To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Loyal and Dutiful Address of the Council of the Administrative County of London.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, the Council of the Administrative County of London, the representative authority of the inhabitants of the capital of the Empire, humbly approach Your Majesty that we may lay before Your Majesty the expression of our feelings on the occasion of the death of our late much-loved King and of the accession of Your Majesty to the Throne.

We venture humbly to assure Your Majesty that we share to the full the sorrow which the death of His late Majesty King Edward VII has awakened in the hearts not only of the people of this Kingdom, but of our fellow subjects in the dominions beyond the seas and in India.

We ask also leave to say that in an especial degree this loss appeals to us because of the many signal acts of Royal favour with which His late Majesty honoured us, and the sympathy and recognition which He always gave to the work which has fallen to us to perform for the capital of the Empire, in the governance of

which His Majesty took a great and abiding interest, and in the midst of which He frequently made his residence, ever caring for the health, beauty and comfort of this great county.

In the grief of Your Majesty and Your Majesty's Royal House, and especially in the pre-eminent grief of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Alexandra, we venture to express very respectfully the sympathy of the people of London.

We pray Your Majesty to believe that we hail with the utmost satisfaction Your Majesty's accession to the Throne. Assured as well by the gracious messages addressed to the nation as by the recollection of Your Majesty's personal interest in the great work in which we are engaged, we are confident that our labours for the amelioration of the lot of those least fortunately placed, the education of the future industrial population of London, and the provision of the many and varied necessities essential for the well-being of so vast a community, will receive at Your Majesty's hands a continuance of Royal sympathy and support. We gratefully recall that Your Majesty and Her Majesty Queen Mary, as Prince and Princess of Wales, honoured the Council by inaugurating its electrified tramway system, visiting its suburban working class cottages at Tooting, and opening Rotherhithe-tunnel, and by being present on other notable occasions associated with its municipal work.

We humbly assure Your Majesty of our whole-hearted loyalty and of our devotion to the persons of Your Majesty and Your Majesty's Gracious and Royal Consort, Her Majesty Queen Mary, daughter of a much loved Princess of the British Royal House. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, bave prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Tatsfield, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Southwark.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Tatsfield is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession in certain trustees upon trust in the first place for Granville Charles Gresham Leveson Gower, of Titsey-place, in the county of Surrey, Esquire, during his life, and the said Granville Charles Gresham Leveson Gower is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant.

"And whereas the said Granville Charles

Gresham Leveson Gower is desirous that the whole advowsou or perpetual right of patronage

of and presentation to the said benefice of Tatsfield should be transferred in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, now Bishop of Southwark, is consenting to the transfer of the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage hereinafter recommended and proposed and has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Tatsfield which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Tatsfield.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Granville Charles Gresham Leveson Gower, being the person whose consent as Patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the first and second years Acts and of the Act of the first and second years of Her soid late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six (in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of Southwark (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his consent seal) and with the consent of the episcopal seal), and with the consent of the persons to whom together with the said Granville Charles Gresham Leveson Gower it is hereinafter recommended and proposed that the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage shall be transferred, that is to say, with the consent of the Reverend Frederick Archibald Gresham Leveson Gower, of Linton Vicarage, Maidstone, in the county of Kent, Clerk in Holy Orders, and the Reverend Richard Busk Paterson Wells, of Cartmel Vicarage, Carnforth, in the county of Lancaster, Clerk in Holy Orders (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Tatsfield shall be transferred to the said Granville Charles Gresham Leveson Gower, Frederick Archibald Gresham Leveson Gower, and Richard Busk Paterson Wells, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Granville Charles Gresham Leveson Gower, Frederick Archibald Gresham Leveson Gower, and Richard Busk Paterson Wells, their heirs and assigns for ever.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Southwark.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Catherington is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in the Reverend Samuel Gilbert Scott, of the Rectory, Havant, in the county of Southampton, Clerk in Holy Orders and an Honorary Canon of the Cathedral Church of Winchester.

"And whereas the said Samuel Gilbert Scott is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Catherington now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, now Bishop of Winchester, and his successors in the same bishoprick.

