sanatoria, clergymen and other ministers of religion, medical men, members of the teaching profession, together with clerks

and others employed in business offices, or members of their families.

By Your Majesty's express desire the wealthy classes are not to be altogether excluded from the advantages of a sanatorium which, if it realizes Your Majesty's beneficent intention, is to be the best of its kind, and twelve rooms are set apart for their reception.

It is unnecessary to enter into a detailed description of the building, as every point can be explained in the course of the inspection which is to be made by Your Majesties. The main block is devoted entirely to the patients, each of whom has a separate room with a balcony on to which the bed can be wheeled if necessary, the upper storey being set back in order that the balcony for this floor should not interfere with the light and air of the rooms below. The twelve rooms for the well-to-do are in the centre, the eighty-eight for the others in the wings.

Recreation rooms are provided on the ground floor, while in the basement is a hydro-therapeutic department.

The administration block, containing the diningrooms, nurses' rooms and kitchen, with its accessories, is separated from the main building by an ornamental garden. The communication between the two is by a corridor permitting of the direct access of nurses and domestic servants to the grand corridor leading to the patients' rooms.

Annexed to the administration block are the rooms of the resident medical staff, the consultation rooms, and the operating theatre, and in a convenient situation, isolated from the other parts of the Sanatorium, is the pathological laboratory. A clinical and research laboratory is also provided, as it is intended that scientific work, both preventive and curative, shall be one of the prominent objects of the Sanatorium.

The laundry is fitted with all the latest appliances, and special precautions are taken for sterilization of the linen. Adjoining it is

the engine-house, from which is supplied the motor power for the dynamos that generate the electric light and the steam for heating the building.

Your Majesty will see with particular interest the chapel erected at the expense of Sir John Brickwood. It is entirely original in plan, consisting of two naves at right angles to each other, meeting in a chancel common to both. The sides enclosing the angle which looks to the south are formed by open arches protected only by a closter. By this admirable arrangement Divine service will practically be conducted in the open air, warmth being provided by heating the floor.

The site which the advisory committee were so fortunate as to secure is singularly beautiful and admirably fitted for all the requirements of a sanatorium. Its aspect on the southern slope of a hill, the height above the sea, the protection from the north and east afforded by the pine woods, the sandy soil, the dry air, the proportion of sunshine, the freedom from dust, the facilities for graduated walks on the rising ground, constitute a combination of advantages rarely to be met with.

The committee are confident that the natural advantages of the site, with skilled medical treatment in a perfectly appointed building, will result in the restoration to health of many of those suffering from early consumption, and in the hope and belief that in years to come blessings will be invoked on Your Majesty's name for the generous thought which prompted the erection of this institution, your committee now humbly pray that Your Majesty will be pleased to declare the Sanatorium open.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

It gives The Queen and Myself great pleasure to be here to-day to open this magnificently situated building. I thank the most generous donor through whose munificence I have been enabled to found this Sanatorium which bears My name, and I am well assured that it will be a great pleasure to him to know that the noble gift which he placed at My disposal has been so usefully bestowed, and that it will be the means of affording relief to those suffering from the devastating scourge of tuberculosis. I congratulate the members of the advisory committee upon the wholehearted manner in which they have carried out the trust I reposed in them; and I thank them for the inestimable value of their advice and experience, and for the expenditure of time and labour, which, despite the many calls upon them, they have given to the work.

It is My desire that this institution shall afford accommodation for that large class of persons of slender means, in professional and other employments, for which no provision for sickness of this kind at present exists. It is also My wish that those persons of larger means who can afford to pay for treatment here should not be entirely excluded from the advantages to be derived from this institution, and I have accordingly decided that a small number of beds shall be reserved for them.

It has ever been My endeavour, and that of the Queen, to do all within Our power to mitigate suffering, and to check the ravages of disease. The Queen has shown Her deep interest in the fight against tuberculosis by becoming the patron of the proposed "Queen Alexandra Sanatorium" at Davos, and by permitting that institution to be called by Her name; and it is Our earnest hope that the Sanatorium which is now opened, and its research laboratories, equipped with every resource of modern science, may assist to advance the physiological knowledge of pulmonary diseases, and that this institution may, by treating the disease in its early stages, be the means of prolonging the lives of those whose career of honourable usefulness has been interrupted by this terrible malady.

