

7 HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirtynine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the second day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, in the

words following, that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter oue hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage

John, Ivy Bridge, in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John, Ivy Bridge, is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in certain trustees upon trust in the first place for Margaret Deare, of Blachford, Ivy Bridge, in the county of Devon, Spinster, during her life, and the said Margaret Deare is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant.

"And whereas the said Margaret Deare is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John, Ivy Bridge, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Archibald, now Bishop of Exeter.

"And whereas the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

" And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint John, Ivy Bridge, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so

recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the new parish of Saint John, Ivy Bridge.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Margaret Deare, being the person whose consent as Patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, and of the Act of the first and second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six (in testimony of which consent she has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint John, Ivy Bridge, shall be transferred to the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, and his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the sixteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Augustine, situate at Huncoat, in the parochial chapelry of Church, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Augustine, situate at Huncoat as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parochial chapelry of Church, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Augustine, situate at Huncoat as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Augustine, Huncoat.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Augustine, situate at Huncoat as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Augustine, Huncoat, being:-

"All that isolated part of the parochial chapelry of Church, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, which is comprised within and is coextensive with the civil parish of Huncoat."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the

said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of Province with the view of the VV Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, euacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province with the Archbishop of the Province with the Archbishop of the view of Province with the Archbishop of the view of Province with the Archbishop of the view of Province with the view of the v "Province, with respect to his own diocese, "and whenever it shall be represented to him "by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the "Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or "more benefices, or that one or more benefice or "benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure " rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his "or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the "same parish or contiguous to each other, and of " which the aggregate population shall not exceed "one thousand five hundred persons, may, with " advantage to the interests of religion, be united "into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the "Province shall inquire into the circumstances of "the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear "to him that such union may be usefully made, "and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that "the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting "thereto, such consent being signified in writing "under the hands of such patron or patrons, the "said Archbishop shall, six weeks before cer-"tifying such inquiry and consent to His "Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in "writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy "in writing of the aforesaid representation to be "affixed on or near the principal outer door of "the church, or in some public and conspicuous "place in each of such benefices, sinecure "rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any "person or persons interested, that he, she, or "they, may, within such six weeks, show cause "in writing under his, her, or their hand or "hands, to the said Archbishop, against such "union; and if no sufficient cause be shown "within such time, the said Archbishop shall "certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to "His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall "be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make "and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such "benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicar-"age or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure "of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to "give directions for regulating the course and " succession in which the patrons, if there be more "than one patron, shall present or nominate to " such united benefice, from time to time, as the " same shall become vacant, and for determining, "if such united benefice shall be in two dioceses, "to which of such dioceses such benefice shall " belong.

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the fourth day of December, one thousand nine

hundred and nine, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Edgar Charles Sumner, Lord Bishop of Gloucester, as Bishop of the diocese within which is situate the benefice of Didmarton with Oldbury-on-the-Hill, in the county of Gloucester, and the Right Reverend George Forrest, Lord Bishop of Bristol, as Bishop of the diocese within which is situate the benefice of Sopworth, in the county of Wilts, having jointly represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed 1,500 persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Most Noble Henry Adelbert Wellington Fitzroy, ninth Duke of Beaufort, being the Patron or person entitled to collate, present, or nominate to the rectory of Didmarton with Oldbury-on-the-Hill (in case the same were now vacant), and also to the rectory of Sopworth (the same being now vacant), has consented to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union but no sufficient cause has been shown.

"The joint representation of the said Lord Bishops of Gloucester and Bristol, our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the said Most Noble Henry Adelbert Wellington Fitzroy, ninth Duke of Beaufort, as Patron of both the said benefices and the copies of the joint representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes, and we further hereby declare that the said benefices when they shall be united into one benefice shall be included in and belong to the diocese of Gloucester and be under the full authority and jurisdiction of the Bishop of such diocese of Gloucester.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of Didmarton with Oldbury-on-the-Hill, situate in the county and diocese of Gloucester and the rectory of Sopworth, situate in the county of Wilts and diocese of Bristol, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased to order and determine that such united benefice shall belong

to the diocese of Gloucester.

WHEREAS by the five hundred and eightysecond and five hundred and eighty-third sections of the Merchaut Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may, by Bye-law made under Part X of that Act, do within its District all or any of the things specified in the first-named section, but that a Bye-law so made shall not take effect until it is submitted to His Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council.