"And whereas the said Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

The KING has been pleased to approve of the Albert Medal of the First Class being conferred upon Mr. Charles Wagner and the Albert Medal of the Second Class upon Mr. Alexander James Stewart, both of Pietermaritzburg, for gallantry in saving life as detailed below:—

On the 15th November, 1899, near Chieveley Station, in Natal, an armoured train which had been sent out on patrol was intercepted by the Boers and three carriages were thrown off the line. These vehicles lay between the rest of the train and the track over which it must travel on its homeward journey, and until they were removed the train, the engine and its escort—about 150 men—were exposed to a severe converging fire of rifles and artillery from the surrounding hills.

The sole means by which the line could be cleared was the engine, which moving to and fro butted at the wreckage until after about 50 minutes' work it was heaved and pushed off the track. The part played by the driver of the engine, Charles Wagner, and by the fireman, Alexander James Stewart, was therefore indispensable to the rescue of the wounded with whom the engine and its tender became crowded. The working of the engine itself was a difficult matter, because at each collision with the wreckage at which it was butting it might easily have been derailed.

The danger was exceptional. The heavy fire of shells and bullets inflicted many casualties, and more than one quarter of all in the train were killed or wounded. The shells repeatedly struck the engine and at any moment might have exploded the boiler. The driver, a civilian, under no military code, was wounded severely in the scalp by a shell-splinter almost immediately. Although in great pain he did not fail during the whole of this affair to manage his engine skilfully, and by clearing the line

saved from death and wounds a proportion at least of the 50 or 60 persons who effected their escape upon the engine and its tender.

Both the driver and his fireman are still in the service of the Natal Government Railways.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 11TH JUNE 1910.)

JARDIGANSHIRE (SHEEP-SCAB REGULA-TIONS) ORDER OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Power to make Regulations.

- 1.—(1.) The Council of the county of Cardigan may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of sheep-scab, make Regulations for all or any of the following purposes:—
 - (i) For prohibiting the movement to any premises in the county, from any premises outside the county, or from any mountain, moor, fell or common, or from any uninclosed land in the county, of sheep removed for wintering purposes
 - (a) unless the sheep have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the prescribed manner before the movement takes place, and are accompanied by a declaration signed by the owner of the sheep, or his duly authorised agent, stating that the sheep have been so dipped and the date and place of dipping; or
 - (b) unless the movement is authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Council which may require as a condition that the sheep shall be moved to premises therein specified and there be detained isolated and dipped in the prescribed manner after their arrival;

and such Regulations may apply to the movement for wintering purposes and to the return movement or to either of such movements.

- (ii) For requiring sheep to which the Regulations apply and which have not been dipped in the prescribed manner before the movement to be kept separate from other sheep during the movement.
- (iii) For requiring the owner of any sheep to which the Regulations apply as soon as practicable to notify to an Inspector of the Council the completion of the movement, and the premises where the sheep are kept, and to give or send to him the declaration or licence relating to the movement.
- (2.) The Regulations may be limited to movement from a particular county or part of a county, or from a particular mountain, moor, fell or common, or a particular area of uninclosed land, or to movement from the mountains, moors, fells or commons, or the uninclosed lands in an area described in the Regulations.

(3.) The Regulations shall not

- (i) apply to sheep which are being moved with a licence under the Sheep-Scab (Compulsory Dipping Areas) Order of 1906; or
- (ii) require the dipping of sheep which have within twenty-eight days before the movement

been dipped under and in accordance with any Order of the Board or of any notice served thereunder, or for the purpose of complying with any provision contained in any Order of the Board which regulates the movement of sheep or any Regulations made thereunder.

Provision in case of Movement of Sheep in contravention of Regulations.

4. Where any sheep have been moved in contravention of the Regulations an Inspector of the Council may, without prejudice to any pro-ceedings for the offence, serve the owner or person in charge of the sheep and the owner or person in charge of any sheep then in contact with the sheep with a notice requiring the dipping of the sheep described in the notice, and prohibiting their movement from the farm, holding, or other place where they are at the time the notice is served (except with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Council) until all the sheep shall have been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip after the seivice of the notice in the presence and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Council, or have been slaughtered, and thereupon it shall be unlawful to move the sheep in contravention of the notice.

