We, the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Court of Governors, Professors and Lecturers, Officers, Graduates and Students of the Victoria University of Manchester humbly crave leave to offer to Your Gracious Majesties, the expression of our devoted loyalty and dutiful attachment.

We recall with particular gratitude the foundation of our University by the Charter granted by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria who permitted her revered name to be associated with it, and that the independence enjoyed by the University under the new Charter granted by Your Majesty in 1903 has been accompanied by an extension of its size and influence and by an increased support from our City and the surround-

ing towns and counties.

We, the Board of Management of the Manchester Royal Infirmary, and the Members of the Honorary Medical Staff, on behalf of the Trustees and Subscribers, humbly approach Your Gracious Majesty gratefully to acknowledge the honour Your Majesty, and Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, have conferred upon us by Your Presence to-day, and to express our thanks for Your Royal recognition of our effort to provide an Infirmary adequate for the needs of the City and District for many years to come.

The Royal Infirmary, of which Your Majesty is the Patron, was founded in 1752; and after more than a century and a half of beneficent work, the growing needs of an ever-increasing population made it necessary to transfer its operations to this more extensive and salubrious

site.

The New Infirmary has been erected to accommodate 600 patients, but to meet existing requirements equipment has been provided for 483. The estimated cost, inclusive of a portion of the site, is £500,000, £400,000 of which have been provided by the sale of the Old Infirmary site to the Corporation of the City, the balance of £100,000 being raised by voluntary contributions. We have every reason to believe that the estimated cost will not be exceeded, and it is a great satisfaction to us to be able to announce that our resources are undiminished, and that our sole
