Address of the Camberwell Borough Council.

To Their Most Excellent Majesties The
King and Queen.

May it please Your Majesties,

Your Gracious Majesties' most dutiful and loyal subjects, being the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Metropolitan Borough of Camberwell in Council assembled, desire most loyally to welcome Your Majesties to the Borough upon the occasion of the laying of the Foundation Stone of the New King's College Hospital at Denmark Hill.

We humbly desire to thank Your Majesty for the unfailing consideration shewn for the welfare of Your Majesty's poorest subjects, and for Your gracious action in consenting to lay the foundation stone of a building which will be used to alleviate distress and pain and assist with medical comfort and aid the poor among the nearly three hundred thousand inhabitants of this Borough and of about one million persons beyond its borders.

And we will ever humbly pray that Your Majesty may long be spared to rule over a nation united by the strongest ties of loyalty, devotion, and affection to Your Royal Throne and Person.

Address of the King's College Hospital Removal Committee.

(Presented by the Hon. W. F. D. Smith, M.P.)

Address to His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen.

May it please Your Majesties,

I am privileged on behalf of the Removal Committee of King's College Hospital to offer our humble duty to Your Majesties, and to express our deep gratitude for the great honour which Your Majesties have conferred upon the hospital by your presence upon this occasion.

Six years ago the Committee of King's College Hospital were called upon to decide whether they would spend a large sum of money upon the old hospital in order to bring it up to modern requirements, or whether they would undertake the construction of a new hospital in South London, where a poor and populous district was sadly in need of hospital accommodation.

The Committee of "King Edward's Hospital Fund" were strongly in favour of a removal scheme, and after a full enquiry into the changed conditions of the population surrounding the old hospital, caused by the clearance of crowded and insanitary areas, and on account of the fact that numerous hospitals already existed in a comparatively small area north of the river, it was decided to adopt the policy of the Fund and to construct a new hospital in South London. This building when completed will give accommodation for 600 beds, and ample provision for all the special departments now necessary for the efficient working of every general hospital.

The site extends to over twelve acres, and in addition land on the south side, to the extent of more than thirty acres, has been acquired, partly by private liberality and partly by public funds, for a people's park, so that the hospital will for ever have the advantage of an adjoining open space larger than any enjoyed by similar institu-

tions in London.

The Committee of "King Edward's Hospital Fund" have given munificent donations, amounting in all to £27,000, to the Removal Fund, which has now reached a total of over £227,000. It is probable that the original estimate of the cost of removal will be somewhat exceeded, but the Committee have every hope that private generosity will provide them with sufficient funds to complete the building now undertaken, without trenching upon the capital sum realisable by the sale of the old hospital site and building, but which it is of vital importance to retain for future endowment.

As Your Majesties will have observed, the building of the out-patient, casualty, and some of the special departments is already far advanced, and it is hoped that in twelve months the whole of the building now contemplated will have been begun.

I now have the honour to request Your Majesty to lay the foundation stone of the new King's College Hospital, and in so doing to perpetuate the connection with Your Majesty's throne and family which our hospital by its style and title has the honour of commemorating.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

"I thank you most heartily on behalf of the Queen and Myself for your loyal Address, and for the cordial welcome you have offered to us.

"It gives Me great pleasure to come to-day to lay the foundation stone of the new building of the Hospital with which the Sovereign's name is connected and in whose past work I have taken so deep an interest. For many years taken so deep au interest. King's College Hospital has ministered to the necessities and alleviated the sufferings of thousands of My subjects in the centre of this crowded Metropolis. It was specially and crowded Metropolis. It was specially and closely associated with the great work of Lord Lister, who, in introducing the antiseptic methods in surgery rendered an inestimable benefit to England and to all mankind. I remember also that your hospital sent out some of the most distinguished of its staff to do generous work among the sick and wounded in the South African War. Your Committee's decision to abandon the whole building and to remove the scene of your labour to a poorer and more populous district, where the need for a hospital was great and the field for its work wider, was a bold step, but I believe it was a wise and right one, and I congratulate the medical and nursing staff on the great opportunity thus given them for increased usefulness. The generous response made to the Committee's appeal for funds shows how highly their decision has been appreciated by the public. I am glad that the fund associated with my name favoured the scheme in its inception and has given material assistance in carrying it out; and I am confident that other generous donors will come forward to supply the money needed to complete a spacious and well equipped building. I can conceive no worthier object for benevolence than this.

