WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words following, viz.:—

- "Whereas by section three of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted inter alia that all pay, pensions and other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, seaman or marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:
- "And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the tenth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and nine, to sanction an allowance of two shillings and sixpence a day to Officers of the Royal Marines when appointed for charge of Wireless Telegraphy Stations:
- "And whereas Your Majesty was further graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the eighteenth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and nine, to sanction an allowance of two shillings a day to Warrant Telegraphists appointed in charge of a Power Wireless Telegraphy Station:
- "And whereas we are of opinion that the duties and responsibilities of Chief Officers of Coast Guard who are placed in charge of Medium and Low Power Wireless Telegraphy Stations are such as to warrant the grant of additional remuneration:
- "We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the grant of extra pay to Chief Officers of Coast Guard appointed in charge of Medium and Low Power Wireless Telegraphy Stations as follows, such remuneration to cover both Charge Pay and Store Allowance:—

.. 1s. 6d. a day.

.. 1s. 0d. a day.

Chief Officers (including Divisional Chief Officers) in charge of a Low Power Station performing Military work ......

6d. a day.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish of Nether Wasdale, in the county of Cumberland, ten days' previous notice of their intention to make such representation have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the civil parish of Nether Wasdale aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:—

NETHER WASDALE, CUMBERLAND.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Nether Wasdale; and in the churchyard,

except as follows:—

(a) In the walled graves now existing in the said churchyard and belonging or reputed to belong to the Musgrave and Paitson families, burial of the body of one member of the family to which the grave belongs or is reputed to belong, may be allowed subject to the condition that the coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b) In the said churchyard, in grave spaces in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the bodies of Hannah Wilson and William Tyson, at their decease, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall in either case, be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the eighteenth day of April next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said eighteenth day of April.
