WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Act of the forty-eighth and forty-ninth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for disannexing from the Archdeaconry of Ripon in the diocese of Ripon the Residentiary Canonry in the Cathedral Church of Ripon now annexed to the said

Archdeaconry, and for providing an endowment for the said Archdeaconry.

"Whereas a Residentiary Canonry in the Cathedral Church of Ripon was annexed to the said Archdeaconry of Ripon by an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council made the twenty-third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, and published in the London Gazette on the thirty-first day of the same month of August, and the income of the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Ripon is derived partly from the endowments and emoluments of the said Residentiary Canonry and partly from procurations, synodals, visitation fees and induction fees or some or one of these sources, and it appears to us to be undesirable that the said Residentiary Canonry should continue to be annexed to the said Archdeaconry of Ripon and that fees derived from any of the above-mentioned sources should continue to be received by the Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry.

"And whereas the payment of the yearly sum hereinafter recommended and proposed to be paid to the said Archdeacon will after the disannexation of the said Residentiary Canonry from the said Archdeaconry of Ripon and after the discontinuance of the collection of the said fees be required in order to provide for the said Archdeacon an annual income of two hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said Archdeaconry of Ripon is now full and the Right Reverend Lucius Frederick Moses Bottomley, Bishop Suffragan of Knaresborough, the present Archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry, is consenting to this scheme.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd, Bishop of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed it with his episcopal seal), and with the consent of the said Lucius Frederick Moses Bottomley, Bishop Suffragan of Knaresborough, as such Archdeacon as aforesaid (in testimony of

which consent he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme the said Residentiary Canonry in the Cathedral Church of Ripon shall be wholly disannexed and disunited from the said Archdeaconry of Ripon.

"And we further recommend and propose that as from the date of the said disannexation we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, be authorized to pay by half yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, to the Archdeacon for the time being of the said Archdeaconry of Ripon the yearly sum of two hundred pounds, the payment so first becoming due being an apportioned part only of the said sum of two hundred pounds in respect of the period between the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and the first half-yearly day of payment next ensuing: Provided always, that every payment in respect of the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the Archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that he has not collected procurations, synodals, visitation fees or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any Archdeacon who may be entitled to receive the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall resign or otherwise avoid his Archdeaconry such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such Archdeacon or his representative (as the case may be) and the Archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same Archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council, now, therefore His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter one

hundred and forty-two, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a supplemental scheme bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following supplemental scheme under the twenty-fifth section of that Act with reference to a fund for the provision of a parsonage house for the Incumbent of the united benefice and rectory of Saint Martin, Ludgate, with Saint Mary Magdalen, Old Fish-street, and Saint Gregory by Saint Paul, in the city and diocese of London.

"Whereas by an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, dated the seventeenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-seventh day of the same month, it was directed that a capital sum of seven thousand pounds should be appropriated towards the provision of a suitable parsonage house or rectory house for the Incumbent of the said united benefice; that pending the provision of such a house the said capital sum should be invested by us, and that the interest or dividends arising from such investment, and any accumulation thereof should be invested and added to such investment of the said capital sum; that if the whole of the capital sum and accumulations should not be required for the provision of the said house the unappropriated balance of such moneys should be added to the moneys which are invested in the names of the Incumbent, and any three of the churchwardens of the said united benefice, in order that the annual dividends or interest arising therefrom may be applied towards the maintenance of the fabric of the parish church of the said united benefice and of divine service therein, and that on the provision of such parsonage house or rectory house the annual allowance of thirty-five pounds, which under the authority of an Order in Council, dated the seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and published in the London Gazette on the following day, was payable in lieu of house rent to the Incumbent for the time being of the benefice of Saint Mary Magdalen, Old Fish-street, with Saint Gregory by Saint Paul, should absolutely cease and determine.

