The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words and figures following, that is to say :--

figures following, that is to say :--"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of the Holy Trinity, Southall, situate in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London and being a benefice in the metropolis or in the vicinity thereof as those terms are defined by the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say, the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three. "Whereas we are satisfied that the said new

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Southall, is a parish wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it appears to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Southall, which is mentioned and described in the schedule to this scheme and is delineated on the map or plan annexed to this scheme should be constituted a separate district for ecclesiastical purposes in the manner which is hereinaîter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship. "And whereas under the provisions of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-sixth day of September in the year one thousand nine hundred and one and published in the London Gazette on the first day of the following month the benefice of Saint Maryat-Hill with Saint Andrew. Hubbard and the benefice of Saint George, Botolph-lane, with Saint Botolph; Billingsgate, in the city of London and in the diocese of London, were united into one benefice. And it was by the same Order provided amongst other things that an ecclesiastical district within the limits of the metropolis or its vicinity should be selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church should be built out of the proceeds of the sale or sales which have been effected of the materials and site of the church of Saint George, Botolph-lane.

"And whereas the district hereinafter proposed to be constituted has been selected by the Bishop of London as the district for which a church shall be built as provided by the said Order in Council.

"And whereas certain endowments which produce an income of five hundred pounds per annum or thereabouts will ultimately under the provisions of the said Order in Council become payable to the Minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed church and district.

"And whereas a sum of five thousand pounds sterling has been temporarily granted by us, the said: Ecclesiastical Commissioners, out of the moneys received by us under the Saint Mary Woolnoth Church Act, 1904, to provide an endowment for the said proposed district until such time as the said income of five hundred pounds per annum or thereabouts shall be available, and we have in respect of the said sum of five thousand pounds sterling agreed and have undertaken to pay by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August, and the first day of November in each and every year to the Minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed church and district a sum of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum until such time as the above mentioned income shall be available.

"And whereas it is provided by the said Order in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district shall be vested alternately in Your Majesty Your heirs and successors and the Dean and Chapter of the first turn of presentation thereto to be vested in the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissiouers, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Southall, which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes by the name of 'The District of Saint George, Southall,' and that the said district shall ultimately be endowed as contemplated by the said Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of September in the year one thousand nine hundred and one.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and when such district shall have become a new parish then of such new parish, and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall as provided by the said lastly mentioned Order of Your Majesty in Council be for ever vested in and be exercised by Your Majesty Your heirs and successors and the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church of Saint Paul in London alternately, the first turn of presentation thereto to be vested in the Dean and Chapter of Saint Paul's.

"And we further recommend that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the toregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint George, Southall, being :-

"All that part of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of the Holy Trinity, Southall, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, which is bounded upon the north-west by the parish of Hayes, upon the south by the new parish of Saint John, Southall Green, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Southall Green, from the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Southall, at a point in the middle of the main line of the Great Western Railway directly opposite to the southern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the house and premises known as Number 58, Grange-road, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the said boundary wall or fence for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its northern end on the southern side of Grange-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the wall or fence at the present eastern end of Grange-road and along the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the passage on the eastern side of the house and premises known as Number 35, Grange-road, and the house and premises known as Rondebosch, Beaconsfield-road, for a distance of four chains and a quarter or thereabouts to the northern end of the last mentioned wall or feuce on the southern side of Beaconsfield-road, and extending thence north-eastward in a straight line (thereby crossing Beaconsfield-road) for a distance of half

cathedral church of Saint Paul in London, the | a chain or thereabouts to the southern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the house and premises on the eastern side of Abbotts-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the said wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the houses and premises on the eastern side of Abbotts-road and the eastern boundary of the house and premises known as Number 133, Oswald-road, for a distance of five chains and three quarters or thereabouts to the northern end of such wall or fence upon the southern side of Oswald-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the wall or fence on the southern side of Oswald-road and along the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the house and premises known as Number 115, Oswald-road, for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where the last mentioned wall or fence meets the wall or fence running along the backs of the houses and premises on the eastern side of Oswald-road, and extending thence northward along the last mentioned wall or fence for a distance of seventeen chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its northern end, and extending thence northward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of nine yards or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the high road leading from Uxbridge to London, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said high road for a distance of four chains and a quarter or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the passage between the houses and premises on the eastern side of Northcote-avenue and the houses and premises on the western side of Alexandra-avenue, and extending thence northward to and along the middle of the last mentioned passage for a distance of ten chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where it meets the bank and hedge forming the boundary of the Hambrough estate, and extending thence first westward and then northward along the said bank and hedge for a distance of twenty chains and three quarters or thereabouts to its northern end near the southern side of the footpath leading from Mount Pleasant towards Yeading, and extending thence first northward to the middle of the said footpath and then first westward and afterwards north-eastward along the middle of the said footpath (thereby crossing the Paddington Branch of the Grand Junction Canal) for a distance of sixteen chains and three quarters or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Southall, from the said parish of Hayes.

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbent of the new parish out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and Incumbent have respectively either signified their assent to such scheme or raised no objection to it. And whereas one calendar month has elapsed since the said drafts were transmitted to the said patrons and Incumbent as aforesaid.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said, late Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:--

figures following, that is to say:--"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as 'The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts,' have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the rectory of the parish of Clapham in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Southwark.

"Whereas the annual value of the benefice of the rectory of Claphum aforesaid (hereinafter referred to as the said benefice) has been improved by means of certain sales leases and other transactions in relation to glebe lands and thereditaments belonging to the said benefice effected from time to time under the provisions of the said Acts during the incumbency of the Reverend Charles Philip Greene the present rector Incumbent of the said benefice and by certain purchases and investments made under the provisions of the said Acts with capital moneys arising from such sales leases and other transactions, and the amount of such improvement in annual value exceeds the annual income derived by the rector or incumbent of the said benefice from those portions of the glebe lands and hereditaments of his said benefice which are hereinafter described and such improved annual income is enjoyed by the said rector or incumbent subject to the provisions contained in the said Acts with respect to making a portion of the improved income accruing to the said benefice by means of any lease, sale, exchange, partition, purchase or investment granted or made under the provisions of the said Acts payable to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners to be applied by us according to the provisions of an Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen in making additional provision for the cure of souls that is to say for the purposes of our common fund so nevertheless as not to affect the incumbent in possession of the said benefice at the time when any such transactions should be effected and provided also that in making any provision for the cure of souls out of such improved income so made payable to us the wants and circumstances of the places in which are situate the lands so dealt with under the provisions of the said Acts should be prima-

rily considered. "And whereas after the transfer to us of the whole of the lands and hereditaments hereinafter described the average annual income of the said benefice will not be left at a less sum than six hundred pounds.

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon the vacation of the said benefice by the said Charles Philip Greene and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same all those in the first and second parts of the schedule

hereunder written subject to all leases tenancies or agreements affecting the same and with the benefit of the rents thereby reserved and the covenants and conditions therein contained shall be transferred to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and shall thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us in fee simple for the benefit of our common fund and the rents issues and profits thereof shall be applied by us in making additional provision for the cure of souls with primary consideration as aforesaid for the vants and circumstances of the parishes and districts within or partly within the limits of the original parish of Clapham in which the said glebe lands are situate.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The SCHEDULE before-mentioned "PART I.

"First.—All that piece or parcel of land containing one acre and three roods or thereabouts in the parish of Clapham in the county of Surrey bounded on the south-east side by the Claphamroad on the south-west side by the messuage and its appurtenances known as Carlton Mansions and on the remaining sides by land not forming part of the glebe land of the said rectory of Clapham which said piece or parcel of land is shown on the Plan A annexed hereto and thereon coloured yellow and marked or numbered I.

"Secondly.—All that piece or parcel of land situate on the north-west side of Clapham-road, in the said parish of Clapham with the messuages or tenements erected and now standing thereon known as Numbers 388, 390 and 392 Claphamroad, with their gardens and appurtenances all which said piece or parcel of land is shown on the plan A annexed hereto and thereon coloured yellow and marked or numbered II.

"Thirdly.—All that piece or parcel of land situate on the north-west side of Clapham-road in the said parish of Clapham, with the messuages or tenements erected and now standing thereon known as Numbers 418, 420 and 422 Claphamroad, with their gardens and appurtenances all which said piece or parcel of land is shown on the plan A annexed hereto and thereon coloured yellow and marked or numbered III.

"Fourthly.—All that piece or parcel of land fronting Gauden-road in the said parish of Clapham, bounded in the rear by the garden of Number 406A, Clapham-road, and adjoining on the south side the premises known as Number 69 Gauden-road, on the north-east side the garden of the premises known as Number 404 Clapham-road, all which piece or parcel of land is shown on the plan A hereuuto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow and marked or numbered IV.

"Fifthly.—All that piece or parcel of land on the south-east side of Bromells-road in the said parish of Clapham with the messuages or tenements erected and now standing thereon known as Numbers 26, 28, 30, 32, 34, 36, 38, 40, 42, 44, 46 and 48, Bromells-road aforesaid with their gardens and appurtenances all which said piece or parcel of land is shown on the plan B annexed hereto and thereon coloured yellow and marked or numbered V.

