Whitehall, May 7th, 1910.

ON Friday night the sixth of May instant, at a quarter to twelve o'clock, our late Most Gracious Sovereign King Edward the Seventh expired at Buckingham Palace in the sixty-ninth year of His age, and the tenth of His Reign. This event has caused one universal feeling of regret and sorrow to His late Majesty's faithful and attached subjects, to whom He was endeared by the deep interest in their welfare which He invariably manifested, as well as by the eminent and impressive virtues which illustrated and adorned His character.

Upon the intimation of this distressing event, the Lords of the Privy Council assembled this day at St. James's Palace, and gave orders for proclaiming His present Majesty, Who made a most Gracious Declaration to them, and caused all the Lords and others of the late King's Privy Council, who were then present, to be sworn of His Majesty's Privy Council.

WHEREAS it has pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lord King Edward the Seventh, of Blessed and Glorious Memory, by whose Decease the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland is solely and rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince George Frederick Ernest Albert: We, therefore, the Lords

Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm, being here assisted with these of His late Majesty's Privy Council, with Numbers of other Principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of London, do now hereby, with one Voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart, publish and proclaim, That the High and Mighty Prince George Frederick Ernest Albert, is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign of Happy Memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord George the Fifth by the Grace of God, King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India; To whom we do acknowledge all Faith and constant Obedience, with all hearty and humble Affection; beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do reign, to bless the Royal Prince George the Fifth with long and happy years to reign over Us.

GOD save the KING.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty being this day present in Council was pleased to make the following Declaration:—

“ My Lords and Gentlemen—

My heart is too full for Me to address you to-day in more than a few words. It is My sorrowful duty to announce to you the death of My dearly loved Father the King. In this irreparable loss which has so suddenly fallen upon Me and upon the whole Empire, I am comforted by the feeling that I have the sympathy of My future subjects, who will mourn with Me for their beloved Sovereign, whose own happiness was found in sharing and promoting theirs. I have lost not only a Father's love, but the affectionate and intimate relations of a dear friend and adviser. No less confident am I in the universal loving sympathy which is assured to My dearest Mother in her overwhelming grief.

Standing here a little more than nine years ago, Our beloved King declared that as long as there was breath in his body He would work for the good and amelioration of His People. I am sure that the opinion of the whole Nation will be that this declaration has been fully carried out.

To endeavour to follow in His footsteps, and at the same time to uphold the constitutional government of these Realms, will be the earnest object of My life. I am deeply sensible of the very heavy responsibilities which have fallen upon Me. I know that I can rely upon Parliament and upon the People of these Islands and of My Dominions beyond the Seas for their help in the discharge of these arduous duties, and for their prayers that God will grant Me strength and guidance. I am encouraged by the knowledge that I have in My dear wife one who will be a constant helpmate in every endeavour for our people's good.”

Whereupon the Lords of the Council made it their humble request to His Majesty that His Majesty's Most Gracious Declaration to Their Lordships might be made public, which His Majesty was pleased to Order accordingly.

We, considering that it is desirable that Friday, the 20th day of May instant, should be observed as mentioned in the 4th section of the statute passed in the 34th year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 17, and as a day of General Mourning throughout the United Kingdom, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Act aforesaid, appoint Friday, the 20th day of May instant, as a special day to be observed in manner provided by the said section, and as a day on which business shall be suspended in terms of the said section. FIRST SCHEDULE.

All that area of land comprising portions of the counties of Somerset, Wilt^s, Dorset, Hants, and Sussex, lying within a line drawn—

On the north, from Banwell, along the road through Sandford, Blagdon, Compton Martin, West Harptree, Litton, Farrington Gurney by Midsomer Norton Railway Station to Radstock, thence along the road through Frome by Chapmanslade to Westbury and thence to Market Lavington, thence following the road in a south-easterly direction to New Farm, thence following the boundary of the War Department land on Salisbury Plain by Urchfont Hill, West Chisenbury, Enford, Fifield to Ludgershall, thence along the road through Weyhill, Andover, Whitchurch, Overton, Basingstoke and thence by Nateley Scures to Hook.

On the east, from Hook, along the road to Odiham, Long Sutton, Well, and by Cheeks Farm to Bentley, thence following the road in a southerly direction through Frithend, Sleaford, Lindford, Stanford, Liphook, Linch, Woolbeding, Midhurst, Cocking, Singleton, to Binderton.

On the south, from Binderton along the road through East Marsden, Chalton, Clanfield, Hambledon, by Broom Farm, Soberton Heath, Woodend, to Wickham, thence following the road through Botley, West End, Swaythling, Chilworth, to Romsey, thence along the road through Sherfield English, Whiteparish, Redlynch, to Downton, thence crossing the river Avon, and following the road in a southerly direction to Fordingbridge, and thence recrossing the river to Ringwood, and by the Christchurch-road, through Sopley to Purewell and Mudeford, thence following a line drawn round the coast (excluding Portland) to West Bay, at the mouth of the Brit River (near Bridport).

On the west, from West Bay along the road to Bridport, thence following the road through Symondsbury, Broad Oak, Broad Orchard, Duckpool, Bettiscombe to Birdsmoor Gate, thence following the road in a northerly direction by Racedown Farm, Blackdown, Horn Ash, Clapton, to Crewkerne, thence along the road through Martock, Long Sutton, Somerton, Compton, Street, to Glastonbury, thence along the road in a westerly direction through Meare, Edington Burtle, to Mark, thence by the road through Tarnock to Lower Weare, and thence

past Bishop Compton to Dunnett Farm, Webbington, Barton, Rhodyate Farm to Banwell, and which area, surrounded on all sides by a red line, is delineated on a map signed by one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, copies of which are deposited in the War Office and the Privy Council Office.

All that area of land comprising that portion of the county of Hants known as the Isle of Wight.

ORDER of the Local Government Board:
Motor Car Act, 1903: Regulations under Section 9 (1).

COUNTY OF THE PARTS OF KESTEVEN.

Parish of Great Gonerby.

To the County Council of the Parts of Kesteven;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

And whereas the County Council of the Parts of Kesteven, having made application to Us to make a Regulation in pursuance of the said sub-section putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising a part of a main road situate in the parish of Great Gonerby, within the county of the Parts of Kesteven, We directed a Local Inquiry to be held into the matter by one of Our Inspectors, and the Inquiry was held accordingly, and Report has been made to Us thereon:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us in that behalf, We do, by this Our Order, make the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—The provisions of sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Act with respect to the driving of a motor car at a speed not exceeding ten miles per hour shall apply and have effect within the limits comprising so much of the Great North-road within the village of Great Gonerby as extends from a point situate 100 yards south of St. Sebastian's Church to a point opposite the Rutland Arms Inn.

ARTICLE II.—These regulations shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and ten.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 22ND APRIL 1910.)

FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Interpretation.

1. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894:

“Cattle” means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves:

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine:

“Carcase” means the carcase of an animal, and includes part of a carcase, and the meat, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part of an animal, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof:

“Scheduled country” means a country or part of a country included in the First Schedule to this Order:

“Foreign” applied to animals and things, means brought to the United Kingdom from any country out of the United Kingdom, and “foreign country” includes any such country:

“Foreign Animals Wharf” means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board for the landing of foreign animals subject to slaughter at the port of landing:

“Person” includes a body corporate:

“Port” includes place:

“Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf” includes a foreman or wharfinger or other person in charge of a Foreign Animals Wharf:

“Market authority” means the person in occupation of a Foreign Animals Wharf, whether as owner, lessee, or otherwise:

“Reception-lair” means a lair adjacent or near to the place of landing which is set apart for the reception of any animals immediately after landing for the purpose of their examination:

“Lairage-men” means men specially appointed by the market authority for the purpose of landing animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf and feeding and watering and tending them in a reception-lair:

“Disease” means cattle-plague (that is to say, rinderpest, or the disease commonly called cattle-plague), contagious pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, sheep-scab, or swine-fever:

“Fodder” means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals:

“Litter” means straw or other substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals:

“Master” includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

CHAPTER 1.—ANIMALS NOT INTENDED TO BE
LANDED AT A FOREIGN ANIMALS WHARF.

Prohibition of bringing Cattle, Sheep, Goats, or Swine from Scheduled Country into a Port in Great Britain.

2. It shall not be lawful, except under the authority of a licence granted by the Board and subject to any conditions thereby imposed, to bring into a port in Great Britain any cattle, sheep, goats, or swine brought from a port in a scheduled country, but this Article shall not apply to any vessel not bound to a port in Great Britain which comes into a port under stress of weather or for repairs or for any purpose other than the delivery or shipment of cargo.

Conditions applicable to Vessels while in port.

3. In the case of any cattle, sheep, goats, or swine brought into a port in Great Britain from a port in a scheduled country, the following conditions shall apply while the vessel is in the port, namely:—

(i) The animals shall not, except under the authority of a licence granted by the Board and subject to any conditions thereby imposed, be removed from the vessel in which they are brought to Great Britain, and then only in accordance with the provisions of the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and this Order.

(ii) Except where the licence otherwise provides, the animals shall not be removed from the vessel until they have been examined by a Veterinary Surgeon on behalf of the Board, and any Inspector of the Board or Veterinary Surgeon employed for that purpose by the Board shall be permitted to examine the animals at such time or times as he may require.

(iii) No person, except Inspectors of the Board, Officers of Customs and Excise, and persons while actually engaged in tending the animals or cleansing or disinfecting the pens, shall enter a pen in which the animals are, or have recently been kept, until the pen has been cleansed and disinfected.

(iv) Every person upon leaving a pen in which the animals are or have recently been kept shall thoroughly wash his hands with soap and water and disinfect his boots with a five per cent solution of carbolic acid, and every such person landing from the vessel in Great Britain shall take such other steps as may be necessary to disinfect his clothes.

(v) The vessel shall, from time to time as and when required by notice signed by an Inspector of the Board, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:—

(a) All parts of the vessel with which the animals or their dung have come in contact shall be scraped and swept and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected in the manner prescribed by this Order.

(b) All fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about the animals shall be scraped and then cleansed and disinfected in the same manner.

- (c) While any part of the vessel is being cleansed or disinfected all animals shall be temporarily removed therefrom.
- (vi) While the vessel remains in any port in Great Britain, all dung of the animals, and all litter, scrapings and sweepings removed from the pens, shall at intervals not exceeding twenty-four hours be thoroughly mixed with quicklime and thereafter without delay either be destroyed by fire on board the vessel or be disposed of as an Inspector of the Board may direct.

Prohibition of landing of Animals from certain Foreign Countries.

4.—(1.) It shall not be lawful to land in Great Britain any animal brought from a port in a scheduled country.

(2.) It shall not be lawful to land in Great Britain any animal exported from the Cape Verd Islands, Madeira, the Azores or the Canary Islands.

Prohibition of landing of Swine from the United States of America.

5. It shall not be lawful to land in Great Britain any swine brought from a port in the United States of America.

Prohibition of Landing of Carcases, &c.

