The following Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland convened in General Assembly, having been transmitted by His Grace the Lord High Commissioner to the Right Honourable Lord Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, has been by him laid before The King, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

To The King's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please Your Majesty,

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, convened in General Assembly, have received with deep respect the gracious letter with which Your Majesty has honoured us in this time of mourning. Even before Your Majesty's letter was read in our Assembly we were deeply moved by observing that the Commission to the Representative of the Sovereign was issued in the Name of Your Majesty's Royal father, and had been signed by him on the day preceding his greatly lamented death. We had met together mourning his loss, and to be again addressed in words from him touched our hearts. He had the loyal affection of our whole Church. We have lively remembrance of his customary presence in his Parish Church of Crathie, and of the most courteous recognition which it was his pleasure to give to representatives of our Church; and the value to us of Your Majesty's letter is greatly enhanced by Your

Majesty's express assurance that our late beloved Sovereign had the deepest regard for the Church of Scotland and the warmest interest in the deliberations of this Assembly.

It is very notable and welcome to us, that Your Majesty has on your accession to the Throne, and again in your gracious letter, renewed the solemn obligation to maintain the Church of Scotland in the full enjoyment of all its rights and privileges, and that Your Majesty assures us of your personal determination to continue undiminished to our Church the countenance and favour shown to it by your father of beloved memory and by your ancestors.

Your Majesty's trust in our attachment to your person and throne is, we earnestly assure Your Majesty, very welcome to us, inheriting as we do in full measure those feelings of loyalty which are traditional in our Church, and which have already been stirred in us afresh by what is known to all of Your Majesty personally, and especially by the interest which you and your Royal Consort have taken in the social well-being of your people.

We thank Your Majesty for your expression of interest in the labours of this the highest Court of our Church, and it is our prayer that the Spirit of God may so guide our thoughts, prompt our words, and rule our decisions, that all we do in this Assembly may be to the glory of God, for the furtherance of the Gospel, and for the welfare of the people in Your Majesty's ancient kingdom of Scotland.

We hail with satisfaction the appointment as Your Majesty's Representative at this General Assembly of the Right Honourable the Earl of

Stair, whose known interest in our Church, of which he is himself an office-bearer, and of whose General Assembly he has often been a member, as well as the historic name he inherits, makes him specially welcome to our whole Assembly.

We have received with gratitude Your Majesty's Royal donation of Two thousand pounds, which we shall use our best endeavour so to apply as to accomplish the pious purposes for which Your Majesty has destined it.

That He, by whom Kings reign and who has called Your Majesty to rule over so great a people, may carry you with all success through the difficult duties of your exalted station, making your reign glorious in our history, that He may long preserve you to be a blessing to the nation, and that He may endow Your Majesty, Your Majesty's Royal Consort, Queen Mary, and the children whom He has given you, with all spiritual and temporal good is the earnest prayer of

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh in Council a scheme bearing date the seventh day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of *Strata Florida*, in the county of *Cardigan* and in the diocese of *Saint David's*.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of *Strata Florida* is vested for an estate in fee simple free from incumbrances in certain trustees upon trust in the first place for *Cornelius Le Brun Powell*, of *Sunny Hill*, *Tregaron*, in the said county of *Cardigan*, Esquire, during his life, and the said *Cornelius Le Brun Powell* is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant.

"And whereas the said *Cornelius Le Brun Powell* is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of *Strata Florida* should be transferred in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the Right Reverend *John*, now Bishop of *Saint David's*, in token that the transfer which is hereinafter recommended and proposed has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of *Strata Florida*, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision

for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the particular district or new parish of *Strata Florida*.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said *Cornelius Le Brun Powell*, being the person whose consent as Patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the first and second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six (in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said *John*, Bishop of *Saint David's* (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), and with the consent of the persons to whom, together with the said *Cornelius Le Brun Powell*, it is hereinafter recommended and proposed that the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage shall be transferred, that is to say, with the consent of *Jessie Florence*, wife of the said *Cornelius Le Brun Powell*; *Charles William Le Brun Powell*, of *Bryn-y-gog*, *Tregaron*, in the said county of *Cardigan*, Esquire; *Cornelius Le Brun Francis Powell*, of Number 5, *Blythwood-road*, *Crouch End*, in the county of *London*, Esquire; and *Jessie Mary Frederica Turner*, of *Park House*, *Church End*, *Willesden*, in the county of *London*, the wife of *Walter Edward Turner*, of the same place, Doctor of Medicine (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of *Strata Florida* shall be transferred to the said *Cornelius Le Brun Powell*, *Jessie Florence Powell*, *Charles William Le Brun Powell*, *Cornelius Le Brun Francis Powell*, and *Jessie Mary Frederica Turner*, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said *Cornelius Le Brun Powell*, *Jessie Florence Powell*, *Charles William Le Brun Powell*, *Cornelius Le Brun Francis Powell*, and *Jessie Mary Frederica Turner*, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Acts: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of *Saint David's*.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-first day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a new archdeaconry within the diocese of Manchester, and for endowing such new archdeaconry, and for altering the boundaries of some of the rural deaneries within the same diocese.

"Whereas the said diocese of Manchester now comprises three archdeaconries and no more, namely, the archdeaconry of Manchester, the archdeaconry of Lancaster, and the archdeaconry of Blackburn.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edmund Arbutnott, Bishop of Manchester, has represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that a new archdeaconry should be constituted within the said diocese of Manchester, and should comprise the rural deaneries of Ashton-under-Lyne, Bolton, Bury, Oldham, Prestwich and Middleton, and Rochdale, which are at present within the said archdeaconry of Manchester, and within the said diocese of Manchester, that such new archdeaconry should be endowed in the same manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed, and that the four parishes or cures or churches of Christ Church, Denton; Saint Lawrence, Denton; Saint Anne, Haughton; and Saint Mary the Virgin, Haughton, shall be dis-severed from the said rural deanery of Ashton-under-Lyne, and shall be annexed to the rural deanery of Ardwick within the said archdeaconry of Manchester.

"And whereas it appears to us to be undesirable that procurations, synodals, visitation fees, and induction fees should be received by the Archdeacon of the said proposed new archdeaconry.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the discontinuance of the collection of the said fees there will be no annual income available for the said proposed archdeaconry from fees, dues, and emoluments, and that the grant hereinafter recommended and proposed will not be such as to raise the annual income of the said proposed archdeaconry to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds.

"Now therefore we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Edmund Arbutnott, Bishop of Manchester (testified by his having signed and

sealed this scheme), humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, one new archdeaconry shall be created within the said diocese of Manchester, and that such archdeaconry shall be named 'the archdeaconry of Rochdale,' and shall comprise and consist of the said rural deaneries of Ashton-under-Lyne, Bolton, Bury, Oldham, Prestwich and Middleton, and Rochdale, and that the areas of the said rural deaneries of Ashton-under-Lyne and Ardwick shall be altered so that the said parishes or cures or churches of Christ Church, Denton; Saint Lawrence, Denton; Saint Anne, Haughton; and Saint Mary the Virgin, Haughton, shall belong to and be part of the said rural deanery of Ardwick, within the said archdeaconry of Manchester, and shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Rural Dean of Ardwick and the Archdeacon of Manchester, and shall not belong to, or be part of any other rural deanery, or be subject to the jurisdiction of any other Rural Dean or of any other Archdeacon.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Rural Deans and other the clergy and the inhabitants generally of the said proposed archdeaconry of Rochdale shall be under and subject to the archidiaconal jurisdiction, authority, and control of the Archdeacon of such proposed archdeaconry for the time being, and that such Archdeacon shall have and exercise all the rights, powers, and duties of an Archdeacon within the limits of his archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that we be authorized to pay by half-yearly instalments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year out of the common fund created by the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act to the Archdeacon of the said proposed archdeaconry of Rochdale and to his successors in the same archdeaconry the yearly sum of two hundred pounds, the instalment so first becoming due being an apportioned part only of the said sum of two hundred pounds in respect of the period between the date of the collation of the first Archdeacon of the said proposed archdeaconry of Rochdale and the first half-yearly day of payment next ensuing: Provided always, that every payment in respect of the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the Archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law, and that he has not collected procurations, synodals, visitation fees, or induction fees during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any Archdeacon who may be entitled to receive the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall resign or otherwise avoid his archdeaconry, such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such Archdeacon or his representatives (as the case may be) and the Archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the Archdeacon affected

thereby, and the said Archdeacon has signified his consent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the parish of Kirkby Overblow, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon, and to be annexed to the new parish of Stainburn, in the same county and diocese, being:—

