Cadiz, Decemb. 15.

ON the 9th Instant came into this Bay the *Reserve-Frigat*, Capt. *Thomas Crawley* Commander, with Nine Merchant Ships from *Newfoundland*; He sails to Morrow for *Malaga*, and purposes to return hither in few days. The Spanish Armada is still at *Naples*.

Madrid, Decemb. 24. The Archbishop of *Saragossa*, President of *Castile*, having obtained leave to quit that Station, and to return to his Archbishoprick, parted from hence the 19th Instant, after having had Audience of the King, and taken his Leave of the Ministers of this Court: And his Catholick Majesty has Conferred that Office upon *Don Manuel Arias*, a Knight of *Malta*, and formerly Ambassador here from that Order, a Person of great Capacity and Experience; who has accordingly taken Possession of it. The King has given the Government of the Kingdom of *Navarre* to the Marquis de *Valero*, Brother to the Deceased Duke de *Vejar*, in the place of the Duke d' *Escalona*, who has resigned the same, with an Intention to enter into Religious Orders. 'Tis said, That after the Holy-Days there will be Published several Decrees, formed by the Great Council de *Medios*, which lye at present before the King for his Approbation. New Levies are making to Augment our Forces in *Catalonia*.

Warsaw, Decemb. 26. We hear that the Cham of *Tartary* is sending an Ambassador to the General Dyet of this Kingdom, which is to meet towards the end of this Month at *Grodno* in *Lithuania*, to make Proposals of Peace to them, as well in the Name of the Grand Signior, as of the Cham; and the Vidame d' *Esneval*, who lately Arrived here with the Character of Ambassador from *France*, does in the mean time Employ all his Art and Industry to dispose this Court to hearken to

a particular Treaty: But in all appearance his Endeavours herein will not have the Success he desires, the King, and most of the Senators, being Resolved not to separate, in the present War, from the Emperor and the Republick of *Venice*, and to enter upon no Negotiation of a Peace, but jointly with them. The Preparations for the War are continued at the same time, and 'tis generally believed that the next Campaign will be opened with the Siege of *Caminiec*. The Moldavians have lately sent out several Parties to try to throw some Provisions into that Place, but our Troops Posted thereabouts, have taken such Care to observe them, that they have not hitherto been able to effect their Design.

Venice, Jan. 3. Several Companies of New Raised Men are come within these few Days to the *Lido*, and others are daily expected; so that by the Convoy, which is designed to Sail from hence the next Week for the *Levant*, 1200 Soldiers will be sent thither. The Senate continues to give out Commissions for New Levies; and we are assured, That the Doge will set out in the beginning of *March*, with divers Noble Venetians, who will attend him during the Campaign.

Vienna, January 7. The Letters from *Transylvania* of the 25th past, give an Account that a Party of *Radziens* had made an Incurfion into the Neighborhood of *Pescaraba* on the *Danube*, where they seized upon several Vessels that were going with Provisions to *Belgrade*; and that some other Parties, which had been sent towards the Frontiers, to get Intelligence of the Enemies Motions, were come back, bringing with them divers Prisoners, who Reported that the Turks were very quiet in their Quarters, and that *Teckley* had taken his at *Passarowitz*, having with him but a very small number of Hungarians. The Recruits and New Levies that are making in the Emperors Hereditary Countries, advance with all the Success that can be expected. Its said that several Imperial Regiments more will be sent towards the *Rhine*, to serve under Prince *Lewis of Baden*, who is to Command the Imperial and Confederate Army on that side the next Campaign. The Dyet of *Poland* is now Assembled, and the last Advices from thence give us hopes, that they will take very vigorous Resolutions for carrying on the War against the Turks; which may very much contribute towards the obtaining a Speedy and Honourable Peace. The Count de *Wallestein* will part from hence in few days for *Turin*, in the Quality of the Emperor's

Emperors Envoy Extraordinary to the Duke of Savoy, to concert with his Royal Highness several Matters relating to the Preparations for the next Campagne; and we are assured, That considerable Recruits will be sent to Reinforce the Imperial Troops in Italy.

Francfort, Jan. 14. We have an Account from Strasbourg, that a great many French Officers have been brought thither, who were Wounded in the Siege of Rhinfelt, and that their Troops are extremely harassed and weakened by that Expedition. The Forces which the Marquis de Coignies had drawn together, in order to pass the Rhine, during the said Siege, and to make a Ravage in the Country on that side, are separated again, and returned to their Quarters; and Monsieur de Melac, who was advanced with some other Troops between Landau and Philipsburg, is likewise retired.

Cologne, Jan. 16. Yesterday Arrived here two Deputies from the Bishop of Munster, to Assist at the Conference that is now held in this City, by the Ministers of the Confederate Princes: 'Tis said that some of them will be Deputed to Visit the Fortifications and Magazines of several places on the Lower Rhine. We have Advice that the French have lately sent several Detachments towards Dauphine. The Landgrave of Hesse is returned to Cassel, but a good Number of his Troops will continue at, and about Rhinfelt, till the Fortifications of that place, which were ruined in the late Siege, be Repaired.

Pembroke, Jan. 10. On the 8th Instant put into this Harbor the Leopard of London, Mr. Winter Commander, bound for the Streights. And yesterday their Majesties Ship the Prince of Orange, and the Hart-Ketch, who had Convoyed divers Merchant men to the Irish Coast, in their return put into this Harbor.

Falmouth, Jan. 14. On Tuesday last, the Fleet of Men of War and Merchant Ships bound to the West-Indies, was seen off of this Harbor the Wind at N. E. This day came in the Spanish Expedition-Pacquet Boat from the Greyne, from whence she came on Tuesday last, having in her Voyage taken a small Vessel that was bound to Recbel.

Plymouth, Jan. 15. On the 12th Arrived here from the Eastward, Their Majesties Ships the Bonaventure, Warsprite, Defiance, St. Albans, and Mary-Galley, with about 70 Sail of Merchant Ships under their Convoy, bound for Lisbon, Cadix, &c. and on the 13th they all Sailed again to the Westward; and several Ships that were in this Port bound for Virginia, Sailed hence in Company with them, the Wind blowing fresh at East. The same day the Adventure came in from Cruising. This day arrived here the Unity of Lime bound for Virginia.

Hull, Jan. 14. On Wednesday last arrived here about 20 Sail of Merchant Ships from Rotterdam, under the Convoy of two Dutch Men of War, one of 50, and the other of 26 Guns; the former is gone to the Northward with about 20 Sail more, bound to several Ports on this Coast.

The Mail from Holland of Friday last is not yet come in.