"Sixthly.—All that narrow strip of land on the west side of and fronting on Venn-street in the High-street, Clapham aforesaid and running from the High-street to Bromells-road with the wall and other erections thereon all which strip is shown on the plan B annexed hereto and thereon coloured yellow and marked or numbered VI. "All those the messuages, lands, tenements and hereditaments with the yards gardens and appurtenances to the same belonging in the parish of Clapham in the county of Surrey shortly described in the second column of the table hereunder written and now demised by or held on the terms of the several leases the short particulars of which are contained in the 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th columns of the same table.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:---

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eightyfour, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Croxby, in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln, between that benefice (being a vicarage) of Market Rasen, which said last named benefice is situate in the said county of Lincoln, and in the said diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being, acting on behalf of Your Majesty, is Patron in right of the Crown of each of the said benefices of Croxby and Market Rasen.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Market Rasen is at present insufficiently endowed, and that the said benefice of Croxby has endowments of such an amount that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of Croxby will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and we are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Market Rasen by means of that apportionment of the income

of the said benefice of Croxby which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas each of the said benefices of Croxby and Market Rasen is now full.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward, Bishop of Lincoln (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), and with the consent of the Right Honourable Robert Threshie, Baron Loreburn, now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date of the next avoidance from whatever cause of the said benefice of Croxby and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same all the glebe lands and other endowments which belong or which may thereafter belong to the said benefice of Croxby shall be charged and be for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Market Rasen with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, a clear annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred and thirty pounds, the same annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred and thirty pounds to be as from the day aforesaid due and payable to the Incumbent of the same benefice of Market Rasen, and to be apportionable between any outgoing Incumbent of the said benefice of Croxby or his representatives on the one hand and his successors in the same Incumbency on the other hand, and to be receivable by the Incumbeut in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Market Rasen shall have the following powers for recovering the said rent charge of one hundred and thirty pounds per annum hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is Incumbent as aforesaid (that is to say) power if and whenever any part of the said rent charge shall at any time be unpaid for twenty-one days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof (although there shall not have been any legal demand made thereof) to enter into the receipt of the endowments charged therewith, or any part thereof, and to receive and take the same until he shall thereby or otherwise be paid and satisfied the same reut charge and the arrears thereof due at the time of such entry or afterwards become due during his being in possession of the same premises, together with all costs and expenses occasioned by the non-payment thereof, and for the purpose of collecting, receiving, and recovering such endowments, or any of them, to use, exercise and enjoy all such powers and remedies for collecting and recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutably exercised or exercisable by him under the law then in force.

"Provided always that if at any time the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Croxby shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any statute in that behalf enabling him grant, convey, and annex to the said benefice of Market Rasen any part or parts of the Rectorial endowments belonging to the said benefice of Croxby which shall in the opinion of the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being, of the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being, and of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, be a just and fair equivalent, or not less than an equivalent, for the said yearly charge of one hundred and thirty pounds hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid, then the same annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred and thirty pounds shall thereupon and thenceforth cease and determine and be no longer payable as hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and published in the London Gazette on the following day, part of the parish of Acton, in the said county of Middlesex and in the said diocese of

London, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate at South Acton, in the said parish of Acton, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, South Acton."

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the sixth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and published in the London Gazette on the twelfth day of the same month, a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Alban the Martyr, situate at Acton Green, and the said consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of All Saints, South Acton, and the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, have become new parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirtyseven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years

of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four. "And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, and of the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, and of the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, shall be altered so that (firstly) all those portions of the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, which are described in the first schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, and (secondly) all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, which is described in the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"THE FIRST SCREDOLE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the

new parish of All Saints, South Acton, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, in the same county and diocese, comprising :---

" I. All that portion of the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, which is bounded upon the south by the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the northwest and upon the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, from the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, at the junction of the Gunnersbury to South Acton Line of the London and South Western Railway with the Kew Bridge to South Acton Line of the North and South Western Junction Railway, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the lastchains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of Kingswood-road, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of Kingswood-road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, from the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green.

"II. And also all that portion of the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, which is bounded upon the south by the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-east and upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, from the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, at the junction of Steele-road with the road called Church-path, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bolton-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Bolton-road for a distance of four chains and a half or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, from the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr. Acton Green.

" THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, and to be annexed to the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, being:---

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, which is bounded upon the north by the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the southwest and upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton, from the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, crosses the middle of Kingswood-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Kingswoodroad for a distance of three chains and three quarters or thereabouts to its junction with Bolton-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Bolton-road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Alban the Martyr, Acton Green, from the said new parish of All Saints, South Acton."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patron and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such Patron and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty in Council of even date therewith, and known as the Northern Territories Order in Council, 1901, certain territories of West Africa, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, were defined and delimited and provision was made for the administration thereof;

And whereas it is expedient that the boundaries of Ashanti should be further defined, and that certain portions of the territories included within the limits of the last recited Order in Council should be annexed to His Majesty's Dominions and should hereafter be included within Ashanti;

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows :-

1. The limits of Ashanti shall be the territories bounded as follows, namely :-- On the south by the Colony of the Gold Coast; on the west by the frontier between the French and British possessions from the point on that frontier which is intersected by the thalweg of the Asnepiri River to the point at which the thalweg of the Black Volta River first meets the aforesaid frontier; on the north by the right bank of the Black Volta River to its junction with the Chukow River; thence the thalweg of the Chukow River to a point opposite to the beacon erected on the right bank of that river west of Tumuni; thence in a straight line running in a south-easterly direction to a beacon erected on the road from Tumuni to Kokrawusu and distant about three

miles from Tumuni; thence in a straight line running in a direction south-east by south to the point at which the Pru River crosses the road from Abcasi to Terefe; thence the thalweg of the Pru River to its junction with the Volta River; thence the right bank of the Volta River to a point opposite to the mouth of the Dakar River; and thence a straight line crossing the Volta River to the junction of the two rivers last mentioned; on the east the line of the frontier between the British and German possessions to a point on the left bank of the Volta River due east of the mouth of the Absosom River.

And whereas it is expedient to define the limits of the Gold Coast Colony;

Now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :----

1. The limits of the Gold Coast Colony shall be the territories on the West Coast of Africa which are bounded as follows, namely:--On the south by the Atlantic Ocean; on the west by the line of the frontier between the British and French possessions from the sea to the point, marked by the Survey Beacon 1620, on the frontier at which the Asuepiri River crosses it.

On the north, starting from the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1620, the boundary follows the thalweg of the Asuepiri River to its source which is marked

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Thence it follows a straight line in a south-easterly direction to the source of the Pumpunase River which is marked by the Survey Beacon G.U.S. 1618. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Pumpunase River to its confluence with the Aponapon River near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1616. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Pumpunase or Aponapon River to its junction with the Pepiase River near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1615. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Pumpunase or Aponapon or Pepiase River to its junction with the Atoinsu River near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1614. Thence it follows the right bank of the Sui River down stream to a point due west of its confluence with the Budumasi River. Thence it crosses the Sui River to its junction with the Budumasi River near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1604. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Budumasi River to the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1603, marking the source of the Budumasi River. Thence it follows in a south-easterly direction the ridge of the hill range forming the watershed between the Apimpinsa and Budumasi and Kabiasua Rivers to the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1602, marking the source of the Apimpinsa River. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Apimpinsa River to its junction with the Dein River near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1699. Thence it Thence it follows the thalweg of the Dein River down stream to its junction with the Bonsawi River near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1698. Thence it follows the watershed line of the Saraho-Babeaneha Range in a northerly direction to the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1690, where it meets the southern boundary of the Bibiani Goldfields Thence it follows the southern Concession. boundary of the Bibiani Goldfields Concession

to the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1689, at the southwest corner of the same concession. Thence it follows the western boundary of the Bibiani Goldfields Concession to the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1685, at the north-west corner of the same concession. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Mpokoampa River to its junction with the Mensine River near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1680. Ampani River to its source, marked by the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1678. Thence it follows a straight line to the source of the Baierabon River, marked by the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1677. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Baierabon River to its junction with the Katabotri River, marked by the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1676. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Katabotri River to its source near the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1675. Thence it crosses the Subin-Katabotri Hill to the source of the Subin River near the last named beacon, a distance of 600 yards, more or less. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Subin River to its confluence with the Aborsu River at the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1673. Thence it Thence it follows the thalweg of the Aborsu River to its source at the Survey Beacon G.C.S. 1672. Thence it follows the watershed of the range of hills lying between the sources of the Aborsu and Kusumusu Rivers in an easterly direction to the source of the Kusumusu River at the Survey Beacou G.U.S. 1671. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Kusumusu River to its junction with the Tetiasu River. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Tetiasu River to its confluence with the Ofin River. Thence it follows the right bank of the Ofin River to the confluence of the Ofin River with the Prah River. Thence it follows the left bank of the Prah River to the point where the road from Obo to Bompata crosses the river. Thence it follows the left bank of the Prah River for a distance up stream of one quarter of a mile. Thence it runs parallel on the northern side of, and one quarter of a mile distant from the present Obo-Bompata road until it meets the Fomang River. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Fomang River up stream to its junction with the Sutere River. Thence it runs in a straight line to the confluence of the Onyim and Supon Rivers. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Onyim River down stream to its junction with the Afram River. Thence it runs in a straight line to the junction of the Babadua Stream and the Obosom Stream. Thence it follows the thalweg of the Obusom River to the Volta River. Thence it crosses the Volta River to a point on the left bank due east of the mouth of the Obosom River.