I assure you of My continued interest in your Hospital, and of the sympathy with which I shall watch its future progress. I cannot doubt that the blessing of Almighty God will attend the work to be done by it in its new home."

The following Address was presented to The King on Friday, July 23rd, on the occasion of Their Majesties' visit to the Royal National Orthopædic Hospital in Great Portland-street, for the opening of the new In-Patient Department of that Institution:—

May it please Your Majesties,

On behalf of the Committee and Governors of the Royal National Orthopædic Hospital we beg to tender our most heartfelt and respectful thanks for the appreciation of the work of this Charity which Your Majesties display in finding time to come here to-day for the purpose of formally opening our newly-completed buildings.

The sympathy of Your Majesties and all the Members of the Royal Family with every charitable and philanthropic endeavour is well known, and perhaps one of the most important features of it has been the establishment by Your Majesty of the King's Hospital Fund for the purpose of co-ordinating the work of the various special Hospitals and directing the flow of charity to the best advantage.

The Committee of Your Majesty's Hospital Fund, having realised that great economies of management might be effected by a policy of amalgamation amongst those special Hospitals carrying on similar work in London, urged the Committees of the old Royal, National and City Orthopædic Hospitals to amalgamate their funds

and build a Central Institution.

This building, which Your Majesties are now about to open, and which has been constructed on the most approved lines of modern medical and sanitary science is the first realisation of this policy of concentration.

The Hospital provides for 200 In-patients, most of whom are children suffering from malformations, which can be cured in the early stages, but which, if not taken in time, will

render them cripples for life.

In addition to the Hospital itself we have, across the road, a Nurses' Home and an Outpatients Department, where last year over 11,000 cases were treated, and where we have now installed a special gymnasium for orthopædic

The cost of these buildings has amounted to about £75,000, £20,000 of which is still required. This matter is the more urgent as we have over 400 patients now waiting for admission.

The Committee remember with gratitude the kindly interest of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria who, for many years, gave Her Patronage to the Royal Orthopædic Hospital and granted a Royal Charter in 1864, while Your Majesty's own name was enrolled as a Life Governor as far back as 1850.

It is a great satisfaction and encouragement to all connected with this Institution that Your Majesty renewed the Royal Charter, in 1905, in favour of the Amalgamated Hospitals, and that the names of Your Majesties are at the head of the list of the Hospital's supporters as Patron and Patroness.

May we again express to Your Majesties our humble and most grateful thanks for the honour of Your visit here to-day, which we are confident will ensure the future prosperity of the Hospital, and the continuance and increase of its work among the poor.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:-

"I thank you most sincerely on behalf of the Queen and Myself for the loyal expression of your appreciation of Our presence here to-day. I responded with much pleasure to your invitation to lay the foundation stone of the new buildings of the amalgamated Hospitals, in one of which My Beloved Mother, Queen Victoria, so long took a lively interest, and with which I Myself was associated for upwards of 50 years. The Queen wishes me to say that She takes a special interest in your work among crippled children, and She is glad of this opportunity of showing Her deep sympathy with your efforts to alleviate their lot.

"I rejoice to think that those who control the funds subscribed for the Hospitals of London are alive to the advantages of concentration. There can be no more striking example of the

valuable services performed by the Committee of the Hospital Fund which bears My name than this amalgamation into one of three special Hospi-Not only is money, which otherwise would have been spent on the upkeep of separate institutions, set free for the definite achievement of the objects for which the institutions exist, but the wider experience gained by collecting all the cases in one building is likely to be productive of valuable results in treatment.

"I trust that you will speedily be relieved of any anxiety in the matter of funds. You tell Me while your Hospital provides for 200 In-patients, more than 400 are now waiting for admission, and you point out most truly that early treatment is often the only means of rescue from a life of suffering and helplessness. I am sure there is no lack of generosity among those who are able to contribute to the support of such an institution as this, and that your pressing needs merely require to be brought home to the imagination of those who would be glad to give, did they but realise the urgent necessity for help. The cause of helpless little children makes a special call on the sympathy of all, and no words of Mine are required to commend the claims of an institution whose object is to restore suffering children to health and to enable them to live as useful citizens.

