The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two) chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eleventh day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say :-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain sanitary improvements at the episcopal house of residence belonging to the See of Llandaff, which is known as

The Palace, Llandaff.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Joshua Pritchard, now Bishop of Llandaff, is desirous that certain sanitary improvements should be made at the said episcopal house of residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous

and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of three hundred and fifty pounds (being a sum which together with the amount of the outstanding balance of the sum already borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Llandaff.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Joshua Pritchard, Bishop of Llandaff (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twenty years or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manuer following; that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one fifteenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Joshua Pritchard, now Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff, as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient

discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound, or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed sanitary improvements at the episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop of Llaudaff, for the time being shall insure against loss or damage by fire and keep insured the said episcopal house of residence, the said insurance to be for a sum of not less than eight thousand two hundred pounds and to be effected in one or more of the public offices of insurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us, and that in case of loss or damage by fire to the same episcopal house of residence the moneys receivable in respect of the said insurance shall be paid over to us by the said Bishop and shall with any interest or accumulation thereon be applied by us in rebuilding or repairing the same episcopal house of residence with the concurrence of the said Bishop.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the sane and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the rural deaneries within the archdeaconries of Coventry and Worcester, in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas there are within the said diocese of Worcester two archdeaconries, to wit, the said archdeaconry of Coventry and the said archdeaconry of Worcester.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, has represented to us that it is desirable to make certain new arrangements (being the arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed), with respect to the rural deaneries within the said archdeaconries of Coventry and Worcester.

"And whereas the areas of the said archdea: onries of Coventry and Worcester, and of the rural deaneries therein, were set forth in the schedule annexed to an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and published in the London Gazette on the twelfth day of the same month.

"And whereas the areas of the said archdeaconries of Coventry and Worcester have since been altered in consequence of the formation of the diocese of Birmingham and the rearrangement of diocesan boundaries in connection with the formation of that diocese.

"And whereas we are of opinion that the new arrangements now proposed by the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Worcester, may properly be carried into effect.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Worcester (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, a new rural deanery to be named 'The Rural Deanery of Kenil-worth,' shall be constituted in the said archdeaconry of Coventry, that a new rural deanery to be named 'The Rural Deanery of Swinford' shall be constituted in the said archdeaconry of Worcester, that the rural deaneries of Rugby and Dunchurch in the said archdeacoury of Coventry shall constitute one rural deanery to be named 'The Rural Deauery of Rugby with Dunchurch,' that each of the said archdeaconries of Coventry and Worcester shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries, the names of which are set down in order under its name, and are numbered consecutively in the schedule to this scheme annexed, and that the name which in such schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof and that every parish or cure or church, the name of which is set down in numbered order under the name of any rural deanery in the first column of the said schedule shall belong to and be a part of the rural deapery and of the archdeaconry under the name of which it so appears as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean and Archdeacon thereof, and shall not any longer belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery or of any other archdeaconry or be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other Rural Dean or of any other Archdeacon.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter

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or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

- "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen, Brighton, situate in the parish of Brighton, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester.
- "Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Stephen, Brighton, situate as aforesaid.
- "Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Brightou, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Stephen, Brighton, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Brighton.' And with the like consent of the said Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Stephen, Brighton, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always that so long as the Reverend Benedict George Hoskyns, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Brighton shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Stephen, Brighton, situate as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said Benedict George Hoskyns; and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.
- "We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The district chapelry of Saint Stephen,

Brighton, being:

"That the Right Reverend John, Lord Bishop of Norwich, as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Anmer and the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Flitcham, both in the county of Norfolk, having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed six hundred and eighteen persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich, our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, Your Majesty's consent in writing, as patron, and the copies of the representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing "(the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted "to the said Archbishop for his consideration) "describing the mode in which it appears to him "that the alteration may best be effected, and "how the changes consequent on such alteration "in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe "lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesias-"tical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect "to patronage and rights to pews, may be made" "with justice to all parties interested; and if "the patron or patrons of the benefice or bene-fices to be affected by such alteration shall "consent in writing under his or their hands to "such scheme, or to such modification thereof "as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and "inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or "modification thereof, and shall certify the same "and such conseut as aforesaid, by his report to "His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for "His Majesty in Council to make an Order for "carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, "as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Charles Lord Bishop of Birmingham hath represented in a writing dated the twenty-eighth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I Charles Lord Bishop of Birmingham beg leave to represent to your Grace:—