"All that portion of the said parish of Kirkby Overblow which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the township or civil parish of North Rigton."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district for spiritual purposes comprising a portion of the said parish of Saint Mary, Crumpsall, and also a portion of the parish of Saint Mark, Cheetham Hill (which last named parish is within the original limits of the said parish of Manchester, and was formed as a district under the said Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850), should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Matthew, Crumpsall, which church was not consecrated under the provisions of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbutnot, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said parish of Saint Mary, Crumpsall, and of the said parish of Saint Mark, Cheetham Hill, which

are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be severed and disannexed from such parishes respectively, and shall be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Matthew, Crumpsall, and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes, and shall be named 'The District of Saint Matthew, Crumpsall.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or to any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the herein named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The district of Saint Matthew, Crumpsall, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish (sometime district under the Parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850) of Saint Mary, Crumpsall, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which is bounded upon the south partly by the parish (sometime district under the parish of Manchester Division Act, 1850) of Saint Mark, Cheetham Hill, and partly by the parish of Saint Thomas, Lower Crumpsall, upon the south-east by the last-named parish, upon the north-east by the parish of Saint Peter, Blackley, upon the north partly by the last-named parish and partly by the parish of Saint Andrew, Blackley, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Andrew, Blackley, from the said parish of Saint Mary, Crumpsall, crosses the middle of the footpath leading from Hill Top across the River Irk into Bank-road, and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward along the middle of the said footpath (thereby crossing the said River Irk) for a distance of twelve chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where it meets Bank-road, and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward along the middle of Bank-road for a distance of twenty-two chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Crumpsall-lane, and extending thence westward along the middle of Crumpsall-lane for a distance of two chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction with Hermitage-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Hermitage-road for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its southern end at the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of the houses and premises on the northern side of Claude-street, and extending thence eastward along the said wall or fence for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to the point where it meets the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the house and premises known as Number 13, Lily-street, and extending thence first southward along the last-mentioned wall or fence and then south-eastward along the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the houses and premises on the southern side of Lily-street for a distance in all of two chains and a half or thereabouts to the eastern end of the last-mentioned wall or fence on the western side of the passage running along the backs of the houses on the western side of Lansdowne-road, and extending thence first south-eastward to and then south-

Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Hallow, of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist in Bedwardine (Worcester), and of the said parish of Wichenford, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church called Christ Church, Broadheath, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church, Broadheath.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of Christ Church, Broadheath, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Hallow, of the parish of Saint John the Baptist in Bedwardine (Worcester), and of the parish of Wichenford, all in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Worcester, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of the bridge which carries Oldbury-road across Langhern Brook, and extending thence westward along the middle of Oldbury-road for a distance of twenty-eight chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading from Dines Green to The Knoll, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of fifty-four chains or thereabouts to the point north of the hydraulic pump, where such footpath crosses the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered 1 upon the map or plan annexed to this representation, and extending thence first southward along the said fence, and then westward along the fences forming the southern boundaries of the said close and of the close numbered 2 upon the said map or plan, for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to the point where the fence forming the southern boundary of the said close numbered 2 crosses the middle of the footpath leading to Oldbury Grange, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last mentioned footpath for a distance of ten chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath and roadway leading from Oldbury Farm across Broadheath Common to Upper Broadheath, and extending thence first north-westward and then westward along the middle of the last mentioned footpath and roadway for a distance of fifty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Lower Broadheath to Cotheridge, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of two chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where it is crossed by the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John the Baptist in Bedwardine (Worcester), from the parish of Cotheridge, in the said county and diocese, and extending thence first north-westward and then in various directions along the said boundary (thereby following in part the southern side of the road leading from Upper Broadheath to Cobbler's Green and Wants Green) for a distance of one mile and fourteen chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary

which divides the said parish of Cotheridge from the said parish of Wichenford, and extending thence westward along the last mentioned boundary (thereby continuing to follow the southern side of the last mentioned road) for a distance of twenty-four chains or thereabouts to a point at Tinker's Cross, opposite to the junction of the last mentioned road with the road leading to Boxleys, and extending thence north-eastward in a straight line (thereby passing between Lingings Farm and Horsage Farm) for a distance of forty-one chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Wichenford from the said parish of Hallow turns northward along the fence forming the western boundary of the Sling Coppice, and extending thence first north-westward and then in various directions along the last mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and six chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the civil parish of Wichenford from the civil parish of Kenswick, and extending thence first generally north-westward and then in various directions along the said civil parish boundary (thereby following in part the middle of Langhern Brook) for a distance of one mile and twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said parish of Hallow from the said parish of Wichenford, and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the last mentioned boundary (thereby following the old course of Fitcher Brook) for a distance of one mile and thirty-five chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary reaches the middle of Langhern Brook, and extending thence first generally eastward and then generally southward along the middle of the said brook (thereby following for a short distance the boundary which divides the said parish of Hallow from the said parish of Saint John the Baptist in Bedwardine (Worcester)) for a distance of five miles or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Oldbury-road across the said brook at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Worcester.

And whereas His said late Majesty was pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by the said Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials in the said churchyard:

And whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the time appointed by the said Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials in the said churchyard should be further postponed:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the time appointed for the discontinuance of burials in the parish churchyard of Saint Oswald, Askrigg, in the county of York, be postponed to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and ten.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is provided that, in case it appear to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in such city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected

by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Nether Wasdale, in the county of Cumberland, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, made a representation to His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh in Council stating that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the civil parish of Nether Wasdale aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued in the said parish as hereinafter directed.

And whereas His said late Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and ten, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by the Privy Council on the eighteenth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and ten, and to direct the said Order in Council to be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof to be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said eighteenth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and ten.

And whereas the said Order in Council has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been duly affixed in the manner directed by the said Order:

And whereas the said representation has been taken into consideration by the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the opening of any new burial ground in the said civil parish of Nether Wasdale, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, be and the same is hereby prohibited, and that burials in the said parish be discontinued as follows, viz. :—

NETHER WASDALE, CUMBERLAND.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Nether Wasdale; and in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a) In the walled graves now existing in the said churchyard and belonging or reputed to belong to the Musgrave and Paitson families, burial of the body of one member of the family to which the grave belongs or is reputed to belong may be allowed subject to the condition that the coffin be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b) In the said churchyard, in grave spaces in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the bodies of Hannah Wilson and William Tyson, at their decease, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall in either case be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(a.) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard, and not situate within fifteen feet of any dwelling house, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In any earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard, and not situate within fifteen feet of any dwelling house, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the eleventh day of July next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such Representation one month before the said eleventh day of July.

MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ACT, 1882.

The following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights and liabilities, &c., of the Urban District Council of Wallasey, in the county of Chester, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the provisions of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882" :—

Whereas by the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885, it is enacted that where a Petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the

Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a Scheme for the purposes in the said Acts named and containing such provisions as in the said Acts are particularized.

And whereas in the month of June, one thousand nine hundred and eight, certain Inhabitant Householders of the Urban District of Wallasey, in the county of Chester, did petition His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh praying for the grant of a Charter of Incorporation.

And whereas the said Petition for a Charter was referred to the Committee of Council, and it was proposed by the Charter to create the Urban District of Wallasey, hereinafter described, a Municipal Borough, and to incorporate the Inhabitants thereof, and to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter.

And whereas under and by virtue of the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1845, the Wallasey Improvement Commissioners were constituted and invested with certain powers for paving, lighting, watching, cleansing, and otherwise improving the Parish of Wallasey, in the County of Chester; and for establishing a Police, and also a Market, within the said Parish; and for other purposes.

