WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-first day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and

fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Luke, Halliwell, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

“Whereas we are satisfied that the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell, is a cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell, which is hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purpose of Divine worship.

“And whereas a sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England towards the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and so soon as such district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act then of the said new parish and towards the maintenance of the Minister or Incumbent thereof for the time being and we have in respect of such sum agreed

and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August and the first day of November in each year to such Minister or Incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the lastly mentioned Act the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said capital sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that we should grant out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act a capital sum of seven hundred pounds sterling in respect of which there should be paid by us to the Minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as before mentioned a yearly sum of twenty-one pounds, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said intended district and of the nomination of the Incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said grant of seven hundred pounds sterling will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas the contributors of the major part of the said sum of four thousand three hundred pounds have nominated the Reverend Henry Henn, Vicar of Bolton-le-Moors, in the said county and diocese, and an honorary Canon of the Cathedral Church of Manchester, the Reverend James Harries Gibbon, Vicar of Saint Luke, Halliwell, in the said county and diocese, Edward Thwaites, of Halliwell Hall, Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid, Bleacher; Percy Musgrave, of Brooklands, Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid, Cotton Spinner; and Frederick Walmsley, of Number 285, Chorley Old-road, Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid, Accountant, as the persons to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall be assigned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbutnott, Bishop of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Margaret, Halliwell.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when

such district shall have become a new parish then of such new parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereto, shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Henry Henn, James Harries Gibbon, Edward Thwaites, Percy Musgrave, and Frederick Walmsley, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Margaret, Halliwell, being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Luke, Halliwell, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which is bounded upon the south by the new parish of Saint Paul, Bolton-le-Moors, upon the south-west and upon the west by the district chapelry of Christ Church, Heaton, upon the north and upon part of the north-east by the new parish of Saint Peter, Halliwell, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the north-east, and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, Halliwell, from the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell, at the junction of Bennett's-lane with Chorley Old-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Chorley Old-road, for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Mornington-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Mornington-road for a distance of fourteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Musgrave-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Musgrave-road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Victory-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Victory-street for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Beverley-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Beverley-road for a distance of two chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction with Lincoln-road, and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of Lincoln-road for a distance of four chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Musgrave-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Musgrave-road for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Kirkhall-lane, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Kirkhall-lane for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern end of the wall forming the eastern boundary of the grounds belonging to the house known as Westwood, and extending thence southward to and along the said boundary wall for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its southern end on the northern side of Chorley New-road, and extending thence southward in a straight line for a distance of

twelve yards or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Chorley New-road, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell, from the said new parish of Saint Paul, Bolton-le-Moors."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Luke, Halliwell, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas three of the Patrons and the Incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas one calendar month has expired since the date of the transmission of such drafts as aforesaid.

And whereas the remaining two Patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish have offered certain objections to the same scheme.

And whereas notwithstanding these objections the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-sixth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and published in the London Gazette on the second day of the following month, certain portions of the parish of Brasted, of the parish of Hever, of the parish of Chiddingstone, of the parish of Edenbridge, and of the new parish of Holy Trinity, Crockham Hill, all in the said county of Kent, and at that time in the diocese of Canterbury, but now in the said diocese of Rochester, were constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and such district was named 'The District of Four Elms.'

"And whereas the said district of Four Elms has become a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Four Elms shall be altered in the manner which is herein- after mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Four Elms shall be altered so that all those portions of the said parish of Brasted and of the said parish of Hever, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured pink, shall be dis severed from such parishes and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Four Elms.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Four Elms, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester, being:—

"I. All that detached portion of the parish of Brasted, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon the north partly by the said new parish of Four Elms and partly by an isolated portion of the parish of Hever, in the said

county and diocese, upon the east partly by the parish of Chiddingstone, in the said county and diocese, and partly by the said parish of Hever, upon the south-east by the last named parish, upon the south-west and upon the west and upon the north-west by the parish of Edenbridge, in the said county and diocese.

"II. And also all that isolated portion of the said parish of Hever in which the house called Meachlands is situate and which is bounded upon the north by the said new parish of Four Elms and upon the south-east and upon the south-west by the above described detached portion of the said parish of Brasted."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, as subsequently amended, certain arrangements as regards the circuits of the judges were approved:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Order be amended on account of certain altera-

tions which have been made in the dates of the Long Vacation in the Supreme Court:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

The Commission days for the several places on the respective circuits for the assizes to be hereafter holden shall, as far as may be practicable and the business to be done may allow, be fixed by the Judges in manner heretofore accustomed in accordance with the scheme set out in the Schedule hereto, but in fixing such Commission days—

(a) The order of towns may be changed on any circuit when it is desirable to prevent the Assizes at any town being holden contemporaneously with special local events or for any other special reason, and

(b) The dates of the Commission days named in the Schedule for any town may be altered so as to provide for anticipated business, or the anticipated absence of business, but no alteration of the dates of such Commission days which will diminish the number of Judges in town at any period of the sittings shall be made without the consent of the Lord Chief Justice of England.

The Schedule to this Order shall be substituted for the Schedule to the Order in Council relating to circuits dated the twenty-eighth of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and the said Order in Council shall take effect subject to the substitution made by this Order, and any copy thereof hereafter printed may be printed with the substitution made by this Order.

The Order in Council of the first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and seven is hereby revoked.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Merchandise Marks Act, 1887 (50 and 51 Vict., c. 28), it is, amongst other things, provided that:—

Section 8 (1).—Every person who after the date fixed by Order in Council sends or brings a watch case, whether imported or not, to any assay office in the United Kingdom for the purpose of being assayed, stamped, or marked, shall make a declaration declaring in what country or place the case was made. If it appears by such declaration that the watch case was made in some country or place out of the United Kingdom, the assay office shall place on the case such a mark (differing from the mark placed by the office on a watch case made in the United Kingdom), and in such a mode as may be from time to time directed by Order in Council:

(2) The declaration may be made before an officer of an assay office, appointed in that behalf by the office (which officer is hereby authorized to administer such a declaration), or before a Justice of the Peace, or a Commissioner having power to administer oaths in a Supreme Court of Judicature in England or Ireland, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, and shall be in such form as may be from time to time directed by Order in Council:

(3) Every person who makes a false declaration for the purposes of this section shall be liable on conviction on indictment, to the penalties of perjury, and on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds for each offence.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, Her late Majesty did order and declare the marks to be placed by the Authorities mentioned in such Order upon watch cases which had been made in some country or place out of the United Kingdom.

And whereas it appears expedient to alter the marks prescribed by the Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the above-recited provisions of the said Act, is pleased to order and declare and doth hereby order and declare that where it appears by the declaration required by the above-recited provisions that such watch cases have been made in some country or place out of the United Kingdom, then the following Authorities, that is to say:—

The Wardens and Commonalty of the Mystery of Goldsmiths of the City of London,

The Guardians of the Standard of Wrought Plate, Birmingham,

The Company of Goldsmiths of the City of Chester,

The Guardians of the Standard of Wrought Plate, Sheffield,

The Incorporation of Goldsmiths of the City of Edinburgh,

The Goldsmiths Company of the City of Glasgow,

The Fraternity or Company of the City of Dublin,

shall respectively cause to be placed on such watch cases the marks more particularly described and delineated in Schedule II hereunto annexed, and such marks shall be substituted for the marks prescribed by the said Order in Council of the twenty-eighth November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

And it is hereby further ordered and declared that the declaration to be made shall be in the form set forth in Schedule I hereto annexed.

And it is hereby further ordered and declared that as from the coming into operation of this Order the said Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, shall be repealed.

This Order shall come into operation on the fourteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and seven.



REPRESENTATION OF STANDARD MARKS.






WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient;

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twenty-sixth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and four, between His Majesty and the President of the Republic of Peru, for the extradition of criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

Treaty of Extradition between Great Britain and Peru.

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Peru, having determined, by common consent, to conclude a Treaty for the extradition of criminals, have accordingly named as their Plenipotentiaries:

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, William Nelthorpe Beauclerk, His Majesty's Minister Resident in Peru;

And His Excellency the President of the Republic of Peru, José Pardo, his Minister for Foreign Relations;

Who after having exhibited to each other their respective full powers and found them in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, in accordance with the stipulations of the present Treaty, any persons who, being accused or convicted in one of the two countries of one or more of the offences enumerated in the following Article are found in the territory of the other.

ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences:—

1. Murder (including parricide, infanticide, poisoning) or attempt or conspiracy to murder. The Peruvian Government may, however, in its absolute discretion, refuse to deliver up any person charged with a crime punishable with death.

