**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh in Council a scheme bearing date the seventh day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Helen, Stonegate, in the city and county of the city of York and in the diocese of York, between that benefice and a certain other benefice, namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Mary, Bishophill Senior, York, which said last-named benefice is situate in the said city and county of the city of York and in the said diocese of York.

“Whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, is the Patron in right of his See of the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, York, and also of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Bishophill Senior, York.

“And whereas the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, has represented to us and we are of opinion that the apportionment hereinafter recommended and proposed is desirable.

“And whereas the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, York, is now vacant.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, acting as Archbishop of the Province and as Ordinary of the diocese within which each of the said two benefices is situate, and also as the Patron in right of his See of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof the said Archbishop has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date upon which any Order of Your Majesty

in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted order, the yearly sum or stipend of fifty-three pounds six shillings and eightpence now payable by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, York, and also all that capital sum of six hundred and sixty-nine pounds fourteen shillings and sixpence now held by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty in favour of the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, York, and also all that sum of two hundred and seventy pounds nine shillings and eightpence two pounds ten shillings per centum consolidated stock now standing in the books of the Paymaster-General in the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice to the credit of the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, York, shall be transferred by way of apportionment from such benefice and shall be annexed to and form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Saint Mary, Bishophill Senior, York.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”
