A PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD R. & I.

Whereas under the Coinage Act, 1870, it is lawful for His Majesty, with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, by Proclamation, to direct the establishment of any branch of His Majesty's Royal Mint in England in any British possession, and to impose a charge for the coinage of gold thereat, and determine the application of such charge, and determine the extent to which such branch is to be deemed part of the said Mint, and to which coins issued therefrom are to be current and be a legal tender, and to be deemed to be issued from the said Mint:

And whereas the Government of the Dominion of Canada has applied for the establishment of a branch of the Mint at Ottawa, the capital of the Dominion, and provision has been made by the

Parliament of the Dominion for an annual expenditure of seventy-five thousand dollars for the expenses of the branch Mint:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

1. A branch of Our Mint (in this Proclamation referred to as the Ottawa branch Mint) shall be established at or near Ottawa in Our Dominion of Canada on such site as the Governor-General of the Dominion in Council may approve.

2. Gold coins of the same denominations, designs, weights, and fineness as gold coins coined at Our Mint in England, may be coined at the Ottawa branch Mint, and any gold coins so coined (in this Proclamation referred to as sterling gold coins) shall be subject to the allowance of the same remedy as gold coins coined at Our Mint in England.

3. The Master of Our Mint shall prepare and transmit such dies as may be required for the sterling gold coins to be coined at the Ottawa branch Mint.

4. The sterling gold coins coined in pursuance of this Proclamation at the Ottawa branch Mint shall be deemed to have been issued from Our Mint, and shall be current and a legal tender in like manner and to the like extent as if they had been coined and issued in England.

5.—(i.) If any person brings to the Ottawa branch Mint any gold bullion and requires the Deputy Master of that branch to assay, coin into sterling gold coins and deliver out the same to him, the Deputy Master shall comply with the requisition upon payment for every ounce troy of gold of standard fineness of a charge of three cents where the amount brought at one time does not exceed five hundred ounces, and of two cents in any other case: Provided that—

(a) where the gold bullion so brought is such that it cannot be brought to the standard fineness of the coin to be coined thereout

without refining the whole or some portion of it, the Deputy Master shall demand for assaying and refining the same such additional charge as the Governor-General in Council may from time to time fix, and until such charge is paid to him may refuse to receive, assay, or coin such bullion; and

(b) where the bullion brought to the branch Mint for coinage is finer than the standard fineness of the coin to be coined thereout, there shall be delivered to the person bringing the same such additional amount of coin as is proportionate to such superior fineness;

(c) no undue preference shall be shown to any person as respects the bullion brought to the branch Mint, and every person shall have priority according to the time at which he brought it;

(d) the Governor-General in Council may make regulations for carrying into effect the provisions of this Article with respect to gold bullion, and the bringing, coining, and delivery out thereof, and in particular for regulating the time and conditions at and under which it is to be so brought, assayed, coined, and delivered out, and the minimum amount which may be so brought.

(ii.) The charges under this Article for coining, assaying, and refining shall be collected by the Deputy Master in accordance with the said regulations, either as a payment in advance, or as a deduction from the coin delivered out, or otherwise, and shall be accounted for and paid over in such manner as the Governor-General in Council directs to the Minister of Finance and Receiver-General of Canada, to be by him paid into the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

6. Subject to the provisions of this Proclamation, the Ottawa branch Mint shall be deemed to be part of Our Mint, and accordingly

(a) the Deputy Master shall comply with all directions he may receive from the Master of Our Mint, whether as regards the returns to be made, or the transmission of specimen sterling gold coins to England or otherwise; and

(b) the said specimen sterling gold coins shall be subject to the trial of the pyx under section twelve of the Coinage Act, 1870, so, however, that they shall be examined separately from the coins coined in England or at any branch Mint other than the one regulated by this Proclamation; and

(c) the Deputy Master and other officers and persons for the purpose of carrying on the business of the branch Mint may be appointed, promoted, suspended, and removed, and their duties assigned and salaries awarded under section fifteen of the Coinage Act, 1870.

7. Subject to any regulations and conditions which may be made by the Master of Our Mint, the Deputy Master of the Ottawa branch Mint shall coin at that branch Mint any gold, silver, bronze, or other coin which the Governor-General of the Dominion requires to be so coined, and which is for the time being a coin of the Dominion and current and legal tender in the Dominion, but coins coined under this Article shall not for the purposes of the Coinage Act, 1870, be deemed to be coins made at, or issued from, Our Mint.

8. The Governor-General in Council shall cause the store of bullion and coin at the Ottawa branch Mint to be inspected half-yearly, and cause the persons inspecting the same to report thereon to the Deputy Master of the branch

Mint, stating the exact amount of bullion and coin inspected by them; and copies of such report shall be transmitted by the Deputy Master to the Governor-General and to the Master of Our Mint in London.

9. The Master of Our Mint shall, in the execution of this Proclamation, act in accordance with any regulations made or directions given by the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury.

10. In this Proclamation—

The expression "Mint" means Our Royal Mint in England;

The expression "Governor-General" includes the officer for the time being administering the Government of the Dominion;

The expression "Deputy Master of the branch Mint" includes any person who lawfully exercises at such branch Mint the authority of Deputy Master.

11. This Proclamation may be cited as the Ottawa Mint Proclamation, 1907.

12. This Proclamation shall come into force on the ninth day of November, nineteen hundred and seven.

"And with the like consent of the said Francis, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of All Saints, situate at Fewcot as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should

be paid and belong to the Minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The district chapelry of Fewcot being:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called "the said benefice") of Burham, in

the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Burham, is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Honourable Henry Cubitt, of Denbies, Dorking, in the county of Surrey.

