Their Majesties then proceeded to the site of the New University Buildings, and on Their arrival the following Address was presented:—

To Their Most Excellent Majesties The King and Queen.

May it please Your Majesties,

We, the President and Governing Bodies of the University College of North Wales beg to offer Your Majesties a most loyal welcome on Your first official visit to this part of Your dominions. It is a source of special gratification to us that this visit should be in connection with the most important event in the history of the University College since its foundation, and the occasion receives an added grace from the presence of Her Majesty the Queen. We remember also, with pride, that the University, of which this College is a constituent body, has in the past enjoyed the

advantage of Your Majesty's guidance as its Chancellor, and that it is still under Your august protection.

We may be permitted to recall to Your Majesty's recollection the fact that the public movement for the erection of the buildings of which you will to-day lay the first stone was inaugurated five years ago by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on the occasion of his visit to his Principality to assume the duties of Chancellor of the University then laid down by Your Majesty. At that time the noble site, on a part of which this ceremony is now being held, had just been presented to the College by the public spirited liberality of this ancient City, and His Royal Highness expressed the confident hope that North Wales would before long place upon it buildings worthy to be the home of the great work the institution was carrying on. The first stage in the realisation of this hope has been reached to-day.

The Welsh people have ever been honourably distinguished for their devotion to learning and culture; and the course of history, specially in our own times, bears witness to the growing importance of higher learning as a force making for national prosperity and as a bond of common interest linking together widely sundered countries and different types of national character. It is our ambition that this College may not unworthily represent this Welsh tradition, and that in ever increasing degree it may be enabled to develop the best abilities of the young men and the young women of Wales, and thus fit them to become more useful citizens, not only of the United Kingdom, but of the great Empire of sister peoples which is united under Your Majesty's sway.

We desire in conclusion to tender to Your Majesties the expression of our heartfelt and loyal devotion and the assurance that Your gracious presence amongst us to day will be a source of profound encouragement to all interested in the welfare of the University College and a powerful incentive to them to spare no effort for the completion of the great enterprise now beginning under such happy auspices.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

In behalf of the Queen and Myself I thank you for the loyal and dutiful address from the University College of North Wales which you have handed to Me.

The admirable work performed by the college in its temporary buildings has been widely recognized and was well known to Me when I held the office of Chancellor of the University of Wales. I feel confident that increased efficiency will result from the facilities afforded by the commodious premises of which I have to-day laid the first stone.

The competition in every branch of industry, especially in those branches which depend largely on science and art, is in these days severe, and it must be met by increased application and improved methods. The world is, I believe, better for such competition, but it behoves individual nations to use every possible effort to hold their own in the struggle. For this purpose higher education is an absolute necessity. However brilliant a man's

natural talents may be, he is greatly hindered by the want of early training, and as a rule only those who have enjoyed a good education are capable of acquiring such proficiency in any branch of study as will enable them to succeed.

The University College of North Wales will offer to its students exceptional opportunities of instruction. Time and money, energy and perseverance, will, I am sure, not be spared in the endeavour to afford every facility for the acquirement of knowledge, and I have had sufficient opportunities of judging the intelligence of the Welsh people and their eagerness in the pursuit of knowledge to know that your young men and women will take every advantage of the instruction which is offered them.

Our thanks are due to the late Dr. Evan Thomas, of Manchester, to the citizens of Bangor, and other generous benefactors who have assisted in the great work. It is a gratifying feature of English life to find rich men so ready to contribute to institutions where the young obtain advantages of study which might otherwise be beyond their reach.

The President and the Governing Bodies will, I am sure, as expert trainers of youth, fail not in inculcating the moral qualities which build up such characters as are the fruit of a wise education. It is the character of the natives of Great Britain which, equally with their energy and enterprise, has given them the proud position which they hold in all the countries of the world. The feelings of self-respect and self-sacrifice which are instilled in their minds from earliest youth, and are cultivated in institutions such as this, remain with them always, and are the means of making the people of this country respected and honoured wheresoever they go.

I pray that by the blessing of God the good work of this institution may be long continued.

His Majesty's return to Holyhead was made by way of Bethesda, Llanberis and Carnarvon, and the following Addresses were presented to His Majesty on the return journey:—

To His Most Gracious Majesty King Edward the Seventh.

We, the Members of the Urban District Council of Bethesda, in the County of Carnarvon, representing Your loyal and devoted subjects, the Inhabitants of this District, beg to tender to Your Majesty a most sincere and warm welcome upon this Your Majesty's first official visit since Your Majesty's Coronation.

We have most pleasant recollections of the former visit paid by Your Majesty, with Your Majesty's Gracious Consort, as Prince and Princess of Wales. It behoves us to mention with sorrow the recent loss from our midst of a great nobleman, one who would have been happy to unite with us in according to Your Majesty a loyal and worthy reception. We refer to the late Lord Penrhyn.

The number of places of public worship and schools with which the district is studded will enable Your Majesty to form an idea as to the bent and aspirations of the people.

Imaginative, fervent, and possessing a keen aspiration for freedom and education, we can assure Your Majesty that loyalty and devotion to Your Throne and Person is not more deep-rooted anywhere than amidst these mountains.

It is our earnest hope and desire that Your Majesty's tour through this most romantic part of "Eryri" will be both pleasant and beneficial, and that Your sojourn in this part of the Principality, short though it necessarily is, will serve to show the esteem, and, if we may be allowed to say so, the affection of Your subjects, as well as their devotion to Your Throne.

In conclusion, we shall pray God that Your benignant reign be a long one, and that the peace and prosperity, moral and material progress of our dear country and Empire, may increasingly characterize it.