6.—(1.) It shall not be lawful to land in Great Britain—

- (a.) a carcase of an animal which has died or been slaughtered on board a vessel while in a port in a scheduled country or during the passage from any such port to Great Britain or thereafter while in any port in Great Britain; or
 - (b.) the dung of any such animal; or
 - (c.) any partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to any such animal; or
 - (d.) any litter that has been used for or about any such animal; or
 - (e.) any fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about any such animal unless they have been scraped and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected in the manner prescribed by this Order, and unless the permission of an Inspector of the Board for the landing thereof has been obtained.
- (2.) The Principal Officer of Customs and Excise may seize and detain any carcase, dung, fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils landed in contravention of this Article, and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, who may give such directions as they think fit for the destruction or disposal thereof.

CHAPTER 2.—TRANSHIPMENT.

Transshipment.

7.—(1.) Foreign animals shall not be transhipped in a port in Great Britain otherwise than in accordance with this Article or under the authority of a licence granted by the Board and subject to any conditions thereby imposed.

(2.) Transshipment, otherwise than under the authority of a licence granted by the Board, shall not take place in any dock except with the special permission of the Principal Officer of Customs and Excise or of some person authorised to act on his behalf, and such special permission shall be given only when on account of the state of the tide or for some other

special circumstance transshipment otherwise than in a dock is impracticable or inexpedient. Where such special permission has not been obtained the master of the vessel in which the animals are imported shall give all facilities for the transshipment of the animals before the vessel enters any dock in Great Britain.

(3.) Animals intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf may be transhipped from the vessel in which they are imported to a landing-vessel provided by the port authority or market authority, if the use of the vessel for such purpose has previously been sanctioned by the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, either generally or in the particular instance.

(4.) The animals shall be transhipped in the presence and under the supervision and control of an Officer of Customs and Excise, and an Officer of Customs and Excise shall remain in charge of the animals on board the landing-vessel until its arrival at the Foreign Animals Wharf.

(5.) The landing-vessel shall proceed direct to the Foreign Animals Wharf, and the animals shall be landed there in the presence and under the supervision and control of an Officer of Customs and Excise.

(6.) The landing-vessel shall not be used for any other purpose during the time of its being so appropriated.

(7.) All parts of the landing-vessel with which the animals or their dung have come in contact shall immediately after each occasion of use, and before being again used, be scraped and swept, and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected in the manner prescribed by this Order.

(8.) The scrapings and sweepings of the landing-vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

(9.) Animals transhipped under this Article shall continue to be deemed foreign animals.

CHAPTER 3.—ANIMALS INTENDED TO BE LANDED AT A FOREIGN ANIMALS WHARF.

Landing of Foreign Animals not brought from a Scheduled Country and destined for a Foreign Animals Wharf in Great Britain.

8.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals, the landing of which in Great Britain is not prohibited by this Order, is hereby made subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board an animal exported or carried coastwise from a port in a scheduled country.

Second. That the vessel has not within twenty-one days before taking on board the animals imported or at any time since taking them on board, entered or been in a port in a scheduled country.

Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with an animal exported or carried coastwise from a port in a scheduled country.

(2.) Animals shall not be landed unless and until the master of the vessel in which they are imported has on the occasion of such importation delivered to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise or their proper officer, a declaration made and signed that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Charge of Animals on Landing at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

9.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, when landed, be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to move any animals so long as they remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise or of an Inspector of the Board except with the permission of the Commissioners or of the Inspector, as the case may be.

Disposal of Animals on Landing.

10. Animals when landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be driven by lairage-men to the nearest available reception-lair or lairs within the limits of the Wharf, there to await the examination of an Inspector of the Board, and, until so examined, shall not be allowed to come in contact with any animals other than those forming part of the same cargo.

Examination of Animals.

11.—(1.) The animals shall be examined in a reception-lair by an Inspector of the Board during daylight.

(2.) If on such examination all the animals are found to be free from disease, the Inspector of the Board may permit the animals to be retained in such lair, which shall thereupon cease to be a reception-lair, or he may permit them to be moved out of such lair and into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the market authority or its officers or the Inspector of the Board shall direct or permit.

(3.) In the case of a cargo of animals landed or intended to be landed at different times or different ports in Great Britain, an Inspector of the Board may cause the animals in a reception-lair to be there detained until he has examined, or become acquainted with the result of the examination of, the rest of the cargo.

Time for Slaughter.

12.—(1.) The owner of an animal landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall cause the same to be slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, in accordance with the provisions of this Article.

(2.) The slaughter of the animals may be commenced at any time after the landing thereof with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) The slaughter of the animals shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as an Inspector of the Board in any case may direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

(4.) Where an Inspector of the Board for any reason considers that an animal should be forthwith slaughtered and shall so direct, the animal shall be slaughtered accordingly.

Restrictions on Access to Foreign Animals Wharf

13.—(1.) No person, except officers of Customs and Excise, lairage-men, the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf, Inspectors of the Board, and such other persons as may be specially authorised in writing by an Inspector of the Board, shall during the time of the landing of the animals enter upon the landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf at which the animals are landed, and no person except as aforesaid shall at any time enter upon any part of the Wharf which is being used as a reception-lair.

(2.) No person shall during the landing of the animals enter upon the part of the Wharf at which the animals are landed or at any time enter a reception-lair unless he is wearing suitable overall coat and leggings, and every person who enters such part of a Wharf or reception-lair shall forthwith after leaving the same remove his overall clothes, and thoroughly wash his hands with soap and water and disinfect his boots.

(3.) Overall clothes shall not be removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf unless and until they have been thoroughly disinfected.

(4.) Any person desiring to enter a Foreign Animals Wharf may be required by any officer authorised in writing in that behalf by the market authority to state the nature of the business necessitating such entry, and if he declines to make such statement, or if the officer requiring such statement is not satisfied as to the correctness of the same, or that the business necessitates his entry, the officer so authorised may prohibit his entry into the Wharf.

(5.) The market authority shall give notice of the provisions of this Article by placards, which shall be kept affixed at or near the entrance of any landing-stage, pier, quay, reception-lair, or other part of the Wharf to which access is for the time being restricted by this Article.

Power to exclude Persons.

14.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof or of any building therein, a notice forbidding persons to enter therein without the permission mentioned in the notice; and thereupon any person who enters or goes into, on, or over such premises without that permission shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf, is hereby empowered to direct any person to quit such Wharf, or any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion thereof; and thereupon any person who fails to quit such premises on direction as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Provision of Overall Clothes.

15. The market authority shall at all times provide to the satisfaction of the Board suitable overall coats and leggings for the use of lairage-men and other persons entering the Wharf.

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

16. An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf, may affix at or near the entrance of the Wharf or any building therein a notice to the effect that persons before entering such Wharf or building, or before leaving such Wharf or building as may be stated in the notice, will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

Regulations in case of Detection of Disease in Foreign Animals Wharf.

17. If it appears to an Inspector of the Board that disease exists or has lately existed in a reception-lair, or in any particular building, slaughter-house, or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf, all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, building, slaughter-

house, or other part of a Wharf shall be there detained by the Inspector of the Board or shall be moved to such other part of the Wharf as he shall direct or permit, and the same shall be dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Inspector of the Board.

Food and Water.

18.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, until they are taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the market authority or the person in charge of the animals with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water, and the expenses incurred by them in respect thereof shall be recoverable by such authority or person from the owners or consignees in any court of competent jurisdiction.

(2.) The animals shall, after they have been taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the owners or consignees with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water.

(3.) The food supplied to sucking-calves in accordance with this Article shall be gruel or milk or other proper food.

(4.) If an animal remains without a proper and sufficient supply of food or water in contravention of this Article, the market authority, and the owner and the consignee and the person in charge of the animal, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894; and it shall lie on the person liable to supply food and water to the animal when charged to prove the proper and sufficient supply of food or water or both and the time when the same was so supplied.

Movement of Carcases, Manure, &c.

19.—(1.) No carcase, offal, fodder, litter, dung or manure shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) All dung and manure shall, before being so removed, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) If an Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such carcase or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Inspector.

Removal of Fittings &c. from Foreign Animals Wharf.

20.—(1.) Fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils that have been used for or about animals and have been landed from a vessel at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be removed from such Wharf unless they have been scraped and subsequently disinfected in the manner prescribed by this Order, and unless the permission of an Inspector of the Board for the removal thereof has been obtained.

(2.) If an Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Inspector.

Disinfection of Foreign Animals Wharf.

21. An Inspector of the Board may give notice in writing to the market authority or Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf requiring the cleansing and disinfection of any portion of the Wharf by such market authority, and when such notice shall have been given, that portion of

the Wharf shall not be used for animals unless and until it has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Foreign Animals Wharf.

22.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals shall at any time be landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Wharf.

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the provisions of this Order shall apply to such animal accordingly.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be used for any purpose other than the purposes authorised by the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, or any Order of the Board under the said Acts in relation thereto.

CHAPTER 4.—LANDING, DISINFECTION, AND DISPOSAL OF DUNG, FODDER, LITTER, FITTINGS, AND OTHER THINGS.

Landing subject to Customs Regulations.

23. All dung of animals carried from a foreign country, and all fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about such animals, and all other dung, fodder, or litter brought in the same vessel with such animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Customs and Excise direct.

Regulations as to Landing and Disinfection of Dung, Fodder &c.

24.—(1.) Dung of animals carried from a foreign country, and partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall not be landed at any place without the previous consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate.

(2.) All other fodder and litter brought in the same vessel with animals carried from a foreign country may be landed without the previous consent of the Local Authority, but, shall, when landed, remain under the charge of an Officer of Customs and Excise, and such fodder and litter shall not be removed from the place of landing except with the permission in writing of an Officer of Customs and Excise.

(3.) Fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about animals carried from a foreign country shall not be landed at any place without the previous consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate unless they have been scraped and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected in the manner prescribed by this Order. If landed with such consent without having been so previously cleansed and disinfected they shall be forthwith cleansed and disinfected in the manner aforesaid by and at the expense of the owner, and shall not be removed or permitted to come in contact with animals until so cleansed and disinfected.

(4.) All dung of animals carried from a foreign country, and all partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and all litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall, when landed, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(5.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to any such dung, fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

CHAPTER 5.—DISINFECTION OF VESSELS, MOVEABLE GANGWAYS, AND OTHER APPARATUS.

Disinfection of Vessels.

25.—(1.) In the case of a vessel from which animals carried from a foreign country have been landed in Great Britain, each compartment of the vessel shall, after the landing of the animals therefrom, and before any animal or cargo is placed in that compartment, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

- (i.) All parts of the compartment with which the animals or their dung have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected in the manner prescribed by this Order;
- (ii.) All fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about the animals shall, if not removed from the vessel, be scraped, and then cleansed and disinfected in the same manner.

(2.) Each part of the vessel with which the animals or their dung have come in contact, and all fittings, pens, hurdles, and utensils, used for or about animals, shall be cleansed and disinfected in accordance with the provisions of this Article before any other animal or any cargo is allowed to come in contact therewith.