"And whereas the said Henry Cubitt is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Burham, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Rochester.

"And whereas the Right Reverend John Reginald, now Bishop of Rochester, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Burham, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Burham.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Henry Cubitt (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Burham, now vested in him, the said Henry Cubitt as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

WHEREAS by section one of the Employers' Liability Insurance Companies Act, 1907 (in this Order referred to as the Act), it is amongst other things enacted that the provisions of the Life Assurance Companies Acts, 1870 to 1872, relating to life assurance companies established or commencing to carry on the business of life assurance within the United Kingdom after the passing of the Life Assurance Companies Act, 1870, shall, with the exceptions specified in the said section, and subject to such necessary modifications and adaptations therein as may be made by Order in Council, apply to companies, whether established before or after the passing of the Act, which carry on within the United Kingdom the business of insuring employers against liability to pay compensation or damages to workmen in their employment:

And whereas by the same Act it is provided that that Act shall come into operation on such day as may be specified in an Order in Council thereunder:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Him by the Act, and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, for the purposes aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. For the purposes of the Act the said provisions of the Life Assurance Companies Acts, 1870 to 1872, shall be adapted in the form and manner set forth in the schedule to this Order.

2. The Employers' Liability Insurance Companies Act, 1907, shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eight.

3. This Order may be cited as the Employers' Liability Insurance Companies (Adaptation of Enactments) Order, 1907.

SCHEDULE.

LIFE ASSURANCE COMPANIES ACT, 1870.
(33 and 34 Vict. c. 61.)

2. In this Act—

The term "company," means any person or persons, corporate or unincorporate, not being registered under the Acts relating to friendly societies, who carry on within the United Kingdom the business of employers' liability insurance, that is to say, the business of insuring employers against liability to pay compensation or damages to workmen in their employment and other risks incidental to the employment of workmen:

The term "chairman" means the person for the time being presiding over the court or board of directors of the company:

The term "policy holder" means, save as otherwise expressly provided, the person who for the time being is the legal holder of the policy for securing the contract with the company, and, where any sum is due or weekly payment payable under any policy, includes the person to whom the sum is due or the weekly payment payable:

The term "policy" includes any policy under which there is for the time being any existing liability already accrued or under which any liability may accrue:

The term "financial year" means each period of twelve months at the end of which the balance of the accounts of the company is

struck, or if no such balance is struck, then each period of twelve months ending with the thirty-first day of December :

The term "Court" means, in the case of a company registered or having its head office in England, the Chancery Division of the High Court; in the case of a company registered or having its head office in Ireland, the Chancery Division of the High Court in Ireland; in all cases of companies registered or having its head office in Scotland the Court of Session in either division thereof :

The term "registrar" means the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies in England and Scotland, and the Assistant Registrar of Joint Stock Companies in Ireland.

3. Every company established within the United Kingdom, and every company established out of the United Kingdom which carries on the business of employers' liability insurance within the United Kingdom, shall be required to deposit the sum of twenty thousand pounds with the Paymaster-General for the time being for and on behalf of the Supreme Court of Judicature, to be invested by him under the direction of the Court in one of the securities usually accepted by the Court for the investment of funds placed from time to time under its administration, the company electing the particular security and receiving the income therefrom, and the registrar shall not issue a certificate of incorporation unless such deposit shall have been made, and the Paymaster-General shall, under direction of the Court, return such deposit to the company so soon as the fund set apart and secured for the satisfaction of claims of policy holders insured by the company shall have amounted to forty thousand pounds.

4. In the case of a company transacting other business besides that of employers' liability insurance, a separate account shall be kept of all receipts in respect of the contracts of the company in relation to employers' liability insurance, and the said receipts shall be carried to and form a separate fund to be called the employers' liability insurance fund of the company, and such fund shall be as absolutely the security of the policy holders as though it belonged to a company carrying on no other business than that of employers' liability insurance, and shall not be liable for any contracts of the company for which it would not have been liable had the business of the company been only that of employers' liability insurance.

5. Every company shall, at the expiration of each financial year of such company, prepare a statement of its revenue account for such year, and of its balance sheet at the close of such year, in the forms respectively contained in the First and Second Schedules to this Act.

6. Every company which, concurrently with the granting of employers' liability insurance policies, transacts any other kind of assurance or other business shall, at the expiration of each such financial year as aforesaid, prepare statements of its revenue account for such year, and of its balance sheet at the close of such year, in the forms respectively contained in the Third and Fourth Schedules of this Act.

8. Every company shall, at the expiration of each financial year of such company, prepare a statement of its estimated liabilities in respect of its employers' liability insurance business in the forms contained in the fifth and sixth schedules to this Act.

9. The Board of Trade, upon the application of or with the consent of a company, may alter the forms contained in the schedules to this Act, for the purpose of adapting them to the circumstances of such company, or of better carrying into effect the objects of this Act.

10. Every statement or abstract hereinbefore required to be made shall be signed by the chairman and two directors of the company and by the principal officer managing the employers' liability insurance business, and, if the company has a managing director, by such managing director, and shall be printed; and the original, so signed as aforesaid, together with three printed copies thereof, shall be deposited at the Board of Trade within nine months of the dates respectively hereinbefore prescribed as the dates at which the same are to be prepared.

