conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or church-

wardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish of Erbistock, in the county of Denbigh, of the parish of Whickham, in the county of Durham; and of the parish of Stoke Bishop in the city of Bristol, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf have made representations to His Majesty in Council, stating that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in the civil parishes of Erbistock and Whickham, and in the city of Bristol, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued in the said parishes as hereinafter directed.

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the nineteenth day of February last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and ten, and to direct the said Order in Council to be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof to be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within the parishes affected by such representations one month before the said thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and ten.

And whereas the said Order in Council of the nineteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and ten, has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed in the manner directed by the said Order:

Now therefore, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, being authorized thereto by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, doth, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on behalf of His Majesty, order, as it is hereby ordered, that the opening of any new burial-ground in the said civil parishes of Erbistock and Whickham, and in the said city of Bristol, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, be and the same is hereby prohibited and that burials in the said parishes be discontinued as follows, viz.:

Erbistock.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint Hilary, in the parish of Erbistock, in the county of Denbigh; and after the thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the church-yard, as existing on the thirty-first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and ten, with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

(a) In any vault or walled grave new existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or

brickwork properly gemented:

(b) In the said churchyard in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive

right of burial therein; subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the

ground adjoining the grave.

WHICKHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary, in the parish of Whickham, in the county of Durham; and in that portion of the churchyard which existed prior to the year one thousand eighthundred and fifty-three, with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said portion of the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the. condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly

cemented:

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said portion of the said churchyard and being enclosed with a kerb or railing or having a monument upon it, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave; subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

CITY OF BRISTOL.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint Mary Magdalene, in the parish of Stoke Bishop, in the city of Bristol; and in the churchyard, with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or

brickwork properly cemented:

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave; subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground

adjoining the grave:

(c) In the said churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