Provided that on the east the boundary of the Gold Coast Colony shall be the line of the frontier between the British and German Possessions southwards to the Atlantic Ocean.

2. Article II of the first recited Order of His Majesty in Council of the 26th September, 1901, is hereby revoked.

3. This Order shall be published in the Gold Coast Government Gazette and shall thereupon come into operation and the Governor of the

Gold Coast shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places, and in such manner. and for such time or times as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto.

4. His Majesty may from time to time revoke, add to, or amend this Order.

5. This Order may be cited as "The Gold Coast Boundaries Order in Council, 1906."

WHEREAS the territories of Africa known as the East Africa Protectorate are under the protection of His Majesty the King:

And whereas by treaty, grant, usage, suffer-ance, and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction within the said Protectorate:

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of August, 1902, and entitled "The East Africa Order in Council, 1902," provision was made for the exercise of His Majesty's jurisdiction within the said Protectorate, and the Commissioner under the said Order appointed was empowered to make ordinances for the administration of justice, the raising of revenue, and generally for the peace order and good government of all persons therein :

And whereas it is expedient that a Governor should be appointed for the said Protectorate in place of a Commissioner, and that there should be an Executive Council and also a Legislative Council in and for the said Protectorate, and that the Legislative Council should have power to make ordinances for the peace order and good government of all persons in the said Protectorate, and that save as herein provided the said Council should exercise all such powers in that behalf as heretofore have been exercised by the Commissioner, subject in all respects to the provisions contained in the said East Africa Order in Council, 1902 :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers on that behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :---I. This Order may be cited as "The East

Africa Order in Council, 1906."

II. In place of the Commissioner appointed under the provisions of the East Africa Order in Council, 1902, there shall be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the East Africa Protectorate (hereinafter called the Protectorate) and appointments to the said office shall be made by commission under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet. Wherever in the said Order in Council the word "Commissioner" occurs the word "Governor" shall be read in place thereof.

III. The said Governor and Commander-in-Chief (hereinafter called the Governor) is hereby authorised, empowered, and commanded to do and execute all things that belong to his said office, according to the tenour of any Orders in Council relating to the Protectorate, and of such Commission as may be issued to him under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, and according to such Instructions as may from time to time be given to him under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, or by Order in Council, or by His Majesty through one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and to such laws as are now or shall hereafter be in force in the Protectorate.

IV. Every person appointed to fill the office of Governor shall, with all due solemnity, before entering on any of the duties of his office, cause the Commission appointing him to be Governor to be read and published in the presence of a Judge of His Majesty's High Court of East Africa, or, if there be no Judge of the said Court who is able to attend, in the presence of such other His Majesty's Officers in the Protectorate as can conveniently attend, which being done, he shall then and there take before him or them the Oath of Allegiance in the form provided by an Act passed in the Session holden in the Thirtyfirst and Thirty-second years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to Promissory Oaths;" and likewise the usual oath for the due execution of the office of Governor, and for the due and impartial administration of justice, which oaths the said judge, or some other of His Majesty's Officers then present, is hereby required to administer.

V. The Governor shall keep and use the Public Seal of the Protectorate for sealing all things whatsoever that shall pass the said Seal: Provided that until a Public Seal shall be provided for the Protectorate the Official Seal heretofore used by the Commissioner may be used as the Public Seal of the Protectorate.

VI. There shall be an Executive Council in and for the Protectorate, and the said Council shall consist of such persons as His Majesty may direct by Instructions under His Mujesty's Sign Manual and Signet, and all such persons shall hold their places in the said Council during His Majesty's pleasure.

VII. There shall be a Legislative Council in and for the Protectorate, and the said Council shall consist of the Governor and such persons, not being less than two at any time, as His Majesty may direct by any Instructions under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, or through one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and all such persons shall hold their places in the said Council during His Majesty's pleasure.

VIII. The persons who shall from time to time compose the said Legislative Council shall have full power and authority, subject always to any conditions, provisoes, and limitations prescribed by any Instructions under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, to establish such Ordinances, and to constitute such Courts and Officers, and to make such provisions and regulations for the proceedings in such Courts, and for the administration of justice, as may be necessary for the peace, order, and good government of the Protectorate.

The Governor shall have a right of veto in the making and passing of all such Ordinances.

IX. There shall be reserved to His Majesty, His heirs and successors, full power and authority, and His and their undoubted right, to disallow any such Ordinances, and to signify

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such disallowance through one of His or their Principal Secretaries of State. Every such disallowance shall take effect from the time when the same shall be promulgated by the Governor in the Protectorate.

There shall also be reserved to His Majesty, His heirs and successors, His and their undoubted right, with the advice of His or their Privy Council, from time to time to make all such Laws or Ordinances as may appear to Him or them necessary for the peace, order, and good government of the Protectorate.

X. In the making of any Ordinances the Governor and the said Legislative Council shall conform to and observe all rules, regulations, and directions in that behalf contained in any Instructions under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet.

XI. The Governor, in His Majesty's name and on His Majesty's behalf, may make and execute, under the Public Seal, grants and dispositions of any lands within the Protectorate which may be lawfully granted or disposed of by His Majesty: Provided that every such grant or disposition be made in conformity, either with some Order in Council or law now or hereafter in force in the Protectorate, or with some Instructions which may be addressed to the Governor under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, or through one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

XII. The Governor may constitute and appoint all such Judges, Commissioners, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers, as may be lawfully constituted or appointed by His Majesty, all of whom, unless otherwise provided by law, shall hold their offices during His Majesty's pleasure.

XIII. The Governor may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing, suspend from the exercise of his office any person holding any office within the Protectorate, whether appointed by virtue of any Commission or Warrant from His Majesty or in His Majesty's name or by any other mode of appointment. Every such suspension shall continue and have effect only until His Majesty's pleasure therein shall be signified to the Governor. In proceeding to any such suspension, the Governor is strictly to observe the directions in that behalf given to him by any Instructions as aforesaid.

XIV. When any crime or offence has been committed within the Protectorate, or for which the offender may be tried therein, the Governor may, as he shall see occasion, in His Majesty's name and on His Majesty's behalf, grant a pardon to any accomplice in such crime or offence who shall give such information as shall lead to the conviction of the principal offender, or of any one of such offenders, if more than one; and further, may grant to any offender convicted in any Court, or before any Judge or other Magistrate, within the Protectorate, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any remission of the sentence passed on such offender, or any respite of the execution of such sentence, for such period as the Governor thinks fit, and may remit any fines, penalties, or forfeitures due or accrued to His Majesty.

XV. Whenever the office of Governor is vacant, or if the Governor becomes incapable or be absent from the Protectorate, or is from any cause prevented from acting in the duties of his office, then such person or persons as His Majesty may appoint under His Sign Manual and Signet, and in default of any such appointment the Senior Member of the Executive Council shall, during His Majesty's pleasure, administer the Government of the Protectorate, first taking the oaths hereinbefore directed to be taken by the Governor and in the manner herein prescribed, which being done, the administrator as aforesaid is hereby authorised, empowered, and commanded to do and execute, during His Majesty's pleasure, all things that belong to the office of Governor according to the tenour of this Order, and according to His Majesty's Instructions as aforesaid, and the Laws of the Protectorate." Provided that the Governor during his passage by sea to or from any part of the Protectorate, or when, in the exercise or discharge of any powers or duties by this Order in Council or otherwise conferred or imposed upon him, he is in any territories adjacent to or near to the Protectorate, shall not be considered to be absent from the Protectorate.

XVI. In the event of the Governor having occasion at any time to be temporarily absent for a short period from the seat of Government or in the exercise or discharge of any powers or duties by this Order in Council or otherwise conferred or imposed upon him by His Majesty to visit any territories adjacent to or near to the Protectorate, he may by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Protectorate appoint any person or persons to be his Deputy or Deputies within any part of the Protectorate, and in that capacity to exercise, during his pleasure, such of the powers hereby vested in the Governor, except the powers of suspension and pardon, as the Governor shall think fit to assign to him or them. The appointment of such Deputy or Deputies shall not affect the exercise by the Governor himself of any of his powers or authorities. Every such Deputy shall, in the discharge of his office, conform to and observe all such Instructions as the Governor shall address to him for his guidance.

XVII. And all His Majesty's Officers, Civil and Military, and all other the inhabitants of the Protectorate are hereby required and commanded to be obedient, aiding, and assisting unto the Governor, and to such person or persons as may from time to time, under the provisions of this Order, administer the Government of the Protectorate.