And whereas the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of the said Act, have recently made certain Bye-laws with respect to the regulation and good government of Masters and Mates of vessels who hold Pilotage Certificates for the Liverpool District, and to the contribution to be made towards the Pilotage Funds of the District by such Masters and Mates, which Bye-laws are in substitution for the Bye-laws for the same purpose already made by the said Pilotage Authority, and approved by Orders in Council of the twenty-sixth August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and first March, one thousand nine hundred and seven.

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Bye-laws so recently made by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being the Bye-laws in the Schedule hereto, are reason-

able and proper:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify His Consent to the said Bye-laws, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order in Council refers.

Bye-laws made by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, the Pilotage Authority of the Port of Liverpool, pursuant to the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, section five hundred and

1. The following Bye-laws shall commence and take effect from the date of the Order of His Majesty in Council approving the same, on which day all Bye-laws previously made by the Board in relation to Masters and Mates holding Pilotage Certificates granted by them and approved by Orders in Council dated twentysixth August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and first March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, so far as the said Bye-laws or any of them are now in force, shall be revoked; but this revocation is not to interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceedings in respect of any offence previously committed or any penalty thereby incurred.

2. Candidates for examination for Pilotage

Certificates will be allowed three examinations only at intervals of not less than one month. in any six months from the date of the application

to be examined in each case.

3. A person to whom a Pilotage Certificate shall be granted by the Board, under the five hundred and ninety-ninth section of the "Mer chant Shipping Act, 1894" (hereinafter called a Certificated person), shall not add to or in any way alter such Certificate, or make or alter any endorsement thereon, or at any time lend such Certificate.

4. A Certificated person who shall observe any alteration in any of the sandbanks or channels, or that any buoys, beacons, or light vessels of the Board have been driven away, broken down, damaged or are out of place, shall forthwith send a correct statement thereof, in writing, to the Superintendent of Pilotage (hereinafter called the Superintendent).

5. A Certificated person, whenever an accident has happened to or been caused by a vessel while in his charge, shall report the facts in writing, as soon as possible, on the approved

form, to the Superintendent.

6. A Certificated person shall obey and execute all lawful orders given by the Board or the Superintendent, and shall also obey all lawful orders given by the Marine Surveyor and Water Bailiff and the Assistant Marine Surveyors and Water Bailiffs, and by the Harbour Masters, Dock Masters and Pier Masters, relative to the anchoring, docking, undocking, towing, trans-porting, or removing of vessels under his charge.

7. A Certificated person shall, when in charge of a vessel for which a Certificate may have been granted, exhibit from the vessel a distinguishing flag of the usual dimensions, and of two colours, the upper horizontal half white and the lower horizontal half red, in order to show that the vessel has on board a master or mate

qualified to act as pilot thereof.

8. A Certificated person shall attend the meetings of the Board, or of their Pilotage Committee, upon being required so to do, by a notice, in writing, under the hand of Superintendent, to answer any complaint complaint or charge which may be made against him.

9. A Certificated person shall attend the Examination Committee, and submit himself for examination by them in respect of his physical

efficiency to act as a pilot:—

(a) On being examined for a Pilotage Certificate for this Port, and

(b) Once in every two years.

10. A Certificated person who offends against, or contravenes any of the last seven preceding Bye-laws, shall for the first offence, on conviction before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction, forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding twenty pounds, and for any subsequent offence he shall also, in addition to or in substitution for a fine, be liable to have his certificate annulled or suspended at the discretion of the Board.

11. A certificated person shall contribute towards the Pilotage Fund of the Liverpool

District, as follows:

(a) On the granting or renewal of a Pilotage Certificate, enabling him to pilot any vessel or vessels therein specified, drawing seventeen feet of water and upwards, the sum of three pounds three shillings yearly, provided that such sum does not exceed five per cent. of the Pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a Pilotage Certificate.

(b) On the granting or renewal of a Pilotage Certificate, enabling him to Pilot any vessel or vessels therein specified, drawing less than seventeen feet of water, the sum of two pounds two shillings yearly, provided that. such sum does not exceed five per cent. of the Pilotage dues which would be payable in respect of his ship if he had not held a

Pilotage Certificate.

The contributions above mentioned shall be payable to the Treasurer for the time being of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board at the time when the fee for the granting or for the renewal of the Certificate is payable.

"And whereas we are of opinion that it is desirable to improve the pension prospects of musicians serving in the bands of the Royal Marine divisions and depôt owing to the limited opportunities existing in these bands of earning

pensions as non-commissioned officers:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to extend to the musicians of the Royal Marine divisional and depôt bands the privilege already accorded to Army bandsmen under the authority of Article 1061 of

Your Majesty's Royal Warrant for Pay, Promotion, &c (1907), viz., that they may be classed as corporals for pension purposes after five years' service on the recognized establishment of the bands.