I have a pleasant recollection of the previous visits which I have paid to your interesting town, and I am not forgetful of the important historical events, some of them tragic, which have taken place in the neighbourhood of the spot where we now stand. From my earliest childhood Carnarvon has been associated in my mind with my predecessor's presentation of the first Prince of Wales to the Welsh people.

May it please Your Majesties,

The Cardiff Railway Company respectfully desire to express to Your Majesties their sincere and loyal appreciation of and gratitude for the great honour which Your Majesties have been pleased to confer upon the City and Port of Cardiff, and in an especial degree upon the Company and their undertaking, by graciously consenting to open their new Dock, and for the permission which Your Majesties have been pleased to accord, that in commemoration of this auspicious event, this Dock may hereafter be known as the "Queen Alexandra Dock."

The Cardiff Railway Company are deeply and most gratefully sensible of the fact that Your Majesties' presence on this occasion affords yet another instance of the great interest which Your Majesties take in all matters affecting the welfare and prosperity of all connected with the trade and commerce of Your Dominions and are especially glad to record that this, the first instance in which a King and Queen of this country have together honoured Cardiff by Their presence, should be associated with the opening of a Dock which will, with its allied industries, afford employment for a large number of Your Majesty's

subjects, and will form an important addition to those shipping facilities which have given to Cardiff, in addition to its ancient historical claim, the position of the first Port in the United Kingdom as regards shipping cleared to foreign countries and British Possessions abroad; and the Company cannot but feel that the signal mark of Royal Favour which Your Majesties have been pleased to confer forms a happy augury for the future prosperity of the Port and District.

The Company beg Your Majesties to accept their very humble and loyal thanks for Your gracious presence on this occasion, and they most sincerely hope that Your Majesties may be spared for many years to reign in the enjoyment of the honour and loyalty over a prosperous and dutiful people.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

It is a pleasure to the Queen and Myself to receive the loyal address which you have handed to Me from the Cardiff Railway Company, whose dock I have come here to-day to open.

I may say in behalf of the Queen that it was a source of gratification to Her Majesty to grant permission for the dock to bear the name of the Queen Alexandra Dock.

The prosperity of the city, which is mainly dependent upon its enormous export trade, is so bound up in the efficiency of your land and sea transport that any undertaking which has for its object an improvement of means of communication is deserving of all possible encouragement.

But such an undertaking as the present is of more than local importance; British trade, notwithstanding its vast volume, is sensitive in a high degree, and responds through its whole mass to local changes; the improvement of shipping facilities in this great port will be felt wherever the commerce of the Empire extends, and any increase in maritime commerce is necessarily followed by an increase of the influence and prosperity of the country.

The Humble Address of the Monmouthshire and South Wales Coal Owners' Association.

May it please Your Most Gracious Majesties,

The occasion of Your Majesties' visit to Cardiff, the principal coal shipping port of the world, affords the deepest satisfaction to the colliery owners who are Members of this Association.

It may interest Your Majesties to know that in the South Wales Coal Field there are 588 mines now in operation, employing about 174,000 workmen, producing nearly 50 millions of tons of coal annually, and that the capital expenditure in connection with these works may be estimated at 25 millions sterling.

The Association, founded in 1864, now represents 80 per cent. of the entire output of the coal field and many of the colliery owners are

also largely interested in the important iron and steel and kindred industries of the district.

It has ever been the desire of the colliery owners of this district to carry out the wise regulations framed by Parliament, from time to time, with the object of securing the greatest possible safety of the workmen employed in the mines, and with a view to minimising, as far as is possible, the occurrence of those sad catastrophies which unfortunately appear to be inseparable from the mining industry.

Your late august and Royal Mother, Her Majesty Queen Victoria, whose memory will be ever dear to the hearts of Her Majesty's subjects in South Wales, was at all times deeply touched, whenever such sad catastrophies occurred, and gave most practical help and sympathy to the unfortunate sufferers. Your Gracious Majesties have nobly emulated this great example, and it has been most comforting to the hearts of the relatives, as well as to the colliery owners, to feel that Your Majesties are so fully mindful of the sufferings of Your people on such occasions.

In the appointment of Royal Commissions having for their objects the greater safety of the mines and the amelioration of the condition of the people engaged therein, the coal trade of South Wales has been honoured by the appointment of prominent gentlemen in the persons of Sir William Thomas Lewis, Bart., the late Mr. Archibald Hood and Mr. Frederick Lewis Davis to serve on such Commissions, the last named being now engaged upon the very important duties of the Royal Commission on Mines.

The honour which Your Majesty The King has thus been graciously pleased to confer upon this important coal industry is very greatly appreciated by the colliery owners, whose efforts will at all times be available for the furtherance of the very laudable objects which Your Majesty has in view.

It will afford Your Majesties pleasure and satisfaction to know that the continued exercise of carefulness and forethought by those responsible for the management of the mines are tending towards a reduction in the loss of life and injury to the miners, and it is earnestly hoped that still better results will be secured.

Of next importance to the question of safety, the preservation of a friendly relationship with the workmen upon questions of labour has at all times been the desire of the colliery proprietors, and Your Majesties will, doubtless, be pleased to learn that this has been secured in a great measure by the sliding scale of wages which operated for twenty-seven years, viz., from 1875 to 1902, under the chairmanship, for the greater part of that time, of Sir William Thomas, Bart., and since 1903 under a Conciliation Board, the owners and workmen being jointly represented, Mr. Frederick Lewis Davis being the owners' President and Mr. William Abraham, M.P., occupying a like position on behalf of the workmen. Whenever friendly differences arise as to the general wage rate the Right Hon. Viscount St. Aldwyn acts in the capacity of Independent Chairman, his decisions invariably giving the highest satisfaction, and his services being much valued by both sides of the Board.