I pray that God's blessing may rest upon this building and upon all who work within it and all who come to it for aid, and that it may be a means of alleviating suffering and saving life for this and many generations to come.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a trausfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Abbots Langley, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Abbots Langley is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in Edward Henry Loyd of Langleybury, King's Langley, in the county of Hertford, Esquire, one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

"And whereas the said Edward Henry Loyd is

"And whereas the said Edward Henry Loyd is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Abbots Langley now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edgar, now Bishop of Saint Albans, is willing to accept

such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Abbots Langley, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish

of Abbots Langley.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Henry Loyd (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Abbots Langley, now vested in him the said Edward Henry Loyd as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans, and his successors in the same Bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans, and by his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of

any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in

Council a scheme bearing date the fourteenth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the rectory of Leverington in the county of Cambridge and now vested in us.

"Whereas, under and by virtue of an Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fiftyfive, section sixteen, certain lands particularly mentioned in the preamble of the said Act became vested in us for all the estate and interest therein of the Rector of Leverington and his successors and for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us for the purposes of our common

"And whereas the said lands are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands so in our possession as aforesaid, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said firstmentioned Act all or any of the said lands so in our possession as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said first mentioned Act or of any other Act. of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved

by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ely.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of All Saints, Southport, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the fourth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight and published in the London Gazette on the ninth day of the same month a certain part of the parish of North Meols in the said county of Lancaster and now in the said diocese of Liverpool was assigned as as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, Southport, situate in the said parish of North Meols, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, Southport.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of All Saints, Southport, has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the abovementioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of All Saints,

Southport, shall be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of All Saints, Southport, shall be altered so that all that isolated portion of the said parish of North Meols which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of All Saints, Southport.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the parish of North Meols, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool, and to be annexed to the new parish of All Saints, Southport, in the said county and diocese, being:—

"All that isolated part of the said parish of North Meols in which Kew Gardens and Blowick Moss are situate which lies to the south-west of the fence forming the northern boundary of the Wigan and Southport line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, and which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon the north-east partly by the said new parish of All Saints, Southport, and partly by the district of Saint Simon and Saint Jude, Southport, in the said county and diocese, upon the south-east by the new parish of Saint Mark, Scarisbrick, in the said county and diocese, upon the south-west by the parish of Halsall, in the said county and diocese, and upon the north-west partly by the new parish of Saint Peter, Birkdale, partly by the new parish of Saint Paul, Southport, partly by the new parish of Saint Philip, Southport, and partly by the new parish of Saint Luke, Southport, all in the said county and diocese."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively

tively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, Chislehurst, situate within the parish of Chislehurst, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Chislehurst, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint George, Bickley, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Chislehurst, and of the said new parish of Saint George, Bickley, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, Chislehurst, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester, as such Bishop, and as the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Chislehurst, and with the consent of Ernest James Wythes, of Copped Hall, Epping, in the county of Essex, Esquire, as the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint George, Bickley (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Chislehurst, and of the said new parish of Saint George, Bickley, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church called Christ Church, Chislehurst, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church, Chislehurst.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church, Chislehurst, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of Chislehurst, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Rochester, which is bounded upon the east and upon the north by the new parish of the Annunciation, Chislehurst, upon the south-west by the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint George, Bickley, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say upon the south and upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Bickley, from the said parish of Chislehurst crosses the middle of the road called Chislehurst-hill, and extending thence first north-castward and then eastward along the middle of Chislehurst-hill for a distance of thirtythree chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction on Chislehurst Common with the road leading to Chislehurst West, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the junction of such road with the southern end of the road leading through the 'Wilderness' upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Chislehurst from the said new parish of the Annunciation, Chislehurst.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint George, Bickley, which is bounded upon the east and upon the north-east by the said parish of Chislehurst, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Chislehurst from the said new parish of Saint George, Bickley, at the point in the middle of the line of the South-Eastern Railway (distant three chains from the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway across Yester-road) where the said line of railway crosses the middle of the stream called Kid Brook, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway (thereby crossing the high road leading from Broinley to Chislehurst) for a distance of forty-two chains or thereabouts to the point where such line of railway again crosses the middle of the stream called Kid Brook, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Bickley, from the said parish of Chislehurst.