"It was with great pleasure that I renewed the Royal Charter on the amalgamation of the Hospitals, and I can assure you that the Queen and I will always take the warmest interest in the beneficent work of this institution, of which we are most happy to be patrons.'

WILD BIRD (ENGLAND).

The Wild Birds Protection (County of Norfolk) Order, 1909.

Dated 30th July, 1909.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1908, and upon application by the County Council of the Administrative County of Norfolk, I hereby make the following Order:-

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (County of Norfolk) Order, 1909."

BIRDS.

Close Time extended.

II. The period during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall be extended throughout the County of Norfolk, so as to be between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of September in any year, so far as regards all Birds mentioned in the schedule to that Act, or added thereto by Clause III of this Order, except Woodcock, the close time for which shall be extended so as to be between the 1st day of February and the 13th day of August in any year, and Snipe, Teal and all species of Wild Duck, the close time for which will remain as fixed by the Act of 1880, namely, between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of August in any year.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

III. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the county of Norfolk to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the schedule to the Act:

Great Bustard, Crossbill, Sand Martin, Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant).

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

IV. During the period between the 31st day of August in any year and the 2nd day of March following the killing or taking of the Bittern, Little Bittern, Great Bustard, Goldfinch, Kingfisher, Owl (all species), and Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant), is prohibited throughout the County of Norfolk.

All Birds protected on Sundays in certain Areas.

V. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Act of 1880, and by Clause II of this Order, does not extend, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited within the areas described in Article VI, paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of this Order.

Eggs.

All Eggs protected in certain Areas.

VI. The taking or destroying of the eggs of any species of Wild Birds is prohibited during the

period expiring on the last day of February, 1915, within the following areas:—

- (a.) Hickling Broad, Whitesley and Heigham Sounds, Blackfleet Broad, Horsey Mere, Martham and Somerton Broads, and the rands, skirts, and walls thereof, and fens and reed grounds appertaining thereto respectively, and the islands therein, and the dykes communicating therewith, including the Hundred Stream or Thurne River and ancient bed, and the rands and walls thereof from Heigham Bridge to the sea at Winterton, and all the marshes and low-lying and uncultivated lands, fens, reed grounds, warrens, marram or sand hills and sea shore, to the line of highwater mark, in the several parishes of Waxham, Horsey, Potter Heigham, and Hickling, and such part of the parish of Catfield as lies to the east of the Midland and Great Northern Joint Railway.
- (b.) The warrens, marram or sand hills and sea shore, to the line of high-water mark, in the parish of Winterton.
- (c.) Such parts of the Rivers Yare and Wensum as are within the Administrative County of Norfolk, and the streams communicating therewith; the River Bure and the streams communicating therewith; and Rockland and Surlingham Broads and the rands, skirts, and walls of each such river and broad, and fens and reed grounds appertaining thereto respectively, and the islands therein, and the dykes communicating therewith.
- (d.) The series of Broads known as Ormesby, Rollesby, Hemsby, Filby, and Burgh Broads, and the rands, skirts, and walls thereof, and the dykes communicating therewith, and the fens, reed grounds, and low-lying lands, marshes, and pastures adjacent thereto, including Lady Broad or Hard Fen Water, in the parish of Filby, Brandyke Broad, in the parish of Burgh St. Margaret, and Muckfleet Dyke, and the marshes and low-lying lands and pastures near or adjacent thereto respectively.
- (e.) The whole of the foreshore of the County of Norfolk, including the shingle, sand hills, salt marshes, creeks, and other unenclosed lands extending from high-water mark to the first boundary of enclosed or cultivated land separating the foreshore from them.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the County.

VII. The taking or destroying of the eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County of Norfolk:—Bittern, Little Bittern, Great Bustard, Crossbill, Stone Curlew (Norfolk Plover, Thick-Knee), Great Crested Grebe or Loon, Kingfisher, Sand Martin, Owl (all species), Oyster Catcher (Sea Pie), Ringed Plover (Ringed Dotterel, Stone Runner), Ruff or Reeve, Terns, Sea Swallows, Pearls, or Dip Ears (all species), Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant), Wild Duck and Teal (all species), Woodcock.

