The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated September 5th, from His Majesty's Representative at Brussels, in which is transmitted a copy of the following decree which appeared in the "Moniteur Belge" of the same date imposing restrictions on arrivals in Belgian ports from the Netherlands:—
