W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two) chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date

the twentieth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain improvements at the episcopal house of residence belonging to the See of Durham, which is known as Auckland Castle.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, now Bishop of Durham, is desirous that certain improvements should be made at the said episcopal house of residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of five hundred and fifty pounds (being a sum which together with the amount of the outstanding balance of the sum already borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Durham.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding five hundred and fifty pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twenty years or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following: that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one fifteenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and

unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenauts by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Handley Carr Glyn, now Bishop of the said diocese of Durham, as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"Now therefore with the consent of the said D'Oyley Scott Ransom (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Edwyn, Bishop of Southwell (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Sutton-upon-Trent now vested in him the said D'Oyley Scott Ransom as aforesaid shall be transferred to the said Edwyn, Bishop of Southwell, and his successors in the same Bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edwyn. Bishop of Southwell, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved

by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Southwell.

- 4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.
- 5. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of Lancaster.
- 6. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be

Any person who after the date of this Order, and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, rhall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.
- 10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance.
- 11. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the county of Lancaster, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Man-
- 12. It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their

arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such

last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recog-nizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 201. to enable him to fray the travelling expenses of such of desuch of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.

15. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner com-mitted for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any Writ of

Habeas Corpus.

16. Except where the context otherwise requires, terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as that which the same terms have in the Spring Assizes Act, 1879.
17. This Order, unless earlier revoked, shall be

in force during the continuance of the Spring Assizes, 1910.

WHEREAS by section two hundred and fourteen of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is provided that a local authority, whose district includes a seaport, may, with the approval of the Board of Trade, make bye-laws relating to seamen's lodging-houses in their district, and that those bye-laws shall be binding upon all persons keeping houses in which seamen are lodged, and upon the owners thereof and persons employed therein; and further, that such bye-laws shall, amongst other things, provide for the licensing, inspection, and sanitary conditions of seamen's lodging-houses, for the publication of the fact of a house being licensed, for the due execution of the bye-laws, for preventing the obstruction of persons engaged in securing that execution, for the preventing of persons not duly licensed holding themselves out as keeping or purporting to keep licensed houses, and for the exclusion from licensed houses of persons of improper character, and shall impose sufficient fines, not exceeding fifty pounds, for the breach of any bye-law; and further, that whenever His Majesty in Council orders that in any district, or any part thereof, none but persons duly licensed in pursuance of bye-laws under the said section shall keep seamen's lodging-houses or let lodgings to seamen from a date therein named, a person acting in contravention of that Order shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds:

And whereas the London County Council is the local authority in the Administrative County of London and a local authority within the

meaning of the said section:

And whereas the said County Council have, with the approval of the Board of Trade, made the bye-laws and regulations contained in the

Schedule hereto:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the said Act, doth order that, from and after the date hereof, none but persons duly licensed in pur-suance of the said bye-laws and regulations shall keep seamen's lodging-houses or let lodgings to seamen in the district of the Administrative County of London, or in any part thereof.

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order in Council.

BYE-LAWS made by the London County Council in pursuance of section 214 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, relating to seamen's lodging-houses in the administrative county of London.

1. In the construction of the following byelaws, unless the context otherwise requires, the I full name and address of the keeper.

following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:-

- "The Council" means the London County Council.
- "The county" means the administrative county of London.

"The district" means the district of the

- sanitary authority.
 "Seaman" means any male person other than the holder of a certificate of competency or service as master, mate, or engineer, in the merchant service who, within four weeks immediately preceding the date of any transaction or occurrence within the scope of these bye-laws, has been employed in any capacity whatsoever on board a ship, whether British or foreign, but shall not include a person engaged upon a fishing boat or trawl boat.
- "Licence" means a licence granted, or which may be granted, by the Council in pursuance of these bye-laws to a person authorizing him to keep the house specified therein as a seamen's lodging-house.

"Keeper" means a person to whom a licence has been granted in pursuance of these

bye-laws.

"House" means a seamen's lodging-house.