(3.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel shall not be landed unless they have been well mixed with quicklime, and when landed they shall be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Disinfection of Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

26.—(1.) A moveable gangway, passage-way, cage, or other apparatus, used or intended for the loading or unloading on or from a vessel of animals carried from a foreign country, or otherwise used in connection with the transit of such animals, shall, so soon as practicable after being so used, be scraped and swept, and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water and subsequently disinfected in the manner prescribed by this Article.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, litter, and other matter so removed shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Disinfection of Vessels arriving in Great Britain after Discharge of Animals.

27. In the case of a vessel from which animals carried from a foreign country have been landed elsewhere than in Great Britain, this Chapter shall apply when the vessel arrives in a port in Great Britain, if and so far as its requirements have not already been complied with.

CHAPTER 6.—PROTECTION OF ANIMALS.

Protection of Animals.

28. This Chapter shall apply in the case of every vessel in or on which foreign animals intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf are carried to a port in Great Britain.

(Parts of Vessel to be used.)

(i.) Animals shall not be carried on more than three decks unless a licence from the Board has been previously obtained exempting the vessel from this requirement.

(ii.) Animals shall not be carried on any hatch above a compartment where other animals are carried, or on any hatch the coamings of which exceed eighteen inches in height.

(iii.) Animals shall not be carried in any part of the vessel where, in ordinary course of navigation, they would interfere with the proper management or ventilation of the vessel, or with the efficient working of the boats.

(Pens and Fittings of Vessels.)

(iv.) All animals shall be carried in pens.

(v.) No pen shall exceed eleven feet in length and nine feet in breadth, and each pen shall be constructed in such a manner, and with materials of such character and strength as to be able to withstand the action of the weather, and to resist the weight of the animals thrown against it.

(vi.) Ship's fittings likely to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to animals shall be properly and securely fenced off.

(vii.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be fitted with suitable battens or other proper footholds which shall be securely fastened to the deck by angle iron plates or otherwise, and shall be strewn with a proper quantity of sand or other suitable substance.

(viii.) Animals while on board a vessel shall be protected against injury or unnecessary suffering from undue exposure to the weather.

(Space for Animals.)

(ix.) Sufficient space shall be allotted in every pen to enable the animals therein properly to feed and rest during the voyage.

(Overcrowding.)

(x.) The vessel shall not be overcrowded in any part or pen so as to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to the animals therein.

(Passage-Ways.)

(xi.) Between every two rows of animals, and in front of every single row of animals, there shall be a passage-way of a minimum width of one foot and six inches, which passage-way shall be kept free of obstruction.

(Ventilation.)

(xii.) All parts of the vessel on which animals are carried shall be sufficiently and suitably ventilated. All such parts if below deck shall, in addition to any ventilation obtained by means of the hatchways, be provided with sufficient and suitable ventilators for the removal of foul air and for the admission of a proper supply of fresh air to all the animals carried.

(Light.)

(xiii.) Arrangements shall be made for the provision at all times of adequate light for the proper tending of the animals.

(Food and Water.)

(xiv.) When animals are carried on a vessel for a voyage which on an average takes more than eighteen hours, they shall be provided while on

board with a sufficient amount of food and water, and proper accommodation shall be provided on board for the stowage of food so that the same shall not be unduly exposed to the weather.

(Securing of Cattle.)

(xv.) All cattle, whether polled or not, while being carried on a vessel shall be securely tied by the head or neck in such manner as not to cause unnecessary suffering and so as to stand athwartships.

(Approaches, Gangways, and other Apparatus.)

(xvi.) Approaches, gangways, passage-ways, cages, and other apparatus used for the landing of animals from a vessel shall be so constructed that injury or unnecessary suffering shall not be caused to the animals.

(Attendance.)

(xvii.) The vessel shall, in addition to the ordinary crew, carry a sufficient number of qualified attendants to tend the animals properly; and every consignment of cattle shall be in charge of a responsible foreman, who shall have under him competent assistants numbering with himself one for every twenty-five head of cattle; and proper and suitable accommodation for all these persons shall be provided.

(Injured Animals.)

(xviii.) If any animal on board a vessel has a limb broken or is otherwise seriously injured, the master of the vessel shall forthwith cause that animal to be slaughtered unless he is satisfied that it can be kept alive and led away without cruelty.

CHAPTER 7.—SPECIAL PROVISIONS IN EVENT OF A COUNTRY OR PART OF COUNTRY BEING DECLARED BY SUBSEQUENT ORDER TO BE A SCHEDULED COUNTRY FOR PURPOSES OF THIS ORDER.

Landing at Foreign Animals Wharf.

29. In the event of a country or part of a country being declared by subsequent Order of the Board to be a scheduled country for the purposes of this Order, animals carried in a vessel leaving the scheduled country before the commencement of such subsequent Order may, notwithstanding the provisions of Article 4 of this Order, be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf in Great Britain in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter, but not otherwise.

Special Provision as to Animals destined for Manchester Foreign Animals Wharf.

30. The animals if intended to be landed at the Manchester Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be carried through the Eastham Lock until they have been examined by an Inspector of the Board, and unless and until the Inspector certifies that his examination and information do not show that there is, or during the voyage has been, an animal on board affected with foot-and-mouth disease.

Inspection by Inspector of the Board.

31. An Inspector of the Board shall be permitted to examine the animals on board the vessel in which they are brought to Great Britain at such time or times as he may require, and the animals shall not be landed or transhipped until they have been so examined.

Duty of Master of Vessel to report Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

32. If any animal taken on board any vessel for conveyance to Great Britain has during the voyage been affected with foot-and-mouth disease, the master of the vessel shall as soon as possible report the fact to the Inspector of the Board who examines the animals.

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

33. Unless and until an Inspector of the Board certifies that his examination and information do not show that there is, or during the voyage has been, an animal on board affected with foot-and-mouth disease, every person before landing in Great Britain from the vessel, shall, unless he lands at a Foreign Animals Wharf, effectually wash and disinfect himself, and change or effectually disinfect his clothes, so as to prevent the introduction or spread of foot-and-mouth disease by him or his clothes.

Landing or Transhipment subject to Permission of Inspector.

34. The animals shall not be landed or transhipped except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board, which permission will only be given when the Inspector is satisfied that sufficient lairage and other accommodation is available for the landing and slaughter of the animals in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

Transhipment.

35. The animals, if so required by an Inspector of the Board, shall be transhipped into vessels approved for such purpose by an Inspector of the Board. Any vessel so used shall be cleansed and disinfected by the owner thereof in such manner as shall be required by an Inspector of the Board.

Landing, &c., at Specified Part of Wharf only.

36. The animals shall be landed only at such part of the Foreign Animals Wharf as an Inspector of the Board may direct, and when landed shall be driven by lairage-men specially appointed for this purpose to such lairs within the limits of the Wharf as may be specially approved for that purpose by an Inspector of the Board.

Slaughter of Animals.

37. After such examination as may be required by an Inspector of the Board, the animals shall either be slaughtered immediately in the lairs in which they then are, or they may, with the permission of an Inspector of the Board, be moved forthwith to a slaughter-house in the Wharf specially approved for that purpose by an Inspector of the Board and there immediately slaughtered.

Special Disinfection of Vessel in event of Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

38. If an Inspector of the Board certifies that there is, or during the voyage has been, an animal on board the vessel affected with foot-and-mouth disease, then after all animals shall have been landed the vessel shall, if instructions to such effect be given by an Inspector of the Board, proceed to sea for a preliminary cleansing and disinfection of the parts of the vessel used for animals, subject to such supervision as the Board may require, and in accordance with any instructions given by an Inspector of the Board.

Disposal of Fittings.

39. Any fittings used in connection with the animals shall, if so required by an Inspector of the Board, be landed and burnt at such time and place and in such manner as an Inspector of the Board may direct.

Disposal of Dung, Fodder, &c.

40. The dung of the animals brought in the vessel, and any fodder or litter brought in the vessel, and the fittings, pens, hurdles or utensils used for or about the animals, shall not be landed in Great Britain, except at a Foreign Animals Wharf, unless the Board for some exceptional cause by licence otherwise permit. For the landing thereof at a Foreign Animals Wharf the previous consent of the Superintendent of the Wharf shall be obtained.

CHAPTER 8.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Prescribed manner of Disinfection.

41. The prescribed manner of disinfection to be adopted under this Order shall be as follows:—

- (i) The place or thing, or the part thereof required to be disinfected, shall be thoroughly washed with—
 - (a) a one per cent. (minimum) solution of chloride of lime containing not less than thirty per cent of available chlorine; or
 - (b) a five per cent. (minimum) solution of carbolic acid (containing not less than ninety-five per cent. of actual carbolic acid), followed by a thorough sprinkling with limewash; or
 - (c) a disinfectant equal in disinfective efficiency to the above-mentioned solution of carbolic acid, followed by a thorough sprinkling with limewash.
- (ii) The application of limewash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of a vessel as are used for passengers or the crew.

Animals Dying on Voyage.

42.—(1.) If on a vessel arriving at a port in Great Britain from a foreign country an animal taken on board for the purpose of importation has died or been slaughtered during the voyage, the master of the vessel shall, immediately on arrival at the place of discharge, report the fact to the proper Officer of Customs and Excise at the port.

(2.) The carcase shall not be landed or discharged from the vessel without the permission in writing of the Officer.

General Power of Detention.

43. If it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs and Excise with respect to any foreign animal, or with respect to any foreign carcase, fodder, litter, dung, or other thing, that disease may be thereby introduced, he may seize and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof or for the delivery

thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof), as they think fit.

Duties of Local Authority and Police.

44. The Local Authority and their officers and all constables and police officers shall assist the Inspectors of the Board to carry into effect and enforce this Order, and shall do or cause to be done all things necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

Exemption of Certain Animals.

45. This Order shall not apply in relation to animals brought to Great Britain from the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man or to animals to be landed at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, provision as to which is made by separate Orders of the Board.

Offences.

46.—(1.) If any animal, carcase, dung, fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils, or other thing shall be brought into a port or transhipped or landed or moved in contravention of this Order or of the conditions of a licence granted under this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing or other place where or from which such animal, carcase, or other thing is landed or moved, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the bringing into port or transshipment or landing or movement, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the same is brought or from which the same is transhipped or landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any person, whose entry into a Foreign Animals Wharf or any part of a Wharf is prohibited, enters or attempts to enter into such Wharf or part of a Wharf he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which, and the owner of the gangway or passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which, and the market authority of the Foreign Animals Wharf in which, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which, as the case may be, the same is done or omitted to be done, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If any animal is not slaughtered in accordance with the provisions of this Order, the person failing to cause such slaughter shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(6.) If anything is done or omitted to be done with respect to any vessel or any animals thereon in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the same is done or omitted to be done, shall, each

according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation of Orders.

47. The Orders described in the Second Schedule to this Order are hereby revoked.

Commencement.

48. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and eleven.

Short Title.

49. This Order may be cited as the FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1910.

**THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS,
1894 TO 1909.**

BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 5TH MAY 1910.)

SHEEP-SCAB (NORTH CARDIGANSHIRE
AND MACHYNLLETH DISTRICT) ORDER
OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Order.

