To this end, the Sieur Kien is sent to Zealand, and other Deputies to the rest of the Provinces, to press the immediate paying in their Quota's, to these Treaties with Denmark, Brandenburgh, and Lunenburgh; the sorces of which last, we have agreed to receive into our pay for the next eight moneths, from the surface of January last.

Constantinople, Dec. 24.
