PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council-

WHEREAS by the Children Act, 1908, it was, amongst other things, enacted that His Majesty may, by Order in Council under the Metropolitan Police Acts, 1839 and 1840, provide for the establishment of one or more separate juvenile courts for the Metropolitan police court district, and for assigning as a division to each such court such portion of that district as may be specified in the Order:

And whereas by the Metropolitan Police Acts, 1839 and 1840, it was, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to alter the number of magistrates appointed to any of the police courts, and to order that a police magistrate or magistrates shall attend regularly at any police court or courts hereafter to be established, either daily or on such days or times as Her Majesty, by the advice aforesaid, shall order:

And whereas by divers Orders in Council made under the said Acts, such police court divisions as to His Majesty from time to time has seemed fit have been constituted within the Metropolitan police district and the extent thereof defined respectively, and such divisions have been assigned to each of the police courts continued or established under the said Acts;

And whereas it is now desirable that juvenile courts should be established, and that a portion of the Metropolitan police court district should be assigned as a division to each such court

from and after the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and ten;

His Majesty is pleased, therefore, with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that from and after the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and ten, juvenile courts shall be established at each of the now existing Metropolitan police courts mentioned in the first column of the schedule following, and that divisions shall be assigned to them as described in the second column of the schedule following:—

Juvenile Courts. Divisions.

1. Bow-street. The divisions for the time being assigned to the Bowstreet and Marlboroughstreet police courts.

2. Clerkenwell. The divisions for the time being assigned to the Clerkenwell and Marylebone police courts.

3. Tower Bridge. The divisions for the time being assigned to the Tower Bridge and Lambeth police courts.

4. Westminster. The divisions for the time being assigned to the Westminster, South Western, and West London police courts.

Old-street.

Greenwich.

The divisions for the time being assigned to the Oldstreet, Thames, and North London police courts.

The divisions for the time being assigned to the Greenwich and Woolwich police courts. And such juvenile courts shall not be held in the court room in which the ordinary sittings of the police court are held, but in the second court room (if any), or in some other room suitable for the purpose in the police court building.

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the said juvenile courts shall be held on Tuesday and Friday in each week, and that one of the magistrates appointed for the Metropolitan police courts shall attend the said juvenile courts on the said days, at two of the clock in the afternoon, or such other hour as may be approved by a Secretary of State for that purpose: Provided that a juvenile court which would in pursuance of the foregoing provision have been held on Christmas Day, Good Friday, or a day appointed for a public fast or thanksgiving, may be held on the preceding day.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 2ND DECEMBER 1909.)

CHESHIRE (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1909.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Revocation of Cheshire (Swine-Fever) Orders of 1908.

1. The Cheshire (Swine-Fever) Order of 1908 and the Cheshire (Swine-Fever) Order of 1908 (No. 2) are hereby revoked as from the commencement of this Order, and the following provisions shall thereupon take effect.

Application of Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 with Modifications.

2. The provisions of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Order) shall apply to the Scheduled Area described in the Schedule hereto, but subject to the modifications hereinafter contained. Provided that the provisions of the principal Order relating to an Infected Area shall not apply to any part of the Scheduled Area, unless such part is for the time being declared by Order of the Board to be, or form part of, a Swine-Fever Infected Area.

Regulation of Movement of Swine to Markets, &c.

3.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved into a market, fairground or saleyard in the Scheduled

Area from premises in the Scheduled Area unless accompanied by a Declaration in accordance with this Article.

(2.) In the case of movement of swine marked as required by Article 5 of the principal Order to a market or saleyard specially authorised by the Local Authority under the principal Order or under the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1904, the Declaration shall be in the Form E set forth in the First Schedule to the principal Order.

(3.) In the case of any other movement affected by this Article, the Declaration shall be in the

Form B set forth in the said Schedule.

(4.) Every Declaration shall be signed by the owner of the swine or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose and shall be available only if made on the day of movement or the previous day

(5.) The Declaration shall be delivered up in exchange for the licence for movement of the swine from the market, fairground or saleyard.

(6.) Swine, while being moved under this Article, shall so far as is practicable be kept separate from all other swine, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Declaration, and not elsewhere.

Regulation of Movement of Swine from Markets, &c.

- 4.—(1.) The movement of Swine from any market, fairground or saleyard in the Scheduled Area shall be subject to the following provisions of this Article.
- (2.) In the case of swine moved into the market, fairground or saleyard from premises outside the Scheduled Area with a licence (Form A) the provisions of Article 4 of the principal Order shall apply to the subsequent movement of the swine.
- (3.) If the market or saleyard is specially authorised by the Local Authority under the principal Order or under the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1904, the movement of the swine exposed at the market or saleyard shall be subject to the provisions of the Order under which the market or saleyard is so authorised.
- (4.) In the case of any other movement of swine from a market, fairground or saleyard the movement shall be subject to the following conditions:
 - (i.) The swine shall be accompanied by a licence (Form C) granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fairground or saleyard is situate.

(ii.) If the place of destination is outside the Scheduled Area it must be a bacon factory

or slaughterhouse.

(iii.) The swine shall not, for a period of twenty-eight days after arrival at the place of destination specified in the licence, be moved from such place of destination except to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse, and only if accompanied by a licence (Form C) authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the swine are detained.

(iv.) Swine moved with a licence under this Article to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse shall be there detained until they are

slaughtered.

(v.) Swine while detained under this Article shall be kept separate from all other swine.

Regulation of Markets, &c., in Scheduled Area.

5. No sale of swine shall be held in any market, fairground or saleyard in the Scheduled Area unless it is authorised by the Local 42° W., from the eastern extreme of the Eastern

Authority of the District (which authority the Local Authority are hereby empowered to grant).

Effect of Licences granted under this Order.

6. No licence shall be required under the principal Order for the movement into a Scheduled Area of swine which are being moved under and in accordance with a licence granted under this Order.

Commencement.

7. This Order shall come into operation on the thirteenth day of December, nineteen hundred and nine.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as the CHESHIRE (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1909, and shall in relation to the Scheduled Area be read as part of the principal Order.


