W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the thirtieth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called "the said benefice") of Boston, in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Boston is vested for an estate in fee simple

without incumbrances in the Right Reverend Edward, now Bishop of Lincoln, in his private capacity.

"And whereas the said Edward, Bishop of Lincoln, is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Boston now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and vested in the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being.

"And whereas the said Edward, Bishop of

"And whereas the said Edward, Bishop of Lincoln, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token of his said desire, and also in token of his willingness as such Bishop to accept such transfer, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Boston which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish of Boston.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward, Bishop of Lincoln (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Boston, now vested in him the said Edward, Bishop of Lincoln, in his private capacity as aforesaid, shall be transferred to himself the said Edward, Bishop of Lincoln, as

such Bishop, and to his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edward, Bishop of Lincoln, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other

Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirtyseven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Paul, Clacton-on-Sea, and partly out of the parish of Great Clacton, both in the county of Essex and in the diocese

of Saint Albans.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said new parish of Saint Paul, Clacton-on-Sea, and the said parish of Great Clacton are cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Clacton-on-Sea, and the said parish of Great Clacton, which are hereinafter mentioned and London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in

described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the

purpose of Divine worship.
"And whereas a sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England towards the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and so soon as such district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act then of the said new parish and towards the mainten-ance of the Minister or Incumbent thereof for the time being, and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August, and the first day of November in each year to such Minister or Incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the lastly mentioned Act the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine pounds per annum so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said capital sum of four thousand three hundred pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that we should grant out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act a capital sum of seven hundred pounds sterling in respect of which there should be paid by us to the Minister or Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as before mentioned a yearly sum of twenty-one pounds, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said intended district and of the nomination of the Incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

" And whereas the said grant of seven hundred pounds sterling will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas the contributors of the said sum of four thousand three hundred pounds have nominated the Bishop for the time being of the diocese in which the cure is situate as the person to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall be assigned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Clacton-on-Sea, and the said of Great Clacton, which are scribed in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the

Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint James, Clacton-on-Sea.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and when such district shall have become a new parish then of such new parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans, and his successors, Bishops for the time being of the diocese in which such district or new parish is or shall be situate.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint James, Clacton-on-Sea' comprising:--

"All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Paul, Clacton-on-Sea, and of the parish of Great Clacton, both in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Saint Albans, which, taken together, are bounded upon the south-east by the sea, upon the west by the parish of Saint Osyth, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Osyth from the said parish of Great Clacton at a point in the middle of Parish-road and north of Summerhouse Farm where such road is joined by the footpath leading to Coppen's Green, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction at Coppen's Green with Saint Osyth-road, and extending thence first south-eastward and then eastward along the middle of Saint Osyth-road for a distance of sixty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Old-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Old-road for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Pier-avenue upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Great Clacton from the said new parish of Saint Paul, Clactonon-Sea, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Pier-avenue for a distance of forty chains or thereabouts to the entrance to the Pier, and extending thence in a straight line due south to the sea.'

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Clacton-on-Sea, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Great Clacton, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken.

And whereas the Patrons of the two cures and the Incumbent of the vicarage of the said new

Council ratifying this scheme become and be parish of Saiut Paul, Clacton-on-Sea, have constituted a separate district for spiritual respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas one calendar month has expired since the date of the transmission of such drafts as aforesaid.

And whereas the Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Great Clacton has offered certain objections to the same scheme.

And whereas, notwithstanding these objections, the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

HEREAS by section 373 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that His Majesty by Order in Council may make regulations for carrying into effect and enforcing the entry of fishing boats in the fishing boat register and any convention with a foreign country relative to the registry, lettering, and numbering of fishing boats which is for the time being in force by virtue of any statute, and may by such regulations adopt any existing system of registry or lettering and numbering of boats:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and two, His Majesty did revoke certain regulations then in force for the registry, lettering, and numbering of British sea-fishing boats, and in lieu thereof did make the regulations set forth in the schedule thereto, and did direct that such regulations should come into force on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and two:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty desirable to amend the said Order in Council, dated the twenty-fourth day of March, one

thousand nine hundred and two, in manuer

hereinafter appearing:

And whereas the Commissioners of Customs have approved Buckie as a place for the registry of ships under the Merchant Shipping Acts, and it is necessary that a Register of Sea Fishing Boats shall in future be kept at the Port of Buckie, and that such register shall be kept by the Chief Officer of Customs stationed at that

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been

complied with:

Now therefore His Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the hereinbefore recited Act, and otherwise by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that:

Notwithstanding anything in the said herein-before mentioned Order in Council of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and two, as amended by this Order, a Register of Sea Fishing Boats shall, in addition to the ports and places indicated in the first schedule to such Order, and still subject thereto, be, from and after the date of this Order, kept at Buckie by the Chief Officer of Customs there stationed, and that such officer shall keep the Register of Sea Fishing Boats at such place in like manner as registers are now kept by the Chief Officer of Customs at other ports and places in the United Kingdom, and shall perform all the duties in relation to the registration, lettering, and numbering of Sea Fishing Boats, and the recording of all the entries relating thereto at the said place which are or may be imposed on registrars by any Act or Order.

The distinguishing letters for the said place of registry, Buckie, shall be "B.C.K."

HEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 VV to 1906, it is, among other things, enacted that, if by any law or ordinance made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British Possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such Possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or suspected of being in, such British Possession, His Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any Foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British Possession of the said Acts or any part thereof so far as it relates to such Foreign State, and so long as such law or ordinance continues in force there and no longer.

And whereas by Part I of Chapter 155 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, being an Act of the Parliament of Canada intituled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Criminals," respecting the Extradition of Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said recited Acts, doth order and it is hereby ordered that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as Part I of Chapter 155 of "The Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906," shall continue in force and no longer.

THEREAS by an Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and one, and known as the Ashanti Order in Council, 1901, the territories therein described were annexed to and became part of His Majesty's Dominions, under the name of Ashanti, and provision was made for the administration thereof;

And whereas by a further Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-second day of October, one thousand nine hundred and six, and known as the Ashanti Order in Council, 1906, the boundaries of Ashanti were further defined, and certain territories were annexed thereto, and included therein as part of His Majesty's Dominions;

And whereas by the twelfth Article of the first hereinbefore recited Order, provision was made with reference to the grant of pardons in Ashanti, and it is expedient to revoke the said Article and make further and other provision in

lieu thereof;

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Ucuncil, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:

I. The twelfth Article of the Ashanti Order in Council, 1901, is hereby repealed and revoked without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, and the said Order shall henceforth be construed and take effect as if, instead of the said twelfth Article, the following Article had

been inserted therein:

"XII. (1.) The Governor, or in the absence of the Governor from Ashanti the Chief Commissioner, may, as he shall see occasion, when any crime has been committed within Ashanti, or for which the offender may be tried therein, grant a pardon in His Majesty's name, to any accomplice, not being the actual perpetrator of such crime, who shall give such information and evidence as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the principal offender; and further, may grant to any offender convicted of any crime, save as hereinafter provided, in any court or before any Judge, Justice, Magistrate, or other Officer within Ashanti, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender, for such period as to the Governor, or in the absence of the Governor from Ashanti to the Chief Commissioner, may seem fit, and may remit any fines, penalties, or forfeitures, which may become due and payable."

"(2.) The Governor may, as he shall see occasion, grant to any offender convicted of.

any crime and sentenced therefor to death or imprisonment for any term exceeding five years in any court, or before any Judge, Justice, Magistrate, or other Officer within Ashanti, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender, for such period as to the Governor may seem fit."

II. This Order shall be published in the Gold Coast Government Gazette and shall thereupon come into operation, and the Governor of the Gold Coast Colony shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places, and in such manner, and for such time or times as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto within Ashanti.

