The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words following, that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for

England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Bobbing, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Bobbing is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend Henry George Hilton, of Usmington House, Hernes-road, Oxford, in the county of Oxford, Clerk in Holy Orders.

"And whereas the said Henry George Hilton is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Bobbing now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Archbishop of Canterbury.

" And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, now Archbishop of Canterbury, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Bobbing which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of the funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish of district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Bobbing.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Henry George Hilton (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the

consent of the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his archiepiscopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Bobbing now vested in him, the said Henry George Hilton, as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, and his successors in the same archbishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, and by his successors in the same archbishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other

Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forth-with registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the

consecrated church of Saint Thomas, situate at Longford, in the parish of Foleshill, in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Worcester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Foleshill, of the parish of Walsgraveon-Sowe, and of the parish of Exhall, both in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Foleshill, of the said parish of Walsgrave-on, Sowe, and of the said parish of Exhall should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas, situate at Longford as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Worcester, as such Bishop, with the consent of the Right Honourable Robert Threshie, Baron Loreburn, now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain acting on behalf of Your Majesty as the Patron as well of the vicarage of the said parish of Foleshill as of the vicarage of the said parish of Walsgrave-on-Sowe, and with the consent of the Right Honourable Jane, Dowager Countess of Aylesford, of Offchurch Bury, Leamington Spa, in the said county of Warwick, as the Patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Exhall (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Foleshill, the said parish of Walsgrave-on-Sowe, and the said parish of Exhall, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Thomas, situate at Longford as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Thomas,

Longford.'
"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet,

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Longford, comprising:-

"I. All that portion of the parish of Foleshill, in the county of Warwick and in the diocese of Worcester, which is bounded upon the east partly by the parish of Walsgrave-on-Sowe, and partly by the parish of Bulkington, upon the north-west by the parish of Exhall, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Exhall from the said parish of Foleshill crosses the middle of Bassford Bridge, which carries the road leading from Woodshires Green to Rowley's Green across the River Sowe, and extending thence first south-eastward and then in various directions along the middle of the River Sowe assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the for a distance of one mile and sixty-five chains or

thereabouts to the centre of Hall Green Bridge, which carries the road leading from Foleshill to Alderman's Green and Hawkesbury across the River Sowe, and extending thence first northeastward and then northward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to a point near Foleshill Mill and opposite to the middle of the footpath leading to the Wyken Colliery, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Foleshill from the said parish of Walsgrave-on-Sowe.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Walsgrave-on-Sowe which is bounded upon the north-east partly by the parish of Shilton, in the said county and diocese, and partly by the said parish of Bulkington, upon the northwest and upon the west by the above described portion of the said parish of Foleshill, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south and upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Foleshill from the said parish of Walsgrave-on-Sowe crosses the middle of the footpath leading from Foleshill Mill to Wyken Colliery, and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts to the point where such footpath crosses the middle of the Wyken Colliery branch line of the London and North Western Railway, and extending thence morth-eastward in a straight line (thereby crossing the Wyken arm of the Oxford Canal) for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from the Wyken Colliery into Lenton's-lane across the Oxford Canal, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such road for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lenton's-lane, and thence south-eastward along extending middle of Lenton's-lane for a distance of twelve chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern end of the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered I upon the map or plan annexed to this scheme, and extending thence first northward to and along the said fence and along the fences forming the eastern boundaries of the closes numbered 2 and 3 upon the said map or plan, and then first eastward and then northward along the fences forming the southern and eastern boundaries of the close numbered 4 upon the said map or plan for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Walsgrave-on-Sowe from the said parish of Foleshill.

"III. And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Exhall which is now included in the civil parish of Foleshili."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council; is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diecese of Worcester.

