WHEREAS by an Order in Council bearing date the twenty-ninth day of January, one thousand nine hundred, and known as "The North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1900," as amended by an Order in Council bearing date the second day of November, one thousand nine hundred and seven, and known as "The North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1907," it was, amongst other things, provided that certain powers in relation to the territory of North Eastern Rhodesia should be exercised by the Governor or other Officer for the time being administering the Government of the Nyasaland Protectorate:

And whereas it is desirable to transfer the said powers to the High Commissioner for South Africa and to amend the said Orders in Council accordingly:

Now therefore His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty

vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the North-Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1909.

2. Article three of the North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1900, as amended by the North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1907, shall be and is hereby further amended:

(1) by the deletion therefrom of the definition of the term "Governor" and the substitution in place thereof of the following definition: "High Commissioner" means His Majesty's High Commissioner for the time being for South Africa:

(2) by the deletion therefrom of the definition of the term "Military Police Forces" and the substitution in place thereof of the following definition: "Military Police Forces" includes all military volunteer and police forces from time to time raised and constituted in North Eastern Rhodesia and appointed by Regulation or Proclamation to be under the control or authority of the High Commissioner.

3. Wherever in the North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1900, as amended by the North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1907, or in any other Order in Council or in any laws proclamations rules or regulations relating to North Eastern Rhodesia the term "Governor" or "Governor of Nyasaland" is used the term "High Commissioner" shall be read in place thereof: and wherever in the said instruments the term "Queen's Regulation" or "Queen's

Regulations" is used the term "High Commissioner's Proclamation" shall be read in place thereof.

4. Article seventeen of the North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1900, shall be and is hereby amended by the substitution of the word "Proclamation" for the word "regulations" wherever the same occurs in the first paragraph of the said article.

5. Article nineteen of the North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1900, shall be and is hereby amended by the insertion of the words "or Proclamation" after the word "regulation" wherever the same occurs in the second paragraph of the said article.

6. Articles thirty-five thirty-nine and fifty of the North Eastern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1900, shall be and are hereby amended by the insertion therein of the words "or Proclamation" after the word "regulation" wherever the same occurs in the said articles.

7. This Order shall be published in the North Eastern Rhodesia Government Gazette and shall take effect from the date of such publication.

WHEREAS the Order of Her late Majesty in Council, dated the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, has been amended by the Order of Her late Majesty in Council, dated the thirtieth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend such Order:

Now therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Bechuanaland Protectorate and Southern Rhodesia Amending Order in Council, 1909.

2. The fifth section of the said Order in Council, dated the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, as amended by the said Order in Council, dated the thirtieth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, shall be and is hereby revoked, but without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder.

3. In lieu of the section so revoked the following section shall be taken to be part of the said Order in Council of the ninth day of

May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and shall be read as the fifth section thereof.

"5. Every Proclamation of the High Commissioner shall be published in the Gazette, and shall from and after the date of such publication, or from and after such other date as may be mentioned in such Proclamation and thereafter until disallowed by His Majesty or repealed or modified by any subsequent Proclamation, have effect as if contained in this Order."

4. No Proclamation issued before the date of the commencement of this Order by the High Commissioner for South Africa, under or by virtue of the powers conferred by the said Order in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, shall be deemed to be invalid by reason only of the omission therefrom of any express provision as to the date of the taking effect, thereof, but any Proclamation so issued shall, unless it is otherwise expressly provided, be deemed to have taken effect from the date of the publication thereof in the Cape of Good Hope Government Gazette, or in the Official Gazette of the High Commissioner for South Africa, as the case may be.

5. This Order shall be published in the Official Gazette of the High Commissioner for South Africa, and shall thereupon commence and come into operation, and the High Commissioner shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places, and in such manner, and for such time or times as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto within the limits of the said Order in Council of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

6. His Majesty may from time to time revoke, alter, add to, or amend this Order.

WHEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop; as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church

"and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Huyshe, Lord Bishop of Worcester, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the thirteenth of May, one thousand nine hundred and nine, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, Huyshe, Bishop of Worcester, beg leave to represent to your Grace that the parish of Arrow, in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester, has belonging to and forming part of it a hamlet, place, or district known by the name of Oversley, the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined, and that the said hamlet adjoins the parish of Alcester, in the same county and diocese, which comprises a chapelry known by the name of Weethley, the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined, and which said chapelry adjoins the parish of Arrow.

