Robert Hughes, Esquire, Ex-Lord Mayor of the City of Cardiff, President of the Cardiff Cymmrodorion Society;

Griffith Hartwell Jones, Doctor of Divinity, Rector of Nutfield:

William Edwin Llewellyn Morgan, Esquire, Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel on the retired list of Our Army; and

Evan Vincent-Evans, Esquire, Secretary of the Honourable Society of Cymmrodorion; Greeting!

Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to make an inventory of the Ancient and Historical Monuments and Constructions connected with or illustrative of the contemporary culture, civilization and conditions of life of the people in Wales and Monmouthshire from the earliest times, and to specify those which seem most worthy of preservation:

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability,

have authorized and appointed, and do by these Presents authorize and appoint you, the said Sir John Rhys (Chairman); Edward Anwyl; Robert Carr Bosanquet; Robert Hughes; Griffith Hartwell Jones; William Edwin Llewellyn Morgan; and Evan Vincent-Evans, to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said inquiry:

And for the better enabling you to carry out the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these Presents authorize you to call in the aid and co-operation of owners of ancient monuments, inviting them to assist you in furthering the objects of the Commission; and to invite the possessors of such papers as you may deem it desirable to inspect to produce them before you.

And We do further give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to and examine all such books, documents, registers and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever:

And We do by these Presents authorize and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid:

And We do by these Presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you, Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment:

And We do further ordain that you, or any three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do:

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as pessible, report to Us, under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more or you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

And for the purpose of aiding you in your inquiries We hereby appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Edward Owen, Esquire, of the India Office, Barrister-at-Law, to be Secretary to this Our Commission, and Our trusty and well-beloved Philip Edward Thomas, Esquire, Bachelor of Arts, to be Assistant Secretary to the Commission.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two, and of the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fourteenth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and forty-two and of the Act of the sixty-first and sixty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter twenty-three, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an union of two contiguous benefices situate within the metropolis, and within the county of Kent and the diocese of Southwark, namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Luke, Charlton, and the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Paul, Charlton, and for effecting certain other measures incidental to or arising out of such union.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of the said diocese of Southwark, has caused proposals for a scheme for effecting an union of the said two benefices to be laid before us, which proposals were prepared under the seventh and eighth sections of the firstly mentioned Act and were approved by the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of the said diocese of Southwark, and were assented to by the patron of the two benefices to be affected thereby, that is to say, by Sir Spencer Pocklington Maryon-Maryon-Wilson, Baronet, of Eastbourne, and the same proposals were also assented to by the vestries of the parishes concerned, that is to say, by the vestry of the parish of Saint Luke, Charlton, and by the vestry of the new parish of Saint Paul, Charlton.

"And whereas it appears to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, to be expedient that the said proposed union of the said

two benefices should be effected, and that such arrangements relating thereto and to the other matters hereinafter contained should be made as are hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of the said diocese of Southwark, as such Bishop, and the said Spencer Pocklington Maryon Maryon-Wilson, as the patron of the said two benefices and the vestries of the said parishes respectively are willing that the scheme for effecting the said union should embody certain modifications of the said proposals, and this present scheme does embody the same modifications accordingly, but otherwise is based upon

the said proposals.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of Southwark (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Spencer Pocklington Maryon Maryon-Wilson (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and seal) and with the consents of the vestry of the said parish of Saint Luke, Charlton, and of the vestry of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Charlton (in testimony of which consents this scheme is signed in the case of each of the said vestries by the chairman of a meeting of the same vestry duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent), we the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council all that is in this scheme contained under the several parts or headings hereinafter mentioned, as follows:-

### "PART I.

"As to the proposed union itself, and certain immediate incidents thereof, we recommend and

propose:-

"1. That the said benefice of Saint Luke, Charlton, and the said benefice of Saint Paul, Charlton, be united into one benefice under the style of 'The Rectory of Saint Luke with Saint Paul, Old Charlton,' which said united benefice is hereinafter called 'the united benefice.'

"2. That if upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette both of the said benefices shall be vacant, the union shall forthwith take effect, and if one only shall be then vacant the said union shall also forthwith take effect if the Incumbent of the other of the said benefices shall consent to become the first Incumbent of the united benetice, but if he shall not so consent then the said union shall take effect upon the then next avoidance of his benefice, and the then Incumbent of the other of said two benefices shall be the first Incumbent of the united benefice, and in any case it shall be lawful for the Bishop of the said diocese of Southwark to admit to the united benefice such first Incumbent (if an Incumbent for the time being of either of the said benefices) without any form or fee of or for presentation and he shall thereupon become Incumbent of the united benefice. Until the time of the union taking effect the said two benefices shall remain separate and the rights and liabilities in respect thereof and of the Incumbents of each of them shall remain unaffected.

#### "PART II.

"As to the parish church of the united benefice and the church of Saint Paul, Charlton, and certain matters connected therewith we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further recommend and propose:—

"1. That upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Luke, Charlton, shall become and

thereafter continue to be the parish church of the united benefice.

