and upon application by the County Council of the Administrative County of East Suffolk, I hereby make the following Order:—

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (Administrative County of East Suffolk) Order, 1908."

BIRDS.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

II. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the Administrative County of East Suffolk to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the Schedule to the Act:—

Avocet, Turtle Dove, Great Bustard, Little Bustard, Common Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Rough-Legged Buzzard, Chiffchaff, Crossbill, Pied Flycatcher, Spotted Flycatcher, Hen Harrier, Marsh Harrier, Montagu's Harrier, Hobby, House Martin, Sand Martin, Nuthatch, Osprey, Kentish Plover, Redstart, Robin, Stonechat, Swallow, Swift, Bearded Tit, Long-tailed Tit, Grey Wagtail, Pied Wagtail, Yellow Wagtail, Blackcap Warbler, Garden Warbler, Willow Warbler, Wheatear, Whinchat, Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Golden-crested Wren, Wryneck (Cuckoo's Mate or Snake Bird).

Close Time extended.

III. The time during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds (other than Snipe and Wild Duck) is prohibited within the Administrative County of East Suffolk, shall be extended so as to be between the last day of February and the first day of September in any year, the close time for Snipe and Wild Duck remaining as fixed by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, namely, between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of August in any year.

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

IV. During the period between the 31st day of August in any year and the 1st day of March following the killing or taking of the following kinds of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of East Suffolk:—

Avocet, Bittern, Black-headed Bunting (Reed Sparrow), Cirl Bunting, Common (or Corn) Bunting, Snow Bunting, Yellow Bunting (Yellow Hammer), Great Bustard, Little Bustard, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Rough-Legged Buzzard, Chiff-chaff, Cuckoo, Stone Curlew (Thick-knee, Thick-kneed Bustard), Pied Flycatcher, Spotted Flycatcher, Goldfinch, Hobby, Kingfisher, House Martin, Sand Martin, Merlin, Nightingale, Nightjar, Nuthatch, Osprey, Barn Owl, Long-cared Owl, Short-eared Owl, Tawny Owl, Redstart, Robin, Spoonbill, Stonechat, Swallow, Swift, Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant), Longtailed Tit, Grey Wagtail, Pied Wagtail, Yellow Wagtail, Blackcap Warbler, Garden Warbler, Reed Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Willow Warbler, Wheatear, Whinchat, Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Green Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, Wren, Golden-crested Wren, Wryneck (Cuckoo's Mate or Snake Bird).

All Birds Protected on Sundays within a certain Area.

V. During the period between the 31st day of Sched August in any year and the 1st day of March 1870.

following, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited in the portion of the Administrative County of East Suffolk which is situated to the east of the London to Great Yarmouth main line of the Great Eastern Railway in the said Administrative County, and in the following parishes or such parts thereof as are not situated to the east of the said main line in the said Administrative County, namely:—

Barking, Akenham, Barsham, Baylham, Magna, Bealings Parva, Bealings Beccles, Belstead, Belton, Benhall, Bentley, Blakenham Great, Blakenlam Little, Blaxhall, Bradwell, Bramfield, Bramford, Brampton, Brantham, Bramford, Bromeswell, Burgh Castle, Campsey Ash, Claydon, Coddenham, Darsham, Eyke, Farnham, Fritton, Glemham Little, Halesworth, Herringfleet, Holton (near Halesworth), Kelsale - cum -Carlton, Martlesham, Melton, Middleton, Needham Market, Pettistree, Playford, Redisham, Rings-field, Rushmere St. Andrew (near Ipswich), Saxmundham, Shadingfield, Spexhall, Sproughton, Tattingstone, Tuddenham St. Martin, Ufford, Wenhaston - with - Mells Hamlet, Westerfield, Westhall, Weston, Wherstead, Whitton, Wickham Market, Wissett, Woodbridge, Yoxford; also so much of the following estuaries and tidal waters as are within the body of the County of Suffolk, and lie above or to the landward side of the following lines respectively, namely: -

STOUR AND ORWELL.

A line drawn straight from the Tower, in Walton-on-the-Naze, in the county of Essex, to the seaward extremity of Landguard Point, in the county of Suffolk.

Provided that nothing in the said Order shall apply to any wild duck decoy, for the time being used as such, or any pond used in connection therewith, in the said portion of the said Administrative County or in any of the foregoing parishes.

Repeal of former Order.

The Order of the 3rd January, 1908, is hereby repealed.