2. Manslaughter.

3. Procuring or attempting to procure abortion.

4. Rape, abduction and indecent assault.

5. Unlawfully detaining or kidnapping children, abandoning or exposing them.

Tratado de Extradición entre la Gran Bretaña y el Perú.

HABIENDO Su Majestad el Rey del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda y de los dominios Británicos allende los mares, Emperador de la India, y su Excelencia el Presidente de la República Peruana, determinado, de común acuerdo, celebrar un Tratado para la extradición de criminales, han nombrado, con este objeto, por sus Plenipotenciarios, á saber:

Su Majestad el Rey del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda y de los dominios Británicos allende los mares, Emperador de la India, á William Nelthorpe Beauclerk, Ministro Residente de Su Majestad en el Perú;

Y su Excelencia el Presidente de la República del Perú al Doctor Don José Pardo, su Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores;

Quienes, después de haberse comunicado recíprocamente sus respectivos plenos poderes, y hallándolos en buena y debida forma, han convenido en los Artículos siguientes:

ARTICULO I.

Las Altas Partes Contratantes convienen en entregarse mutuamente, con arreglo á las estipulaciones del presente Tratado, todas aquellas personas que, acusadas ó convictas en uno de los dos países de uno ó más delitos especificados en el Artículo siguiente, se encontraren en el territorio de la otra.

ARTICULO II.

Se concederá la extradición por los siguientes crímenes ó delitos:—

1. Homicidio (comprendiendo en esto parricidio, infanticidio y envenenamiento), homicidio frustrado ó complicidad para realizarlo. Será, sin embargo, potestativo del Gobierno Peruano rehusar la entrega de un individuo acusado de crimen que merezca pena de muerte.

6. Bigamy.
 7. Wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
 8. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.
 9. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
 10. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
 11. Arson and other malicious injury to property if such injuries are indictable.
 12. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.
 13. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any Company punishable with imprisonment for not less than one year.
 14. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.
 15. Counterfeiting or altering money or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.
 16. Making or having possession of instruments adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm or for the forgery of documents. Forgery and uttering what is forged.
 17. Offences against bankruptcy law.
 18. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any persons travelling or being upon a railway.
 19. Piracy by the law of nations.
 20. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.
 21. Extradition is also to be granted for other crimes or offences against persons or things which, according to the laws of the High Contracting Parties, are Extradition offences and are punishable by not less than one year's imprisonment.
- The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.
- Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the law of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

ARTICLE III.

Each of the High Contracting Parties reserves the right to grant or refuse the surrender of its own subjects or citizens.

ARTICLE IV.

The surrender shall not take place when the person claimed by the Government of either of the two nations has already been tried and sentenced by the authorities of the other for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed should be awaiting trial in the territory of one of the two nations, or be undergoing sentence in it on account of any other crime than that for which his extradition is claimed, his surrender shall be deferred until after he has been discharged, whether by acquittal or on the expiration of his sentence, or by pardon or otherwise.

ARTICULO III.

Cada una de las Altas Partes Contratantes se reserva el derecho de conceder ó negar la entrega de sus propios súbditos ó ciudadanos.

ARTICULO IV.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applying or applied to.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered may in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made for any other crime, or on account of any other matters than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has had an opportunity of returning to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively; in default of these by the Consular Officers, and in the absence of both of these, directly, from Government to Government.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

Also, in case of extradition being demanded by Great Britain for a crime which is an offence against some statute, a copy of the said statute shall be sent; and if for a crime at common law only, an extract from some text-book generally recognized as authoritative may be sent, as indicating the punishment applicable to the offence giving rise to the requisition.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed *in contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

ARTICLE X.

When either of the Contracting Governments considers the case urgent it may apply for the

ARTICULO V.

No se concederá la extradición, si después de la perpetración del crimen, ó instauración del juicio criminal, ó de ser declarado convicto el reo, resultare éste exento de enjuiciamiento ó castigo, por haber trascurrido el tiempo de la prescripción, según las leyes del Estado solicitante ó solicitado.

ARTICULO VI.

ARTICULO VIII.

La demanda de extradición de un acusado deberá ir acompañada de la orden de prisión expedida por autoridad competente del Estado que pide la extradición, y de aquellas pruebas que, según las leyes del país donde se encuentre el acusado, justificarian su aprehensión, si el crimen hubiese sido cometido allí.

Si la Gran Bretaña pidiere la extradición de una persona acusada de un crimen contra un estatuto, se acompañará también copia de ésta; y si sólo se trata de un crimen de derecho común, se maudará un extracto de un libro de texto generalmente reconocido como autorizado, que señale la pena que merece el delito que ha motivado la demanda de extradición.

ARTICULO IX.

ARTICULO X.

Such request will be granted, provided the existence of a sentence or warrant of arrest is proved and the nature of the offence of which the fugitive is accused is clearly stated.

The warrant of arrest to which this Article refers shall be issued by the competent judicial authorities of the Country applying for extradition. In the United Kingdom the accused shall on arrest be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate. The prisoner shall be discharged if the State applying does not complete the requisition within the term of ninety days counting from the date of the arrest of the prisoner.

ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove by the documents presented which shall contain a description of the person claimed and any particulars which shall serve to identify him, that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

ARTICLE XII.

In the examinations which they may have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the Authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate or Officer of the other State.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of the other State to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of the other State.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice or some other Minister of the other State: but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the country where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several

la detención provisional del delincuente y el embargo de los objetos que se relacionan con el delito.

Se accederá á la demanda siempre que se pruebe la existencia de la sentencia ó de la orden de prisión, y la naturaleza del delito de que es acusado el fugitivo esté bien definida.

La orden de prisión á que se refiere el presente Artículo debe ser librada por las autoridades judiciales competentes del país que pide la extradición. En el Reino Unido, tan pronto como el acusado sea aprehendido, será puesto á disposición de un Magistrado de Policía. El preso será puesto en libertad si el Estado solicitante no formaliza la demanda de extradición dentro del plazo de noventa días, contados desde la fecha de la detención del preso.

ARTICULO XI.

Se concederá la extradición sólo en el caso en que el Estado solicitado considere que las causales presentada están de acuerdo con sus leyes, tanto para justificar el sometimiento del preso á la acción de los tribunales, caso de que el crimen hubiese sido perpetrado en el territorio del mismo Estado, ó bien para probar por los documentos presentados que contendrán la identidad de la persona reclamada, y cualesquiera datos que puedan servir para comprobar que el preso es la misma persona convicta por los Tribunales del Estado peticionario, y que el crimen de que ha sido convicto es de aquellos por los que el Estado solicitado habría concedido la extradición del reo; mas en ningún caso podrá éste ser entregado sino después de transcurridos quince días desde la fecha de su detención hasta que se expida la orden de su entrega.

ARTICULO XII.

Al proceder al examen, de conformidad con las estipulaciones que preceden, las autoridades del Estado solicitado aceptarán como pruebas válidas las declaraciones juradas ó afirmaciones de testigos, tomadas en el otro Estado, ó copias de las mismas, así como las órdenes de prisión y sentencias consiguientes, y los certificados ó documentos judiciales que comprueben el delito, siempre que sean autenticados como sigue:

1. La orden de prisión ó copia de ella, deberá ser firmada por un juez, magistrado ó funcionario del otro Estado.

2. Las declaraciones ó afirmaciones, ó copias de las mismas, deberán ser certificados con la firma de un juez, magistrado ó funcionario del otro Estado, acreditando que son las declaraciones ó afirmaciones originales, ó que son copias fieles de las mismas, según el caso sea.

3. El certificado ó documento judicial que compruebe un delito deberá ser autenticado por un juez, magistrado ó funcionario del otro Estado.

4. En todo caso, la orden de prisión, declaración, afirmación, copia, certificado, ó documento judicial, deba ser autenticado, bien sea mediante juramento de testigo, ó bien por el sello oficial del Ministro de Justicia ó de cualquier otro Ministro del otro Estado, mas cualquier otra autenticación que á la sazón sea permitida por las leyes del país donde se efectúa el examen puede adoptarse en lugar de a referida.

ARTICULO XIII.

Si el individuo reclamado por una de las Altas Partes Contratantes, en virtud del presente Tratado, fuera igualmente reclamado por uno ó

other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to the State whose demand is earliest in date.

ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within ninety days from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to or the proper Tribunal thereof shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XV.

When extradition is conceded the papers and other articles connected with the offence or its authors, or which were in their possession at the time of their arrest, shall be delivered to the State to which extradition is granted.