III. His Majesty may from time to time revoke, alter, add to, or amend this Order. IV. This Order may be cited as the Ashanti

Order in Council, 1907.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Elgin, K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Order of His Majesty in · Council bearing date the twenty-sixth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and one, and known as the Northern Territories Order in Council, 1901, the territories therein described by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, were defined and delimited, and were named the Northern Territories of the Gold Coast, and provision was made for the administration thereof;

And whereas by a further Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing date the twentysecond day of October, one thousand nine hundred and six, and known as the Northern Territories Order in Council, 1906, the boundaries of the Northern Territories of the Gold Coast were

further defined;

And whereas by the eleventh Article of the first hereinbefore recited Order provision was made with reference to the grant of pardons in the said Northern Territories, and it is expedient to revoke the said Article and make further and other provision in lieu thereof;

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby

ordered, as follows:-

I. The eleventh Article of the Northern Territories Order in Council, 1901, is hereby repealed and revoked without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, and the said Order shall henceforth be construed and take effect as if, instead of the said eleventh Article, the following Article had been inserted therein:

"XI. (1) The Governor, or in the absence of the Governor from the Northern Territories the Chief Commissioner, may, as he shall see

within the Northern Territories, or for which the offender may be tried therein, grant a pardon in His Majesty's name to any accomplice, not being the actual perpetrator of such crime, who shall give such information and evidence as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the principal offender; and further, may grant to any offender convicted of any crime, save as hereinafter provided, in any court, or before any Judge, Justice, Magistrate, or other Officer within the Northern Territories a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender, for such period as to the Governor, or in the absence of the Governor from the Northern Territories to the Chief Commissioner, may seem fit, and may remit any fines, penalties, or forfeitures which may become due and

payable."
(2) The Governor may, as he shall sec occasion, grant to any offender convicted of any crime and sentenced therefor to death or imprisonment for any term exceeding five years in any court, or before any Judge, Justice, Magistrate, or other Officer within the Northern Territories, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender, for such period as to the Governor

may seem fit."

II. This Order shall be published in the Gold Coast Government Gazette and shall thereupon come into operation, and the Governor of the Gold Coast Colony shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places, and in such manner, and for such time or times as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto within the Northern Territories.

III. His Majesty may from time to time revoke,

alter, add to, or amend this Order.

IV. This Order may be cited as the Northern Territories Order in Council, 1907.

words following, viz.:-"Whereas by the twentieth section of an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her late Majesty's reign, chapter eighty-nine, entitled the Greenwich Hospital Act, 1865, it is, amongst other things, enacted that the Admiralty shall from time to time continue to appoint such officers, clerks, and servants, for the purposes of the Hospital and Schools as seem fit, and may (subject to the approval of Your Majesty in Council), fix the salaries of such officers and

"And whereas by an Order in Council of Her occasion, when any crime has been committed | late Majesty bearing date the sixteenth of April,

one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, it was directed that the salary attached to the appointment of Director of Greenwich Hospital should be one thousand pounds per annum.

"And whereas we are of opinion that this salary should now be revised.

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize the scale of salary of the Director of Greenwich Hospital to be at the rate and on the scale of one thousand pounds to one thousand two hundred pounds a year, rising by fifty pounds a year, as from the twenty-seventh May, one thousand nine hundred and seven, and to authorize an immediate increment of fifty pounds to the present holder of the appointment as from that

HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, viz.:-

"Whereas by section three of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted inter olia that all pay, pensions and other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Royal Marine Forces to a person being or having been an Officer, seaman, or marine therein shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council.

Article 6 (2) of the Sheep-Dipping (England) Order of 1907, which restricts the movement of sheep until they have been dipped, shall not apply in the case of movement of sheep from any premises in the administrative county of East Sussex, or the county boroughs of Brighton or Hastings, for the purpose of exposure in a market, fair-ground or saleyard, if the movement of the sheep from those premises is authorised by a licence which may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which those premises are situate.
- 2. The licence shall state the market, fair-ground or saleyard at which the sheep are to be exposed, and shall be granted only if the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fair-ground or saleyard is situate have consented to the issue of such a licence, either generally or in the particular instance.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Power to make Regulations.

- 1.—(1.) The Local Authority of either of the Districts specified in the Schedule to this Order may, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, make Regulations, with a view to the prevention of worrying of cattle (including sheep), for requiring that dogs or any class of dogs shall, during all or any of the hours between sunset and sunrise, be kept by the owners thereof under control in manner prescribed by the Regulations.
- (2.) The Regulations may apply to the whole or any part of the District, and may exempt any class of dogs either generally or under prescribed conditions.

Confirmation of Regulations.

2.—(1.) Regulations made under this Order shall not take effect unless and until they have been submitted to and confirmed by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Unless the Board otherwise direct, the following provisions shall apply-

(i.) Notice of intention to apply for confirmation of any Regulations shall be given in one or more of the local newspapers circulating within the District in two successive issues two weeks at least before the making of the application.

(ii.) For two weeks at least before an application, a copy of the Regulations proposed to be confirmed shall be kept at the office of the Local Authority of the District, and be open during office hours thereat to the inspection of ratepayers of the District

without fee or reward.

(iii.) The Clerk of the Local, Authority shall

on the application of any such ratepayer furnish him with a copy of the proposed Regulations on payment of sixpence.

(3.) A copy of any Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order, signed and certified by the Clerk of that Local Authority to be a true copy and to have been duly confirmed, shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, in all legal proceedings, of the due making, confirmation, and existence of the Regulations, without further or other proof.

Seizure of Dogs where Regulations are Contravened.

3. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against a Regulation made under this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):--

Section forty-three (powers of police);

Section forty-four (powers of inspectors);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisious of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the Inverness-SHIRE (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1907.

THAMES CONSERVANCY.

OTICE is hereby given, that the Conservators of the River Thames propose to make the following Bye-laws :-

BYE-LAWS for the Regulation of the River Thames and the Navigation thereof and for Other

The Conservators of the River Thames in exercise of the powers and authority vested in them by the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, do make the following Bye-laws, that is to say :-

1. All bye-laws, rules and orders for the regulation, management and improvement of the River Thames and the navigation thereof and of the lands appertaining thereto and for the government, good order, regulation and registration of vessels in or upon the said river and of persons navigating the same or using the towing paths, piers, landing places or any of the locks thereof except the bye-laws of the 26th day of August, 1893, for the protection, preservation and regulation of the fisheries, the Thames Motor Launch Bye-laws, 1906, and the Tower Bridge Navigation Bye-laws for the time being in force shall after these present bye-laws have been confirmed by the Board of Trade be and the same are hereby repealed.

2. These bye-laws may be cited as "The Thames Bye-laws, 1907," and shall come into operation the day after the same are confirmed by the Board of Trade.

Preliminary.

3. These bye-laws shall be applicable to the Thames as defined by the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and to all places over which the Conservators have jurisdiction to make bye-laws under the provisions of the said Act except where the same or any of them are expressly limited to any particular part or parts of the river or place.

4. In these bye-laws the words and expressions hereinafter mentioned shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them respectively unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction, viz.:—
The expression "The Thames" or "river"

means and includes so much of the Rivers Thames and Isis respectively as are between the town of Cricklade, in the county of Wilts, and an imaginary straight line drawn from the entrance to Yantlet Creek, in the county of Kent, to the City Stone opposite to Canvey Island, in the county of Essex, and so much of the River Kennet as is between the common landing place at Reading, in the county of Berks, and the River Thames, and so much of the River Lee and Bow Creek respectively as are below the south boundary stones in the Lee Conservancy Act, 1868, mentioned, and all locks, cuts and works within the said portions of rivers and creeks, provided that no dock, lock, canal or cut existing at the passing of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and constructed under the authority of Parliament and belonging to any body corporate established under such authority and no bridge over the River Thames or the River Kennet belonging to or vested in any county 'council or municipal authority or to or in any railway company shall be deemed to form part of the Thames.