Provisions as to Regulations.

- 5.—(1.) The Council shall forthwith send to the Board two copies of every Regulation made by them under this Order.
- (2.) If the Board are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any Regulation made by the Council under this Order, that the same is for any reason objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.
- (3.) The power to make Regulations under this Order shall be exercised only by the Council or their Executive Committee and shall not be deputed to any other Committee or Sub-Committee.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

- 6.—(1.) Any person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under the Regulations a declaration or licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of the Council, produce and show to him the declaration or licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.
- (2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

7.—(1.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of the Regulations or a Notice under this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which

the sheep is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

- (2.) If a sheep is not dipped or is not isolated as required by the Regulations or any licence or notice, the owner and person in charge of the sheep shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (3.) If a person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under the Regulations a declaration or licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (4.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a declaration or licence as required by the Regulations, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

- 8. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—
 - "Efficient sheep-dip" means a sheep-dip approved by the Board for sheep-scab, or purporting to be so approved:
 - "County" means administrative county:
 - "Prescribed" means prescribed by Regulations made under this Order:
 - "Inspector" includes Veterinary Inspector:
 - "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:
 - "The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

9. This Order may be cited as the Cardiganshire (Sheep-Scab Regulations) Order of 1910.

AMERICAN GOOSEBERRY MILDEW (CHAPEL FIELDS ALLOTMENTS) ORDER OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Destructive Insects and Pests!

Acts, 1877 and 1907, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of the Order.

1. This Order shall apply to the allotments known as the Chapel Fields Allotments in the parish of Somersham in the county of Huntingdon.

Definitions.

- 2. In this Order-
- "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:
- "An allotment" means an allotment to which this Order applies:
- "Disease" means the disease affecting gooseberry and currant bushes which is known as Sphaerotheca mors-uvae or American Gooseberry Mildew; and "diseased" means affected with disease:
- "Article" means Article of this Order.

Removal of Gooseberries from an Allotment.

3. Gooseberries shall not be removed from an allotment except with a permit signed by an Inspector of the Board authorising the removal, which permit shall be attached to the sieve or other receptacle containing the gooseberries in such manner as to be seen readily.

Precautions in Picking Gooseberries on an Allotment.

4. The occupier of an allotment shall take such steps as are necessary to secure compliance with the conditions of this Article and to carry out such other precautions against the spread of disease from his allotment as an Inspector of the Board may think necessary, and require him to carry out; provided that an Inspector of the Board may in writing exempt an allotment from the operation of this Article or any condition therein contained.

Conditions.

- (a) Whenever fruit is picked one picker shall be sent in advance of the others who shall pick all diseased gooseberries and drop them into a can containing a suitable quantity of paraffin. The diseased gooseberries shall subsequently be burnt.
- (b) All pickers shall be girt with aprons or other suitable protection in such a way that the disease cannot be conveyed to their clothes, and these aprons or other protection shall be dipped in boiling water before being taken to any other garden and also at the close of each day.
- (c) The pickers shall collect the gooseberries in baskets or bags and carry them to some convenient part of the allotment where the gooseberries shall be emptied out on to a sheet and again examined. Diseased gooseberries shall be at once destroyed. Sound gooseberries may then be placed in the receptacle in which they are to be removed from the allotment.
- (d) No sieve or other receptacle in which gooseberries are to be removed from the allotment shall be brought into the allotment among the bushes.
- (e) The baskets in which the gooseberries are gathered by the pickers shall be disinfected by dipping in boiling water at such times as may be

required by the Inspector and shall not be taken to any other garden until so disinfected.

Offences.

- 5. Every person shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, who-
 - (1.) removes any gooseberries in contravention of this Order; or
 - (2.) fails to adopt such measures for prevention of the spread of the disease as are specified in Article 4.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the tenth day of June, nineteen hundred and