"That the said chapelry of Weethley formerly belonged to the parish of Kinwarton, in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester, from which it was separated and annexed to Alcester by an Order in Council, dated the ninth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

"That the parish of Arrow and the hamlet of Oversley contain respectively two thousand four hundred and thirty-five acres and one thousand five hundred acres or thereabouts, and a population of three hundred and seventeen and one hundred and sixty-four respectively.

"That the parish of Alcester and the chapelry of Weethley contain respectively one thousand six hundred acres and five hundred and fifty acres or thereabouts, and a population of two thousand three hundred and three and twenty-eight respectively.

"That the hamlet of Oversley is much nearer by road to Alcester than to Arrow, and the

parishioners of Arrow residing there have to pass through the town of Alcester to attend their parish church a distance of a mile and a half.

"That the church of the chapelry of Weethley is distant about three miles from the town of Alcester and about two miles from the church of Arrow.

"That the churchyard of the parish of Arrow is nearly full and the obligation as to burials from the workhouse situate in the hamlet of Oversley would under the hereinafter proposed changes be transferred to the parish of Alcester wherein a large cemetery has lately been opened.

"That the apportioned rent-charge payable in lieu of tithes of the lands within the said hamlet of Oversley amounts to one hundred and forty-nine pounds and twelve shillings, and that the amount of such tithe rent-charge payable for the year preceding November last after deducting the rates thereon was ninety-four pounds.

"That there is no glebe land within the said hamlet.

"That the net annual value of the rectory of Arrow excluding the said rent-charge upon lands in Oversley amounts to about three hundred and seventy pounds.

"That the apportioned rent-charge payable in lieu of tithes of the lands within the said chapelry of Weethley amounts to one hundred and two pounds, and that the amount of such rent-charge payable for the year preceding November last after deducting the rates thereon was sixty-four pounds.

"That there is no glebe land within the said chapelry.

"That the net annual value of the rectory of Alcester excluding the said rent-charge upon lands in Weethley amounts to about one hundred and ninety-four pounds.

"That it does not appear that any inhabitants of the said hamlet of Oversley have any right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the parish church of Arrow, nor does it appear that any of the inhabitants of the said chapelry of Weethley have any such right to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the parish church of Alcester.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament called 'The Pluralities Acts,' the said hamlet of Oversley may be advantageously separated from the parish of Arrow and be annexed to the parish of Alcester for ecclesiastical purposes, and that the said chapelry of Weethley may be advantageously separated from the parish of Alcester and be annexed to the parish of Arrow for the like purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the Act, first and second Victoria, chapter one hundred and six, I have drawn up in writing a scheme appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of

the Patron of the benefices of the said parishes and of the Incumbents of such benefices to the intent that your Grace may if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows :—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the hamlet or district of Oversley from the parish of Arrow to which it belongs, and to annex it to the parish of Alcester to which it is contiguous for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the Rector of Alcester shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said hamlet or district.

"That all the tithe rent-charges of and belonging to the said rectory of Arrow arising or payable for or in respect of the lands within the said hamlet of Oversley shall henceforth belong and be attached to the said rectory of Alcester, and shall belong to and be held received and enjoyed by the Rector thereof for the time being for ever.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said hamlet or district in the church of the said parish of Alcester, and that the fees for all such offices and all such other ecclesiastical dues, offerings, and emoluments usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice as shall arise or become payable within or in respect of the said hamlet or district shall belong to the Incumbent of the said parish of Alcester.

"That the inhabitants of each of the said districts of the said hamlet of Oversley and the said chapelry of Weethley shall be entitled to accommodation in the church of the parish to which each shall respectively be annexed and in common with the parishioners of that parish and shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the church of the parish from which it shall be separated except nevertheless any person or persons, if any, possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the last-mentioned church and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"It is proposed to separate the chapelry of Weethley from the parish of Alcester to which it belongs and to annex it to the parish of Arrow, to which it is contiguous, for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the Rector of Arrow shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said chapelry.