XVIII. In this Order the term "the Governor," unless inconsistent with the context, shall include every person for the time being administering the Government of the Protectorate.

XIX. His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in Council may at any time revoke, alter, or amend this Order.

XX. The following Sections of the Order of His Majesty in Council, dated the 11th August, 1902, and known as the East Africa Order in Council, 1902, shall, upon the coming into operation of this Order be revoked, without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, namely :-Sections 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, 12 [except Sub-sections

(8) and (10)], Sections 17 and 19. XXI. This Order shall be read and proclaimed within the Protectorate, and shall thereupon commence and come into operation.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Elgin, K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

HEREAS by "The Merchaut Shipping Act, 1894," it is (amongst other things) evacted that where the Legislature of any British

Possession provides for the examination of and grant of Certificates of Competency to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates or Engineers on board British ships, and the Board of Trade report to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient with the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1×94, and that the Certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Act and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in the like manner, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council-

1. Declare that the said Certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Act;

2. Declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Act which relate to Certificates of Competency granted under that Act shall apply to the Certificates referred to in the said Order;

3. Impose such conditions, and make such regulations with respect to the said Certificates and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation and suspension thereof as Her Majesty may think fit, and impose penalties not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of those conditions and regulations:

And that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any such Order in Council as last aforesaid the Order shall, as from the date of the publication or any later date mentioned in the Order, take effect as if it were enacted by Parliament :

And whereas at the coming into operation of the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, there were in force the Orders in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety - one, and the twenty - third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three hereinafter mentioned, being Orders in Council made under enactments repealed by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and it was provided by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, that Orders in Council so made should remain in force as if made or granted under the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1894:

And whereas by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is further provided that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, revoke, alter or add to any Order in Council made by Her under the Merchant Shipping Acts:

And whereas by the said Order in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, Her late Majesty was pleased to declare inter alia that Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by certain Authorities therein named and described in the case of the several British Possessions therein mentioned to persons intending to act as therein mentioned on board British ships should be of the same force as if they had been granted under the Acts relating to merchant shipping :

And whereas by the said Order last mentioned Her Majesty was further pleased to impose and make the regulations set out in the Schedule A thereto with respect to the said Colonial Certificates of Competency and to declare that the regulations set out in the said Schedule A thereto should apply to all Colonial Certificates of Competency that might theretofore have been or should thereafter be granted:

And whereas by the said Order in Council of the twenty-third day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, Her late Majesty was pleased to declare that Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Marine Board of Victoria from and after the twenty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight as therein mentioned should be of the same force as if they had been granted under the Acts relating to merchant shipping and should be subject to the same conditions and regulations as are set out in Schedule A to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and nincty-one:

And whereas by the provisions of the Navigation (Amendment) Act, 1899 passed by the Legislature of New South Wales, and by the provisions of the Shipping and Seamen Act, 1903, passed by the Legislature of New Zealand certain changes were made in the Authorities authorised by the said Legislatures respectively to grant Colonial Certificates of Competency in those Possessions respectively and other similar changes may be made by the Legislature of the British Possessions referred to in the said Orders in Council with regard to the Authorities authorised to grant such Certificates in such several Possessions :

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that it is expedient that the said Orders in Council should be so altered as to apply to Certificates of Competency granted by the proper Authority for the time being in the British Possessions mentioned in the said Orders in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of His Privy Council, is hereby pleased :---

To declare that the Colonial Certificates of Competency granted or to be hereafter granted by the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Administrator, Head of the Government, Minister, Board, Body or Corporation of or in any British Possession mentioned in the said Orders in Council for the time being authorised by the Legislature or Legislative Authority of such Possession to grant Colonial Certificates of Competency (hereinafter called "the proper authority") from and after the respective dates in the case of the several Possessions with reference to the several kinds of Certificate in the said Orders in Council mentioned shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 and shall be subject to the same conditions and regulations as are set out in Schedule A to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one and the said Orders in Council shall be read and construed as if the proper authority had been originally mentioned therein in the case of each such Possession in lieu of the Authority in each case actually named and described therein.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board, a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Your Majesty's Naval Establishments.

Admiralty, dated the 25th day of July, 1906, in the words following, viz. :--

"Whereas by Orders in Council of Her late Majesty bearing date the tenth November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, second March, one thousand eight hundred and eightyone, tenth March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the establishment was authorised under the 'Naval Savings Bank Act, 1866' of Naval Savings Banks on board Your Majesty's Ships, at the Headquarters of the Royal Marine Divisions, and at such of Your Majesty's Naval Establishments on shore as we might think desirable, and sanction was given to the issue of such regulations for the proper management of the same as were from time to time found necessary.

"And whereas under the said Orders in Council the rates of interest were fixed at three and three-quarters per cent. simple interest per annum on all deposits in the banks established on board Your Majesty's Ships, and at two and a half per cent. compound per annum on every complete pound invested in the banks established at the Royal Marine Divisions and Naval Establishments on shore;

"And whereas we are of opinion that, in view of the reduced value of such deposits to Your Majesty's Government, it is no longer practicable to continue the payment of interest at the present rate on deposits in the Banks instituted on board Your Majesty's Ships, and that such rate should therefore be assimilated to that authorised on deposits in the Banks instituted at the Royal Marine Divisions and Naval Establishments on shore;

"And whereas we have been advised that regulations made under section five of the 'Naval Savings Bank Act, 1866,' should be authorised directly by Your Majesty's Order in Council, and covering sanction is therefore necessary to the regulations issued indirectly in accordance with the Orders in Council of Her late Majesty, dated second March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and tenth March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, for the administration of the Banks at the Royal Marine Divisions and Your Majesty's Naval Establishments on shore;

"And whereas we consider it desirable in certain minor details further to revise the administration of the Naval Savings Banks on shore and on board Your Majesty's Ships;

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that, in pursuance of the Act aforesaid, Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to direct that the rate of interest payable on all deposits in new accounts opened in banks instituted in any of Your Majesty's ships that may be commissioned on or after the first January, one thousand nine hundred and seven, shall be fixed at two pounds ten shillings per cent. compound per annum on every complete pound invested, and that the regulations established under the Orders of Her late Majesty in Council, dated second March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, tenth March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, may be cancelled, and the regulations, copies of which are appended hereto, substituted for the same, and that this Order may have retrospective effect, as necessary to sanction the regulations issued from time to time for the management of the banks at the Royal Marine Divisions and at

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF NAVAL SAVINGS BANKS ON BOARD HIS MAJESTY'S SHIPS.

General Supervision.

1. The general supervision of the Bank will be vested in the Commanding Officer.

Manager of Bank.

2. The Paymaster will be regarded as the Manager of the Bank.

When Bank to be Opened.

3. The Bank is to be open for the receipt and withdrawal of deposits on the days when monthly advances are paid, and in any month in which advances are not required, the Commanding Officer shall appoint a day when the Bank shall be open.

Witness to Transactions.

4. The Commanding Officer shall appoint a Commissioned Officer to attend personally and witness the receipts and payments.

Deposits.

5. No sum less than one shilling is to be received, nor any fractional part of a shilling.

Pass Book.

6. Each Depositor on making his first deposit shall be furnished by the Paymaster for retention in the Depositor's own custody, with a Pass Book, in which shall be entered at the time of receipt or payment the several sums deposited or withdrawn, such entries to be verified by the initials of the Paymaster, and the officer appointed to witness the transactions under section four; the Pass Book shall bear on the outside of the cover the official or regimental number of the Depositor.

On closing his account each Depositor shall surrender his Pass Book, which shall be forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy with the Withdrawal List on which the closing transaction appears.

7. Should a Depositor lose his Pass Book the Commanding Officer may direct that he be supplied with a fresh Book, on which the word "Duplicate" is to be written.

Deposit List.

8. At the time of the receipt of the amounts deposited, the Paymaster shall prepare a list of the same, to which is to be appended a certificate to be signed by him, that the sums deposited have been credited in the Ledger Accounts and Pass Books, and the total amount received debited in his Cash Account. A certificate to be signed by the witnessing Officer appointed under section four shall also be appended, to the effect that the amounts shown on the list were deposited in his presence. The list is then to be forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Withdrawals.

9. A Depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or any portion of his deposits shall give to the Paymaster seven days' notice prior to the next day for opening the bank, in order that the necessary arrangements may be made.

10. Payment may however be made forthwith if the Commanding Officer is satisfied of the urgency of the case, and that the immediate withdrawal of the deposit would be for the advantage of the Depositor.

11. A Depositor withdrawing any sum cannot be permitted to re-invest it, or any part of it, the same day.

12. Interest is only payable when the total amount deposited is withdrawn.

13. No fractional part of a shilling may be withdrawn except when the Depositor's account is closed, and the interest is paid; nor in the latter case is any fractional part of a penny to be paid.

Withdrawal List.

14. At the time of the payment of the amounts withdrawn the Paymaster shall prepare a list of the same, to which is to be appended a certificate to be signed by him, that the sums withdrawn have been debited in the Ledger Accounts and Pass Books, and the total amount credited in his Cash Account. A certificate to be signed by the witnessing officer appointed under section four shall also be appended to the effect that the several sums withdrawn have been paid in his presence. The list is then to be forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Depositors Transferred.

