Rome, December 27.

THE Count de Thun, who is to Command the Gallies of Malta the next Year, is come hither, and had two Days ago Audience of the Pope. The Ecclesiastical Gallies are fitting out at *Civita Vecchia*, for the assistance of the *Venetians*. Signior Caccia, who is named to be Nuncio in Spain, will part from hence in few Days on his Journey thither. The French Cardinals continue their Negotiation to adjust the Differences that still remain between this Court and that of France.

Venice, Jan. 2. The Doge *Morosini* purposes to set out for the *Levant* presently after *Easter*; In the mean time all imaginable diligence is used in making the new *Levies*, and the other Preparations for the War. The Noble *Petro Zeno* is made Procurator of *St. Mark*, he paying 25000 Ducats for the use of the War. From *Dalmatia* we hear that the *Morlaques* continue their Incursions into the Enemies Territories with good success.

Milan, Jan. 2. Our Governor since his return from *Turin*, has held several Councils of War, and has given Orders to hasten the Recruits and other Levies for augmenting the Forces in the Service of this State. His Excellency has commanded some Troops to march towards *Montferrat* to joyn the Germans quartered there, in order to a more close Blockade of the Garison of *Casal*; and several Wagons were taken the last Week as they were going thither with Provisions and Wood. 'Tis said that new Directions are come from the Court of Spain to hinder the carrying of Corn out of this Duchy into *Suifferland*.

Turin, Jan. 3. The Duke of Savoy is now perfectly recovered, and begins to appear in publick. The French having failed in their late treacherous Design upon *Mondovi*, are now moving towards the Valley of *Aost*, where they threaten to make a ravage, of which advice having been given to his Royal Highness, he has ordered a sufficient reinforcement to be sent thither to protect that Country. This Week 250 Men of the Garison of *Pignerol*, commanded by an Officer of Note, ventured out in the Night to cut some Wood at a place not far from thence, for they suffer much this hard Weather for want of it; but it happened that a party of German Horse from *Vigone* was abroad at the same time, and met the French, who were all either killed or taken; The Germans took likewise all their Wagons drawn by 4 and 6 Oxen apiece.

Warsaw, Dec. 23. On the 21st instant the King of Poland began his Journey from hence to *Grodno* in *Lithuania*, to be present at the General Diet, which will be opened before the end of this Month. From the Frontiers we have advice, That our Troops are so vigilant to se-

cure all the Passes about *Caminiec*, that the Tatars and Moldavians have not yet been able to supply that Garison with Provisions, of which they begin to be in great want.

Vienna, January 7. The last Letters from *Hungary* tell us, That the Ottoman Troops, who drew together lately with a design as 'twas believed to attack *Peter Waradin*, seeing no likelihood of succeeding in it, were separated again, and marching back to their Quarters. The *Radziens* make frequent Incursions upon the Enemy; and one of their Parties seized lately 15 Turkish Boats near *Pescaraba*; and another having passed the *Danube*, advanced almost as far as *Nissa*; and brought back a considerable Booty. The Emperor has sent the Electoral Bonnet to the Duke of *Hanover*. The New Levies are carried on with great vigour.

Frankfort, Jan. 14. Our Magistrates have sent two Deputies to Compliment the Landgrave of *Hesse* upon his late good success in obliging the Enemy to raise the Siege of *Rhinfelt*, and at the same time to regulate some Matters with him concerning the security of this City. The Recruits are made with great diligence for the Confederate Troops, and all Things are preparing for an early Campaigne.

Cologne, January 16. The Conference appointed to be held here by the Ministers of the Confederate Princes, was begun yesterday; Count *Guido of Staremberg* (who is made Governor of *Coblentz*) presiding therein on the part of the Emperor. VVe hear from the *Moselle*, That the French Troops who were employed in the Siege of *Rhinfelt*, are returned to their Quarters, but that they were forced to leave some of their heavy Cannon between *Castellain* and *Montroyal* by reason of the badness of the ways; They are making Preparations at *Trier*, *Montroyal*, and other places on that side, for some new Enterprize, and continue their Violences upon the Country People to compleat their Levies. VVe are told that Magazines are going to be made in this City, *Duren*, and *Aix la Chapelle*, for the use of the Confederate Forces quartered in these Parts.

Paris, Jan. 16. The Duke Administrator of *Wirttemberg* is now at Liberty; but 'tis said he will continue here the rest of this Month. The Prince Royal of *Denmark* arrived yesterday in this City, where he will remain some days *incognito* till his Train and Equipage be in a condition to appear publickly. The two *Tripolins*, taken lately by 3 French Men of VVar in the Channel of *Malta*, carried, one of them 50 Guns, and the other 40; and there were taken on both 460 Turks, and 60 Christians Released. VVe hear from *Flanders*, That the French Troops that were before *Furnes* are returned to their Quarters.

Brussels,

Brussels, Jan. 18. The Troops of this Garrison that marched lately towards *Flanders* returned hither the 16th instant. The *Marquis de Bédmar*, our *Maître de Camp General*, is likewise come back; but the Duke of *Holstein* continues at *Newport*, to Command there. Things are at present very quiet on our Frontiers, but we are told that the Enemy do provide a great number of Bombs, Carcasses, &c. at *Münbeuge* and *Mons*; and they give out that the French King will be there in March. The French have plundered and burnt all the Bourgs and Villages about *Furns*; Their Hospitals are full of sick Soldiers; And the scarcity of Corn encreases daily within the French Dominions; insomuch, That a Bushel of Corn is sold at *Mons* for a Pistol; by reason whereof both the Soldiers and Inhabitants suffer very much. The *Prince de Vandemont* has obtained leave from the King of Spain to retire to *Rome* on account of the ill State of his Health; His Pensions will be continued him; and as we hear they are assigned out of the Revenues of *Naples*.

Hague, Jan. 20. The Baron Van *Heckeren* who was lately at the Courts of *Lunenburg* in the quality of *Envoy Extraordinary* from this State, is arrived with the same Character at that of *Saxony*; from whence 'tis said he has Orders to go to *Sweden*. We have advice, That the Count d'*Acoux* and *Monfieur de Bonropes*, Ambassadors from *France* to *Sweden* and *Denmark*, are arrived at *Dunkirke*, from whence they will continue their Voyage by Sea. On the 17th Sailed out of the *Texel* about 150 Dutch Merchantmen, bound for the *Streights* and other Parts, with a good Convoy.

Plimouth, January 10. Yesterday appeared off of this Harbour the *West India* Fleet, under the Command of Sir *Francis Woeeler*, who came the day before out of *Cowes Road*; and after having lain by for several Ships to joyn them out of this Port, they Sailed again to the Westward with a fair Wind. The same day Sailed from hence the *Minutague*, *Crown*, *Advice*, and four Dutch Men of War to the Westward.

Portsmouth, January 11. Yesterday came to Spithead above 100 Sail of Dutch outward bound Merchant Ships; and this day five Dutch Men of War from the Eastward, one of them a Rear-Admiral. This day likewise Sailed from hence Their Majesties Ships the *Waspsight*, *Defiance*, *St. Albans*, *Bonadventure*, and *Mary Galley*, with the Fleet of English Merchantmen bound to *Bilboa*.

Whitehall, January 12. This day *William Bridgman Esq* was Sworn one of the Clerks of Their Majesties most Honourable Privy Council, in the place of *John Dye Esq* Deceased.
