#### PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the rural deaneries within the archdeaconries of Surrey and Winchester in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas there are within the said diocese of Winchester three archdeaconries, to wit, the said archdeaconry of Surrey, the said archdeaconry Winchester, and the archdeaconry of the Isle

of Wight.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, has represented to us that it is desirable to make certain new arrangements (being the arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed) with respect to some of the rural deaneries within the said archdeaconries of Surrey and Winchester.

"And whereas the existing area of the said archdeaconry of Surrey, and of the rural deaneries therein, was set forth in the schedule annexed to an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the eighteenth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight and published in the London Gazette on the seventh day of the following

"And whereas the existing area of the said archdeaconry of Winchester was set forth in the schedule annexed to an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the seventh day of August in the year one thousand nine hundred and published in the London Gazette on the fourteenth day of the same month.

"And whereas we are of opinion that the new arrangements now proposed by the said Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester, may properly be

carried into effect.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order a new rural deanery to be named 'The Rural Deanery of Ringwood shall be constituted in the said archdeaconry of Winchester, that each of the said archdeaconries of Surrey and Winchester shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries, the names of

At the Court at Balmoral, the 26th day of which are set down in order under its name and are numbered consecutively in the schedule to this scheme annexed, that the name which in such schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof and that every parish or cure or church the name of which is set down in numbered order under the name of any rural deanery in the first column of the said schedule shall belong to and be a part of the rural deanery and of the archdeacoury under the name of which it so appears as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean and Archdeacon thereof and shall not any longer belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery or of any other archdeaconry or be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other Rural Dean or of any other Archdeacon.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of

Parliament."

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the second day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of a share or portion of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure of Dedham (hereinafter called the said benefice) in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice is vested in Your Majesty in right of Your Duchy of Lancaster.

"And whereas in the parish church of the said benefice there is an endowed office of Lecturer held under the charity called the Dedham Lectureship in the said parish of Dedham, a charity regulated by schemes of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales dated the twenty-eighth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, the fourth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, the twenty-first day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, and the twenty-ninth day of May in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, and the present holder of the said office of Lecturer is the Reverend Hamilton Ashwin.

"And whereas by the last above-mentioned scheme of the said Charity Commissioners being

Burnley, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right; Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron (in right of his See) of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Burnley (in testimony. whereof he, the said Bishop, has signed and sealed this representation) and with the consent of the trustees of the estates devised by the late. William Hulme, Esquire, as the Patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint James, Briercliffe (in testimony whereof they, the said trustees, have affixed their common or corporate seal to this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Burnley, and of the said new parish of Saint James, Briercliffe, which are described in the schedule bereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Cuthbert, Burnley, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Cuthbert, Burnley.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in

Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Cuthbert,

Burnley, comprising:

"All those contiguous portions of the new parish. (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Andrew, Burnley, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint James, Briercliffe,

And whereas by an Agreement entered into between His Majesty's Government and the Sultan of Brunei, on the third day of December, one thousand nine hundred and five, provision has been made for the reception by His Highness of a British Officer, to be styled the Resident, as the Agent and Representative of His Majesty:

And whereas by an Enactment shortly entitled "The Courts Enactment, 1908," legislative provision has been made by His Highness for the constitution and powers of the Resident's Court and other civil and criminal courts subordinate thereto:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty in Council expedient that the said Orders in Council

should be revoked:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this belialf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Brunei Orders in Council, 1901 and 1906, shall from henceforth be revoked, without prejudice to anything duly or lawfully done thereunder.

It shall and may be lawful for any person or persons being a party or parties to any civil suit or action commenced in any Court having juris-diction in the State of Brunei from which an appeal has been heard and determined by the appeal has been heard and determined by the Court of Appeal in the Straits Settlements, to appeal to His Majesty in His Privy Council against any final judgment decree or order of the said Court of Appeal given or made upon such appeal subject to the same rules, conditions, and limitations, and subject to the same procedure in all respects as may from time to time be applicable to appeals to His Majesty in Council from the said Court of Appeal in respect of civil suits or actions commenced in the Courts of civil suits or actions commenced in the Courts of the Strairs Settlements.

HEREAS by Treaty, capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means, His Majesty the King has jurisdiction within the places referred to in this Order:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :-

1. This Order may be cited as "The Foreign

Jurisdiction (Probates) Order in Council, 1908."
2.—(1.) This Order extends to all persons and to all property subject to any of the following Orders in Council: "The Morocco Order in Council, 1889"; "The Persia Order in Council, 1889"; "The Ottoma Order in Council, 1899,"; "The Ottoma Order in Council, 1899,"; "The China and Corea Order in Council, 1904"; "The Siam Order in Council, 1906"; or any Orders in Council substituted therefor.

