Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to

the Bechuanaland Protectorate (Lands) Order in Council, 1904, all other land situate within the limits of the Bechuanaland Protectorate elsewhere than in the Tati district shall,

with the exception of

(1) such land as is either

(a) included in any native reserve duly set apart by Proclamation, or

(b) the subject of any grant duly made by or on behalf of His Majesty, and

(2) the forty one farms known as "the Baralong Farms," held by members of the Baralong tribe by virtue of certificates of occupation issued by the Chief Montsioa, on the twenty-eighth day of March, one thou-

sand eight hundred and ninety-five, vest in His Majesty's High Commissioner for South Africa, and be subject to all the provisions of the said Order in Council as Crown Lands.

2. His Majesty may at any time add to, alter, or amend this Order.

3. This Order may be cited for all purposes as the Bechuanaland Protectorate (Lands) Order in Council, 1910.

His Majesty has been pleased to award the Edward Medal of the First Class to David McWhirter and William McLelland.

On the 8th July, 1909, two steeplejacks, with an assistant, were engaged in fixing new lightning conductors to a chimney, about one hundred and eighty feet high, at the Coltness Iron Works, Newmains, Lanarkshire. The two steeplejacks, who were at the top of the chimney on a scaffold consisting of two planks, about nine inches broad, were affected by gas fumes from the chimney and one of them became unconscious and fell on the scaffold. The other, after tying his mate to the scaffold by a rope, was able to descend by a ladder to the ground, and received medical attention. Their assistant climbed the ladder, but was not sufficiently experienced to reach the scaffold.

There was not time to obtain the assistance of regular steeplejacks, but two men employed at the Iron Works volunteered—David McWhirter and William McLelland. They both asceuded the ladder, got on to the narrow scaffold, and succeeded in placing the unconscious man in the "boatswain's chair" used by the steeplejacks, and in lowering him safely to the ground. Neither of them had previously had experience of climbing chimneys, and, in addition to climbing a vertical ladder one hundred and eighty feet high, they had to deal with an unconscious man cn a narrow open scaffold, and they also ran the risk of being overcome by the gas fumes.

The KING has been pleased to confer the Albert Medal of the Second Class upon Antonio Dingli and Paolo Bonnici, for gallantry in endeavouring to save life at Zabbar, Malta, as detailed below :---

On the night of the 31st May, 1909, and the early morning of the following day, men were engaged in emptying the cess pit of certain premises at Zabbar, Malta. The foul air in the pit rendered any lengthened period of work impracticable, and resulted in one of the men losing his life.

Antonio Dingli was the first man to descend, but he was compelled in a short time to return to the surface, for another to take up the task.

The next man to descend had almost regained the surface after a short absence, when he collapsed and fell back into the pit. Dingli descended at once, and succeeded in getting him to the pit opening when he himself lost consciousness, and both fell back into the pit.

Bonnici then tied a rope round his waist and descended to the rescue of his comrades. As he was unable to lift Dingli, a rope with a hook attached was lowered, and the rope having been made secure, Dingli was hauled up to the pit head in an apparently lifeless condition.

Bonnici was rescued by means of the rope.

The third man succumbed before he was brought to the surface.

The presentation of the Medals, in the name of His Majesty, was performed by the Governor of Malta, on the Palace Square, Valletta, on the 20th ultimo.

The KING has been pleased to allow Mrs. Isabella Wilson, now residing at South Shields, to receive the Albert Medal of the Second Class which, but for his untimely death, would have been awarded to her late husband, Mr. Archibald Wilson, in recognition of his gallantry in endeavouring to save life as detailed below :—

On the 27th November, 1908, workmen were engaged painting the inside of an iron tank in the stokehold of a steamer lying in dry dock at Jarrow.

Owing to the fact that very strong fumes were given off by the anti-corrosive paint or solution used the men were working in relays, each squad of three men being relieved after 10 or 15 minutes had elapsed.

A workman named Graham was overcome by the fumes, and the chargeman, Archibald Wilson, sacrificed his life in endeavouring to save Graham.

Thomas McCormack, who had already been affected by the fumes while at work in the tank, went to Wilson's assistance, but was himself rendered insensible, and was rescued by James Kennedy Chapman, Works Manager at the Dock, who, having pulled McCormack out, re-entered the tank and endeavoured to save Graham, but was himself overcome by the fumes.

The rescue of Chapman and Graham was eventually effected from the top of the tank.

The award of the Albert Medal of the Second Class to Mr. Chapman and Mr. McCormack was notified in the London Gazette of the 23rd July, 1909.