15. When a Depositor is transferred from one Ship to another, or if a Marine, from a Ship to Quarters, his account shall be closed on board the Ship he leaves, and unless he requires to withdraw his deposits, as provided by section ten of these Regulations, it shall be reopened on board the Ship or at the Quarters he joins, by a Transfer List showing the balance and interest due to him.

16. The Transfer List shall be made out and signed by the Paymaster and two copies made thereof. The original Transfer List, with the Depositor's ledger account, shall be sent to the Accountant-General of the Navy—the duplicate list shall be sent to the Ship or Quarters to which he may be transferred, and the triplicate list shall be retained on board the Ship issuing the Transfer List.

Depositors Discharged or Promoted.

17. On a Depositor being discharged the Service, or ceasing by promotion to be eligible to continue a Depositor, no further interest shall accrue on his deposits, but his account shall be closed, and he may either receive his money from the Paymaster, or have the same transferred for investment in a Post Office Savings Bank or assigned for payment at the Admiralty Office.

Depositors Sent to Hospital.

18. On a Depositor being sent to Hospital a Transfer List, as provided for in section sixteen shall be sent with him, to be forwarded with his Pay Documents (should he be invalided) to the Accountant-General of the Navy, or to the ship the Depositor may join on his arrival home; the original of such list is to be sent in the usual manner to the Accountant-General of the Navy, but the Depositor's Ledger Account need not be sent until it is known that the Depositor will not return to the Ship, when it is to be forwarded with a notation thereon showing the man's disposal.

19. The transaction is to be shown as an ordinary transfer issued, in column 5 of the Abstract Account, and should a Depositor whose account is so transferred rejoin his Ship, the Transfer List is to be returned with him, and the

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amount of principal thereon is to be entered on the date of rejoining as a transfer received in column 3 of the Abstract Account.

Depositors Dying.

20. On the death of a Depositor no further interest shall accrue on his deposits, but his account shall be closed and transferred, with his Pass Book, to the Accountant-General of the Navy, for settlement with his representatives. The amount is not to appear in the Paymaster's Cash Account, nor be inserted in Form S. 46 (late S. 54) "Accounts of Dead and Run Men."

Transfers to Shore Banks.

21. A Depositor, while continuing in the Service, may have his account transferred to a Shore Bank, i.e., a Dockyard or Divisional Bank, for the purpose of investment. In such case the procedure shown under section sixteen shall be followed—the original Transfer List with the Depositor's Ledger Account being sent to the Accountant-General of the Navy, duplicate list to the Shore Bank, and a triplicate list retained on board.

Interest.

22. Interest at the rate of $\pounds 2$ 10s. per centum per annum shall be allowed to Depositors on every complete pound deposited, such interest to commence on the first day of the month, when the deposit is made during the first ten days of a month, and on the first of the following month on a deposit made during the remaining portion of a month; when the whole or any portion of the amount deposited is repaid, interest on the sum withdrawn is to close with the last day of the month preceding that in which the payment is made. On the 31st March in each year the interest due to each depositor shall be computed, and so much of it as consists of entire pounds and shillings shall be added to the Principal of each account; any fractional part of a shilling shall remain as interest to be added to that subsequently accruing. The amounts carried subsequently accruing. The amounts carried over to Principal shall be entered in the Pass Books of the respective Depositors, duly initialled by the Paymaster and verified by the initials of the witnessing officer appointed under section four.

The total amount of interest added to Principal shall be credited in the Cash Account as a payment on account of interest and debited as a receipt on account of deposits and inserted in column 2 of the Abstract Account.

This regulation shall apply however only to new accounts in ships Commissioned on and after the 1st January, 1907, and to Depositors who, having opened such new accounts, may be subsequently transferred. Interest on accounts in ships Commissioned before that date, and on accounts transferred from such ships, shall be calculated at the rate of £3 15s. per centum per annum, but such interest is not to be added annually to Principal, and shall only be paid to the Depositor when the whole balance is withdrawn.

Bank Ledger.

23. A Ledger shall be kept by the Paymaster, and secured under lock and key, in which are to be entered the several sums debited or credited to the account of each Depositor.

Abstract Account.

24. The Paymaster shall keep an Abstract Account of the deposits, withdrawals, and transfers, and regularly post therein, in order of date, the totals of the respective lists, and also

the interest paid to Depositors. An extract from such Abstract Account shall be prepared monthly, showing the transactions and the particulars of transfers received from other Banks during the period, and forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy; if no transactions should take place during any such period, a "Nil" return is to be forwarded.

Entries in Pass Books and Ledger Accounts.

25. All amounts received (whether by transfer or in cash) during the first ten days of a month, shall be entered to the credit of the Depositor in his Pass Book on the day when received, but under date in the Ledger Account for Interest purposes, from the first day of that month, and all amounts received from the eleventh to the last day of the month (both inclusive) are to be entered in the Pass Book on the day when received, but under date in the Ledger for Interest purposes, from the first day of the succeeding month.

26. In like manner all amounts withdrawn during a month shall be entered in the Pass Book to the debit of a Depositor on the day when withdrawn, but under date in the Ledger for Interest purposes, from the first day of that month.

Transfers from Shore Banks.

27. Interest on an account transferred for investment from a Shore Bank to a Ship Bank shall be extended from the date to which the interest was calculated on the Transfer List, at the rate of £2 10s. per centum per annum, to the date when interest commences in the Ship Bank.

28. Where an amount to the credit of a Depositor in a Shore Bank is transferred to a Ship for payment the same shall be brought to account in column three of the Abstract Account as a transfer received, and in column four as a withdrawal. When the whole account is transferred the interest paid shall be shown in column seven; such amounts are not to be passed through the Savings Bank Ledger; the payment is to be shown on a withdrawal List, and the Transfer List received from the Shore Bank, shall be attached thereto as a voucher.

Interest on an amount transferred for payment shall also be extended at the rate of $\pounds 2$ 10s. per centum per annum, from the date to which interest was calculated on the Transfer List, to the last day of the month preceding that in which the payment is made.

Annual Schedule of Balances and Interest.

29. A Schedule shall be prepared from the Ledger, of the balances and interest due to each Depositor on the thirty-first March in each year and also the amounts of interest added to Principal on that date. The Schedule shall be prepared by the Paymaster and shall be signed by him and also by a Commissioned Officer (to be appointed by the Commanding Officer) who shall compare the amounts entered thereon with the amounts standing to each Depositor's credit in the Saving's Bank Ledger, and append a certicate that such comparison has been made. The Schedule shall be forwarded as soon as practicable afterwards, to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Supersession of Paymaster.

30. Whenever a Paymaster is superseded, he shall transmit to the Accountant-General of the Navy an Abstract Account for the whole period of his charge, in the same form as rendered when a Ship is paid off. The balance of such account shall be verified by comparison with a Scheduel to be prepared from the Savings Bank Ledger of the amounts due to the Depositors.

31. The preparation of this Schedule shall be superintended by a Commissioned Officer, to be appointed by the Commanding Officer; such Officer shall also require the production of the Depositors' Pass Books, and compare in each case the balance shown as due, with the amount standing to the Depositor's credit in his Pass Book, and in the Savings Bank Ledger, previously to signing the certificate at the foot of the Schedule, which is also to be forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Pay Off.

32. When a ship is paid off, all Depositors may have their Principal and Interest, or any part of the same :—

(1) Paid in cash by the Paymaster in the presence of the Commanding Officer, at the time the Crew are paid their wages.

(2) Remitted for payment at their own homes on Form S. 66.

(3) Transferred to a Receiving Ship or Naval Barracks or a Dockyard Bank (in the case of Seamen) or a Marine Bank (in the case of Marines) for payment.

(4) Transferred to a Dockyard Bank (in the case of continuous Service Seamen) or a Marine Bank (in the case of Marines) for the purpose of continuing the investment.

(5) Assigned for payment at the Admiralty Office.

(6) Transferred to the Accountant-General of the Navy for investment in a Post Office Savings Bank, on the distinct understanding however that it is not with a view of depositors shortly withdrawing the amounts so transferred.

33. The amounts remitted on Form S. 66 are first to be treated as withdrawals from the Bank, and entered in the Withdrawal List, the Paymaster crediting himself with the amounts.

34. In the case of a Ship paid off abroad, the account of any Depositor whose time is not expired, or who volunteers for the new commission, or for any other ship on the station, shall, subject to his general liberty of withdrawal and liberty of investment under the above provisions, be transferred to the Ship he joins.

35. When a Ship is ordered to be paid off, a notice shall be posted in some conspicuous place on board, calling the attention of Depositors to the several alternatives open to them.

36. After ascertaining the wishes of the Depositors the Paymaster shall close the Ledger Accounts, make out the requisite Transfer Lists, prepare the final Withdrawal List, and after insertion of the several transactions in the Abstract Account, balance the same, taking care that the total of principal in the final Withdrawal List agrees with the aggregate balance of the same appearing due in the Abstract Account.