- 2. A person who shall apply to the Council for a licence shall furnish, on the application form to be supplied by the Council, a true statement of the particulars therein required to be specified.
- 3. A person who, not being duly licensed, shall himself or by means of any agent or servant hold himself out as keeping or purporting to keep a licensed house, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, and to a further penalty of ten pounds for every day during which he shall continue to do so after conviction for so doing.
- 4. A licence shall continue in force (subject to suspension or revocation as in these bye-laws provided) for such period as the Council may determine, and shall be subject to such conditions specified therein or endorsed thereon, and not being inconsistent with the laws, bye-laws, or regulations for the time being in force in the county, as the Council sees fit, and a keeper, or any person employed in a licensed house, shall not commit a breach of, or fail to observe, such conditions.
- 5. A house or part of a house which is in connection with any public-house or beer-house shall not be licensed as a seamen's lodging-house.
- 6. A licence shall not be granted to a person who holds a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor, nor shall a liceuce be granted in respect of any house or part of a house where intoxicating liquor is sold, nor shall any keeper sell or be engaged or interested in the sale of intoxicating liquor. Provided that nothing in this bye-law shall prohibit the Council from granting a licence in respect of a bona fide sailors' home carried on under the superintendence of an unpaid board of directors or committee of management at which intoxicating liquor is sold; any profits of such home being wholly applied or expended in the upkeep, maintenance, endowment or improvement of such home or for the benefit of the seamen lodging or boarding therein.
- 7. A keeper shall affix and keep undefaced and legible a notice with the words "Licensed Seamen's Lodging-house" in the most conspicuous place on the outside of the main entrance from any street to the licensed house, and also the

- 8. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall at all times, by day or night, when required by an officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses, or by an officer of the Board of Trade, or of the police, give him or them or any of them free access to all parts of such house and to the register of seamen lodgers hereinafter referred to.
- 9. A keeper shall not at any one time receive, cause, or suffer to be received into a house, or into any room therein, a greater number of lodgers than shall be from time to time allowed by the certificate of the Clerk of the Council. Such certificate shall be supplied by the Council to the keeper, and he shall produce such certificate whenever required by any officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses.

10. A keeper shall fix and keep fixed in a conspicuous place in each room appointed for use as a sleeping apartment in a house, a ticket signed by the Clerk of the Council, stating the number of lodgers allowed to be received into such room, and a keeper and any person employed in a house shall not at any time conceal, deface, alter, or obliterate, or permit, or suffer to be concealed, defaced, altered, or obliterated any letters

or figures on such ticket.

11. Notwithstanding that the maximum number of lodgers to be received into a house or into any room therein may not have been fixed by the Council as hereinbefore provided, a keeper shall not cause or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of four hundred cubic feet of free air space for each person to occupy at one time as a sleeping apartment a room which is used for that purpose.

12. Whenever the Council shall consider it necessary to reduce the number of lodgers to be received into any room in a house, the keeper shall, upon receiving notice in writing to that effect, under the hand of the Clerk of the Council, cease to permit such room to be occupied by any greater number of lodgers than that specified in

such notice.

13. A keeper shall not at any time cause or suffer any room which may be appointed for use as a kitchen, scullery, or sitting room, or any underground room which does not comply with the provisions of sub-section 1 of section 96 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, to be used as a sleeping apartment.

14. A keeper shall cause all such means of ventilation as may be provided in or in connection with any room, passage, or staircase in a house, and in, or in connection with, any watercloset or urinal belonging to a house to be

maintained at all times in good order.

15. A keeper shall cause the windows of every room, and of every passage, staircase, and water-closet in a house to be kept fully open for such time on each day as may be necessary for the purposes of ventilation, and shall cause the windows of every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment to be kept fully open from 9 A.M. to 4 P.M. each day during the months of October, November, December, January, February, March and April, and from 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. each day during the months of May, June, July, August, and Sep-

Provided that such keeper shall not be required in pursuance of this bye-law to cause any window in any room to be opened or to be kept open at any time when the state of the weather is such as to render it necessary that the window shall be closed, or when any bed in such room may be occupied by any lodger in consequence of sickness or of other sufficient cause.