Persons who have served for two full consecutive years in any Civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, or as Registered Boy Copyists or Registered Boy Clerks in connection with the Civil Service (if registered on the results of the competition of September 22nd, 1908, or any previous competition) may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.

2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners-

- (a) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.
- (b) That they are natural-born or naturalized British subjects.

3. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as the Postmaster-General may from time to time fix.

4. The examination will be in the following subjects, viz :---

- 1. English Composition (including Writing and Spelling).
- 2. Arithmetic (first four rules, Simple and Compound, including English and Metrical Weights and Measures, Reduction, Vulgar Fractions and Decimals, excluding Recurring Decimals).

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency will not be regarded as qualified.

5. Candidates must be at least 5 feet 4 inches in height.

6. The following persons are ineligible to compete, viz.:---

Members of the Royal Irish Constabulary of less than five years' service.

7. The following classes of persons are eligible under certain conditions only, that is to say:--

- (a) Persons actually serving in the Army.
- (b) Persons actually serving in the Navy.
- (c) Persons holding situations in the Civil Service.
- (d) Members of the Royal Irish Constabulary of more than five years' service.
- (c) Probationary Engineer Cadets in the Navy and Apprentices in His Majesty's Dockyards.

- (g) Persons who have been trained in the Inland Revenue Branch of the Government Laboratory.
- No person actually serving in the Army will be eligible unless he produces to the Civil Service Commissioners, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to attend the examination dated before the commencement of the competition and given in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued by or under the authority of the Army Council.
- No person actually serving in the Navy will be eligible unless he produces to the Civil Service Commissioners, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition and given

in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued by or under the authority of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

9. A fee of 5s. will be required from every Candidate attending an Examination.

These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 17 and 19. If an Examination begins in one of the first four months of any year, candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of January in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the second four months of any year, candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of May in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last four months of any year, candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of September in that year.

- In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served in the Army or Navy may deduct from their actual age any time during which they have served; and persons who may be serving or who may have served in the Militia, the Imperial Yeomanry, the Honourable Artillery Company, or the Volunteers, may deduct from their actual age any time spent on actual military service, such time being reckoned by the number of days for which they received Army pay.

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ORDER of the Local Government Board: District Auditors Act, 1879: Assignment of Duties and District :-

SUSSEX AUDIT DISTRICT.

- Poor Law Unions named in the Schedule to this Order ;-
- To the Overseers of the Poor of the several Parishes comprised within the said Unions respectively;
- To the Authorities referred to in Article I (3)
- Portslade Joint Industrial School :-

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by Section 4 of the District Auditors Act, 1879, it is enacted that the Local Government Board may from time to time assign to District Auditors their Duties, and the Districts in which such Auditors respectively are to act, and may from time to time change wholly or in part such Duties or Districts

And whereas John Orchard is a District Auditor duly appointed under the provisions of the Statutes in that behalf;

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board, hereby certify the appointment to the Office of District Auditor of the said John Orchard (hereinafter referred to as "the District Auditor"), and do Order and Prescribe as follows :-

ARTICLE 1.-It shall be the duty of the District Auditor to audit the Accounts of the following Authorities and their Officers; namely,

- (1) The Guardians of the Poor of the several Poor Law Unions named in the Schedule to this Order.
- (2) The Overseers of the Poor of the several Parishes comprised in the said several Unions.
- (3) The several other Authorities for the time being whose Accounts are or may be by law subject to be audited by a District Auditor, and whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being wholly situated within one or more of the said Unions, and whose Accounts are not subject to audit by any other District Auditor.

(4) The Joint Body of Managers of the Portslade Joint Industrial School.

(5) Such other Authorities whose Accounts are or may be by law subject to be audited by a District Auditor, and whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being partly situated within one or more of the said Unions as We may by Order hereafter prescribe.

ARTICLE II.-The District Auditor shall audit the said Accounts according to the provisions of the several Statutes and of the Orders issued by competent authority in force for the time being in that behalf, and shall perform all such duties and exercise all such powers in connection with the audit of such Accounts as are prescribed and conferred by the said Statutes and Orders.

ARTICLE III.-The District in which the District Auditor shall act as Auditor, and which We hereby assign to him for the performance of his duties under this Order, shall be termed "The Sussex Audit District," and shall, until We otherwise prescribe, comprise the several Poor Law Unions named in the Schedule to this Order, the area subject to the jurisdiction of the Joint Body of Managers named in Paragraph (4) of Article I of this Order, and the Districts or areas subject to the jurisdiction of any such |

Authority as is mentioned in Paragraph (5) of the said Article.