- (2.) This Order shall take effect on such day not less than one month nor more than three months after it is first exhibited in the public office of the highest of His Majesty's Courts established by each of the said Orders in Council, as His Majesty's Representative shall by public notification appoint.
- 3. In this Order the term "principal Order" means the Order under which the Court exercising jurisdiction is established, including therein any subsequent or amending Order affecting such jurisdiction, and the term "His Majesty's Representative" means in the Ottoman Empire, except Egypt, His Majesty's Ambassador; in Egypt, His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General; in China, Morocco, Persia, and Siam, His Majesty's Minister; and in Corea, His Majesty's Consul-General.
- 4. The provisions of this Order shall be deemed to be supplementary to the powers conferred upon the Court by the principal Order for the exercise of its jurisdiction in matters of probate and administration.
- 5.—(1.) Every application for a grant of probate or of letters of administration shall be accompanied by an affidavit to be made by the person applying for the grant, giving particulars of the deceased person's estate and effects within the limits of the principal Order, and of the deductions permissible under this Order, and setting out the value thereof.
- (2.) Where any error has been made in the value of an asset in the said affidavit or in the amount of any debt or other permissible deduction, or where an asset or debt has been omitted from the affidavit which should have been included, or where an asset or debt has been included which should have been omitted, or in any other case in which an error has been made, a further affidavit may be made by the person who applied for the grant of probate or letters of administration, stating the nature of the correction to be made.
- 6. The following property shall be deemed to be part of the estate, and shall be included in the affidavit accompanying the application for probate or letters of administration in respect of the estate of every person dying after the commencement of this Order:—
  - (a.) Any property taken as a donatio mortis causa made by the deceased person, or taken under a disposition, made by such deceased person purporting to operate as an immediate gift inter vivos whether by way of transfer delivery declaration of trust or otherwise, which shall not have been bona fide made twelve months before the death of the deceased person, or taken under any gift, whenever made, of which property bona fide possession and enjoyment shall not have been assumed by the donee immediately upon the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise.
- (b.) Any property which the deceased person having been absolutely entitled thereto has caused to be transferred to or vested in himself and any other person or persons jointly, including therein any purchase or investment effected by such deceased person either by himself alone or in concert or by arrangement with any other person so that the beneficial interest therein or in some part thereof passes or accrues by survivorship on his death to such other person.
  - (c.) Any property passing under any past or future settlement made by the deceased person

- by deed or any other instrument not taking effect as a will, whereby an interest in such property or the proceeds of sale thereof for life or any other period determinable by re-ference to death is reserved either expressly or by implication to the settlor, or whereby the settlor may have reserved to himself the right by the exercise of any power to restore to himself, or to reclaim the absolute interest in such property, or the proceeds of sale thereof, and the term "settlement" in this paragraph shall include any trust, whether expressed in writing or otherwise, and if contained in a deed or other instrument effecting the settlement, whether such deed or other instrument was made for valuable consideration or not as between the settlor and any other person.
- (d.) Money received under a policy of assurance effected by the deceased person on his life, where the policy was wholly kept up by him for the benefit of a donee, whether nominee or assignee, or a part of such money in proportion to the premiums paid by him, where the policy was partially kept up by him for such benefit.
- 7. The following property shall not be deemed to be part of the estate, and shall not be included in the affidavit accompanying the application for probate or letters of administration in respect of the estate of a deceased person:—
  - (a.) Property held by the deceased as trustee for another person under a disposition not made by the deceased.
  - (b.) Property held by the deceased as trustee for another person under a disposition made by the deceased more than twelve mouths before his death, where possession and enjoyment of the property was bonâ fide assumed by the beneficiary immediately upon the creation of the trust and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the deceased or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise.
  - (c.) Property passing on the death of the deceased by reason only of a bona fide purchase from the person under whose disposition the property passes, or the falling into possession of the reversion on any lease for lives, or the determination of any annuity for lives, where such purchase was made, or such lease or annuity granted for full consideration in money or money's worth paid to the vendor or grantor for his own use or benefit, or in the case of a lease, for the use or benefit of any person for whom the grantor was a trustee:

Provided that where any such purchase was made or lease or annuity granted for partial consideration in money or money's worth paid to the vendor or grantor for his own use or benefit, or in the case of a lease for the use or benefit of any person for whom the grantor was a trustee, the property passing shall be included in the affidavit accompanying the application for probate or letters of administration, but the value of the consideration shall be allowed as a deduction from the value of the property.