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament called 'The Pluralities Acts' the several places or districts or portions of land described in the schedule hereto may be advantageously separated from the parishes to which they respectively belong and be annexed to other parishes to which they are contiguous as the spiritual care of the inhabitants thereof will thereby be more conveniently and effectually provided for.

"That pursuant to the directions of the twenty-sixth section of the Act one and two Victoria chapter one hundred and six, I have drawn up in writing a scheme appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Patrons and Incumbents of the benefices of the said parishes to the intent that your Grace may if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed that the district or portion of land described in the first part of the schedule hereto and delineated in the accompanying map and thereon coloured light green shall be separated from the parish of Hall Green and be annexed to and united with the new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Acocks Green for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the district or portion of land described in the second part of the said schedule and delineated in the accompanying map and thereon coloured light purple shall be separated from the said parish of Hall Green and be annexed to and united with the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sparkhill for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the district or portion of land described in the third part of the said schedule and delineated in the accompanying map and thereon coloured light buff shall be separated from the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sparknill and be annexed to and united with the said new parish of Hall Green for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the Incumbents of the several parishes to which such districts or portions of land shall be annexed shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of such districts.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said districts in the churches of the parishes to which they shall be annexed and that the fees for all such offices and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice as shall arise or become payable within or in respect of the said districts shall belong to the Incumbents of the said parishes.

"That no change shall be made in regard to glebe lands tithes or tithe rent charges, compositions in lieu of tithes, endowments or other annual payments of or belonging to the benefices of the parishes herein referred to nor in respect to patronage.

"That the inhabitants of the said several districts shall be entitled to accommodation in the churches of the parishes to which they shall be respectively annexed and in common with the parishioners of those parishes and shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the churches of the parishes from which they shall be separated except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the last mentioned churches and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"SCHEDULE.

"FIRST PART.

"To be added to the new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Acocks Green.

"That portion of the new parish of Hall Green lying to the east of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Sparkhill, and which is bounded on the west by Redding-lane, on the north by the turnpike road leading from Birmingham towards Warwick, on the east by the said new parish of Saint Mary the Virgin Acocks Green, and on the south by Shaftmoorlane and coloured light green on the map.

"SECOND PART.

"To be added to the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Sparkhill.

"All that portion of the new parish of Hall Green aforesaid which lies on the north-east side of the new parish of Moseley and which is bounded on the north by College-road (leading from Wake Green until it joins the River Cole) on the eastern side by the said River Cole (until it runs under the road (Cole Bank-lane) leading from Sarehole Mill towards Marston Chapel) on the south by the said last-mentioned road to the Four Lane Ends pear to the Mill Pond and on

the whole of the south-west boundary by the Wake Green-road and coloured light purple on the map.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may "be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-paro-" chial may in some instances with advantage be "annexed to parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate "parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the " Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop " of any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place or district within the diocese of such "Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as "the case may be, may be advantageously "separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice " by itself or be united to any other parish to "which it may be more conveniently annexed, or " to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, " so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or "that any extra-parochial place may with advan-tage be annexed to any parish to which it is "contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish " for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Arch-"bishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in "writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be " transmitted to the said Archbishop for his con-"sideration), describing the mode in which it "appears to him that the alteration may best be. " effected, and how the changes consequent on "such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical "jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and pay-"ments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by " such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such

"modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section eight of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things. further enacted, "That when by any Order of " Her Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate " parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted the same shall, on registration thereof, and " with the consent in writing of the Incumbent " or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to " be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy "and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly "nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and cor-"porate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto "him or them, and such perpetual curate shall "thenceforth have, within the limits of the " district parish formed under the Church Build-"ing Acts, for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and " shall not in anywise be subject to the control " or interference of the Incumbent or Incum-" bents of the benefice or benefices to be affected "by such Order, if he or they shall have con-" sented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Lord Archbishop of York, hath certified to His Majesty in Council, by his report dated the twenty-first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and seven, as follows:—

"We, the undersigned William Dalrymple by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, do, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Her late Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and six, hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That there is in the county and diocese of York the parish of Nafferton which comprises amongst other places the township of Wansford, the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined, but are more particularly shown on the map or plan hereto annexed.

"That there is within the said township of Wansford a consecrated church which has been recently built and endowed by Sir Tatton Sykes, of Sledmerë, in the East Riding of the county of York, Baronet, with an annual income of ode hundred and ten pounds paid by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to the curate nominated by the Incumbent of Nafferton for duty at Wansford, which said annual income is paid by the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in consideration of a capital sum of three thousand three hundred pounds paid by the said Sir Tatton Sykes to the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in aid of such perpetual endowment.

"That according to the last census the population of the said parish of Nafferton, exclusive of the said township of Wansford, amounts to eleven hundred and eighty or thereabouts, and that of the said township of Wansford to two hundred and forty or thereabouts.

"That the distance between the said parish

church of Näfferton and the church at Wänsford is under two nules.

"That the said church of Wansford affords sufficient accommodation for the whole of the inhabitants of the said township and district hereby intended to be assigned to the said church at Wansford as the parish of Wansford for all ecclesiastical purposes, and to this church the inhabitants of the said township and district have customarily resorted.

"That baptisms, churchings, and burials have since the church at Wansford was built been solemnized and performed in the said church at Wansford and the fees received by the Minister for the performance of such ecclesiastical offices have been accounted for by him to the Incumbent of Nafferton. For the publication of banns and solemnization of marriages the inhabitants of the said township of Wansford have been obliged to resort to the parish church of Nafferton.

"That the annual value of the benefice of Nafferton, exclusive of the residence house thereon, is about three hundred and fifteen pounds or thereabouts.

"That the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have since the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one down to the present time made a grant to the Vicar of Nafferton of a sum of one hundred pounds per annum for the services of a licensed Curate in the church and parish of Nafferton with Wansford.

"That the said sum of one hundred pounds per annum will still be paid by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and shall on this scheme taking effect be equally divided each year between the Vicar of Nafferton and the perpetual Curate of Wansford as part of the perpetual income of the respective benefices each benefice of Nafferton and Wansford receiving a moiety of such aforesaid grant of one hundred nounds.

"That there is a suitable residence house at Wansford recently built by the said Sir Tatton Sykes for a resident clergyman which has been conveyed to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners as a parsonage house for the said benefice of Nafferton with Wansford by deed dated the thirteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six.

"That the patronage of the said benefice of Nafferton with Wansford belongs to the said Lord Archbishop of York in right of his See of York and the present Vicar of the said benefice of Nafferton with Wansford is the Reverend Walter Marshall Hewitt, M.A., who consents to such proposed separation.

"That on such proposed separation being effected the patronage of the said church and ecclesiastical parish of Wansford shall be vested in the said Sir Tatton Sykes, Baronet, and his heirs and assigns for ever.

"That the said church and residence house at Wausford aforesaid was built by the said Sir Tatton Sykes, who has also built a school contiguous to the church at Wansford for the benefit of the children of the said township.

"That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the said Acts of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six, and of the second and third years of the reign of Her late Majesty; chapter forty-nine, the township of Wansford together with that portion of the township and parish of Nafferton particularly

shewn and delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, may be advantageously separated from the parish and parish church of Nafferton and be constituted a separate parish for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act, the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme, he doth by this report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty shall think it expedient and proper so to do make an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

Willelm Ebor."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Archbishop and the consent referred to in the said report are in the words following:—

"SCHEME.