And whereas under and by virtue of the Public Health Act, 1848, and the Wallasey Order, 1852, confirmed by the Public Health Supplemental Act, 1853 (No. 1) the powers of the Wallasey Improvement Commissioners under the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1845, ceased, and the Local Board for the District of Wallasey (hereinafter called "The Local Board") in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-three were constituted and became invested with various powers and duties.

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 28th day of November, 1876, made in pursuance of Section 4 of the Burial Act, 1857, the Local Board were constituted the Burial Board for the District according to its then existing area.

And whereas Tables of Fees duly allowed and approved in accordance with the provisions of the Burial Acts are now in force within the District.

And whereas under and by virtue of the Public Health Act, 1875, the Local Board were constituted the Urban Sanitary Authority for the Local Government District of Wallasey.

And whereas under and by virtue of the Public Health Act, 1875 (Section 270), and the Wallasey Order (No. 2), 1877 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Caistor Union, &c.) Act, 1877), the Local Government District of Wallasey was extended, and the provisions of certain local Acts were made applicable thereto.

And whereas under and by virtue of the Local Government Act, 1894, the Local Board became the Urban District Council for the Urban District of Wallasey (hereinafter called "The District Council").

And whereas the Education Act, 1902, has come into operation in the District of Wallasey, and the District Council thereof are now the Local Education Authority within the said District for the purposes of Part III of the said Act, and a scheme for the constitution of an Education Committee was made by the District Council on the 12th day of March, 1903, and was approved by the Board of Education on the 23rd day of April, 1903.

And whereas by an Order of the Local Government Board made under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1894, and dated the 26th November, 1895, as amended by their Order of the 23rd September, 1898, the Local Government Board conferred upon the said Urban District Council the power to appoint and to revoke the appointment of assistant overseers for each parish wholly comprised within the Urban District; and by a further Order dated the 20th March, 1896, the power to appoint overseers for each of such parishes; and by a further Order dated the 19th June, 1897, such of the powers, duties, and liabilities of the Vestry of each township wholly comprised within the District as would if the township had been a rural parish with a parish council have been transferred to such council by sub-section (1) of Section 6 of the Act; and also the powers, duties, and liabilities of the overseers of each such township with respect to appeals or objections by the Overseers in respect of the valuation list or appeals in respect of the poor rate or county rate, or the basis of the county rate.

And whereas the following Acts have been adopted by the Local Board and by the District Council and are now in force within the District of the District Council, that is to say:—

1. The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889; adopted on the 24th day of October, 1889.
2. The Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890; adopted on the 4th day of December, 1890.
3. The Public Libraries Acts; adopted on the 3rd day of March, 1898.
4. The Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, part iii.; adopted on the 21st day of April, 1898.
5. The Baths and Washhouses Acts; adopted on the 7th day of February, 1895.

And whereas by the Commissioner's Award, dated the 2nd day of November, 1813, and made pursuant to the Liscard Inclosure Act, 1809, divers commons and waste lands within the Township of Liscard, in the Parish of Wallasey, were set out, allotted and divided, and the boundaries of the said Township of Liscard were ascertained, determined and fixed.

And whereas the Local Government Board have now under consideration a proposal for the amendment of the Bye Laws in force in the Urban District in respect of Horses, Ponies, Mules or Asses standing for hire.

And whereas by the Commissioner's Award, dated the 13th day of May, 1823, and made pursuant to the Wallasey and West Kirby Inclosure Act, 1814, divers commons and waste lands within the Townships of Wallasey and Poulton-cum-Seacombe in the Parish of Wallasey were set out, allotted and divided.

And whereas by the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1858, the Local Board were enabled to construct works, and supply their District with Water and Gas; and their powers with respect to the acquisition and maintenance of Ferries were enlarged.

And whereas by the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1861, further powers were conferred on the Local Board for raising money for the acquisition of Seacombe Ferry; and for incorporating the said Board.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1863 (confirmed by the Local Government Supplemental Act, 1863, (No. 2), the Borrowing powers of the Local Board were extended (Sewerage-works and Water-works).