"That all the tithe rent charges of and belonging to the said rectory of Alcester arising or payable for or in respect of the lands within the said chapelry of Weethley shall henceforth belong and be attached to the said rectory of Arrow and shall belong to and be held, received and enjoyed by the Rector thereof for the time being for ever.

"That the fees for all offices performed within the said chapelry of Weethley and all ecclesiastical dues, offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said chapelry and usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Rector of Arrow.

"CONSENTS.

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I, the Most Honourable Hugh de Grey, Marquis of Hertford, the Patron of or person entitled to present to the rectories of Alcester and Arrow, and we, Thomas Jackson Chapman, B.A., Rector of Alcester, and John Columbine Paterson Morgan, B.A., Rector of Arrow, do hereby signify our consents to the foregoing scheme and to every matter and thing therein contained.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his report, dated the fifth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and nine, which said report is in the words and figures following :—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council that the Right Reverend Huyshe, Lord Bishop of Worcester, has represented unto Us (amongst other things)

"That the parish of Arrow, in the county of Warwick and his diocese of Worcester, has belonging to it and forming part of it a hamlet, place or district known by the name of Oversley, and that the said hamlet adjoins the parish of Alcester, in the same county and diocese, which comprises a chapelry known by the name of Weethley and which said chapelry adjoins the parish of Arrow.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the Pluralities Act, 1888, the hamlet of Oversley may be advantageously separated from the parish of Arrow and be annexed to the parish of Alcester for ecclesiastical purposes only, and that the chapelry of Weethley may be advantageously separated from the parish of Alcester and be annexed to the parish of Arrow for the like purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme, together with the consents thereto in writing of the Most Honourable Hugh de Grey, Marquis of Hertford, the Patron or person entitled to present to the rectories of Alcester and Arrow, the Reverend Thomas Jackson Chapman, B.A., the Rector of Alcester, and the Reverend John Columbine Paterson Morgan, B.A., the Rector of Arrow, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

And whereas the Right Reverend Norman Dumenil John, Lord Bishop of Newcastle, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the twenty-seventh August, one thousand nine hundred and nine, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, as follows:—

"We, the Right Reverend Norman Dumenil John, by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Newcastle, do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of an Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle the vicarage of Eglington, the parish whereof contains, according to the last census, a population of one thousand two hundred and sixty-four.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Eglington is at present seven hundred and ten pounds.

"The patronage of the said vicarage is vested in the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Newcastle and the Reverend Abraham Gooderham is the present vicar thereof.

"2. There is in the same county and diocese the rectory of Ingram the parish whereof contains according to the last census a population of one hundred and fifty seven.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Ingram is three hundred and thirty-five pounds.

"The patronage of the said rectory is vested in the Reverend James Allgood and the Reverend Roland Frederick Allgood is the present rector thereof.

"3. It appears to us that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, and of another Act passed in the second and third years of the same reign chapter 49 the following alteration in the contents and boundaries of the above mentioned parishes may advantageously be made namely:—

"The separation of portions of the parish of Eglington known as the townships or civil parishes of Brandon and Branton and more particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed from that parish and the annexation of the same to the parish of Ingram.

"Such alteration as aforesaid is in our opinion desirable owing to the fact that such portions of the parish of Eglington are nearer to the parish church of the parish to which it is proposed to annex the same than to the parish church of Eglington to which such portions now belong and such alteration will be for the convenience of the inhabitants thereof.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the said twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament we the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing such portions of the said parish of Eglington above referred to and the mode in which it appears to us that the

alteration may be best effected and to have the change consequent thereupon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues and payments and in respect of patronage and the right to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents.

"And in case you shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith We request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents aforesaid by your report to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents of the Patrons and Incumbents of the said benefices respectively are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate two districts or portions of the parish of Eglington known as the townships or civil parishes of Brandon and Branton, in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle and more particularly described in the schedule hereto and to annex the same for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Ingram in the same county and diocese.