The word "person" includes a corpora-

tion whether aggregate or sole.

The word "horse" includes all draught animals.

The word "vessel" includes any ship lighter, keel, barge, launch, houseboat, pleasure or other boat, randan, wherry, skiff, dingey, shallop, punt, canoe, yacht, raft, float, float of timber or craft whatever whether navigated by steam or otherwise.

The word "lighter" means any dumb barge or other like craft for carrying goods or any sailing barge with her mast and gear lowered on deck.

The expression "steam vessel" includes any vessel propelled by machinery.

The expression "steam launch" applies to a steam vessel not being used solely as a tug or for the carriage of goods and not being certified by the Board of Trade as a passenger steamer to carry two hundred or more passengers.

The expression "pleasure boat" includes any ship, launch, houseboat, boat, randan, wherry, skiff, dingey, shallop, punt, canoe or yacht, whether navigated by steam or otherwise, not being used solely as a tug or for the carriage of goods, and not being certified by the Board of Trade as a passenger steamer to carry two hundred or more passengers, whether private or for hire.

The expression "pleasure boat for hire" means any pleasure boat let for hire or used or intended to be used for any purpose of profit except such pleasure boats as are let for hire for a period of not less than four weeks continuously to one and the same person.

The expression "private pleasure boat" means any pleasure boat other than a boat for hire, and includes such as are let for a period of not less than four weeks continuously to one and the same person.

The expression "under steam" means under steam, electricity or other mechanical power.

The expression "steam whistle" includes any efficient sound signal approved by the

The expression "short blast" shall mean a blast of about one second's duration.

The expression "prolonged blast" shall mean a blast of from 4 to 6 seconds' duration.

The word "master" when used in relation to any vessel means any person whether the owner, master or other person lawfully or wrongfully having or taking the command, charge or management of the vessel for the time being.

The word "harbour-master" means and shall apply to each of the harbour masters and to any person authorised by the Conservators to assist them or to perform the duties of a harbour-master.

The expression "permission of the Conservators" or "consent of the Conservators" means permission or consent of the Conservators in writing signed by the Secretary.

The words "in writing" applied to any

document include documents wholly printed or wholly written or partly printed and partly written.

A vessel is "under way" within the meaning of these bye-laws when she is not at anchor, moored or made fast to the shore or ground and when she is dropping up or down the river with her anchor on the ground.

The word "visible" when applied to lights means visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere.

The words "by day" shall mean between sunrise and sunset and the words "by night" between sunset and sunrise.

The word "Secretary" means the person for the time being acting as Secretary to the Conservators.

The expression "due notice" means a notice in writing given by the Conservators or by any person duly authorised by them to act in their behalf.

The word "certificate" means certificate

in writing signed by the Secretary.

The word "officer" means any officer of the Conservators or any person employed by them to carry out the provisions of these bye-laws.

The words "the register" mean the register kept by the Conservators in pursuance of sections 138, 139 and 140 of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894.

Words importing the masculine gender only shall include females and words importing the singular only shall include the plural.

5. In these bye-laws every steam vessel which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing vessel, and every vessel under steam, whether also under sail or not, is to be considered a steam vessel.

For Preventing Collisions. Lights and other Visible Signals.

6. The master of every vessel shall comply with the following bye-laws as to visible signals in all weathers, as to lights by night and as to other visible signals by day, and during such times no other lights or other visible signals which may be mistaken for the lights or other visible signals prescribed by these bye-laws shall be exhibited.

Lights, &c., required below Hampton Church. 7. A steam vessel other than a steam launch

when under way shall carry :--

(a) On or in front of the foremast or if a vessel without a foremast then in the forepart of the vessel at a height above the hull of not less than twenty feet, and if the breadth of the vessel exceeds twenty feet then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, so however that the light need not be carried at a greater height above the hull than forty feet a bright white light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twenty points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light ten points on each side of the vessel, viz.:—from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least two miles. Provided that steam vessels which navigate both above and below London Bridge shall not be required to carry their lights at a greater height than twelve feet above the hull.

Such steam vessels navigating above London Bridge only may carry the white light at any convenient height above and in line with the stem.

(b) On the starboard side a green light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the starboard side and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile.

(c) On the port side a red light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the port side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile.

(d) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least three feet forward from the light so as to prevent these lights from being seen across

the bow.

(e) A steam vessel when towing another vessel, or when attached for the purpose of towing or manceuvring such vessel, shall, in addition to her side lights, carry two bright white lights in a vertical line, one over the other, not less than four feet apart. Each of these lights shall be of the same construction and character, and shall be carried in the same position as the white light which other steam vessels are required to carry.

Such steam vessel may carry a small white light abaft the funnel or aftermast for the vessel towed to steer by, but such light shall not.

be visible forward of the beam.

8. Every steam launch when under way shall-

(a) On or before the foremast, or, if there be no foremast, on the funnel or on a staff at the bow, in either case at a height above the hull of not less than four feet, a bright white light so fixed as to throw the light ten points on each side of the vessel, viz., from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side, which light shall in the case of a steam launch registered under the provisions of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, be behind a glass shade or slide upon which the registered number of such steam launch shall be legibly and conspicuously painted in black figures, and which light shall in the case of any other launch be behind a glass which shall be perfectly plain and clear.

(b) On the starboard side a green light so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead

to two points abaft the beam.

(c) On the port side a red light so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam.

(d) Each of such lights shall be of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at

least one mile.

9. A sailing vessel under way, and any vessel not under steam, being towed other than a lighter or a float or raft of timber shall carry the same lights as are prescribed by bye-law 7 for a steam vessel under way, with the exception of the white lights mentioned therein, which they shall never carry.

10. A lighter, float or raft of timber when under way, and not in tow, shall by night have a white light of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile always ready, and exhibit the same on the approach of any vessel.

11. (a) The master of a steam vessel or of any vessel which is towing any lighter, float or raft of timber shall cause a white light of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least a mile to be exhibited on the stern or after part of such lighter, float or raft of timber. Provided that if there be more than one such lighter, float or raft of timber being towed in line the white light above referred to shall be

exhibited on the stern or after part of the sternmost or last of such line.

(b) The master of a steam vessel which is towing any lighter lashed alongside shall cause a white light to be exhibited on the side of such lighter furthest from such steam vessel.

12. A vessel other than a lighter, float or raft of timber which is being overtaken by another vessel shall show from her stern to such last mentioned

vessel a white light or a flare up light.

The white light required to be shown by this bye-law may be fixed and exhibited continuously, but in such case the lantern shall be so constructed, fitted and screened that it shall throw an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 12 points of the compass, viz.: for six points from right aft on each side of the vessel so as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile. Such light shall be carried as nearly as practicable on the same level as the side lights.

This bye-law shall not apply to boats, wherries, punts or canoes, or to steam launches registered under the provisions of the Thames Conservancy

Act, 1894.

13. A vessel under one hundred and fifty feet in length, when at anchor or moored, shall exhibit forward where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull, a white light (hereinafter called the riding light) in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

A vessel of one hundred and fifty feet or upwards in length when at anchor or moored shall exhibit in the forward part of the vessel at a height of not less than twenty and not exceeding forty feet above the hull one such light and at or near the stern of the vessel and at such a height that it shall be not less than fifteen feet lower than the forward light another such light.

Provided that-

(a) Where masted vessels are lying in tiers no other vessel other than the outermost offshore and the innermost inshore of such vessels in each tier shall be required to exhibit the riding light or lights above prescribed.