This State shall be bound to return them after the termination of the trial, if any persons shall satisfy the authorities of the State granting extradition that they have a right to them.

ARTICLE XVI.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the colonies and foreign possessions of His Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws in such colonies and foreign possessions allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such colony or possession by the Chief Consular officer of the Republic of Peru in such colony or possession.

The Governor or chief authority may dispose of the requisition, in accordance with the laws of the territory in which he exercises authority, and shall be at liberty to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any colony or foreign possession of His Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVIII.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year, and not less than six months.

It shall be ratified after receiving the approval of the Congress of the Republic of Peru, and the

ARTICULO XV.

Este Estado estará obligado á devolverlos después de terminado el juicio la persona ó personas que prueben á las autoridades del Estado que concede la extradición, que tienen derecho á ellos.

ARTICULO XVI.

Todos los gastos que ocasione la extradición serán á cargo del Estado que la pide.

ARTICULO XVII.

Las estipulaciones del presente Tratado serán aplicables á las colonias y demás posesiones de Su Majestad Británica, hasta donde las leyes de dichas colonias y posesiones lo permitan.

La demanda para la entrega de un criminal refugiado en cualquiera de esas colonias ó posesiones se dirigirá al Gobernador ó primera autoridad de la colonia ó posesión por el primer funcionario Consular de la República del Perú en dicha colonia ó posesión.

Dicho Gobernador ó primera autoridad que reciba la demanda procederá al respecto con arreglo á las leyes del territorio donde ejerce las funciones de tal, y podrá conceder la entrega ó someter el asunto á su Gobierno.

La demanda de entrega de un criminal que venga de una colonia ó posesión de Su Majestad Británica, estará sujeta á las reglas establecidas en los Artículos anteriores del presente Tratado.

ARTICULO XVIII.

El presente Tratado comenzará á regir diez días después de su publicación, de conformidad con las formas prescritas por las leyes de las Altas Partes Contratantes; pudiendo cualquiera de éstas terminarlo mediante un aviso anticipado que no exceda de un año ni baje de seis meses.

El Tratado será ratificado después de ser aprobado por el Congreso de la República del

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the 20th day of May, one thousand nine hundred and seven, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Peru, and of the said Treaty with the President of the Republic of Peru:

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

WHEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty The King has jurisdiction in that portion of the coast and islands of the Persian Gulf and Gulf of Oman which is within the dominions of His Majesty the Shah of Persia;

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PART I.—PRELIMINARY AND GENERAL.

1. This Order is divided into parts, as follows:—

En testimonio de lo cual, nosotros, los Plenipotenciarios respectivos, hemos firmado y sellado los Artículos que preceden, en Lima, el veintiséis de Enero de mil novecientos cuatro.

2. The limits of this Order are the coast and islands of the Persian Gulf and Gulf of Oman, being within the dominions of His Majesty the Shah of Persia, including the territorial waters of Persia adjacent to the said coast and islands.

3. In the construction of this Order the following words and expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant thereto, that is to say:—

"Administration" means letters of administration, including the same with will annexed or granted for special or limited purposes or limited in duration.

"British possession" means any part of His Majesty's dominions exclusive of the United Kingdom.

"British ship" means a merchant ship being a British ship within the meaning of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and includes a ship belonging to any British subject as hereinafter defined.

"British subject" includes a British protected person, that is to say, a person who either (a) is a native of any Protectorate of His Majesty; or (b) by virtue of section 15 of the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise enjoys His Majesty's protection within the Persian coast and islands.

"Consul-General" means the person for the time being holding the office of His Majesty's Consul-General for Fars and the coasts and islands of the Persian Gulf, and of Political Resident in the Persian Gulf.

"Consular Seal" means the official seal of the Consul-General.

"The Court" means a court held by the Consul-General or the Judicial Assistant.

"Foreigner" means a subject or citizen of a State in amity with His Majesty, other than Persia.

"Imprisonment" means imprisonment of either description as defined in the Indian Penal Code.

"Inland Persia" means the territories and dominions of the Shah of Persia, so far as not included within the limits of this Order.

"Judicial Assistant" means an officer appointed by the Secretary of State, or, with his previous or subsequent assent, by the Governor-General of India in Council, to be a Judicial Assistant to the Consul-General.

"Month" means calendar month.

"Offence" means any act or omission punishable by a Criminal Court.

"Persian coast and islands" means all places within the limits of this Order.

"Persian or Foreign Court" means a Court of the Government of Persia, or of any foreign State in amity with His Majesty, and exercising lawful jurisdiction within the Persian coasts and islands, and includes every member or officer of such a Court.

"Persian subject" means a subject of His Majesty the Shah of Persia.

"Person" includes corporation.

"Secretary of State" means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

"Ship" includes any vessel used in navigation, however propelled, with her tackle, furniture, and apparel, and any boat or other craft.

"The Treasury" means the Lord High Treasurer or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any two of them.

"Will" means will, codicil, or other testamentary instrument.

4.—(1.) In this Order, words importing the plural or the singular may be construed as referring to one person or thing, or to more than one person or thing, and words importing the masculine as referring to the feminine (as the case may require).

(2.) Where this Order confers any power or imposes any duty, then, unless a contrary intention appears, the power may be exercised and the duty shall be performed from time to time as occasion requires.

(3.) Where this Order confers a power, or imposes a duty on, or with respect to, a holder of an office, as such, then, unless a contrary intention appears, the power may be exercised and the duty shall be performed by, or with respect to, the holder for the time being of the office or the person temporarily acting for the holder.

(4.) Where this Order confers a power to make any rules, regulations, or orders, the power shall, unless a contrary intention appears, be construed as including a power exercisable in the like manner and subject to the like consent and conditions, if any, to rescind, revoke, vary or amend the rules, regulations, or orders.

(5.) This Article shall apply to the construction of any regulations, rules, or orders made under this Order, unless a contrary intention appears.

5. The jurisdiction conferred by this Order extends to the persons and matters following, in so far as by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means, His Majesty has jurisdiction in relation to such matters and things, that is to say:—

(1.) British subjects, as herein defined, within the limits of this Order.

(2.) The property and all personal or proprietary rights and liabilities within the said limits of

British subjects, whether such subjects are within the said limits or not.

(3.) Persian subjects and foreigners in the cases and according to the conditions specified in this Order and not otherwise.

(4.) Foreigners, with respect to whom any State, King, Chief, or Government, whose subjects, or under whose protection they are, has by any Treaty as herein defined or otherwise agreed with His Majesty for, or consents to, the exercise of power or authority by His Majesty.

(5.) British ships with their boats, and the persons and property on board thereof, or belonging thereto, being within the limits of this Order.

6. All His Majesty's jurisdiction exercisable within the Persian coast and islands for the hearing and determination of criminal or civil matters, or for the maintenance of order, or for the control or administration of persons or property, or in relation thereto, shall be exercised under and according to the provisions of this Order, so far as this Order extends and applies.

PART II.—APPLICATION OF LAW OF BRITISH INDIA AND OF THE UNITED KINGDOM.

7.—(1.) Subject to the other provisions of this Order, and to any Treaties for the time being in force relating to the Persian coast and islands, His Majesty's criminal and civil jurisdiction within the Persian coast and islands shall, so far as circumstances admit, be exercised on the principles of, and in conformity with, the enactments for the time being applicable as hereinafter mentioned of the Governor-General of India in Council, and of the Governor of Bombay in Council, and in accordance with the powers vested in, and the course of procedure and practice observed by and before, the Courts in the Presidency of Bombay beyond the limits of the ordinary original jurisdiction of the High Court of Judicature at Bombay according to their respective jurisdiction and authority, and, so far as such enactments, powers, procedure and practice are inapplicable, shall be exercised in accordance with justice, equity, and good conscience.

(2.) The enactments mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order are hereby made applicable to the Persian coast and islands as from the commencement of this Order.

(3.) Any other existing or future enactments of the Governor-General of India in Council, or of the Governor of Bombay in Council, shall also be applicable to the Persian coast and islands, but shall not come into operation until such times as may in the case of any of such enactments respectively be fixed by the Secretary of State, or, with his previous or subsequent assent, by the Governor-General of India in Council.

(4.) The Court may construe any such enactment, with such alterations not affecting the substance, as may be necessary or proper to adapt the same to the matter before the Court.