1.—(1.) This Order applies to the Area described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the Dipping Area") and the restrictions hereby imposed are substituted for those in force under the Orders hereby revoked.

(2.) Any parts of the administrative county of Montgomery to which the Sheep-Scab (Montgomeryshire) (Machynlleth District) Order of 1909 applied and which are not comprised within the Dipping Area to which this Order applies shall form part of the Area to which the Sheep-Scab (Denbighshire, Flintshire, and Montgomeryshire) Order of 1909 applies, and that Order and any Order amending it shall apply to such parts accordingly.

PART I.

MOVEMENT OF SHEEP OUT OF DIPPING AREA,
AND EXPOSURE AT MARKETS &c. WITHIN
DIPPING AREA.*Restriction on Movement of Sheep out of Dipping
Area throughout the Year.*

2.—(1.) Sheep shall not (except as hereinafter provided) be moved out of the Dipping Area unless—

(i.) they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted: or

(ii.) they are moved direct to a slaughter-house having previous to such movement been marked by the painting or stamping with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each sheep thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(2.) Sheep moved under this Article to a slaughter-house shall after their arrival thereat be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Special Facilities for Movement of Wintered Sheep.

3.—(1.) The preceding Article shall not apply to the return movement of sheep which have been moved for wintering purposes to premises in the Dipping Area, if such return movement is authorised by a licence granted under this Article.

(2.) The place of destination shall be the premises from which the sheep were moved for wintering purposes, or other premises in the same occupation, and shall be specified in the licence.

(3.) A licence may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate, in accordance with any instructions of the Local Authority, and may contain such conditions as to dipping and

isolating the sheep after their arrival at the place of destination as the Local Authority direct.

(4.) A licence shall not be granted except upon production to the Inspector of a declaration, signed by the person under whose charge the sheep have been wintered, to the effect (a) that the sheep are not affected with, or suspected of, sheep-scab, (b) that neither the sheep to which the declaration relates nor any other sheep on any of the premises whereon the sheep have been wintered have been affected with sheep-scab while the sheep to which the declaration relates were kept thereon, and (c) that to the best of his knowledge and belief the sheep to which the declaration relates have not been exposed to the infection of sheep-scab.

(5.) A declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting a licence thereon.

(6.) A licence shall be in force for six days inclusive of the day of issue.

*Restriction on Exposure of Sheep at Markets, &c.,
within Dipping Area between 31st July and 1st
November.*

4. Between the thirty-first day of July and the first day of November in any year, sheep shall not (except as hereinafter provided) be permitted to enter, or be exposed for sale or exhibition in, any market, fairground, saleyard, or place of exhibition in the Dipping Area unless they are accompanied by a licence (in this Order referred to as a "market licence") granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted.

*Conditions affecting the grant of Movement and
Market Licences.*

5.—(1.) A movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence may be granted by an Inspector upon production to him of

(a) a certificate, in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect, showing that the sheep to be moved have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in accordance with the requirements of this Order; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, to the effect that the sheep to be moved are sheep referred to in the certificate and that since the dipping the sheep have been kept separate while in the Dipping Area from other sheep not so dipped.

(2.) A movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence may also be granted by an Inspector upon production to him of

(a) a certificate by a duly qualified veterinary surgeon to the effect that he has within ten days before the licence is granted examined each of the sheep to be moved, and found it to be free from sheep-scab; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, to the effect that since such examination the sheep have been kept separate from other sheep, and have not been exposed in any market, fairground, saleyard or exhibition.

A licence under this paragraph shall only be granted where, in the opinion of the Inspector granting it, compliance with paragraph (1.) is impracticable or inexpedient.

(3.) A declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting a licence thereon. A certificate shall also be so retained unless it refers to more sheep than are proposed to be moved, in which case a note shall be made thereon and initialled by the Inspector who grants the licence, stating the number of the sheep for which the licence is granted.

(4.) The licence shall be in force for six days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

(5.) A copy of the licence shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the Local Authority of the District in which is situate the place of destination specified in the licence, if such place is situate in another District.

(6.) A movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence shall not be granted except in accordance with this Article.

Dipping necessary to obtain Movement Licences under Article 2.

6.—(1.) If a movement licence under Article 2 is available for any day between the thirty-first day of July and the first day of November the sheep to be moved must have been dipped twice on separate dates with an interval of not more than twenty-eight days between the two dates, and the second dipping must have taken place within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

(2.) If a movement licence under Article 2 is available for any day between the thirty-first day of October and the first day of August, or if it relates to sheep which have within seven days before the licence is granted been moved into the Dipping Area with a market licence, the sheep to be moved must have been dipped once within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

Dipping necessary to obtain Market Licences.

7.—(1.) If a market licence relates to sheep on premises situate within the Dipping Area, they must have been dipped twice on separate dates with an interval of not more than twenty-eight days between the two dates, and the second dipping must have taken place within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

(2.) If a market licence relates to sheep on premises situate outside the Dipping Area, they must have been dipped once within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

Special Provisions as to Lambs.

8. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority is satisfied that any lambs are intended for immediate slaughter and that it is impracticable or inexpedient that the same should in accordance with this Order be dipped before movement for such purpose, or that the lambs are to be moved direct to a slaughter-house, he may, subject to any directions by the Local Authority, by licence authorise the movement of the lambs to any market, fairground, saleyard, or other premises, whether in the Dipping Area, or not, subject to such conditions (if any) as are inserted in the licence, and thereupon the lambs may be moved in accordance with such licence and conditions, and be exposed for sale in the market, fairground, or saleyard, free from any restrictions imposed by any Order of the Board. Provided that an Inspector of the Local Authority shall not issue any such licence for movement to premises in the District of another Local Authority unless the consent of such Local Authority, either generally or in the particular instance, has been previously obtained. This

Article does not apply to lambs more than nine months old.

Power to grant Exemption from One of the Two Dippings prescribed for Sheep to be moved out of Dipping Area or to Markets, &c., within Dipping Area.

9.—(1.) Where the Local Authority are satisfied that a particular farm or holding in their District has been free from sheep-scab for a period of three years or longer, and that sheep on such farm or holding are not exposed to the risk of infection by contact with sheep on other premises, the Local Authority may, on application by the occupier of such farm or holding, and on production of such evidence as may be required, exempt sheep on such farm or holding from the earlier of the two dippings necessary under this Order to obtain a movement licence or market licence. The Local Authority shall not grant an exemption in any case where it might increase the risk of the spread of sheep-scab.

(2.) Every exemption shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority and a copy shall be sent to the Board by the Local Authority.

(3.) An exemption may at any time be terminated by an Inspector of the Board by a notice signed by him and served on the occupier of the farm or holding to which the exemption relates, but not so as to affect the legality of anything done under the exemption before service of such notice of termination.

Conditions affecting Movement in case of Exemption.

10. An applicant for a movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence for sheep on exempted premises must produce to the Inspector the exemption, and a declaration by the occupier of the premises or his duly authorised agent to the effect (a) that the sheep to be moved are not affected with, or suspected of, sheep-scab, (b) that no sheep on the exempted premises has been affected with sheep-scab since the exemption was granted, and (c) that to the best of his knowledge and belief the sheep to which the declaration relates have not been exposed to the infection of sheep-scab.

PART II.

ANNUAL COMPULSORY DIPPING.

Returns by Owners of Sheep in Dipping Area on 1st August.

11.—(1.) Every owner of sheep in the Dipping Area shall, on the first day of August in each year, or as soon after that date as may be practicable, send by post or deliver to the Clerk of the Local Authority a return showing the name or description of the farm or holding or other premises in the Dipping Area upon which the sheep are, the description of his sheep on such farm or holding or other premises, on the first day of August, and the number of such sheep so far as such number can reasonably be ascertained.

(2.) The owner of any sheep brought into the Dipping Area between the said date and the first day of November in each year, shall send or deliver a similar return relating to the sheep so brought into the Area.

(3.) Every return shall be made on a form approved by the Local Authority, who shall provide forms for this purpose to owners of sheep applying therefor.

Dipping of all Sheep in Dipping Area between 31st July and 1st November.

12.—(1.) The owner of any sheep in the Dipping Area between the thirty-first day of

July and the first day of November in each year (hereinafter referred to as "the prescribed dipping period"), shall, subject to the next following Article, cause the same to be dipped twice between those dates, with an interval of not more than twenty-eight days between the dippings by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip.

(2.) The dippings shall be carried out on such dates, at such dipping places, and in such manner as shall be required by a Notice signed by an Inspector of the Local Authority, and served by post, or otherwise, on the owner or person in charge of the sheep referred to in the Notice.

(3.) All sheep after having been dipped shall during the remainder of the prescribed dipping period be kept isolated, as far as practicable, from sheep which have not been so dipped.

Exemptions from Compulsory Dipping.

13.—(1.) The provisions of this Order requiring the dipping of all sheep during the prescribed dipping period shall not apply to sheep moved out of the Dipping Area under and in accordance with the provisions of this Order, or slaughtered within the Area, during the prescribed dipping period.

(2.) In the case of sheep which, in the opinion of the Local Authority of the District where they are kept, it is impracticable or inexpedient to dip in accordance with the requirements of this Order, on account of any special circumstances, the prescribed dipping period may be extended by the Local Authority to the seventh day of November.

Powers of Entry and Examination.

14. For the purpose of this part of this Order an Inspector of the Local Authority may, subject to the direction of the Local Authority, enter any premises within the District and examine any sheep thereon, and such powers of entry and examination shall be in addition to any other like powers vested in the Inspector by the Act of 1894 or otherwise.

PART III.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Appointment by Local Authority of Persons to receive Notices, &c.

15.—(1.) The Local Authority shall appoint persons for their District or for separate parts of their District to receive returns under this Order, and shall give adequate notice of appointments so made: Provided that any such appointments or notices made or given under the Sheep-Scab (North Cardiganshire) Order of 1909, or the Sheep-Scab (Montgomeryshire) (Machynlleth District) Order of 1909, or any Order amending the same, shall be sufficient for the purposes of this Order.

(2.) The Local Authority of any District in the Dipping Area in which a market, fair, sale, or exhibition is held shall take such steps as may be necessary to enforce thereat the provisions of this Order relating to market licences, and for that purpose may appoint one or more persons to receive the licences required by this Order to accompany sheep entering therein. The licences shall, upon entry of the sheep into the market, fairground, saleyard, or place of exhibition, be delivered to any person so appointed on demand by him. The person receiving licences shall deliver the licences to an Inspector of the Local Authority.

Provisions as to farms on borders of Dipping Area.

16. Where any farm or holding is situate partly within and partly without the Dipping Area the provisions of this Order shall, not-

withstanding anything contained in any other Order of the Board, apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the Area.

Certificates of Dipping.

17. Where sheep are dipped in the presence, and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, he shall give the owner or person in charge of the sheep a certificate in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or the like effect.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

18. Where sheep are moved with a licence under this Order, the licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the sheep at the time of completing the said movement.

General Provisions as to Movement.