- 8. In arriving at the value of the estate, an allowance shall be made for debts and incumbrances due to persons resident within the limits of the principal Order and for reasonable funeral expenses, but an allowance shall not be made—
  - (a.) For debts incurred by the deceased or incumbrances created by a disposition made by the deceased, unless such debts or incumbrances were incurred or created bona fide for

full consideration in money or money's worth wholly for the deceased's own use and benefit and take effect out of his interest; nor

- (b.) For any debt in respect whereof there is a right to reimbursement from any other estate or person unless such reimbursement cannot be obtained; nor
- (c.) More than once for the same debt or incumbrance charged upon different portions of the estate.
- 9. In any case where it thinks fit the Court may require any person subject to its jurisdiction to give such information, either by affidavit or otherwise, as may be in his power touching the property of the deceased within its jurisdiction, or may direct such inquiries on the subject as it think fit, and the information or report so received shall be deemed to be a portion of the affidavit of the applicant for probate or letters of administration.
- 10. The fee or fees to be paid on the issue of a grant of probate or letters of administration after the commencement of this Order shall be determined by Rules of Court made in accordance with the powers contained in the principal Order.
- 11. If a grant of probate or letters of administration comprises property which is settled or is the subject of or is required to pay a legacy, so much of the fees paid on the issue of the said grant as represents the fees on such settled property or legacy shall (unless the will contains an express provision to the contrary) be payable out of the settled property or legacy.
- 12. Every grant of probate or letters of administration made after the commencement of this Order shall bear a certificate in writing under the hand of the proper officer of the Court, stating the amount of the fee that has been paid, together with gross value of the estate and the deductions therefrom; and no such grant shall be issued until all the proper fees have been duly paid.
- 13. Where a further affidavit is sworn under Article 5 (2), and the Court is satisfied either that a larger fee should have been paid on the issue of a grant of probate or letters of administration than was paid, or that the fee paid was in excess of the proper amount, it may direct the applicant to pay such further fee as may be due, or may direct such sum to be repaid to the applicant as may seem just, and the certificate in writing under Article 12 shall be amended accordingly.
- 14. Where the Court has power to seal a grant of probate or letters of administration or confirmation issued by a Court of Probate in the United Kingdom, or in any British possession to which the Colonial Probates Act, 1892, for the time being extends, this power shall not be exercised unless an application is made to the Court for that purpose, accompanied by a statement similar to the affidavit required by Article 5 (1) of this Order, and the provisions of this Order shall apply, and fees shall be paid on such sealing, as if it were an application for and the issue of a grant of probate.
- 15. Article 106, Sub-Article 2 of the China and Corea Order in Council, 1904, is hereby repealed.

And the Right Honourable Sir Edward Grey, Baronet, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

Now therefore His Majesty by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the British Settlements Act, 1887, the Pacific Islanders Protection Acts, and the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- (1) This Order may be cited as the Pacific Order in Council, 1893, Amendment Order, 1908, and shall be read and construed as part of the Pacific Order in Council, 1893.
- (2) In Clause 108 of the Principal Order, the words "the expiration of one month from the commencement of such publication" shall be omitted, and the following words substituted, namely: "the date of such publication or from and after any date which may be specified in lieu thereof in any such regulations."
- (3) This Order shall come into force forthwith.

W HEREAS two-thirds of the Council of the county borough of Huddersfield on the fifteenth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eight, agreed to petition, and the Council of the said borough thereupon petitioned His Majesty for an alteration of the number and boundaries of the wards of the said borough;

And whereas His Majesty has been pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council and in pursuance and in exercise of the powers vested in His Majesty by "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882," to fix the number of wards into which the county borough of Huddersfield shall be divided, and to order and direct that the said borough shall thenceforth be divided into fifteen wards, which Order was made on the ninth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and eight;

And whereas on the twenty-ninth day of April, in the year last aforesaid, the Right Honourable Herbert John Gladstone, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did duly warrant and appoint me, Samuel Pope, Esquire, Barristerat-Law, a Commissioner, to prepare a scheme for

determining the boundaries of such wards and [ a point 33 yards south of its junction with Ballfor apportioning the Councillors; of the said borough among such wards.

Now I, the said Samuel Pope, in pursuance of the powers given me by virtue of the said appointment under the said Act, do hereby determine as hereinafter mentioned the boundaries of the said fifteen wards into which the said borough is divided, which wards are hereinafter named and numbered as follows (that is to say) :-

- 1. Longwood Ward. 2. Lindley Ward.

  - 3. Birkby Ward.
- 4. Fartown Ward.
- 5. Dalton, Bradley and Deighton Ward.
  - 6. Marsh Ward.
  - Paddock Ward.
  - 8. West Central Ward.9. North Central Ward.
  - 10. South Central Ward.
  - 11. Moldgreen Ward.
  - 12. Almondbury Ward.
  - 13. Newsome Ward.
  - 14. Crosland Moor, Ward.
  - 15. Lockwood Ward.

And where in the following descriptions of the ward boundaries (so far as such descriptions do not refer to the borough boundary) a street, road, footpath or fence is given as the boundary of a ward, the boundary is to be taken as the centre of such street, road, footpath or fence, and where any street or road is described as joining another street or road, the point of junction is to be taken as the point at which lines drawn along the centres of the two streets or roads, and continued, would intersect each other, and a point described as being opposite a street or road is to be taken as opposite the centre of the street or road.