8. The enactments described in the first schedule to "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act 1890," shall apply to the Persian coast and islands, as if they were a British colony or possession, but subject to the provisions of this Order, and to the exceptions, adaptations, and modifications following, that is to say:—

(i.) The Consul-General is hereby substituted for the Governor of a colony or British possession, and the Court of the Consul-General is hereby substituted for a Superior Court or

Supreme Court, and for a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace of a colony or British possession.

(ii.) For the portions of the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 and 1867, referred to in the said Schedule shall be substituted Part XIII of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894."

(iii.) In section 51 of "The Conveyancing (Scotland) Act, 1874," and any enactment for the time being in force amending the same, the Court of the Consul-General is substituted for a Court of Probate in a Colony.

(iv.) With respect to "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881,"—

(a.) So much of the 4th and 5th sections of the said Act as relates to sending a report of the issue of a warrant, together with the information, or a copy thereof, or to the sending of a certificate of committal and report of a case, or to the information to be given by a Magistrate to a fugitive, shall be excepted, and in lieu of such information the person acting as the Magistrate shall inform the fugitive that in the British possession or Protectorate to which he may be conveyed he has the right to apply for a writ of *habeas corpus* or other like process.

(b.) So much of the 6th section of the said Act as requires the expiration of fifteen days before issue of warrant; shall be excepted.

(c.) The Consul-General shall not be bound to return a fugitive offender to a British possession unless satisfied that the proceedings to obtain his return are taken with the consent of the Governor of that possession.

(d.) For the purposes of Part II of the said Act, the Persian coast and islands, and British India, shall be deemed to be one group of British possessions.

9. Where, by virtue of any Imperial Act, or of this Order, or otherwise, any provisions of any Imperial Acts, or of any Law in force in India, or of any Orders in Council other than this Order, are applicable within the limits of this Order, or any forms, regulations, or procedure prescribed or established by or under any such Act, Law or Order, are made applicable for any purpose of this Order, or any other Order relating to the Persian coast and islands, such Acts, Laws, Orders, forms, regulations, or procedure may be construed or used with such alterations and adaptations not affecting the substance as may be necessary having regard to local circumstances, and anything required to be done by, to, or before any Court, Judge, officer, or authority may be done by, to, or before a Court, Judge, officer, or authority having the like or analogous functions, or by, to, or before any officer designated by the Secretary of State or by the Court (as the case may require) for that purpose; and the Consular seal may be substituted for any other seal, and in case any difficulty occurs in the application the Secretary of State, or with his previous or subsequent assent, the Governor-General of India in Council, may direct by, to, or before whom and in what manner anything is to be done, and such Act, Law, Order, form, Regulation, or procedure shall be construed accordingly.

Where under any such Imperial Act, Law, or Order any publication is required to be made, as respects any judicial proceeding in any

"Gazette" or otherwise, such publication shall be made by such mode as the Court shall think fit to direct.

PART III.—CRIMINAL MATTERS.

10. Subject to the other provisions of this Order, the Code of Criminal Procedure and the other enactments relating to the administration of criminal justice in British India for the time being applicable to the Persian coast and islands, shall have effect as if the Persian coast and islands were a district in the Presidency of Bombay; the Consul-General shall be deemed to be the Sessions Judge; and the Judicial Assistant shall be deemed to be the District Magistrate and additional Sessions Judge; the High Court of Judicature at Bombay (hereinafter called the High Court) shall be deemed to be the High Court; and the powers both of the Governor-General in Council and of the Local Government under those enactments shall be exercisable by the Secretary of State, or, with his previous or subsequent assent, by the Governor-General of India in Council.

11. When any person is committed to the High Court of Bombay for trial, the Consul-General may, under, and in accordance with, the provisions of section 4 of the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, send him to Bombay for trial, and may, if he thinks fit, bind over such of the proper witnesses as are British subjects, or any of them, in their own recognizances, to appear and give evidence on the trial.

12. (1.) The Consul-General may by General Order prescribe the manner in which, and the places within the Persian coast and islands at which, sentences of imprisonment are to be carried into execution.

(2.) The Court may, in any case, by warrant sealed with the Consular seal, cause an offender convicted and sentenced to imprisonment before the Court to be removed to, and imprisoned in, any place within the Persian coast and islands.

13. Where an offender convicted before any Court established under this Order is sentenced to imprisonment, and the Consul-General proceeding under section 7 of the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, authority in that behalf being hereby given to him, considers it expedient that the sentence should be carried into effect within His Majesty's dominions, and the offender is accordingly sent for imprisonment to a place in His Majesty's dominions, the place shall be either a place in the Presidency of Bombay, or a place in some other part of His Majesty's dominions, the Government whereof consents that offenders may be sent thither under this Article.

14.—(1.) In cases of murder or culpable homicide, if either the death or the criminal act which wholly or partly caused the death happened within the Persian coast and islands, a Court acting under this Order shall have the like jurisdiction over any British subject who is charged either as a principal offender or as an abettor as if both such criminal act and the death had happened within the Persian coast and islands.

(2.) In the case of any crime committed on the high seas or within the Admiralty jurisdiction by any British subject who at the time of committing

such crime was on board a British ship, or on board a foreign ship to which he did not belong, a Court, acting under this Order, shall have jurisdiction as if the crime had been committed within the Persian coast and islands.

(3.) In cases tried under this Article no different sentence can be passed from the sentence which could be passed in England if the crime were tried there.

(4.) The foregoing provisions of this Article shall be deemed to be adaptations, for the purposes of this Order and of the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, of the following enactments, namely:—

The Admiralty Offences (Colonial) Act, 1849 ;
The Admiralty Offences (Colonial) Act, 1860 ;
The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, Part XIII.

And those enactments shall apply accordingly, and be administered within the Persian coast and islands.

15. Where a warrant or order of arrest is issued by a competent Consular authority in inland Persia for the apprehension of a person who is accused of crime committed in inland Persia, and who is, or is supposed to be, within the limits of this Order, and such warrant or order is produced to any Court acting under this Order, the Court may back the warrant or order, and the same when so backed shall be sufficient authority to any person to whom it was originally directed, and also to any constable or officer of the Court by which it is backed, and to any person named on the back of the warrant or order, to apprehend the accused person at any place within the limits of this Order, and to carry him to and deliver him up within the jurisdiction of the authority issuing the warrant or order.

16. Where a British subject is convicted of an offence, the Court before which he is convicted may, if it thinks fit, at any time before he is discharged, require him to give security to the satisfaction of the Court for his future good behaviour, and for that purpose may, if it thinks fit, cause him to come or be brought before the Court.

17.—(1.) Where it is shown by evidence on oath, to the satisfaction of the Court, that any person subject to this Order has committed, or is about to commit, an offence against this Order, or is otherwise conducting himself so as to be dangerous to peace and good order, or is endeavouring to excite enmity between the people of Persia and His Majesty, or is intriguing against His Majesty's power and authority within the limits of this Order, the Court may, if it thinks fit, by order under the Consular seal, prohibit that person from being within the limits of this Order, during any time therein specified, not exceeding two years.

(2.) The Court, by order in writing under the Consular seal, may vary any order of prohibition (not extending the duration thereof), and may revoke any order of prohibition or removal.

(3.) The Consul-General shall forthwith report to the Secretary of State every order made by him under this Article, and the grounds thereof, and the proceedings thereunder.

18.—(1.) If a British subject fails to give security for good behaviour or for keeping the

peace when lawfully required to do so, or fails to comply with an order of prohibition made under this Order, the Court may, if it thinks fit, order that he be deported from the Persian coast and islands.

(2.) The Judicial Assistant, on making an order of deportation, shall forthwith report to the Consul-General the order, and the grounds thereof.

(3.) Thereupon the person ordered to be deported shall, unless the Consul-General thinks fit otherwise to direct, be as soon as practicable, and in the case of a person convicted, either after execution of the sentence or while it is in course of execution, removed in custody under warrant to the place named in the warrant.

(4.) The place shall be a place either in the Presidency of Bombay, or in the part of His Majesty's dominions to which the person belongs, or in a British possession or protectorate, the Government whereof consents to the reception therein of persons deported under this Order.

(5.) The Court, on making an order of deportation, may, if it thinks fit, order the person to be deported to pay all or any part of the expenses of his deportation, to be fixed by the Court in the order. Subject thereto, the expenses of deportation shall be defrayed as the Secretary of State, with the concurrence of the Treasury, directs.

(6.) The Consul-General shall forthwith report to the Secretary of State every order of deportation made under this Order, and the grounds thereof, and the proceedings thereunder.