"And whereas the said capital sum of seven thousand pounds has been invested and is with the accumulations thereof available for the provision of a suitable parsonage house or rectory house as aforesaid but no such house has been provided, and it has been made to appear to Us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that it is not at present possible to secure a suitable house either within or near to the united parish of Saint Martin, Ludgate, with Saint Mary Magdalen, Old Fish-street, and Saint Gregory by Saint Paul.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be desirable, that the accumulation of the dividends or interest arising from the investment of the said capital sum and the accumulations thereof should cease, and that such dividends or interest should be applied in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and affixed his episcopal seal thereto) with the consent of the Dean

and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London as the patrons of the said united benefice (in testimony of which consent they have affixed their common or capitular seal to this scheme), and with the consent of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Martin, Ludgate, and of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Mary Magdalen, Old Fish-street, and of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Gregory by Saint Paul (in testimony whereof this scheme is signed in the case of each vestry by the chairman of a meeting of the same vestry, duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that the provisions of the said Order in Council of the seventeenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, shall be altered and varied in the following manner, that is to say, that the investments representing the said capital sum of seven thousand pounds and the accumulations thereof or the sum or sums of money to be realized by the sale or sales of such investments shall be applicable to the provision of a parsonage house or rectory house for the Incumbent of the said united benefice if and when it shall appear to us to be expedient to undertake the provision of such parsonage house or rectory house; that as from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and until such time as we may as hereinbefore provided determine that the said investments or any part thereof or the proceeds of the sale thereof shall be applied to the provision of such parsonage house or rectory house as aforesaid, the dividends or interest arising from such investments shall cease to be invested and added to the existing investments, and shall be paid as to three-fourths thereof to the Incumbent of the united benefice and his successors as an addition to the income of the said united benefice and as to one-fourth thereof to the Incumbent and churchwardens of the said united benefice to be applied by them towards the maintenance of the fabric of the parish church of the said united benefice and of divine service therein; and that the annual allowance of thirty-five pounds which, under the authority of the said Orders in Council of the seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and the seventeenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety, is now payable by us out of our common fund to the Incumbent of the said united benefice in lieu of house rent shall upon the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme absolutely cease and determine.

“Provided always that if such parsonage house or rectory house as aforesaid be hereafter provided out of the said investments and the whole of the said investments be not expended upon the provision of such parsonage house or rectory house, the portion remaining unappropriated to that purpose shall be added to the moneys which in accordance with the said Order in Council of the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, are as aforesaid invested in the names of the Incumbent and three of the churchwardens of the said united benefice, and the dividends whereon are applicable towards the maintenance of the fabric of the parish church of the united benefice and of divine service therein.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them,

in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said supplemental scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said supplemental scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as “The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts,” duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as “The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts,” have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the vicarage and parish of Leigh in the county of Lancaster and diocese of Manchester.

“Whereas the annual value of the benefice of Leigh, that is to say, of the vicarage of the parish of Leigh aforesaid (hereinafter called the said benefice), has been improved by means of certain leases of the glebe lands of the said benefice and of the minerals underlying portions of such glebe lands, which leases were granted under the authority of the said Acts by former Vicars or Incumbents of the said benefice of Leigh.

“And whereas rents, royalties, and other reservations by the said mineral leases reserved and made payable to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, have from time to time as the same have been received by us been invested in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Acts, and of such investments there remain standing in the name of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, first, a sum of five thousand and fourteen pounds fourteen shillings and ninepence London County three pounds per centum stock, secondly, a sum of four thousand eight hundred and thirty pounds thirteen shillings and twopence India three pounds per centum stock, and thirdly, a sum of four thousand seven hundred and seventy pounds two shillings and elevenpence Metropolitan Consolidated three pounds per centum stock, all which said sums of stock are now held by us in trust to pay the Vicar or Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice the annual interest or dividends from time to time arising or accruing therefrom or

thereupon, but subject nevertheless to the provisions contained in the said Acts with respect to making a certain portion of the improved value arising to the said benefice from the said leases payable to us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

"And whereas the improvement in the annual value of the said benefice arising from or by means of the said leases exceeds the annual sum of one thousand three hundred pounds, and after the appropriation (hereinafter recommended) to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, for the benefit of our common fund, of the sums of stock hereinbefore mentioned the average annual income of the said benefice will not be left at a less sum than six hundred pounds.

"And whereas the said benefice was vacated on the twenty-eighth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and seven, by the death of the Reverend Canon Joseph Heaton Stanning, late Vicar or Incumbent thereof.

"Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and eight, the sums of stock hereinbefore mentioned, that is to say, the sum of five thousand and fourteen pounds fourteen shillings and ninepence London County three pounds per centum stock, the sum of four thousand eight hundred and thirty pounds thirteen shillings and twopence India three pounds per centum stock and the sum of four thousand seven hundred and seventy pounds two shillings and elevenpence Metropolitan three pounds per centum stock, shall cease to be held by us for the benefit of the Vicar or Incumbent of the said benefice and shall be held by us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose that as from the said first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and eight, all the rents, royalties, and other reservations which shall become payable to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under and by virtue of an indenture of lease described in the schedule hereto (being one of the leases by means whereof the annual value of the said benefice has been improved as aforesaid) or of any renewal of such lease or of any lease or leases that may hereafter be granted of the minerals or any part of the minerals demised by the said indenture of lease shall cease to be paid to us for the benefit of the Vicar or Incumbent of the said benefice and shall be paid to us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE.

