first north-westward and then westward along the middle of the said roadway or footpath for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with the high road from London to Hastings nearly opposite to the White Horse Inn, and extending thence westward across the said high road for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to the fence forming the southern boundary of the house and premises known as the White Horse Inn and extending thence westward along the said fence and along the fences forming the southern boundaries of the closes numbered one, two, three and four upon the map or plan annexed to this representation and of Hounsell Wood for a distance of forty-nine chains or thereabouts to the south-western corner of Hounsell Wood, and extending thence westward in a straight line for a distance of forty-two chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the road leading from Bugshill Farm to Hurst Green)

road leading from Bugshill Farm to Hurst Green) to the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Salehurst from the said parish of Etchingham crosses the middle of the Tunbridge Wells and Hastings branch line of the South Easteru and Chatham Railway."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chichester.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say :—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirtyfour; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter fortynine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Saviour, situate at Raynes Park, in the parish of Merton, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Southwark.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said

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church of Saint Saviour, situate at Raynes Park, as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of the said diocese of Southwark (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Merton which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Saviour, situate at Raynes Park, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Raynes Park.' "And with the like consent of the said Edward

Stuart, Bishop of the said diocese of Southwark (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Saviour, situate at Raynes Park, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time heing: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend James Edwin Jagger, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Merton, shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Saviour, situate at Raynes Park, as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said James Edwin Jagger: and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto is to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

## "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Saviour, Raynes Park, being:---

"All that part of the parish of Merton, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Southwark, which is bounded upon the southeast partly by the parish of Morden and partly by the parish of Malden, upon the south-west by the last named parish, upon the west by the new parish of New Malden and Coombe, upon the north partly by the parish of Wimbledon and partly by the new parish of Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the east, by an imaginary line com-mencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Holy Trinity, South Wimble-don, from the said parish of Merton, at the junction of the footpath known as "the Chase" with the high road from Kingston, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the high road from Kingston for a distance of thirteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Bushey Mead-road, and continuing thence