- 16. A keeper shall, in the first week in the month of April, and, if required in writing by the Council, in the first week in the month of October, in every year, cause every part of a house to be cleansed, and shall, at the same time, except as in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause every area, the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every water-closet belonging to the premises, and the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every room, staircase, and passage in the house, to be thoroughly stopped, cleansed, and lime-washed or distempered. Provided that if any such interior surface is painted or covered with material which is such as to render the lime-washing thereof unsuitable or inexpedient, this bye-law shall be deemed to be satisfied, so long as such surface is thoroughly cleansed, and the paint or other covering thereon is renewed, if such cleansing or renewal be necessary for the purpose of keeping the house in a cleanly and wholesome condition.
- 17. A keeper shall as often as may be necessary to keep the same in a clean and wholesome state, cause all the rooms, passages, stairs, floors, windows, doors, and walls of a house to be thoroughly cleansed and freed from vermin, and shall also cause the floors of every room to be thoroughly swept daily, before the hour of ten in the forenoon, and to be well and sufficiently washed on Friday in each week before the hour of twelve noon.

18. A keeper shall cause all bed clothes and bedding and every bedstead used in a house to be thoroughly cleansed as often as shall be required for the purpose of keeping such bed clothes, bedding, and bedsteads in a clean and wholesome

condition, and free from vermin.

19. A keeper shall, for the use of the lodgers received into a house, cause to be provided a sufficient number of chamber utensils, and a sufficient number of washing basins or other proper receptacles for water, of adequate capacity and suitably placed, and a sufficient supply of water, and a sufficient number of towels for use in connection with such washing basins and other receptacles, and shall cause such basins or receptacles to be kept clean and in good order, and the supply of towels to be renewed as often as may be requisite.

20. A keeper shall cause every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment in a house to be furnished with such number of beds and bedsteads, and with such a supply of bed clothes as may be sufficient for the requirements of the number of lodgers authorized to be received into such room, and he shall cause every sleeping apartment to be furnished with bedsteads and bedding of a

size adapted for one person only.

21. A keeper shall cause all solid or liquid filth or refuse to be removed once at least in every day before the hour of ten in the forenoon from every room in a house, and shall once at least in every day cause every vessel, utensil, or other receptacle for such filth or refuse to be

thoroughly cleansed.

22. In the event of any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, being ill of any infectious disease, the keeper shall forthwith give intimation in writing of the same to the Medical Officer of Health of the county and of the district, and shall adopt all such precautions as may be necessary to prevent the spread of such infectious disease. Such keeper shall not, at any time while such inmate is suffering from such infectious disease, cause or allow any other person, except a person voluntarily in attendance on such inmate, to use or occupy the same room as such inmate,

Where in pursuance of the statutory provision in that behalf, the sanitary authority may order the removal of such iumate to a hospital or other place for the reception of the sick, such keeper, on being informed of such order, shall forthwith take all such steps as may be requisite on his part to secure the safe and prompt removal of such inmate in compliance with the order of the sanitary authority, and shall, in and about such removal, adopt all such precautions as, in accordance with any instructions which he may receive from the Medical Officer of Health of the county or of the district, may be most suitable for the circumstances of the case.

Where, in consequence of the illness of such inmate, there may be reasonable grounds for apprehending the spread of infection through the admission of a lodger to any room or rooms in a house or through the admission to such room or rooms of the maximum number of lodgers authorized to be received therein, such keeper, after being furnished with the necessary instructions from the Medical Officer of Health of the county or of the district, and until the grounds for apprehending the spread of infection shall have been removed, shall cease to receive any lodger into such room or rooms or shall receive therein such number of lodgers, being less than the maximum number, as the exigencies of the

case may require.

23. A keeper shall provide sufficient and proper water-closet accommodation in a seamen's lodging-house in the proportion of one such closet to every twelve or fractional part of twelve persons in a house authorized to receive not more than twenty-four persons; one to every fifteen or fractional part of fifteen persons in a house authorized to receive more than twenty-four and not more than sixty persons; one to every twenty or fractional part of twenty persons in a house authorized to receive more than sixty and not more than one hundred persons; and one to every twenty-five or fractional part of twenty-five persons in a house authorized to receive more than one hundred persons. He shall cause all water-closets in a house and every part of the apparatus of such water-closets to be kept clean, and shall cause the same and every drain or means of drainage with which they or either of them may communicate, to be maintained in good order and efficient condition.

24. A keeper shall cause every part of the structure of a house to be maintained at all times in good order and repair.

25. A keeper shall cause the yard, area, forecourt, or other open space within the curtilage of a house to be maintained at all times in good order and thoroughly clean, and free from any accumulation of filth or other refuse.