11. A printed copy of the last deposited statement, abstract or other document by this Act required to be printed shall be forwarded by the company, by post or otherwise, on application, to every shareholder and policy holder of the company.

12. Every company which is not registered under the Companies Act, 1862, and which has not incorporated in its deed of settlement section ten of the Companies Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, shall keep a "Shareholders Address Book," in accordance with the provisions of that section, and shall furnish, on application, to every shareholder and policy holder of the company a copy of such book, on payment of a sum not exceeding sixpence for every hundred words required to be copied for such purpose.

13. Every company which is not registered under the Companies Act, 1862, shall cause a sufficient number of copies of its deed of settlement to be printed, and shall furnish, on application, to every shareholder and policy holder of the company a copy of such deed of settlement on payment of a sum not exceeding two shillings and sixpence.

14. Where it is intended to amalgamate two or more companies, or to transfer the employers' liability insurance business of one company to another, the directors of any one or more of such companies may apply to the Court, by petition, to sanction the proposed arrangement, notice of such application being published in the Gazette, and the Court, after hearing the directors and other persons whom it considers entitled to be heard upon the petition, may confirm the same if it is satisfied that no sufficient objection to the arrangement has been established.

Before any such application is made to the Court a statement of the nature of the amalgamation or transfer, as the case may be, together with an abstract containing the material facts embodied in the agreement or deed under which such amalgamation or transfer is proposed to be effected, and copies of the actuarial or other reports upon which such agreement or deed is founded, shall be forwarded to each policy holder of both companies in case of amalgamation, or to each policy holder of the transferred company in case of transfer, by the same being transmitted in manner provided by section one hundred and thirty-six of the Companies Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, for the transmission to shareholders of notices not requiring to be served personally; and the agreement or deed under which such amalgamation or transfer is effected shall be open for the inspection of the policy holders and shareholders at the office or

offices of the company or companies for a period of fifteen days after the issuing of the abstract herein provided.

The Court shall not sanction any amalgamation or transfer in any case in which it appears to the Court that policy holders representing one tenth or more of the value of the liabilities of the company to the policy holders in any company which it is proposed to amalgamate, or in any company the business of which it is proposed to transfer, dissent from such amalgamation or transfer.

No company shall amalgamate with another, or transfer its business to another, unless such amalgamation or transfer is confirmed by the Court in accordance with this section:

Provided always, that this section shall not apply in any case in which the business of any company which is sought to be amalgamated or transferred does not comprise the business of employers' liability insurance.

In this section "policy holder," in the case of a policy terminable by the company at the end of any year, does not include the legal holder of the policy for securing the contract with the company unless a weekly payment is actually payable under the policy.

15. When an amalgamation takes place between any companies, or when the business of one company is transferred to another company, the combined company or the purchasing company, as the case may be, shall, within ten days from the date of the completion of the amalgamation or transfer, deposit with the Board of Trade certified copies of statements of the assets and liabilities of the companies concerned in such amalgamation or transfer, together with a statement of the nature and terms of the amalgamation or transfer, and a certified copy of the agreement or deed under which such amalgamation or transfer is effected, and certified copies of the actuarial or other reports upon which the agreement or deed is founded; and the statement and agreement or deed of amalgamation or transfer shall be accompanied by a declaration under the hand of the chairman of each company and the principal managing officer of each company that to the best of their belief every payment made or to be made to any person whatsoever on account of the said amalgamation or transfer is therein fully set forth, and that no other payments beyond those set forth have been made or are to be made either in money, policies, bonds, valuable securities, or other property by or with the knowledge of any parties to the said amalgamation or transfer.

16. The Board of Trade may direct any printed or other documents required by this Act, or certified copies thereof, to be kept by the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies or other officer of the Board of Trade; and any person may, on payment of such fees as the Board of Trade may direct, inspect the same at his office, and procure copies thereof.

17. Every statement, abstract, or other document deposited with the Board of Trade or with the Registrar of Joint Stock Companies under this Act shall be receivable in evidence; and every document purporting to be certified by one of the secretaries or assistant secretaries of the Board of Trade, or by the said registrar, to be such deposited document, and every document purporting to be similarly certified to be a copy of such deposited document, shall, if produced out of the custody of the Board of Trade or of

the said registrar, be deemed to be such deposited document as aforesaid, or a copy thereof, and shall be received in evidence as if it were the original document, unless some variation between it and the original document shall be proved.

18. Every company which makes default in complying with the requirements of this Act shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty-pounds for every day during which the default continues; and if default continue for a period of three months after notice of default by the Board of Trade, which notice shall be published in one or more newspapers as the Board of Trade may direct, and after such publication the Court may order the winding up of the company, in accordance with the Companies Act, 1862, upon the application of one or more policy holders or shareholders.

19. If any statement, abstract, or other document required by this Act is false in any particular to the knowledge of any person who signs the same, such person shall be liable on conviction thereof on indictment to fine and imprisonment, or on summary conviction thereof to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

20. Every penalty imposed by this Act shall be recovered and applied in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Companies Act, 1862, are recoverable and applicable.