(b) Lighters lying at the usual barge moorings in the river above Gravesend are not

required to exhibit the riding light.

(c) Every steam vessel, sailing vessel or lighter moored permanently head and stern in the river shall in addition to or in lieu of the riding light exhibit such light or lights as the Conservators shall from time to time order or direct.

The length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her certificate of registry.

14. A vessel of one hundred and fifty feet or upwards in length shall by day when at anchor in Gravesend Reach exhibit a black ball or shape of not less than two feet in diameter such ball or shape to be fixed in the forward part of the vessel at a height of not less than 20 and not more than 40 feet above the hull.

This bye-law shall not apply to vessels used

as hulks and moored fore and aft.

A vessel other than a lighter of one hundred feet or upwards in length aground in or near the fairway shall by night exhibit in the forward part of such vessel three lights placed vertically of which the centre one is to be red and the other two white, such lights to be visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile and by day shall exhibit two black balls ! by any vessel.

or shapes not less than two feet in diameter which shall be placed vertically in the forward part of the vessel not less than six feet apart.

A vessel of one hundred and fifty feet or upwards in length shall by night in addition to the above-mentioned lights exhibit the after light required to be carried by a vessel at anchor.

The lights or balls or shapes mentioned in this bye-law shall be so placed that the lowermost in the forward part of the vessel shall be at a height of not less than 20 feet and not more than 40 feet above the hull and the after light not less than 15 feet lower than the lowermost forward light.

This bye-law shall not apply to vessels lying

at tiers, jetties or wharves.

16. All vessels when employed to mark the positions of wrecks or other obstructions shall exhibit where the same may best be seen by day a green flag and by night two white lights placed horizontally not less than six nor more

than twelve feet apart.

17. Every steam dredger moored in the river shall in addition to the lights prescribed by Byelaw 13 exhibit three white lights from globular lanterns not less than eight inches in diameter the said three lights to be placed in a triangular form with the apex uppermost at right angles to the keel and to be of sufficient power to be visible at a distance of at least one mile and to be placed not less than six feet apart on the highest part of the framework athwartships.

This bye-law shall not apply to dredgers lying

at tiers, jetties or wharves.

Lights Required above Hampton Church.

18. Every steam vessel shall when navigating above Hampton Church carry the following lights:

(a) On or before the foremast or if there be no foremast on the funnel or on a staff at the bow in either case at a height above the hull of not less than four feet a bright white light so fixed as to throw the light ten points on each side of the vessel, viz., from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side which light shall in the case of a steam launch registered under the provisions of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, be behind a glass shade or slide upon which the registered number of such steam launch shall be legibly and conspicuously painted in black figures and which lights shall in the case of any other vessel be behind a glass which shall be perfectly plain and clear.

(b) On the starboard side a green light so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead

to two points abaft the beam.

(c) On the port side a red light so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam.

(d) Each of such lights shall be of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least one mile.

Sound Signals.

19. The signals by whistle mentioned in the following bye-laws shall not be made by means of a siren or any instrument other than an ordinary steam whistle or other efficient sound signal approved by the Conservators and shall not be used on any occasion or for any purpose except those therein mentioned and no other signal by whistle or sound signal shall be made

20. When vessels are in sight of one another a steam vessel under way in taking any course authorized or required by these bye-laws shall indicate that course by the following signals on her steam whistle, viz.:—

One short blast to mean "I am directing

my course to starboard."

Two short blasts to mean "I am directing my course to port."

Three short blasts to mean "My engines

are going astern."

- 21. When a steam vessel under way is about to turn round she shall signify the same by four short blasts of the steam whistle in rapid succession and whilst turning shall repeat such signal to any approaching vessel which latter vessel shall thereupon take such action as may be necessary to avoid collision.
- 22. When a steam vessel under way is for any reason not under command, or is unable to manceuvre as required by these bye-laws, she shall signify the same to any approaching vessel by sounding on her steam whistle three blasts in succession, viz.:—a prolonged blast followed by two short blasts, and thereupon such approaching vessel shall take such action as may be possible to avoid collision.

The onus of proving that the above-mentioned signal was proper and necessary shall lie on the

master of the vessel giving the same.

23. A vessel coming out of dock shall signify the same by a prolonged blast of the steam whistle, except in the case of a vessel coming out of the St. Katharine's Dock requiring the bascules of the Tower Bridge to be raised in order to get into position in the river, which shall signify the same by a prolonged blast of the steam whistle followed by three short blasts in rapid succession.

In the case of a vessel not under steam the tug in attendance shall make the foregoing signals.

For Vessels in Fog.

24. All signals prescribed by this bye-law for vessels under way shall be given:—

(1) By steam vessels—on the ordinary steam whistle, or other efficient sound signal approved by the Conservators.

(2) By sailing vessels and vessels not under steam towed other than lighters—on the

fog-horn.

A steam vessel shall be provided with an efficient whistle sounded by steam, electricity or other mechanical power, so placed that the sound may not be intercepted by any obstruction, and with an efficient fog-horn to be sounded by mechanical means, and also with an efficient bell. A sailing vessel of twenty tons gross tonnage or upwards shall be provided with a similar fog-horn and bell.

In fog, mist, falling snow or heavy rain storms, whether by day or night, the signals described in this bye-law shall be used as follows, viz.:—

(a) A steam vessel having way upon her shall sound at intervals of not more than two minutes a prolonged blast.

(b) A steam vessel under way, but stopped and having no way upon her, shall sound at intervals of not more than two minutes two prolonged blasts with an interval of about one second between them.

(c) A sailing vessel under way shall sound at intervals of not more than one minute when on the starboard tack one blast, when on the port tack two blasts in succession, and when with the wind abaft the beam or becalmed three blasts in succession.

- (d) A vessel when in the fairway and not under way shall at intervals of not more than one minute ring the bell rapidly for about five seconds.
- (e) A vessel when towing and a vessel under way which is unable to get out of the way of an approaching vessel through being not under command or unable to manœuvre as required by these bye-laws shall, instead of the signals prescribed in sub-sections (a) and (c) of this bye-law, at intervals of not more than two minutes sound three blasts in succession, viz.:—one prolonged blast followed by two short blasts. A vessel towed may give this signal, and she shall not give any other.

Sailing vessels of less than twenty tons gross tonnage and lighters shall not be obliged to give the above-mentioned signals, but if they do not they shall make some other efficient sound signal at intervals of not more than one minute.

This bye-law shall not apply to keels, house-boats, pleasure or other boats, randans, wherries, skiffs, dinghies, shallops, punts, canoes, floats or rafts of timber.

25. Every vessel shall in fog, mist, falling snow or heavy rain storms go at a moderate speed, having careful regard to the existing circumstances and conditions.

A steam vessel hearing apparently forward of her beam the fog-signal of a vessel the position of which is not ascertained shall, so far as the circumstances of the case admit, stop her engines, and then navigate with caution until danger of collision is over.

Steering and Sailing.

- 26. When two sailing vessels are approaching each other so as to involve risk of collision, one of them shall keep out of the way of the other, viz.:—
 - (a) A vessel which is running free shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is closehauled.
 - (b) A vessel which is close-hauled on the port tack shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled on the starboard tack.
 - (c) When both are running free with the wind on different sides the vessel which has the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the other.
 - (d) When both are running free with the wind on the same side the vessel which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is to leeward.
 - (e) A vessel which has the wind aft shall keep out of the way of the other vessel.
- 27. When a steam vessel and a sailing vessel are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam vessel shall keep out of the way of the sailing vessel.
- 28. Every steam vessel shall when it is safe and practicable keep to that side of midchannel which lies on the starboard side of such vessel, so that she may with a port helm always be and be kept clear of any steam vessel proceeding in the opposite direction.