"2. That upon the union taking effect the table of fees used in the church which will become the church of the united benefice shall (until revised or altered by proper authority) be the table of fees for the united parish.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the register books of baptisms marriages and burials of the parish of Saint Luke, Charlton, and of the new parish of Saint Paul, Charlton, shall be placed in the custody of the Incumbent of the united benefice and shall so continue.

# "PART III.

"As to the endowments of the united benefice we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further

recommend and propose:

"1. That upon the union taking effect all the properties, revenues and income constituting the endowments of the rectory of Saint Luke, Charlton, and of the rectory of Saint Paul, Charlton (other than the present parsonage house of the rectory of Saint Luke, Charlton and the grounds appurtenant thereto or heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith) shall be transferred and annexed to the united benefice.

"2. The Incumbent for the time being of the united benefice shall out of the endowments and income so transferred pay a stipend of not less than one hundred and fifty pounds per annum to an assistant curate to be duly licensed by the bishop to perform the office of stipendiary curate

in the united parish.

"3. That upon the union taking effect the present parsonage house of the rectory of Saint Paul, Charlton, shall be the parsonage house of the united benefice.

# "PART IV.

"Upon the subject of patronage, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend and propose:-

"That the patronage of the united benefice shall be vested in the said Spencer Pocklington Maryon Maryon-Wilson his beirs and assigns.

#### "PART V.

"As to the present parsonage house of the rectory of Saint Luke, Charlton, and the site and appurtenances thereof, and as to the proceeds of any sale or sales thereof, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further recommend

"Î. That so soon as conveniently may be after the union has taken effect the present parsonage house of Saint Luke, Charlton, and the site and the appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, at such time or times and in such . manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient.

"2. That the net proceeds to arise from such sale shall form one aggregate fund and shall be applied as follows, and in the following order,

that is to say:-

"(a) That we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, shall out of such aggregate fund first set apart a capital sum not exceeding two thousand pounds for or towards the acquisition of a suitable site for and the erection of or otherwise for the provision of a parsonage house for a new district to be constituted wholly or in part out of the united parish but until the said capital sum shall be so applied the interest thereon shall be applied towards the payment of the sum of one hundred pounds per annum next hereinafter i

mentioned if required for that purpose and if not so required shall be added to and applied as the income of the residue of the said aggregate fund.

"(b) That we shall out of such aggregate fund (if it shall suffice) next set apart a capital sum the interest whereon shall amount to one hundred pounds per annum and such interest shall be paid by way of additional income to the Incumbent of the united benefice so long as there shall be payable to the Reverend Charles Swainson, late rector of Saint Luke, Charlton, the pension assigned to him out of the revenues of the said benefice upon his retirement therefrom under the provisions of the Incumbents' Resignation Acts and when such pension shall cease to be payable the sum so set aside shall fall into and form part of the residue of the said aggregate fund and shall be applied as such residue is hereinafter directed to be applied.

"(c) That we shall apply the residue of the said aggregate fund for the endowment or augmentation of the income of the minister or Incum-bent of the new district for the provision of a parsonage house for which the sum of two thousand pounds is to be set aside as aforesaid.

And whereas the said scheme has been laid before both Houses of Parliament for the space

of two calendar months.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Southwark.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words following,

that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, in the county of York and in the diocese of York.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, is a cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for

public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine

worship.

"And whereas in pursuance of the power and authority given by an order of the High Court of Chancery, dated the first day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, confirming a scheme for the future application of the income of the trust property of the twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of the town and parish of Sheffield, in the said county of York, and of an order of the Board of Charity Commissioners for England and Wales, dated the fourth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, in partial variation of the scheme established by the said first mentioned order, the said Burgesses and Commonalty have proposed to appropriate the sum of two hundred pounds per annum out of that part of the income of their trust property which is applicable to ecclesiastical purposes in and towards the endowment of the district herein proposed to be constituted.

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, have signified by a writing bearing date the fourth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, under our common seal our approval of and consent to the proposed endowment of the said proposed

district.

"And whereas the said endowment of two hundred pounds per annum has been so appropriated as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof should be assigned to the twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of

Sheffield aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Dalrymple, Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, which is more particularly described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Timothy, Crookes.

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette

as aforesaid be assigned to and be vested in and shall be exercised by the twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of the town and parish of Sheffield and their successors.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

#### "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Timothy, Crookes, being all that part of the particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, in the county of York and in the diocese of York, which is bounded upon a small part of the south by the consolidated chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Ranmoor, upon the west by the new parish of Christ Church, Fulwood, upon the north-west by the new parish of Stannington, upon the north and upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint Mary, Walkley, upon the east by the new parish of Saint Philip, Sheffield, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining part of the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Philip, Sheffield, from the said particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, at the junction of Heavy Gate-road with Springvale-road, and extending thence first south-westward and then westward along the middle of Springvale-road for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Crookes, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said road called Crookes for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Toftwood-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Toftwood-road for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bole Hill-lane, and extending thence first south-westward and then north-westward along the middle of Bole Hill-lane for a distance of twenty chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Bole Hill-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Bole Hill-road for a distance of twenty-five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Hagg-lane, and extending thence first north-westward and then southwestward along the middle of Hagg-lane for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, from the said consolidated chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Ranmoor.