Happily at present there are no serious differences, but, on the contrary, there is a most friendly relationship between employers and employed.

The progress of the South Wales Coal Field has been more noticeable than any that has occurred in the other coal fields of the United Kingdom, and Your Majesties will no doubt be

further pleased to learn that the coal trade of the district is now in a prosperous condition, that the wages of the workmen are proportionately high, and that the new dock which Your Majesty The King has been so graciously pleased to open will not only add greatly to the shipping facilities for the largest vessels afloat, but also afford employment for a considerable additional number of workmen.

For above fifty years the coal required for Your Majesty's Navy has been supplied from the collieries of the South Wales Coal Field, and the steam coal has been recognised as of the most superior quality for all the trials of speed of Your Majesty's warships, and is called into requisition to fulfil the principal requirements of the Admiralty. To this extent the colliery proprietors are proud to feel that the South Wales steam coal plays an important part in maintaining the supremacy of Your Majesty's Navy for the defence of Your Kingdom.

The colliery owners most fervently hope that Your Majesties will accept these humble expressions of loyalty, and their assurance that Your Majesties' presence in the South Wales Coal Field will bind more closely the hearts of the mining population towards Your Majesties and the other Members of Your Royal Family.

They earnestly pray that it may please Almighty God to spare Your Majesties for many years to come in order to continue the beneficent rule over Your vast Empire which has been productive of so many and such great blessings to Your subjects.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

I thank you in behalf of The Queen and Myself for your loyal and dutiful address of welcome.

I am glad to receive from the Monmouthshire and South Wales Coalowners' Association, which represents so large a body of colliery proprietors, an assurance of their desire to carry out the regulations framed by Parliament for the safety of the miner. My Government must always rely largely on the loyal co-operation of the owners of the mines of the country in their efforts to promote the safety of those who, under conditions involving much danger, carry on this great industry, which is so closely connected with the defence and well-being of the kingdom, and so vital to its manufactures and shipping.

I trust that the inquiry now being carried on by the Commission which I have appointed will have important results in the direction of further securing the safety of the miner.

I gladly note the reference in your address to the services on that Commission of the President of your Conciliation Board; and I trust that the Report which has recently been submitted to Me by the Commission in regard to the use of rescue apparatus will lead to the adoption in this and the other colliery districts of measures for facilitating the work of rescue in the event of those disasters, which still unhappily occur from time to time.

I have often read with a feeling of admiration and pride how, on such occasions, when numbers of miners are cut off, by fallen *débris* or other obstruction, from the outer world, their fellow-workers, undeterred by their perfect knowledge of the danger of the attempt, eagerly volunteer to assist in the work of rescue. The whole country applauds and is grateful for the courage and

devotion of such heroes. But I have for some time felt that insufficient means exist of giving a worthy and lasting public recognition of these brave deeds. I propose very shortly to establish a decoration bearing my own name to be awarded to the courageous men who in the mines and quarries of this country voluntarily endanger their lives in order to save the lives of others.

I learn with pleasure of the successful working of your Conciliation Board, and the friendly relations which now exist between employers and employed in this district. The settlement of differences as to the remuneration of the worker and of other industrial disputes as they arise, by friendly discussion and co-operation between the coalowner and the miner, must tend to the prosperity of both, and to the general welfare of the district.

I am glad to hear of the present thriving condition of the industry, and I hope your expectations of the benefits to be derived from the new dock will be fulfilled, so that not only extended and regular employment will be provided for the working classes, but the prosperity of the trade will be further advanced and secured.

Her revered Majesty, the late Queen Victoria, was graciously pleased to grant to the Institute a Royal Charter of Incorporation in 1881.

The principal objects and aims of the Institute have been the advancement of engineering, science, and practice; the exchange of information and ideas amongst its members, the placing on record the results of experience, the prevention of accidents in mines, and the saving of human life.

The Institute was founded to embrace not only mining, but engineers of allied professions—civil, mechanical, marine, and electrical, and there are now 545 members upon the roll.

The Institute has had a great deal to do with the development of the South Wales and Monmouthshire coal fields, as regards collieries, iron and steel works, railways and docks; and when explosions have unfortunately happened in the coal field, the members of this Institute have been foremost in facing danger, to rescue the living, and recover the dead.

The Institute mentions these matters to Your Majesties because they are aware of Your great interest in the development of the resources of Your country, and of the deep sympathy of Yourself and of all Members of Your Royal House with suffering in any form.

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Institute in 1857, since which time it has steadily devoted itself to the preservation of human life and the safer development of mineral property; has contributed substantially and beneficially to the prosperity of the country, and the welfare and safety of the working members of the community. It has published a series of "Proceedings," forming a valuable reference on subjects relating to mining and general engineering, and it has always been one of the first aims of the Institute to encourage any invention which might have for its object the saving of life, or the prevention of accidents.

In the year 1893 the Institute Buildings, in Park-place, Cardiff, which Your Majesties will pass *en route* to the City Hall, were erected at a cost of £10,000. There has also just been completed a large library building adjoining the Institute, at a cost of some £5,000, which will be opened this year to celebrate the jubilee of the Institute.

In conclusion, the Members of the South Wales Institute of Engineers greatly rejoice at the visit of Your Majesties, and they earnestly pray that God's richest blessings may be showered upon Yourself and Your Royal House, and trust that while conferring happiness upon the Citizens of Cardiff in paying them this visit, it will also afford Your Majesties some pleasure.