21. The Court may order the winding up of any company, in accordance with the Companies Act, 1862, on the application of one or more policy holders or shareholders, upon its being proved to the satisfaction of the Court that the company is insolvent, and in determining whether or not the company is insolvent, the Court shall take into account its contingent or prospective liability under policies; but the Court shall not give a hearing to the petition until security for costs for such amount as the judge shall think reasonable shall be given, and until a *prima facie* case shall also be established to the satisfaction of the judge; and in the case of a proprietary company having an uncalled capital of an amount sufficient to make up the actual invested assets equal to the amount of the estimated liabilities, the Court shall suspend further proceedings on the petition for a reasonable time (in the discretion of the Court) to enable the uncalled capital, or a sufficient part thereof, to be called up; and if at the end of the original or any extended time for which the proceedings shall have been suspended such an amount shall not have been realised by means of calls as, with the already invested assets, to be equal to the liabilities, an order shall be made on the petition as if the company had been proved insolvent.

22. The Court, in the case of a company which has been proved to be insolvent, may, if it thinks fit, reduce the amount of the contracts of the company upon such terms and subject to such conditions as the Court thinks just, in place of making a winding-up order.

23. Any notice which is by this Act required to be sent to any policy holder may be addressed and sent, in the case of a current policy, to the person to whom notices respecting such policy are usually sent, and in the case of an expired policy, to every person to whom any payment due under that policy is payable, and any notice so addressed and sent shall be deemed and taken to be notice to the holder of such policy.

24. The Board of Trade shall lay annually before Parliament the statements and abstracts of reports deposited with them under this Act during the preceding year.

LIFE ASSURANCE COMPANIES ACT, 1872.

(35 and 36 Vict., c. 41.)

1. The deposit required to be made under the provisions of the Life Assurance Companies Act, 1870, as adapted by this Order, may be made by the subscribers of the memorandum of association of the company, or any of them, in the name of the proposed company, and such deposit upon the incorporation of the company shall be deemed to have been made by and to be part of the assets of the company.

The said deposit shall, until returned to the company, be deemed to form part of the employers' liability insurance fund of the company, and shall be subject to the provisions of section four of the Life Assurance Companies Act, 1870, as so adapted, accordingly. The Board of Trade may from time to time make, and when made revoke, alter, or add to, rules with respect to the payment of the said deposit, the investment of or dealing with the same, the deposit of stocks or securities in lieu of money, and the payment of the interest or dividends from time to time accruing due on any such investment, stocks, or securities in respect of such deposit. Any rules made in pursuance of this section shall have effect as if they were enacted in this Act, and shall be laid before Parliament within three weeks after they are made, if Parliament be then sitting, or if not, within three weeks after the beginning of the then next session of Parliament.

* * * * *

3. The Board of Trade shall lay before Parliament any statement or abstract of report which is deposited with them by any company, and purports to be in pursuance of the Life Assurance Companies Act, 1870, as adapted by this Order, although the Board are of opinion that it is not such a statement or abstract as is required to be prepared by that Act as so adapted.

4. Where the business or any part of the business of an employers' liability insurance company has, [either before or] after the making of this Order, been transferred to another company under an arrangement in pursuance of which such first-mentioned company (in this Act called the subsidiary company) or the creditors thereof has or have claims against the company to which such transfer was made (in this section called the principal company), then, if such principal company is being wound up by or under the supervision of the Court, either at or after the making of this Order, the Court shall (subject as hereinafter mentioned), order the subsidiary company to be wound up in conjunction with the principal company, and may by the same or any subsequent Order appoint the same person to be liquidator for the two companies and make provision for such other matters as may seem to the Court necessary, with a view to such companies being wound up as if they were one company; and the commencement of the winding up of the principal company shall, save as otherwise ordered by the Court, be the commencement of the winding up of the subsidiary company; the Court nevertheless shall have regard, in adjusting the rights and liabilities of the members of the several companies between themselves, to the constitution of such companies, and to the arrangements entered into between the said companies, in the same manner as the Court has regard to the rights and liabilities of different classes of contributories in the case of the winding up of a single company, or as near thereto as circumstances admit.

Where any subsidiary company or company alleged to be subsidiary is not in process of being

wound up at the same time as the principal company to which it is subsidiary, the Court shall not direct such subsidiary company to be wound up unless after hearing all objections (if any) that may be urged by or on behalf of such company against its being wound up, the Court is of opinion that such company is subsidiary to the principal company, and that the winding up of such company in conjunction with the principal company is just and equitable.

Where any subsidiary company and principal company are being wound up by different branches of the Court, the Court to which appeals from such branches lie shall make an order directing in which branch the winding up of such companies is to be carried on, and the necessary proceedings shall be taken for carrying such order into effect.

An application may be made in relation to the winding up of any subsidiary company in conjunction with a principal company by any creditor of, or person interested in, such principal or subsidiary company.

Where a company stands in the relation of a principal company to one company, and in the relation of a subsidiary company to some other company, or where there are several companies standing in the relation of subsidiary companies to one principal company, the Court may deal with any number of such companies together or in separate groups, as it thinks most expedient, upon the principles laid down in this section.

5. Where an employers' liability insurance company is being wound up by the Court, or subject to the supervision of the Court, or voluntarily, the value of the liability of the company to the policy holders requiring to be valued in such winding up shall be estimated in manner provided by the First Schedule to this Act, but this section shall not apply to any company the winding up of which has commenced before the making of this Order, unless the Court having cognisance of the winding up so order, which order that Court is hereby empowered to make, if it think it expedient so to do, on the application of any person interested in the winding up of such company.

6. The rules in the first and second schedules to this Act shall be of the same force as if they were rules made in pursuance of the Judicature Acts, 1873 to 1899, or of the one hundred and seventy-first and one hundred and seventy-third sections of the Companies Act, 1862, as the case may be, and may be altered in manner thereby provided, and rules may be made under the said Acts and sections for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this Act with respect to the winding up of companies.