V HEREAS by section sixteen of Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by section eight of the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when"ever it shall appear to the Archbishop of
the Province, with respect to his own diocese,
and whenever it shall be represented to

"him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the "Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or " more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, "and of which the aggregate population shall " not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, " may, with advantage to the interests of religion, " be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop " of the province shall inquire into the circum-" stances of the case; and if on such inquiry it "shall appear to him that such union may be " usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient "extent, and that the patron or patrons of the "said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, "vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are "consenting thereto, such consent being signified " in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks " before certifying such inquiry and consent to " His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with "respect to his own diocese, a statement in " writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy "in writing of the aforesaid representation to be "affixed on or near the principal outer door of "the church, or in some public and conspicuous "place in each of such benefices, sinecure "rectories or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or "they may, within such six weeks, show cause "in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown "within such time, the said Archbishop shall "certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to "His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall " be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make "and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such " benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage "or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of " souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.'

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the first day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words following:—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify

to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Huyshe, Lord Bishop of Worcester as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Saint Helen with Saint Alban in the city of Worcester and the rectory of Saint Michael in Bedwardine in the same city having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed fifteen hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the said Lord Bishop of Worcester being the Patron or person entitled to present to the said rectory of Saint Helen with Saint Alban (if the same were now vacant) and also to the said rectory of Saint Michael in Bedwardine (the same being now vacant) has consented to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no sufficient cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of .Worcester, our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the said Lord Bishop as Patron of the said benefices and the copies of the representation and notices before

mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of Saint Helen with Saint Alban, situate in the city and diocese of Worcester, and the rectory of Saint Michael in Bedwardine, situate in the same city and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother "churches to which they belong, with great "advantage, and places altogether extra-paro" chial may in some instances with advantage be "annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Bishop, as "the case may be, may be advantageously "separated from any parish or mother church "and either be constituted a separate henefice

"by itself or be united to any other parish to " which it may be more conveniently annexed, or " to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, "place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, " so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or "that any extra-parochial place may with advan-"tage be annexed to any parish to which it is "contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish " for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Arch-"bishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in "writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be " transmitted to the said Archbishop for his con-"sideration), describing the mode in which it "appears to him that the alteration may best be " effected, and how the changes consequent on "such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical " jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, " and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and pay-" ments, and in respect to patronage and rights "to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under " his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop "may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, "on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied " with any such scheme, or modification thereof, " and shall certify the same and such consent as "aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in "Council to make an Order for carrying such "scheme, or modification thereof, as the case "may be, into effect; and such Order being registered in the registry of the diocese, " which the registrar is hereby required to do, " shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever including the Incumbent or Incumbents "of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, if he shall have consented thereto in writing under his or their hands, but if such "Incumbent or Incumbents shall not have so "consented thereto the Order shall not come "into operation until the next avoidance of the "benefice by the Incumbent objecting to the "alteration, or by the surviving Incumbent objecting, if more than one shall object thereto, "and in such case the Order shall forthwith, "after such avoidance, become binding on all persons whatsoever.'

And whereas the Right Reverend John Reginald, Lord Bishop of Rochester, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the eighteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eight, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I John Reginald by Divine permission Bishop of Rochester do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace.

"1. There is in the county of Kent and my diocese of Rochester the rectory of Reckenham the parish whereof lies adjoining to the ecclesiastical parish of Bromley and contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of eleven thousand seven hundred and fifty.

"2. The net annual value of the benefice of Beckenham arising from tithe rentcharge dividends from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and other sources is five hundred and ten pounds.

"archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice of such bishop, as the same county and diocese is the particular district of Saint Mary Shortlands which was constituted under the authority of an Instrument bearing date the third day of November one thousand eight hundred and

seventy under the common seal of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and under the hand and seal of the then Archbishop of Canterbury in whose diocese the said district was then situate. This district adjoins the said ecclesiastical parish of Bromley and contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of two thousand two hundred and six.