And whereas by the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1864, powers were conferred on the Local Board to make and maintain a Pier or Landing Stage at New Brighton and a Reservoir in the Township of Liscard; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1867, further powers were conferred on the Local Board with respect to their Ferries and Gas-works, and the raising of further monies; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1870 (confirmed by the Local Government Supplemental Act, 1870), parts of Local Acts in force within the district of the Local Board were repealed and altered (Sewerage-works and Water-works—Borrowing powers, etc.).

And whereas by the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1872, powers were conferred on the Local Board to make and maintain works in connection with their Seacombe and Egremont Ferries, and to extend their Water-works, and to raise further monies; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order of 1876 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Birmingham, etc.) Act, 1876), the Urban Sanitary Authority for the District of Wallasey were enabled to put in force the Compulsory Clauses of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860 and 1869, for the purposes of widening and improving the approaches to Seacombe Ferry.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order (No. 1), 1877 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Caistor Union, &c.) Act, 1877), certain Local Acts were altered, amended and partially repealed (Ferries and Gasworks—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1878 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Bristol, &c.) Act, 1878), the provisions of the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1858, were made applicable to the extended Wallasey Local Government District.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1881, (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Acton, &c.) Act, 1881), certain Local Acts and a Confirming Act were altered and amended (Ferries—Borrowing Powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1883 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 7) Act, 1883), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered and amended (Ferries, Gas-works and Water-works—Borrowing powers, etc.).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1888 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1888), a Local Act and a Confirming Act were altered (Hackney Carriages, etc.).

And whereas by the Wallasey Local Board Act, 1890, powers were conferred on the Local Board with respect to Foreshore; Streets, Buildings and Sewers; Private Street Works; Sanitary Provisions; Water and Gas; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1892 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 12) Act, 1892), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered (Gas-works—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1894 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1894), a Confirming Act was partially repealed (Sewerage-works and Water-works—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1895 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 1) Act, 1895), a Confirming Act was altered (Ferries—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1896 confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1896), a Confirming Act was altered (Gas-works—Borrowing powers),

And whereas by the Wallasey Urban District Council (Promenade) Act, 1896, powers were conferred on the District Council to construct a Promenade and other Works, to acquire certain Lands; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Electric Lighting Order, 1897 (confirmed by the Electric Lighting Orders Confirmation (No. 6) Act, 1897), the District Council were granted certain powers as to Electric Lighting.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1897 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1897), a Local Act and certain Confirming Acts were altered (Ferries—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1898 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1898), a Confirming Act was altered (Gas-works—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Tramways and Improvements Act, 1899, powers were conferred on the District Council with respect to Lands, Tramways, Street Improvements and Promenades; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1899 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1899), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered (Ferries and Gasworks—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1900 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 8) Act, 1900), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered (Ferries—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Improvement Act, 1901, powers were conferred on the District Council with respect to Railway to Gas-works; Streets and Buildings; Infectious Disease; Milk Supply (Tuberculosis); Street Advertisements; Superannuation and Finance; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1902 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 3) Act, 1902), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered (Ferries—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1903 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 1) Act, 1903), certain Local Acts were altered (Water Rent).

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1905 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 8) Act, 1905), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered (Ferries—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Tramways and Improvements Act, 1906, powers were conferred on the District Council with respect to Tramways; Promenades; Lands and further Provisions as to Works; Gas, Water, and Electricity; Streets, Buildings, Sewers and Drains; Infectious Disease and other Sanitary Provisions; Common Lodging-houses; Recreation Grounds; Police and Fire Brigade; Licences and Finance; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1907 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 7) Act, 1907), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered (Ferries—Borrowing powers).

And whereas by the Wallasey Tramways and Improvements Act, 1909, powers were conferred on the District Council with respect to Tramways, Street Improvements and Lands and Finance; and for other purposes.

And whereas by the Wallasey Order, 1909 (confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1909), certain Local Acts and Confirming Acts were altered (Ferries—Borrowing powers).