26. A keeper and every person employed in a house shall not receive any female lodger into such house.

27. A keeper and every person employed in a house shall not knowingly lodge, or knowingly harbour, any thief or reputed thief, any prostitute or reputed prostitute, or any other person of improper character.

28. A keeper shall keep a register and shall enter therein the name, age, and nationality of every seaman lodger received into a house, the name of the last vessel from which such seaman lodger was discharged, and the port of discharge, with the name and port of registry of any vessel he may join while resident in such house, and his declared destination on leaving.

29. A keeper shall put up or affix and keep up or affixed a copy of these bye-laws in a suitable

or conspicuous position in the common sittingroom of a house in such a manner that the contents of such copy may be clearly and distinctly visible and legible, and shall enter upon the space left for the purpose at the foot of that copy, a scale of the charge per day for board, lodging, and necessaries made in such house, and shall not make a higher charge than is provided by the scale on any pretence whatever.

30. Upon the Council being satisfied that any keeper has been guilty of a breach of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or the Acts amending the same, or that such keeper has kept, or is keeping, or is allowing to be kept, a house in which drunkenness, gambling, opium smoking, or immoral or fraudulent practices prevail, or is or has been a party to such proceedings, or neglects to remove from such house any person of improper or immoral character who may have entered therein, or has failed, or is failing to comply with these bye-laws or any of them, the Council may suspend or revoke all licences granted to such keeper.

31. No person shall obstruct any officer or person engaged in securing the execution of

these bye-laws.

32. Every person offending against any of the foregoing bye-laws, except where otherwise expressly provided, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to a penalty of five pounds for every day during which the offence may be continued after conviction for the first offence.

33. These bye-laws shall come into force on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and ten, from which date the bye-laws made by the Council on the eighteenth day of June and the twenty-third day of July, one thousand nine hundred and one, relating to seamen's lodging-houses in the county shall be repealed.

The foregoing bye-laws were made by the London County Council on the sixth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and the fourteenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and the common seal of the Council was hereunto affixed on the sixteenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and nine.

WHEREAS a Lighthouse and Fog Signals are being erected by the States of the Island of Guernsey at or near Fort Doyle at a rock known as Platte Fougère, both situate in the said Island:

And whereas by virtue of section 634 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, the Trinity House are the General Lighthouse Authority for England and Wales, and the Channel Islands and the adjacent seas and islands:

And whereas by section 669 of the said Act it is provided that the powers of the Trinity House

under Part XI of the said Act with respect to Lighthouses, Buoys or Beacons already erected or placed, or thereafter to be erected or placed in the Islands of Guernsey or Jersey (other than their powers with respect to the surrender or purchase of local Lighthouses. Buoys and Beacons and the prevention of false lights) shall not be exercised without the consent of His Majesty in Council:

And whereas the Trinity House have agreed to contribute a sum not exceeding two hundred pounds per annum towards the maintenance of the said Lighthouse and Fog Signals so long as the Light and Fog Signals are of a character approved by the Trinity House, and are maintained to their satisfaction.

Now therefore, His Majesty in pursuance of the powers in Him vested by the above recited Act, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared that the powers of the Trinity House under Part XI of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, relating to Lighthouses, Buoys and Beacons, including their powers under sections 637 and 652 thereof, may be exercised by the Trinity House to the extent of enabling them to make the aforesaid contribution to the annual expense of the said Lighthouse and Fog Signals so long as the Light and Fog Signals are of a distinctive character approved by them and are maintained to their satisfaction and not further or otherwise.

- (a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:
- (b) In the said churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has hereto-

of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein; subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

WHICKHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary, in the parish of Whickham, in the county of Durham; and in that portion of the churchyard which existed prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, with the following exceptions, that is to say :-

- (a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said portion of the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:
- (b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said portion of the said churchyard and being enclosed with a kerb or railing or having a monument upon it, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave; subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
- CITY OF BRISTOL.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint Mary Magdalene, in the parish of Stoke Bishop, in the city of Bristol; and in the churchyard, with the following exceptions, that is to say:—
 - (a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:
 - (b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave; subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave:
 - (c) In the said churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the thirty-first day of March next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the fore taken place, the burial may be allowed London Gazette, and that copies thereof be

affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representations one month before the said thirty-first day of March.