7. Where a company, either before or after the making of this Order, has transferred its business to or been amalgamated with another company, no policy holder in the first-mentioned company who shall pay to the other company the premiums accruing due in respect of his policy, or receive from that company any payment due under any policy, shall by reason of any such payment or receipt made after the making of this Order, or by reason of any other act done after the making of this Order, be deemed to have abandoned any claim which he would have had against the first-mentioned company, or to have accepted in lieu thereof the liability of the other company, unless such abandonment and acceptance have been signified by some writing signed by him or by his agent lawfully authorized.

8. This Act shall be construed as one with the Life Assurance Companies Act, 1870, as adapted by this Order.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

* Rule for Valuing the Present Value of a Weekly Payment.

The present value of a weekly payment shall, if the incapacity of the workman in respect of which it is payable is total incapacity, be such an amount as would, if invested in the purchase of an immediate life annuity from the National Debt Commissioners through the Post Office Savings Bank, purchase an annuity for the workman equal to seventy-five per cent. of the annual value of the weekly payment, and in any other case shall be such proportion of such amount as may, under the circumstances of the case, be proper.

Rule for Valuing a Policy.

The value of a current policy shall be such portion of the last premium paid as is proportionate to the unexpired portion of the period in respect of which the premium was paid, together with, in the case of a policy under which any weekly payment is payable, the present value of that weekly payment.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

Where an employers' liability insurance company is being wound up by the Court or subject to the supervision of the Court, the official liquidator in the case of all persons appearing by the books of the company to be entitled to or interested in policies granted by such company for employers' liability insurance is to ascertain the value of the liability of the company to each such person, and give notice of such value to such persons, and any person to whom notice is so given shall be bound by the value so ascertained unless he gives notice of his intention to dispute such value in manner and within a time to be prescribed by a rule or order of the Court.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the County Courts Act, 1888, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty by Order in Council from time to time to alter the number and boundaries of the districts and the place of holding any Court, and to order by what name and in what towns and places a Court shall be held in such District:

Article I. This Scheme shall except so far as is otherwise herein expressly provided or as there may be anything in the subject matter or context inconsistent therewith come into operation on the second day of November, one thousand nine hundred and seven.

Article II. Subject as regards any future alteration of the wards hereby constituted to the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, and any Act amending the same as to the alteration of wards the following provisions shall have effect:—

(i.) For the purposes of the election of Councillors the borough shall continue to be divided into six wards which shall continue to be termed respectively the Central Ward, the East Ward, the North-East Ward, the North-West Ward, the South Ward and the West Ward.

(ii.) Each of the said wards shall comprise the portion of the borough indicated by a separate colour and distinguished by the name of the ward on the maps, each marked "Map of the Wards of the Borough of Keighley, as altered 1907," one of which shall be sent herewith to the Secretary of State to be submitted by him to His Majesty in Council for approval and the other shall be deposited by the Town Clerk of the Borough at his office within fourteen days after the date of this Scheme.

(iii.) Nothing herein contained shall affect the existing distribution of Councillors among the said wards.

And whereas it is expedient that these two Orders in Council should be revoked:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order and direct that the above-mentioned Orders in Council dated respectively the third February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and the seventh January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four shall be revoked as from the date of this Order, and they are hereby revoked.

Any Student who has served the House for a period of twenty-five years as an Official Student shall be entitled to retire on a pension of £350 a year, which shall be increased by the sum of £10 a year for each additional year's service as such Student; but no such pension shall exceed the sum of £400 a year.

I have received the enclosed telegram on the subject of Morenga containing details of the occurrences at Witpan.

2. Major Elliott appears to have acted with commendable energy, promptitude, and decision, and he, and the Police and Cape Mounted Rifemen under his command, deserve credit for the successful discharge of a duty under circumstances of special hardship and difficulty.

3. The Prime Minister has communicated to Major Elliott an expression of the thanks of the Government to him and to all ranks under his command for their services.

Extract from a telegram from Major Elliott, Uppington, to Commissioner Commanding, Cape Mounted Police, Cape Town, dated 23rd September, 1907.

I returned here yesterday afternoon with my squadron. Morenga was overtaken some 50 miles in Kalahari Desert after all ranks had been 24 hours in the saddle. Mauder's troop had

been ordered to hold Morenga until I came up, and was 36 hours continuously in the saddle. Position taken up by Morenga precluded any possibility of charging him in front. We swept round his left flank at a gallop in column of troops extended in file, No. 3 troop Cape Mounted Police leading, supported by No. 1 troop Cape Mounted Rifles, troops Nos. 2 and 4 Cape Mounted Police reserve; firing commenced almost immediately afterwards, and all four troops were then extended in a semicircle around Morenga. Key to position, Mander was ordered to take with his troops extended and dismounted, which he did in splendid style, leading his men, revolver in hand, the advance being covered by volley firing at 500 yards range by No. 4 troop Cape Mounted Police. Hottentots stuck to position until the last. The Cape Mounted Rifles were led up against left flank of position by Lieutenant Cowley, who was accompanied by Captain von Hagen of the Imperial German Army and Currie with his scouts. All ranks carried position in excellent style. When position was taken, volley firing was kept up, sweeping the bushes in which the enemy was located at ranges varying from 500 to 2,000 yards. Subsequently on going over position the excellence of the firing was discernible, bushes and trees being cut to pieces by the fire. At 5 P.M. firing ceased, and a mounted reconnoitring party was sent out on our front to search ground in immediate neighbourhood. On all being reported clear, I went over position, but could not remain owing to being without water for men and horses. There may be thus other bodies lying undiscovered. Dutch population here apparently jubilant at our success. The Cape Mounted Rifles, under Lieutenant Cowley, maintained well the reputation of their regiment, and possibly the Commandant-General would desire to have this conveyed to him. Captain von Hagen of the Imperial German Army was much in evidence, joining the firing line, and offering his assistance in every way. All ranks under my command behaved excellently under most trying circumstances, as the heat was almost intolerable, and no water for miles. Casualties sustained occurred in troop No. 2 Cape Mounted Police, on charging the ridge, and during the afternoon approximately 5,000 rounds of ammunition were expended.