. 29. Every steam vessel crossing the river shall be navigated so as not to cause obstruction, injury or damage to any other vessel.

30. Every steam vessel under way turning round in the river and every vessel being turned round by a steam vessel shall be navigated so as not to cause obstruction, injury or damage to any other vessel.

31. Every steam vessel navigating against the tide shall if necessary on approaching points or sharp bends in the river ease her speed and stop and wait before rounding so as to allow any vessel navigating with the tide to round and pass clear of her.

32. Every vessel overtaking any other shall keep out of the way of the overtaken vessel.

Every vessel coming up with another vessel from any direction more than two points abaft her beam, i.e., in such a position with reference to the vessel which she is overtaking that at night she would be unable to see either of that vessel's side lights, shall be deemed to be an overtaking vessel, and no subsequent alteration of the bearing between the two vessels shall relieve the overtaking vessel of the duty of keeping clear of the overtaken vessel until she is finally past and clear.

As by day the overtaking vessel cannot always know with certainty whether she is forward or abaft this direction she shall if in doubt assume she is an overtaking vessel and keep out of the

way.

33. Where by these bye-laws one of two vessels is to keep out of the way the other shall when it is safe and practicable keep her course and speed.

34. Every steam vessel which is directed by these bye-laws to keep out of the way of another vessel shall on approaching her if necessary

slacken her speed or stop or reverse.

35. Every vessel which is directed by these bye-laws to keep out of the way of another vessel shall if the circumstances of the case admit avoid crossing ahead of the other.

36. Every steam vessel navigating against the stream above Teddington Lock shall if necessary ease and stop to allow vessels coming down with the stream to pass clear of her, particularly when rounding points or sharp bends in the river.

37. The master of every vessel in obeying these bye-laws shall have due regard to all dangers of navigation and collision and to any special circumstances which may render a departure from them necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

38. The master of every vessel shall keep or cause to be kept a proper look out and shall comply with all bye-laws as to lights and signals and shall observe all precautions which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen or by the special circumstances of the case.

Navigable Passage.

39. There shall be maintained as far as practicable between London Bridge and the Tower Bridge a navigable passage not less than two hundred feet wide for vessels passing up and down the river.

40. There shall be maintained as far as practicable between the Tower Bridge and Barking Creek a navigable passage not less than three hundred feet wide for vessels passing up and down the river, and in all parts of the river where the navigable passage shall be in the stream between tiers of vessels the space for the navigable passage shall be reckoned from the vessel in each of the said tiers nearest to the other or opposite tier.

41. All vessels navigating Gravesend Reach except vessels intending to anchor therein shall be kept to the northward of the anchorage ground

hereinafter defined.

All vessels anchoring in the Reach shall bring up in such anchorage ground and all vessels so anchoring and remaining beyond a period of 24 hours are to be moored.

The anchorage ground is that portion of the Reach which lies within the boundary lines hereinafter described.

The southern boundary line is that part of the south shore which lies between the eastern and western boundary lines.

The northern boundary line is that part of an imaginary line drawn from the Northfleet Lighthouse (S. 88° E. true) on with the northernmost of three high chimneys at the Cement Works at Northfleet extending eastward which lies between the eastern and western boundary lines.

The western boundary line is an imaginary line drawn from a spot on the southern shore (N. true) to the western side of the Tilbury Hotel extending northward until it meets the northern boundary line.

The eastern boundary line is an imaginary line drawn from the Explosives Notice Board in Higham Bight (N. true) and extending north-

ward until it meets the northern boundary line.

N.B.—At night the Northfleet Lighthouse shows a white occulting light to the northward of the northern boundary line and a red occulting light to the southward of such line over the

anchorage ground.

- 42. The navigable part of the channel of the river above Richmond Lock shall at all times be kept clear for the passage of vessels navigated thereon and no vessel shall be stopped in the navigable part of the said channel so as to impede or obstruct the free and clear passage of any other vessel and no ryepeck or punt pole shall be left fixed in any part of the bed of the river.
- 43. If any vessel or thing shall be stopped, be aground or sunk or placed in any part of the river above Richmond Lock so as to impede or obstruct the free and clear navigation thereof the owner or any person having the care of such vessel or thing shall immediately on the request of any person impeded or obstructed thereby or of any officer of the Conservators remove such impediment or obstruction so as to clear the channel and on the refusal or neglect of such owner or other person to remove such obstruction forthwith any officer of the Conservators may remove or cause the same to be removed and if necessary cause any such vessel to be unloaded and the cost of such removal and unloading shall be paid by the owner of such vessel or thing.

Navigation and Management.

- 44. Every steam vessel navigating above Teddington Lock shall where the channel or depth of water permits be navigated in mid river.
- 45. No float or floats or raft or rafts of timber either singly or together exceeding sixty feet in length (excepting timber in one length) and twenty feet in width shall be permitted to go into or pass along any part of the river unless such float or floats or raft or rafts be towed by a steam vessel efficient for the purpose in which case they shall not exceed 150 feet in length (excepting timber in one length) and 30 feet in width nor in either case shall any following float or raft of timber go within a distance of three hundred yards of any other such float or raft.
- 46. The master of every vessel which through accident or other cause has sunk in the river

shall forthwith send notice thereof giving the position to the Harbour Master.

47. The master of every vessel which has slipped or parted from her anchor shall forthwith send notice thereof giving the position of such anchor to the Harbour Master.

This bye-law shall not apply to vessels belonging to the Conservators employed in raising a wreck or to any wreck in charge of the Con-

48. No anchor shall be allowed to lie or remain in the river outside of the line of the tiers.

49. Every vessel when navigating or lying in the river shall carry her anchor in such a position as not to cause injury or damage to any other vessel.

50. No steam vessel shall be worked, navigated or placed upon or anchored or moored in the river within three hundred and sixty feet of His Majesty's dock-yard or arsenal at Woolwich or of His Majesty's victualling yard at Deptford except steam vessels belonging to or employed in the service of His Majesty, his heirs or successors and no vessel shall be anchored in the river within a similar distance of His Majesty's powder hulk "Thalia" except for the purpose of loading or discharging explosives out of or into such powder hulk.

51. No steam vessel attached to any mooring buoy, mooring post, dolphin, jetty or landing place shall set her engines in motion so that injury or damage may be caused to such mooring buoy, mooring post, dolphin, jetty or landing place or any vessel or thing whatsoever.

52. The master of every steam vessel navigating the river shall be on one of the paddle boxes or on the bridge of such steam vessel during the whole of the time it is under way and shall remove or cause to be removed any person other than the crew who shall be on the paddle boxes or bridge of such steam vessel.

Above Teddington Lock this bye-law shall apply only to steam vessels which are used for the carriage of passengers or for purposes of excursions and which are not steered from the bows or bridge.

53. No master of any vessel shall load or discharge any cargo ballast fuel refuse or rubbish any part of which is liable in the course of such loading or discharging to fall into the river without taking such precautions by affixing canvas or tarpaulins or other suitable material or thing as shall effectually prevent any such cargo ballast fuel refuse or rubbish from falling into the river.

54. No lighter or sailing barge shall lie in or be navigated on the river below Battersea Bridge without having a freeboard of at least fifteen inches, such freeboard to be measured amidships and coamings (if any) may be included in such measurement but in no case must the top of the deck or gunwale be less than three inches above the water's edge when such craft is decked and hatched or less than six inches above the water's edge when such craft is open.

55. No vessel shall be moored to or remain at any pier or premises belonging to the Conservators without the permission of the officer in charge of such pier or premises being first obtained and shall move away when ordered by such officer so to do.

