The following Address was presented to The King on the arrival of Their Majesties at Liver-pool on Wednesday, the 7th July, en route for Birmingham, for the opening of the new buildings of the University of Birmingham :---

Address of the Liverpool City Council. To Their Most Excellent Majesties The King and Queen.

May it please Your Majesty,

We, Your Majesties' loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of Liverpool humbly desire to offer to Your Majesties the assurance of our devotion to Your Majesty's assurance of our devotion to four Majesty's person and of our pleasure in welcoming Your Majesties to the City of Liverpool. We desire to express our gratitude for the presence of Your Majesty and of Her Majesty the Queen at the Review of the Territorial Forces of West Lancashire, and we rejoice to think that Your Majesty has thus honoured a Force which the Citizens of Liverpool have done all in their power Citizens of Liverpool have done all in their power to assist. We humbly pray that Your Majesty may be long spared to rule over us, and in company with Her Majesty the Queen, enjoy for many years the love and devotion of a loyal people.

We recollect with grateful satisfaction the previous occasions upon which Your Majesties have honoured Birmingham, and are deeply conscious of the encouragement which has been given from time to time to the progress of our City by the gracious recognition which Your Majesties and other Members of Your Royal House have been pleased to accord to many of our institutions.

Your Majesties are ever ready to encourage and to promote all that contributes to the welfare of humanity; and we, in this place, remember with peculiar delight Your consistent interest in the advancement of learning, and in the progress of the sciences and arts. These Buildings owe their existence to a like interest on the part of many of Your subjects, and it is our earnest desire to realise the intention of our founders and benefactors, and to send forth from our walls men and women well equipped to serve the cause of true education, and to further the material and intellectual well-being of their fellows, throughout Your Majesties' ancient Kingdom and British Dominions beyond the Seas.

Rather do we regard it as capable of indefinite expansion. "To you, gentlemen of the Staff, I have to say that I highly appreciate your disinterested and earnest labours on behalf of the University and the community, and I learn with pleasuro that you hold yourselves ready to expand your curriculum as experience may suggest.

"To you, the students, I say that the honour and dignity of this University are largely in your hands, and I look to you to initiate and hand down worthy traditions to your successors.

The following Address was presented to The King on the occasion of Their Majesties' visit to South Kensington, on Thursday, the 8th July, when His Majesty laid the first stone of the new buildings of the Imperial College of Science and Technology:—

May it please Your Majesties,

We, the Governors, Professors, Students, and Staff of the Imperial College of Science and Technology, desire to offer this humble expression of our gratitude for the gracious presence of Your Majesty and of Her Majesty The Queen at the ceremony of laying the first stone of our new buildings.

The Imperial College, founded under a Royal Charter granted by Your Majesty on the 8th of July, 1907, represents the latest, and as we trust, the most effective, development of the great movement towards Scientific and Technical Education which arose out of the Exhibition of 1851. Standing at South Kensington, in the midst of the imposing buildings which mark the progress of that education in its various branches, we cannot forget that it was to Your Majesty's Father, the illustrious Prince Consort, that the movement largely owed its original inspiration. At a time when small regard was generally paid to either scientific or artistic instruction, the wise foresight of His Royal Highness anticipated what is now universally recognised as one of the prime needs of our national life.

Of the institutions now comprised in the Imperial College, the Royal School of Mines was not entirely transferred from its original home in Jermyn-street until the year 1880. The Royal College of Science did not receive its title until 1890, having gradually gathered under one roof the scientific departments, such as those of Chemistry, Physics, Geology, and Biology, which had grown up round the Royal School of Mines with which it was then incorporated. In 1906, the new buildings in Imperial Institute-road, provided accommodation of the most improved kind for the study of Chemistry and Physics. Meanwhile, the Corporation and Livery Companies of the City of London had planned the Central Technical College, of which Your Majesty laid the first stone in the year 1881, for the study of Chemistry, and in particular, of Engineering. As the result of the Report of a Departmental Committee, instituted by the Board of Educa-tion in 1904, the three Colleges were welded into the new Imperial College, with the declared object of giving the highest specialised in-struction, and of providing for the most advanced training and research in the various branches of science, especially in its application to industry.

