Naples, October 27. This day arrived here the Spanish Armada, consisting of 19 Men of War, several Fireships, and 20 Gallies, who are to Winter in this Port.

Leighorn, Novemb. 1. On the 30th of the last month the Count d'Elree arrived off of this place with 14 Men of War and 4 Fireships; and after having conferred with the French Consul residing here, who went on board him, he set sail again, taking his Course back towards Toulon.

Turin, Novemb. 8. His Royal Highness is so well recovered, that his Physicians conclude him now to be out of danger; but he still continues very weak. The late bad Weather has hindered the dispersion of the Army into Winter-quarters.

The Germans are to have theirs, as they had the last year, in the Territories of *Morferat*, *Mantua*, &c. except some Regiments of Horse, who are to remain with his Royal Highness's Forces in *Piedmont*, for the Security of the Country. The Regiment of *Montecuculi* passed through this City on the 3d instant, with that of *Palfi*, who are going to *Mantua*, and the Regiment of *Commercy* to *Parma*. The two Bavarian Regiments encamped two or three days before from this place, and on the 4th marched towards *Germany*; though they advance but slowly, for that they expect to be countermanded. The Spanish Forces are returned to the *Milanese*.

Peter Waradin, October 28. The Imperial Forces continue encamped near this place, to observe the Enemy, who lie still about *Belgrade*: But there being no prospect of any Action, and the Season obliging the Troops on both sides to go into their Winter-quarters, Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* has left the Army under the Command of the Duke de *Croy*, and is returned to *Vienna*. A strong Body of the Enemies Forces have passed the *Danube*, with Orders to supply *Timisoara*, and their other Garisons in *Upper Hungary*, with Provisions, and all other Necessaries for their Defence and Subsistence during the Winter; upon which, a Reinforcement has been sent to General *Viterani*, who commands on the frontiers of *Transylvania*, in order to oppose their Design. This day arrived here a Turkish Express, named *Mustapha Sipahi*, from *Belgrade*, with Letters from the Heer *Van Heemkerke*, Ambassador from the States General of the United Provinces, giving an Account of his having had Audience of the Grand Visier, and of the good disposition he found him in towards a Peace.

Vienna, Novemb. 12. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is now at his Government of *Raas*, where he arrived about the 3d of this month, but is expected here in few days. The Duke de *Croy* commands, in his absence, the Imperial Army in *Hungary*, which has begun to separate, and to march to their Quarters. The Turks have put a fresh Supply of Provisions into *Temeiswar*, and resolved to have done the like at *Gula* and *Tro*, whither they were marching, for that purpose, with a Body of about 16000 Men, and several Pieces of Cannon, commanded by the Seraskier and *Tockley*; but being informed that the Imperial Troops under General *Truchses* had joyned with General *Viterani*, and that they were moving towards them, they retired towards *Belgrade*, without succeeding in their Design. We understand by Letters from the Dutch Ambassador at *Belgrade*, of the 25th inst, That he has had Audience of the Visier, who received him very well, and shewed an inclination to a Peace; sending his Proposals by an Express to the Port, and desiring he would go with him to *Adrianople*. In the mean time, the Preparations for the War are made here with great application, and several Conferences have been held about settling the new Levies which the Emperor has resolved to make against the next Spring. The Auxiliary Troops of *Bavaria* and *Munster* are returning from *Hungary*, to serve on the *Rhine*, whither they will be followed by several Imperial Regiments. My Lord *Paget*, Ambassador from Their Majesties of Great Britain, intends to set out from hence next Monday on his Journey towards *Turkey*.

Francofort, Nov. 19. The French have put a more than usual number of Men into all their Garisons in *Alsace* and on the *Moselle*: Six Regiments are entered into *Strasbourg*, besides the ordinary Garison, and six more are expected there. They are at present very busy in making their Recruits, obliging every Village to furnish 2, 3, 4, and some 10 and 15 Men according to their bigness. The States of *Franconia* and *Suabia* are still assembled about settling the Winter-quarters. Yesterday passed through this City the Prince de *Commercy*, in his way from *Savoy* towards the Spanish Netherlands.

Cologne,

Cologne, Novemb. 21. The Sieur de Fintembourg is come hither to treat about Winter-quarters for some of the Musket Troops, which have been several days within 3 or 4 hours of this City. They were from Trier of the 14th instant, that a great quantity of Corn and Forage was brought down the Rivers Saar and Moselle from Lorraine for the Subsistence of the French Troops quartered in these Parts. Five Companies of the Regiment of Anhalt arrived here this day, to strengthen our Garrison. The Four Regiments of Saxe Jochs, who served this Campaign in Flanders, pulled the Rhine yesterday at Roerweren in their march homeward; as the Musket Troops designed to do this day.