56. All vessels navigating the river shall be navigated singly and separately except small boats fastened together or towed alongside or astern of other vessels and except vessels towed by steam vessels.

57. Vessels towed by steam vessels navigating the river below the Albert Bridge at Chelse^a shall if more than two in number be placed two abreast (except vessels trading on any canal and not exceeding fourteen feet nine inches in width, which may be placed three abreast) and not more than six of any such vessels shall be towed together at the same time and no tow of vessels shall exceed in length the following limits, namely :-

Above London Bridge 400 feet Between London Bridge and the

landing place at the end of

Trinity-street, Charlton 320 feet Below the said landing place 400 feet to be calculated from the stern of the vessel towing to the stern of the aftermost vessel

A steam vessel may tow another vessel lashed alongside of her, but shall not at any one time tow more than one vessel in such a manner.

58. Vessels towed by steam vessels navigating between the Albert Bridge at Chelsea and Hampton Church may be placed in a single line but shall not be placed more than two abreast (except vessels trading on any canal and not exceeding fourteen feet nine inches in width which may be placed three abreast) and not more than six of any such vessels shall be towed together at the same time and the distance between any two of the vessels so towed shall not exceed fifty feet.

59. Vessels towed by steam vessels navigating the river above Hampton Church shall be placed in a single line, and not more than four such vessels shall be towed together at the same time, and the distance between any two of the vessels so towed shall not exceed sixty feet.

60. The master of every steam vessel which is being used as a tug shall when approaching the toll collecting station at Kew so navigate his vessel as to avoid overcrowding at the said station, and shall if necessary ease the speed of his vessel at a sufficient distance from the said station to allow for the collection of tolls from any other vessel, and shall if necessary stop and await her turn for payment of tolls, such turn to be determined according to the order of arrival.

61. No vessel exceeding three hundred and one feet in length and in the case of a paddle wheel steamer exceeding sixty-five feet in width measured from the outside of the paddle boxes, and in the case of other vessels exceeding thirtysix feet in width which is used only or principally for the carriage of passengers, or for the purposes of excursions shall be navigated in the river above Blackwall Pier.

For the purposes of this bye-law the length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her Certificate of Registry.

62. Any lighter navigating the river shall have at least one competent man constantly on board for the navigation and management thereof, and all such craft exceeding fifty tons, but of not more than one hundred and fifty tons burden, shall when under way have one man in addition, and all such craft exceeding one hundred and fifty tons burden shall when under way have two men in addition on board to assist in the navigation and management of the same with the following exceptions: -When being towed by a steam vessel or when being moved to and fro between any vessels or places a distance not exceeding two hundred yards.

The word "burden" in this bye-law shall

have the same meaning as the expression "burden tonnage" defined by the Thames Watermen's and Lightermen's Act, 1893.

63. No vessel shall without the previous

63. No vessel shall without the previous consent of the Harbour Master be placed or be in such a position as to obstruct or interfere with the access to any Dock entrance.

This bye-law does not apply to vessels in the employment of or belonging to the Conservators.

64. No vessel shall be moored to or placed in front of the towing path so as to cause an obstruction to or interference with either the navigation of the river or the use of the towing path.

65. When any vessel is stopped between the towing path and the navigable channel the mast or towing mast or the funnel (if any) shall be lowered so as to permit the towing lines of any other vessel to pass without obstruction, and when any vessel shall be moored at any wharf or elsewhere in the river the same shall be securely made fast at both ends thereof, and shall be laid as close to and along the side or front of such wharf or mooring place as conveniently may be.

66. No vessel shall be towed upon the river from the bank otherwise than from a mast of sufficient height to protect the banks, gates and works from injury by the towing line except in places where the strength of the stream renders it necessary that the line should be brought down to the vessel and made fast.

67. The owner or other person in charge of every vessel on the river shall obey and conform to the directions of every officer of the Conservators, and of every person for the time being in their employ.

68. No houseboat or steam launch shall lie or loiter in any part of the river from time to time marked off by the Conservators, or defined by notice given by the Conservators or by notice-boards set up by them as being a part of the river in which no houseboat or steam launch shall lie or loiter. Provided always that nothing in this bye-law shall prevent any pleasure boat from remaining during any regatta, boat race, procession or other special occasion at such place and for such length of time as may be sanctioned by the Conservators or any of their officers.

69. Any person engaged in navigating or employed on or using or being in, upon or about the river or the banks or towing paths thereof, or any land of the Conservators who shall be intoxicated or make use of obscene, scandalous, abusive, indecent or improper language to any officer of the Conservators whilst employed in the performance of the duties of his office, or to the annoyance of any person who shall be in, upon or about the river or the banks or towing paths thereof or any land of the Conservators, or who shall obstruct any officer of the Conservators in the execution of his duty, shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these bye-laws, and be liable to the penalty hereinafter mentioned.

70. The master or owner of any vessel entering or leaving the Thames subject to the payment of duties of tonnage, and which has not been entered at the office of His Majesty's Customs, and on which the duties of tonnage have not been paid to the receiver there, shall furnish the Conservators for the purpose of registration with full particulars of the name, tonnage and owner of such vessel, and the port to which she belongs, and shall send a return once in every month of the arrival and departure of such.

vessel during the preceding month to the office of the Conservators, and shall pay to the Conservators the duties of tonnage which are then payable for each time of arrival in and departure from the river pursuant to the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and the Thames Conservancy Act, 1905.

71. The owner or occupier of any pier, jetty or other structure in the river or on the shore thereof shall light or mark such pier, jetty or other structure in such manner as the Conservators may from time to time direct.

72. No advertisement or advertising notice shall be exhibited upon or by means of any vessel or otherwise on or over the river except advertisements or notices by the owner of any vessel on such vessel for the purposes of or in reference to his trade or business.

. The expression "owner" in this bye-law shall mean the person whose name appears in the certificate of registration of such vessel.

73. No person other than the occupier of land adjoining the towing path shall allow cattle to pasture on the towing path and no person shall ride or drive any horse thereon except when towing a vessel or drive any cart, wagon, vehicle or machine over or upon any part of the towing path unless there be a public right of way for such cart, wagon, vehicle or machine.

74. No person shall remove any material whatsoever from the banks, weirs, tumbling bays, towing paths or lands or any works of the Conservators.

75. No vessel shall enter any lock unless there be sufficient water to float and carry such vessel through such lock and the channel or cut leading to or from the same, and no vessel shall stop in any lock longer than is necessary for the filling or emptying of the lock and passage through the same

76. If any vessel shall have passed through any lock and the toll for the passage thereof shall not have been duly paid such toll may be demanded and taken at any other lock or at any place on or near the Thames within the jurisdiction of the Conservators through or by which such vessel is to pass and no master shall remove his vessel from such lock or place at which such toll has been demanded until the same has been paid.

77. No vessel shall enter any lock with sail up nor hoist any sail during the time it continues in the lock.

78. When any vessel used for carrying goods or merchandize, steam tug or steam launch enters a lock a rope or chain shall be immediately put out from the bow and stern of such vessel and made fast on shore in order to prevent the vessel from running foul of the gates or works or other vessels in the lock.

79. No person shall without the consent of the ferryman first obtained take away or use any ferry boat or any pole or tackle belonging to such ferry.

80. No boat or punt shall be used as a ferry for the conveyance of persons on the River Thames unless previously licensed by the Harbour Master of the district. Every such licence shall state the number of persons which the said boat or punt is licensed to carry at any one time and the said number shall be kept legibly and clearly inscribed on some prominent position in the said boat or punt. The master of such boat or punt shall not at any one time carry more

than the number of persons allowed by the said licence.

81. No person on board any vessel shall without actual necessity place or hold a pole or boat hook against any bank or towing path or works on the river so as to injure or damage the same.