And whereas the following Acts of Parliament refer and apply in whole or in part to the Urban District of Wallasey or some part thereof:—

The Hoylake Railway Act, 1863,

The Hoylake Railway (New Works) Act, 1865,

The Seacombe, Hoylake and Deeside Railway Act, 1881,

The Seacombe and Deeside Railway Act, 1882,

The Seacombe and Hoylake Railway Act, 1886,

The Wirral Railway Act, 1893,

The Wirral Railway Act, 1895,

And whereas the District Council have made Bye-laws and Regulations with respect to Tramways pursuant to the powers conferred upon them by the Tramways Act, 1870, and the Wallasey Tramways and Improvements Act, 1899, which were allowed by the Board of Trade on the 20th day of June, 1902.

And whereas the District Council on the 5th day of January, 1888, made Regulations under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Orders, 1885 and 1886.

And whereas under the provisions of the Shop Hours Act, 1904, the District Council have made a Closing Order which was confirmed by one of His late Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State on the 22nd day of July, 1909.

And whereas the County Council of Cheshire have made certain Bye-laws for the good rule and government of the Administrative County of Chester, and the same are now in force in the Urban District of Wallasey.

And whereas it is intended that arrangements shall be made for the consolidation of the Police Force of the Borough of Wallasey when constituted by Charter with the Police Force of the County of Chester.

And whereas the District Council are a Local Authority within the meaning of the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885.

And whereas this Scheme before being settled by the Committee of Council was referred for consideration to His late Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, to the Local Government Board, to the Board of Trade and to the Board of Education.

And whereas it is expedient that a Scheme should be made and settled, containing the provisions hereinafter set forth.

Now, therefore, pursuant to the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885, and every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby direct, order and declare as follows:—

This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as "The Borough of Wallasey Scheme, 1910."

The Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Wallasey are in this Scheme referred to as "The Corporation."

This Scheme, when confirmed, shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough created by the said Charter, and this Scheme shall be construed and applied as if it had been dated and confirmed by Parliament or Order in Council on the day before the day of the said first meeting, and everything thereunder shall be done and had accordingly.

This date is hereinafter referred to as "The commencement of this Scheme." So far as may be necessary this Scheme shall operate retrospectively.

From and after the commencement of this Scheme the Municipal Borough created by the said Charter shall be placed within the jurisdiction of the Corporation acting by the Council of the Borough as the Sanitary Authority of the said Borough.

The District Council, their powers, duties, rights, obligations and privileges shall continue and be deemed to have continued to exist until the commencement of this Scheme, unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the grant of the said Charter or the creation of the said Borough. From and after the commencement of this Scheme the District Council shall be and the same are hereby abolished, and their powers, duties, rights, obligations and privileges shall cease and determine.

All the jurisdiction, powers, duties, and property vested in or possessed by the District Council, or by any person or body in trust for them or any of their members as such (and not otherwise dealt with or transferred by or under any part of this Scheme) shall vest in the Corporation, and shall be exercised, held and applied for the municipal and public purposes of the said Borough.

All duties and liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to and were enforceable against the District Council or the property thereof, shall attach to and be enforceable against the Corporation.

Any investigation, legal proceedings or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the District Council before the commencement of this Scheme may be continued, prosecuted or enforced by or against the Corporation.

The term "property" in this Scheme means and includes all property real and personal, and all things in action and all rights of common and commonable rights and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books, and documents and all rights and all claims to relief and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise and includes any estate or interest legal or equitable in or in respect of any property so defined.

The District Fund and General District Rate of the Borough of Wallasey shall for all purposes whatsoever (subject to the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, with respect to the Borough Fund and Borough Rate and Watch Rate respectively) take the place of and be substituted for the District Fund and General District Rate respectively of the District Council, and all sums of money respectively payable to from or out of and all liabilities charged upon or attaching to the District Fund and General District Rate of the said Urban District shall (subject as aforesaid) be paid to from or out of and shall be charged upon the said District Fund and General District Rate of the said Borough respectively.