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act been transmitted to the three Patrons and to the Incumbent of the particular district of Saint Thomas, Crookes, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and one of the said Patrons and the Incumbent have respectively signified their

assent to such scheme.

And whereas the second of the said Patrons has offered certain objections to the same scheme and the remaining Patron has not signified his assent thereto.

And whereas one calendar month has expired since the date of the transmission of such drafts as aforesaid.

And whereas, notwithstanding these objections, the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said schame, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

# PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section twenty-one of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that, "Whereas from the increase of population, "or from other circumstances, it may be expe-"dient that two or more benefices which have " been heretofore united or which may be here-"after united under the provisions of this Act should be disunited," it is amongst other things enacted, "that when two or more benefices shall " have been united, or may be hereafter united "into one benefice, and with respect to his own "diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or the Bishop of any diocese shall "represent to the said Archbishop of the Pro-"vince, that one or more of the benefices within "his diocese, of which such united benefice shall "consist, may be separated therefrom with "advantage to the interests of religion, the said "Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances "of the case, and if on such inquiry it shall "appear to him that such union may be usefully "dissolved, so far as respects such benefice or "benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before certifying such inquiry to His Majesty "as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to "his own diocese, a statement in writing of the "facts, and in all other cases a copy in writing " of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on " or near the principal outer door of the church " or in some public and conspicuous place in each "of the benefices forming part of the united benefice, with notice to any person or persons "interested that he, she, or they may within "such six weeks show cause in writing under his, "her, or their hands to the said Archbishop "against any such disunion; and if no sufficient "cause be shown within such time, the Arch-"bishop shall certify the inquiry and consent, "when the patron's consent is necessary, to His "Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be "lawful for His Majesty to issue an Order for "separating such last-mentioned benefice or benefices from such united benefice, and for " declaring the rights of patronage of the several "patrons, if there be more than one patron, and "such Order shall be registered in the registry "of the diocese to which such united benefice "shall belong, which Order the Registrar of such "diocese, immediately on the receipt thereof, is "hereby required to register accordingly, and "thereupon immediately if such united benefice "shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto "dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice "or benefices so proposed to be separated from "such united benefice, but in all other respects " shall remain in full force and effect, and thence-"forward such last-mentioned benefice or bene"separate and distinct benefice or benefices to "all intents and purposes whatever as if no such "union had taken place, and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may according to the "terms of such Order present or nominate thereto "respectively, and so from time to time upon each and every avoidance of the same: Pro"vided always, that no benefices which have been united for more than sixty years before the passing of this Act shall be disunited without the consent in writing of the patron or patrons."

And whereas by section twenty-three of the aforesaid Act it is further enacted "that whenever two or more benefices which have at any "time been united into one benefice shall be "disunited and become separate benefices under "the provisions of this Act, whether the Order "for disunion shall extend to the whole number " of benefices of which such united benefice con-" sisted, or to one or more of such benefices only, "it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, "on the recommendation of the Archbishop of "the Province, with the consent of the patron or "patrons of such benefices respectively (such consent to be signified in writing under the "hands of such patron or patrons) to assign and "attach such portion of the glebe lands, tithes, "moduses, rent-charges, or other endowments "or emoluments belonging to, or arising or "accruing within the limits of such united benefice to each of such benefices respec-"tively, as to His Majesty in Council shall "seem fit, notwithstanding such proportion of glebe land, tithes, rent-charges, moduses, or "other endowments or emoluments, or any part "thereof, may not arise or accrue within the limits "of the benefice to which the same shall be so "assigned and attached as aforesaid, or may " not have belonged thereto, and also to divide "and apportion between such benefices all such "charges and outgoings as before the disunion "thereof were imposed upon the whole united " benefice."

And whereas the Right Reverend John, Lord Bishop of Norwich, hath represented in a writing dated the eleventh day of March, one thousand nine hundred and eight, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, John, Lord Bishop of Norwich, do hereby represent to your Grace that the disunion of the united rectory of Anmer and vicarage or perpetual curacy of Flitcham, in the county of Norfolk and my diocese of Norwich, by the separation of the said rectory of Anmer from the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Flitcham may be made with advantage to the interests of religion."

And whereas on the twenty-third day of March, one thousand nine hundred and eight, the said Archbishop inquired into the circumstances of the

And whereas on the tenth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and eight, the said Archbishop certified to His Majesty in Council as follows, that is to say:—

"We the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council—

"shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso factor dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or benefices so proposed to be separated from such united benefice, but in all other respects such united benefice, but in all other respects such united benefice, but in all other respects of shall remain in full force and effect, and thence of the discussion of the vicarage or perpetual diocese of Norwich, having represented unto us that the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the rectory of Anmer from the

vicarage or perpetual curacy of Flitcham, may be | made with advantage to the interests of religion, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might usefully be dissolved, and that Your Most Gracious Majesty being the Patron or person entitled as part of Your private estates to present and nominate to the rectory of Anmer with the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Flitcham, the same being now vacant, consents

to the proposed disunion.

The upper one indicates the velocity with which the storm centre is moving; the lower one, the barometric pressure of the depression for the time being, according to the values given in Table II.