-Any Order in force assigning a ARTICLE IV. District to the District Auditor for the discharge of his duties or prescribing his duties, shall, on and after the date on which this Order comes into operation, be rescinded, but nothing in this Order shall affect or interfere with the existing duties and powers of the District Auditor as regards any Audit of which notice has already been given, or any matters or proceedings already commenced.

ARTICLE V.-In this Order-

The term "Overseers of the Poer" includes Churchwardens and Assistant Overseers.

ARTICLE VI.-This Order shall come into operation on the second day of March, one thousand nine hundred and ten, provided that, for the purpose of the giving by the District Auditor of notices of any Audit, it shall operate from the date hereof.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government. Board: (Altering General Accounts Order): Appointment of Stocktaker :-

ASTON UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Aston Union ;-

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by General Orders of the Poor Law Board, dated respectively the 14th day of January, 1867, and the 16th day of February, 1869, which are in force in the Aston Union, it is required that in relation to the provisions, clothing, and other stores in the Workhouse, the Accounts, when made up and balanced, shall be submitted to the Visiting Committee or to some member thereof, who shall enter a memorandum at the foot of those Accounts certifying to the same having been submitted, and to the correctness of the said Accounts as regards the stock remaining in store;

And whereas it is expedient to empower the Guardians of the Poor of the said Union to appoint a competent person or persons to examine the stores at the Workhouse, and at any House (whatever be its designation or description) which belongs to the Guardians, in which any poor person is lodged and maintained, and to which the Orders hereinbefore mentioned. apply, and to perform the other duties hereinafter set forth :

Now therefore, in the exercise of Our powers in that behalf, We, the Local Government Board, hereby Order as follows :---

ARTICLE I.—The Guardians of the Poor of the Aston Union (hereinafter referred to as "the Guardians"), as and when they shall think fit to do so, may appoint a competent person or persons to perform the duties of a Stocktaker as hereinafter set forth, and may revoke that appointment. Any appointment of a Stocktaker by the Guardians shall be notified to Us forthwith.

ARTICLE II.—Every appointment of a Stocktaker shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Regulations in force for the time being as to the appointment of Officers by the Guardians, and a person appointed to the Office of Stocktaker shall receive such remuneration as may from time to time be assigned to him by the Guardians.

ARTICLE III.—No person, except with Our consent, shall be appointed to the office of Stocktaker while holding any other office under the Guardians.

ARTICLE IV.—The Stocktaker shall, on the day next after the termination of each quarter, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stores at the Workhouse, and at any House for which he is appointed and directed to act, and compare the said stores with the quantities of stock remaining in store as shown by the entries in the proper columns in the Accounts termed respectively the "Quarterly Balance of the Provisions Account" and the "Quarterly Balance of the Necessaries and Miscellaneous Account," or in such additional Accounts as may be kept under the directions of the Guardians.

He shall also, on the day next after the termination of each half-year, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stocks of clothing at the Workhouse, and at any House as aforesaid, and compare the same with the balance appearing in the Accounts termed respectively the "Clothing Materials Receipt and Conversion Account" and the "Clothing Receipt and Expenditure Account." He shall also examine the Inventory Books, and verify stocks shown therein, in such manner and to such extent as the Guardians may from time to time direct.

ARTICLE V.—After making the examination and comparison referred to in Article IV, the Stocktaker, if he find the stock to be correct, shall sign a certificate at the foot of each of the balanced Accounts in the following form :—

If he find the stock to be in any respect incorrect, he shall make such alteration in the said certificate as he may deem necessary, specifying the particulars in which he finds the quantities of stock to be incorrectly stated.

ARTICLE VI.—The Master of the Workhouse, and the Master, Steward or Superintendent of any such House as aforesaid, shall, when required by the Stocktaker to do so, on the days and at the times referred to in Article IV, submit to him the stores and accounts therein mentioned, and render to him such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of such examination and comparison as aforesaid.

ARTICLE VII.—The Master of the Workhouse, and the Master, Steward or Superintendent of any such House as aforesaid, shall lay each of the said Accounts before the Guardians at their next meeting after the date of the entry therein of any such certificate as aforesaid.

ARTICLE VIII.—So long as a Stocktaker is appointed it shall not be necessary for the Visiting Committee to examine the stores or to enter in any Account the memorandum required by any General Order or by any other Order applicable to the Aston Union.