"An indenture of lease dated the eighth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one and granted by the Reverend Joseph Heaton Stanning, then Incumbent of the said benefice with the consent and approval of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and of the Right Honourable Lord Lilford, Patron of the said benefice, whereby there was demised to the Wigan Coal and Iron Company Limited for a term of sixty years from the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, the coal underlying certain lands containing about twenty-six acres situate in the parishes of Leigh and Wigan in the county of Lancaster and belonging to the said benefice."

And whereas the notice of the foregoing scheme, which is required by the hereinbefore mentioned Acts has been given by the said Commissioners to the patron of the said benefice of Leigh and the said patron has not made any objection to the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-third day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter thirty-seven have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parish of Stanhope, in the county of Durham, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the twenty-fourth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and made or expressed to be made between Wentworth Blakett Beaumont, of Bretton Hall, in the county of York, Esquire, M.P., of the one part and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, certain lands and hereditaments situate in the said parish of Stanhope, and more particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, became, with their appurtenances, and are now vested in us.

"And whereas the said lands and hereditaments are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof, on account of their character and situation, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

"SCHEDULE.

"All those lands messuages tenements and hereditaments situate in the parish of Stanhope in the county of Durham and known by the several names of Redburn (including High and Low Redburn) Rookhope Head Wolfeleugh (including High and Low Wolfeleugh) Lintzgarth (including High and Low Lintzgarth) and Broad Dale House together containing four thousand nine hundred and ninety acres two roods and twenty-eight perches or thereabouts which said lands messuages tenements and hereditaments are delineated on the plan marked A annexed to the said indenture and are therein coloured round with red.

"All those lands message tenement and hereditaments situate in the parish of Stanhope aforesaid and known by the name of New House containing forty-two acres two roods and twenty-two perches or thereabouts which lands message tenement or hereditaments are delineated on the said plan marked A and are therein coloured round with purple.

"All that field close or piece of land situate at or near Short Thorns in the parish of Stanhope aforesaid containing four acres two roods and thirty-three perches or thereabouts and all those fields closes or pieces of land situate at or near Short Thorns aforesaid adjoining one another and called Lodge Field together containing four acres one rood and ten perches or thereabouts all which fields closes or pieces of land are delineated on the plan marked C annexed to the aforesaid indenture and are therein coloured round with green.

"All those pieces or parcels of land containing together two acres three roods and twenty-one perches or thereabouts being part of certain lands now or formerly known as Middle Black Dean Farm situate in the parish of Stanhope aforesaid which pieces or parcels of land are delineated on the plan marked D annexed to the said Indenture and are therein coloured round with red.

"All those pieces or parcels of land situate at or near Cowhill in the parish of Stanhope aforesaid containing together sixteen acres two

roods and thirty-three perches or thereabouts which pieces or parcels of land are delineated on the plan marked E annexed to the said Indenture and are therein coloured round with red.

"All that piece or parcel of land cottage and garden situate at Ireshope Burn in the parish of Stanhope aforesaid containing two roods and four perches or thereabouts. And all that piece or parcel of land situate at West Black Dean in the said parish containing two roods and thirty-seven perches or thereabouts which pieces or parcels of land are delineated on the plan marked G annexed to the said Indenture and are therein respectively coloured round with brown and red

"All those two several pieces of land message and garden situate in the parish of Stanhope aforesaid known heretofore by the name of the Caudle House and now by the name of Coronation Cottage which are delineated on the plan marked B annexed to the said Indenture and are therein coloured round with red and numbered respectively 2, 5 and 3 save and except such parts of the said piece of land numbered 5 as had already been conveyed by the said Wentworth Blackett Beaumont to various parties and also all the rights and interest (if any) of the said Wentworth Blackett Beaumont to and in the mines and minerals within and under such parts of the said piece of land numbered 5 as had been conveyed as hereinbefore mentioned.

"All those several pieces or parcels of land situate at or near Pinfold House in the parish of Stanhope aforesaid together with the messuages or dwelling houses and outbuildings which are delineated on the plan marked F annexed to the said Indenture and are thereon coloured round with red.