The further development which we trust will result in the rising of an important group of buildings in the neighbourhood of this stone, has been rendered possible in the first place by the Royal Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851, who have given the sites, by the liberal grants provided by the Government and the London County Council, and by the generosity of private donors, among whom the late Mr. Alfred Beit, other members of the firm of Wernher, Beit and Company, the Goldsmith's Company, and the Bessener Memorial Committee, have been conspicuous.

It is the earnest, and we believe well grounded hope of the Governors, that this Imperial College, thus honoured to-day by Your Majesty's countenance and approval, and by that of Her Majesty the Queen, may in the coming years justify its title by providing a principal centre of the most advanced teaching and research in science on its practical side, not only for the United Kingdom, but for the whole of Your Majesty's Dominions, and that it may stand second in dignity and character to no other kindred institution in the world.

"I thank you most heartily on behalf The Queen and Myself for the Address from the Governors, Professors, Students, and Staff of the Imperial College of Science and Technology. It is a great pleasure to Me to lay the foundation stone of your new buildings.

"The concentration of various associated Colleges into one Institution, which was effected by Our Order in Council of July, 1907, has always seemed to Me to be an admirable scheme for the furtherance of scientific instruction, which

My dear Father had so much at heart; and the names which appeared in the first list of the Members of the Governing Body were sufficient in themselves to give the College a very high status in the educational world.

"The purposes of the College, as stated in the Charter, are to give the highest specialised instruction and to provide the fullest equipment for advanced teaching and research in various branches of science, especially in its application to industry. In recent years the supreme importance of higher scientific education has, I am happy to say, been fully recognised in England; and as time goes on I feel more and more convinced that the prosperity, even the very safety and existence of our country depend on the quality of the scientific and technical training of those who are to guide and control our industries. The rapid growth of knowledge makes it necessary for the teacher of any branch of applied science to be a specialist of a high order, and the most accomplished specialist cannot impart the full advantage of his knowledge without that complete provision of apparatus for research and instruction which this College will supply.

"The College has already given admirable results, and we may well look for a steady increase in the number of students and in the efficiency of the instruction provided.

"The thanks of the country are due to those public-spirited donors through whose generosity a large portion of the funds have been provided for this great work, and I join in your appreciation of their munificence. I think it is especially fitting that the great discoveries of the late Sir Henry Bessemer, to which the remarkable development of the engineering industries in the last half-century is largely due, should be commemorated by the equipment of the new laboratories of this Institution.

"I pray that the blessing of God may attend the future of the College and the high destinies which I anticipate for its work."

The KING was pleased, on Thursday, the 22nd of July, at Buckingham Palace, to present to Arthur Eccleshall, an employee of the London and North-Western Railway Company; to George Henry Smith, of Woburn Sands, Bedfordshire; to James Kennedy Chapman and Thomas McCormack, both of Jarrow; and to James Vivian Reed, lately Second Mate of the steamship Afonwen, of Cardiff, the Albert Medals of the Second Class, which have been conferred upon them by His Majesty for gallantry in saving or endeavouring to save life, as detailed below:---

ARTHUR ECCLESHALL.

On the 2nd October, 1908, between 1 and 2 P.M., three children were making their way over the level crossing at Bushbury Railway Station, where Eccleshall was employed as a porter. A light engine was approaching at the time, travelling at about 10 miles an hour, and seeing that the children's lives were endangered Eccleshall shouted to them, when two of the children ran forward and got clear of the rails on which the engine was travelling, while the third, a little boy, tried to escape by running between the platform and the rails; the engine was almost upon him when Eccleshall jumped from the platform in front of the engine and lifted the child clear of the railway track. In so doing he was struck by the engine and thrown into the four-foot way, being rendered unconscious.

GEORGE HENRY SMITH.

On the 24th October, 1908, a workman at the Woburn Sands Brickworks, named Charles Griffin, was precipitated to the bottom of one of the kilns owing to the roof collapsing, and was imprisoned by hot ballast and bricks, the upper part of his body alone being free. His comrade Smith on hearing of the accident at once went to his rescue, but to effect an entry proved to be a work of some difficulty as the wicket through which the bricks were taken into and removed from the kiln was almost completely blocked. He succeeded, however, in reaching his comrade and in removing the bricks and ballast imprisoning the fallen man, who was eventually drawn up to the top of the kiln by means of a rope fastened under his armpits. Griffin subsequently died of the injuries he sustained.