"Whereas by section three of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces to a person being or having been an Officer, seaman or marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we have had under consideration the difficulty experienced in obtaining candidates for the position of Schoolmaster in

Your Majesty's Naval Service:

"And whereas we consider it necessary, in order to secure the services of efficient candidates, that the position and prospects of the Naval Schoolmaster class should be materially

improved:

"And whereas we are desirous of obtaining power to extend payment of the allowance of sixpence a day, sanctioned by Order in Council of Her late Majesty bearing date the fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, to any person (not being a Naval Schoolmaster) selected to perform the duties of a Naval Schoolmaster for the period of actual employment:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize the introduction of the changes in the conditions of service of Chief Schoolmasters, Head Schoolmasters, and Naval Schoolmasters, set forth in the

annexed schedule:

"We further beg leave to recommend, with regard to the proposal contained in clause eight of the schedule, that we may be empowered to grant the relative rank of Lieutenant to those Chief Schoolmasters who have retired, after serving for three years in that rank on the Active List, since the first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and four, the date on which the rank was instituted, the grant of this rank to be a purely titular distinction and to carry with it no pecuniary advantages.

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, provision was made for direct Appeals from the Supreme Court of New Zealand to Her

Majesty in Council.

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, provision was made for Appeals from the Court of Appeal of New Zealand to Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas it is expedient, with a view to equalizing as far as may be, the conditions under which His Majesty's subjects in the British Dominions beyond the Seas shall have a right of Appeal to His Majesty in Council and to promoting uniformity in the practice and procedure in all such Appeals, that the said Orders in Council, dated the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, should be revoked, and new provision made for Appeals from the said Supreme Court and the said Court of Appeal to His Majesty in Council.

It is hereby ordered by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the said Orders in Council be and the same are hereby revoked, and that instead thereof the Rules hereunder set out shall regulate all Appeals to His Majesty in Council from the Dominion of New Zealand.

"Court" means Court appealed from being either the Court of Appeal of New Zealand or the Supreme Court of New Zealand, as the

case may be;

"Court of Appeal" means the Court of Appeal of New Zealand;

"Supreme Court" means the Supreme Court

of New Zealand;

"Record" means the aggregate of papers relating to an Appeal (including the pleadings, proceedings, evidence and judgments) proper to be laid before His Majesty in Council on

the hearing of the Appeal; "Registrar" means the Registrar or other proper officer having the custody of the

Records in the Court appealed from; "Month" means calendar month;

Words in the singular include the plural, and words in the plural include the singular.

- 2. Subject to the provisions of these Rules, an Appeal shall lie:-
 - (a) as of right, from any final judgment of the Court of Appeal, where the matter in dis-pute on the Appeal amounts to or is of the value of five hundred pounds sterling or upwards, or where the Appeal involves, directly or indirectly, some claim or question to or respecting property or some civil right amounting to or of the value of five hundred pounds sterling or upwards; and
 - (b) at the discretion of the Court of Appeal, from any other judgment of that Court, whether final or interlocutory, if, in the opinion of the Court, the question involved in the Appeal is one which, by reason of its great general or public importance or otherwise, ought to be submitted to His Majesty in Council for decision;
 - (c) at the discretion of the Supreme Court from any final judgment of that Court, if, in the opinion of that Court the question involved in the Appeal is one which, by reason of its great general or public importance, or of the magnitude of the interests affected, or for any other reason, ought to be submitted to His Majesty in Council for decision.
- 3. Where in any action or other proceeding no final judgment can be duly given in consequence of a difference of opinion between the Judges the final judgment may be entered pro forma on the application of any party to such action or other proceeding, according to the opinion of the Chief Justice, or, in his absence, of the

senior puisne Judge of the Court, but such judgment shall only be deemed final for purposes of an Appeal therefrom, and not for any other

purpose.

4. Applications to the Court for leave to appeal shall be made by motion in Court at the time when judgment is given, or by notice of motion filed in the Court, and served on the opposite party in accordance with the rules or practice of the Court within twenty-one days after the date of the Judgment appealed from.