"All and singular other (if any) the hereditaments situate or arising in the said parish of Stanhope (including any stints or rights of stintage and rights of common in such parish) of or to which the said Wentworth Blackett Beaumont was beneficially seized or entitled for any estate of freehold or customary freehold or inheritance at law or in equity."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and

"And whereas the said grant of the said yearly sum of sixty pounds will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas the contributors of the said capital sum of three thousand pounds have nominated the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester, the Reverend Arthur Frederick Johnson, Incumbent of the said Parochial Chapelry of Great Harwood, Simeon Kenyon, of number 103, Saint Hubert's-road, Great Harwood aforesaid, Esquire, William Henry Kirkham, of number 26, Saint John's-street, Great Harwood aforesaid, Esquire, and Richard Mercer, of No. 37, Russell-place, Great Harwood aforesaid, Esquire, as the persons to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall be assigned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parochial chapelry of Great Harwood which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint John, Great Harwood.'

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Hanwell, situate in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, and being a benefice in the Metropolis or in the vicinity thereof as those terms are defined by the Union of Benefices Acts, 1860 and 1898, that is to say, the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said parish of Hanwell is a parish wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it appears to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of

Hanwell which is mentioned and described in the schedule to this scheme and is delineated on the map or plan annexed to this scheme should be constituted a separate district for ecclesiastical purposes in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and episcopal seal to this scheme, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Hanwell which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes by the name of 'The District of Saint Mellitus, Hanwell,' and that the said district shall be endowed in the manner which is contemplated by the said Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and when such district shall have become a new parish then of such new parish and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall as provided by the said lastly-mentioned Order of Your Majesty in Council be vested in and exercised by the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London, and his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Mellitus, Hanwell, being:—

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe-

lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Lord Archbishop of York, hath certified to His Majesty in Council by his Report, dated the 28th day of April, 1908, as follows:—

"We, the undersigned William Dalrymple, Lord Archbishop of the Province of York, do, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Her late Majesty's reign, chapter 106, hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That there is in the county and diocese of York the vicarage of Sherburn in Elmete, the parish whereof comprises amongst other places the village and township of Lotherton cum Aberford, the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That there is also in the same county and diocese the vicarage of Aberford, which adjoins the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford.

"That according to the last census the population of the parish of Sherburn in Elmete, exclusive of the township of Lotherton cum Aberford, amounted to two thousand one hundred and twenty-five persons, that of the parish of Aberford to eight hundred and forty-five persons, and that of the township of Lotherton cum Aberford to five hundred and six persons.

"That the village of Lotherton cum Aberford in distance from the parish church of Aberford varies from a few yards to one and a half miles, and in distance from the parish church of Sherburn in Elmete varies from three and a half to five miles.

"That marriages in respect of persons residing in the township of Lotherton cum Aberford have been from time immemorial solemnized and performed in the parish church of Sherburn in Elmete.

"That the church of the said parish of Aberford is capable of affording accommodation to the parishioners of the said parish of Aberford and also to the inhabitants of the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford, the said inhabitants having for a great number of years past attended the church at Aberford instead of their own parish church, on account of the latter being at so great a distance.

"That the patronage of the said vicarage and parish church of Sherburn in Elmete is vested in the Archbishop of York for the time being, and the Reverend Reginald Gerard Glennie, M.A., is the present Incumbent thereof.

"That the patronage of the said vicarage and parish church of Aberford is vested in the Provost and Fellows of Oriel College, Oxford, and the Reverend Charles Kaye Watson, M.A., is the present Incumbent thereof.

"That the said patrons and Incumbents are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Sherburn in Elmete, including the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford (exclusive of the value of the residence house at Sherburn in Elmete) is three hundred and nineteen pounds.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Aberford (exclusive of the value of the residence house at Aberford) is two hundred and fifty-eight pounds.

"That the tithe rent charge, the particulars of which are given in the schedule hereunder written, and payable on land in the township of

Lotherton cum Aberford, is commuted at the annual sum of ten pounds by an award and apportionment of tithe rent charges in lieu of tithe of the said township, confirmed by the Tithe Commissioners for England and Wales, on the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, which said tithe rent charges have been heretofore payable to the Vicar of Sherburn in Elmete, shall be received by and become payable to the Vicar of Aberford if the scheme for the said separation and annexation be carried out.