"From and after the passing of any Order in Council carrying this scheme into effect the Incumbent of the said parish of Ingram shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said districts now part of the parish of Eglington, and proposed to be annexed to the parish of Ingram, and the fees for marriages, churchings and burials and other ecclesiastical dues, offerings, and emoluments arising from the said districts shall thenceforth belong to the Incumbent of the said parish of Ingram to which such districts shall have been so annexed.

"That no alteration shall be made as to the patronage or (save as aforesaid) the endowments of any of the benefices affected by this scheme.

"SCHEDULE.

"All that portion of the parish of Eglington in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle comprised within the township or civil parish of Brandon and also all that portion of the same parish comprised within the township or civil parish of Branton the boundaries of which two townships are well known and defined.

"CONSENTS.

"We, Norman Dumenil John by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Newcastle the Patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Eglington were the same now vacant do hereby signify our consent to the foregoing representation and scheme and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

"In witness whereof we have hereunto set our hand this twenty-seventh day of August, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and nine.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his report dated the sixth October, one thousand nine hundred and nine, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"That there is in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle the vicarage of Eglington the parish whereof contains according to the last census a population of one thousand two hundred and sixty-four.

"That there is in the same county and diocese the rectory of Ingram the parish whereof contains according to the last census a population of one hundred and fifty-seven.

"That there are within the said parish of Eglington the two townships or civil parishes of Brandon and Branton the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said two townships of Brandon and Branton may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of the reign of Her said late Majesty chapter forty-nine be advantageously separated from the said parish of Eglington and be annexed to the said parish of Ingram for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Lord Bishop hath drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it seems to him that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Patrons and Incumbents of the said benefices to be effected has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"That the representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty chapter one hundred and six certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

WHEREAS His Majesty the King and the President of the French Republic have concluded a Convention to the effect that their respective subjects and citizens shall enjoy reciprocally the benefits of the legislation in force in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and France respectively in regard to compensation for accidents arising out of their employment.

And whereas by section one of the Workmen's Compensation (Anglo-French Convention) Act, 1909, it is provided that His Majesty may by Order in Council make such modifications in the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1906, in its application to workmen who are French citizens as appear to Him to be necessary to give effect to the said Convention.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers vested in Him by the above-mentioned provisions of the Workmen's Compensation (Anglo-French Convention) Act, 1909, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and prescribe as follows:—

The Workmen's Compensation Act, 1906, hereinafter referred to as "the Act," shall in the case of workmen who are French citizens apply subject to the following modifications:—

(1) An employer having his principal place of business in France shall not be liable to pay compensation under the Act for injury to a workman who is a French citizen, by accident arising out of and in the course of the employment

(i) if the workman has been temporarily detached for employment in the United Kingdom, and such employment has at the time of the accident lasted less than six months;

(ii) if the workman is engaged in transport service and is employed at intervals whether regular or not in the United Kingdom.

(2) In all cases the question as to the liability to pay compensation under the Act to a French citizen, and as to the amount or duration of such compensation including the question of the

redemption of weekly payments, and in cases of death the question as to who is a dependant and as to the amount payable to each dependant shall be settled by the Judge of the County Court, and in no other manner.

(3) Where a weekly payment payable to a French citizen has been redeemed by the payment of a lump sum of such amount as would, if invested in the purchase of an immediate life annuity from the National Debt Commissioners through the Post Office Savings Bank, purchase an annuity for the workman of upwards of four pounds, the lump sum shall be paid into the County Court and invested in the purchase of an annuity for the benefit of the workman.

(4) Where a lump sum payable either in the redemption of a weekly payment or as compensation to the dependants of a deceased workman has been paid into the County Court, then

(a) if the workman returns to reside in France; or

(b) if the dependants resided in France at the time of the death of the workman, or subsequently return to reside in France,

the total sum due to the injured workman or his dependants shall be transferred to the "Caisse Nationale Française des Retraites pour la Vieillesse."