- "4. The net annual value of the benefice of Saint Mary Shortlands arising from trust fund surplice fees and pew rents is five hundred and twenty-five pounds.
- "5. In the same county and diocese is the rectory of Hayes the parish whereof adjoins the ecclesiastical parish of Bromley aforesaid and contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of eight hundred and thirty-eight.
- "6. The net annual value of the benefice of Hayes arising from tithe rentcharge surplice fees and dividends from Queen Anne's Bounty and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners is three hundred and twenty-eight pounds.
- "7. In the same county and diocese is the vicarage of Bromley the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of ten thousand five hundred and thirty-one.
- "8. The net annual value of the benefice of Bromley arising from tithe rentcharge glebe lands dividends from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners surplice fees and Easter offerings is four hundred and fifty pounds.
- "9. John Cator of Woodbastwick Hall in the county of Norfolk Esquire is the Patron of the said benefice of Beckenham, Esther Mabel Wilkinson of Seal in the county of Kent Spinster is the Patron of the said benefice of Saint Mary Shortlands, the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas Lord Archbishop of Canterbury is the Patron of the said benefice of Hayes, and I the Bishop aforesaid am Patron of the said benefice of Bromley.
- "11. The Reverend Canon Henry Arnott is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Beckenham the Reverend Canon Henry Francklyn Wolley is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Mary Shortlands the Reverend George Clowes is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Hayes and the Reverend Donald Tait is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Bromley.

"12. Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of said first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the several areas or districts of the ecclesiastical parish of Beckenham the particular district of Saint Mary Shortlands and the ecclesiastical parish of Hayes so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said ecclesiastical parish of Bromley and the mode in which it appears to me the alterations, may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the said Patrons and of the said Henry Arnott Henry Francklyn Wolley and Donald Tait the Incumbents other than the Incumbent of Hayes and in case you shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied therewith I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consent of the Patrons thereto to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

" SCHEME.

"1. It is proposed to separate a district from the ecclesiastical parish of Beckenham in the county of Kent and diocese of Rochester and unite such district for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining ecclesiastical parish of Bromley in the same county and diocese.

"3. It is also proposed to separate a district from the ecclesiastical parish of Hayes aforesaid and unite such district for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining ecclesiastical parish of Bromley aforesaid.

"That the said township contains a consecrated chapel and is distant at its nearest point from the parish church of Sedgefield aforesaid upwards of three miles or thereabouts and the population thereof is computed to be one hundred and forty persons, but no part of the population of the said township reside within a distance of four miles of the said Church.

"That the said township is near to the parish of the vicarage of Grindon in the said county and my diocese, and is distant at its furthest

point five miles or thereabouts from the parish church of Grindon aforesaid, and the inhabitants of the said township have usually resorted to the Minister and parish church of Grindon for practically all ecclesiastical purposes, marriages necessarily being solemnized at Sedgefield, and it will be beneficial for the said inhabitants to have the said township annexed to the said parish of Grindon for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the population of the parish of Sedgefield aforesaid (exclusive of the township of Embleton) according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one, amounts to two thousand one hundred and seventy persons, and the population of the parish of Grindon aforesaid according to the same census amounts to four

hundred and eighteen persons.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Sedgefield, not reckoning the house of residence as an item, is eight hundred and eighty pounds or thereabouts.

"That the patronage of the said rectory of Sedgefield is vested in me by virtue of my bishopric and the Reverend Edwin Price, Clerk, Master of Arts, is now the Rector thereof.

"That I as the Patron of the rectory and parish church of Sedgefield and the said Incumbent thereof are with the Patron and Incumbent of the said vicarage of Grindon, all consenting parties to the annexation and separation hereinafter proposed as is testified by our respective hands to the consent in writing hereto annexed.

HEREAS by the Finance Act, 1908, it is VV enacted that as from a date to be fixed by Order in Council under section six of that Act the power to levy the duties on Local Taxation licences to which that section applies shall be transferred in England and Wales to County

in game, and licences for dogs, killing game, guns, carriages (including duties charged under sub-section (1) of section eight of the Locomotives on Highways Act, 1896), armorial bearings and male servants:

And whereas it is further enacted that His Majesty may by Order in Council fix the date of the transfer under that section, and make any such further provisions as it appears necessary or expedient to make in order to give full effect to the transfer and may make provision for the furnishing by County Councils of returns to the Local Government Board as to the amounts levied under the power transferred by that section:

And whereas it is further enacted that the transfer under that section shall not affect any equitable adjustment respecting the distribution of the proceeds of the Local Taxation licences made under the Local Government Act, 1888, or otherwise, but that provision may be made by Order in Council under that section for any alteration which it appears necessary or expedient to make in consequence of the transfer in the procedure for making any payments, or otherwise giving effect to any such adjustment:

And whereas it is further enacted that subsections (3) (4) and (5) of section twenty of the Local Government Act, 1888, and any other provisions of that Act relating to the levy of the duties on local taxation licences by County Councils, shall, as respects the duties to which the said section six applies, have effect as if the power to levy those duties had been transferred under sub-section (3) of section twenty of that Act:

And whereas it is provided by sub-section (3) of section twenty of the Local Government Act, 1888, subject to certain limitations mentioned in sub-section (4) of that section, that His Majesty may from time to time by Order in Council made on the recommendation of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury (hereinafter referred to as "the Treasury") transfer to County Councils as from the date specified in the Order the power to levy the duties on all or any of the local taxation licences specified in the First Schedule to that Act, and that after such date every County Council and their officers shall (subject nevertheless to any exceptions and modifications contained in the Order) have within their county for the purpose of levying the duties transferred the same powers, duties and liabilities as the Commissioners of Inland Revenue and their officers have with respect to the duties transferred, and to the issue and cancellation of licences on which the duties are imposed, and other matters under the Acts relating to those duties and licences, and all enactments relating to those duties and licences and to punish-ments and penalties connected therewith shall apply accordingly.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in him by the said recited enactments, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that the transfer specified in sub-section (1) of section six of the Finance Act, 1908, shall take place as from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and that the transfer shall be subject to the exceptions and modifications hereinafter contained.

And His Majesty in further exercise of the powers vested in him by the said recited enactments, and in-order to give effect to the transfer under the said section, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to make the provisions hereinafter specified.

I. Subject to the exceptions and modifications hereinafter stated, every County Council shall have within its County all powers and duties now vested in the Commissioners of Inland Revenue for carrying into execution every enactment relating to the duties on the licences to which section six of the Finance Act. 1908, applies, and shall not in the exercise of their powers and duties under this Order be subject to the authority, direction or control of the Treasury.

II. The forms of licence now provided by the Commissioners of Inland Revenue in connexion with the duties on the licences to which section six of the Finance Act, 1908, applies, and the forms of certificate of exemption from duty in respect of dogs, and also the forms of declaration and notice required under the Revenue Act, 1869, shall, with the adaptations necessary to be made to meet the altered circumstances, continue to be used, unless and until the Treasury shall prescribe some other form of licence, certificate of exemption, declaration or notice, and thereafter the forms so prescribed shall be used.

HI. The Commissioners of Inland Revenue shall print and provide the forms of licences and also the forms of certificate of exemption from duty in respect of dogs and of any declaration, notice and book of account required by law in relation to any of such licences or certificates.

IV. No such licences shall be issued in England and Wales except by such Officers of the Post Office as are authorized by the Postmaster-General, who shall have regard to the requirements of sub-section 5 (a) of section twenty of the Local Government Act, 1888.

V. The Postmaster-General shall pay to the Council of each County the amount of the duties received by him in respect of the licences issued at Post Offices within the County at such convenient times as may be arranged by him with the Local Government Board, and shall from time to time certify to that Board the total amount of the duties collected in respect of each description of licence, and the amounts due to and paid by him to each County Council in respect of such licence duties. The Postmaster-General may, if he thinks fit, vary such certificate, but unless so varied his certificate shall be conclusive.

VI. The duty on any licence in respect of which an allowance and repayment is required to be made under the proviso to section twenty-three of the Revenue Act, 1869, shall be allowed and repaid by the Council of the County in which the further duty therein referred to is paid.

VII. Every County Council shall in each year make a return to the Local Government Board of the amount of any repayments of licence duty made by them in the preceding financial year and of the penalties (including any sum received where proceedings for recovery of a penalty have been stayed or compounded for) recovered in the preceding financial year in respect of the duties on the licences to which this Order applies; and the return shall be made at such times and in such form, and shall be verified in such manner as may be prescribed by that Board. o The Local Government Board shall annuallycertify the amount of the repayments so. made, and also the amount of the penalties received by the several County Councils in the last preceding financial year, which are to be carried to the same account as the duties on the licences, and may, if they think fit, vary such certificate, but unless so varied such certificate shall be conclusive.