(7.) If a person deported under this Order returns to the Persian coast and islands without permission in writing of the Consul-General, or the Governor-General of India in Council, or the Secretary of State, he shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with a fine which may extend to 1,000 rupees (459·77 dollars), or with both.

(8.) He shall also be liable to be forthwith again deported under the original or a new Order, and a fresh warrant.

19.—(1.) Where under this Order a person is to be sent or removed or deported from the Persian coast and islands, he shall, by warrant of the Court sealed with the Consular seal, be detained, if necessary, in custody, or in prison, until a fit opportunity for his removal or deportation occurs, and then be put on board a vessel belonging to, or in the service of His Majesty, or if no such vessel is available, then on board some other British or other fit vessel.

(2.) The warrant shall be sufficient authority to the person to whom it is directed or delivered for execution, and to the Commanding Officer or master of the vessel, to receive and detain the person therein named, in the manner therein prescribed, and to send or remove and carry him to the place therein named, according to the warrant.

(3.) In case of sending or removal for any purpose other than deportation, the warrant shall be issued in duplicate, and the person executing it shall, as soon as practicable after his arrival at the place therein named, deliver, according to the warrant, with one of the duplicates of the warrant, to a constable, or proper officer of police, or keeper of a prison, or other proper authority or person there, the person named in the warrant, to be produced on the order of the proper Court or

authority there, or to be otherwise dealt with according to law.

20. An appeal shall not lie against an order of prohibition, or removal, or deportation made under this Order.

21. If any person subject to criminal jurisdiction under this Order does any of the following things, namely :—

(i.) Wilfully by act or threat obstructs any Officer of or person executing any process of the Court in the performance of his duty ; or

(ii.) Within or close to the room or place where the Court is sitting wilfully misbehaves in a violent, threatening, or disrespectful manner to the disturbance of the Court, or to the intimidation of suitors or others resorting thereto ; or

(iii.) Wilfully insults any member of the Court, or any assessor, or any person acting as a Clerk or Officer of the Court during his sitting or attendance in Court, or in his going to or returning from Court ; or

(iv.) Does any act in relation to the Court or a Judge thereof, or a matter pending therein, which, if done in relation to a Superior Court in England, or in India, would be punishable as a contempt of such Court, or as a libel on such Court, or the Judges thereof, or the administration of justice therein ; such person shall be liable to be apprehended by order of the Court with or without warrant, and, on enquiry and consideration and after the hearing of any defence which such person may offer, without further process or trial, to be punished with a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees (45·97 dollars), or with imprisonment not exceeding twenty-four hours.

A Minute shall be made and kept of every such case of punishment, recording the facts of the offence and the extent of the punishment, and a copy of the Minute shall be forthwith sent to the Governor-General of India in Council.

Provided that, if the Court thinks fit, instead of proceeding under the preceding provisions, it may direct or cause the offender to be tried in a separate criminal prosecution or proceeding in which the offender shall be liable to any punishment to which he would be liable if the offence were committed in relation to the Court of a Sessions Judge in India.

Nothing herein shall interfere with the power of the Court to remove or exclude persons who interrupt or obstruct the proceedings of the Court.

22. If a British subject smuggles or imports into or exports from the Persian coast and islands any goods whereon any duty is charged or payable to the Government of Persia, with intent to evade payment of the duty on any goods, the importation or exportation whereof is prohibited by law, he shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees, or a sum equal to treble the value of the goods (whichever shall be the greater), or with both imprisonment and fine.

23.—(1.) If a British subject—

(i.) Publicly derides, mocks, or insults any religion established or observed within the limits of this Order ; or

(ii.) Publicly offers insult to any religious service, feast, or ceremony established or kept

in any place within those limits, or to any place of worship, tomb, or sanctuary belonging to any religion established or observed within those limits, or to the ministers or professors thereof ; or

(iii.) Publicly and wilfully commits any act tending to bring any religion established or observed within those limits, or its ceremonies, mode of worship, or observances, into hatred, ridicule, or contempt, and thereby to provoke a breach of the public peace ;

he shall be guilty of an offence, and on conviction thereof, liable to imprisonment which may extend to two years, with or without a fine not exceeding 500 rupees, or to a fine alone not exceeding 500 rupees.

(2) Consular officers shall take such precautionary measures as seem to them proper and expedient for the prevention of such offences.

24. Any British subject being within the limits of this Order may be proceeded against, tried, and punished under this Order for piracy wherever committed.

25. If any British subject within the limits of this Order violates or fails to observe any stipulation of any Treaty between His Majesty, His predecessors, heirs, or successors, and the Shah of Persia for the time being in force, in respect of the violation whereof any penalty is stipulated for in the Treaty, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Treaty, and on conviction thereof under this Order shall be liable to a penalty in accordance with the stipulations of the Treaty.

26. Where a person entitled to appeal to the High Court of Bombay from any judgment or order passed in the exercise of criminal jurisdiction under this Order desires so to appeal, he shall present his petition of appeal to the Court which passed the judgment or order ; and the petition shall with all practicable speed be transmitted by or through the Consul-General to the High Court, with certified copies of the charge (if any) and proceedings, of all documentary evidence admitted or tendered, of the depositions, of the notes of the oral testimony, and of the judgment or order, and any argument on the petition of appeal that the appellant desires to submit to the High Court.

27. The Court against whose judgment or order the appeal is preferred may postpone the execution of the sentence pending the appeal, and shall, if necessary, commit the person convicted to prison for safe custody, or detain him in prison for safe custody, or shall admit him to bail, and may take security, by recognizance, deposit of money, or otherwise, for his payment of any fine.

PART IV.—CIVIL MATTERS.

28. Subject to the other provisions of this Order, the Code of Civil Procedure, and the other Indian enactments relating to the administration of civil justice and to insolvency and bankruptcy for the time being applicable to the Persian coast and islands, shall have effect as if the Persian coast and islands were a district in the Presidency of Bombay ; the Consul-General shall be deemed to be the District Judge, and the Judicial Assistant shall be an additional District Judge of the district, and the Court, whether held by the Consul-General or by the Judicial Assistant, shall be deemed to be the District Court or Principal Civil Court of Original

Jurisdiction in the district; the High Court of Bombay shall be deemed to be the highest Civil Court of Appeal for the district, and the Court authorized to hear appeals from the decisions of the District Court; and the powers, both of the Governor-General in Council and the Local Government, under those enactments, shall be exercisable by the Secretary of State, or, with his previous or subsequent assent by the Governor-General of India in Council.

29. The following enactments of the Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890, that is to say, section 2, sub-sections (2) to (4), sections 5 and 6, section 16, sub-section (3), shall apply to the Court as if in the said sections the Court were mentioned in lieu of a Colonial Court of Admiralty, and the Persian coast and islands were referred to in lieu of a British possession.

30.—(1.) The Court shall endeavour to obtain, as early as may be, notice of the deaths of all British subjects leaving property within the Persian coast and islands, and all such information as may serve to guide the Court with respect to the securing and administration of their property.

(2.) On receiving notice of the death of such a person, the Court shall put up a notice thereof at the Court House, and shall keep the same there until probate or administration is granted, or, where it appears to the Court that probate or administration will not be applied for or cannot be granted, for such time as it thinks fit.

(3.) The Court shall, where the circumstances of the case appear so to require, as soon as may be, take possession of the property within the Persian coast and islands of the deceased, or put it under the Consular seal (in either case, if the nature of the property or other circumstances so require, making an inventory), and so keep it until it can be dealt with according to law.

(4.) All expenses incurred on behalf of the Court in so doing shall be the first charge on the property of the deceased, and the Court shall, by sale of part of that property, or otherwise, provide for the discharge of these expenses.

(5.) When a British subject dies within the limits of this Order or elsewhere intestate, his property, or so much thereof as is within those limits, shall, until administration is granted, vest in the Consul-General.

31. If a person named executor in a will, and to the establishment of whose title, as such, it is necessary to obtain probate of that will, takes possession of and administers or otherwise deals with any part of the property of the deceased, and does not obtain probate within one month after the death or after the termination of any proceeding respecting probate or administration, he shall be punished with fine, which may extend to 1,000 rupees (459.77 dollars).

32. If any person, other than the person named executor, or the administrator, or a person entitled to represent the deceased without obtaining probate or letters of administration, or an officer of the Court, takes possession of and administers or otherwise deals with any part of the property of the deceased, he shall, as soon as practicable, notify the fact and the circumstances to the Court, and shall furnish to the Court all such information as the Court requires; and shall

conform to any direction of the Court in relation to the custody, disposal, or transmission of the property or the proceeds thereof, and, in case of any contravention of this Article, he shall be punished with fine, which may extend to 1,000 rupees (459.77 dollars).

