WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Commission, dated the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, in His Majesty's absence from His Realm in foreign parts, to hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His approval of any matter or thing whereunto His Royal Highness should be so authorized by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, and to do further on His Majesty's behalf any matter or thing for the purposes of the said Commission whereunto His Royal Highness should be authorized in manner aforesaid :

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the Second Session of Parliament, held in the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter twenty-six, sections one and two, have duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the seventh day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say ;

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the Second Session of Parliament, held in the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter twenty-six, sections one and two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for relieving the Bishop of Ely of one of the houses of residence belonging to the See.

"Whereas there are two houses of residence belonging to the See of Ely, the one situate at

Ely, in the county of Cambridge, and the other in Dover-street, in the city of Westminster.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, that the said house of residence situate in Dover-street, in the city of Westminster, and known as Ely House, is unnecessary.

"And whereas under the circumstances hereinbefore set forth it appears to us to be expedient that the said Bishop should be relieved of the said house of residence known as Ely House, and that a sale thereof with the appurtenances thereto belonging should be effected in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, testified by his having signed this scheme and affixed hereto his episcopal seal, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose as follows, that is to say :—

"That the said Bishop be authorized and empowered to sell for such price or prices and at such time or times and in such manner as shall be approved by us, and to transfer and convey to any purchaser or purchasers by an assurance or assurances to be made in manner and form approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners under our Common Seal, the whole estate, right, title, and interest of him the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, and of his successors, of in and to the said house of residence known as Ely House with the appurtenances thereto belonging, and that all moneys received by or on account of the said house of residence and the appurtenances thereto belonging or of any part thereof, except such sum as the purchaser shall pay to the Bishop for tenant's fixtures, shall be by him the said Bishop paid over to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and shall be held by us and shall be applied by the said Bishop for the purposes and in the manner next hereinafter mentioned, but with and subject to our approval, and at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, that is to say,

firstly, in defraying all costs, charges and expenses of and incident to the sale of the said Episcopal residence known as Ely House, and secondly, in applying the remainder of the said moneys to such purposes agreed upon between us and the Bishop of Ely for the time being as may be sanctioned by and in conformity with the provisions of any Act of Parliament which may hereafter be passed in relation to the matter.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved at the Council held under the authority of the said Commission; now, therefore, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, being authorized in that behalf by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on behalf of His Majesty, ratify the said scheme, and order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and further on His Majesty's behalf, by and with the like advice, doth hereby direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ely.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Commission dated the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, in His Majesty's absence from His Realm in foreign parts, to hold on His Majesty's behalf, His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His approval of any matter or thing whereunto His Royal Highness should be so authorized by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, and to do further on His Majesty's behalf any matter or thing for the purposes of the said Commission whereunto His Royal Highness should be authorized in manner aforesaid:

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the twenty-first day of February, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late

Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport, in the county of Chester, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-third day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and published in the London Gazette on the third day of the following month, a certain part of the parish of Saint Thomas, Stockport, in the said county of Chester, and in the said diocese of Chester, was constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and such district was named 'The District of Saint Matthew, Stockport.'

"And whereas the said district of Saint Matthew, Stockport, has become a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport, shall be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis John, Bishop of Chester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport, shall be altered so that all that portion of the parish of Cheadle, in the said county of Chester, and in the said diocese of Chester, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dis severed from such parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport, in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Cheadle, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon the west and upon the north by the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south, by an imaginary

line commencing at the point in the middle of the line of the London and North Western Railway where the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport, the said parish of Cheadle and the parish of Saint Thomas, Stockport, in the said county and diocese, all meet, and extending thence first southward, then south-westward and then westward along the middle of the Warrington and Stockport Line of the said London and North Western Railway for a distance of one mile or thereabouts to the point where the said Warrington and Stockport Line of railway is crossed by the boundary which divides the said parish of Cheadle from the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Stockport."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved at the Council held under the authority of the said Commission: now, therefore, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, being authorized in that behalf by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on behalf of His Majesty, ratify the said scheme or representation, and order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales doth further, on His Majesty's behalf, by and with the like advice, direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Commission dated the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, in His Majesty's absence from His Realm in Foreign Parts, to hold on His Majesty's behalf, His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His approval of any matter or thing whereunto His Royal Highness should be so authorized by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, and to do further on His Majesty's behalf any matter or thing for the purposes of the said Commission whereunto His Royal Highness should be authorized in manner aforesaid:

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth

and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of February, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mark, situate at Washwood Heath, in the new parish (sometime district) of Saltley in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Birmingham.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mark, situate at Washwood Heath as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Birmingham (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saltley which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Mark, situate at Washwood Heath as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Washwood Heath.'