Your Majesties' present visit to our City is to us all most memorable and deeply interesting, being the first instance for centuries of the presence amongst us of the reigning Monarch of this country.

We appreciate to the full the warm interest which Your Majesties have always shown in the welfare of the people of Wales, and the close association of Your Majesties and of the Royal Family with Cardiff.

We remember with the liveliest pride and pleasure the 27th day of June, 1896, when, as Prince of Wales, His Majesty honoured Cardiff by graciously accepting the Honorary Freedom of the Borough.

We recollect with gratification that His Majesty was, as Prince of Wales, the Chancellor of the University of Wales (Prifysgol Cymru) which has its Registry in the Cathays Park, in this City, and that He is now Protector of the University.

of June 29th, containing rules to be observed in regard to infectious diseases in Holland:—

STAATSBLAD OF THE KINGDOM OF THE NETHERLANDS.

(No. 155).

Decree of June 29, 1907, containing rules to be followed when burning or destroying expropriated objects, disinfecting infected objects, buildings, means of conveyance, vessels, and when rendering harmless dunghills and other collections of dirt, as also when arranging and placing the mark mentioned in Article 20 of the law of December 4, 1872 (Staatsblad, No. 134), containing provisions against infectious diseases.

We, Wilhelmina, by the Grace of God Queen of the Netherlands, Princess of Orange-Nassau, &c., &c., &c., at the proposition of Our Minister of the Interior of May 13, 1907, No. 3786, Department of Inland Administration; Giving attention to Article 25 of the law of December 4, 1872 (Staatsblad, No. 134); Having heard the Council of State (advice of June 11, 1907, No. 34); Having seen our said Minister's further report of June 24, 1907, No. 5607, Department of Inland Administration; Have approved and understood: to stipulate:

Article 1.

If, according to the law of December 4, 1872 (Staatsblad, No. 134), the burning or destruction of expropriated objects, the disinfection of infected objects, buildings, means of conveyance, vessels, mentioned in Article 8 of that law, or the rendering harmless of dunghills and other collections of dirt, has to take place, this shall be carried out with observance of the rules laid down in Article 2, and, further, in accordance with the prescriptions to be determined by Our Minister of the Interior.

Article 2.

The burning or destruction of expropriated objects shall take place at one or more places to be indicated for that purpose by the Burgomaster: to be such as will not endanger public health nor cause danger of fire.

Small objects may be burned in the stove of the dwelling.

Bed-stuffing of little or no value, such as straw, sea-grass, ferns, bran, &c., are to be burned by preference.

The disinfection of infected objects, or of objects suspected of being infected, mentioned in Article 8 of the law, of buildings or rooms, of means of conveyance and vessels shall be carried out by persons to be indicated for that purpose by the Burgomaster, and instructed and trained as far as possible for the duties to be performed.

These persons shall issue declarations that the disinfection has been carried out in accordance with the existing rules.

Without such a declaration the disinfection shall be considered not to have taken place, and it cannot have legal results.

The said declarations may also be issued by Burgomasters, police commissioners, directors of hospitals, of military buildings, of prisons and by commanders and masters of seagoing vessels.

If it should not be possible for the disinfecting of the objects which are to be disinfected to take place in the dwelling or on the premises, they shall be conveyed to a place to be indicated by the Burgomaster.

The bodies of persons deceased of an infectious disease shall be coffined as soon as

possible, and, if possible, shall be removed from the dwelling to the mortuary.

Article 3.

The mark, mentioned in Article 20 of the law, shall consist of a piece of white paper upon which the words "infectious disease," and the name of the disease shall be printed in black. The letters which mention the name of the disease shall be at least three centimetres high and two centimetres broad; the heavy lines of the letters shall be at least one centimetre broad.

Article 4.

This mark shall be affixed in a conspicuous place on or immediately over the street door, and similarly at every other entrance; in the case of shops it shall be affixed to the post of the door or doors; in each case one metre and a half above the door-sill.

Article 5.

Pasted on a wooden board it shall be affixed:—

a. In the case of vessels with high bulwarks on the man-rope on starboard or port.

b. In the case of vessels with low bulwarks on the outer side of the rigging one metre above board, on starboard and port.

c. In the case of every other sort of vessel, and in the case of rafts, on a post or pole at a height of two metres above the vessel or raft.

Article 6.

Articles 1, 2, 3 and 5 of this Decree shall, if necessary, be applied to all foreign and Dutch vessels and rafts, with the exception of foreign warships.

Article 7.

From August 1st, 1907, the Royal Decree of July 26th, 1885 (Staatsblad, No. 167), shall be withdrawn, with the appertaining rules, as determined by the Royal Decree of July 24th, 1891 (Staatsblad, No. 153).

Article 8.

From the same day the rules determined by this decree shall be followed when burning or destroying expropriated objects, disinfecting infected objects, buildings, means of conveyance, and vessels, and rendering harmless dunghills and other collections of dirt, as also when arranging and placing the mark mentioned in Article 20 of the law.

Our Minister of the Interior shall be charged with the execution of this decree which shall be inserted in the Staatsblad and simultaneously in the Staatscourant, and of which a copy shall be sent to the Council of State.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

REGULATIONS respecting Boy Clerks registered for Temporary Employment in Public Departments.

* * *Revised Regulations may at any time be issued.*

1. Two Registers of Boy Clerks for temporary employment in Public Departments will be kept by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. These Registers will contain the names of boys who, being either natural-born or naturalized British subjects, have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners that they are of good health and character, and that they are duly qualified under the following regulations (3 and 4). One Register will contain the names of boys for service in London, Edinburgh, and provincial towns of England, Scotland and Wales. The other will contain the names of boys for service in Dublin and provincial towns in Ireland.