In continuation of my despatch of 25th September, I forward a copy of Major Elliott's report of the affair at Witpan. The report bears out the expression of opinion in the second paragraph of my despatch of 25th September. The number of men with Morenga appears to have been small; but, had it not been for the efficient scouting, for which credit is specially due to Sub-Inspector Mander and Sub-Inspector Currie, and for Major Elliott's prompt and energetic measures, Morenga would probably have succeeded in effecting a junction with Simon Kooper; and once their junction in the Kalahari had been effected, it would have become exceedingly difficult to deal with them.

Operations against Morenga.

SIR,

I have the honour to forward herewith a copy of Major Elliott's report dated the 24th ultimo, upon his engagement with Morenga, and of the incidents which led up to it.

The successful conclusion of the operations is undoubtedly due to the foresight exercised by Major Elliott, and to the general thoroughness of his arrangements and dispositions, to the admirable persistence and vigour with which the pursuit was pressed in a practically waterless country, to the excellent scouting, and the intelligence resulting therefrom, and finally to the manner in which Major Elliott's command responded to the call made upon it, due to the ability of officers and men to endure a strain such as this, the result of their training in a police force of this nature, to their being constantly in the saddle in the performance of their duties, and accustomed to long journeys on horseback often under very trying conditions.

Major Elliott's successful conduct of the operations confirms my opinion of the ability of this officer which led to my selection of him to take charge of the Cape Mounted Police in Gordonia-German border. I desire to bring his name specially to the notice of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, and whilst all have done well, the names of Sub-Inspectors Currie and Mander are also specially mentioned. The former I selected for duty on the border, owing to his knowledge of the country and languages, and for his scouting qualifications in which he cannot easily be surpassed.

Engagement with Morenga and Followers.

The COMMISSIONER COMMANDING,
Cape Mounted Police, Cape Town,

As desired in your telegram, No. 873, I beg to submit my report as follows. (Unfortunately, I have not for the moment with me any records, as, owing to the rapidity with which I moved, no wheeled transport was possible, and only actual necessaries, including ammunition, were carried.)

To begin—I decided on evacuating Longklip on Saturday the 14th instant and marching on Zwartmodder. Sunday was spent quietly arranging various matters in connection with the squadron. On Monday I despatched Lieutenant Cowley, in command of the Cape

Mounted Rifles, and scouts, under Sub-Inspector Currie, to Arries and Nakab, with instructions to make fullest enquiries and investigate all reports en route there. On Tuesday Sub-Inspector Currie returned in the afternoon and reported to me that, under orders from Lieutenant Cowley, he had followed the spoor of several natives coming from the direction of German South-West Africa, and proceeding to the hills in the vicinity of Longklip, Lieutenant Cowley proceeding in the meantime to Nakab. Sub-Inspector Currie, whose scouts have invariably performed excellent work, took up the spoor, and eventually found Morenga in a deep gorge. As Morenga's men objected to Currie interviewing their chief, and were very truculent, presenting their rifles at him, he was unable to penetrate actually to Morenga himself, but by means of Petrus, Morenga's stepson, elicited the fact that Morenga was prepared to discuss with no one peace terms excepting myself, giving me two days whether I would make up my mind to come and see him. On receipt of this information I decided to march at once for Longklip, the three troops were warned, and we left Zwartmodder at 1 A.M. on Wednesday, the 15th idem, reaching Longklip, 24 miles, in 5 hours. I sent a despatch rider from Zwartmodder to Koetvlei, ordering the Cape Mounted Rifles to join me at once at Longklip, which they did, arriving there at 9.30 A.M. on the same date.

Sub-Inspector Currie again went out to interview Morenga, with a view to arranging a place at which I could meet him. Subsequently, after an absence of some four hours, he returned, telling me that Morenga had left his position. I then ordered Sub-Inspector Mander, with his troop and two guides, to take up the spoor, to move as rapidly as possible, and to inform me when he got into touch with Morenga, and having done so to open fire and hold him until I arrived. At 12.30 P.M. I received a despatch from Sub-Inspector Mander telling me that Morenga was proceeding in the direction of Upington. I decided, therefore, on moving immediately, sending Sub-Inspector Burges with his troop through Smalvisch and Toeslaan with orders to meet me at Gous, my object in doing this being to prevent Morenga from occupying the mountains he originally did when first interviewed by Sub-Inspector Mander, I myself proceeding with two troops to Gous, carrying all my reserve ammunition on pack saddles, in nose-bags, which were strengthened for the work by being doubled, i.e., fitted one into the other. My wheel transport I sent to Zwartmodder, and men carried two days' rations. For the horses I had nothing. On reaching Gous I received a communication from Sub-Inspector Mander, who had caught up to Morenga, in which I was informed that he had done his best to surround Morenga, but that he was in a bad position, and at daylight his horses would, in all probability, be shot. I therefore instructed him to, while it was dark, evacuate the position he had occupied and take up another one which would still keep Morenga under his rifle fire. In the meantime, having been joined by Sub-Inspector Burges with his troop, I saddled up, proceeding to Middelputs, where all my horses were watered, and then leaving the road, and preceded by the scouts on the spoor, proceeded into the desert. The remainder of the night was spent in pushing on as rapidly as possible, but much delay was caused by the shifting of the packs, constant stops being necessary to readjust these. By about 8 A.M. I was at a place from which Mander had written, only to find that