37. The sums then due to Depositors, as scheduled in the final Withdrawal List for payment in cash, shall be paid in the presence of the Commanding Officer at the time the Ship's Company are paid their wages.

38. Should a Depositor fail to present himself to receive the amount due to him at the pay off, a Transfer List assigning the amount due for payment by the Accountant-General of the

Navy, shall be made out and transmitted with the final Withdrawal List.

39. The final Withdrawal List, the Abstract Account and the Ledger, with all other Savings Bank documents on board, shall then be sent to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Transfers to Post Office Savings Bank.

40. As regards transfers to the Post Office Savings Bank (which are to be effected for the purpose only of continuing the investment of Depositors' money), the Paymaster shall send to the Accountant-General of the Navy, a list of the amounts to be so invested, accompanied by a declaration from each Depositor in the form prescribed by the Postmaster-General.

Ledger Accounts.

41. All Depositors' accounts closed either by withdrawal or transfer, shall be removed from the Ledger and sent to the Accountant-General of the Navy, with the Withdrawal or Duplicate Transfer Lists in which the balances withdrawn or transferred respectively appear, observing that these directions do not apply to the final Withdrawal List, which is to be accompanied by the Ledger itself.

Deserters' Accounts.

42. Interest on the balance of deposits due to a deserter shall cease on the last day of the month preceding that in which the desertion occurs.

In the event of a deserter being subsequently recovered Interest on the balance of deposits due on his account shall recommence on the first day of the month following the date of recovery.

All unpaid accounts of Deserters shall be transferred at the close of the Commission to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Transfers to Admiralty.

43. When a Depositor's Account is assigned for payment at the Admiralty, the Transfer List shall be prepared in duplicate only, the original list being sent direct to the Accountant-General of the Navy and the Ship's copy being retained on board.

Home Station Ships having no Bank.

44. In Home Station Ships having no Bank on board (to which the foregoing Regulations do not apply) the following Rules shall be observed :---

(a) When Depositors' accounts are transferred for payment the Paymaster shall at the time of payment prepare a Withdrawal List, to which shall be appended a Certificate to be signed by him that the amounts have been duly paid. The payments shall be witnessed by a Commissioned Officer, to be appointed by the Commanding Officer, who shall initial the entries of the transactions in the Depositors' Pass Books. The signatures of the Depositors shall be obtained on the Withdrawal List as receipts for the amounts entered against their names.

(b) In any case where a Depositor's Pass Book cannot be produced, payment shall not

be made without authority from the Account ant-General of the Navy, to whom information of the circumstances shall be reported.

(c) The Withdrawal List is to be sent, with the Transfer Lists attached thereto, and the

Depositors' Pass Books, to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

(d) Should any Depositor whose account may be so transferred not apply for his money within two months after the receipt on board of the Transfer List, such list shall be forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy, with a notation of the circumstance thereon.

(e) In any case where it is known on board that a Depositor for whom a Transfer List has been received has proceeded to another ship, such Transfer List, or where several names are included in the same list, an extract from such list shall be forwarded to the ship which the man has joined.

(f) In any case where a Depositor applies for payment of his account, and a Transfer List for the same has not been received, information of the circumstances shall be reported to the Accountant-General of the Navy, who will issue an authority for payment, if practicable.

(g) In the event of the Admiralty portion or Ships (Triplicate) copy of a Transfer List being received on board, payment shall not be made, but the list in question shall be forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy with a report as to the circumstances of its receipt.

(b) Interest on an account transferred for payment is, where necessary, to be extended from the date to which the Interest was calculated on the Transfer List, to the last day of the month preceding the date of payment.

Cash Voucher.

45. A Voucher in which the amounts received and paid during a month shall be respectively shown, shall accompany the Paymaster's Cash Account.

Transaction not to appear in Pay Documents or Ship's Books.

46. No transaction arising out of the business of Naval Savings Banks shall be shown in any way in the Depositors' Pay Documents or the Ships' Books, but the records of the same shall be kept perfectly distinct and disconnected from all other accounts, excepting only the Paymaster's Cash Accounts, in which shall be debited and credited respectively the amounts deposited and withdrawn on board ship.

Mutual Benefit Societies.

47. The funds of Mutual Benefit Societies formed on board His Majesty's Ships may be invested in the Naval Savings Bank subject to the following rules :---

1. The Admiralty will in no way be responsible in regard to the management of the affairs of the Society, its stability or the distribution of its Funds.

2. Deposits will be received from a Society composed only of Petty Officers and Seamen of the Royal Navy, and Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates of the Royal Marines.

3. Such Society must be approved of by the Commanding Officer of the Ship, and have a duly elected Secretary or other responsible Officers and Committee, a list of whom shall be deposited in the hands of the Paymaster.

4. The Bank business connected with the Society will be transacted with the Secretary or other Officer direct, who with the Committee Society for the due administration of the Funds.

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5. An Account shall be opened in the Naval Savings Bank Ledger on board bearing the title of the Society, viz. :-- "Mutual Benefit Society of His Majesty's Ship ," in which shall be posted all receipts and payments in connection with the Society.

6. No amount less than one pound sterling nor any fractional part of a pound sterling shall be received into, or withdrawn from, the Bank on account of the Society.

7. This Trust Fund Account shall be kept entirely distinct from any personal Account of the Officer in whose name the deposits are made on behalf of the Society.

8. Withdrawals shall be made on written requisitions signed by two Members of the Committee, such requisitions shall contain a form of receipt for the amount withdrawn.

9. The receipts for the amounts withdrawn shall be signed by the Secretary or other representative officer.

10. Deposits and withdrawals are to be entered by the Paymaster in the ordinary Deposit and Withdrawai Lists (Forms S.475 and S.477) amongst those of other depositors, the title of the Society being inserted in the space provided for the depositor's name.

11. The authorities mentioned in Clause 8, under which payments are made to the Secretary or other representative Officer, are to be appended to the Withdrawal Lists as vouchers.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF NAVAL SAVINGS BANKS IN HIS MAJESTY'S DOCKYARDS.

(Articles 410 to 423, Cashier's Instructions.)

Naval Savings Banks.

1. Naval Savings Banks are established in His Majesty's Dockyards at Chatham, Sheerness, Portsmouth, and Devonport, for the receipt of deposits from seamen of the Royal Navy in pursuance of "The Naval Savings Bank Act, 1866," and Order in Council of the 2nd March, 1881.

The Cashier is regarded as the Manager of the Bank, and its general supervision is to be vested in the Superintendent.

Hours of Business.

2. The Bank is to be open for the receipt and withdrawal of deposits every day between the hours of 10 A.M. and 3 P.M., except on Saturdays, when it will close at noon. It will be closed on Sundays and public holidays, and on days when the yard is closed.

Minimum Deposit.

3. No sum less than one shilling is to be received, nor any fractional part of a shilling. Subject to this the Cashier is to receive from any person, other than a marine, entitled under the Act to be a depositor in a Naval Savings Bank, any sum of money tendered or remitted for deposit.

Depositor's Certificate. Form 573.

4. Every Depositor is to be furnished with an acknowledgment of his having opened an account, and this should be produced whenever he appears personally at the Bank, and previously will be answerable to the Members of the to any withdrawals under Article 8. If the account is opened by cash personally tendered, the acknowledgment is to be handed to him by the Cashier; if by means of allotment or remittance, it is to be transmitted to him through the Commanding Officer of his Ship. Deposits personally tendered and payments to the depositors direct from the Bank are to be entered on the Form of Acknowledgment, and such entries are to be verified by the initials of the Cashier.

Bank Ledgers. Form 584.

5. For each depositor an account is to be opened in the bank ledgers, in which all deposits and withdrawals are to be entered at the time of receipt or payment, and verified by the initials of the Cashier.

The ledgers are to be kept under lock and key in the custody of the Cashier.

Depositors may be allowed to inspect, and, should they request it, be furnished with statements of, their accounts.

Deposits, Allotments, and Remittances.

6. A seaman afloat may remit sums of not less than one pound through the paymaster of his ship for deposit in a Yard Bank. He may also make an allotment of his pay for investment in a Yard Bank. Where a deposit is made by allotment the requisite authority will be issued by the Accountant-General of the Navy.

The amounts allotted or remitted are to be regarded as transfer transactions only, to be taken credit for by the Cashier in his cash account as payments on account of allotments or remittances, and debited as receipts on account of Naval Savings Banks.

List of Allotments. Form 575.

The total amount credited in the depositors accounts each month on account of allotments is to be brought to account in one sum in the cash account, and the amount reported to the Accountant-General of the Navy on the prescribed form. A detailed list of the deposits made by allotment is to be transmitted quarterly to the Accountant-General of the Navy, showing the allotment number and the monthly credits in the depositor's account in respect of each allotment.

List of Deposits. Form 574.

7. The Cashier is to forward to the Accountant-General of the Navy, a list of amounts deposited each day in cash or by remittance, certifying that they have been credited in the depositor's accounts and debited in his cash account.

Withdrawals.