Hamburg, Novemb. 21. We hear from Copenhagen, That Monsieur Hop, Envoy extraordinary from the States General was arrived there, and had had Audience of the King of Denmark. The last Letter from Poland being advice, That the Turks and Moldavians had raised the Siege of Sirocque, after having left above 2000 Men before that place, and that they were retired towards Budzick.

Paris, Novemb. 21. The Count d'Espre, who had been with the Squadron under his Command as far as Leghorn, returned on the 3d instant to Toulon: There is a Report that he is in a good way again, but 'tis not said whither. The French Gallies are come back to Marseilles, where they are ordered to be laid up. On the 16th instant Signior Cavallotti, the Pope's Nuncio, made his publick Entry here, and on the 18th had Audience of the French King, with the usual Ceremonies. The Letters from Pignerol of the 14th instant say, That the Duke of Savoy continued on the morning and was returned to Turin, where he had assisted at a Conference with General Caparra, and the other General Officers of the Army. We are told, That Monsieur Catinat had Orders to remain on the Frontiers of Piedmont till the end of this month, at which time he will return thither. We have Advice by Letters from some of our Kingdom of Navarre, That the Count-Dowager of England arrived there on the 7th of this month, and was received by the Marquis de la Paille. His Majesty to the King of Spain, who is appointed by his Cardinal-Minister, with an Aide de Camp Court, to attend and conduct her to the Territories of Portugal. Her Majesty intended to stay two or three days at Leon, and then to continue her Journey by Burgos, Laredo, Salamanca, Ciudad Rodrigo, and to Almodon, the first Town of Portugal to reach the Spanish Frontiers.

Brussels, Nov. 23. On the 6th instant at night Monsieur de Zimenes, Governor of Malines, after having furnished the little Town of Thour on the Sambre, with Provisions and other Necessaries, and with a Body of 8000 Men to wards Marchienne au Pont and Châtelet, designed to surprise those two Posts, thereby to strengthen the Garrison of Charleroy. The 18th part of our Garrison marched out towards Waterloo, to join with some other Troops detached from the Garrisons of Louvain, Malines, and other places thereabouts; and the French Army went from hence the same evening to command them. On the 19th they rendezvoused near Waterloo, and marched to Fraisis, and afterwards to Melle; from which last place Lieutenant General au Roy was detached with 10 Squadrons of Horse and 6 Battalions of Foot, who advanced towards Châtelet; but finding the Enemy had already fortified that Post, and left there 5000 Foot to defend it, he put 500 of his Men into Courtois, to Reinforce the Garrison; and having ordered several of the Enemy's Parties to retire, who had appeared near that place, he returned to Melle. Our Troops have demolished the Castle of Gosselers, and some other Castles near Charleroy, where the Enemy might otherwise have lodged themselves: They are now gone back to their several Garrisons, and the Earl of Artois returned thither yesterday. The Enemy continue to fortify Châtelet; but have not yet begun any Works at Marchienne au Pont. Here have been lately published new and very strict Orders against supplying the Enemy with any Horses out of these Provinces, or which they are said to be in much want, to Reinforce their Cavalry: The like is done in Holland, Leige, and the Neighbouring Countries. We hear, That the French King has commanded all the Towns of his New Conquests to raise and maintain Regiments at their own Charge: Liffe is to raise two; Mons V. Lincennes, Cambray, Namur, and other places, one each. The Prince de Chimay parted from hence the 19th instant for Spain, to assist the Birth of the Electoral Prince of Brabant.

Amsterdam, Nov. 25. The States of Holland separated yesterday with the next Month, having first resolved to lay an Embargo upon all Marching Ships and Vessels, during this Winter, except those which are now Laden and ready to Sail. The Baron de Bruggenorden is lately returned from the Court of Spain, where he was sent by the Elector of Bavaria, and will part from hence in few days for Breslaw. The States General have appointed a solemn Fast to be observed on the 8th of the next Month throughout these Provinces. The Dutch East-India Fleet which came in the sound, in number about 50 Sail, under the Command of three Men of War, one of 40, another of 24, and the Third of 18 Guns, was attacked on the 15th instant near the Doggerbank by four Danish Privateers, Commanded by Captain de Bore, two of them carrying 42 Guns, another 40, and the 4th between 30 and 40 Guns; They fought that day and the following with great obstinacy; The Enemy boarded three of the Ship of Captain Broecker Commandant of the Fleet, and

were as often beaten off with great loss; at the last Boarding 43 of the French entered him, who were all killed or drowned; but at the same time Captain Broecker was also killed; the Enemy likewise boarded another of the Dutch Men of War, Commanded by Capt. Hogenloë, and were beaten off again, but the smallest of them Commanded by du Pont was taken, after having made a very stout Defence. The other two Convoys are come into the Texel with about 70 Merchant Ships; We have an account of 11 or 12 that are taken; the rest are still missing. Our Fleet from Moscow consisting of 11 Sail, which came from Archangel on the 27th of September, under Convey of one Man of War, is lately arrived in the Texel.