"That the said township of Wansford the boundaries of which are well known and defined shall be separated from the said parish of Nafferton with Wansford together with that portion of the parish of Nafferton more particularly shewn and delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed by a blue verge line and be constituted a separate parish for all ecclesiastical purposes as well as a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name of 'The Perpetual Curacy of Wansford,' of which the said church within the said township of Wansford, shall be the parish church, the said proposed parish of Wansford being delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed by a pink verge line.

"That such separate parish and benefice of Wansford shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish of Nafferton, and the Incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That churchwardens shall be annually chosen in customary manner at the time when churchwardens are usually appointed in and for the said separate parish and benefice of Wansford, and such churchwardens shall be duly admitted, and shall do all things pertaining to the office of churchwardens as to ecclesiastical matters in and for the said separate parish and benefice.

"That the offices of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be published and performed or solemnized in the church of the said proposed parish of Wansford, and all the tees and payments for the said offices and for all other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the said separate parish and benefice of Wansford when constituted and all such other ecclesiastical dues, offerings, emoluments usually payable to the Incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said separate parish or benefice shall henceforth belong to and be received by the Incumbent of Wansford when admitted thereto, but no change is to be made by this scheme in regard to the glebe lands, tithe rent charge, or other emoluments of the said parish church of Nafferton, except as to the grant of one hundred pounds a year paid by the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners one moiety of which said annual grant is to be paid to the Incumbent of Wansford.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed

parish of Wansford shall henceforth be exempt from all liability to contribute to rates for or in respect of the parish church of Nafferton or any other church or chapel situate elsewhere than within the limits of the said proposed parish of Wansford, but shall be liable for rates for the repair and maintenance of the church of the said proposed separate parish and benefice and the expenses incident to the due performance of Divine service therein.

"That the said Sir Tatton Sykes, Baronet, his heirs and assigns shall be Patron of the said perpetual curacy and benefice of Wansford when constituted and that no change is inteuded to be hereby made in the endowments attached to the parish church of Nafferton except as aforesaid or in the patronage thereof except as regards the house of residence at Wansford, which shall become the parsonage house of the Incumbent of Wansford, when the said parish is constituted.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed separate parish of Wansford shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Nafferton, nor shall the inhabitants of Nafferton be entitled to any accommodation in the said church of the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Wansford. The consent of the vicar of Nafferton with Wansford to this scheme is hereto annexed.

"CONSENT.

"I, Walter Marshall Hewitt, Clerk, M.A., Vicar of the said vicarage and parish church of Nafferton with Wansford do hereby signify my consent to the foregoing report and scheme.

"And whereas under Your Majesty's Royal Warrant of 1906, Officers of Your Majesty's Army Retired whilst serving in Army Ordnance

Factories receive certain increases of retired pay, and whereas we are of opinion that similar provision should be made for Officers of Your Majesty's Navy appointed to posts in the Inspection and Experimental Departments, or to posts at the Admiralty connected with those departments if the latter are subsequently departments, if the latter are subsequently created;

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the following regulations for increases of retired pay of Officers of Your Majesty's Navy who are placed on the Retired List whilst serving on the staff of the Inspection and Experimental Departments or in posts at the Admiralty connected with those

departments:

'(1.) If an Officer is discharged to retired pay at his own request or on completion of any period for which he may have been appointed, or as unfit for further employment from other cause than age, medical unfitness, or misconduct, his retired pay should be increased by one-sixtieth of the pay and allowances of the appointment for each complete year of service.

"(2.) If discharged to retired pay on account of age, medical unfitness, abolition of office, or reduction or reorganisation of establishment.

(a.) With ten or more years service after date of retirement from Your Majesty's Navy his retired pay should be increased by one-sixtieth of the pay and allowances of the appointment for each complete year of service;

(b.) With less than ten years service after such date the increase should be at the rate of one-fiftieth of the pay and allowances of the appointment, provided that the total addition shall not exceed ten-sixtieths of such pay and allowances.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these

proposals."