33.—(1.) When the peculiar circumstances of the case appear to the Court so to require for reasons recorded in its proceedings, the Court may, if it thinks fit, of its own motion or otherwise, grant letters of administration to an officer of the Court.

(2.) The officer so appointed shall act under the direction of the Court, and shall be indemnified thereby.

(3.) He shall publish such notices, if any, as the Court thinks fit, within the Persian coast and islands, Bombay, the United Kingdom, and elsewhere.

(4.) The Court shall require and compel him to file in the proper office of the Court his accounts of his administration, at intervals not exceeding three months, and shall forthwith examine them and report thereon to the Consul-General.

(5.) The accounts shall be audited under the direction of the Court.

(6.) All expenses incurred on behalf of the Court in execution of this Article shall be the first charge on the estate of the deceased within the Persian coast and islands; and the Court shall, by the sale of that estate or otherwise, provide for the discharge of those expenses.

34.—(1.) Where any person entitled to appeal to the High Court of Bombay from any decree or order made in the exercise of civil jurisdiction under this Order desires so to appeal, he shall present his memorandum of appeal to the Court which made the decree or order, and, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, that Court shall receive the same for transmission to the High Court in manner hereinafter provided.

(2.) The appellant shall, within such time as the Court directs, give security to the satisfaction of the Court, and to such amount as the Court thinks reasonable, for prosecution of the appeal, and for payment of any costs which may be ordered by the High Court of Bombay on the appeal, to be paid by the appellant to any person.

(3.) The appellant shall pay into the proper office of the Court which passed the decree or order such sum as the Court thinks reasonable, to defray the expense of the making up and transmission to the High Court of Bombay of the record.

35. The appellant may, with his memorandum of appeal, file any argument which he desires to submit to the High Court of Bombay in support of the appeal.

36.—(1.) The memorandum of appeal and the argument (if any) shall be served on such persons as respondents as the Court in which they are filed directs.

(2.) A respondent may, within fourteen days after service, file in that Court a memorandum (if

any) of cross-appeal, and such arguments as he desires to submit to the High Court of Bombay against the appeal, or in support of the cross-appeal.

(3.) Copies thereof shall be furnished by the Court in which they are filed to such persons as the Court thinks fit.

37.—(1.) On the expiration of the time for the respondent filing his argument, the Court shall, without the application of any party, make up the record of appeal, which shall consist of the memorandum of appeal and the arguments (if any), and certified copies of the following, namely, the plaint, written statements (if any), all proceedings, all written and documentary evidence admitted or tendered, the notes of the oral evidence, the judgment, and the decree or order.

(2.) The several pieces shall be fastened together consecutively numbered, and the whole shall be secured by the Consular seal, and be forthwith forwarded by him to the High Court of Bombay.

(3.) The Court may, if for special reasons it thinks fit, send any portion of the documentary evidence, in original, to the High Court.

PART V.—PERSIAN AND FOREIGN SUBJECTS AND TRIBUNALS.

38.—(1.) Where a Persian subject or foreigner desires to bring in a Court established under this Order a suit against a British subject, or a British subject desires to bring in such a Court a suit against a Persian subject or foreigner the Court shall entertain the same, and shall hear and determine it.

(2.) Provided that the Persian subject or foreigner, if required by the Court, first obtains and files in the proper office of the Court the consent, in writing, of the competent authority, (if any), on behalf of his own nation to his submitting, and that he does submit by writing, to the jurisdiction of the Court, and if required by the Court, gives security to the satisfaction of the Court, and to such reasonable amount as the Court thinks fit, by deposit or otherwise, to pay fees, costs, and damages, and abide by, and perform, the decision to be given by the Court or on appeal.

(3.) A cross-suit shall not be brought in the Court against a plaintiff, being a foreigner.

(4.) Where a Persian subject or foreigner obtains, in a Court established under this Order, a decree or order against a defendant being a British subject, and in another suit that defendant is plaintiff and the Persian subject or foreigner is defendant, the Court may, if it thinks fit, on the application of the British subject, stay the enforcement of the decree or order pending that other suit, and may set off any amount decreed or ordered to be paid by one party in one suit against any amount decreed or ordered to be paid by the other party in the other suit.

(5.) Where a plaintiff, being a Persian subject or foreigner, obtains a decree or order, in a Court established under this Order, against two or more defendants, being British subjects, jointly, and in another suit one of them is a plaintiff and the foreigner is defendant, the Court may, if it thinks fit, on the application of the

British subjects, stay the enforcement of the decree or order pending that other suit, and may set off any amount decreed or ordered to be paid by one party in one suit against any amount decreed or ordered to be paid by the other party in the other suit, without prejudice to the right of the British subject to obtain contribution from his co-defendants under the joint liability.

(6.) Where in a suit a Persian subject or foreigner is co-plaintiff with a British subject who is within the Persian coast and islands, it shall not be necessary for the Persian subject or foreigner to give security under this Article as regards fees and costs, unless the Court so directs, but the co-plaintiff British subject shall be responsible for all fees and costs.

39.—(1.) Where it is proved that the attendance of a British subject to give evidence, or for any other purpose connected with the administration of Justice, is required before a Persian or foreign Court, a Court established under this Order may, if it thinks fit, in a case and in circumstances in which the Court would require the attendance of that person before the Court, order that he do attend as required.

(2.) If the person ordered to attend, having reasonable notice of the time and place at which he is required to attend, fails to attend accordingly and does not satisfactorily excuse his failure to the satisfaction of the Court, he shall, independently of any other liability, be liable to be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with fine which may extend to 1,000 rupees (459-77 dollars), or with both.

40. When a British subject invokes or submits to the jurisdiction of a Persian or foreign Tribunal and engages in writing to abide by the decision of that Tribunal, or to pay any fees or expenses ordered by that Tribunal to be paid by him, the Court may, on such evidence as it thinks fit to require, enforce payment of such fees and expenses in the same manner as if they were fees payable in a proceeding in the Court, and shall pay over and account for the same when levied to the proper Persian or foreign authority as the Court may direct.

41.—(1.) If a British subject wilfully gives false evidence in a proceeding before a Persian or foreign Court, or in an arbitration between a British subject on the one hand, and a Persian subject or foreigner on the other hand, he shall, on conviction before a competent Court of Criminal Jurisdiction, be liable to be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with fine which may extend to 1,000 rupees (459-77 dollars), or with both.

(2.) Nothing in this Article shall exempt a person from liability under any other British or British Indian Law to any other or higher punishment or penalty :

Provided that no person shall be punished twice for the same offence.

42.—(1.) Every Agreement for reference to arbitration between a British subject on the one hand and a Persian subject or a foreigner on the other hand, may, on the application of any party, be filed for execution in the office of the Court.

(2.) The Court shall thereupon have authority to enforce the Agreement, and the award made

thereunder, and to control and regulate the proceedings before and after the award, in such manner and on such terms as the Court may think fit:

(3.) Provided that the Persian subject or foreigner, if so required by the Court, first obtains and files, in the proper office of the Court, the consent, in writing, of the competent authority (if any) on behalf of his own nation to his submitting, and that he does submit by writing, to the jurisdiction of the Court, and, if required by the Court, gives security to the satisfaction of the Court, and to such reasonable amount as the Court thinks fit, by deposit or otherwise, to pay fees, costs, damages, and expenses, and abide by and perform the award.

PART VI.—REGISTRATION.

43.—(1.) A register of British subjects shall be kept at each of such Consular offices within the limits of this Order, and in respect of such [Consular] districts respectively, as may be prescribed by Regulations.

(2.) Every British subject, resident or arriving within the said limits, being of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, or being married, or a widower or widow, though under that age, may, subject to the provisions of this Order, be registered in a Consular register.

(3.) The registration of a man shall comprise the registration of his wife, or wives, if living with him; and the registration of the head of a family shall comprise the registration of all females and minors, being his relatives, in whatever degree, living under the same roof with him at the time of his registration.

(4.) A British subject resident within the said limits shall not be registered elsewhere than in the register of the Consular district in which he resides; but a person arriving within the said limits may be registered either in the register of the Consular district in which he first arrives, or in that of the district in which he goes to reside.

(5.) A person arriving within the said limits, and not already registered, must apply for registration within one month after arrival; a person resident within the said limits must apply for registration in January in every year: provided that a person who fails to obtain registration within the time so limited may be registered at any time if he excuses his failure to the satisfaction of the Consular officer.