5. Leave to appeal under Rule 2 shall only be granted by the Court in the first instance—

(a) upon condition of the Appellant, within a period to be fixed by the Court, but not exceeding three months from the date of the hearing of the application for leave to appeal, entering into good and sufficient security, to the satisfaction of the Court, in a sum not exceeding five hundred pounds, for the due prosecution of the Appeal, and the payment of all such costs as may become payable to the Respondent in the event of the Appellant not obtaining an order granting him final leave to appeal, or of the Appeal being dismissed for non-prosecution, or of His Majesty in Council ordering the Appeal (as the case may be); and

(b) Upon such other conditions (if any) as to the time or times within which the Appellant shall take the necessary steps for the purpose of procuring the preparation of the Record and the dispatch thereof to England, as the Court, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, may think it reasonable to

impose.

- 6. Where the judgment appealed from requires the Appellant to pay money or perform a duty, the Court shall have power, when granting leave to appeal, either to direct that the said judgment shall be carried into execution or that the execution thereof shall be suspended pending the Appeal, as to the Court shall seem just. And in case the Court shall direct the said judgment to be carried into execution, the person in whose favour it was given shall, before the execution thereof, enter into good and sufficient security, to the satisfaction of the Court, for the due performance of such Order as His Majesty in Council shall think fit to make thereon.
- 7. The preparation of the Record shall be subject to the supervision of the Court, and the parties may submit any disputed question arising in connection therewith to the decision of the Court, and the Court shall give such directions thereon as the justice of the case may require.
- 8. The Registrar, as well as the parties and their legal Agents, shall endeavour to exclude from the Record all documents (more particularly such as are merely formal) that are not relevant to the subject-matter of the Appeal, and, generally, to reduce the bulk of the Record as far as practicable, taking special care to avoid the duplication of documents and the unnecessary repetition of headings and other merely formal parts of documents; but the documents omitted to be copied or printed shall be enumerated in a list to be placed after the index or at the end of the Record.
- 9. Where in the course of the preparation of a Record one party objects to the inclusion of a document on the ground that it is unnecessary or irrelevant, and the other party nevertheless insists upon its being included, the Record as finally printed (whether in New Zealand or in England), shall, with a view to the subsequent adjustment of the costs of and incidental to such document, indicate in the index of

papers, or otherwise, the fact that, and the party by whom, the inclusion of the document was objected to.

- 10. The Record shall be printed in accordance with the Rules set forth in the Schedule hereto. It may be so printed either in New Zealand or in England.
- 11. Where the Record is printed in New Zealand, the Registrar shall, at the expense of the Appellant, transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council forty copies of such Record, one of which copies he shall certify to be correct by signing his name on, or initialling, every eighth page thereof, and by affixing thereto the seal of the Court.
- 12. Where the Record is to be printed in England, the Registrar shall, at the expense of the Appellant, transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council one certified copy of such Record, together with an index of all the papers and exhibits in the case. No other certified copies of the Record shall be transmitted to the Agents in England by or on behalf of the parties to the Appeal.

The taxing officer, in taxing the costs of the Appeal, shall, either of his own motion or at the instance of the opposite party, inquire into any unnecessary prolixity in the Case, and shall disallow the costs occasioned thereby.
- 26. Where the Judicial Committee directs a party to bear the costs of an Appeal incurred in New Zealand, such costs shall be taxed by the Registrar or other proper officer of the Court in accordance with the rules or practice for the time being regulating taxation in the Court.
- 27. Any Order which His Majesty in Council may think fit to make on an Appeal from a judgment of the Court of Appeal or Supreme Court shall be executed by all Courts in like manner as an original judgment of the Court appealed from should or might have been executed.
- 28. Nothing in these Rules contained shall be deemed to interfere with the right of His Majesty, upon the humble Petition of any person aggrieved by any judgment of the Court, to admit his Appeal therefrom upon such conditions as His Majesty in Council shall think fit to impose.

On an application for final leave to appeal, the Court may inquire whether notice, or sufficient notice, of the application has been given by the Appellant to all parties concerned, and, if not satisfied as to the notices given may defer the granting of the final leave to appeal, or may give such other directions in the matter as, in the