19. Sheep, while being moved under this Order, shall as far as practicable be kept separate from all other sheep, and, if moved with a licence, shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the licence, and not elsewhere.

Provision for Movement through Dipping Area.

20. For the purposes of this Order, sheep shall not be deemed to be moved out of the Dipping Area—

(i.) where they are moved through the Area by railway from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area without unnecessary delay and without the sheep being untrucked within the Area; or

(ii.) where they are moved through the Area by road from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area, provided that such movement is authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District of the place where the sheep enter the Area; or

(iii.) where they are moved through the Area under and in accordance with any Order of the Board or any licence issued thereunder.

Special Dipping and Restriction on Movement of Sheep not Dipped as Required by Sheep-Scab (Montgomeryshire) (Machynlleth District) Order of 1909.

21.—(1.) If an Inspector of the Local Authority is satisfied that any sheep in the transferred parts of the administrative county of Montgomery referred to in Article 1 (2.) of this Order have not been dipped between the thirty-first day of August and the sixteenth day of October, nineteen hundred and nine, in the manner prescribed by the Sheep-Scab (Montgomeryshire) (Machynlleth District) Order of 1909, he may, without prejudice to any proceedings for the offence, serve the owner or person in charge of the sheep and the owner or person in charge of any sheep then in contact with the undipped sheep with a notice requiring the sheep described in the notice to be dipped before the first day of September, nineteen hundred and ten, twice within twenty-eight days by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep dip in the presence and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and prohibiting the movement of the sheep from the farm, holding, or other place where they are at the time of the service of the notice (except with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District) until all the sheep have been so dipped.

(2.) The dipping required by this Article shall be in substitution for the dipping required by Article 3 of the Sheep-Scab (Denbighshire, Flintshire, and Montgomeryshire) Order of 1909 in the prescribed dipping period expiring on the thirty-first day of August, nineteen hundred and ten.

(3.) If a sheep is not dipped as required by a Notice under this Article, or is moved in contravention of such a Notice, the owner and person in charge of the sheep shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

22.—(1.) Any person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector, or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

23. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

24.—(1.) If a sheep is not dipped as required by this Order, the owner and person in charge of the sheep at the expiration of the period within which its dipping is required by this Order shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a sheep is permitted to enter, or is exposed for sale in, any market, fairground, saleyard, or place of exhibition, in contravention of this Order, the occupier of the premises, and the owner and person in charge of the sheep, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If a sheep is not isolated as required by this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the occupier of the place where the sheep is detained, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping

it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by clipping, or washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted or stamped on any sheep, as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the sheep, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(6.) If a person in charge of a sheep, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(7.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a licence or return as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

25. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Efficient sheep-dip” means a sheep-dip approved by the Board for sheep-scab, or purporting to be so approved:

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector:

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Revocation of Orders.

26. The Orders described in the Third Schedule hereto are hereby revoked.

Commencement.

27. This Order shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of May, nineteen hundred and ten.

Short Title.

28. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP-SCAB (NORTH CARDIGANSHIRE AND MACHYNLLETH DISTRICT) ORDER OF 1910.

SHEEP-SCAB (MERIONETHSHIRE) ORDER
OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Order.

1.—(1.) The Area referred to in this Order as “the Dipping Area” is the Area comprising the administrative county of Merioneth except the petty sessional divisions of Penllyn and Edeyrnion.

(2.) Those petty sessional divisions shall form part of the Area to which the Sheep-Scab (Denbighshire, Flintshire and Montgomeryshire) Order of 1909 applies, and that Order and any Order amending it shall apply to such divisions accordingly.

PART I.

RETURNS BY OWNERS OF SHEEP.

*Returns by Owners of Sheep in Dipping Area
on 1st June.*

2.—(1.) Every owner of sheep in the Dipping Area shall, on the first day of June, in each year, or as soon after that date as may be practicable, send by post or deliver to the Clerk of the Local Authority of any District in which his sheep may be, a return showing the name or description of the farm or holding or other premises in the District upon which the sheep are, the description of his sheep on such farm or holding or other premises, on the first day of June, and the number of such sheep so far as such number can reasonably be ascertained.

(2.) The owner of any sheep brought into the Dipping Area between the said date and the first day of December in each year, shall send or deliver a similar return relating to the sheep so brought into the Area.

(3.) Every return shall be made on a form approved by the Local Authority, who shall provide forms for this purpose to owners of sheep applying therefor.

(4.) Returns made before the commencement of this Order under the Sheep-Scab (North Wales Dipping Areas) Order of 1908 shall be treated as sufficient for the current year except as to sheep subsequently brought into the Dipping Area.

COMPULSORY DIPPING.

*Dipping of all Sheep in Dipping Area during First
Prescribed Dipping Period.*

3.—(1.) The owner of any sheep in the Dipping Area between the thirty-first day of May and the first day of September in each year

(hereinafter referred to as “the first prescribed dipping period”), shall, subject to Article 6 of this Order relating to exemptions from compulsory dipping, cause the same to be dipped between such dates by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip.

(2.) All sheep after having been dipped shall during the remainder of the first prescribed dipping period be kept isolated, as far as practicable, from sheep which have not been so dipped.

(3.) The occupier of a farm or holding in the Dipping Area on which sheep are kept shall personally, or by his agent authorised in that behalf, within fourteen days after the expiration of the first prescribed dipping period, send, in each year, a declaration as to the dipping of the sheep, in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, to the person appointed to receive such declarations by the Local Authority of the District in which the farm or holding is situate.

(4.) The Local Authority may in any case where they think such procedure desirable, for the purpose of securing the dipping required by this Order, cause a Notice to be served on the owner or person in charge of any sheep requiring that the sheep shall be dipped at such time and place as is stated in the notice and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and the sheep shall thereupon be dipped in accordance with the requirements of such notice. The notice may be in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto, or to the like effect.

Provisions as to First Prescribed Dipping Period.

4. During the first prescribed dipping period the following provisions of this Article shall apply:—

(1.) For the purposes of enabling the Local Authority to be represented at the dipping whenever they think such a course desirable, the owner or person in charge of any sheep required to be dipped under this Order shall give such written notice of his intention to dip his sheep as is hereinafter provided:—

(i.) the notice shall be delivered, or sent by post, to such persons as the Local Authority of the District may appoint to receive such notices in respect of sheep in their District:

(ii.) the notice shall be sent or delivered at such time as to be received by the appointed person three clear days, at least, before the intended time of dipping, unless a shorter notice is authorised by the Local Authority:

(iii.) the notice shall state the time and place of the intended dipping, and the approximate number of sheep intended to be dipped.

(2.) If from any cause the dipping of the sheep on the date specified in a notice becomes impracticable, no further notice shall be required if the sheep are dipped as soon after such date as is practicable.

(3.) A return in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, shall be sent immediately after each dipping by the owner or person in charge of the sheep dipped to the person appointed to receive such returns by the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are dipped, except in any case in which an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority is present at the dipping.

Dipping of all Sheep in Dipping Area during Second Prescribed Dipping Period.

5.—(1.) The owner of any sheep in the Dipping Area between the thirty-first day of August and the first day of December in each year (hereinafter referred to as "the second prescribed dipping period"), shall, subject to the next following Article, cause the same to be dipped between such dates by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip.

(2.) Dipping shall be carried out on such dates, at such dipping places, and in such manner as shall be required by a Notice signed by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District, and served by post, or otherwise, on the owner or person in charge of the sheep referred to in the Notice.

(3.) All sheep after having been dipped shall during the remainder of the second prescribed dipping period be kept isolated, as far as practicable, from sheep which have not been so dipped.

Exemptions from Compulsory Dipping.

6.—(1.) The provisions of this Order requiring the dipping of all sheep during a prescribed dipping period shall not apply to sheep moved out of the Dipping Area under and in accordance with the provisions of Part II of this Order, or slaughtered within the Area, during the prescribed dipping period.

(2.) The provisions of this Order requiring the dipping of all sheep during the first prescribed dipping period shall not apply to sheep which on or since the third day of May then last past have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District, and since such dipping have been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

Powers of Entry and Examination.

7. For the purpose of this part of this Order an Inspector of the Local Authority of any District may, subject to the direction of the Authority appointing him, enter any premises within the District and examine any sheep thereon, and such powers of entry and examination shall be in addition to any other like powers vested in the Inspector by the Act of 1894 or otherwise.

PART II.

Restriction on Exposure at Markets, &c., between 31st May and 1st December.

8. Sheep shall not, except as hereinafter provided, be exposed for sale or exhibition in any market, fair, saleyard, or place of exhibition in the Dipping Area, between the thirty-first day of May and the first day of December in each year, unless they shall have within forty-two days before such exposure been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District where the sheep are dipped.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep out of Dipping Area between 31st May and 1st December.

9.—(1.) Sheep shall not (except as hereinafter provided) be moved out of the Dipping Area between the thirty-first day of May and the first day of December in each year, unless—

(i.) they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted under the

provisions of this Article by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted; or

(ii.) they are moved direct to a slaughter-house having previous to such movement been marked by the painting or stamping with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each sheep thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(2.) A licence for movement under this Article may be granted

(i.) upon production to the Inspector granting the licence of

(a) a certificate, in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto or to the like effect, showing that the sheep to be moved have, within forty-two days before the licence is granted, been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto or to the like effect, to the effect that the sheep to be moved are sheep referred to in the certificate and that since the dipping the sheep have been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

(3.) A licence for movement under this Article may also be granted upon production to the Inspector of

(a) a certificate by a duly qualified veterinary surgeon to the effect that he has within ten days before the licence is granted examined each of the sheep to be moved, and found it to be free from sheep-scab; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, to the effect that since such examination the sheep have been kept separate from other sheep, and have not been exposed in any market, fairground, saleyard or exhibition.

A licence under paragraph (3.) shall only be granted where, in the opinion of the Inspector granting it, compliance with paragraph (2.) is impracticable or inexpedient.

(4.) A declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting a licence thereon. A certificate shall also be so retained unless it refers to more sheep than are proposed to be moved, in which case a note shall be made thereon and initialled by the Inspector who grants the licence, stating the number of the sheep for which the licence is granted.

(5.) The licence shall be in force for six days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

(6.) A copy of a licence under this Article shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the Local Authority of the District in which is situate the place of destination specified in the licence, if such place is situate in another District.

(7.) Sheep moved under this Article to a slaughter-house shall after their arrival thereat be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Movement of Lambs.

10. Where an Inspector of a Local Authority is satisfied that any lambs in the Dipping Area and in the District for which he is appointed Inspector are intended for immediate slaughter and that it is impracticable or inexpedient that the same should in accordance with this Order be dipped before movement for such purpose, or that the lambs are to be moved direct to a slaughter-house, he may, subject to any directions by the Local Authority appointing him, by licence authorise the movement of the lambs to any market, fairground, saleyard or other premises, whether in the Dipping Area, or not, subject to such conditions (if any) as are inserted in the licence, and thereupon the lambs may be moved in accordance with such licence and conditions, and be exposed for sale in the market, fairground, or saleyard, free from any restrictions imposed by any Order of the Board. Provided that an Inspector of a Local Authority shall not issue any such licence for movement to premises in the District of another Local Authority unless the consent of such Local Authority, either generally or in the particular instance, has been previously obtained. This Article does not apply to lambs more than nine months old.