any equitable adjustment, of the share of any county in the Estate Duty grant, the proceeds of the Local Taxation Licence Duties, and the sums which in pursuance of the Finance Act, 1907, are paid in lieu of those duties, and the Local Taxation (Customs and Excise) Duties, in respect of any financial year, it shall be found that the sum actually received in respect of that year by any County exceeds the share of that County, the amount of such excess shall be paid by the Council of that County to the Council of the County entitled to receive the same. The one half of the penalties imposed by the enactments relating to the duties upon licences for dogs which is, when recovered and enforced upon information of a police constable before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction in England and Wales, now payable to the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, shall be paid to the Council of the county in which the penalty is recovered, and shall be dealt with by the County Council as in the case of penalties recovered by the Council in relation to the duties upon the licences to which this Order applies.

XIII. in the county of (hereinafter called the Apprentice) of the first part, the Grimsby Fisherlads' Institute, a Company registered under the Companies Acts and limited by guarantee (hereinafter called the Guardians) of the second part, and

of in the county of Owners of Fishing Boats (hereinafter called the Master) of the third part. Witnesseth that the Master (which term shall include the Executors, Administrators and Assigns of the Master, if consistent with the context), the Guardians and the Apprentice hereby mutually covenant and agree to the terms, conditions and stipulations set out in the body and upon the back of this Indenture:—

- (1) The Apprentice binds himself Apprentice to the Master for the term of years from the date hereof, subject to a Probationary period of two months as hereinafter more particularly mentioned.
- (2) During such time the Apprentice will faithfully serve his Master and obey his lawful commands and keep his secrets and when requisite give to his Master true accounts of his goods and money which may in any way come into the hands of the Apprentice. The Apprentice will not during the said term do any damage to his Master nor will he consent to any such damage being done by others but will if possible prevent the same and give warning thereof and will not embezzle waste or otherwise wrongfully deal with the goods of his Master, nor frequent Taverns or Alehouses nor absent himself from his Master's service without leave.

- (3) The Master will during the said term of Apprenticeship use all proper means to teach the Apprentice or cause him to be taught the business of a Seaman and Fisherman and will provide the Apprentice with sufficient meat, drink, lodging, washing, medicine and medical and surgical assistance, sea bedding, wearing apparel and necessaries.
- (4) All wearing apparel provided by the Master for the use of the Apprentice shall during the said term remain the property of the Master, the Apprentice having full right to the use thereof at all times for his own sole use and wear, but he shall not acquire any right or title thereto for the purpose of selling, pledging or otherwise disposing of such apparel until the expiration of the apprenticeship when such apparel shall become the Apprentice's property.
- (5) The Master shall not during the said term pay to the Apprentice any money for the purpose of enabling him to obtain board and lodging for himself, but the Master will provide the Apprentice with suitable and sufficient board and lodging to the satisfaction of the Superintendent and of the Guardians or their Council or Agent. The Superintendent referred to throughout this Indenture shall mean the Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office, who for the time being may have cognisance of the matter upon the application of either party, or upon his own initiative or otherwise howsoever.
- (6) The Master will pay to or on account of the Apprentice the Remuneration specified on the back of this Indenture under the letter "A" at the times and in manner hereinafter or in such endorsement appearing. The Master shall pay into the hands of the Apprentice himself the daily or weekly sums specified on the back hereof under the letter "B." All further re-muneration to which the Apprentice shall become entitled whether as spending money perquisites or share of salvage shall be paid by the Master to the Superintendent to be forthwith paid by him into the Seamen's Savings Bank to the account of the Apprentice. Provided that if the Superintendent shall be of opinion that on account of misconduct or the state of the fund or for other sufficient reasons the Apprentice ought not to receive into his own hands any sums whatsoever, or that the sum ought to be reduced and shall in writing so inform the Master, the payments to the Apprentice or such part thereof as the Superintendent shall specify shall thereupon be discontinued for such period as the Superintendent may determine and the spending money or the balance if any remaining after paying the reduced amount to the Apprentice shall be paid by the Master to the Superintendent to be placed to the credit of the Account aforesaid. Subject to all necessary withdrawals by the Superintendent from the said Account in the Seamen's Savings Bank for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned and for the payment of any sum in the nature of a fine imposed upon the Apprentice by a Court of competent jurisdiction and for other special purposes which the Superintendent shall in his discretion think proper to allow, the amount standing to the credit of the said account shall there remain until the expiration or other sooner determination of the said term of apprenticeship, whereupon the balance standing to the credit of the said account after providing for all payments and deductions then proper to be made shall be paid or transferred to or to the credit of the Apprentice.
- (7) The Apprentice shall not be required to serve in any fishing boat in which the Master is