"And with the like consent of the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Birmingham (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Mark, situate at Washwood Heath as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Washwood Heath, being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometime district) of Saltley, in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Birmingham, which is bounded upon the east by the new parish of Saint Margaret, Ward End, upon the north by the new parish of Erdington, upon part of the

west by the new parish of Saint Clement, Nechells, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the west and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Clement, Nechells, from the said new parish of Saltley at the centre of the bridge which carries Aston Church-road across the Birmingham and Warwick Junction Canal, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Aston Church-road for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Arley-road and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward along the middle of Arley-road for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Washwood Heath-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Washwood Heath-road for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Havelock-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Havelock-road for a distance of twenty-eight chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Highfield-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Highfield-road for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Alum Rock-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Alum Rock-road, for a distance of thirty-seven chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saltley from the said new parish of Saint Margaret, Ward End."

And whereas the said representation has been approved at the Council held under the authority of the said Commission; now, therefore, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, being authorized in that behalf by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on behalf of His Majesty, ratify the said representation, and order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales doth further, on His Majesty's behalf, by and with the like advice, direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Birmingham.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Commission dated the fifth day of *March*, one thousand nine hundred and seven, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, in His Majesty's absence from His Realm in foreign parts, to hold on His Majesty's behalf, His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His approval of any matter or thing whereunto His Royal Highness should be so authorized by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, and to do further on His Majesty's

behalf any matter or thing for the purposes of the said Commission whereunto His Royal Highness should be authorized in manner aforesaid:

And whereas by section twenty-one of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that, "Whereas from the increase of population, or from other circumstances, it may be expedient that two or more benefices which have been heretofore united or which may be hereafter united under the provisions of this Act should be disunited," it is amongst other things enacted, "That when two or more benefices shall have been united, or may be hereafter united into one benefice, and with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the province, or the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop of the province, that one or more of the benefices within his diocese, of which such united benefice shall consist, may be separated therefrom with advantage to the interests of religion, the said Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances of the case, and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully dissolved, so far as respects such benefice or benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before certifying such inquiry to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in all other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church or in some public and conspicuous place in each of the benefices forming part of the united benefice, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her, or their hands to the said Archbishop against any such disunion; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent, when the patron's consent is necessary, to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty to issue an Order for separating such last mentioned benefice or benefices from such united benefice, and, for declaring the rights of patronage of the several patrons, if there be more than one patron, and such Order shall be registered in the Registry of the diocese to which such united benefice shall belong, which Order the Registrar of such diocese, immediately on the receipt thereof is hereby required to register accordingly, and thereupon immediately if such united benefice shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or benefices so proposed to be separated from such united benefice, but in all other respects shall remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward such last mentioned benefice or benefices shall be and be deemed and taken to be a separate and distinct benefice or benefices to all intents and purposes whatever as if no such union had taken place, and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may according to the terms of such Order present or nominate thereto respectively, and so from time to time upon each and every avoidance of the same: Provided always, that no benefices which have been united for more than sixty years before the passing of this Act shall be disunited without the consent in writing of the patron or patrons thereof."

And whereas by section twenty-three of the aforesaid Act it is further enacted "That whenever two or more benefices which have at any

"time been united into one benefice shall be dis-united and become separate benefices under the provisions of this Act, whether the Order for disunion shall extend to the whole number of benefices of which such united benefice consisted or to one or more of such benefices only, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, on the recommendation of the Archbishop of the province, with the consent of the patron or patrons of such benefices respectively (such consent to be signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons) to assign and attach such portion of the glebe lands, tithes, moduses, rent charges or other endowments or emoluments belonging to or arising or accruing within the limits of such united benefice to each of such benefices respectively as to His Majesty in Council shall seem fit, notwithstanding such proportion of glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, moduses or other endowments or emoluments, or any part thereof, may not arise or accrue within the limits of the benefice to which the same shall be so assigned and attached as aforesaid, or may not have belonged thereto, and also to divide and apportion between such benefices all such charges and outgoings as before the disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole united benefice."

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, hath represented in a writing, dated the seventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred and six, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:—

"I, Edward, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, do hereby represent to your Grace that it appears to me that the disunion of the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Little Carlton and the rectory of Castle Carlton in the county and diocese of Lincoln by the separation of the rectory of Castle Carlton from the rectory of Little Carlton may be made with advantage to the interests of religion.

And whereas, on the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and six, the said Archbishop inquired into the circumstances of the case.