(5) Where a workman receiving a weekly payment returns to reside in France, the amount due by way of weekly payments shall, notwithstanding anything in paragraph 18 of the First Schedule to the Act, be remitted to him through the County Court at such intervals and in such manner as may be agreed upon between the Secretary of State and such persons as the President of the French Republic may authorize for the purpose.

(6) No Court fee or other charge shall be payable in the case of a workman who is a French citizen in respect of any proceedings under the Act in the County Court, whether under paragraph (15) of the First Schedule to that Act, or subsequent to the award, or otherwise.

(7) The Registrar of every County Court shall, not later than the thirty-first January in each year, send to the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in a form prescribed by him, a record of all judicial decisions given in the course of the preceding year under the Act in the case of French citizens, and the said Secretary of State shall cause such record to be communicated to the "Département du Travail et de la Prévoyance Sociale."

(8) The power of making rules under the Act shall include a power to make such rules as may be necessary for the purpose of carrying this Order into effect.

(9) In Scotland, references to the Sheriff Court shall be substituted for references to the County Court, reference to the Sheriff for reference to the Judge of the County Court, and reference to the Sheriff Clerk for reference to the Registrar of the County Court.

(10) This Order shall apply to all accidents happening on and after the date on which the Convention takes effect, and shall cease to have effect on the expiration of one year from the date on which the Convention shall have been denounced by one or other of the two contracting parties.

And whereas by Article VI of the Regulations of 1907 it is provided that every Port Sanitary Authority shall, with the approval of the Chief Officer of Customs of the port, or, in the case of any Dockyard Port for which a King's Harbour Master has been appointed, with the approval of that officer, fix some place where the Master of any ship certified under the Regulations of 1907 to be an infected ship or a suspected ship within the meaning of the Regulations of 1907, shall, as required by Article X of the Regulations of 1907, moor or anchor the ship; and it is further provided by Article VI that the place to be fixed as aforesaid shall be some place within the jurisdiction or district of the Sanitary Authority, unless We otherwise consent; in which case the place so fixed shall, for the purposes of the Regulations of 1907, be deemed to be within that jurisdiction or district;

And whereas it is further provided by the said Article VI that where in pursuance of Our General Order dated the 9th day of November, 1896, or of any Order by that Order revoked, or of any consent given by Us in pursuance of any of the said Orders, places have been fixed for the mooring or anchoring of ships for the purposes of the regulations revoked by the Regulations of 1907, those places shall be deemed to have been so fixed in pursuance of and for the purposes of the Regulations of 1907;

And whereas by virtue of Our Order dated the 8th day of September, 1893, the Council of the Borough of Portsmouth have been permanently constituted the Port Sanitary Authority for that part of the Port of Portsmouth which is described in the said Order;

And whereas by an Order dated the 27th day of October, 1893, We consented to the Portsmouth Port Sanitary Authority (hereinafter referred to as "the Port Sanitary Authority,"), fixing, with the approval of the Queen's Harbour Master of the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth, the waters within the triangle therein referred to, and shown on the Map or Chart in the Schedule annexed to that Order, as the place where any ship bound to any place within the district of the Port Sanitary Authority should be moored or anchored for the purpose of Article X of Our General Order dated the 28th day of August, 1890 (being one of the Orders revoked by Our Order dated the 9th day of November, 1896), the said place being situate without the jurisdiction or district of the Port Sanitary Authority:

And whereas the Port Sanitary Authority propose, with the approval of the King's Harbour Master of the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth, to fix the place hereinafter referred to, and indicated by an area outlined in red on the Map or Chart in the Schedule to this Order, as the place where any ship certified under the Regulations of 1907 as aforesaid may be moored or anchored for the purpose of Article X of the Regulations of 1907, in lieu of that fixed by the said Order dated the 27th day of October, 1893, and the said place being situate without their jurisdiction or district, have made application to Us for Our consent in the matter:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon Us by the said Acts and by the Regulations of 1907, and of every other power enabling Us in that behalf, We do hereby Declare, Order, and Direct as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The said Order dated the twenty-seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, is hereby rescinded.