Provision for Movement through Dipping Area.

11. For the purposes of this Order, sheep may be moved out of the Dipping Area free from the restrictions on such movement imposed by Part II of this Order in any case where they are moved through such Area by railway from a place outside such Area to another place outside such Area without unnecessary delay and without the sheep being untrucked within such Area, or where they are moved through the Dipping Area under and in accordance with any Order of the Board or any licence issued thereunder.

PART III.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Appointment by Local Authority of Persons to receive Notices, &c.

12. The Local Authority shall appoint persons for their District or for separate parts of their District to receive notices, returns, and declarations under this Order, and shall give adequate notice in their District of appointments so made: Provided that any such appointments or notices made or given under the Sheep-Scab (North Wales Dipping Areas) Order of 1908, shall be sufficient for the purposes of this Order.

Provisions as to farms on borders of Dipping Area.

13. Where any farm or holding is situate partly within and partly without the Dipping Area the provisions of this Order shall in any case where the homestead is situate within the Dipping Area apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the Area.

Certificates of Dipping.

14. Where sheep are dipped in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority, he shall give the owner or person in charge of the sheep a certificate in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep not Dipped as Required by Order.

15. Where any sheep shall not have been dipped as required by this Order an Inspector of the

Local Authority may, without prejudice to any proceedings for the offence, serve the owner or person in charge of the sheep and the owner or person in charge of any sheep then in contact with the undipped sheep with a notice, in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, requiring the dipping of the sheep described in the notice, and prohibiting their movement from the farm, holding, or other place where they are at the time the notice is served (except with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District) until all the sheep shall have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip after the service of the notice in the presence and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, or have been slaughtered, and thereupon it shall be unlawful to move the sheep in contravention of the notice.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

16. Where sheep are moved with a licence under this Order, the licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the sheep at the time of completing the said movement.

General Provisions as to Movement.

17. Sheep, while being moved under this Order, shall as far as practicable be kept separate from all other sheep, and, if moved with a licence, shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the licence, and not elsewhere.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

18.—(1.) Any person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

19. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

20.—(1.) If a sheep is not dipped as required by this Order, the owner and person in charge of the sheep at the expiration of the period within which its dipping is required by this Order shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by clipping, or washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted or stamped on any sheep, as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the sheep, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If a person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a licence or return as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Commencement.

21. This Order shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of May, nineteen hundred and ten.

Interpretation.

22. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Efficient sheep-dip” means a sheep-dip approved by the Board for sheep-scab, or purporting to be so approved:

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector:

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

23. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP-SCAB (MERIONETHSHIRE) ORDER OF 1910.

Application of Order.

1. This Order applies to the Areas described in the Schedule hereto (each of which is hereinafter referred to as a "Special Dipping Area").

PART I.

MOVEMENT OF SHEEP OUT OF SPECIAL DIPPING AREAS, AND EXPOSURE AT MARKETS &C. WITHIN SPECIAL DIPPING AREAS.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep out of Special Dipping Areas throughout the Year.

2.—(1.) Sheep shall not (except as hereinafter provided) be moved out of a Special Dipping Area unless—

(i.) they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted: or

(ii.) they are moved direct to a slaughter-house having previous to such movement been marked by the painting or stamping with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each sheep thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(2.) Sheep moved under this Article to a slaughter-house shall after their arrival thereat be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Special Facilities for Movement of Wintered Sheep.

3.—(1.) The preceding Article shall not apply to the return movement of sheep which have been moved for wintering purposes to premises in a Special Dipping Area, if such return movement is authorised by a licence granted under this Article.

(2.) The place of destination shall be the premises from which the sheep were moved for wintering purposes, or other premises in the same occupation, and shall be specified in the licence.

(3.) A licence may be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate, in accordance with any instructions of the Local Authority, and may contain such conditions as to dipping and isolating the sheep after their arrival at the place of destination as the Local Authority direct.

(4.) A licence shall not be granted except upon production to the Inspector of a declaration, signed by the person under whose charge the sheep have been wintered, to the effect (a) that the sheep are not affected with, or suspected of, sheep-scab, (b) that neither the sheep to which the declaration relates nor any

other sheep on any of the premises whereon the sheep have been wintered have been affected with sheep-scab while the sheep to which the declaration relates were kept thereon, and (c) that to the best of his knowledge and belief the sheep to which the declaration relates have not been exposed to the infection of sheep-scab.

(5.) A declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting a licence thereon.

(6.) A licence shall be in force for six days inclusive of the day of issue.

Restriction on Exposure of Sheep at Markets, &c., within Special Dipping Areas between 31st August and 1st December.

4. Between the thirty-first day of August and the first day of December in any year, sheep shall not (except as hereinafter provided), be permitted to enter, or be exposed for sale or exhibition in, any market, fairground, saleyard, or place of exhibition in a Special Dipping Area unless they are accompanied by a licence (in this Order referred to as a "market licence") granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted.

Conditions affecting the grant of Movement and Market Licences.

5.—(1.) A movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence may be granted by an Inspector upon production to him of

(a) a certificate in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule to the Sheep-Scab (Carnarvonshire) Order of 1910 or to the like effect, showing that the sheep to be moved have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in accordance with the requirements of this Order; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule to the Sheep-Scab (Carnarvonshire) Order of 1910, or to the like effect, to the effect that the sheep to be moved are sheep referred to in the certificate and that since the dipping the sheep have been kept separate while in the Special Dipping Area from other sheep not so dipped.

(2.) A movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence may also be granted by an Inspector upon production to him of

(a) a certificate by a duly qualified veterinary surgeon to the effect that he has within ten days before the licence is granted examined each of the sheep to be moved, and found it to be free from sheep-scab; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, to the effect that since such examination the sheep have been kept separate from other sheep, and have not been exposed in any market, fairground, saleyard or exhibition.

A licence under this paragraph shall only be granted where, in the opinion of the Inspector granting it, compliance with paragraph (1.) is impracticable or inexpedient.

(3.) A declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting a licence thereon. A certificate shall also be so retained unless it refers to more sheep than are proposed to be moved, in

which case a note shall be made thereon and initialled by the Inspector who grants the licence, stating the number of the sheep for which the licence is granted.

(4.) The licence shall be in force for six days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule to the Sheep-Scab (Carnarvonshire) Order of 1910 or to the like effect.

(5.) A copy of the licence shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the Local Authority of the District in which is situate the place of destination specified in the licence, if such place is situate in another District.

(6.) A movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence shall not be granted except in accordance with this Article.

Dipping necessary to obtain Movement Licences under Article 2.

6.—(1.) If a movement licence under Article 2 is available for any day between the thirty-first day of August and the first day of December the sheep to be moved must have been dipped twice on separate dates with an interval of not more than twenty-eight days between the two dates, and the second dipping must have taken place within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

(2.) If a movement licence under Article 2 is available for any day between the thirtieth day of November and the first day of September, or if it relates to sheep which have within seven days before the licence is granted been moved into the Special Dipping Area with a market licence the sheep to be moved must have been dipped once within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

Dipping necessary to obtain Market Licences.

7.—(1.) If a market licence relates to sheep on premises situate within a Special Dipping Area, they must have been dipped twice on separate dates with an interval of not more than twenty-eight days between the two dates, and the second dipping must have taken place within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

(2.) If a market licence relates to sheep on premises situate outside a Special Dipping Area, they must have been dipped once within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted.

Special Provisions as to Lambs.

8. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority is satisfied that any lambs are intended for immediate slaughter and that it is impracticable or inexpedient that the same should in accordance with this Order be dipped before movement for such purpose, or that the lambs are to be moved direct to a slaughter-house, he may, subject to any directions by the Local Authority, by licence authorise the movement of the lambs to any market, fairground, saleyard, or other premises, whether in a Special Dipping Area, or not, subject to such conditions (if any) as are inserted in the licence, and thereupon the lambs may be moved in accordance with such licence and conditions, and be exposed for sale in the market, fairground, or saleyard, free from any restrictions imposed by any Order of the Board. Provided that an Inspector of the Local Authority shall not issue any such licence for movement to premises in the District of another Local Authority unless the consent of such Local Authority, either generally or in the particular instance, has been previously obtained. This Article does not apply to lambs more than nine months old.

Power to grant Exemption from One of the Two Dippings prescribed for Sheep to be moved out of Special Dipping Areas, or to Markets, &c., within Special Dipping Areas.

9.—(1.) Where the Local Authority are satisfied that a particular farm or holding in a Special Dipping Area has been free from sheep-scab for a period of three years or longer, and that sheep on such farm or holding are not exposed to the risk of infection by contact with sheep on other premises, the Local Authority may, on application by the occupier of such farm or holding, and on production of such evidence as may be required, exempt sheep on such farm or holding from the earlier of the two dippings necessary under this Order to obtain a movement licence or market licence. The Local Authority shall not grant an exemption in any case where it might increase the risk of the spread of sheep-scab.

(2.) Every exemption shall be signed by the Clerk of the Local Authority and a copy shall be sent to the Board by the Local Authority.

(3.) An exemption may at any time be terminated by an Inspector of the Board by a notice signed by him and served on the occupier of the farm or holding to which the exemption relates, but not so as to affect the legality of anything done under the exemption before service of such notice of termination.

Conditions affecting Movement in case of Exemption.

10. An applicant for a movement licence under Article 2 or a market licence for sheep on exempted premises must produce to the Inspector the exemption, and a declaration by the occupier of the premises or his duly authorised agent to the effect (a) that the sheep to be moved are not affected with, or suspected of, sheep-scab, (b) that no sheep on the exempted premises has been affected with sheep-scab since the exemption was granted, and (c) that to the best of his knowledge and belief the sheep to which the declaration relates have not been exposed to the infection of sheep-scab.

PART II.

ANNUAL COMPULSORY DIPPING.

Returns by Owners of Sheep in Special Dipping Areas on 1st September.

11.—(1.) Every owner of sheep in a Special Dipping Area shall, on the first day of September in each year, or as soon after that date as may be practicable, send by post or deliver to the Clerk of the Local Authority a return showing the name or description of the farm or holding or other premises in the Special Dipping Area upon which the sheep are, the description of his sheep on such farm or holding or other premises, on the first day of September, and the number of such sheep so far as such number can reasonably be ascertained.

(2.) The owner of any sheep brought into a Special Dipping Area between the said date and the first day of December in each year, shall send or deliver a similar return relating to the sheep so brought into the Area.

(3.) Every return shall be made on a form approved by the Local Authority, who shall provide forms for this purpose to owners of sheep applying therefor.

Dipping of all Sheep in Special Dipping Areas between 31st August and 1st December.

12.—(1.) The owner of any sheep in a Special Dipping Area between the thirty-first day of

August and the first day of December in each year (hereinafter referred to as "the prescribed dipping period"), shall, subject to the next following Article, cause the same to be dipped twice between those dates, with an interval of not more than twenty eight days between the dippings by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip.