(6.) A person registered in any register of British subjects established under any Order in Council repealed by this Order, shall be registered under the provisions of this Order, unless the Consular officer is satisfied, after inquiry, that the previous registration was erroneous, or that such person is not entitled to registration under the provisions of this Order.

(7.) Every person applying to be registered under this Order shall, unless excused by the Consular officer, attend personally for that purpose at the Consular office on each occasion of registration.

(8.) Every person shall, on every registration

of himself, pay a fee of one rupee, or such other fee as the Secretary of State from time to time appoints. The amount of the fee may be uniform for all persons, or may vary according to the position and circumstances of different classes if the Secretary of State from time to time so directs, but may not in any case exceed three rupees.

44.—(1.) The Consular Officer shall on every registration give to the person registered a certificate of registration signed by him, and sealed with his Consular seal.

(2.) The name of a wife, if her registration is under the provisions of this Order comprised in her husband's, shall be indorsed on the husband's certificate.

(3.) The names and descriptions of females and minors, whose registration is under the provisions of this Order comprised in that of the head of a family, shall be indorsed on the certificate of the head of the family.

45. If any British subject fails to obtain registration under the provisions of this Order, he shall not be entitled to be recognized or protected as a British subject, but he shall, although not registered, be subject to the jurisdiction of the Court.

46.—(1.) A person, not of Asiatic descent, arriving within the limits of this Order, and applying to be registered as a British subject, shall be so registered if the Consular officer is satisfied, after such inquiry as he may deem fit, that he is entitled to the status of a British subject.

(2.) A person of Asiatic descent arriving within the said limits, and applying to be registered as a British subject, shall be so registered if he (a) produces a passport as a British subject from British India or a British possession; or (b) files an affidavit or sworn declaration showing that he was born within His Majesty's dominions or within the territory of any Prince or State in India under the suzerainty or in alliance with His Majesty, or that he has been naturalized in the United Kingdom; and (c) in either case gives satisfactory evidence of his identity.

(3.) A person born within the said limits, being the child of a person of Asiatic descent who arrived within the said limits, may be registered as a British subject if it is proved that the father (a) was registered as a British subject at the time of the child's birth; or (b) being entitled was prevented from being so registered by causes for which he was not responsible.

Any child of a person registered under the provisions of this Article shall not be entitled to be registered as a British subject by reason only that his father and grandfather were so registered.

(4.) A woman, being the widow of a person of Asiatic descent, who was in his lifetime registered as a British subject, shall be registered as a British subject if her name appears on the last certificate given to her husband before his death, but not otherwise.

47. All registers kept under any Order repealed by this Order shall continue in force until superseded by registers kept under this Order.

PART VII.—MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

48. Subject to the control of the Secretary of State, the Consul-General may, from time to time, with the previous sanction of the Governor-General of India in Council, make Rules of Procedure and other Rules, consistent with this Order, for the better execution of the provisions herein contained in respect of any matter arising in the course of any civil or criminal case, including insolvency and bankruptcy proceedings.

49.—(1.) Subject to the control of the Secretary of State acting with the concurrence of the Treasury, the Consul-General may, from time to time, with the previous sanction of the Governor-General of India in Council, make rules imposing fees leviable in respect of any proceedings in, or processes issued out of, any Court established under this Order.

(2.) But a Court before which any matter is pending may, in any case, if it thinks fit, on account of the poverty of a party, or for any other reason, dispense in whole or in part with the payment of any fees chargeable in respect of such matter.

(3.) Nothing in this Order shall affect any Order in Council for the time being in force prescribing a table of fees to be taken by Consular officers; and where a fee is taken under that Order, no fee shall be taken in respect of the same matter under this Order.

50.—(1.) All fees, charges, expenses, costs, fines, damages, and other money payable under this Order, or under any law made applicable by this Order, may be enforced under order of the Court by attachment and sale of the movable property of the person by whom they are payable, and in case of deficiency by imprisonment for a term which may extend to one month.

(2.) Any bill of sale or mortgage, or transfer of property, made with the view of avoiding such attachment or sale, shall not be effectual to defeat the provisions of this Order.

(3.) All fees, penalties, fines, and forfeitures levied under this Order shall be paid to the public account, and shall be applied in such manner as the Secretary of State with the consent of the Treasury may direct.

51. Whenever an Acting Consul-General or Acting Judicial Assistant has commenced the hearing of any cause or matter, civil or criminal, he may, unless the Consul-General otherwise directs, continue and complete the hearing and determination thereof, notwithstanding that his authority to act as Consul-General or as Judicial Assistant has otherwise ceased by reason of the expiration of the time for which he was appointed to act, or by reason of the happening of any event by which his authority is determined.

52.—(1.) If an officer of the Court, employed to execute a decree or order, loses, by neglect or omission, the opportunity of executing it, then, on complaint of the person aggrieved and proof of the fact alleged, the Court may, if it thinks fit, order the officer to pay the damages sustained by the person complaining, or part thereof.

(2.) The order may be enforced as an order directing payment of money.

53.—(1.) If a clerk or officer of the Court, acting under pretence of the process or authority

of the Court, is charged with extortion, or with not paying over money duly levied, or with other misconduct, the Court may, if it thinks fit, inquire into the charge in a summary way, and may for that purpose summon and enforce the attendance of all necessary persons as in a suit, and may make such order for the repayment of any money extorted, or for the payment over of any money levied, and for the payment of such damages and costs as the Court thinks fit.

(2.) The Court may also, if it thinks fit, on the same inquiry, impose on the clerk or officer such fine, not exceeding 50 rupees (22-99 dollars) for each offence, as the Court thinks fit.

(3.) A clerk or officer punished under this Article, shall not, without the leave of the Court, be liable to a civil suit in respect of the same matter; and any such suit, if already or afterwards begun, may be stayed by the Court in such manner and on such terms as the Court thinks fit.

(4.) Nothing in this Article shall be deemed to prevent any person from being prosecuted under any other British or British Indian law for any act or omission punishable under this Article, or from being liable under that other law to any other or higher punishment or penalty than that provided by this Article:

Provided that no person shall be punished twice for the same offence.

54. The Court shall have jurisdiction from time to time to make an order requiring a person to contribute, in such manner as the Court directs, to the support of his wife, or to the support of his or her child, whether legitimate or not, being, in the opinion of the Court, under the age of sixteen years. Any such order may be made in a summary way, as if the neglect to provide for the support of such wife or child were an offence, and any failure to comply with any such order shall be deemed to be an offence, and shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding 10 rupees (4-59 dollars) for any one default, and the Court may direct any penalty imposed for such offence to be applied for the support of such wife or child in such manner as the Court thinks fit.

55. The Consul-General under this Order shall have power to make and alter Regulations (to be called King's Regulations) for the following purposes (that is to say):—

(a.) For the peace, order, and good government of British subjects within any such place in relation to matters not provided for by this Order and to matters intended by this Order to be prescribed by Regulation.

(b.) For securing the observance of any Treaty or arrangement, for the time being in force, relating to any place within the limits of this Order, or of any native or local law or custom, whether relating to trade, commerce, revenue, or any other matter.

(c.) For amending, modifying, or repealing with respect to places within the limits of this Order any Acts or enactments which are made applicable or have been brought into operation in those places by or under any of the provisions of Article 7 of this Order.

(d.) For regulating or preventing the importation or exportation in British ships or by

British subjects of arms or munitions of war, or any parts or ingredients thereof; and for giving effect to any Treaty relating to the importation or exportation of the same.

(e.) For requiring Returns to be made of the nature, quantity, and value of articles exported from or imported into his district; or any part thereof; by or on account of any British subject who is subject to this Order, or in any British ship, and for prescribing the times and manner at or in which, and the persons by whom, such Returns are to be made.

(f.) For the governance, visitation, care and superintendence of prisons.

56.—(1.) Any Regulations made under the preceding Article may provide for forfeiture of any goods, receptacles, or things in relation to which, or to the contents of which, any breach is committed of such Regulations, or of any Treaty or any native or local law or custom, the observance of which is provided for by such Regulations.

(2.) Any person committing a breach of any such Regulations shall, in addition to any forfeiture prescribed thereby, be liable, on conviction, to imprisonment, for a period not exceeding three months, or to a fine, or to both.

(3.) Any fine imposed for a breach of Regulations shall not exceed 1,500 rupees: provided that in the case of any breach of any native or local law relating to customs law, or under which the importation or exportation of any goods is prohibited or restricted, the fine may extend to a sum equivalent to treble the value of the goods in relation to which the breach is committed.