"That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford may be advantageously separated from the parish of Sherburn in Elmete aforesaid, to which it at present belongs, and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Aberford aforesaid.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him the alterations above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereupon in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction,

glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with such scheme, he doth by this report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty in Council with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the patrons and Incumbents of the parishes to be affected, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council, in case it shall be thought expedient and proper so to do, may make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Archbishop and the consents referred to in the said report are in the words following:—

“SCHEME.

“That the township of Lotherton cum Aberford, in the parish of Sherburn in Elmete and county and diocese of York, shall be separated from that parish to which it at present belongs, and be united to and form part of the parish of Aberford for ecclesiastical purposes.

“That the Vicar of the parish of Sherburn in Elmete shall cease to have cure of souls within the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford, and the Vicar of the parish of Aberford shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said township.

“That the inhabitants of the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Sherburn in Elmete or any church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in that parish but shall be liable as other inhabitants of the parish of Aberford for the repair of the parish church of Aberford.

“That the inhabitants of the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford shall have the same rights as to pews and the performance of all offices and services of the church at the said parish church at Aberford and otherwise in relation to the said church as the other inhabitants of the said parish of Aberford.

“That the fees for all such offices and services performed for the inhabitants of the said township of Lotherton cum Aberford as aforesaid, or arising within the limits of the same, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice, shall belong to and be received by the Incumbent of the benefice of Aberford aforesaid.

“That on such proposed Order in Council being effected the tithes arising out of lands situate within the township of Lotherton cum Aberford commuted at the yearly sum of ten pounds, now payable to the said Vicar of Sherburn in Elmete, which said tithes are more particularly described in the schedule referred to in the foregoing representation, shall belong to and become part of the endowment of the said vicarage of Aberford.

“That no alteration shall be made as to the patronage of either of the said two benefices to be affected by this scheme.

“CONSENTS.

“We, William Dalrymple, by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan, the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage and parish church of Sherburn in Elmete, in the county of York, within our diocese and jurisdiction in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend Reginald Gerard Glennie, M.A., the present Vicar of the said vicarage, and we, the Provost and Fellows of Oriel College, Oxford, the patron or persons entitled to present to the vicarage and parish church of Aberford, in the same county and diocese, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend Charles Kaye Watson, M.A., the present vicar of the said vicarage, do hereby respectively signify our assent to the foregoing report and scheme and the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

WHEREAS section eight (three) of “The Mail Ships Act, 1891,” provides that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make rules for carrying into effect, as respects British Possessions, the provisions of that Act with respect to the security given by mail ships, and in particular with respect to the commencement of a legal proceeding by service of a writ or process in the Possession, and to the notices to be given to arresting authorities in the Possession, and the evidence to be receivable by such authorities of the security having been given or withdrawn, and the application of the security in discharge of any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture, where the same are or is recovered or payable either in the British Possession, or under proceedings pending concurrently in that British Possession, and in any other British Possession or the United Kingdom: Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Notices of Exemption.

1. Any rules of the High Court of Justice in England, made under the provisions of “The Mail Ships Acts, 1891 and 1902” (hereinafter referred to as “the Acts”), shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Acts are applied for the purpose of a Convention, and shall be published by such Government in the Gazette of the Possession, and also in such local official Gazettes published in the Possession as the Government of the Possession may prescribe.

2. A copy of every notice and list published by the Board of Trade under the Acts, or under any rules of Court made under the Acts, shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Acts are applied for the purpose of a particular Convention.

3. A copy of every such Notice and list, signed by a Secretary to the Government of the Possession, or other prescribed officer, shall be published in the official Gazette of the Possession, and a copy of such Gazette Notification shall be kept publicly exhibited in the Court-room of every Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession, and a copy of the said Gazette containing any such Notification shall be receivable in evidence by every arresting authority in the Possession.

4. If notwithstanding its exemption, an exempted mail ship is arrested in the Possession, the Government of the Possession, on being

informed by the owner of such arrest and of the arresting authority, and on being satisfied that the ship is an exempted mail ship, shall forthwith send a special notice to the arresting authority, informing him that the ship is an exempted mail ship, and as such entitled to release.

Actions Against Exempted Ships.

5. An action may be commenced against the owners of an exempted mail ship in the like cases, in the same manner and subject to the same rules as an Admiralty action *in rem*, and in any Colonial Court of Admiralty having jurisdiction in the Possession in which such an action might have been brought if the ship were not an exempted mail ship.

Orders, by Courts having jurisdiction in British Possessions, for Application of the Security.