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

ORDER of the Local Government Board: District Auditors Act, 1879: Assignment of Duties and District (Supplemental):-

METROPOLITAN BOROUGHS AUDIT DISTRICT.

To Arthur Carson Roberts, Barrister-at-Law, District Auditor;—
To the Central (Unemployed) Body for

London ;

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by Section 4 of the District Auditors Act, 1879, it is enacted that the Local

Government Board may from time to time assign to District Auditors their Duties, and the Districts in which such Auditors respectively are to act, and may from time to time change wholly or in

part such Duties or Districts;

And whereas by an Order dated the 23rd day of March, 1901, We, the Local Government Board, certified the appointment of Arthur Carson Roberts as a District Auditor, and assigned to him the duties therein mentioned and the District in which he should act as Auditor, which District in the said Order was termed "The Metropolitan Boroughs Audit District'

Dover Harbour Works—Cautionary Notice Respecting.

As several instances have recently occurred of large ships fouling the staging of the South Breakwater at Dover, when entering or leaving the port, and doing considerable damage, and also of their fouling the Admiralty Pier, mariners are warned that not only is great skill required, owing to the varying conditions of the tidal streams, to enter or leave Dover Harbour safely, but that if that skill and care is not observed, it is possible that they may so disturb the staging, when fouling it, as to bring down on their decks the "Titan," employed in laying the concrete blocks, which weigh 400 tons.

- 4. The driver of a carriage, on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road so as not to leave sufficient space for the carriage to pass, shall sound his bell or whistle as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall, with reasonable despatch, cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the carriage.
- 5. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramway, nor

shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

- 6. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or "conductor's" platform and not otherwise.
- 7. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform on any musical instrument.
- 8. A person in a state of intoxication or affected with any infectious or contagious disease shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.
- 9. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.
- 10. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil or damage the seats, cushions, linings or other fittings of any carriage, or remove or deface any number plate, printed, painted or other notice, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage, and no person, not being a servant of the Company, duly authorized in that behalf, shall touch, handle or interfere with any electric machine or appliance in, under, upon, or about any carriage (except electric bells provided for the use of passengers). Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.
- 11. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of a carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in any carriage; and may be prevented from entering any carriage, and shall not enter any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor; and if found in any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage, upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.
- 12. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, or other duly authorized officer of the Company, the fare legally demandable for the journey.
- 13. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.
- 14. A passenger, not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Company, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.
- 15. Personal luggage not exceeding 28lbs. in weight (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) may be carried by hand, or, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, shall be placed on the front or driver's platform. The conductor may decline to take into or upon the carriage any luggage of a form or description calculated to annoy or inconvenience any passenger.
- 16. Packages carried by passengers exceeding 28lbs. in weight will be charged as one fare.
- 17. No passenger or other person, not being a servant of the Company, shall be permitted to

- travel on the steps or driver's platform of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof or platform of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.
- 18. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage or travel therein other wise than on a seat provided for passengers.
- 19. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is authorized to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage after being warned by the conductor not to do so.
- 20. When a carriage contains the full authorized number of passengers, the conductor shall inform intending passengers that the car is full up by calling "Car full!"
- 21. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the authorized number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage, except during inclement weather, when as many as four persons may be allowed to stand inside the car.
- 22. No person shall enter, mount or leave, or attempt to enter, mount or leave, any carriage whilst in motion.
- 23. No dog (other than one carried and held in the arms of a passenger) nor any other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.
- 24. No passenger shall smoke inside or on the three front rows of seats on the outside of any carriage, or expectorate inside or outside any carriage.
- 25. No person shall enter, get upon, or travel in or on any carriage with loaded firearms, or with any article, instrument or implement which may be daugerous or offensive to any passenger.
- 26. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.
- 27. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.
- 28. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Forty shillings.
- 29. There shall be placed and kept in a conspicuous position, inside of each carriage in use, a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.
- 30. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the third day of September, 1906.