Morenga had got away during the night, leaving various articles of wearing apparel and bedding behind. Marks were discernible in the sand where they had crept out on hands and knees. In the meantime, it would appear, judging from the spoor, that Mander was still following Morenga, in pursuit. The spoor was thus easily followed, and for another five hours every effort was made to reach Morenga, but without result. As the horses had been under the saddle for seven hours, I allowed half-an-hour's off-saddle. We saddled up within that time and continued the pursuit. At about 1 P.M. cheers from the leading troop denoted that Sub-Inspector Mander and his troop were in sight. Pushing on to these, Morenga's position was pointed out to me, running at right angles to that on which our men for the moment stood. Re-arranging the troops in my squadron somewhat, girths were loosened, and a five minutes' spell taken, after which, with the scouts extended in front under Sub-Inspector Currie, Sub-Inspector Burges with No. 3 troop as advance guard, likewise extended with an interval of four yards between each file, followed at a distance of about 150 yards by Lieutenant Cowley with the Cape Mounted Rifles also so extended as supports, and again by troops Nos. 2 and 4 in same formation as reserve, the advance against Morenga's position was made. At this stage several natives could be seen standing boldly against the skyline on top of a very high sand-dune, which comprised Morenga's position, and which he apparently hoped I would charge. The pace was increased to a trot, and then to a gallop, and remarkably well the squadron looked as it swept forward in the formation I have described, giving the onlooker the appearance of a very much greater number of men than were actually present, my strength being approximately 100 all ranks. Firing shortly afterwards commenced, being directed principally at long range as we swept from the left flank of Morenga's position. Sub-Inspector Burges wheeled his troop to the left and dismounted under cover, gaining possession of a ridge flanking Morenga; the Cape Mounted Rifles wheeling to the right, dismounting under cover and occupying a ridge continuing the line, but slightly in the rear of Sub-Inspector Burges' troop. The two reserve troops under Sub-Inspectors Mander and Gash were dismounted and used more or less as a wedge joining Burges and Cowley's troops. Firing at this juncture became pretty general, but owing to the cover taken it was very difficult for them to locate our men. Having reconnoitred the position, it appeared to me that to be successful I should be compelled to drive the Hottentots from a kopje which was in the centre of my semi-circle. I decided, therefore, in attacking them at once. Having explained to Sub-Inspector Mander what I required done I ordered him to advance with his troop, instructing Sub-Inspector Gash with his troop to fire volleys on the ridge, giving the range as 500 yards. On this being done, Mander's men advanced in alternate rushes, first from the left and then from the right side. Leaving the scene of the action at this particular part I galloped off to the Cape Mounted Rifles and ordered Lieutenant Cowley to advance on the left flank of his position. The Cape Mounted Rifles immediately responded and were led by Mr. Cowley. Captain von Hagen of the Imperial German Army asked me if he could join the storming party, and receiving permission, did so. At this juncture I ordered the "cease fire" to sound, as our men were getting well up to the top, immediately followed by having the "charge" sounded. It was found

that the Hottentots, some six in number, refused to be driven out, and continued to fire from holes in the sand; however, on the various detachments reaching the summit four of these unfortunate people were killed, and two severely wounded. During Sub-Inspector Mander's advance, which was admirable, and this officer's leading perfect, he drawing his revolver and encouraging his men by his cool bearing, two casualties, already reported, occurred. On the position being finally taken, volley firing was commenced therefrom at varying ranges with satisfactory results. At 5 P.M. the firing gradually ceased to dropping shots, and on its ceasing altogether, a reconnoitring patrol was sent out to search for the enemy. On the return of this patrol, which reported all clear, accompanied by Captain von Hagen and another officer I went over the ground and found evidence of the severity of the fire by the marks on the trees and bushes, in addition to the condition of bodies, which were found riddled with bullets, demonstrating clearly that nothing possible could have lived in the fire which, for about 10 minutes, was a continuous volley firing by 60 men.

Owing to the unfortunate scarcity of water and the difficulty of carrying supplies, I considered it prudent not to continue any further into the Kalahari. The men had had nothing to eat all day, and this was also the case with the horses.

On conclusion of the engagement I proceeded with my squadron direct to Upington, and owing to direction taken, via Norokei and Areachap, reached there, covering a distance of approximately 90 miles, at 2.30 P.M. on the 22nd instant.

I particularly wish to draw attention to good work performed by Sub-Inspector Mander, and Sub-Inspector Currie with his scouts. These two officers were invaluable to me, and indefatigable as far as energy and thoroughness are concerned.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 2ND NOVEMBER 1907.)