JAMES KENNEDY CHAPMAN AND THOMAS MCCORMACK.

On the 27th November, 1908, workmen were engaged painting the inside of an iron tank in the stokehold of a steamer lying in dry dock at Jarrow.

Owing to the fact that very strong fumes were given off by the anti-corrosive paint or solution used the men were working in relays, each squad of three men being relieved after 10 or 15 minutes had elapsed.

A workman named Graham was overcome by the fumes, and the chargeman, Archibald Wilson, sacrificed his life in endeavouring to save Graham.

Thomas McCormack, who had already been affected by the fumes while at work in the tank, went to Wilson's assistance, but was himself rendered insensible, and was rescued by James Kennedy Chapman, Works Manager at the Dock. who, having pulled McCormack out. re-entered the tank and endeavoured to save Graham, but was himself overcome by the fumes.

The rescue of Chapman and Graham was eventually effected from the top of the tank.

JAMES VIVIAN REED.

On the occasion of the earthquake at Messina on the 28th December, 1908, the steamship Afonwen, of Cardiff, was lying at her moorings, having arrived at Messina on the 24th December.

The first intimation the Master of the ship (Captain William Owen) had of the disaster was on being awakened in the early morning of the 28th December by the noise of the upheaval and the commotion caused by the tidal wave, but owing to the darkness and the dense clouds of dust the full extent of the disaster could not be realised for some time. The danger to shipping claimed the first attention of the Captain, but having satisfied himself as to the safety of his vessel he proceeded ashore with his crew, as the dawn broke, to render assistance.

The particular act of gallantry in respect of which the Albert Medal has been awarded was performed when a building of five storeys was reached, where children were noticed at a great height from the ground crying for help. The interior of the building had for the most part collapsed, and one of the walls had disappeared; the structure was therefore in a very dangerous condition.

The Captain having given the word, Henry Smith, Able Seaman, and, shortly after, James Vivian Reed, Second Mate, swarmed up a rope to the rescue of the children, who had lowered string by means of which the rope was hauled up and made fast. The rescue of the children having been effected, three persons were lowered down from a story above.

Henry Smith, in pursuit of his calling, is away at sea and therefore was not able to attend at the Palace yesterday. His medal will be presented at a later date.

ESSEX (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1909.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Power to make Regulations.

1.-(1.) The Local Authority of any of the Districts specified in the Schedule to this Order may, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, make Regulations, with a view to the prevention of worrying of cattle (including sheep), for requiring that dogs or any class of dogs shall, during all or any of the hours between sunset and sunrise, be kept by the owners thereof under control in manner prescribed by the Regulations.

(2.) The Regulations may apply to the whole or any part of the District, and may exempt any class of dogs either generally or under prescribed conditions.

Confirmation of Regulations.

2.-(1.) Regulations made under this Order shall not take effect unless and until they have been submitted to and confirmed by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Unless the Board otherwise direct, the following provisions shall apply-

(i.) Notice of intention to apply for confirmation of any Regulations shall be given in one or more of the local newspapers circulating within the District in two successive issues two weeks at least before the making of the application.

- (ii.) For two weeks at least before an application, a copy of the Regulations proposed to be confirmed shall be kept at the office of the Local Authority of the District, and be open during office hours thereat to the inspection of ratepayers of the District without fee or reward.
- (iii.) The Clerk of the Local Authority shall on the application of any such ratepayer furnish him with a copy of the proposed Regulations on payment of sixpence.

(3.) A copy of any Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order, signed and certified by the Clerk of that Local Authority to be a true copy and to have been duly confirmed, shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, in all legal proceedings, of the due making, confirmation, and existence of the Regulations, without further or other proof.

Seizure of Dogs where Regulations are Contravened.

3. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against a Regulation made under this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals --Act, 1894--

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):---

Section forty-three (powers of police);

Section forty-four (powers of inspectors); and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or