82. No owner of a towing horse or his servant or driver shall permit or suffer the horse to trespass, graze or trample on land adjoining the towing path or leave any gate on the towing path or bridge open or leave any swing-bridge open or suffer the towing line to tear away or

damage any rail, gate, post, bridge or works.

83. No person shall without the previous consent of the Conservators erect any new buck or weir or drive or affix any pile or stake or make any hedge or plant any willows or osiers in the

84. No person without the previous express consent of the lock keeper shall use, interfere or meddle with the gear at any lock or weir or with any sluice belonging to the Conservators.

85. No owner or occupier of a mill shall except in case of sudden necessity draw down the water at the mill for the purpose of repairing the works of such mill or for cleansing the mill stream unless he shall have given notice in writing of his intention so to do to the Conservators at their

office seven days previously thereto.

86. Two flashes and no more shall be penned for or drawn in a week and those only on such days and at such hours as the Conservators from time to time appoint. Previously to the drawing for such flashes all the flood-gates and sluices and shuttles at all mills and weirs affected thereby shall be close shut in and be kept close shut in till the flash is at best and such flash shall then be drawn and all the flood-gates and sluices and shuttles at the several mills and weirs shall be opened. And all the flood-gates, sluices and shuttles at the said mills and weirs shall be kept open to permit such flash to pass without obstruction until the water is drawn down to low water mark if necessary and be kept so for three hours if necessary after the opening or drawing thereof. Immediately after sufficient water has been drawn for the navigation the flood-gates, sluices and shuttles shall be close shut in and kept close shut in until the water shall have risen to the low water mark affixed at the adjoining locks.

87. Every houseboat and steam launch used on the river above Teddington lock shall be provided with such sanitary appliances as shall have been approved by the Conservators or their duly authorized officer and no certificate of registration shall be granted to the owner of any such vessel who does not show upon the form to be furnished to the Conservators when applying for the registration of such vessel that a satisfactory method exists thereon for the disposal of the

sewage and other refuse.

88. Any vessel being on the river on the occasion of any boat race, regatta, public procession or launch of a vessel or on any other occasion when large crowds assemble thereon shall not pass thereon so as to obstruct, impede or interfere with the boat race, regatta, procession or launch or endanger the safety of persons assembling on the river or prevent the maintenance of order thereon and the master of every such vessel shall observe the directions of the officer of the Conservators engaged in superintending the execution of this bye-law.

89. No person shall while using or while in,

upon or about the river or the banks or towing paths thereof or any land of the Conservators do or cause or incite any other person to do any of the acts specified in the following sub-sections of this bye-law:—

(1) Commit any offence against decency or

be otherwise disorderly.

(2) Bathe without proper bathing dress or drawers.

- (3) Bathe or prepare to bathe between the hours of eight in the morning and eight in the evening except at bathing places authorized by the Conservators and except when wearing rowing costume or University bathing costume.
- · (4) Bathe or prepare to bathe at any place where or between any hours when bathing is for the time being prohibited by the Conservators.
- (5) Do any act which may cause danger to any person or property or occasion a nuisance obstruction or annoyance to the public or to any person.

(6) Cast or throw into or upon or place or cause or suffer to fall or flow into or upon any of the places specified in this bye-law any sewage, rubbish or other offensive or injurious

matter or thing.

(7) Destroy or injure any flowering or other plant or any shrub, vegetation, tree, wood or underwood.

(8) Light, maintain, throw down, place or leave any fire or any flaming, smouldering or burning substance or any matter or thing in any place where the same may cause danger or damage to property of any kind or annoy-

ance to any person.

- (9) Kill, injure, take, catch or trap or attempt to kill, injure, take, catch or trap any animal or bird or the young of any animal or bird. Provided always that this subsection shall not extend to prevent any person employed by the Conservators or acting with the consent of the Conservators from killing vermin or shall affect any right of fowling, shooting, hunting or sporting existing on the 14th day of August, 1885.
- (10) Take, destroy, search for or disturb the nest of any bird.

(11) Destroy, injure, disturb or take out of or remove from the nest whether permanently or temporarily the egg of any bird.

(12) Move, injure or deface any notice, notice-board, work or thing whatsoever the property or in charge of the Conservators or set up by them or with their consent.

(13) Do any act injuriously affecting the

safety or amenity of the river.

Registration.

90. Every pleasure boat used or intended to be used upon the River Thames above Teddington Lock shall be registered and marked as in these bye-laws provided.

91. No person shall use or assist or be concerned in using or cause or suffer to be used upon the river above Teddington Lock any pleasure boat unless such boat shall be registered and

marked as in these bye-laws provided.

92. No person shall hire or let for hire or hold out or offer for hiring or suffer or permit to be let for hire any pleasure boat to be used upon the river above Teddington Lock or ply for hire with any pleasure boat upon the river above the said lock unless the same shall be...

registered and marked as in these bye-laws

provided.

93. The preceding bye-laws 99, 191 and 92 shall not apply to steam launches required to be registered under the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, nor to any vessel required to be registered under the "Thames Fishery Bye-laws, 1893."

- 94. Every person applying to the Conservators for registration of a houseboat shall furnish to the Conservators in writing upon a form to be obtained at the office of the Conservators, Victoria Embankment, London, E.C., or from such of the officers or servants of the Conservators as may be from time to time supplied with such forms correct information as to the particulars following, that is to say:—
 - (a) The length from head to stern of such houseboat.
 - (b) The method of disposal of the sewage and other refuse in such houseboat.
 - (c) The true name and usual residence of the owner thereof.
 - (1) At the time of making such application for registration the applicant shall pay to the Conservators the sums following, that is to say:—

(a) For a houseboat not exceeding thirty leet in length the sum of five pounds.

- (b) For a houseboat exceeding thirty feet in length the sum of five pounds and in addition thereto the further sum of two shillings for every complete six inches of length by which such houseboat shall exceed thirty feet in length.
- (c) Houseboats kept stationary throughout the year and used only for purposes in connection with boating such as for dressing places or store rooms for boat's gear shall pay £1 ls. annually in lieu of the payments fixed by articles (a) (b) such reduced payment to be in the discretion of the Conservators.
- (d) Houseboats kept by boat owners and boat builders to be let for hire shall be exempt from payment of registration fees if neither let nor used during the year.
- (2) The Secretary may if he shall think fit before complying with any application for registration of a houseboat require such houseboat to be measured by such person in the employment of the Conservators as he shall think fit.
- (3) Upon registration a number shall be appropriated by the Conservators to ach houseboat, and such number together k, with the length of such houseboat and the full name and address of the owner thereof and the date of registration shall be entered in the register.
- (4) Upon registration of a houseboat there shall be furnished to the person registering the same a certificate containing the name in full and the residence of the owner, the register number and the date of such registration, and other such particulars as the Conservators shall think fit.
- (5) The registration of and certificate for a houseboat shall become void immediately upon the expiration of twelve calendar months from the date of registration, but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.
- (6) Every houseboat registered under these bye-laws shall have legibly and conspicuously painted upon each side thereof either the register number or the name thereof, subject to such conditions as the Conservators may require.