(4.) King's Regulations shall not take effect until they are allowed by a Secretary of State: provided that in case of urgency declared in any such Regulations, the same shall take effect before such allowance, and shall continue to have effect unless and until they are disallowed by the Secretary of State, and until notification of such disallowance is received and published by the Consul-General, and such disallowance shall be without prejudice to anything done or suffered under such Regulations in the meantime.

(5.) All King's Regulations shall be published by the Consul-General in such manner and at such places as he may think proper.

(6.) In this Article "breach of the Regulations" includes the breach of any native or local law or custom, the observance of which is required by any King's Regulations.

57. Judicial notice shall be taken of this Order, and of the commencement thereof, and of the appointment of the Consul-General and Judicial Assistant and of the constitution and limits of the Courts and districts, and of Consular seals and signatures, and of any Rules and Regulations made or in force under this Order, and no proof shall be required of any of such matters.

58. Nothing in this Order shall deprive the Consul-General, or an officer subordinate to him, either as such or as Political Resident in the Persian Gulf, of the right to observe, and to enforce the observance of, or shall deprive any

person of the benefit of any reasonable custom existing within the Persian coast and islands, unless this Order contains some express and specific provision incompatible with the observance thereof.

59. Nothing in this Order shall—

(i.) Affect any power or jurisdiction conferred by, or referred to in, the Act of the Governor-General of India in Council, entitled the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879 (Act XXI of 1879), or in the Indian (Foreign Jurisdiction) Order in Council, 1902; or

(ii.) Affect any jurisdiction for the time being exercisable by the Consul-General under any Imperial Act other than the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890; or

(iii.) Prevent any Consular officer of His Majesty within the Persian coast and islands from doing anything which His Majesty's Consuls in the dominions of any State in amity with His Majesty are for the time being, by law, usage, or sufferance, entitled or enabled to do.

60. Criminal or civil proceedings pending at the commencement of this Order shall, from and after that time, be regulated by the provisions of this Order as far as the nature and circumstances of each case admit.

61. The Consul-General may within the limits of this Order exercise any power conferred on any Justice of the Peace within His Majesty's dominions by any Act of Parliament for the time being in force regulating merchant seamen or the mercantile marine.

62. If a question arises whether any place is or is not within the Persian coast and islands for the purposes of this Order, it shall be referred to the Consul-General, and a certificate under his hand and seal shall be conclusive on the question, and shall be taken judicial notice of by the High Court of Bombay, and by any Court established under this Order.

63. Not later than the thirty-first day of March in each year, or such other day as the Secretary of State directs from time to time, the Consul-General shall send to the Governor-General of India in Council, for transmission to the Secretary of State, a Report on the operation of this Order up to the thirty-first day of December in the previous year, or such other date as the Secretary of State directs from time to time, showing for the last twelve months the number and nature of the proceedings, criminal and civil, taken under this Order, and the result thereof; and the number and amount of fees received, and containing an abstract of the list of registered British subjects and such other information, and being in such form as the Secretary of State from time to time directs.

64.—(1.) A printed copy of this Order, and of all Rules of Procedure and other Rules for the time being in force under this Order, shall be kept open to inspection free of charge in the office of the Consul-General, and of each Court established under this Order.

(2.) Printed copies thereof shall be sold within the Persian coast and islands at such reasonable price as the Consul-General from time to time directs.

65.—(1.) This Order shall be published in the "Gazette of India" within such time after the passing thereof as the Secretary of State may prescribe, and shall come into force on such day (in this Order referred to as the commencement of this Order), within six months after that publication, as the Governor-General of India in Council may, by notification in the said "Gazette," appoint in this behalf.

(2.) But any appointment under this Order may be made at any time after its passing, and no proof shall, in any proceedings, be required of any of the matters prescribed by this Article.

66. As from the commencement of this Order the Orders in Council mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order shall be repealed to the extent therein mentioned; but this repeal shall not—

(a.) Affect the past operation of those Orders, or either of them, or any appointment made, or any right, title, obligation, or liability accrued, or the validity or invalidity of anything done or suffered under any of those Orders, before the making of this Order;

(b.) Interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding or action, criminal or civil, in respect of any offence committed against or forfeiture incurred or liability accrued under or in consequence of any provision of any of those Orders, or any Regulation confirmed by any such Order or made thereunder;

(c.) Take away or abridge any protection or benefit given or to be enjoyed in relation thereto.

(2.) Notwithstanding the repeal of the Orders aforesaid, all Rules and Regulations approved or confirmed by or under any Order so repealed, shall continue and be as if this Order had not been made; but so that the same may be revoked, altered, or otherwise dealt with under this Order, as if they had been made under this Order.

(3.) Criminal or civil proceedings begun under any of the Orders repealed by this Order, and pending at the time when this Order comes into operation, shall, from and after that time, be regulated by the provisions of this Order, as far as the nature and circumstances of each case admit.

67. This Order may be cited as "The Persian Coast and Islands Order in Council, 1907."

And the Right Honourable Sir Edward Grey, Baronet, and the Right Honourable John Morley, two of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Order in Council, bearing date the eleventh August, one thousand nine hundred and two, declaring what is requisite to entitle a volunteer of Volunteer Engineer Corps, Volunteer Divisions of Submarine Miners and Volunteer Electrical Engineers to be deemed an efficient volunteer be cancelled, and that Tables II. and III. in the schedule to this Order annexed be substituted therefor:

And whereas a draft of the scheme to be attached to the proposed fresh Order was on the second day of March laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words mentioned and set forth in the schedule to this Order annexed, and, one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the proposed scheme hath this day been submitted to His Majesty in Council for His approval thereof:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, having this day taken the said scheme into consideration, doth, in pursuance and exercise of the power in His Majesty by the said Act of Parliament in that behalf vested and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, hereby direct the substitution of the said draft scheme, forming the schedule to this Order, to take effect from first November, one thousand nine hundred and six, for Tables II., III., and IV. of the schedule to the aforesaid Order in Council of the eleventh August, one thousand nine hundred and two, and doth also direct the cancellation of those portions of the schedule to the Order in Council.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 8TH MAY 1907.)

RUTLAND (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1907.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Power to make Regulations.

1.—(1.) The Local Authority of the District specified in the Schedule to this Order may, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, make Regulations, with a view to the prevention of worrying of cattle (including sheep), for requiring that dogs or any class of dogs shall, during all or any of the hours between sunset and sunrise, be kept by the owners thereof under control in manner prescribed by the Regulations.

(2.) The Regulations may apply to the whole or any part of the District, and may exempt any class of dogs either generally or under prescribed conditions.

Confirmation of Regulations.

2.—(1.) Regulations made under this Order shall not take effect unless and until they have been submitted to and confirmed by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Unless the Board otherwise direct, the following provisions shall apply—

(i.) Notice of intention to apply for confirmation of any Regulations shall be given in one or more of the local newspapers circulating within the District in two successive issues two weeks at least before the making of the application.

(ii.) For two weeks at least before an application, a copy of the Regulations proposed to be confirmed shall be kept at the office

of the Local Authority of the District, and be open during office hours thereat to the inspection of ratepayers of the District without fee or reward.

(iii.) The Clerk of the Local Authority shall on the application of any such ratepayer furnish him with a copy of the proposed Regulations on payment of sixpence.

(3.) A copy of any Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order, signed and certified by the Clerk of that Local Authority to be a true copy and to have been duly confirmed, shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, in all legal proceedings, of the due making, confirmation, and existence of the Regulations, without further or other proof.

Seizure of Dogs where Regulations are Contravened.

3. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against a Regulation made under this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):—

Section forty-three (powers of police);

Section forty-four (powers of inspectors);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the RUTLAND (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1907.

The licence shall state the market, fair-ground or saleyard at which the sheep are to be exposed, and shall be granted only if the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fair-ground or saleyard is situate have consented to the issue of such a licence, either generally or in the particular instance.

Article 6 (2) of the Sheep-Dipping (England) Order of 1907, which restricts the movement of sheep until they have been dipped, shall not apply in the case of movement of sheep from any premises in the administrative counties of East and West Suffolk or in the county borough of Ipswich for the purpose of exposure in a market, fair-ground or saleyard, if the movement of the sheep from those premises is authorised by a licence which may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which those premises are situate.

2. The licence shall state the market, fair-ground or saleyard at which the sheep are to be exposed, and shall be granted only if the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fair-ground or saleyard is situate have consented to the issue of such a licence, either generally or in the particular instance.