6. Any order of a Court having jurisdiction in a British Possession directing any security to be applied shall recite the name of the Court and of the action or proceeding, the cause of action, and the judgment debt, and shall comprise a certificate by the Judge of the Court that the ship in respect of which the judgment is given is an exempted mail ship, and might but for such exemption have been arrested and sold in execution thereof, and that the Judgment debt is still unsatisfied, and is payable out of the security lodged in or under the control of the High Court of Justice in England in respect of the ship.

7. The order may require payment to be made either in London to a named agent of the execution creditor, or in the Possession to some named officer of the Court from which the order issues.

8. Every such order shall be sealed with the seal of the Court, and shall be drawn up in duplicate, addressed to the Admiralty Registrar, Royal Courts of Justice, London, and shall be transmitted under cover to the prescribed officer of the Government of the Possession.

9. The said duplicate orders when received by the prescribed officer shall be countersigned by him, and shall be forthwith transmitted to a Secretary of State, who shall cause one of such orders to be delivered to the Admiralty Registrar, and the Admiralty Registrar shall, subject to any direction of the High Court, make an order upon the Paymaster-General for payment of the required sum out of the security in accordance with these Rules.

10. Unless the High Court shall otherwise order, and subject to existing rights of priority of liens, orders for the application of any security shall be paid in the order in which they are received by the Admiralty Registrar; but where two or more orders are received at the same time, they shall be paid in the order of their respective dates.

11. Where the order requires payment to a named agent of the execution creditor in London, the money shall be payable at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State.

12. If the order requires payment to be made to a named officer of the Court from which the order issues, such an amount shall be paid out by the Paymaster-General, to a person nominated by the Secretary of State, as will at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State be necessary to purchase a draft for the amount of the order payable at sight in the Possession, and such draft shall be in favour of the said named officer of the said Court.

13. Where any action or proceeding against the owners of an exempted mail ship is pending

in a Court having jurisdiction in a British Possession, involving a claim against the security lodged in the High Court in England, the Court in the British Possession shall transmit to the Admiralty Registrar notice of the pendency of such action or proceeding, stating the nature and amount of the claim and the proceedings taken in regard thereto; and in case of the subsequent discontinuance or other conclusion of such action or proceeding, whereby the security ceases to be affected, the Court shall transmit notice of such discontinuance or conclusion. Every such notice shall be sealed, drawn up, addressed and transmitted to the Admiralty Registrar in like manner as an order for the application of the security.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

14. In every British Possession to which these Rules apply, the Governor in Council may, by Order, prescribe any matter directed by these Rules to be prescribed, or necessary for carrying them into effect.

15. In the application of these Rules to British India, the following provisions shall have effect:—

(a) The Presidencies of Madras and Bombay, the Bengal division of the Presidency of Fort William, the Province of Eastern Bengal and Assam, and the Province of Burmah shall be deemed to be separate British Possessions.

(b) The expressions "Government of the Possession" and "Governor in Council" respectively shall mean the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, the Lieutenant-Governor of Eastern Bengal and Assam, and the Lieutenant-Governor of Burmah, with respect to the territories administered by them respectively.

(c) All Orders made in pursuance of Rule fourteen with respect to any part of British India shall be made with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council.

16. In the application of these Rules to any British Possession in which there is a Vice-Admiralty Court, and no Colonial Court of Admiralty, these Rules shall be read as if "Vice-Admiralty Court" were substituted for "Colonial Court of Admiralty."

17. In these Rules "judgment debt" means any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture found by any Court to be payable by the owner of a ship, and "execution creditor" means the person entitled to a judgment debt.

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Act.

18. This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (Rules) Order in Council, 1908."

19. "The Mail Ships (Rules) Order in Council, 1895," is hereby repealed.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it was enacted that, in case it appeared to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground should be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case might require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, should be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances might require ; provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it should please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, should be published in the London Gazette, and should be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation was so considered ; provided also that no such representation should be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days’ previous notice of the intention to make such representation should have been

given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish of Morley ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the borough of Morley without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials should be discontinued in the said borough as hereinafter directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the fourth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and eight, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twentieth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and eight, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the said borough without the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said borough shall be discontinued as follows, viz.:

MORLEY.—Forthwith and entirely in the Congregational Church of Saint Mary in the Wood, Morley, in the borough of Morley, and in that portion of the churchyard which was in existence prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

one thousand nine hundred and eight, amending Statute III, Clause 7, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THE HUMBLE PETITION of the Warden and College of the Souls of All Faithful People deceased of Oxford, commonly called All Souls College.