CORNWALL (PARASITIC MANGE) ORDER OF 1907.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

*Separation of Diseased and Suspected Animals
and Notice of Disease.*

1.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge a horse, ass, or mule affected

with or suspected of parasitic mange shall (a) as far as practicable keep that animal separate from animals not so affected or suspected; and (b) with all practicable speed give notice of the fact of the horse, ass, or mule being so affected or suspected to a constable of the police force for the police area in which the horse, ass, or mule so affected or suspected is.

(2.) The constable receiving such notice shall forthwith give information of the receipt by him of the notice to an Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall forthwith report the same to the Local Authority.

*Veterinary Inquiry by Local Authority as to
existence of Parasitic Mange.*

2.—(1.) The Local Authority on receiving information of the existence, or supposed existence, of parasitic mange shall forthwith cause inquiry to be instituted as to the correctness of such information with the assistance and advice of a Veterinary Inspector, or of a veterinary practitioner qualified according to the Act of 1894 to be a Veterinary Inspector.

(2.) The owner and occupier of any premises on which there is a horse affected with, or suspected of, parasitic mange, shall give all reasonable facilities for the inquiry by the Local Authority under this Article, and any person failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Detention of Animals.

3.—(1.) A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority may serve a Notice (in the Form A set forth in the First Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect) on the occupier of any stable, shed, field or other premises in which there is a horse, ass, or mule, which in his opinion is affected with parasitic mange, and thereupon the following restrictions shall take effect:—

(i.) The horse, ass, or mule so affected shall not be moved out of the stable, shed, field or other premises specified in the Notice, except with the written authority, and under the supervision, of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and only to some other place of detention; and during the detention it shall from time to time, as often as may be necessary, be treated by the owner thereof with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority;

(ii.) No other horse, ass, or mule shall be moved out of the stable, shed, field, or other premises, unless on each occasion immediately before the movement it is treated with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority.

(2.) A Notice under this Order shall remain in force until it is withdrawn by a Notice in writing served on the occupier of the premises by an Inspector of the Local Authority.

*Regulations of Local Authority as to Cleansing and
Disinfection.*

4.—(1.) The Local Authority may, for the purpose of preventing the spreading of parasitic mange, make Regulations for the following purposes, or any of them:

(i.) For providing for the cleansing and disinfection of any place used by, and of utensils,

mangers, feeding-troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things used for or about, any horse, ass, or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange:

(ii.) For prescribing the mode in which such cleansing and disinfection are to be effected:

(iii.) For requiring the owner, lessee, or occupier of any such place to cleanse and disinfect any such place, utensils, mangers, feeding-troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things, at the expense of the Local Authority, or at the expense of such owner, lessee, or occupier:

(iv.) For requiring the removal by the owner from contact with horses, asses, or mules, of litter used for or about any horse, ass, or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange.

(2.) The mode of disinfection shall be one of those prescribed by the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1906.

(3.) If any person fail to cleanse and disinfect any place or any utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, or to remove any litter, in accordance with any such Regulation, it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of such Regulation, to cause such place or such utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, to be cleansed and disinfected, or to remove such litter, and to recover summarily the expenses thereby incurred from such person.

(4.) Where the power conferred by the preceding provisions of this Article is exercised by the Local Authority, the owner, lessee, or occupier of the place to be cleansed and disinfected shall give all reasonable facilities for that purpose.

Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

5.—(1.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board two copies of every Regulation made by them under this Order.

(2.) If the Board are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any Regulation made by the Local Authority under this Order, that the same is for any reason objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Extension of certain Sections of Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

6. Horses, asses, and mules shall be animals and parasitic mange of horses, asses, and mules, (in this Order called parasitic mange) shall be a disease for the purposes of this Order and of the following sections of the Act of 1894 (namely):

Section forty-three (powers of police);

Section forty-four (powers of inspectors);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences or procedure.

Exemption of Army Veterinary Department and Veterinary Colleges.

7. Nothing in this Order applies to any horse, ass, or mule kept in stables of military barracks or camps under the care and supervision of the Army Veterinary Department, or in stables of

any Veterinary College affiliated to the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.

Offences.

8.—(1.) If a horse, ass, or mule is moved in contravention of this Order, or of a Notice under this Order, the owner of the horse, ass, or mule, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the horse, ass, or mule is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If anything is omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, or of any Regulation made thereunder, the owner and the lessee and the occupier and the person in charge of any place or thing in or in respect of which the same is omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any owner, occupier, or person in charge of premises requiring to be cleansed and disinfected fails to give the facilities to a Local Authority required under this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

9. In this Order—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Extent.

10. This Order extends to the administrative county of Cornwall.

Revocation.

11. The Order described in the Second Schedule hereto is hereby revoked as from the commencement of this Order; Provided that all regulations made by the Local Authority under the said revoked Order and in force immediately before the commencement of this Order shall continue in force until altered or revoked by the Local Authority or by the Board and shall have effect as if they had been made under this Order.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-third day of November, nineteen hundred and seven.

Short Title.

13. This Order may be cited as the CORNWALL (PARASITIC MANGE) ORDER of 1907.

The above-mentioned animal shall not be moved out of the premises specified in this Notice, except with the written authority, and under the supervision, of an Inspector of the Local Authority and only to some other place of detention; and during the detention it shall from time to time, as often as may be necessary, be treated by the owner thereof with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority.

2. No other horse, ass, or mule shall be moved out of the premises specified in this Notice, unless on each occasion immediately before the movement it is treated with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority.
