THE COAL MINES REGULATION ACTS,  
1887 to 1908.

THE METALLIFEROUS MINES REGULATION ACTS, 1872 AND 1875.

THE QUARRIES ACT, 1894.

I hereby order and direct that, for the purposes of inspection under the Coal Mines Regulation Acts, 1887 to 1908, the Metalliferous Mines Regulation Acts, 1872 and 1875, and the Quarries Act, 1894, the United Kingdom shall be divided into the following districts:—

No. 1 or Scotland District consisting of the whole of Scotland.

No. 2 or Newcastle District consisting of the counties of Northumberland and Cumberland, and the northern portion of the county of Durham (namely so much of the county as lies north of a line commencing at the mouth of the River Wear, and following its course westward to the point near the township of Painshaw, where the North Eastern Railway crosses the said river, thence following the said line of the railway north-westward to the Washington Railway Station, and thence the line of the Pontop and South Shields Railway westward to the point where the latter line strikes the boundary line of the township of Medomsley, near Leadgate, thence following the eastern boundary line of the said township of Medomsley northward as far as the River Derwent, and thence proceeding westward along the said River Derwent to the boundary of the county of Northumberland), the detached part of the county of Lancaster, north of Morecambe Bay, and the Isle of Man.