(2.) The dippings shall be carried out on such dates, at such dipping places, and in such manner as shall be required by a Notice signed by an Inspector of the Local Authority, and served by post, or otherwise, on the owner or person in charge of the sheep referred to in the Notice.

(3.) All sheep after having been dipped shall during the remainder of the prescribed dipping period be kept isolated, as far as practicable, from sheep which have not been so dipped.

Exemptions from Compulsory Dipping.

13.—(1.) The provisions of this Order requiring the dipping of all sheep during the prescribed dipping period shall not apply to sheep moved out of a Special Dipping Area under and in accordance with the provisions of this Order, or slaughtered within such Area, during the prescribed dipping period.

(2.) In the case of sheep which, in the opinion of the Local Authority of the District where they are kept, it is impracticable or inexpedient to dip in accordance with the requirements of this Order, on account of any special circumstances, the prescribed dipping period may be extended by the Local Authority to the seventh day of December.

Powers of Entry and Examination.

14. For the purpose of this part of this Order an Inspector of the Local Authority may, subject to the direction of the Local Authority, enter any premises within the District and examine any sheep thereon, and such powers of entry and examination shall be in addition to any other like powers vested in the Inspector by the Act of 1894 or otherwise.

PART III.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Appointment by Local Authority of Persons to receive Notices, &c.

15.—(1.) The Local Authority shall appoint persons for their District or for separate parts of their District to receive returns under this Order, and shall give adequate notice of appointments so made: Provided that any such appointments or notices made or given under the Sheep-Scab (North Wales Dipping Areas) Order of 1908 shall be sufficient for the purposes of this Order.

(2.) The Local Authority of any District in a Special Dipping Area in which a market, fair, sale, or exhibition is held shall take such steps as may be necessary to enforce thereat the provisions of this Order relating to market licences, and for that purpose may appoint one or more persons to receive the licences required by this Order to accompany sheep entering therein. The licences shall, upon entry of the sheep into the market, fairground, saleyard, or place of exhibition, be delivered to any person so appointed on demand by him. The person receiving licences shall deliver the licences to an Inspector of the Local Authority.

Provisions as to farms on borders of Special Dipping Areas.

16. Where any farm or holding is situate partly within and partly without a Special Dipping

Area the provisions of this Order shall, notwithstanding anything contained in any other Order of the Board, apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the Area.

Certificates of Dipping.

17. Where sheep are dipped in the presence, and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, he shall give the owner or person in charge of the sheep a certificate in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule to the Sheep-Scab (Carnarvonshire) Order of 1910, or the like effect.

Effect of Licences granted under this Order.

18. No licence shall be required under the Sheep-Scab (Carnarvonshire) Order of 1910 for the movement out of the Dipping Area to which that Order applies of sheep which are being moved under and in accordance with a licence granted under this Order.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

19. Where sheep are moved with a licence under this Order the licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the sheep at the time of completing the said movement.

General Provisions as to Movement.

20. Sheep, while being moved under this Order, shall as far as practicable be kept separate from all other sheep, and, if moved with a licence, shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the licence, and not elsewhere.

Provision for Movement through Special Dipping Areas.

21. For the purposes of this Order, sheep shall not be deemed to be moved out of a Special Dipping Area—

(i.) where they are moved through the Area by railway from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area without unnecessary delay and without the sheep being untrucked within the Area; or

(ii.) where they are moved through the Area by road from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area, provided that such movement is authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District of the place where the sheep enter the Area; or

(iii.) where they are moved through the Area under and in accordance with any Order of the Board or any licence issued thereunder.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

22.—(1.) Any person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector, or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

23. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

24.—(1.) If a sheep is not dipped as required by this Order, the owner and person in charge of the sheep at the expiration of the period within which its dipping is required by this Order shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a sheep is permitted to enter or is exposed for sale in any market, fairground, sale-yard, or place of exhibition, in contravention of this Order, the occupier of the premises, and the owner and person in charge of the sheep, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If a sheep is not isolated as required by this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof; and the occupier of the place where the sheep is detained, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If any person, with a view unlawfully, to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by clipping, or washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted or stamped on any sheep, as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the sheep, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(6.) If a person in charge of a sheep, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(7.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a licence or return as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

25. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Efficient sheep-dip” means a sheep-dip approved by the Board for sheep-scab, or purporting to be so approved:

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector:

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries;

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

26. This Order shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of May, nineteen hundred and ten.

Short Title.

27. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP-SCAB (CARNARVONSHIRE SPECIAL DIPPING AREAS) Order of 1910.

MERIONETHSHIRE (MIGNEINT MOUNTAIN DISTRICT) ORDER OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Order.

1. This Order shall apply to the area described in the First Schedule hereto, which is hereinafter referred to as “the Scheduled Area.”

Restriction on Movement of Sheep out of Scheduled Area.

2.—(1.) Sheep shall not be moved out of the Scheduled Area, whether to a place of destination in the administrative county of Merioneth or not, unless they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the county of Merioneth.

(2.) Unless the Inspector is satisfied

(a) that the sheep are intended for immediate slaughter and that it is impracticable or inexpedient that the sheep should in accordance with the provisions of this Article be dipped before movement for such purpose, or

(b) that the sheep are to be moved direct to a slaughterhouse, a licence for movement under this Article shall be granted only for sheep which have, within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted, been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District; and have since the dipping been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

(3.) The licence shall be in force for six days inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the Form set forth in the Schedule to the Sheep-Scab (Merionethshire) Order of 1910, or to the like effect.

Effect of Licences granted under this Order.

3. No licence shall be required under the Sheep-Scab (Merionethshire) Order of 1910 for the movement out of the Dipping Area to which that Order applies of sheep which are being moved under and in accordance with a licence granted under this Order.

Provision for Movement by Road through Scheduled Area.

4. The restrictions on movement imposed by this Order shall not apply in any case where the movement is from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area, provided that such movement is authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the county of Merioneth.

Provisions as to farms on borders of Scheduled Area.

5. Where any farm or holding is situate partly within and partly without the Scheduled Area the provisions of this Order shall, notwithstanding anything contained in any other Order of the Board, apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the Area.

Special Dipping and Restriction on Movement of Sheep not Dipped as Required by Merionethshire (Migneint Mountain District) Sheep-Scab Order of 1909.

6.—(1.) If an Inspector of the Local Authority is satisfied that any sheep in the Scheduled Area have not been dipped between the thirty-first day of August and the first day of December, nineteen hundred and nine, in the manner prescribed by the Merionethshire (Migneint Mountain District) Sheep-Scab Order of 1909, he may, without prejudice to any proceedings for the offence, serve the owner or person in charge of the sheep and the owner or person in charge of any sheep then in contact with the undipped sheep

with a notice requiring the sheep described in the notice to be dipped before the first day of September, nineteen hundred and ten, twice within twenty-eight days by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep dip in the presence and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and prohibiting the movement of the sheep from the farm, holding, or other place where they are at the time of the service of the notice (except with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District) until all the sheep have been so dipped.

(2.) The dipping required by this Article shall be in substitution for the dipping required by Article 3 of the Sheep-Scab (Merionethshire) Order of 1910 in the prescribed dipping period expiring on the thirty-first day of August, nineteen hundred and ten.

(3.) If a sheep is not dipped as required by a Notice under this Article, or is moved in contravention of such a Notice, the owner and person in charge of the sheep shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation.

7. The Orders described in the Second Schedule to this Order are hereby revoked.

Commencement.

8. This Order shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of May, nineteen hundred and ten.

Short Title, etc.

9. This Order may be cited as the MERIONETHSHIRE (MIGNEINT MOUNTAIN DISTRICT) ORDER OF 1910, and shall be read with the SHEEP-SCAB (MERIONETHSHIRE) ORDER OF 1910.

ORDER OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of Order.

1. This Order applies to the Area described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the Dipping Area").

PART I.

RETURNS BY OWNERS OF SHEEP.

*Returns by Owners of Sheep in Dipping Area on
1st June.*

2.—(1.) Every owner of sheep in the Dipping Area, shall, on the first day of June in each year, or as soon after that date as may be practicable, send by post or deliver to the Clerk of the Local Authority of any District in which his sheep may be, a return showing the name or description of the farm or holding or other premises in the District upon which the sheep are, the description of his sheep on such farm or holding or other premises, on the first day of June, and the number of such sheep so far as such number can reasonably be ascertained.

(2.) The owner of any sheep brought into the Dipping Area between the said date and the first day of December in each year, shall send or deliver a similar return relating to the sheep so brought into the Area.

(3.) Every return shall be made on a form approved by the Local Authority, who shall provide forms for this purpose to owners of sheep applying therefor.

(4.) Returns made before the commencement of this Order under the Sheep-Scab (North Wales Dipping Areas) Order of 1908 shall be treated as sufficient for the current year except as to sheep subsequently brought into the Dipping Area.

COMPULSORY DIPPING.

*Dipping of all Sheep in Dipping Area during First
Prescribed Dipping Period.*

3.—(1.) The owner of any sheep in the Dipping Area between the thirty-first day of May and the first day of September in each year (hereinafter referred to as "the first prescribed dipping period"), shall, subject to Article 6 of this Order relating to exemptions from compulsory dipping, cause the same to be dipped between such dates by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip.

(2.) All sheep after having been dipped shall during the remainder of the first prescribed dipping period be kept isolated, as far as practicable, from sheep which have not been so dipped.

(3.) The occupier of a farm or holding in the Dipping Area on which sheep are kept shall personally, or by his agent authorised in that behalf, within fourteen days after the expiration of the first prescribed dipping period, send, in each year, a declaration as to the dipping of the sheep, in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, to the person appointed to receive such declarations by the Local Authority of the District in which the farm or holding is situate.

(4.) The Local Authority may in any case where they think such procedure desirable, for the purpose of securing the dipping required by this Order, cause a Notice to be served on the owner or person in charge of any sheep requiring that the sheep shall be dipped at such time and place as is stated in the notice and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and the sheep shall thereupon be dipped in accordance with the requirements of such notice. The notice may be in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect.

Provisions as to First Prescribed Dipping Period.

4. During the first prescribed dipping period the following provisions of this Article shall apply:—

(1.) For the purposes of enabling the Local Authority to be represented at the dipping whenever they think such a course desirable, the owner or person in charge of any sheep required to be dipped under this Order shall give such written notice of his intention to dip his sheep as is hereinafter provided:—

(i.) the notice shall be delivered, or sent by post, to such persons as the Local Authority of the District may appoint to receive such notices in respect of sheep in their District.

(ii.) the notice shall be sent or delivered at such time as to be received by the appointed person three clear days, at least, before the intended time of dipping, unless a shorter notice is authorised by the Local Authority.

(iii.) the notice shall state the time and place of the intended dipping, and the approximate number of sheep intended to be dipped.

(2.) If from any cause the dipping of the sheep on the date specified in a notice becomes impracticable, no further notice shall be required if the sheep are dipped as soon after such date as is practicable.