- opinion of the Court, the justice of the case requires.
- 19. An Appellant who has obtained final leave to appeal shall prosecute his Appeal in accordance with the Rules for the time being regulating the general practice and procedure in Appeals to His Majesty in Council.
- 20. Where an Appellant, having obtained final leave to appeal, desires, prior to the dispatch of the Record to England, to withdraw his Appeal, the Court may, upon an application in that behalf made by the Appellant, grant him a certificate to the effect that the Appeal has been withdrawn, and the Appeal shall thereupon be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed without express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appealant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.
- 21. Where an Appellant, having obtained final leave to appeal, fails to show due diligence in taking all necessary steps for the purpose of procuring the dispatch of the Record to England, the Respondent may, after giving the Appellant due notice of his intended application, apply to the Court for a certificate that the Appeal has not been effectually prosecuted by the Appellant, and if the Court sees fit to grant such a certificate, the Appeal shall be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed for non-prosecution without express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appellant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.
- 22. Where at any time between the order granting final leave to appeal and the dispatch of the Record to England the Record becomes defective by reason of the death, or change of status, of a party to the Appeal, the Court may, notwithstanding the order granting final leave to appeal, on an application in that behalf made by any person interested, grant a certificate showing who, in the opinion of the Court, is the proper person to be substituted or entered on the Record in place of, or in addition to, the party who has died, or undergone a change of status, and the name of such person shall thereupon be deemed to be so substituted or entered on the Record as aforesaid without express Order of His Majesty in Council.
- 23. Where the Record subsequently to its dispatch to England becomes defective by reason of the death, or change of status, of a party to the Appeal, the Court shall, upon an application in that behalf made by any person interested, cause a certificate to be transmitted to the Registrar of the Privy Council showing who, in the opinion of the Court, is the proper person to be substituted or entered on the Record in the place of, or in addition to, the party who has died or undergone a change of status.
- 24. The Case of each party to the Appea may be printed either in Canada or in England, and shall, in either event, be printed in accordance with the Rules set forth in the Schedule hereto, every tenth line thereof being numbered in the margin, and shall be signed by at least one of the Counsel who attends at the hearing of the Appeal, or by the party himself if he conducts his Appeal in person.
- 25. The Case shall consist of paragraphs numbered consecutively and shall state, as concisely as possible, the circumstances out of which the Appeal arises, the contentions to be urged by the party lodging the same, and the reasons of

appeal. References by page and line to the relevant portions of the Record as printed shall, as far as practicable, be printed in the margin, and care shall be taken to avoid, as far as possible, the reprinting in the Case of long extracts from the Record. The Taxing Officer, in taxing the costs of the Appeal, shall, either of his own motion, or at the instance of the opposite party, inquire into any unnecessary prolixity in the Case, and shall disallow the costs occasioned thereby.

26. Where the Judicial Committee directs a party to bear the costs of an Appeal incurred in Alberta, such costs shall be taxed by the proper officer of the Court in accordance with the rules for the time being regulating taxation in the Court.

27. The Court shall conform with, and execute, any Order which His Majesty in Council may think fit to make on an Appeal from a judgment of the Court in like manner as any original judgment of the Court should or might have been executed.

28. Nothing in these Rules contained shall be deemed to interfere with the right of His Majesty, upon the humble Petition of any person aggrieved by any judgment of the Court, to admit his Appeal therefrom upon such conditions as His Majesty in Council shall think fit to impose.

The Wild Birds Protection (West Riding of Yorkshire) Order, 1910.

Dated 18th January, 1910.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1908, and upon application by the Council of the Administrative County of the West Riding of Yorkshire, I hereby make the following Order:—

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (West Riding of Yorkshire) Order, 1910."

BIRDS.

Close Time Extended.

II. The time during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Act of 1880 shall be extended throughout the Administrative County of the West-Riding of Yorkshire, so far as concerns all Wild Birds except Woodcock, so as to be between the last day of February and the 12th day of August in any year.

The close time for Woodcock is hereby extended so as to be between the 1st day of February and the 12th day of August in any year.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

III. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the Administrative County of the West Riding of Yorkshire to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the Schedule to the Act:—

Sunday Protection.

VI. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880 (as extended by Clause II of this Order), does not apply, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of the West Riding of Yorkshire, except in that portion of the Riding known as the Forest of Bowland and comprising the Townships of Forest of Bowland (Higher Division), Forest of Bowland (Lower Division), Newton-in-Bowland and Slaidburn.

Eggs.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the West Riding.

VII. The taking or destroying of the eggs of the following species of Wild Birds, also the eggs of the Birds named in the Schedule to the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, as amended by the Act of 1881 (except the Lapwing, Peewit or Green Plover), and of those added to the Schedule by Clause III of this Order, is prohibited within the Administrative County of the West Riding of Yorkshire:—

The taking or destroying of the eggs of the Lapwing, Peewit, or Green Plover is prohibited after April 14th in each year.

ARTICLE V.—After making the examination and comparison referred to in Article IV, the Stocktaker, if he find the stock to be correct, shall sign a certificate at the foot of each of the balanced Accounts in the following form:—

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Bridgend and Cowbridge Union;—

And to all others whom it may concern.