not during the continuance of such service himself serving as Skipper, Second hand or Seaman, or in which the Master if not so serving does not during the continuance of the Apprentice's service in such Fishing Boat possess an interest therein of at least Eight Sixty-fourths Shares. Provided that if, in the opinion of the Superintendent, it is desirable and the Apprentice consents it shall be lawful for such Apprentice to serve in some other Fishing Boat approved by the Superintendent for a period not exceeding two months.

(8) The Master will attend with the Apprentice before the Superintendent within twenty-eight days after the expiration of the Probationary period hereinbefore referred to or if they or either of them are or is at sea during that time then immediately on return to port. And if this Indenture is not then cancelled as hereinafter provided the Master or his Representative shall also attend with the Apprentice once at least in every year during the continuance of this Indenture before the Superintendent with a view to the investigation by him of questions affecting the remuneration or earnings and service of the Apprentice, and will give a full, true, and faithful account and report of such remuneration or earnings and of the character, conduct, and efficiency of the Apprentice. And in the event of any change of abode or of any gross misconduct on the part of the Apprentice or of any serious accident happening to him the Master will forthwith as soon as practicable give notice thereof to the Superintendent.

(9) The Master will allow the Apprentice twenty-eight days ashore in each year during the continuance of the said term of apprentice-ship at such time or times as the Master may determine and to the satisfaction of the Super-intendent seven days whereof at least shall be holiday for the purpose of visiting his relations or friends, unless in the opinion of the Super-intendent the Apprentice is not entitled to such holiday in any year by reason of misconduct.

(16) The Master covenants with the Guardians that he will not suffer the Apprentice to reside in any home which shall be provided by the Master without such home shall first have been approved by the Guardians or their Committee or Agent and also that the Guardians or any Members of their Committee or their Agent shall be entitled at all reasonable hours during the said term to enter and inspect the said home, and also to go on board of and inspect any fishing vessel on which the Apprentice may be and that the Master will during the said term permit the Guardians by their Committee to supervise the welfare and interests of the Apprentice and will permit the Apprentice to attend at the Fisherlads' Institute in Orwell-street, Grimsby, to receive instruction as hereinafter provided.

(11) The Apprentice covenants with the Guardians that he will each day on eighteen days at least during his time ashore in each year of the said term attend at the said Fisherlads' Institute during such hours as the Guardians by their Committee may from time to time appoint and receive instruction in the subjects or matters

as hereinafter mentioned.

(12) The Guardiaus covenant with the Apprentice that the Guardiaus will during such hours as he may attend at the said Fisherlads' Institute in pursuance of his covenant in that behalf hereinbefore contained cause him to be taught and instructed in all or any of the following subjects, or matters, viz., navigation, the making, fixing, and mending of fishing nets, general seamanship, and cooking. And further that the Guardians

will during the said term subject and without prejudice to the power and authority of the Superintendent act as Guardians in supervising the welfare and interests of the Apprentice.

(13) If the Apprentice shall be fined for any offence by a Justice or Justices of the Peace and such fine shall be paid by the Master, he shall subject to the consent of the Superintendent be entitled to deduct the amount of such fine from the spending money of the Apprentice.

(14) If during the Probationary period hereinbefore referred to or upon the first attendance of the Master and Apprentice before the Superintendent at the expiration thereof in pursuance of the covenant hereinbefore contained, the Superintendent is of opinion in all the circumstances of the case that it will not be desirable in the interest of the Apprentice to allow this Indenture to remain in force; or

If at any time during the continuance of the said term of Apprenticeship the Superintendent is of opinion that the Master is or will be unable within a reasonable period to provide the Apprentice with such service as is intended and permitted under this Indenture—
