

Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Dinas, in the county of Pembroke and in the diocese of Saint David's.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Dinas is vested in Sir Marteine Owen Mowbray Lloyd, of Bronwydd, in the county of Cardigan, Baronet, as equitable tenant for life with remainder to his first and every other son successively in tail male with divers remainders over, and the said Marteine Owen Mowbray Lloyd is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant.

"And whereas the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Dinas does or may form part of the hereditaments which under an Indenture, bearing date the second day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, are charged by way of mortgage to secure the payment of a certain sum of money to Arthur Ernest Brooke Hunt, of Merton Grange, Slough, in the county of Buckingham, Esquire, the Honourable Cecil Reginald John Manners, commonly called Lord Cecil Reginald John Manners, of Number 8, Hanover-square, in the city of Westminster, and Edmond Leveson Calverley, of Government office, Bloemfontein, in the Orange River Colony, a Major in Your Majesty's Army.

"And whereas the said Marteine Owen Mowbray Lloyd is desirous (with the concurrence of the said Arthur Ernest Brooke Hunt, Cecil Reginald John Manners and Edmond Leveson Calverley) that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Dinas should be transferred in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed freed and absolutely discharged from the said mortgage, debt or charge.

"And whereas the Right Reverend John, now Bishop of Saint David's, in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinafore mentioned Act recited, or by some or one of them, is made necessary has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Dinas, which is hereinafore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the

cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Dinas.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Marteine Owen Mowbray Lloyd being the person whose consent as patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the first and second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six (in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said John, Bishop of Saint David's (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), with the consent of the said Arthur Ernest Brooke Hunt, Cecil Reginald John Manners and Edmond Leveson Calverley (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the persons to whom together with the said Marteine Owen Mowbray Lloyd it is hereinafter recommended and proposed that the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage shall be transferred, that is to say, with the consent of Dame Katherine Helena Lloyd, wife of the said Marteine Owen Mowbray Lloyd; Peverel de Lormet Lloyd, of Bronwydd, in the said county of Cardigan, Spinster; Frederick Edward Withington, of Danebury, Nether Wallop, in the county of Southampton, Esquire; and Nesta Constance Muriel Withington, his wife (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Dinas, freed and absolutely discharged from the payment of the principal sum of money and all interest due or to become due under the said Indenture of the second day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, shall be transferred to and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Marteine Owen Mowbray Lloyd, Katherine Helena Lloyd, Peverel de Lormet Lloyd, Frederick Edward Withington and Nesta Constance Muriel Withington, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint David's.