And whereas the said Statute was approved by Her late Majesty in Council on the third day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-

And whereas the title of the said Statute was in the words following that is to say:-

"Chichele Professor of International Law." And whereas clause 1 of the said Statute was in the words following that is to say:

"1. The Chichele Professor of International Law shall lecture and give instruction on Public and Private International Law including as a part of Public International Law the history and obligation of Treaties":

And whereas the said Statute forms § 3 of Sectio II B of Titulus IV of the Statutes of the University and the said clause 1 thereof is referred to in the amending Statute hereinafter mentioned as Statt. Tit. IV Sect. II B § 3 cl. 1: And whereas the Chancellor Masters and

Scholars of the University of Oxford on the first day of February one thousand nine hundred and ten have made the following amending Statute

that is to say:

Whereas it is expedient to assimilate the Statute which will apply to future Chichele Professors of International Law to the Statute now applicable to the Professorship by (1) adding to the title of the Chair the words "and Diplomacy" and (2) omitting Private International Law from the topics with which the Professor is required to deal the University enacts as follows:

1. In Statt. Tit. IV Sect. II B § 3 to the title "Chichele Professor of International Law" shall

be added the words "and Diplomacy."

2. Ibid clause 1 the words "and Private" shall be struck out and after the words "International Law" wherever they occur the words

WILD BIRD (ENGLAND).

The Wild Birds Protection (Administrative County of East Sussex) Order, 1910.

Dated 16th February, 1910.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1908, and upon application by the County Council of the Administrative County of East Sussex, I hereby make the following Order:-

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as the Wild Birds Protection (Administrative County of East Sussex) Order, 1910.

BIRDS.

Close Time Extended.

II. The time during which the killing or taking

day of February and the 1st day of September in any year, except with respect to the following birds :-

Curlew, Godwit, Wild Goose, Lapwing, Plover, Redshank and other Sand Pipers, Snipe, Wild Swan, Mallard, Teal and other Wild Duck, Whimbrel, Widgeon, Woodcock.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

III. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the Administrative County of East Sussex to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the schedule to the Act:-

Blue-throat, Black-headed Bunting, Cirl Bunting, Corn Bunting, Reed Bunting, Snow Bunting, Yellow Bunting (Yellow Hammer), Bustard, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Chiffchaff, Corn Crake (Land Rail), Spotted Crake, Golden-eyed Duck, Peregrine Falcon, Flycatcher (both species), Heron, Hobby, Glossy Ibis, Kestrel, Martin (both species), Merlin, Nuthatch, Osprey, Water Pipit, Kentish Plover, Pratincole, Raven, Redstart, Redbacked Shrike, Tree Sparrow, Stone-chat, Swallow, Swift, Bearded Tit, Blue Tit, Coal Tit, Crested Tit, Great Tit, Long-tailed Tit, Marsh Tit, Wagtail (all species), Blackcap Warbler, Dartford Warbler, Garden Warbler, Grasshopper Warbler, Reed Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Willow Warbler, Wood Warbler, Whastear Whinghat Whitetheast Warbler, Wheatear, Whinchat, Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Fire-crested Wren, Goldencrested Wren, Wryneck.

IV. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the undermentioned area in the Administrative County of East Sussex to the Linnet (Brown and Green) in the same manner as if those species were included in the schedule to the Act.

The area referred to is bounded on the north by a line beginning on the sea coast at the boundary between the County Borough of Hastings and the Borough of Bexhill, proceeding along such boundary to its junction with the main road from Hastings to Bexhill, thence along the northern side of such main road, through Bexhill, Ninfield, Horsebridge, and Laughton, to the boundary of the Borough of Lewes, theuce along the northern boundary of that Borough to its junction with the main road leading from Lewes to Offbam, thence along the northern side of such main road through Ditchelling and Hurstpierpoint to the County boundary between Albourne and Woodmancote and is outlined in blue on a map deposited with the Clerk of the County Council, sealed with the Home Office seal, and dated the 16th February, 1910.

The House Sparrow depriced of protection.

