Now, therefore, His Majesty doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, order and declare that the Province of Prince Edward Island, in the Dominion of Canada, shall be deemed a separate British Possession, and that the Second Part of the Medical Act, 1886, shall be deemed as from the date of this Order to apply to the said Province of Prince Edward Island.

WHEREAS by section 20 (3) of the Finance Act, 1894, it is enacted that His Majesty the King may, by Order in Council, apply that section to any British Possession where His Majesty is satisfied that, by the law of such Possession, either no duty is leviable in respect of property situate in the United Kingdom when passing on death, or that the law of such Possession as respects any duty so leviable is to the like effect as the foregoing provisions of that section.

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that by the law of the Yukon Territory in the Dominion of Canada no duty is leviable in respect of property situate in the United Kingdom when passing on death.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of and in exercise of the power by the aforesaid Act in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the twentieth section of the Finance Act, 1894, shall apply to the Yukon Territory in the Dominion of Canada.