And whereas, on the twenty-sixth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and six, the said Archbishop certified to His Majesty in Council as follows, that is to say:—

"We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Edward, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, as Bishop of the diocese in which is situate the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Little Carlton and the rectory of Castle Carlton in the county and diocese of Lincoln having represented unto us that the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the rectory of Castle Carlton from the rectory of Little Carlton may be made with advantage to the interests of religion we inquired into the circumstances of the case

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might usefully be dissolved.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry to Your Majesty in Council, we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of Little Carlton and to be also placed on the usual place for public notices in the parish of Castle Carlton, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she or they might

within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such disunion and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln, our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, and the copies of the representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the rectory of Castle Carlton from the rectory of Little Carlton so as to constitute each of them a separate benefice for cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only and in accordance with the statement of circumstances above referred to; we recommend that each benefice shall retain its own endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and outgoings so nevertheless that the residence house of the united benefice situate at Little Carlton shall be the residence house of the rectory of Little Carlton after the said disunion is effected.

"Randall Cantuar."

Now, therefore, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, being authorized in that behalf by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on behalf of His Majesty, order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said united benefice consisting of the rectory of Little Carlton and the rectory of Castle Carlton, situate in the county and diocese of Lincoln, shall be disunited by separating the said rectory of Castle Carlton from the said rectory of Little Carlton.

And His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, being authorized as aforesaid, doth hereby, by and with the like advice, on His Majesty's behalf, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop with the consent of the patrons, direct that each of the said benefices respectively shall retain its own original endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and outgoings so nevertheless that the residence house of the united benefice situate at Little Carlton aforesaid shall be the residence house of the rectory of Little Carlton after the disunion of the said benefices.

COLCHESTER AND DISTRICT (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1907.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Restrictions in Scheduled Area.

1. The provisions of the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 shall in their application to the Infected Area described in the Schedule hereto be modified in manner declared by this Order.

Markets Fairs Sales and Exhibitions of Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

2.—(1.) The Local Authority may grant a Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition of swine in the Infected Area if they are satisfied that the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held in a market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition which is capable of being thoroughly cleansed and disinfected, and thereupon the market fair sale or exhibition may be held accordingly.

(2.) A Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall specify the name and address of the person licensed to hold the market fair sale or exhibition (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall also specify the place where the market fair sale or exhibition is to be held, and may authorise the holding

of periodical markets fairs sales or exhibitions on stated days for a time limited, not exceeding three months, but the Licence may be renewed from time to time or revoked at any time by the Local Authority.

(3.) A Licence shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to ensure publicity for the same, and a copy of the Licence shall be posted and kept posted during the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition by the person licensed to hold or holding the same at or near the gate or other entrance of the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition where such market fair sale or exhibition is held.

(4.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every Licence granted by them for the holding of a market fair sale or exhibition under this Article.

(5.) A fit person or a sufficient number of fit persons shall be appointed by the Local Authority and named in the Licence for the purpose of receiving Licences authorising movement of swine to the market fair sale or exhibition, and for granting Licences for movement of swine therefrom in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

(6.) No swine shall be moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare into a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Article unless accompanied by a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902 or this Order.

Licences for Movement out of Licensed Markets, &c., only to bacon factory or slaughterhouse.

3.—(1.) Swine exposed at a market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order may be moved from the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition along over or across a highway or thoroughfare in an Infected Area if accompanied by a Licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fair, saleyard, or exhibition is situate, and only to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the Licence, where the swine after their arrival shall be detained until they are slaughtered.

(2.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days inclusive of the day of issue.

(3.) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay.

(4.) A copy of a Licence for movement from a market, fair, saleyard, or exhibition, shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the Local Authority of the District in which is situate the bacon factory or slaughterhouse specified in the Licence.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

4.—(1.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to a market fair sale or exhibition in an Infected Area, the Licence shall be delivered up at the entrance to the market fair-ground sale-yard or place of exhibition by the person in charge of the swine to the person appointed under this Order to receive the same.

(2.) Where swine are moved with a Licence under the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1902, or this Order, to any other premises in an Infected Area, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station by

the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing the said movement.

Attendance at Markets, &c.

5. A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend at every market fair sale or exhibition licensed under this Order.

Revocation by Board of Licences.

6. If the Board are of opinion, with respect to any Licence for a market fair sale or exhibition under this Order, that the holding of such market fair sale or exhibition thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the Licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

7.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

8. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

9.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a Licence, as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

10. In this Order—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries;

“Infected Area” means an area declared by Special Order of the Board to be a Swine-Fever Infected Area;

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

11. This Order shall come into operation on the third day of April, nineteen hundred and seven.

12. This Order may be cited as the COLCHESTER AND DISTRICT (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1907.

Declaration of Sheep-Scab Compulsory Dipping Area.