Whereas the University of Oxford Commissioners under and by virtue of all and every the powers in that behalf enabling them contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, did by an Instrument under their seal, dated the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, make certain Statutes thereunto annexed for your Petitioners who are therein described as "the College of All Souls of the Faithful Departed, commonly called All Souls College, in the University of Oxford."

And whereas such Statutes were approved by Her late Majesty in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two:

And whereas Statute III, Clause 7, was in the words following, that is to say:—

"7. Seven other Fellowships shall be awarded by a Board of Electors consisting of the Warden, four Fellows of the College appointed for a term of five years by the Warden and Fellows, Bodley's Librarian for the time being, and three Members of Convocation appointed for a term of five years by the Hebdomadal Council of the University. Elections to these Fellowships may be held after examination, or without examination, as the electors shall from time to time determine, but subject to the following conditions of eligibility (that is to say):—

"Any person may be elected who, having passed all the examinations required by the University for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and being in the judgment of the electors qualified by character and attainments to be a Fellow of the College, undertakes to prosecute in the College or the University, or under the direction of the College or the University elsewhere, some definite literary or scientific work which shall be specified in the resolution by which he is elected. The right to elect shall be vested in the electors present at the election, and that person shall be elected for whom the greatest number of those present shall have voted. In case of equality of votes, the Warden, if present, shall have a casting vote.

"Not more than one of these Fellowships shall be filled up in any year. If in any year there be no person whom the electors shall judge qualified for election, the Fellowship shall be suspended, and the emoluments of it shall fall into the Corporate Revenues of the College. A Fellow elected under this clause may be re-elected in like manner and under like conditions from time to time."

And whereas on the twenty-sixth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council approved of the following alteration in the before mentioned Statute III, Clause 7 (which had been resolved on at a general meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, held on the twenty-fourth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and six), being made, that is to say, that after the words "any person may be elected who," contained in such clause of the said

Statute, the words "having passed all the examinations required by the University for the degree of Bachelor of Arts and" should be omitted.

And whereas at a general meeting of the Governing Body of our said College specially summoned for that purpose and held on the fourth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and eight, it was unanimously resolved as follows, namely:—

1. That the words "by a Board of Electors consisting of the Warden, four Fellows of the College appointed for a term of five years by the Warden and Fellows, Bodley's Librarian for the time being, and three Members of Convocation appointed for a term of five years by the Hebdomadal Council of the University. Elections to these Fellowships may be held" contained in the first paragraph of such clause between the words "awarded" and "after" and the word "electors" also contained in the first paragraph of such clause between the words "the" and "shall" be respectively omitted therefrom.

2. That the words "Warden and Fellows" be inserted in the first paragraph of such clause in the place of the word "electors" so to be omitted therefrom, and that the words "Before proceeding to an election the Warden and Fellows shall communicate their intention to the Hebdomadal Council, and shall consider any representation which the Council may make upon the subject" be inserted immediately after the words "casting vote" at the end of the first paragraph of such clause.

And whereas the aforesaid Statute III, Clause 7, as so altered by your Petitioners (if and when the same shall be approved and confirmed by the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council), will thenceforth read as follows, namely:—

"7. Seven other Fellowships shall be awarded after examination or without examination as the Warden and Fellows shall from time to time determine, but subject to the following conditions of eligibility (that is to say):—

"Any person may be elected who being in the judgment of the electors qualified by character and attainments to be a Fellow of the College, undertakes to prosecute in the College or the University, or under the direction of the College or the University elsewhere, some definite literary or scientific work which shall be specified in the Resolution by which he is elected. The right to elect shall be vested in the electors present at the election, and that person shall be elected for whom the greatest number of those present shall have voted. In case of an equality of votes the Warden, if present, shall have a casting vote. Before proceeding to an election, the Warden and Fellows shall communicate their intention to the Hebdomadal Council, and shall consider any representation which the Council may make upon the subject.

"Not more than one of those Fellowships shall be filled up in any year. If in any year there be no person whom the electors shall judge qualified for the election, the Fellowship shall be suspended, and the emoluments of it shall fall into the Corporate Revenues of the College. A Fellow elected under this clause may be re-elected in like manner and under like conditions from time to time."

Now, we, the said Warden and College, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do hereby submit the aforesaid alterations so made

by us in the Statutes governing our said College to the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, and humbly pray that the same may be approved and confirmed.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 30TH JULY 1908.)