V. The whole of the Administrative County of East Sussex is hereby exempted from the operation of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, so far as the House Sparrow is concerned.

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

VI. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, as extended, so far as certain birds are concerned, by Clause II of this Order, does not apply, the killing or taking of any of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of East Sussex :-

of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Act of 1880 Avocet, Blue-throat, Chough, Spotted Crake, shall be extended so as to be between the last Crossbill, Stone Curlew (Great Plover, Thick-

knee), Common Bittern, Little Bittern, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Golden-eyed Duck, Pied Flycatcher, Goldfinch, Great Crested Grebe, Greenshank, Heron, Hoopoe, Glossy Ibis, Kingfisher, Common Kite, Wood Lark, Nightjar (Goat Sucker), Oriole, Osprey, White Owl, Greynecked Phalarope, Red-necked Phalarope, Water Pipit, Ringed Plover, Pratincole, Raven, Redpole, Dusky Redshank, Spotted Sandpiper, Wood Sandpiper, Siskin, Tree Sparrow, Spoonbill, Temminck's Stint, Common Tern, Bearded Tit, Dartford Warbler, Wheatear, Green Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Lesser Spotted Woodpecker.

All Birds protected on Sundays except within a certain Area.

VII. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act of 1880, as extended, so far as certain birds are concerned, by Clause II of this Order, does not apply, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited within the Administrative County of East Sussex, except in so much of the Poor Law Union of Cuckfield as is comprised in the parishes of Bolney and Twineham, which area is outlined in red on the map referred to in Clause IV of this Order.

EGGS.

All Eggs protected in certain Areas.

VIII. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of any species of Wild Birds is prohibited for a period of five years from the date of this Order within the undermentioned areas which are outlined in orange on the map referred to in Clause IV:

- (a.) An area bounded on the west by a line drawn due south from the eastern extremity of the sea wall at Seaford, on the east by a line drawn due south from the eastern extremity of the Coastguard Station at Meads, in the borough of Eastbourne, on the north by the front edge of the sea cliffs extending between those limits, and on the south by the sea.
- (b.) An area bounded on the west by a line drawn due south from the western boundary of the parish of Rottingdean, on the east by a line drawn due south from the eastern extremity of the sea cliffs in the Urban District of Newhaven, on the north by the front edge of the sea cliffs extending between those limits, and on the south by the sea
- (c.) An area bounded on the west by a straight line drawn from the sea through the eastern extremity of the Meads Coastguard Station at Eastbourne to the western side of the main road running from Eastbourne to Hailsham at its junction with Church-street and High-street, Eastbourne, and by the western side of the main road via Willingdon and Polegate and Hailsham, to its junction with the Lewes and Battle main road at or near Upper Horsebridge; on the north by the northern side of the Lewes and Battle main road running from the said point at or near Upper Horsebridge through Gardner-street, and Boreham-street to Ninfield, by the north-eastern side of the main road leading from Ninfield to Bexhill through Sidley, and by the northern side of the main road from Bexhill to the boundary of the County Borough of Hastings at Bulverhythe; on the east by the western boundary of the Borough of Hastings; and on the south by the sea.

Hastings from the sea to the point at which the South Eastern and Chatham branch line of railway from Hastings to Ashford leaves the County Borough near Coghurst; on the west and north by the eastern and southern boundary of such branch line of railway leading through Rye to the Kent and Sussex County boundary; on the east by such County boundary, and on the south by the sea.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the Administrative County.

IX. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of East

Avocet, Common Bittern, Blue-throat, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Spotted Crake, Crossbill, Stone Curlew (Great Plover, Thick-knee), Goldfinch, Great Crested Grebe, Heron, Hobby, Houpoe, Kestrel, Kingfisher, Common Kite, Wood Lark, Nightingale, Nightjar (Goat Sucker), Oriole, Owl (all species), Grey-necked Phalarope, Red-necked Phalarope, Water Pipit, Kentish Plover, Ringed Plover, Wood Sandpiper, Red-backed Shrike, Spoonbill, Common Tern, Bearded Tit, Dartford Warbler, Wheatear, Green Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Lesser Spotted Wood-pecker, Golden-crested Wren, Wryneck.

Repeal of former Order.

X. The Order of the 17th day of February, 1909, is hereby repealed.
