May it please Your Majesties.

We, Your Majesties' most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of King's Lynn, in the county of Norfolk, humbly beg leave to approach Your Majesties, and to offer to Your Majesties a respectful and heartfelt welcome to our ancient Borough.

We recall with sincere pleasure the previous occasions on which Your Majesties (when Prince and Princess of Wales) visited our Borough, and we gladly renew on this occasion the assurance of our devoted loyalty and dutiful attachment to

Your Majesties.

We are exceedingly grateful for the distinguished honour you are so graciously conferring on us by again visiting our ancient Borough, and we rejoice that this visit should be associated with the inauguration of an Institution which will so greatly increase the educational facilities

of the town and district.
We earnestly pray that Your Majesties may long continue to reign over Your devoted subjects, and that Your vast Empire may ever enjoy the great blessings of peace and prosperity.