SHEEP-DIPPING (ENGLAND) ORDER OF 1908 (No. 2).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Article 16 (1.) of the Sheep-Dipping (England) Order of 1908 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") is hereby revoked, and the following provision substituted therefor:—

"16.—(1.) The restriction on movement into the Dipping Area imposed by this Order shall not apply to sheep which are being moved from any place outside the Area to any premises in the Dipping Area, provided that they have been

dipped in the mode prescribed by Article 2 of this Order, in the presence of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District, within twenty-eight days before the movement, and provided that since such dipping they have been kept isolated from sheep which have not been so dipped and provided that they have not been exposed in any market, fairground, or saleyard at which there were at the same time exposed sheep which had not been so dipped, and provided that they are accompanied by a declaration in the Form H set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, signed by the owner of the sheep or his agent authorised in that behalf."

2. The Form H set forth in the Schedule hereto is hereby substituted for the Form H set forth in the Second Schedule to the principal Order.

3. This Order may be cited as the Sheep-Dipping (England) Order of 1908 (No. 2), and shall be read as one with the principal Order.

CAMBRIDGE ALLOTMENT GARDENS
(SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1908.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Premises to which this Order applies.

1.—(1.) This Order shall apply to the premises described in the Schedule hereto, and also to any other premises in the borough of Cambridge to which the Order may be applied by a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority of the said borough and served upon the occupier of the premises described in such Notice.

(2.) This Order shall cease to apply to any premises upon service on the occupier thereof of a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board or of the said Local Authority.

(3.) A copy of every Notice served under this Article shall forthwith be sent to the Board by the Inspector serving the same.

Restriction on Movement of Swine from or to Premises to which this Order applies.

2. Swine shall not, except as expressly authorised by this Order, be moved from or to any premises to which this Order applies.

Movement of Swine for Immediate Slaughter.

3.—(1.) Swine (not being in a Swine-Fever Infected Place and their movement not being prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board) may be moved from any premises to which this Order applies in a float, cart or van to a slaughter-house situate in the borough of Cambridge, for the purpose of immediate slaughter if accompanied by a licence in the Form D set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of that borough, which licence shall be in force for not more than six days inclusive of the day of issue.

(2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article the owner of the swine, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration in the Form E set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, which shall be retained by the Inspector.

(3.) The swine shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(4.) The swine moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and shall, after their

arrival at the slaughter-house, be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Cleansing and Disinfection of Vehicle used for Movement of Swine.

4.—(1.) Any float, van or cart which has been used for the conveyance of swine under the preceding Article, shall immediately after each occasion of such use be cleansed and disinfected by and at the expense of the owner of the float, van or cart as follows :

- (i.) The floor of the float, van or cart and all other parts thereof with which the swine, or their droppings, have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom ; then
 - (ii.) The same parts of the float, van or cart shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water ; then
 - (iii.) The same parts of the float, van or cart shall be disinfected in one of the modes prescribed by the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1906.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and the dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed under this Article shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with swine.

Movement of Swine to Premises to which this Order applies.

5.—(1.) Swine may be moved to any premises to which this Order applies if accompanied by a licence in the Form A set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the borough of Cambridge, which licence shall be in force for not more than six days inclusive of the day of issue ; Provided that no licence under this Order shall be required for swine which are being moved to premises to which this Order applies under and in accordance with a licence (Form A) granted under the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908.

(2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article, the owner of the Swine, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration in the Form B set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, countersigned as hereinafter provided.

(3.) The declaration shall not be effective until it is countersigned by a police officer of the district where the swine are, who, before countersigning the declaration, shall, so far as is practicable, satisfy himself as to the correctness of the statements contained therein.

(4.) The declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting the licence thereon.

(5.) The swine moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay.

Production of Licences ; Names and Addresses.

6.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce

and show to him the licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

7. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

8.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a pig is not marked as required by this Order, the owner, consignee, or other person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of this Order in respect of the cleansing and disinfection of any float, cart or van used for the movement of swine, the owner, or other person for the time being in charge of the float, cart or van shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any pig as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

9. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 :

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries :

“Swine-Fever Infected Place” means a place for the time being declared to be a Swine-Fever Infected Place under any Order of the Board :

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Commencement.

10. This Order shall come into operation on the third day of August, nineteen hundred and eight.

Short Title.

11. This Order may be cited as the CAMBRIDGE ALLOTMENT GARDENS (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1908.