ARTICLE II.—We consent to the Port Sanitary Authority fixing, with the approval of the King's Harbour Master of the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth, the waters included within the area outlined in red on the Map or Chart in the Schedule to this Order as the place where any ship, bound to any place within the District of the Port Sanitary Authority, and certified as aforesaid, shall be moored or anchored for the purpose of Article X of the Regulations of 1907.

NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Union;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by a General Order, dated the 14th day of December, 1852, addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Union, the Poor Law Board prescribed Regulations with regard to the administration of outdoor relief to poor persons in the said Union;

And whereas it is expedient that further provision should be made temporarily with regard to the administration of relief to certain classes of poor persons in the said Union:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order as follows:—

Article I.—The Guardians of the Poor of the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Union may, after not less than seven days' notice of the proposal has been sent by their Clerk to each Guardian, pass a Resolution (hereinafter referred to as "the Resolution") to the effect that the powers conferred by this Order shall be exercised by them, and a copy of the Resolution shall be forwarded to Us by the Clerk within one week after the passing of the Resolution.

Article II.—(1.) The Guardians may, from and after the passing of the Resolution, and during the operation of this Order, relieve out of the Workhouse the wife and family of any able-bodied male person who is relieved in the Workhouse.

(2.) An able-bodied male person who is relieved in the Workhouse, while his wife and family are relieved by the Guardians out of the Workhouse, shall not be absent from the Workhouse more than once in any one week, nor for a period exceeding twelve hours, nor without the consent of the Guardians.

(3.) Any such able-bodied male person who is absent from the Workhouse without any contravention of subdivision (2) of this Article may be relieved by the Guardians during his absence from the Workhouse, without being set to work during the time or any part of the time of his absence.

Article III.—This Order shall operate and have effect until the thirtieth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and ten.

SHEEP-SCAB (COMPULSORY DIPPING
AREAS) ORDER OF 1909.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Order.

1. The Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Order of 1906 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") shall, as regards any Area to which at the date hereof it has been applied with or without modifications, be read as if it contained the following provisions.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep not Dipped as Required by Order.

2. Where any sheep shall not have been dipped as required by the principal Order an Inspector of the Local Authority may, without prejudice to any proceedings for the offence, serve the owner or person in charge of the sheep and the owner or person in charge of any sheep then in contact with the undipped sheep with a notice, in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, requiring the dipping of the sheep described in the notice, and prohibiting their movement from the farm, holding, or other place where they are at the time the notice is served (except with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District) until all the sheep shall have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip after the service of the notice in the presence and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, or have been slaughtered, and thereupon it shall be unlawful to move the sheep in contravention of the notice.

Offences.

3. If a sheep is not dipped as required by a notice served under the principal Order as hereby modified, the owner and person in charge of the sheep shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP-SCAB (COMPULSORY DIPPING AREAS) ORDER OF 1909, and together with the principal Order as the Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Orders, 1906 and 1909.

MIDDLESEX (PARASITIC MANGE) ORDER OF 1909.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Definition of Parasitic Mange.

1. The expression "parasitic mange" in this Order means sarcoptic mange or psoroptic mange.

Separation of Diseased and Suspected Animals and Notice of Disease.

2.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge a horse, ass, or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange shall (a) as far as practicable keep that animal separate from animals not so affected or suspected; and (b) with all practicable speed give notice of the fact of the horse, ass, or mule being so affected or suspected to a constable of the police force for the police area in which the horse, ass, or mule so affected or suspected is.

(2.) The constable receiving such notice shall forthwith give information of the receipt by him of the notice to an Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall forthwith report the same to the Local Authority.

Veterinary Inquiry by Local Authority as to existence of Parasitic Mange.

3.—(1.) The Local Authority on receiving information of the existence, or supposed existence,

of parasitic mange shall forthwith cause inquiry to be instituted as to the correctness of such information with the assistance and advice of a Veterinary Inspector, or of a veterinary practitioner qualified according to the Act of 1894 to be a Veterinary Inspector.

(2.) The owner and occupier of any premises on which there is a horse, ass or mule affected with, or suspected of, parasitic mange, shall give all reasonable facilities for the inquiry by the Local Authority under this Article, and any person failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Detention of Animals.