3. The limits of age are 15 to 17. If an examination begins in one of the first four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of January in that year. If an examination begins in one of the second four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of May in that year. If an examination begins in one of the last four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of September in that year.

4. The subjects for examination are :—

1. Handwriting and Orthography.
2. Arithmetic, including Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.
3. English Composition.
4. Copying Manuscript.

And any two of the following :—

5. Geography.
6. English History.
7. Translation from Latin.
8. Translation from French.
9. Translation from German.
10. Mathematics.
11. The rudiments of Chemistry and Physics.

No subjects are obligatory, but no Candidate will be regarded as qualified who fails to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency.

5. Open Competitive Examinations for the purpose of testing the qualifications of Candidates in the above-mentioned subjects will be held by the Civil Service Commissioners from time to time as may be necessary, and a certain number, regulated by the probable demand from the Public Departments, of those who show sufficient proficiency will be placed upon the Registers kept by the Commissioners, and will be available for employment as their services are required. The competitions for the Irish service will, as a rule, be held at the same time as the competitions for service in Great Britain, and the list of successful candidates for Ireland will

be separate from that of the successful candidates for service in Great Britain. Candidates can enter for both competitions, when they are held simultaneously, paying only one fee. If successful in both they will be entered on the Register for Great Britain only, or on that for Ireland only, or on both Registers according to their choice.

6. The fee payable for attending the Open Competitive Examinations will be 5s.

7. Boy Clerks placed on these Registers will be summoned for employment in any of the Public Departments as they are wanted. When not wanted, they will have no claim to employment. Refusing to serve when called upon, except for reasons satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, they will be removed from the Registers. The order in which they may be employed, the Departments to which they may be assigned, and their retention generally on the Registers, will be determined by the Civil Service Commissioners; but they will be subject to the orders of the Departments in which they are serving during the time of their actual employment, and will be liable to dismissal from them by the authorities thereof, without notice, for inefficiency or misconduct.

Boy Clerks resigning, or procuring their own discharges from Departments, except for sufficient reasons proved to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, will be removed from the Registers.

Their assignment for service will, as a general rule, be according to their order of merit in the examination; but exceptions to this general rule may be made when the engagement offered is very short, or for other sufficient reasons.

8*. These Boy Clerks will usually be engaged and paid by the week of 39 hours, viz. :—7 hours a day on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, and 4 hours on Saturdays; and they will be paid 15s. per week during the first year of their service. After a year of approved service, an increase of pay to 16s. a week may be allowed; after a second year, an increase of pay to 17s. a week; after a third year, an increase to 18s.; after a fourth year, an increase to 19s.

In any case of absence without pay a Boy Clerk's increment shall be postponed one day for every day of such absence—absence without pay equally with the interval between two successive engagements not being reckoned as service for any purpose contemplated by the Regulations.

Boy Clerks may also be engaged and paid by the hour at the rate of 4½d. per hour during their first year of service; at the rate of 5d. per hour during the second; 5½d. during the third year of service; and afterwards at the rate of 6d. per hour. Any who may be engaged by the week and who may be required to attend for more than 7½ hours on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday, or more than 4½ hours on Saturday, will be paid at the hourly rate for such overtime attendance. But in no case must overtime attendance exceed 6 hours in any one week. They may also be paid by the piece at such rates as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury.

9. No service, however much it may happen to be prolonged, will confer any claim to superannuation or compensation allowance; and Boy

* Clause 8 applies to all Boy Clerks registered on the result of competitions held later than 1st April, 1902.

Clerks will not be retained, as such, after they shall have reached the age of 20.

10. If a public holiday, on which the office is closed, fall within the period of a Boy Clerk's engagement, he may be paid in respect of it as for a working day. Boy Clerks may, with the consent of the Department in which they are serving, or if not at the time serving, with the consent of the Civil Service Commissioners, be allowed holidays, with pay at the rate for the official day in the proportion of one day for every 24 full days of actual and approved service previously rendered by them as Boy Clerks. But no Boy Clerk shall be allowed to take more than 12 days' leave under these conditions, between the 1st day of January and the 31st day of December, both days inclusive, in any one year, and in calculating the leave to be allowed in any given year, no service rendered before the 1st day of January of the preceding year shall be counted.

Holiday pay can only be allowed for holidays actually taken, not for days on which the Boy Clerk is drawing pay in respect of employment in any capacity in the Public Service.

11. Boy Clerks who may fall ill while serving in any Department, and whose illness may be attested by medical certificate to the satisfaction of the authorities of such Department, may be allowed sick-leave, receiving three-fourths of the rate of pay for the official day; provided that no Boy Clerk shall be paid for holidays and sick-leave, taken together, for more than 28 days within any one year, exclusive of public holidays.

12. Except in conformity with Regulations 10, 11, 14, and 15, Boy Clerks will only receive pay for the hours, or parts of hours, during which they actually attend.

13. No person who has been trained, either wholly or partially, at the public expense, for the occupation of a teacher in schools in connexion with the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, is eligible for employment as a Boy Clerk until the consent of those Departments, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

14. If any case of infectious disease should occur in the house where a Boy Clerk is living, he must immediately report the fact to the Officer under whom he is employed, and must, if required, at once discontinue his attendance. In cases of such enforced absence from his employment, it is in the discretion of the Head of the Department in which he has been serving to allow the Boy Clerk full pay at the usual rate for the period for which it is medically certified that his attendance at the office would be likely to be dangerous to his colleagues.

