## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirtynine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; aud the Act of the thirty-tirst and thirty-second years of Her said Jate Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteeu, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, in the words following, that is to say:-
"We, the Leclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Bobbing, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.
"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Bobbing is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend Henry George Hilton, of Usmington House, Hernes-road, Oxford, in the county of Oxford, Clerk in Holy Orders.
"And whereas the said Henry George Hilton is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of bobbing now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Archbishop of Canterbury.
" And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, now Archbishop of Canterbury, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereiubefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Raudall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, bas executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.
"And whereas tho transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Bobbing which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinaiter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more cligible for augmentation out of the funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Bobbing.
"Now therefore with the consent of the said Henry George Hilton (in testimony whereof he. has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the