All the rights, interests, powers, property, privileges, liabilities or obligations vested in or attached to the District Council, under any Statute, Order, Bye-law or Regulation shall pass to, devolve upon, be exercisable by or against, vested in or attached to the Corporation acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the Borough and from and after the commencement of this Scheme the Corporation shall be and continue the legal successors of the Urban District Council of Wallasey for all purposes. The Town Clerk of the Borough shall be substituted for and perform the duties of the Clerk to the District Council.

Any Bye-laws and Regulations under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1875, the Tramways Act, 1870, the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order of 1885, the Shop Hours Act, 1904, and any other Public General Act or Local Act, and any Tables of Fees under the Burial Acts and any other Local or Public General Act, in force within the Urban District of Wallasey at the commencement of this Scheme, shall, unless duly repealed, revoked or varied, continue in force and have operation in the Borough in like manner and with the like effect as if the Corporation acting by the Council and their Officers and the Borough were referred to therein instead of the Local Board or the District Council (as the case may be), and their Officers and the District.

The Bye-laws for the good rule and government of the Administrative County of Chester, so far as they are in force in the Urban District of Wallasey, shall continue in force and be enforced within the Municipal Borough of Wallasey until the expiration of two years from the commencement of this Scheme, or until other Bye-laws for good rule and government made by the Corporation shall have come into force whichever shall first occur.

As soon as may be convenient after the commencement of this Scheme, the Council of the Borough shall prepare and submit to the Board of Education a Scheme for an Education Committee for the Borough, in accordance with the

provisions of Section 17 of the Education Act, 1902.

Until such Scheme shall have been approved by the Board of Education, the members of the Education Committee of the District Council who are in office immediately before the commencement of this Scheme shall be deemed to have been appointed and shall be the Education Committee for the Borough of Wallasey.

As soon as the Scheme of the Borough Council shall have been approved by the Board of Education the Education Committee appointed by the District Council shall be dissolved and cease to exist.

SAVING FOR RATES, &c.

Notwithstanding the incorporation of the Borough and the provisions of this Scheme, all rates, assessments, compositions, charges, mortgages, contracts, leases, conveyances, deeds, documents, acts, matters and things made, entered into, or done before the commencement of this Scheme, by, to, or with reference to the District Council, shall be as good, valid and effectual to all intents and purposes whatsoever for, against and with reference to the Corporation as if the same had been done, entered into, or done by, to or with reference to the Corporation instead of the District Council and may be proceeded on or enforced in the same manner in all respects as if the Corporation instead of the District Council had been party or privy to the same and had been named or referred to therein.

In case any Officer of the District Council who shall have been employed by the District Council shall not be employed by the Council of the said Borough, nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid by way of compensation for the loss of his position out of the funds of or under the control of the Corporation acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority for the said Borough, and the amount to be paid in each case shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of Section 120 of the Local Government Act, 1888, and Sub-Sections (1) to (7) inclusive, of that Section, shall apply as if they formed part of this Scheme, with the substitution of the words "Borough Council" for "County Council," and "this Scheme" for "this Act," and with such other modifications as are necessary to make them applicable hereto.

Provided, nevertheless, that if any such Officer be so employed by the said Corporation and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct), within four years of the commencement of this Scheme he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Corporation. Provided that the term "Officer" shall include only persons employed by the said Council whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month and no other persons.

The accounts of the District Council and their Officers shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the District Auditor, in like manner, and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions, and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted and the provisions of Sections 247 and 250 of the Public Health Act, 1875, as amended by the District Auditors Act, 1879, and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of Local Boards or Urban District Councils, and of their Officers shall apply to such audit; and the provisions of this Scheme with respect to the

District Council shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character, and operation to the purposes of such audit; any money certified to be due from any person by the District Auditor at such audit shall be paid by such person to the Treasurer of the Borough.

enable overtaking pedestrians, vehicles, horses
or cattle to pass by. And the person in
charge of such locomotive shall, upon re-
ceiving any such signal as aforesaid, imme-
diately stop such locomotive and waggon's or
draw it and them to the side of the highway,
as the case may require.