15. In any year in which an open Competition for situations as Assistant Clerk (Abstractor Class) in the Civil Service or for Clerkships of the Second Division is held, a Boy Clerk who obtains from the Head of the Department in which he is serving leave of absence to attend such Examination may also, at the discretion of the Head of the Department, be allowed pay, at the usual rate, for the days during which he is attending the Examination.

16. Service Marks for each full period of three calendar months of actual approved service, subject to a maximum of twelve such periods

will be allowed to Candidates attending Examinations for the following situations, viz.:—

- Clerkships in the Second Division of the Civil Service,
- Second Class Clerkships (Lower Section) for Port Service in the Department of His Majesty's Customs,
- Assistantships of Excise,
- Assistantships of Customs,

who are serving or have served as Boy Clerks; but the number of marks to be allowed for each period may be different at successive examinations.

17. In the promotions of permanent Civil Servants [Assistant Clerks (Abstractor Class) and others] under Clause 15 of the Order in Council of 29th November, 1898, not less than one and not more than two years' approved service as Boy Clerk or Boy Copyist may be allowed to reckon towards the six years' established service required by the said clause.

The occulting light every ten seconds established in an iron framework tower, 63 feet high, erected on the head of a coral pier on the northern side of the entrance to the harbour, situated at a distance of 410 yards S. 63° E. from the White tomb, shows the following sectors:— red from the bearing of S. 8° W., through west, to N. 85° W. over Wingate Reef, white in the fairway from N. 85° W. to N. 55° W., and red over Towartit Reef from N. 55° W., through north, to N. 82° E.

Leading beacons:—

2. Two red fixed dioptric lights, vertically placed 20 feet apart, have been established on the iron framework tower, painted in chocolate and white horizontal bands, 113 feet high, erected as a front beacon on the western shore of the harbour in a position situated at a distance of 7 cables N. 58° W. from the White tomb.

Two red fixed dioptric lights, vertically placed 20 feet apart, have been established on the iron framework tower, painted chocolate, 157 feet high, erected as a rear beacon, at a distance of 1,060 yards N. 51° W. from the front beacon.

These two beacons or their lights, which are visible over an arc of 90°, in line N. 51° W. lead through the entrance to the harbour.

3. The power of each light in the harbour is 30 candles; at present they are only exhibited on application to the Controller of Harbours and Lights, of the Port Sudan, not otherwise.

4. Iron standard beacons, 15 feet high, are placed to mark the prominent points of the reefs immediately outside the harbour, as follows:—

a. Port hand beacons are surmounted by a black and white disc.

b. Starboard hand beacons are surmounted by a triangle painted chocolate.

It is presumed that the terms port hand and starboard hand refer to vessels entering the port.

5. An iron standard beacon, surmounted by a cage, is being erected on the eastern point of Wingate Reef, and a similar beacon surmounted by a diamond shape on the southern point of the reef.

MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1894.

BYE-LAWS AS TO SEAMEN'S LODGING-HOUSES.

WHEREAS, by section 214 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is provided that a local authority whose district includes a seaport may, with the approval of the Board of Trade, make Bye-laws relating to seamen's lodging-houses in their district, and those Bye-laws shall be binding upon all persons keeping houses in which seamen are lodged and upon the owners thereof and persons employed therein, and further that such bye-laws should, amongst other things, provide for the licensing, inspection, and sanitary conditions of seamen's lodging-houses; for the publication of the fact of a house being licensed; for the due execution of the Bye-laws; for preventing the obstruction of persons engaged in securing that execution; for the preventing of persons not duly licensed holding themselves out as keeping or purporting to keep licensed houses; and for the exclusion from licensed houses of persons of improper character; and should impose sufficient fines not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of any Bye-law.

AND WHEREAS the Council of the County Borough of Swansea is the Local Authority under the Public Health Acts, and a Local Authority within the meaning of the said section:

NOW WE, THE COUNCIL OF THE SAID COUNTY BOROUGH OF SWANSEA, BY VIRTUE OF THE POWER IN THAT BEHALF IN US VESTED, AT A MEETING OF THE SAID COUNCIL, HELD ON THE NINETEENTH DAY OF JUNE, NINETEEN HUNDRED AND SEVEN, DO HEREBY make the following Bye-laws, that is to say:—

1. In the construction of the following Bye-laws, unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—

"The Council" means the Council of the County Borough of Swansea.

"The Borough" means the said County Borough.

"Seaman" means any male person other than the holder of a certificate of competency or service as master, mate, or engineer, in the merchant service who within four weeks immediately preceding the date of any transaction or occurrence within the scope of these Bye-laws, has been employed in any capacity whatsoever on board a ship, whether British or foreign, but shall not include a person engaged upon a fishing boat or trawl boat.

"License" means a license granted or which may be granted by the Council in pursuance of these Bye-laws to a person authorising him to keep the house specified therein as a seamen's lodging-house.

"Licensed keeper" means a person to whom a license has been granted in pursuance of these Bye-laws.

"Keeper" means and includes both a licensed keeper and a person who keeps a seamen's lodging-house or a house in which seamen are lodged to whom a license has not been granted in pursuance of these Bye-laws.

"Licensed house" means a seamen's lodging-house in respect of which a license has been granted in pursuance of these Bye-laws.

"House" means and includes both a licensed house and a seamen's lodging-house or a house in which seamen are lodged in respect of which a license has not been granted in pursuance of these Bye-laws.

2. A person who shall apply to the Council for a license shall furnish, on the application form to be supplied by the Council, a true statement of the particulars therein required to be specified.

3. The Council shall cause a register to be kept of all licenses granted under these Bye-laws, and the suspension or revocation of any license shall be noted in such register.

