The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS respecting Boy Clerks registered for Temporary Employment in Public Departments.

1. Two Registers of Boy Clerks for temporary employment in Public Departments will be kept by the Civil Service Commissioners.*

2. These Registers will contain the names of boys who, being either natural-born or naturalized British subjects, are certified by the Civil Service Commissioners to be of good health and character, and duly qualified under the following regulations (3 and 4). One Register will contain the names of boys for service in London, Edinburgh, and provincial towns of England, Scotland, and Wales. The other will contain the names of boys for service in Dublin and provincial towns in Ireland.

3. The limits of age are 15 to 16. If an examination begins in one of the first four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of January in that year. If an examination begins in one of the second four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of May in that year. If an examination begins in one of the last four months of any year candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of September in that year.

4. The subjects for examination are:—

1. Handwriting and Orthography.
2. Arithmetic, including Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.
3. English Composition.
4. Copying Manuscript.

And any three of the following, except that not more than two languages may be taken:—

5. Geography.
6. English History.
7. Latin.
8. French.
9. German.
10. Mathematics.
11. Elementary Science.

No candidate will be regarded as qualified who fails to obtain such an aggregate number of