4.—(1.) A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority may serve a Notice (in the Form A set forth in the Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect) on the occupier of any stable, shed, field or other premises in which there is a horse, ass, or mule, which in his opinion is affected with parasitic mange, and thereupon the following restrictions shall take effect:—

(i.) The horse, ass, or mule so affected shall not be moved out of the stable, shed, field or other premises specified in the Notice, except with the written authority, and under the supervision, of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and only to some other place of detention; and during the detention it shall from time to time, as often as may be necessary, be treated by the owner thereof with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority;

(ii.) No other horse, ass, or mule shall be moved out of the stable, shed, field, or other premises, unless on each occasion immediately before the movement it is treated with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority.

(2.) A Notice under this Order shall remain in force until it is withdrawn by a Notice in writing served on the occupier of the premises by an Inspector of the Local Authority.

Regulations of Local Authority as to Cleansing and Disinfection.

5.—(1.) The Local Authority may, for the purpose of preventing the spreading of parasitic mange, make Regulations for the following purposes, or any of them:

(i.) For providing for the cleansing and disinfection of any place used by, and of utensils, mangers, feeding-troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things used for or about, any horse, ass, or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange:

(ii.) For prescribing the mode in which such cleansing and disinfection are to be effected:

(iii.) For requiring the owner, lessee, or occupier of any such place to cleanse and disinfect any such place, utensils, mangers, feeding-troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things, at the expense of the Local Authority, or at the expense of such owner, lessee, or occupier:

(iv.) For requiring the removal by the owner from contact with horses, asses, or mules, of litter used for or about any horse, ass, or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange.

(2.) The mode of disinfection shall be one of those prescribed by the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1906.

(3.) If any person fail to cleanse and disinfect any place or any utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, or to remove any litter, in accordance with any such Regulation, it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of such Regulation, to cause such place or such utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, to be cleansed and disinfected, or to remove such litter, and to recover summarily the expenses thereby incurred from such person.

(4.) Where the power conferred by the preceding provisions of this Article is exercised by the Local Authority, the owner, lessee, or occupier of the place to be cleansed and disinfected shall give all reasonable facilities for that purpose.

Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

6.—(1.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board two copies of every Regulation made by them under this Order.

(2.) If the Board are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any Regulation made by the Local Authority under this Order, that the same is for any reason objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Extension of certain Sections of Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

7. Horses, asses, and mules shall be animals, and parasitic mange of horses, asses, and mules (in this Order called parasitic mange) shall be a disease for the purposes of this Order and of the following sections of the Act of 1894 (namely):

Section forty-three (*Police*);

Section forty-four (*General Administrative Provisions*);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences or procedure.

Exemption of Army Veterinary Service and Veterinary Colleges.

8. Nothing in this Order applies to any horse, ass, or mule kept in stables of military barracks or camps under the care and supervision of the Army Veterinary Service, or in stables of any Veterinary College affiliated to the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.

Offences.

9.—(1.) If a horse, ass, or mule is moved in contravention of this Order, or of a Notice under this Order, the owner of the horse, ass, or mule, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the horse, ass, or mule is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If anything is omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this

Order, or of any Regulation made thereunder, the owner and the lessee and the occupier and the person in charge of any place or thing in or in respect of which the same is omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any owner, occupier, or person in charge of premises requiring to be cleansed and disinfected fails to give the facilities to a Local Authority required under this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

10. In this Order—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Extent.

11. This Order extends to the administrative county of Middlesex.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall come into operation on the sixth day of December, nineteen hundred and nine.

(iv.) For requiring the removal by the owner from contact with horses, asses, or mules, of litter used for or about any horse, ass, or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange.

(2.) The mode of disinfection shall be one of those prescribed by the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1906.

(3.) If any person fail to cleanse and disinfect any place or any utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, or to remove any litter, in accordance with any such Regulation, it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of such Regulation, to cause such place or such utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, to

The owner and occupier of any premises on which there is a horse, ass or mule affected with, or suspected of, parasitic mange, shall give all reasonable facilities for the inquiry by the Local Authority under this Article, and any person failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