(3.) A return in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, shall be sent immediately after each dipping by the owner or person in charge of the sheep dipped to the person appointed to receive such returns by the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are dipped, except in any case in which an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority is present at the dipping.

Dipping of all Sheep in Dipping Area during Second Prescribed Dipping Period.

5.—(1.) The owner of any sheep in the Dipping Area between the thirty-first day of August and the first day of December in each year (hereinafter referred to as "the second prescribed dipping period") shall, subject to the next following Article, cause the same to be dipped between such dates by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip.

(2.) The dippings shall be carried out on such dates, at such dipping places, and in such manner as shall be required by a Notice signed by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District, and served by post, or otherwise, on the owner or person in charge of the sheep referred to in the Notice.

(3.) All sheep after having been dipped shall during the remainder of the second prescribed dipping period be kept isolated, as far as practicable, from sheep which have not been so dipped.

Exemptions from Compulsory Dipping.

6.—(1.) The provisions of this Order requiring the dipping of all sheep during a prescribed dipping period shall not apply to sheep moved out of the Dipping Area under and in accordance with the provisions of Part II of this Order, or slaughtered within the Area, during the prescribed dipping period.

(2.) The provisions of this Order requiring the dipping of all sheep during the first prescribed dipping period shall not apply to sheep which on or since the third day of May then last past have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District, and since such dipping have been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

Powers of Entry and Examination.

7. For the purpose of this part of this Order an Inspector of the Local Authority of any District may, subject to the direction of the Authority appointing him, enter any premises within the District and examine any sheep thereon, and such powers of entry and examination shall be in addition to any other like powers vested in the Inspector by the Act of 1894 or otherwise.

PART II.

Restriction on Exposure at Markets, &c., between 31st May and 1st December.

8. Sheep shall not, except as hereinafter provided, be exposed for sale or exhibition in any market, fair, saleyard, or place of exhibition in the Dipping Area, between the thirty-first day of May and the first day of December in each year, unless they shall have within forty-two days before such exposure been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District where the sheep are dipped.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep out of Dipping Area between 31st May and 1st December.

9.—(1.) Sheep shall not (except as hereinafter provided) be moved out of the Dipping Area

between the thirty-first day of May and the first day of December in each year, unless—

(i.) they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted under the provisions of this Article by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted; or

(ii.) they are moved direct to a slaughter-house having previous to such movement been marked by the painting or stamping with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each sheep thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(2.) A licence for movement under this Article may be granted

(i.) upon production to the Inspector granting the licence of

(a) a certificate, in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect, showing that the sheep to be moved have, within forty-two days before the licence is granted, been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect, to the effect that the sheep to be moved are sheep referred to in the certificate and that since the dipping the sheep have been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

(3.) A licence for movement under this Article may also be granted upon production to the Inspector of

(a) a certificate by a duly qualified veterinary surgeon to the effect that he has within ten days before the licence is granted examined each of the sheep to be moved, and found it to be free from sheep-scab; and

(b) a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, to the effect that since such examination the sheep have been kept separate from other sheep, and have not been exposed in any market, fairground, saleyard or exhibition.

A licence under paragraph (3.) shall only be granted where, in the opinion of the Inspector granting it, compliance with paragraph (2.) is impracticable or inexpedient.

(4.) A declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting a licence thereon. A certificate shall also be so retained unless it refers to more sheep than are proposed to be moved, in which case a note shall be made thereon and initialled by the Inspector who grants the licence, stating the number of the sheep for which the licence is granted.

(5.) The licence shall be in force for six days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

(6.) A copy of a licence under this Article shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the Local Authority of the District in which is

situate the place of destination specified in the licence, if such place is situate in another District.

(7.) Sheep moved under this Article to a slaughter-house shall after their arrival thereat be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Movement of Lambs.

10. Where an Inspector of a Local Authority is satisfied that any lambs in the Dipping Area and in the District for which he is appointed Inspector are intended for immediate slaughter and that it is impracticable or inexpedient that the same should in accordance with this Order be dipped before movement for such purpose, or that the lambs are to be moved direct to a slaughter-house, he may, subject to any directions by the Local Authority appointing him, by licence authorise the movement of the lambs to any market, fairground, saleyard or other premises, whether in the Dipping Area, or not, subject to such conditions (if any) as are inserted in the licence, and thereupon the lambs may be moved in accordance with such licence and conditions, and be exposed for sale in the market, fairground, or saleyard, free from any restrictions imposed by any Order of the Board. Provided that an Inspector of a Local Authority shall not issue any such licence for movement to premises in the District of another Local Authority, unless the consent of such Local Authority, either generally or in the particular instance, has been previously obtained. This Article does not apply to lambs more than nine months old.

Provision for Movement through Dipping Area.

11. Sheep may be moved out of the Dipping Area free from the restrictions on movement imposed by Part II of this Order in any case where they are moved through such Area by railway from a place outside such Area to another place outside such Area without unnecessary delay and without the sheep being untrucked within such Area, or where they are moved through the Dipping Area under and in accordance with any Order of the Board or any licence issued thereunder.

PART III.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Appointment by Local Authority of Persons to receive Notices, &c.

12. The Local Authority shall appoint persons for their District or for separate parts of their District to receive notices, returns, and declarations under this Order, and shall give adequate notice in their District of appointments so made: Provided that any such appointments or notices made or given under the Sheep-Scab (North Wales Dipping Areas) Order of 1908 shall be sufficient for the purposes of this Order.

Provisions as to farms on borders of Dipping Area.

13. Where any farm or holding is situate partly within and partly without the Dipping Area the provisions of this Order shall, in any case in which the homestead is situate within the Dipping Area, apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the Dipping Area.

Certificates of Dipping.

14. Where sheep are dipped in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority, he shall give the owner or person in charge of the sheep a certificate in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep not Dipped as Required by Order.

15. Where any sheep shall not have been dipped as required by this Order an Inspector of the Local Authority may, without prejudice to any proceedings for the offence, serve the owner or person in charge of the sheep and the owner or person in charge of any sheep then in contact with the undipped sheep with a notice, in the Form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the like effect, requiring the dipping of the sheep described in the notice, and prohibiting their movement from the farm, holding, or other place where they are at the time the notice is served (except with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District) until all the sheep shall have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip after the service of the notice in the presence and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, or have been slaughtered, and thereupon it shall be unlawful to move the sheep in contravention of the notice.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

16. Where sheep are moved with a licence under this Order, the licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the sheep at the time of completing the said movement.

General Provisions as to Movement.

17. Sheep, while being moved under this Order, shall as far as practicable be kept separate from all other sheep, and, if moved with a licence, shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the licence, and not elsewhere.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

18.—(1.) Any person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

19. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

20.—(1.) If a sheep is not dipped as required by this Order, the owner and person in charge of the sheep at the expiration of the period within

which its dipping is required by this Order shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by clipping, or washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted or stamped on any sheep, as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the sheep, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If a person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a licence or return as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation.

21. The Orders described in the Third Schedule hereto are hereby revoked.

Commencement.

22. This Order shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of May, nineteen hundred and ten.

Interpretation.

23. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Efficient sheep-dip” means a sheep-dip approved by the Board for sheep-scab, or purporting to be so approved :

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector :

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries :

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

24. This Order may be cited as the SHEEP-SCAB (CARNARVONSHIRE) ORDER OF 1910.

Application of Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 with Modifications.

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the provisions of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Order) shall apply to the Scheduled Area described in the First Schedule hereto, but subject to the modifications hereinafter contained. Provided that the provisions of the principal Order relating to an Infected Area shall not apply to any part of the Scheduled Area, unless such part is for the time being declared by Order of the Board to be, or form part of, a Swine-Fever Infected Area.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them

Regulation of Movement of Swine from Markets.

2.—(1.) The movement of swine from any market, fairground or saleyard in the Scheduled Area shall be subject to the following provisions of this Order.

(2.) In the case of swine moved into the market fairground or saleyard from premises outside the Scheduled Area with a licence (Form A) the provisions of Article 4 of the principal Order shall apply to the subsequent movement of the swine.

(3.) If the market or saleyard is specially authorised by the Local Authority under the principal Order or under the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1904, the movement of the swine exposed at the market or saleyard shall be subject to the provisions of the Order under which the market or saleyard is so authorised.

(4.) In the case of any other movement of swine from a market, fairground or saleyard the movement shall be subject to the following conditions :—

(i.) The swine shall be accompanied by a licence (Form C) granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fairground or saleyard is situate.

(ii.) If the place of destination is outside the Scheduled Area it must be a bacon factory or slaughterhouse.

(iii.) The swine shall not, for a period of twenty-eight days after arrival at the place of destination specified in the licence, be moved from such place of destination except to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse, and only if accompanied by a licence (Form C) authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the swine are detained.

(iv.) Swine moved with a licence under this Article to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

(v.) Swine while detained under this Article shall be kept separate from all other swine.

Regulation of Markets, &c., in Scheduled Area.

3. No sale of swine shall be held in any market, fairground or saleyard in the Scheduled Area unless it is authorised by the Local

Authority of the District (which authority the Local Authority are hereby empowered to grant).

Effect of Licences granted under this Order.

4. No licence shall be required under the principal Order for the movement into a Scheduled Area of swine which are being moved under and in accordance with a licence granted under this Order.

Revocation of Order.

5. The Order described in the Second Schedule hereto is hereby revoked.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the nineteenth day of May, nineteen hundred and ten.

Short Title.

7. This Order may be cited as the NORTHAMPTONSHIRE (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1910, and shall in relation to the Scheduled Area be read as part of the principal Order.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Premises to which this Order applies.

1.—(1.) This Order shall apply to the premises described in the Schedule hereto, and also to any premises in the neighbourhood to which the Order may be applied by a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority and served upon the occupier of the premises described in such Notice.

(2.) This Order shall cease to apply to any premises upon service on the occupier thereof of a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) A copy of every Notice served under this Article shall forthwith be sent to the Board by the Inspector signing the same.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep from Premises to which this Order applies.

2.—(1.) Sheep shall not be moved from any premises to which this Order applies unless they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted.

(2.) Unless the Inspector is satisfied

(a) that the sheep are intended for immediate slaughter and that it is impracticable or inexpedient that the sheep should in accordance with the provisions of this Order be dipped before movement for such purpose, or

(b) that the sheep are to be moved direct to a slaughterhouse,

a licence for movement under this Article shall be granted only for sheep which have, within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted, been dipped twice, with an interval of not less than ten and not more than fourteen days between the dippings, by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District; and have since the first dipping been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

3.—(1.) Any person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the

Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Effect of Order.

4. The restrictions on movement of sheep imposed by this Order shall be in addition to any other such restrictions which may be in force during the operation of this Order.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

6.—(1.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

7. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

"Efficient sheep-dip" means a sheep-dip approved by the Board for sheep-scab, or purporting to be so approved;

"Inspector" includes Veterinary Inspector:

"The Board" means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

8. This Order shall come into operation on the thirteenth day of May, nineteen hundred and ten.