1.—(1.) The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be a Compulsory Dipping Area for the purposes of the Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Order of 1906, hereinafter referred to as the "principal Order."

(2.) Where any farm or holding is situate partly within and partly without the Compulsory Dipping Area, the principal Order shall apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the Compulsory Dipping Area, except that where the farm or holding is partly in the said Dipping Area and partly in an adjoining Compulsory Dipping Area the said Order shall apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the adjoining Area.

Period for Compulsory Dipping.

2. The dates between which all sheep in the Compulsory Dipping Area hereby declared are to be treated by the owner for sheep-scab by effective dipping under Article 2 of the principal Order are hereby fixed to be the fifteenth day of August and the first day of October in every year.

Modification of the Principal Order.

3. Article 2 (Compulsory Dipping of all Sheep in Compulsory Dipping Area) of the Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Order of 1906, shall not as regards the Area described in the Schedule hereto apply to sheep for which an exemption has been obtained from the Local Authority of the District, which exemption shall only be granted for sheep which for the purposes of sale,

exhibition or movement shall have been dipped under and in accordance with the provisions of the principal Order on or since the eighteenth day of July in the current year, and have since such dipping been kept separate from sheep not dipped in the manner prescribed by the principal Order. The sheep thus exempted shall until the expiration of the prescribed dipping period be kept separate from sheep which have not been dipped in the manner prescribed by the principal Order. Every exemption shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority and shall be subject to any conditions specified in the exemption. A copy of every exemption shall be sent to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries. This modification does not alter the effect of Part II of the principal Order (*Regulation of Exposure and Movement of Sheep in Compulsory Dipping Areas*).

Provision for Movement through Compulsory Dipping Area.

4. Article 5 of the Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Order of 1906 shall not apply to sheep which are moved out of an adjoining Compulsory Dipping Area with the Licence necessary for such purpose if the sheep are intended to be moved to a place outside the Dipping Area declared by this Order.

Modification of Sheep-Dipping (Wales and Monmouth) Order of 1907.

5. From and after the commencement of this Order, the Sheep-Dipping (Wales and Monmouth) Order of 1907 shall cease to apply to the Area hereby declared to be a Compulsory Dipping Area.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, nineteen hundred and seven.

Short Title.

7. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP-SCAB (WELSH COMPULSORY DIPPING AREA) No. 2 ORDER OF 1907.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Declaration of Sheep-Scab Compulsory Dipping Area.

1. The Area described in the First Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be a Compulsory Dipping Area for the purposes of the Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Order of 1906, hereinafter referred to as the "principal Order."

Period for Compulsory Dipping.

2. The dates between which all sheep in the Compulsory Dipping Area hereby declared are to be treated by the owner for sheep-scab by effective dipping under Article 2 of the principal Order are hereby fixed to be the first day of September and the fifteenth day of October in every year.

Modification of the Principal Order.

3. Article 2 (*Compulsory Dipping of all Sheep in Compulsory Dipping Area*) of the Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Order of 1906, shall not as regards the Area described in the First Schedule hereto apply to sheep for which an exemption has been obtained from the Local Authority of the District, which exemption shall only be granted for sheep which for the purposes of sale, exhibition or movement shall have been dipped under and in accordance with the provisions of the principal Order on or since the fourth day of August in the current year, and have since such dipping been kept separate from sheep not dipped in the manner prescribed by the principal Order. The sheep thus exempted shall until the expiration of the prescribed dipping period be kept separate from sheep which have not been

dipped in the manner prescribed by the principal Order. Every exemption shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority and shall be subject to any conditions specified in the exemption. A copy of every exemption shall be sent to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries. This modification does not alter the effect of Part II of the principal Order (*Regulation of Exposure and Movement of Sheep in Compulsory Dipping Areas*).

Modification of Sheep-Dipping (Wales and Monmouth) Order of 1907.

4.—(1.) From and after the commencement of this Order, the Sheep-Dipping (Wales and Monmouth) Order of 1907, shall cease to apply to any part of the Area hereby declared to be a Compulsory Dipping Area.

(2.) For the purposes of the Sheep-Dipping (Wales and Monmouth) Order of 1907 sheep landed in the Dipping Area declared by this Order shall be treated as sheep landed in the Dipping Area to which the first-mentioned Order applies.

Revocation of Order.

5. The Order described in the Second Schedule to this Order is hereby revoked.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, nineteen hundred and seven.

Short Title.

7. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP-SCAB (WELSH COMPULSORY DIPPING AREA) No. 1 ORDER OF 1907.