And where a river or stream is given as the boundary of a ward, the boundary (except where it refers to the borough boundary) is to be taken as the medium filum of such river or stream.

And where reference is made to the borough boundary, the already determined boundary line of the borough is meant.

And in the event of any discrepancy between the the map and the description, the Ordnance Survey Map (2nd Edition, 1906-7) shall prevail.

#### No. 1.—Longwood Ward

#### No. 3.—Birkby Ward.

I do hereby determine that Birkby Ward shall comprise so much of the said borough as lies

within the following boundary:—

140 yards south-east of its junction with Jilley Royd-lane, proceeding thence along such boundary line in a south-westerly direction to the junction of the two-unnamed roads leading to Grimscar Foot at Reap Hirst, thence in a southerly direction along the road leading to Reap Hirstroad, thence along that road to its junction with Birkby-road, thence along that road to its junction with Brian-road, thence in an easterly direction along Birkby Hall-road to Birkby Lodge-road, thence in a south-easterly direction along that road to its junction with Blacker-road North, thence in an easterly direction along that road to the north corner of the cemetery, thence in a south-easterly direction by a public footpath to the east corner of the cemetery, thence in a north-easterly direction along an intended new road past St. John's Church to St. John'sroad, thence across that road, thence in a northeasterly and easterly direction along Willow-lane to its junction with Halifax Old-road, thence in a north-westerly direction along that road to its junction with Yew-street, thence in a northeasterly direction along that street, Spaines-road and Wasp Nest-road to its junction with Bradford-road North, thence in a northerly direction along that road to its junction with Harry-lane, and thence in a north-westerly direction along that lane and Lightridge-road to the point first above described.

#### No. 4.—Fartown Ward.

I do hereby determine that Fartown Ward shall comprise so much of the said borough as lies within the following boundary:—

Commencing at a point at the junction of Chestnut-street and the road leading to Fieldhouse, thence proceeding in a westerly direction along the said Chestnut-street to its junction with Sheepridge-road, thence in a south-westerly direction along that road to its junction with Ash Browroad, thence in a westerly and north-westerly direction along that road to its junction with Bradford-road North near the New Inn, thence in a southerly direction along that road to its junction with Wasp Nest-road, thence in a south-westerly direction along that road to its junction with Spaines-road, thence along that road to its junction with Yew-street, thence along that street to its junction with Halifax Old-road, thence in a south-easterly direction along Halifax Old-road to its junction with Bradford-road, thence across that road and along Willow-lane East and Hillhouse-road to Leedsroad, thence across that road and along Thistlestreet to St. Andrew's road, thence across that road and along Hebble Beck to its junction with the River Colne, thence in a north-easterly direction along the said river to a point where the proposed new road in continuance of Old Fieldhouse-lane will meet the said river, thence in a north-westerly direction along the said proposed new road, Old Fieldhouse lane and the road leading to Fieldhouse to the point first above described.

No. 5.—Dalton, Bradley and Deighton Ward.

#### No. 8.-West Central Ward.

! I do hereby determine that West Central Ward shall comprise so much of the said borough as

lies within the following boundary:--

Commencing at a point at the junction of Westparade and Upperhead-row, thence proceeding in a north-westerly direction along the said West-parade, Trinity-street and West-hill to its junction with Gledholt-road, thence in a southerly direction along the said road, Gledholt Bank and the east side of the Triangle at Paddock Foot to Longroyd-lane, thence in a south-westerly direction along the westerly side of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Viaduct to the River Colne, thence in an easterly direction along that river to Folly Hall, thence in a north-easterly direction along the said Folly Hall and Chapelhill to its junction with Buxton-road, thence in a westerly direction along South-parade to its junction with Manchester-street, thence across that street to its junction with Upperhead-row, thence in a northerly direction along the said Upperhead-row to the point first above described.

#### No. 9.—North Central Ward.

side of the said easterly boundary of that railway and the Huddersfield Railway Station, to a point in Westgate opposite the easterly boundary wall of the said station, thence in an easterly direction along Westgate to its junction with John Williamstreet, thence across that street, thence in an easterly and south-easterly direction along Kirkgate to its junction with Old Post Office-yard, thence along the south side of that yard to Castlegate, thence in a southerly direction along Castlegate to its junction with Dock-street, thence in an easterly direction along that street and an undefined straight line in continuation thereof and across the canal to the towing path, thence in a northerly direction along that path to Turnbridge-road, thence in an easterly direction along that road and an undefined straight line in continuation thereof to the River Colne, and thence in a northerly direction along that river to the point first above described.

#### No. 10.-South Central Ward.