- 95. Every person applying to the Conservators for registration of a private pleasure boat other than a houseboat or steam launch shall furnish to the Conservators in writing upon a form to be obtained as in bye-law 94 mentioned correct information as to the particulars following, that is to say:—
 - (a) The true name and usual residence of the owner thereof.
 - (b) The number of such private pleasure boats belonging to such owner.
 - (c) The class to which each of such private pleasure boats belongs, as, for example, skiff or sculling boat, pair-oar, four-oar, eight-oar canoe or punt or otherwise as the case may be.
 - (1) At the time of making such application for registration the applicant shall pay to the Conservators the sum of two shillings and sixpence for every boat to be registered.
 - (2) Upon registration there shall be appropriated by the Conservators to the owner of every such boat a number to be called the owner's number, and such number shall be entered in the register together with the date of registration, and shall be appropriated to such person in respect of every such boat which shall be registered in his name.
 - (3) Upon registration of every such boat there shall be furnished to the person registering the same a certificate containing the name in full and residence of the registered owner, and the owner's number and the date of such registration, and such other particulars as the Conservators shall think fit.
 - (4) The registration of and certificate for every such boat shall become void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration, but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.
 - (5) Every such boat shall have fixed in a conspicuous place inside such boat a plate with the registered number of the owner, such plate to be made in accordance with a pattern approved by the Conservators.
- 96. Every person applying to the Conservators for registration of a pleasure boat for hire other than a houseboat or steam launch shall furnish to the Conservators in writing upon a form to be obtained as in bye-law 94 mentioned correct information as to the particulars following, that is to say:—
 - (a) The true name and usual residence of the owner thereof.
 - (b) The number of such pleasure boats for hire belonging to such owner.
 - (c) The class to which each of such boats belongs, as, for example, skiff or sculling boat, pair-oar, four-oar, eight-oar canoe or punt, or otherwise as the case may be.
 - (1) At the time of making such application for registration the applicant shall pay to the Conservators the sum of two shillings and sixpence for every such boat.
 - (2) Upon registration there shall be appropriated by the Conservators to the owner of every such boat a number to be called the owner's number, and such number shall be entered in the register together with the date of registration, and shall be appropriated to such person in respect of every such boat which shall be registered in his name.
 - (3) There shall also at such time be appropriated by the Conservators to every such boat a number to be called the boat's number, and a separate number shall be appropriated

to every such boat and shall be entered in

the register.

(4) Upon registration of any such boat there shall be furnished to the person registering the same a certificate containing the name in full and the residence of the owner, the owner's number, the boat's number and the date of such registration, and such other particulars as the Conservators think fit.

(5) The registration of and certificate for every such boat for hire shall become void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration, but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter

mentioned.

(6) Every such boat shall have fixed in a conspicuous position inside such boat the owner's and boat's numbers, which numbers shall be in plainly legible black figures on a white ground on a plate of an oval shape not less than four inches by three inches.

97. The members of any rowing club or canoe club may apply to the Conservators to register the club colours, badge or mark as the distinctive mark of rowing boats or canoes belonging to such club, and by these bye-laws required to be

(1) Every such application shall be in writing and signed by the secretary of such club or other authorized person, and shall specify particularly:-

(a) The name and headquarters of the club.(b) The name and description of every rowing boat or canoe used upon the Thames, and at the time of such application owned by the club.

(c) The colours, badge or mark used by the club and where proposed to be painted or placed on the rowing boats or canoes or on

the oars or paddles thereof.

(2) The Conservators may if they shall think fit and subject to such conditions (if any) as they shall think fit register such club colours, badge or mark.

(3) The Conservators may in their absolute discretion refuse any such application whether in respect of any particular club colours badge or mark or in respect of any club generally.

(4) The Conservators may at any time if they shall think fit to do so cancel any such

registration.

(5) Every such registration shall if not previously cancelled become void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

(6) Every such rowing boat or canoe shall be marked in such manner as the Conservators

may from time to time determine.

98. The members of any sailing club may apply to the Conservators to register a burgee as the distinctive mark of sailing boats belonging to members of such club and by these bye-laws required to be registered.

(1) Every such application shall be in writing and signed by the secretary of such club or other person authorized in that behalf

and shall specify particularly:

(a) The name and address of every member of the club.

(b) The name and description of every sailing boat used upon the Thames owned by every such member.

(2) The Conservators may if they shall 1

think fit and subject to such conditions (if any) as they shall think fit register such

(3) The Conservators may in their absolute discretion refuse any such application whether in respect of any particular burgee or in respect of any club generally.

(4) The Conservators may at any time if they shall think fit to do so cancel any such

registration.

(5) Every such registration shall if not previously cancelled become void immediately upon the expiration of thirty-six calendar months from the date of registration, but may be renewed in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

(6) The owner of every such sailing boat shall also cause such sailing boat to be registered under these bye-laws as a private pleasure boat but such sailing boat shall not be required to be marked otherwise than as is hereinafter specified, that is to say :-

(7) Such sailing boat shall be distinguished by flying the registered burgee of the club and by having her name painted horizontally across the stern thereof in white or gilt letters of a block character not less than two-and-ahalf inches in length and proportionately thick. Provided always that nothing in this bye-law contained shall exempt the owner of any sailing boat which shall not be registered and marked in accordance therewith from having the same registered and marked in accordance with such of the provisions of bye-laws 95 and 96 as may be applicable

99. Every person applying to the Conservators for renewal of the registration of or certificate for a pleasure boat shall furnish the same information and make the same payments as are hereinbefore prescribed with reference to the first registration or certificate and every such renewed registration and certificate shall if not previously cancelled have effect for twelve calendar months or for thirty-six calendar months as the case may be from the date thereof and no longer, but may again be renewed in like manner.

100. Upon every transfer of the ownership of a pleasure boat registered under these byelaws the transferor shall and the transferee may forthwith give to the Conservators notice in writing of such transfer and the Conservators shall in either case thereupon without charge grant to such transferee a fresh certificate for the period for which the existing certificate shall be unexpired and shall cause his name and address to be inserted in the register in the place of those of the transferor and until such notice shall have been given the transferor shall for all the purposes of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and of these bye-laws and of all other bye-laws, rules, orders and regulations of the Conservators for the time being in force be deemed to be the owner of such pleasure boat.

(1) Upon every such transfer of ownership the person previously registered as the owner of such pleasure boat shall return to the Conservators at their office, Victoria-embankment, London, E.C., the certificate for the time being in force in respect of such boat.

(2) Immediately upon the granting of a fresh certificate the certificate previously in force in respect of the same boat shall become (3) From and after the granting of a fresh certificate the person to whom the same is granted shall have the boat in respect of which the same is granted marked as if such fresh certificate were the first certificate in respect of such boat.

101. Notwithstanding anything contained in the preceding bye-laws relating to registration the Conservators may if in the case of any particular pleasure boat they shall think fit by writing under the hand of their Secretary require or sanction the marking of any such boat in some manner different from that required under the foregoing bye-laws and in such case such boat shall be marked according to such writing.

102. All names, numbers or other distinctive marks or things by these bye-laws required to be placed or kept in, upon or about any pleasure boat shall be placed in a conspicuous position and if outside the boat above the water line and shall be kept and maintained by the respective owners of every such boat in a cleanly and plainly distinguishable condition and to the satisfaction of the Conservators or their officers.

(1) No person shall knowingly conceal or cause or suffer to be concealed any name, number or other distinctive mark or thing by these bye-laws required to be kept in, upon or about any pleasure boat.

(2) No person shall display or cause or suffer; to be displayed upon or about any pleasure boat by these bye-laws required to be registered any number other than is re-

quired by these bye-laws.

(3) Every certificate of registration when issued shall be subject to the condition that the owner or other person in charge of the vessel to which the same relates shall on demand either produce the certificate or show the registration plate or owner's or vessel's number, club colours, burgee, badge, mark or name as the case may be to any officer of the Conservators, to any Proctor of the University of Oxford, any Marshal or officer acting under such Proctor, any officer or constable of the Metropolitan Police and to any police officer or constable acting for any of the counties of Surrey, Berks, Wilts, Gloucester, Oxon, Buckingham or Middlesex, or the city of Oxford or any borough the police jurisdiction of which extends to any place upon the river.