8. A depositor on applying at the bank within the prescribed hours, and producing the acknowledgment referred to in Article 4, and other evidence of his identity if deemed necessary, may withdraw the whole or any part of his deposits.

Depositors Afloat. Form S. 495.

A depositor may, while serving afloat and absent from the port, withdraw the whole or any part of his money on forwarding to the Cashier a request for the same, certified by the Commanding Officer of the ship in which he is serving (see Article 9); or payment of the whole or any portion of his money may be made to another person on the depositor's order, certified by his Commanding Officer.

Payment to Nominee. Form S: 494.

In the latter case the order for payment is to the whole or any portion of the amount deposited be prepared on board the depositor's ship in is repaid, or transferred under the preceding

duplicate, one copy to be forwarded to the Cashier, and the other to the payee.

Depositors on Leave. Form 576.

If a Depositor who is on leave at a distance from the port wishes to be paid the whole or a portion of his money, the Cashier is to forward to him a form of request for his signature before a magistrate, or other competent authority. Ou its return duly signed and attested, accompanied by the acknowledgment referred to in Article 4, the Cashier will remit the money. If, however, the Cashier should entertain any doubt of the applicant's title he is to make such further inquiry, and obtain such further evidence as he may deem requisite.

Re-Investment.

A Depositor withdrawing any sum cannot be permitted to re-invest it, or any part of it the same day.

Interest.

Accruing interest is only payable when the total amount deposited is withdrawn.

No fractional part of a shilling may be withdrawn, except when a depositor's account is closed, and the interest is paid. In the latter case no fractional part of a penny is to be paid.

Withdrawal List. Form 577.

At the close of each day upon which withdrawals take place, the Cashier is to total the Withdrawal List, and take credit for the total amount withdrawn in his cash account. The list is to be duly certified by himself, and forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy. The signatures on the list are to be attested by a witness. The authorities under which payments are made to depositors or to other persons by their order are to be appended to the list as vouchers.

Transfer of Account to Ship. Form S. 496. Transfer List. Form 578.

9. A depositor may have his money transferred to the ship to which he belongs for investment in the ship bank, or he may have the whole or a portion of his money transferred for payment on board. In either case the Cashier, on receipt of a request from the depositor, duly certified by the Commanding Officer of his ship, is to issue in duplicate a Transfer List for the amount, one copy to be sent to the Commanding Officer of the ship and the other to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

A similar course is to be pursued on the transfer of a depositor's account from one Dockyard Bank to another.

Transfer from Ship. Form 579.

A continuous Service Seaman who is a depositor in a ship, may, on being paid off, have bis account transferred to a Dockyard Bank. The Cashier is to forward to the Accountant-General of the Navy an abstract of such transfers at the end of every month.

Interest.

10. Interest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per centum per annum is to be allowed to depositors on every complete £1 deposited. Deposits made during the first ten days of each month are to bear interest from the first day of the month, and those made during the remainder of the month from the first day of the following month. When the whole or any portion of the amount deposited is repaid, or transferred under the oreceding Article, interest on the sum withdrawn is to cease with the last day of the month preceding that in which the payment or transfer is made.

Remittances.

As regards deposits by remittance, the date of the issue of the remittance list on board ship is to be taken as the date of the receipt of the deposits into the bank.

Accounts Transferred from Ships.

Interest on an account transferred from a ship commissioned before 1st January, 1907, or on an account transferred from a ship commissioned after 1st January, 1907, which had been transferred from a ship commissioned prior to that date is to be calculated at the rate of $3\frac{3}{4}$ per centum per annum (simple interest) to the date when interest commences in the Dockyard Bank.

Interest is to be computed to the 31st March in each year, and then so much of it as consists of entire pounds and shillings is to be added to the principal of each account, any fractional part of a shilling is to remain as interest to be added to that subsequently accruing. The total amount carried over to principal is to be taken credit for in the cash account as a payment on account of interest, and debited as a receipt on account of deposits, and inserted in column 2 of the Abstract Account (see Article 11).

Abstract Account. Form 580.

11. The Cashier is to keep an abstract account of the deposits, withdrawals and transfers, and post therein daily the totals of the respective lists, and also the interest paid to depositors.

The abstract account is to be balanced on the 31st March in each year and forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Schedule of Balances. Form 583.

12. On the 31st March in each year a schedule of the balances and interest due to depositors to that date is to be prepared, and forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy, with the abstract account. The Cashier is to append a certificate of its accuracy.

Closed Accounts.

13. All depositors' accounts, when closed by the withdrawal or transfer of their entire balances, are to be removed from the ledger and sent to the Accountant-General of the Navy, with the Withdrawal or Transfer Lists.

With a view to closing old accounts the ledgers are to be frequently inspected, and application is to be made to the Accountant-General of the Navy for the addresses of depositors whose accounts show no transactions over a period of two years. The wishes of such depositors in regard to their accounts are to be ascertained.

Death, Promotion, or Desertion of Depositor.

On receipt of information of the death, discharge, promotion to warrant rank, or desertion of a depositor, his account is to be closed and transferred to the Accountant-General of the Navy and no further interest shall accrue from the date of such discharge, etc.

Correspondence.

14. All communications of a routine nature from the Accountant-General of the Navy relative to Naval Savings Bank business will be addressed direct to the Cashier.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF NAVAL SAVING'S BANKS AT THE ROYAL MARINE DIVISIONS.

Naval Savings Banks.

1. Naval savings banks are established in each Division at Chatham, Eastney, Forton, and Plymouth for the receipt of deposits from Warrant or Non-Commissioned Officers and men of the Royal Marines, serving at Headquarters or borne on the books of any of His Majesty's Ships, in pursuance of "The Naval Savings Bank Act, 1866," and Order in Council of the 10th March, 1882.

The Paymaster is regarded as the manager of the bank, and its general supervision is to be vested in the Colonel Commandant.

Hours of Business.

2. The bank is to be open for the receipt and withdrawal of deposits every day between such hours as the Colonel Commandant shall appoint. The bank will be closed on Sundays.

Minimum Deposit.

3. No sum less than one shilling is to be received, nor any fractional part of a shilling. Subject to this, the Paymaster is to receive any sum of money tendered or remitted for deposit.

Depositor's Certificate. Form R. 338.

4. Every depositor is to be furnished with an acknowledgment of his having opened an account, and this should be produced whenever he appears personally at the bank, and previous to any withdrawals under Article 8. If the account is opened by cash personally tendered, the acknowledgment is to be handed to him by the Paymaster; if by means of allotment or remittances, it is to be transmitted by the Paymaster of his ship. Deposits personally tendered and payments to the depositors direct from the Bank are to be entered on the Form of acknowledgment, and such entries are to be verified by the initials of the Paymaster.

Bank Ledgers.

5. For each depositor an account is to be opened in the bank ledgers in which all deposits and withdrawals are to be entered at the time of receipt or payment, and verified by the initials of the Paymaster.

The Ledgers are to be kept under lock and key in the custody of the Paymaster.

Depositors may be allowed to inspect, and, should they request it, be furnished with statements of, their accounts.

Allotments and Remittances.

6. A marine afloat may remit sums of not less than one pound through the Paymaster of his ship for deposit in a Divisional Bank. He may also make an allotment of his pay for investment in a Divisional Bank.

Where a deposit is made by allotment the requisite authority will be issued by the Accountant-General of the Navy.

The amounts allotted or remitted are to be regarded as transfer transactions only, to be taken credit for by the Paymaster in his cash account as payments on account of allotments or remittances, and debited as receipts on account of Naval Savings Banks. 7210

List of Deposits. Form R. 330.

7. The Paymaster is to forward to the Accountant-General of the Navy a list of amounts deposited each day in cash or by remittance, certifying that they have been credited in the depositors' accounts and debited in his cash account.

List of Allotments. Form R. 330A.

The total amount credited in the depositors' accounts each month on account of allotments is to be brought to account in one sum in the cash account and the amount reported to the Accountant-General of the Navy on the prescribed form. A detailed list of the deposits made by allotment is to be transmitted quarterly to the Accountant-General of the Navy showing the allotment number and the monthly credit in the depositor's account in respect of each allotment.

Withdrawals.

8. A depositor on applying at the bank within the prescribed hours, and producing the acknowledgment referred to in Article 4, and other evidence of his identity, if deemed necessary, may withdraw the whole or any part of his deposits.

Depositors Afloat. Form S. 499.

A depositor may while serving afloat, and absent from the Division, withdraw the whole or any part of his money on forwarding to the Divisional Paymaster a request for the same, certified by the Commanding Officer of the ship on which he is serving; or payment of the whole or any portion of his money may be made to another person on the depositor's order, certified by his Commanding Officer.

Payment to Nominee. Form S. 498.

In the latter case, the order for payment is to be prepared on board the depositor's ship in duplicate, one copy to be forwarded to the Divisional Paymaster, and the other to the payee.

Depositors on Leave. Form R. 340.