Repeal of former Order.

VIII. The Order of the 9th September, 1907, is hereby repealed.

ByE-Laws for the Regulation of the Registration of River Craft within the Port of London.

The Port of London Authority, in exercise of the powers and authorities vested in them by the Port of London Act, 1908, the Watermen's and Lightermen's Amendment Act, 1859, and the Thames Watermen's and Lightermen's Act, 1893,

do make the following bye-laws, that is to say:

1. The bye-laws of the Company of Watermen and Lightermen of the River Thames, made on the 1st day of November, 1893, and approved by the Conservators of the River Thames on the 27th day of November, 1893, except those numbered 42, 47, 103, and 106 are hereby repealed.

2. These bye-laws may be cited as "The Port of London (Registration of River Craft) Byelaws, 1909," and shall come into operation the day after the same are confirmed by the Board of Trade.

3. In these bye-laws the words and expressions hereinafter mentioned shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them respectively unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such meanings:

The expression "the Port Authority" means

the Port of London Authority.

The expression "the limits of the Port of London" means the limits of the Port of London as defined in the Port of London

The expression "river craft" means river craft as defined in the Port of London Act,

The word "tug" means and includes any vessel propelled by steam, electricity, or other mechanical power used for the purpose of towing ships, lighters, barges, or other like craft for carrying goods, wares, or merchandises, or rafts, or floats of timber.

The expression "canal barge" means a lighter or barge having a beam not exceeding 14 feet 9 inches, and principally employed in trading on canals communicating with the

River Thames.

The expression "canal boat" means a lighter or barge having a beam not exceeding 7 feet, and principally employed in trading on canals communicating with the River Thames.

The word "tonnage" means tonnage by measurement, ascertained according to the rules given in the Third Schedule of the Thames Watermen's and Lightermen's Act, 1893, when applied to vessels not registered under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and when applied to vessels so registered means the registered tonnage appearing in the register of such vessel.

4. Every person shall on applying to the Port Authority for the registration or for the renewal of the registration of a tug, lighter, barge, canal barge or canal boat respectively pay to the Port Authority the sum specified in this bye-law, that

is to say:

For every tug, five pounds. For every lighter, barge, and other like craft for carrying goods, wares or merchan-dises other than a canal barge or canal boat, a sum equal to eight pence for every ton of the tonnage thereof.

For every canal barge, ten shillings. For every canal boat, five shillings.

5. The following fees shall, in addition to the sums specified in Bye-law 4, be paid to the Port Authority by the owners of river craft,

For a duplicate of any certificate lost or

destroyed, the sum of five shillings.

For registering the address of a permanent hirer of any one river craft, the sum of one shilling.

No lighter, barge, or other like craft used for carrying goods, wares, or merchandises registered under the provisions of the Thames Watermen's and Lightermen's Act, 1893, shall be worked or navigated within the limits of the Port of London unless there be painted thereon the name of such lighter, barge, or other like craft, and the name or names of the owner or owners thereof, and his or their number and engraved thereon the tonnage of such lighter, barge, or other like craft to the nearest quarter of a ton of such tonnage, and the number of such lighter, barge, or other like craft in manner following, that is to say

The name of such lighter, barge, or other like craft, and the name or names of the owner thereof, and his or their number shall be painted white on a black ground in capital letters not less than three inches long and proportionately broad, and figures not less than six inches long and proportionately broad on the bows of lighters, and on the hudds boards or sterns of

barges and other like craft.

The tonnage of such lighter, barge or other like craft and the numbers thereof shall be engraved on one of the beams in letters and figures not less than four inches long and proportionately broad.

7. Any person committing an offence against these bye-laws shall, for every such offence, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

Any person desirous of making any objection to or representation respecting such proposed bye-laws may do so in writing or otherwise on or before Friday, the tenth day of September, 1909, by sending the same to, or leaving, or making the same at the office of the said Port of London Authority (River Department), Victoria Embankment, E.C.