4. A person who, not being entered in the Council's register as a licensed keeper, shall himself or by means of any agent or servant hold himself out as keeping or purporting to keep a licensed house, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding *twenty* pounds, and to a further penalty of £10 for every day during which he shall continue to do so after conviction for so doing.

5. A license shall not be granted in respect of a house or part of a house until it has been inspected and approved as fit for the purpose of a licensed house by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the Borough, and any person who applies for a license shall produce to the Council evidence to its satisfaction of his fitness to be licensed.

6. A licensed keeper shall not transfer or lend a license to any other person.

7. A license shall be subject to such conditions specified therein, or endorsed thereon, and not being inconsistent with the laws, bye-laws, or regulations for the time being in force in the Borough, as the Council sees fit, and a licensed keeper, or any person employed in a licensed house shall not commit a breach of, or fail to observe, such conditions.

8. A license shall continue in force (subject to suspension or revocation as in these bye-laws provided) for one year from 1st January. The Council may at its discretion refuse to renew any license.

9. A house or part of a house which is in connection with any public-house or beer-house shall not be licensed as a seamen's lodging-house.

10. A license shall not be granted to a person who holds a license for the sale of intoxicating liquor, or who is engaged or interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall a license be granted in respect of any house or part of a house where intoxicating liquor is sold nor in respect of any house or part of a house occupied or used for the purpose of the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall any licensed keeper sell or be engaged or interested in the sale of intoxicating liquor, nor be engaged or interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer.

11. A licensed keeper shall affix and keep undefaced and legible a notice with the words "Licensed Seamen's Lodging-house" in the most conspicuous place on the outside of the main entrance from any street to the licensed house, and also the full name and address of the licensed keeper.

12. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall at all times, by day or night, when required by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the Borough or by an officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses, or by an officer of the Board of Trade, or of the police, give him or them or any of them free access to all parts of such house and to the register of seamen lodgers hereinafter referred to.

13. A keeper shall not at any time receive, cause, or suffer to be received into a house, or permit to sleep in any room therein, any greater number of lodgers than shall be from time to time allowed by the certificate of the Medical

Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the Borough. Such certificate shall state the total number of lodgers allowed to sleep in each room of such house, as well as the total number such house may receive, and shall be supplied by the Council to the keeper; and he shall produce such certificate whenever required by any officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses.

14. A keeper shall fix and keep fixed in a conspicuous place in each room a ticket signed by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the Borough, stating the number of lodgers allowed to sleep in such room.

15. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall not any time conceal, deface, alter, or obliterate, or permit, or suffer to be concealed, defaced, altered, or obliterated any such letter or figures.

16. Notwithstanding that the maximum number of lodgers to be received in a house or in any room therein may not have been fixed by the Council as hereinbefore provided, a keeper shall not cause or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of 400 cubic feet of free air space for each person to occupy at one time as a sleeping apartment a room which is used for that purpose.

17. Whenever the Council shall consider it necessary to reduce the number of lodgers to be received in any room in a house, the keeper shall, upon receiving notice in writing to that effect, under the hand of the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the Borough, cease to permit such room to be occupied by any greater number of lodgers than that specified in such notice.

18. A keeper shall not at any time cause or suffer any room which may be appointed for use as a kitchen, scullery, or sitting room, or any underground room which does not comply with the provisions of the Public Health Acts, to be used as a sleeping apartment.

19. A keeper shall cause all such means of ventilation as may be provided in, or in connection with, any room or passage in a house, and in, or in connection with, any water-closet belonging to a house to be maintained at all times in good order.

20. A keeper shall cause the windows of every room and of the passages and water-closets in a house to be kept fully open for such time on each day as may be necessary for the purposes of ventilation, and shall cause the windows of every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment to be kept fully open from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. in winter, and 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. in summer.

Provided that such keeper shall not be required in pursuance of this Bye-law to cause any window in any room to be opened or to be kept open at any time when the state of the weather is such as to render it necessary that the window shall be closed, or when any bed in such room may be occupied by any lodger in consequence of sickness or of other sufficient cause.

21. A keeper shall, in the first week in the month of April, and, if required in writing by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the Borough, in the first week in the month of October, in every year, cause every part of a house to be cleansed, and shall, at the same time, except in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause every area, the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every water-closet belonging to the premises, and the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every room, staircase, and passage in the house, to be thoroughly stopped, cleansed, and lime-washed

or distempered. Provided that if any such interior surface is painted or covered with material which is such as to render the lime-washing thereof unsuitable or inexpedient, this Bye-law shall be deemed to be satisfied so long as such surface is thoroughly cleansed, and the paint or other covering thereon is renewed, if such cleansing or renewal be necessary for the purpose of keeping the house in a cleanly and wholesome condition.

22. A keeper shall, as often as may be necessary to keep the same in a clean and wholesome state, cause all the rooms, passages, stairs, floors, windows, doors, and walls of a house to be thoroughly cleansed and freed from vermin, and shall also cause the floors of every room to be thoroughly swept daily, before the hour of ten in the forenoon, and to be well and sufficiently washed on Friday in each week before the hour of twelve noon.

23. A keeper shall cause all bed clothes and bedding and every bedstead used in a house to be thoroughly cleansed as often as shall be required for the purpose of keeping such bed clothes, bedding, and bedsteads in a clean and wholesome condition and free from vermin.

24. A keeper shall cause the bed clothes of every bed in his house to be removed from such bed as soon as conveniently may be after such bed shall have been vacated by any lodger, and shall cause all such bed clothes, and the bed from which such bed clothes may have been removed, to be freely exposed to the air for one hour at least in the forenoon, or for one hour at least in the afternoon of every day.