If a depositor who is on leave at a distance from the Division wishes to be paid the whole or a portion of his money, the Divisional Paymaster is to forward to him a form of request for his signature before a magistrate, or other competent authority. On its return duly signed and attested, accompanied by the acknowledgment referred to in Article 4, the Divisional Paymaster will remit the money. If, however, the Paymaster should entertain any doubt of the applicant's title, he is to make such further inquiry, and obtain such further evidence as he may deem requisite.

Re-investment.

A depositor withdrawing any sum cannot be permitted to re-invest it, or any part of it, the same day.

Interest.

Accruing interest is only payable when the total amount deposited is withdrawn.

No fractional part of a shilling may be withdrawn, except when a depositor's account is closed, and the interest is paid. In the latter case, no fractional part of a penny is to be paid.

Withdrawal List. R. 331.

At the close of each day upon which withdrawals take place, the Paymaster is to total the

Withdrawal List, and take credit for the total amount withdrawn in his cash account. The list is to be duly certified by himself, verified by a witness, and forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy. The authorities under which payments are made to depositors, or to other persons by their order, are to be appended to the list as vouchers.

Transfer of Account to Ship. Form S. 499.

Transfer List. Form R. 334.

9. A depositor may have his money transferred to the ship to which he belongs for investment in the ship bank, or he may have the whole or a portion of his money transferred for payment on board. In either case, the Divisioual Paymaster, on receipt of a request from the depositor, duly certified by the Commanding Officer of his ship, is to issue in duplicate a Transfer List for the amount, one copy to be sent to the Commanding Officer of the ship, and the other to the Accountant-General of the Navy. A similar course is to be pursued on the transfer of a depositor's account from one Divisional Bank to another.

Transfer from Ship. Form R. 335.

The account of a depositor in a ship may, when the ship is paid off, be transferred to the bank at his division. The Divisional Paymaster is to forward at the end of every month to the Accountant-General of the Navy an abstract of such transfers.

Interest.

10. Interest at the rate of £2 10s. per centum per annum is to be allowed to depositors on every complete pound deposited. Deposits made during the first ten days of each month are to bear interest from the first day of the month, and those made during the remainder of the month from the first day of the following month. When the whole or any portion of the amount deposited is repaid, or transferred under the preceding article interest on the sum withdrawn is to cease with the last day of the month preceding that in which the payment is made.

Remittances.

As regards deposits by remittance, the date of the issue of the remittance list on board ship is to be taken as the date of the receipt of the deposits into the bank.

Interest is to be computed to the thirty-first March in each year, and then so much of it as consists of entire pounds and shillings is to be added to the principal of each account; any fractional part of a shilling is to remain as interest to be added to that subsequently accruing. The total amount carried over to principal is to be taken credit for in the cash account as a payment on account of interest, and debited as a receipt on account of deposits, and inserted in column two of the Abstract Account.

Accounts Transferred from Ships.

Interest on an account transferred from a ship commissioned before first January, one thousand nine hundred and seven, or on an account transferred from a ship commissioned after first January, one thousand nine hundred and seven, which had been transferred from a ship commissioned prior to that date is to be calculated at the rate of £3 15s. per centum per annum (simple interest) to the date when interest commences in the Divisional Bank.

Abstract Account. Form R. 336.

11. The Paymaster is to keep an abstract account of the deposits, withdrawals, and transfers, and post therein daily the totals of the respective lists, and also the interest paid to depositors.

The abstract account is to be balanced on the thirty-first March in each year and forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy.

Schedule of Balances. Form R. 337.

12. Within a week after the thirty-first March in each year, a schedule of the balances and interest due to depositors to that date, is to be prepared and forwarded to the Accountant-General of the Navy with the abstract account. The Examiner of Accounts is to append a certificate of its accuracy.

Closed Accounts.

13. All depositors' accounts, when closed by the withdrawal or transfer of their entire balances, are to be removed from the ledger and sent to the Accountant-General of the Navy, with the Withdrawal or Transfer Lists.

With a view to the closing of old accounts the ledgers are to be frequently inspected, and in cases where accounts show no transactions over a period of two years, the wishes of the depositors in regard to their accounts are to be ascertained.

Death, Promotion, or Desertion of a Depositor.

On receipt of information of the death, discharge, promotion beyond the rank of warrant or non-commissioned officers, or desertion of a depositor his account is to be closed and transferred to the Accountant-General of the Navy, and no further interest shall accrue from the date of such discharge, &c.

14. The Savings Bank Clerks employed at the several Divisions of Head-Quarters of the Royal Marines, according to the number of the accounts open in the respective Banks during each month, shall be paid as follows:—

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said section eight of the Medical Act, 1886, their Lordships have made the regulations contained in the schedule to this Order, and do hereby order and direct that all elections of direct representatives shall be conducted in accordance with the said regulations.

SCHEDULE.

Regulations for the conduct of Elections under section eight of the Medical Act, 1886.

1. The returning officer shall fix the last day on which nomination papers are to be sent in, and at least fourteen days before the day so fixed shall cause a notice of the election to be published, specifying the number of persons to be elected, the place where the nomination papers are to be sent in, and the last day on which they are to be sent in.

The notice shall be published in two or more newspapers circulating in the part of the United Kingdom in which the election is to be held, and shall be, as nearly as may be, in the form marked A in the appendix to these regulations, or to the like effect.

2. Before the last day fixed for the sending in of nomination papers, the returning officer shall issue his precept to the branch council for that part of the United Kingdom in which the election is to be held requiring the said branch council to cause a representative or representatives to be elected by the registered medical practitioners resident in that part of the United Kingdom within twenty-one days after the receipt of the said precept.

The said precept shall be as nearly as may be in the form marked B in the appendix to these regulations, or to the like effect, and shall be sent, by post or otherwise, to the registrar of the said branch council.

3. Each candidate for election shall be nominated by a separate nomination paper signed by not fewer than twelve registered medical practitioners resident in that part of the United Kingdom in which the election is to be held.

4. Every nomination paper shall state the name, registered address, and registered qualification or qualifications of the person nominated, and also the registered addresses and registered qualifications of the persons signing such paper, and shall be, as nearly as may be, in the form marked C in the appendix to these regulations, or to the like effect.

5. Any person entitled to vote at the election may sign the nomination paper of a candidate or of any number of candidates not exceeding the number to be elected.

6. Every nomination paper shall, on or before the last day fixed for the sending in of nomination papers be delivered by post or otherwise at the appointed place, and shall be accompanied by a declaration in writing signed by the person nominated, acknowledging, that such person consents to be nominated. Every nomination paper in respect of which any requirement of these regulations has not been complied with, or which is not received at the appointed place on or before the last day fixed for the sending in of nomination papers, shall be invalid.

7. If the number of persons so nominated as aforesaid does not exceed the number to be elected, such persons (if duly qualified) shall be deemed to be elected, and shall be so certified in writing by the branch council to the returning officer.

8. If the number so nominated exceeds the number to be elected, the branch council for the part of the United Kingdom in which the election is to be held shall cause voting papers and identification envelopes to be prepared. Voting papers shall contain the names, registered addresses, and registered qualification or qualifications of all the persons nominated, and state the last day on which voting papers may be returned, and the place to which they are to be returned, and the identification envelope shall bear a declaration of identity.

Voting papers and identification envelopes shall be as nearly as may be in the form marked D and E in the appendix to these regulations, or to the like effect.

9. The branch council shall, seven days at least before the last day fixed for the return of voting papers, cause a voting paper to be forwarded by post to each registered medical practitioner resident in the part of the United Kingdom in which the election is held, at his registered address, together with an identification envelope. Each voter shall be entitled to receive one voting paper and no more; and votes shall not be given except upon the voting papers provided by the branch council.

10. Each voter shall mark the voting paper delivered to him with a cross \times against the name or names of the person or persons (not exceeding the number of persons to be elected) for whom he intends to vote, and shall place his voting paper folded face inwards in the identification envelope and securely fasten the same. The voter shall sign the declaration printed on the said envelope, place it inside a covering envelope and seud it by post to the appointed place on or before the last day fixed for the return of voting papers. Every voting paper in respect of which any requirement of these regulations has not been complied with, or on which the voter has placed any mark whereby he may be afterwards identified, or which is not received at the appointed place on or before the last day fixed for the return of voting papers, shall be invalid.

11. The branch council, immediately after the last day fixed for the return of voting papers, shall cause the validity of the votes to be ascertained by an examination of the identification envelopes, and by such other evidence (if any) as they may think necessary, and shall cause such of the identification envelopes as are found to be valid to be opened and the voting papers withdrawn, kept folded face inwards, and placed in a bailot box. When all the voting papers have been transferred to the ballot box they shall be examined and counted, and the number of valid votes given for each candidate ascertained. Any candidate or his agent appointed by him to represent him may be present during the examination of the identification envelopes and the counting of the voting papers.

12. The candidate or the candidates to the number to be elected, who being duly qualified has or have received the greatest number of votes, shall be deemed to be elected, and shall be so certified in writing by the branch council to the returning officer. If an equality of votes is found to exist between any of the candidates, and the addition of a vote would entitle any of such candidates to be declared elected, the branch council shall determine by lot which of the candidates whose votes are equal shall be certified as duly elected.