25. A keeper shall cause every room in his house, which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment, to be furnished with such number of beds and bedsteads, and with such a supply of bed clothes and necessary utensils as may be sufficient for the requirements of the number of lodgers received in such room.

26. A keeper shall, for the use of the lodgers received into a house, cause to be provided a sufficient number of chamber utensils, and a sufficient number of washing basins or other proper receptacles for water, of adequate capacity and suitably placed, and a sufficient supply of water, and a sufficient number of towels for use in connection with such washing basins and other receptacles, and shall cause such basins or receptacles to be kept clean and in good order, and the supply of towels to be renewed as often as may be requisite.

27. A keeper shall cause all solid or liquid filth or refuse to be removed once at least in every day before the hour of ten in the forenoon from every room in a house, and shall once at least in every day cause every vessel, utensil, or other receptacle for such filth or refuse to be thoroughly cleansed.

28. In the event of any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, being attacked by any infectious disorder, the keeper shall forthwith give intimation of the same to the Medical Officer of Health of the Borough.

29. A keeper, immediately after being informed or having ascertained that any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, is ill of any infectious disease, shall adopt all such precautions as may be necessary to prevent the spread of such infectious disease. Such keeper shall not, at any time while such inmate is suffering from such infectious disease, cause or allow any other person, except a person voluntarily in attendance and authorised to attend on

such inmate, to use or occupy the same room as such inmate.

(a) Where, in pursuance of the statutory provision in that behalf, the sanitary authority may order the removal of such inmate to a hospital or other place for the reception of the sick, such keeper, on being informed of such order, shall forthwith take all such steps as may be requisite on his part to secure the safe and prompt removal of such inmate in compliance with the order of the sanitary authority, and shall, in and about such removal, adopt all such precautions as, in accordance with any instructions which he may receive from the Medical Officer of Health of the Borough, may be most suitable for the circumstances of the case.

(b) Where, in consequence of the illness of such inmate, there may be reasonable grounds for apprehending the spread of infection through the admission of a lodger to any room or rooms in a house or through the admission to such room or rooms of the maximum number of lodgers authorised to be received therein, such keeper, after being furnished with the necessary instructions from the Medical Officer of Health of the Borough, and until the grounds for apprehending the spread of infection shall have been removed, shall cease to receive any lodger into such room or rooms or shall receive therein such number of lodgers, being less than the maximum number, as the exigencies of the case may require.

(c) Such keeper shall, immediately after the death, removal, or recovery of an inmate who may have been ill of any infectious disease, give written notice thereof to the Medical Officer of Health of the Borough.

(d) When a registered medical practitioner has certified that any inmate of a house is suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, and can be safely removed to hospital, such inmate shall not obstruct the sanitary authority in effecting his removal to any hospital or infirmary with the consent of the authorities thereof.

(e) When the Medical Officer of Health of the Borough certifies that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house or part thereof, or of any articles therein likely to retain infection, or the destruction of such articles would tend to prevent or check any dangerous infectious disease, such keeper shall give the sanitary authority such facilities as may be necessary to enable such authority to carry out such works of cleansing, disinfection, or destruction as such Medical Officer of Health may deem to be necessary.

(f) Unless and until by such cleansing and disinfection the necessary precautions for preventing the spread of disease shall have been duly taken, such keeper shall not cause or suffer any other lodger to be received into the room or rooms which, in the case hereinbefore specified, may have been exposed to infection.

30. A keeper shall provide, in a suitable and convenient situation for the use of lodgers, properly constructed water-closets, in the proportion of one such water-closet for every twelve lodgers; and shall cause such water-closets and every part of the apparatus of such water-closets to be kept clean, and shall cause the same and every drain or means of drainage with which they or either of them may communicate, to be maintained in good order and efficient condition.

31. A keeper shall cause every part of the structure of a house to be maintained at all times in good order.

32. A keeper shall cause the yard, area, fore-court, or other open space within the curtilage of a house to be maintained at all times in good order and thoroughly clean, and free from any accumulation of filth or other refuse.

33. A keeper and every person employed in a house shall not receive any female lodger into such house.

34. A licensed keeper and every person employed in a licensed house shall not knowingly lodge, or knowingly harbour, any thief or reputed thief, any prostitute or reputed prostitute, or any other person of improper character.

35. A keeper shall keep a register and shall enter therein the name, age, and nationality of every seaman lodger received into a house, the name of the last vessel from which such seaman lodger was discharged, and the port of discharge, with the name and port of registry of any vessel he may join while resident in such house, and his declared destination on leaving.

36. A keeper shall put up or affix and keep up or affixed a copy of these bye-laws in a suitable and conspicuous position in the common sitting-room of a house in such a manner that the contents of such copy may be clearly and distinctly visible and legible, and shall enter upon the space left for the purpose at the foot of that copy, a scale of the charge per day for board, lodging, and necessaries, made in such house, and shall not make a higher charge than is provided by the scale on any pretence whatever.

37. Upon the Council being satisfied that any licensed keeper has been guilty of a breach of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or the Acts amending the same, or that such keeper has kept, or is keeping, or is allowing to be kept, a house in which drunkenness, gambling, or immoral or fraudulent practices prevail, or is or has been a party to such proceedings, or neglects to remove from such house any person of improper or immoral character who may have entered therein, or has failed, or is failing to comply with these Bye-laws or any of them, the Council may suspend or revoke all licences granted to such keeper.

38. No person shall obstruct any officer or person engaged in securing the execution of these Bye-laws.

39. Every person offending against any of the foregoing Bye-laws, except where otherwise expressly provided, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds for every such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every day during which the offence may be continued after conviction for the first offence.

40. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of July, 1907.
